



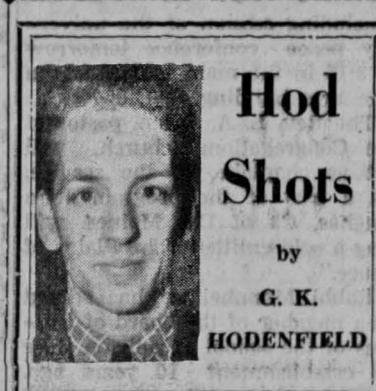

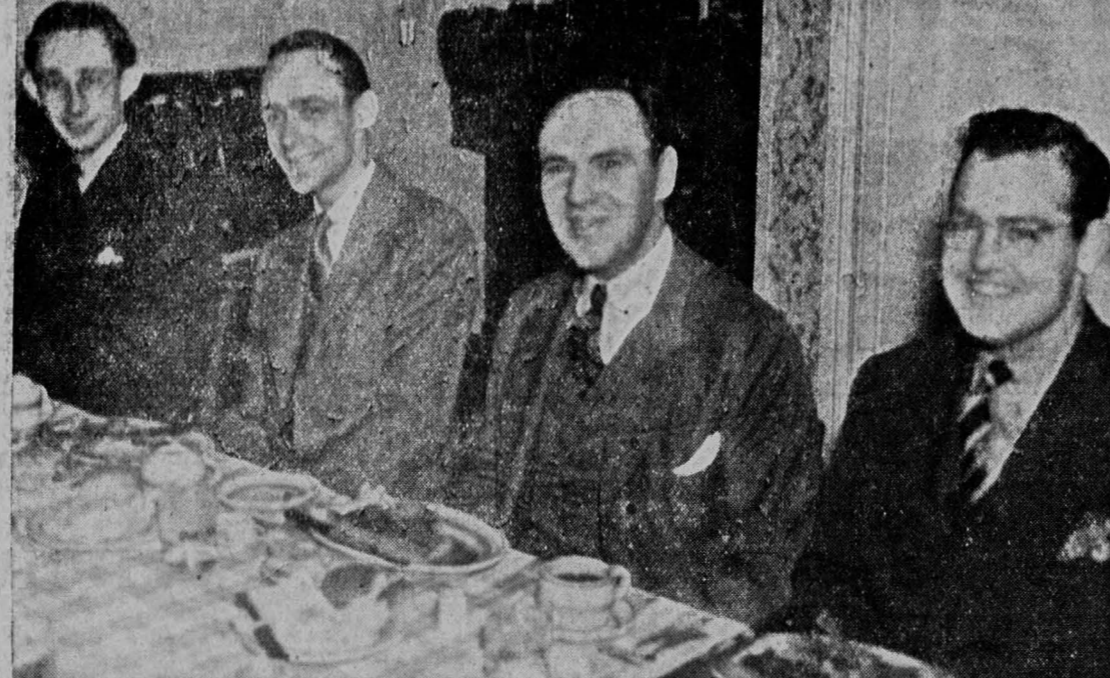

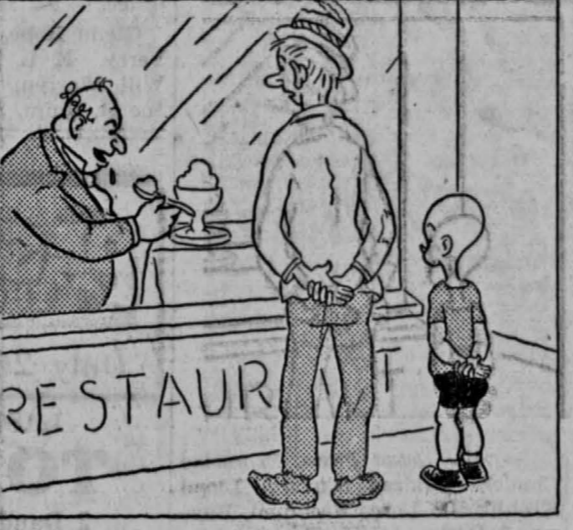
**Private Boat Train**

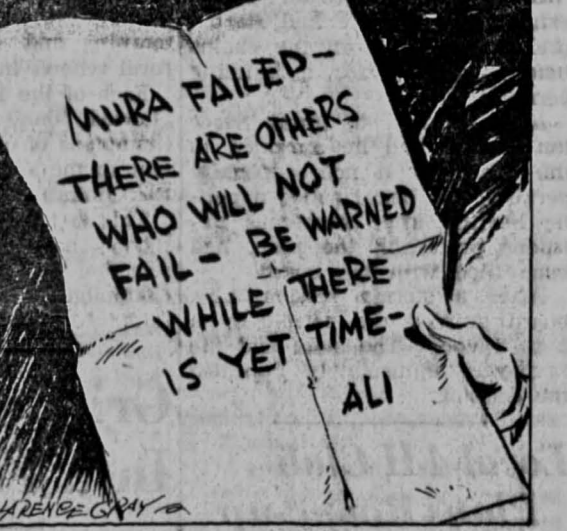

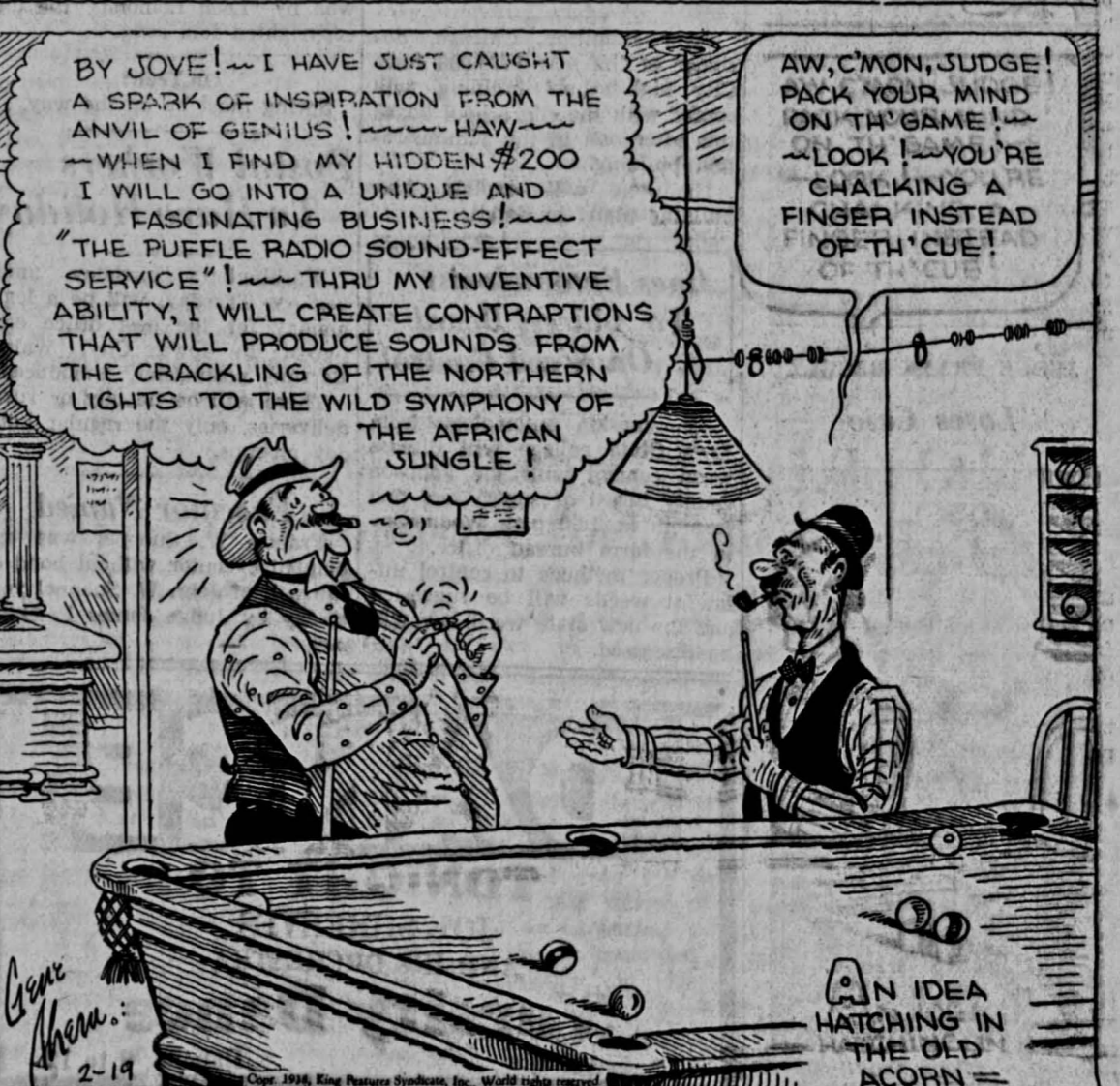
