

Two 'Mixers' Will Introduce Freshmen, New Students To University Theater Activities

To Give Several Plays For Freshmen At First Meeting

Freshmen and all new students interested in dramatics will be introduced to the activities of University theater and this year's plans for freshman university dramatic productions at two theater mixers this week, Prof. Edward C. Mabie, director of University theater, announced yesterday.

The first meeting, designed solely for freshmen, will be Tuesday at 7 p.m. in the auditorium of the dramatic arts building. Professor Mabie will outline the freshman program, which will include several productions in the university's newest playhouse, the drawing room theater.

"Spring Dances" by Philip Barry will be the first play to be produced in the drawing room theater. It will be directed by Bramer Sherman, G of New York, N.Y.; Max Ellis, G of Ft. Madison, and Hayes Newby, G of Cleveland.

The second mixer will be Thursday at 7:30 p.m. when University theater will hold "open house" for all students—freshmen and transfers particularly. During the second get-acquainted meeting Professor Mabie will present University theater plans for the year. Donald Winbiger will also take part in the introduction of theater activities. New members of the board of governors of University theater will also be presented during the second get-acquainted meeting. The equipment and stage facilities of the new theater, used last year for the first time, will also be explained to students. Refreshments will be served at the end of the meeting. The BOOK PARADE

Informality, Easiness, Naivete Mark Van Loon's Latest Work

Author of 'The Arts' Explains Subject With Clarity

"THE ARTS" by Hendrik Willem van Loon. (Simon and Schuster, 1937, \$3.95.) I am sorry to confess that I have not read all of the some 300,000 words in van Loon's history of fine arts. It's not the kind of book anyone—excepting possibly long-haired art majors—will read from beginning to end without stopping. But at some time or other—and quite soon—I plan to go back, reread parts of the narrative and begin those parts I didn't find time to do.

The keynote of this weighty but thoroughly undull book is informality, the man-to-man approach, the idea that you and I can talk together about the greatest works of art, weigh them with relation to meaning and use to mankind, say what we think as frankly, courageously and honestly as Hendrik does.

Almost everyone knows that the Greeks built the Acropolis and that the Romans built the Colosseum, but to most of us the Byzantine, Levantine, Venetian and Renaissance may simply be titles for movie houses. But Hendrik van Loon has a talent for explanations. He is especially facile in tracing a house from a mud hut to a palace, in describing how man first indicated sound on paper by primitive notes. He tells why baroque decoration in churches was meant to impress rather than inspire and why the billowing dress of heavy silks and velvets in the Renaissance meant that the woman of the mature 30's was lordling it

over the young woman. He shows the effect of patronage and propaganda on artists. This form of simplification is necessary and useful. It coordinates our knowledge and dusts it off. The academicians and the intellectuals are apt to hide things from the people by pretending inside knowledge and a special dialect. Hendrik closes his book with a firm hand. "I did not write this book to give you a lot of facts," he declares. He is interested in art as life; he wants to let his readers see the whys and the wherefores. The historical data is present but unobtrusive.

Too Informal
The artists, I suspect, may find fault with van Loon. He is too informal, too easy, too readable. The historians would be displeased with the naivete of "The Story of Mankind," and "The Story of America." Van Loon does not write for the intellectuals or the college professors, but he does write, and writes indeed well, for the average among us.

If you know nothing at all about art or if you know a great deal about it in a vague sort of way, you'll find "The Arts" helpful and worthwhile. Van Loon is performing a service for mankind by putting our loose-ended information in an orderly manner.

Younghill Kang Writes Another Admirable Book

"EAST GOES WEST" by Younghill Kang. (Charles Scribner's Sons, 1937, \$2.75.)

Younghill Kang is still a young man in his 30's but already he is a professor of literature at New York university and on the staff of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Already, too, he has written three excellent books, one of which—"The Grass Root"—has been hailed as among the finest books of the far east yet published. Written with a style fresh and invigorating as a morning rain, Kang's book might well be subtitled "The Discovery of America." Penniless, misunderstood, puzzled, Kang came to America at 18—"with little money and no prestige." Where he was going or what he would do, he had no idea. Of one thing alone, he was sure. He was determined to throw off all that was oriental in his make up and take on all that was occidental.

Sees American Fallacy
How he eked out a bare living and still kept up his college work, how he lived for a time in a Korean-managed hotel and ate in a Korean-managed restaurant while he was penniless, how he wooed and won a young Wellesley graduate nick-named "Trip," and how he sold books, hitch-hiked, clerked in a department store, before he found his place in the world—these make as charming and unconventional a book as has been issued this year. Kang has found more of life in America than most Americans. He can see the fallacy of American thinking and much of American false believing. He can write, and write well, of his search for a western world. "I entered a new

State Service To Give Exam

Leib Announces Final Date for Filing of Applications

Eligibility examinations for positions in the Iowa state employment service, a division of the unemployment compensation commission, and in the national employment service in this state have been announced by Prof. Karl Leib of the college of commerce, special representative of the U. S. employment service. Applications for examinations must be filed by Oct. 23. Examinations will be held for positions in both administrative and local employment offices. All examinations are open to both men and women. All applicants must be legal residents of the state of Iowa and citizens of the United States. Besides minimum requirements which vary with the position, all competitors must have had a background of full-time paid employment in work providing familiarity with employment problems and practices. Positions to be filled in the state administrative offices are: director, administrative assistant, statistical supervisor and fiscal supervisor. Positions in local employment offices are manager, assistant manager, senior interviewer and junior interviewer. Complete information and application forms may be obtained from Professor Leib.
