Secret Data Regulations

WASHINGTON (A)- President Eisenhower revamped the government's policy on secret data Friday with an order asserting the public's right to "a maximum amount of information in keeping with security."

Repealing a controversial set of regulations former President Truan issued two years ago, the new order goes into effect Dec. 15.

It strips 28 federal agencies of authority to "classify" information-that is, withhold it from the public on security grounds. It limts this power to the chief administrative officers alone in 17 other

It throws out the "restricted" category for classifying government data, leaving only "top secret," "secret" and "confidential,"

Provides for Complaints It also provides for a system for receiving complaints from newsmen and others outside the government, and sets up machinery for constant review of the whole

At the 20th annual convention of the Associated Press Managing Editors association in Chicago, editors from all parts of the country welcomed the change.

Discussing the changes before the association, Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell criticized the old Truman order as "vague," among other things.



Under-Age Drivers Bring Less Trouble Under 1953 Law

DES MOINES (A)-School officials and law enforcement officers are having fewer headaches because the 1953 legislature tightened the regulations over school driving permits, a safety worker said recently.

"School people tell us the changes constitute the finest piece of legislation ever brought out by the state safety department," said Frank Ulish, director of the department's safety education division. He added:

"Furthermore, police officers tell us they are 100 per cent for the changes. There's less trouble now with the under-age drivers, and that means fewer headaches for the school people and the police as well."

Increased Limitations The last legislature set up

these further limitations on permits issued to students between the ages of 14 and 16 to drive to and from school: The pupil must live at least a

mile from school, he must go to and from school by the most direct route, he may not drive except between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. on school days, and an applicant for a permit must obtain the approval of an official of

"There used to be a terrible violation of the school driving permit," Ulish said. "Formerly, a permit could be issued with the opproval of the pupil's parents. The kids could mollycoddle their dads, but they can't mollycoddle
