'Voice of Democracy' Contest Judges Named

CBS-TV To Present Show On SUI Stuttering Division

The stuttering division of the SUI speech clinic, directed by Prof. Wendell Johnson will receive nationwide publicity early next year over the Columbia Broadcasting system's television network.

Herbert Holtzer, a free lance writer signed by CBS to write the script for the SUI film, arrived in Iowa City Monday and has been attending speech classes all week. He will return to New York Saturday to write the script.

Johnson, speech pathology majors and students attending SUI especially for the stuttering program will be featured in the half-hour film's cast.

CBS-TV plans to begin a new educational series, "The Search," early next year on a once-a-week basis until summer.

Each program will discuss a human problem at a different university and show via film the answers arrived at or the aid rendered. One of the shows will feature the Yale study center.

A CBS crew from New York will be sent out to do the filming after Holtzer completes his script. During the past year, he has written scripts and helped direct six educational films for a New York firm.

The New York writer was impressed with SUI's extensive television facilities for students and "the serious approach taken in the classrooms."

He believes there is a great future in films because of the increased number of television stations. "Fluffy" commercials will continue on film for a long time, he said. For example, an unbreakable dish may sometimes break if dropped on TV.

80 Iowa Doctors Convene, Hear Talks on Heart Disease

More than 80 Iowa doctors attending an institute on heart disease here Thursday heard talks on the causes of heart disease in children and young adults.

The institute was the first of a series on diseases of the heart and circulation which will be held in Iowa during the coming year. Co-operating with the SUI college of medicine in sponsoring the series are the speakers' bureau of the Iowa State Medical society, the Iowa Heart association and the division of heart disease of the state department of health.

Speakers included two SUI faculty members—Dr. William B. Bean, head of the department of internal medicine, and Dr. Richard D. Gauchat of the department of pediatrics. Dr. Bean's subject was "Some Clinical Problems in Aortic Stenosis," and Dr. Gauchat discussed "Rheumatoid Arthritis in Children."

Other speakers were Dr. Richard Ebert of the Northwestern university medical school, whose subject was "The Physiology of the Circulation in Acute Infections," and Dr. Lewis Thomas, of the University of Minnesota school of medicine, who spoke on "The Present Status of Research on the Pathogenesis of Rheumatic Fever."

Speech Staff To Attend Parley Veterans Allowed Degree Switch

The entire staff of the SUI speech pathology and audiology department and a number of graduate students will attend the 29th annual convention of the American Speech and Hearing Association to be held at the Hotel New Yorker, New York city, Monday through Wednesday.

Participating in the convention will be the following staff members: Prof. Wendell Johnson, chairman of the council of Speech Pathology and Audiology, and Prof. James Curtis will be resource persons during a session entitled "Interrogation of Experts."

Johnson will discuss stuttering and Curtis will discuss problems related to research technique and design. Johnson will also present a report to the council in his capacity as chairman of the speech correction fund committee. Curtis, who is a member of the council of the association, will present two papers, one on "The Case for Dynamic Analysis in Acoustic Phonetics" and one on "Cues that Aid Listening to One of Two Simultaneous Messages."

Prof. Dorothy Sherman will present a paper on "The Use of the Stuttering Scale in Measuring Progress in Therapy."

Prof. Frederick Darley, who is

a member of the program committee for the convention, will be chairman of the sessions on "Speech Therapy in Cerebral Palsy" and "Interrogation of Experts."

Prof. D. C. Spriestersbach will present a report to the council in his capacity as chairman of the committee on clinical standards in speech. He will be chairman of the session on "Diagnostic and Therapeutic Techniques."

Graduate students who will attend the convention are James Shapley, Iowa City; Christie Russell, Toronto, Canada; Elizabeth Parker, Tasmania, Australia; Natalie Fischer, New York city; Shirley Berger, Hammond, Ind.; Malcolm Sellinger, Brooklyn, N. Y.; and David Williams, Belle Plaine.

Also attending the convention are Mrs. Dorothy Williams and Robert Rosenbaum, speech and hearing consultants for the Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children; Mrs. Jean Parker, speech and hearing consultant for Iowa State Services for Crippled Children, and Prof. Earl Schubert and Charles Parker of the speech pathology and audiology instructional staff.

Veterans taking undergraduate college work under the Korean GI bill may shift from one bachelor's degree to another, without having it count as their one-and-only change of course allowed under the law, Veterans Administration officials said this week in answer to many queries.

In order to make the switch, VA added, veterans must do it soon enough so as not to involve any more training time than was originally required to complete the course.

As an example, VA pointed out that a veteran who had enrolled for a four-year course leading to a B.S. degree in commerce could move over to a B.A. degree in liberal arts. And as far as the law is concerned, it would not be considered a change, so long as the overall training time did not exceed the original four years.

The reason that changes in degree need not constitute changes in course is that VA lists a veteran's educational objective as a baccalaureate degree, pure and simple, without any reference to his major field of study.

Therefore, a change in the type of bachelor's degree obviously would not be a change in training objectives, if the training time isn't lengthened, VA said.

VA added that even though a veteran might have put down a specific type of bachelor's degree

on his application for Korean GI training, his originally-designed objective still is considered to be only a baccalaureate degree.

Colleges are still required to inform VA whenever a Korean GI trainee changes the degree he's aiming for. The school must certify that the change does not involve any extension of training time; it also must give the name of the revised degree objective to which the veteran has changed.
