## U.S. Sends Over 725,000 Tons Of Arms to Anti-Red Nations

WASHINGTON — More than 725,000 tons of U.S. arms have been shipped to anti-Communist nations since last March and defense officials hope to speed up the military aid program next year, it was disclosed Friday.

The equipment already sent to allies in Europe and Asia includes more than 1,600 tanks, 750 heavy artillery guns, 600 planes, 50 naval vessels and 6,000 vehicles.

The lion's share — 478,000 tons — went to western European members of the Atlantic pact. Another 187,000 tons were shipped to the Mediterranean for Greece, Turkey and Iran, and 60,000 tons went to the far east for the Philippines, Indo-China, Malaya, Indonesia, Burma and Formosa.

All of the shipments were made since last March, when the military defense assistance program was approved by congress. More than \$6-billion since has been voted for the purpose.

Maj. Gen. Stanley L. Scott, new director of the defense department's military assistance office, said the shipments are just a start on what is needed to equip

the unified western European defense force being raised under the command of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"The strength of those armies, and their state of readiness, will depend in a great degree on the initial stages of the ability of American industry to keep the supplies flowing to Europe at an ever-increasing tempo," he said.

Most of the arms shipped so far have come from World War II reserve stocks. But future shipments will increasingly lean on the current output of American defense industry.

## Senator Urges U.S. To Stir Up Trouble Behind Iron Curtain

WASHINGTON — Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.) said Friday the United States should turn the tables on Russia and start stirring up domestic troubles behind the Iron Curtain.

The ranking Republican member of the senate foreign relations committee issued a statement proposing that this country create a top-level strategy board to find ways of fomenting revolutions, guerrilla warfare, fifth column activities and sabotage in Communist countries.

He pointed out that Russia has been using Communist parties in democratic countries for just that purpose for many years.

**Would Help Avert War**  
Asserting that his plan would help to avert the threat of a world war, Wiley said:

"The more preoccupied the Russians are with their own internal difficulties and disturbances, the less they will feel they could rely on their own and satellite peoples and to that extent war pressure would be eased."

Urging the nation to drop "panty-waist" diplomacy, Wiley said the Russians have poured "arms, money and sabotage materials" into the effort to foment difficulties in this country and its allied nations.

### Red China Vulnerable

"The Russians are infinitely more susceptible to this type of troublemaking than we are," he said. He added that Communist China is particularly vulnerable because of the large number of pro-Nationalist guerrilla troops within its borders.

Besides helping to avert war, Wiley said, such a program would carry out this nation's avowed goal of helping all people become free.

### France Approves Arms for Military

PARIS — The national assembly Friday night approved a record 740-billion franc (\$2,114,000,000) military budget for next year, including 355-billion francs (\$1,014,000,000) to be spent on France's contribution to the Atlantic pact army.

The assembly fixed the total amount to be spent on the military — 30 percent of the national budget — during an article by article vote on the bill. The article, the first of more than a dozen up before the assembly, was approved by a vote of 416-180.

The vote came just after Premier Rene Pleven warned the deputies that France "can not stay disarmed before a possible menace."

Still up for debate was the disputed second article of the bill, which called for financing part of the rearmament effort with 145-billion francs (about \$487,000,000) in new taxes.

Pleven called for a vote of confidence on the second article.

### Learns of Iowa Bonus 2 Days Before Deadline

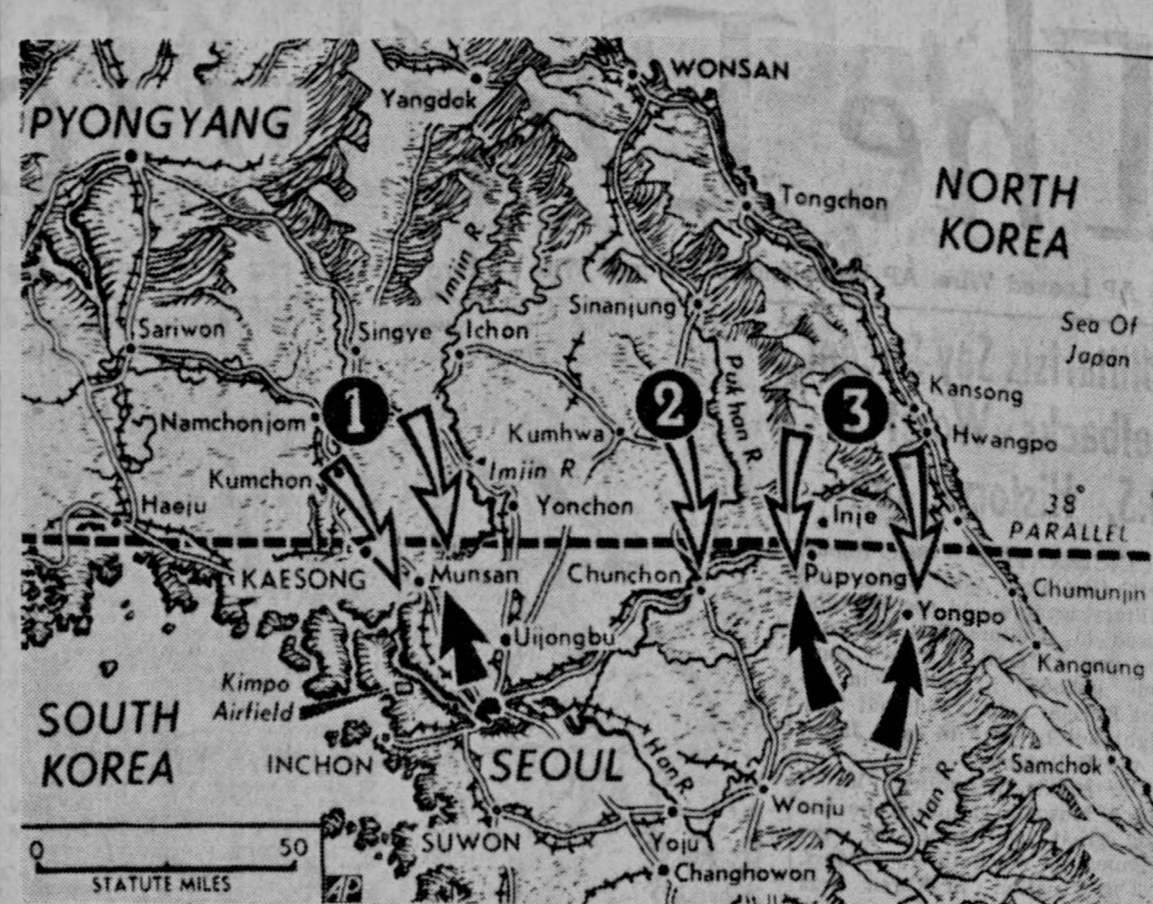
BLENCOE (AP) — A World War II veteran with three years service including 16 months overseas learned for the first time Friday that Iowa is paying a bonus for war service.

Sunday is the deadline for applications for a bonus.

N.C. Gray, service officer for the American Legion post here, who declined to give the veteran's name, said he would receive \$400.

Gray said that Edward J. Kalemyn, secretary of the bonus board, told him that the mailing of the veteran's application today would assure the veteran the bonus.

## Where Reds Thrust Against Allied Defenses



RED FORCES APPEARED TO BE MASSING FRIDAY against Imjin river 10 miles south of 38th parallel (1). Red patrols were reported at Munsan, 25 miles from Seoul. In the east central sector (2), attack was aimed at Chunchon. In east (3), enemy attacks dented the line to depth ranging from three to 10 miles below the parallel. The lesser penetration was 35 miles inland from the Sea of Japan. The deeper was in mountainous country about 25 miles inland from the east coast.

## Vet May Lose All Limbs After Ordeal in Korea

BATTLE CREEK, MICH. — A 19-year-old boy with a fighting man's guts to "play possum" when Chinese Communists tossed him in a snowdrift for dead and then crawl on ice in sub-zero temperatures to rescue, took the threat of multiple amputation of his hands and feet in stride Friday.

Pvt. Hubert Reeves, who 18 months ago whistled at girls in his hometown, Joliet, Ill., may lose portions of all his limbs to frost bite suffered in North Korea.

But you'd never know it from the kid under the white sheets of Percy Jones army general hospital, doctors said.

**Flown to Hospital**  
Reeves was flown to Percy Jones with other Korean casualties the week before Christmas. He recounted for his mother, Mrs. Wanetta Reeves, 40, and ward mates how he managed to escape.

"We couldn't hold our outpost any longer. And we had to fight our way out," he said.

"We, the wounded, gave our support to the men still able to fight so they could keep their hands warm while trying to fight our way through."

## Union Demands More Favorable Terms For Rail Pact

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers late Friday demanded "more favorable" terms in a proposed three-year peace pact between the railroads and four unions.

The brotherhood's officers were instructed to "go back to Washington" to get them.

There was no amplification of what terms the union wants to improve, or whether the union considers its stand an outright rejection of the proposals.

**Other Unions to Meet**  
The three other railway operating unions — trainmen, firemen and conductors — will meet within the next 10 days to consider the plan.

Providing wage increases and other benefits for approximately 300,000 men, the plan was worked out in conferences led by Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman. Eight days ago it was announced from the White House as a settlement of a long dispute over wages and operating rules.

Friday's action was taken by the BLE's general chairman at the end of a two-day session.

"They fully analyzed the Washington memorandum of Dec. 21 and have instructed the grand chief and his negotiating committee to go back to Washington to negotiate the terms of that memorandum into a more favorable settlement."

## Letter Brings Clue to Lost Stone of Scone

LONDON (AP) — An anonymous letter to a Glasgow newspaper provided Friday night what may be the first tangible clue to the whereabouts of Britain's missing coronation stone.

The letter contained a petition to King George VI laying down certain conditions under which the 425-pound relic would be returned to the authorities.

One of the conditions was that the stone should be retained in Scotland in a place to be selected by the king.

The petition gave as proof of good faith a description of hitherto unpublicized faults in a watch left in Westminster abbey when the stone was stolen from there early Christmas morning.

Police did not immediately comment on the new information.

Ever since the theft was discovered, police have suspected it was engineered by Scottish Nationalists. The sandstone block was used in the coronation of Scottish kings long before it fell into English hands.

A close watch has been kept on highway and rail traffic in an effort to prevent it from being carried to Scotland.

Scotland yard sleuths dredged in Hyde Park lake Friday, but the best of their haul was a big lump of concrete, a rusty old safe and an iron chair.

Churches taking part include the Baptist, Christian, Methodist, Nazarene, Presbyterian and Congregational.

The Rev. P. Hewison Pollock, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will give the meditation.

## Loveland Tells Truman He Doesn't Want Job

WASHINGTON — Albert J. Loveland, defeated Democratic candidate in Iowa for the U.S. senate, told reporters that he informed President Truman Thursday he was not interested in a federal job.

Loveland resigned as under secretary of agriculture, a \$17,000 a year job, to make the race for the senate in the November election.

## Accused Man Asks For Truth Serum

SPENCER — A young farmhand accused of a Christmas eve slaying was given a truth serum Friday at his own request in efforts to learn more about how Henry Weiskus, 50, Milford, met his death.

A defense attorney said that statements which Archie Henry, 24, Milford, made while under the influence of sodium pentathol indicated he fought Weiskus in self defense, but details of the interrogation were not released.

Weiskus' frozen body was found Christmas day on the shoulder of a remote country road west of Milford. An autopsy showed that he died of a severe beating at the base of his skull.

## \$150 in Equipment Lost As Large Shed Burns

A large shed located on city property near Oakland cemetery was destroyed by fire early Friday. About \$150 worth of equipment stored in the building was lost in the blaze.

C. F. Parrot, sexton at the cemetery, said the shed may have been set afire accidentally by persons who have been trapping animals in the area.

## Bound to Grand Jury On Murder Charge

SPRIT LAKE — Justice of the Peace C. C. Gravatt bound Archie Henry, 24, Milford, over to the grand jury Friday on an open murder charge accusing him of beating another man to death.

A ruling that Henry must face charges in the Christmas eve death of Henry Weiskus, 50, Milford, followed a preliminary hearing at which deputy sheriff Elmer Eckard testified the youth had admitted slugging the victim with a grease gun.

Dr. K. L. Clayton, Dickinson county coroner, testified that Weiskus died of blows about the head and neck. He said the dead man had been struck "eight or 10 times."

An Iowa City woman is recovering from a knee bruise suffered when she accidentally fell in a city bus.

Roy A. Sedivec, driver of the bus owned by the Iowa City Coach company, told police Friday Mrs. Luxford, 1607 Morning-side drive, suffered the injury Thursday afternoon when she attempted to get off the bus without his knowledge.

The bus was crossing the intersection of College street and Seventh avenue at the time of the accident.

In a minor traffic mishap Wednesday, about \$70 damage resulted when a truck and car collided at the intersection of Madison street and Iowa avenue.

### SUI Doctor Accepts Grant for Research

Dr. Alson E. Braley, director of SUI's ophthalmology department, has accepted a grant from the American Cyanamid company for research in the field. This grant is the remainder of a former grant made to Dr. Braley by the same company while he was at New York university.

One hundred dollars was accepted from the Tarknath Das foundation for the Sudhindra Bose fund. The fund was established last year in honor of the late Professor Bose, associated with the political science department at SUI from 1913 until his death in 1946.

A grant of \$10 was accepted from Mr. and Mrs. James Figgins, State Center, as a memorial to their son, Richard. It is to be used to help a handicapped boy in the Iowa hospital school for severely handicapped children.

Three volumes of illustrated catalogues from the art collections of the late Henry Clay Frick, were accepted from Miss Helen Frick of the Frick art reference library, New York, N.Y. The books are valued at \$2,000 and are printed on hand-made paper, utilizing special type.

### Ends Hiding, Gives Up to Crime Group

CHICAGO (AP) — Tony Accardo, reputed head of a nationwide crime syndicate, ended three months in hiding Friday and surrendered to Sen. Estes Kefauver's crime committee.

Accardo, tough henchman of the late Scarface Al Capone, said he gave up because he missed his family. He said he wanted to spend the rest of the holidays at home.

His surrender was expected by the ranks of the big-time gangsters who went into hiding when the current crime investigation began.

Accardo, natty in well-tailored clothes, walked into the U.S. marshal's office with his lawyer, George Calahan.

He announced his presence to Chief Deputy Marshal Edward Sullivan and accepted a subpoena ordering him to appear before the crime committee in Washington a week from Friday.

Accardo had been missing from his usual haunts since the crime committee announced it wanted to see him, early last October.

### Allis-Chalmers Reduces Farm Equipment Prices

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company rolled its farm equipment prices back Friday to Dec. 1 levels, wiping out recent increases.

President Walter Geist said the rollback eliminates tractor price increases of about eight percent that were put into effect Dec. 11 and 12.

Geist said the rollback would put the company in an "impossible" position unless its 8,000 suppliers also freeze prices.

He disclosed the rollback in a letter to the company's 32,000 employees at nine plants across the nation.

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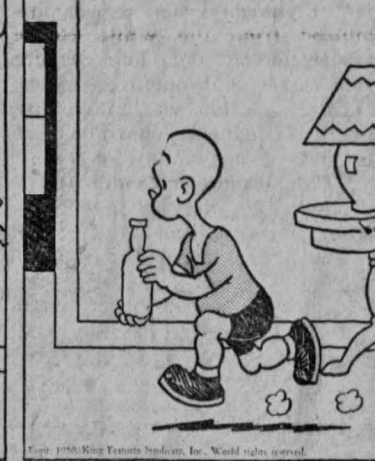
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
