hands and his flat vestigial feet, no less useful for this purpose than those of his Simian ancestors.

The implication of Dr. Hooton's remarks is that the human body will ultimately become a soft, inactive mass of protoplasm, useless and defenseless. Is this entirely true?

Another eminent scientist has said that some thousands of years from now the human body will be smaller and weaker, the limbs will be somewhat reduced in length and man will have neither outer ears nor teeth.

It is this man's belief that such changes will not be to the disadvantage of humans—that they will not cause man to be exterminated. On the contrary, he thinks man's brain will have developed apace with his deterioration in physical strength. What man now accomplishes through sheer physical energy will then be done by the initiative of his brain.

We cannot be certain now what man will be like in ages to come, but the loss of physical strength should not mean man's ultimate destruction. Man is the first and only reasoning animal; the brain and not force will some day be the dominant factor in this world, and if man's brain continues to develop in the future, man will possess this dominant factor.

WHAT NORA FOUND

How the present revival of "A Doll's House" in Chicago takes the mind back to those push decades when Ibsen bewitched the drama like a grim Norse troll, gave tongue to the secret desires and judgments of millions of restive wives, and spurred women everywhere into their break for freedom! More than any other playwright in history, he not only shattered beloved frauds but also let loose a social force which finally culminated in woman's assured entrance into business, the arts and professions, politics and the voting booth.

How men cringed and their consorts exulted when Norma Helmer grew tired of leading a doll's life, abjured Thorwald as an uxorious satrap, visioned the world as an arena where woman's work was yet to be done, and spoke these words ere she went out into the night: "I am going to see if I can make out who is right, the world or I."

Since those brave days, how many Noras have come to know the real nature of the world which they had imagined as "man-made" in corruption, selfishness, and tyranny, steeped in freedom, adventure, and romance, and awaiting only the pure hand of woman to mold it more closely to beneficence! As earnest of their stainless mission to clear the mire from politics, the English suffragists threw acid on oil paintings, bricks at prime ministers, and words about the "oppression" of women through the ages. Never having read genuine history, they described the centuries as quivering with the groans of noble ladies immured in castles while the knights cavorted, with the submission of hemstitching wives while the burgher husbands made all the money, and with the shrieks of peasant wives slapped down by drunken brutes. That by a process of indirection, inspiration, and sheer subtlety women had created the age of chivalry, dominated every oriental empire, changed the history of France, and otherwise ruled the world never entered their pretty heads, or came forth from their very active tongues. That man, tyrant man, whether he was prince or artisan, seldom horsed about, but rather bent to onerous tasks and "oppressions" of every kind never gained credence in their valiant crusade.

Today Nora has swept away thousands of the abuses of inheritance, property and juridical "man-made" rights, but she has come through as a sadder, wiser, and much more sensible woman. The romance of man's wars, the glory of man's office work, the rewards of man's privileged slavery to man; these she has shared and come to estimate at their actual worth. To the "drudgery" of housework and raising children, to the "confined" dullness of a woman's world, Nora has more and more returned, rather than endure the much more appalling drudgery and dullness of the "man-made" world. No less has she taken up those occupations which she can do better than any man—not for being a free soul but for being a woman with a woman's genius for the intuitive, the particular, the realistic, and with the supreme ability to make men do what they think they are doing from their own initiative, but really are doing from a hypnotism as invisible as night and as invincible as the forces which move the tides.

Nora has found the world as neither right nor wrong, but simply as the world where the infinite complexity of "oppression" can only be resolved by Thorwald's spade-work ennobled by the creative mind, and by Nora's woman-given capacity to do what she alone can do.

Heart Is Handy Organ, Despite Increasing Number of Deaths

Last month's issue of a national magazine contained an article entitled, "Death Comes to the Average Man." It dealt with heart disease, which, it was said, kills more people than cancer, tuberculosis, Bright's disease and pneumonia, put together.

In adult people its frequency is striking. Of 2,000 graduates of a great university, it was found that of every 1,000 deaths, 630 were due to heart disease or blood vessel disease. This checks closely with a study of 3,581 American physicians who died in 1936, and in these, 624 out of every 1,000 were heart deaths. Of course, these figures look more alarming than they actually are.

The work of the heart is a beautifully adapted piece of mechanism. There are six and one-half quarts of blood in the body. The heart, as a hollow muscle, has to pump this all over, bringing food and oxygen to all the billions of cells of the body. It works tirelessly and endlessly, and the amount of work that it does has been calculated to be equal to raising a man of average weight in an elevator four yards every 10 minutes.

Chick Meehan Quits Coaching Leaves Manhattan Job To Give Time To His Business

NEW YORK, Dec. 14 (AP)—John F. (Chick) Meehan, head football coach at Manhattan college for the past six years, today resigned his post in order to devote his entire time to business affairs. College authorities said no successor had yet been considered.

Meehan formerly coached football at Syracuse and New York university, turning out top-flight teams at both universities. He took over the reins at Manhattan six years ago with the announcement he intended to become a "small time" coach, but has gradually built up the Jaspers' teams until they have won national recognition.

The 1937 team was the most successful Meehan has turned out at Manhattan, winning six games, losing three and tying one. Meehan was coaching at Syracuse in 1915, 16 and 17 before going overseas in the navy during the war. He returned as assistant coach at Syracuse and became head coach in 1920, serving for five years.

Taking over at N.Y.U. in 1925, Meehan brought nation-wide fame to the "Violent Violets," who never before had achieved much in athletics. During his seven-year term, his football teams won 49 games, lost 15 and tied four. Among his pupils were such stars as Ken Strong, all-America fullback, Al Lassman and Len Grant.

Meehan left N.Y.U. at the expiration of a contract which made him one of the highest-paid football coaches in America. He asked the Violet authorities not to consider offering him a new contract after a student publication had demanded his dismissal as the sponsor of an undesirable system of "big time" football.

Within two weeks he was signed as football coach and athletic director at Manhattan with the understanding that "there will be no high pressure, no ballyhoo." The Jaspers have departed from that program to some extent, stiffening their schedule from year to year, but they never equalled the meteoric rise of Meehan's N.Y.U. teams. In his six seasons

as coach they won 31 games, lost 21 and tied six. Meehan also devoted considerable time to other sports, introducing rowing at Manhattan and building up an intra-mural program.



Liquor Sales For November Show Increase

A state survey indicated that only a few stores showed a decrease over the preceding month's sales. Among those which did not respond to the holiday spirit with increased liquor purchases were the residents of Waterloo and Marshalltown, both showing a decrease of about \$2,000.

Patrolmen Mark Autoists Death Spots With Pins on Station's Iowa Road Map

Every time a fatal motor accident occurs in Iowa, state highway patrolmen mark the scene of the crash on an Iowa road map hanging in their patrol stations. The map of the unit at West Liberty is dotted with more than 530 white-capped pins — each denoting the death spot of one or more motorists. The number of death markers during 1937 already equals the entire number used during 1936 — and 16 more days remain before the year ends. State highway patrolmen, directed by Sgt. Edward Faber at West Liberty, believe that the 1937 death list will exceed the 1936 fatalities. "The pavements — glazed by sleet yesterday — are bound to be more dangerous now," one patrolman said. "We urge all drivers to keep off the highways unless it is absolutely necessary, and then to drive only with caution."

John Heller Jr. Will Discuss Stabilizing Employment Need

To Speak at Meeting Of Eagle Lodge Tomorrow

The necessity of stabilizing employment in order to guarantee the economic welfare of America will be the chief subject developed by John W. Heller Jr., of York, Pa., national president of the Eagles lodge, when he addresses the local lodge at a special meeting beginning at 7 p.m. tomorrow.

Heller is a veteran Eagle and has been outstanding in the fraternity's fight for social justice. He is making an official tour of the 1,187 lodges in the Eagles organization.

General arrangements for tomorrow night's meeting are in the hands of John Lemons, worthy president of the Iowa City lodge. Formal initiation of candidates will take place at the meeting. Attorney Will J. Hayek will act as toastmaster of the banquet honoring the national president which will follow the meeting. George Reichardt is in charge of banquet arrangements and Larry Lechy of speakers' arrangements. Attorney E. A. Baldwin will address the Eagles gathering in addition to the national president's address.

Heller's message will deal with the social welfare activities of the Eagles organization. The fraternity is sponsor of the Eagles-Ludlow bill, a plan to insure the working man a steady job at a living wage.

"For 30 years the social philosophy of the Eagles has been based on the protection of the family," worthy president Lemons stated yesterday. "Forty-seven states have pension laws both for needy aged and for needy mothers. When we took up these causes, not a state or county had such laws."

"Members of our fraternity believe that until men can work steadily enough to maintain a good standard of living and to provide for their old age we will be threatened constantly by severe depressions. Therefore, we, Eagles are eager to secure passage of this legislation which would be a means of averting these economic upheavals and the suffering that results from them." It is with this program that the national president will deal.

The \$2 bounty is being paid county residents for the first time this year.


Cedar Rapids Man Pays Speeding Fine


