We Need More Housing as Soon as Possible

(Second in a Series of Articles) The only satisfactory solution to the problem of how to provide good housing for married students—veterans and otherwise—is to build apartment dormitories with small units which could be rented inexpensively.

Such building could be done either by the university or by a private organization. It seems very unlikely, however, that a private group would be interested.

And if the university is to do it, another ruling—this time a favorable one—must be obtained from the state attorney general, or the legislature must pass a law authorizing such construction.

portance of providing good living facilities as well as good classroom equipment. We ask the university to do everything it can IMMEDIATELY to overcome the legal barriers to a housing solution, and then to start construction—temporary or permanent—as soon as materials become available, and not wait a year or two until costs MAY be somewhat lower.

At least the university should have its blueprints drawn, ready to start action the minute the way is cleared. That has not been done. The university also should be taking steps to see that as many of the housing units vacated by the departing naval personnel as possible be opened to married students.

We need money from the state, or at least permission to build dormitory apartments. And we need it now. Can the state legislature's interim committee, which is to be on the campus today, do anything to relieve our housing problem? We urge the committee's earnest consideration of this matter, with a view to action at the earliest moment.

By JAMES D. WHITE SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — It seems the Chinese take a dime view of the Shidehara cabinet in Tokyo, which many Americans think of as quite a liberal outfit.

Chinese doubt, cabled here by the official Chinese news agency, is expressed by the Chungking Ts Kung Pao, a paper which often reflects official thinking in China.

Actually the chief mission of the Shidehara cabinet, says the Ts Kung Pao, "will not differ from that of the two preceding cabinets, that is, to strengthen or stabilize the position of the Japanese emperor, by all means."

America Has Reached Forkroad of Destiny, Says Admiral Halsey

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Admiral Halsey declared last night that America had reached a "rendezvous with destiny" from which it could head toward permanent peace or back to where the nation was four years ago.

Calling Japan a ruthless foe, he emphasized his belief that it must not be admitted to the society of civilized nations until it proved itself worthy.

The old sea dog, commander of the famed third fleet, in an address prepared for delivery at a civic homecoming banquet, related the difficulties overcome from the "shoestring era" until the thudding blows against Japan forced the enemy's sudden surrender.

"If anybody had asked me what sort of shoulder patch we felt was appropriate for the South Pacific force in late 1942 and early 1943," the admiral said, "I'd have told him, without hesitation: 'a frayed shoelace—fastened with a rusty nail!'"

Halsey said that "beyond question, both the atomic bomb and the entry of Russia into the war weighed heavily in Japan's ultimate decision for a quick surrender.

Covering The Capital

WASHINGTON—Incidental information: The stranger-than-fiction stories of this global war still will be turning up a decade from now—stories like the one the Netherlands information bureau here came across recently.

It's about the American in a Japanese prison camp in Java who built a radio receiving set in the hollow of his wooden leg.

Gaylord A. Buchanan, Claysville, Pa., lost his leg in his third year at the United States naval academy at Annapolis but was permitted to complete his course. An engineer for the Sperry Gyroscope Co., Buchanan was captured and interned in Java as the Japanese spread south.

DECORAH (AP) — City officials said yesterday they had been assured by war department engineers that the dry run flood control project would be started early next year if the city can obtain options on land which would be affected.

The project involves tunneling a hill and turning flood water into the upper Iowa river, and building dikes in Decorah to protect residence property. The city was given two weeks to obtain the options. Cost of the project was estimated at \$700,000.
