## Trucking Dispute Continues Unsettled Following Meeting

A five-hour conference Thursday failed to achieve a settlement in the dispute between Eldon Miller, Inc., Iowa City, and 42 of its truckers.

Another meeting is scheduled for this afternoon in an attempt to end the work stoppage which began at midnight Sunday.

Gasoline transport trucks in the firm's terminals at Coralville, Dubuque, and La Crosse, Wis., have been idled by the dispute.

Howard Yambura, vice-president in charge of industrial relations for the company, said Thursday night he expected to be able to make a statement after the meeting today concerning progress in the negotiations.

After the meeting Thursday, which was attended by attorneys and representatives for both sides, Yambura said he was "pretty sure some progress is being made." Three of the striking truckers were at the meeting.

The truckers' attorney, William L. Meardon, said Thursday night that all the truckers involved are expected to attend today's meeting.

The company is working toward an agreement whereby the truckers would go back to work for an interim period while further contract difficulties are discussed, said Yambura.

Negotiations toward such an agreement are pending the outcome of today's meeting, he added.

The dispute arose because the truckers were dissatisfied with the take-home pay they were receiving.

The men work under contract for Miller. Most of them either own their truck tractors or are buying them from the Miller

## Young GOP's Hear Ray Explain Student Attitudes on Politics

SUI Young Republicans heard Prof. Robert F. Ray, director of the SUI Institute of Public Affairs, explain the state-wide Iowa Citizenship Clearing House and heard him describe the current apathy of college students toward party politics at a meeting of the organization Thursday.

Ray, who is chairman of the Iowa clearing house, said the organization has been established to encourage "better minds for better politics."

Ray produced the 1,330 ballots cast during the all-university elections March 24 for Student Board of Publications and said that 18 per cent of those ballots would have been thrown out if the elections committee had adhered to Iowa election ballot standards. Some ballots were initiated by the voters, some were checked, and some students had voted for more candidates than the ballot required.

He cited this as only one example of the indifference of college students toward politics.

Ray blamed parental attitudes which encourage their children to stay out of politics for the greatest share of the attitudes of college students. He pointed out that 50 per cent of the U.S. population think it impossible to be elected to a public office and to remain honest. "No wonder," he said, "that only 3 out of 2,500 students in City high school indicated that they wanted to go

company.  
Under the terms of their contracts, they are to receive a percentage of the gross revenue which they earn for the company. Deductions are made from this percentage for such items as insurance, maintenance and repairs to trucks and tractors.

Meardon said the men had been paid as low as 15 per cent of their share of the gross revenue.

One of the truckers said the issue is not the hours, but "whether a fellow should work a 60-hour week and get a take-home pay of \$40."

Representing the truckers at the conference Thursday were Meardon and three of the operators from Coralville. The company was represented by Yambura; Thomas R. Stephens, vice-president in charge of operations, and the corporation's counsel, James R. Austin, Des Moines.

## House Passes Wiretap Bill; Limits Usage

WASHINGTON (AP)—The house passed a bill Thursday to legalize wiretapped evidence in national security cases, but refused the administration's request that the attorney general be given a free hand in such investigations.

Instead, the house voted 221-166 to require federal court approval before the attorney general could order wires tapped to collect evidence against suspected spies and saboteurs.

An administration bill which would have given sole authority to the attorney general was rejected in favor of a substitute by Rep. Edwin Willis (D-La) containing the provision for prior court approval.

**166 Oppose Substitute**  
Thirty-two Republicans and one independent lined up with 166 Democrats for the Willis substitute. All 166 opposing votes were Republican.

After settling the issue, the house passed the bill on a 378-10 vote and sent it to the senate.

The measure would abolish the 20-year-old ban on the use of wire-tap evidence in federal courts. It would also permit the future use of such information already in the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

**Would Require Order**  
The attorney general would not require a court order to make use of this evidence, thus allowing the justice department to prosecute cases which have been stalled by the old ban. Officials have indicated that one of these is the case of Judith Coplon, alleged to have passed government secrets to a Soviet agent. She was twice convicted but the convictions were upset on appeal.

Opponents of the administration bill claimed that unlimited authority for the attorney general would make wiretapping subject to political abuse and encourage "police state" tactics.

**Would Handicap Officials**  
Supporters argued that the necessity of obtaining court approval would handicap law enforcement officials in the performance of duties.

The administration bill, sponsored by Rep. Kenneth Keating (R-NY), made wiretapped information admissible as evidence but only so far as it would apply to cases of treason, espionage, sabotage and conspiracy involving the national security.

## 3 Joint Reviews Planned by ROTC

Air force and army ROTC units will hold three joint reviews this spring, Col. George A. Bosch, professor and head of air science and tactics, and Col. Walter E. Sewell, professor and head of military science and tactics, announced Thursday.

The three reviews will be held during the federal inspection May 20 and 21, Governor's day May 11, and President's day, May 24.

In past years the two units have held joint reviews for Governor's day and President's day, but separate reviews for the federal inspection.

Six awards will be presented to cadets by Governor William S. Beardsley during the Governor's day review. They are: the Governor's match; the Air Force association award; the American Society of Military Engineers gold medals, the Infantry ROTC medal, the Professor of Air Science and Tactics award and the Tribune medals.

Reports here were that Dulles would visit London and Paris next week for talks with British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and France's Foreign Minister Georges Bidault.

Diplomatic officials in Washington late Thursday said they understood Dulles planned to fly in an air force plane to London Sunday for two days of talks with Eden and Prime Minister Churchill, then go to Paris Wednesday for two days of talks with Bidault and Premier Laniel.

A report for President Eisenhower would be ready by the end of next week.

The talks would precede the Geneva conference on Far East problems, chiefly Korea and Indochina, scheduled for April 26.

In other developments Thursday, the French smashed at new Vietnam trenches at Hanoi with tank artillery and bombed supply lines in efforts to wither any new attack prepared by Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap on Dien Bien Phu. A two-mile sweep by French tanks west and southwest of the fortress failed to encounter any enemy forces.

In Washington, Sen. William Knowland (R-Calif.) proposed to hold up foreign aid for nations who drag their feet on joining action against Asian Reds.

The French press said King Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia decreed general mobilization and proposed an appeal to the UN to combat invasion of his Indochina country by the Communist-led Vietminh.

## Canadian Air Collision Kills 37 Persons

MOOSE JAW, Sask. (AP)—A Royal Canadian air force training plane rammed an airliner loaded with passengers Thursday and flaming death claimed 37 lives.

There were no survivors from Canada's worst airline disaster.

A recheck showed 36 died in the crashed planes, and one woman was killed on the ground when two engines and part of the burning cabin of the Trans-Canada North Star liner plowed through a house and trapped her in it.

Among the victims were Rodney Adamson, 51, Progressive Conservative party member of parliament, and his wife, and Pat Reid, 58, famous northland bush pilot, and his wife.

**En Route To Vancouver**  
Thirty-one passengers, including five on company passes, and a crew of four were in the North Star en route from Montreal to Vancouver. The Harvard trainer was piloted by a British solo flier from a training field near Moose Jaw.

Witnesses said the trainer rammed into the liner, slicing off one of the liner's wings. There was a loud explosion, like cannon fire, then the planes fell, with fire shooting from the North Star's spinning tail.

One eyewitness saw bodies hurled out of the plane by the explosion. Bodies were recovered over a wide area.

Witnesses said the North Star flamed in its death plunge, parts of the big liner flying in all directions as it struck the golf course. A gas tank bounced into a house, setting it afire. Two other homes also caught fire in the populated area, one burning to the ground. No one on the ground was reported injured.

**Searchers Comb Area**  
Hundreds of searchers combed the golf course in the vain hope of finding survivors.

One witness, a Moose Jaw car dealer, Mac McKay, said, "I saw the big plane in trouble. It was smoking and while I watched a wing dropped.

"There was an explosion at about 3,000 or 4,000 feet, but the plane didn't disintegrate. We heard another explosion after the plane had fallen out of sight. I didn't see the Harvard at all."

Flight Lt. Ronald Gilmore of Winnipeg, who was visiting Moose Jaw, said he saw one of the planes "on fire well forward" before it dropped from sight.

The crash occurred at about 11:15 a.m. Iowa time. Trans-Canada officials in Winnipeg said the North Star was carrying 38 persons—29 passengers, four crewmen and five company officials.

The company's Montreal office figured there were only 35 aboard.

The North Star, which left Montreal Wednesday night, was delayed by storms over western Ontario.

Names of the crewmen and passengers were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

## 'Stolen' Car Was Only Hiding

William R. Myers, M4, Des Moines, is probably searching for a new parking place today.

Wednesday night Myers parked his car behind the Phi Beta Phi medical fraternity house, 109 River st., where he lives. Thursday morning he couldn't find it, and reported to police that it had been stolen.

But he found it a short time later—at the bottom of a ravine behind the fraternity house.

Apparently the car broke loose from its parking place, rolled across the parking lot, went between two other parked cars and down an embankment into the ravine without overturning.

## New Armed Services Security Plans Revealed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new army-navy-air force security program aimed at keeping the armed forces free of subversives and other security risks was announced by Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson Thursday.

Wilson told the senate armed services committee the new directive will provide uniform standards for all the services and "speed up our procedures for getting such individuals out of the service and for keeping them out."

One controversial feature: "Known Communists will not be inducted into the armed services."

That means, in effect, automatic draft exemptions for young Communists who otherwise would be subject to military service.

**Has Called for Review**  
Wilson also disclosed he has ordered a review of the cases of all military personnel cleared under prior directives.

The new directive requires, among other things, loyalty certificates from all applicants for enlistment, members of reserve units and inductees of any rank. It says inductees who don't fill out loyalty questionnaires "satisfactorily," or whose questionnaires show "significant derogatory information," will be kept in non-sensitive assignments at the lowest pay grade until they have been thoroughly investigated.

**Discharges Ordered**  
Discharges "under other than

honorable conditions" are ordered for any whom it would be "inconsistent with the interests of national security" to keep in uniform.

Loyalty cases are not the only ones covered. The directive calls for separation from the service of any personnel guilty of (1) purposely disclosing classified information, (2) infamously, dishonest or immoral conduct, (3) drunkenness or drug addiction, or (4) behavior or associations which show the person "not reliable or trustworthy."

This parallels the standards announced by the Eisenhower administration for civilian employees of the government.

## British Plan Containing 2 Reported Loss

LONDON (Friday) (AP)—British Overseas Airways Corp. said Friday that one of its big jetliners with 21 persons on board has vanished on a flight from Rome to Cairo.

A spokesman said the plane carried 14 passengers and a crew of seven South Africans.

Sir Miles Thomas, BOAC chairman, immediately suspended Comet services pending further information. This was the first time the Comets have grounded this year.

### U.S., Canada Set Up New Radar Installations

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and Canada are setting up a new radar warning fence along tundra and ice of the Arctic perimeter in an effort to give the big cities to the south at least a six-hour notice of approaching enemy warplanes. Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson said Thursday that preliminary work on the project is "well advanced."

### Publisher Indicted for Defaming McCarthy

LAS VEGAS (AP)—Publisher H. M. Greenspun of the Las Vegas Morning Sun was indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury on a charge of mailing copies of his newspapers containing an article on Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.) which tended to "incite arson, murder or assassination." The indictment contained a copy of a column Greenspun wrote in the Sun which said "Sen. Joe McCarthy has come to a violent end . . . but I would hate to see some simpiton get the chair for such a public service as getting rid of McCarthy."

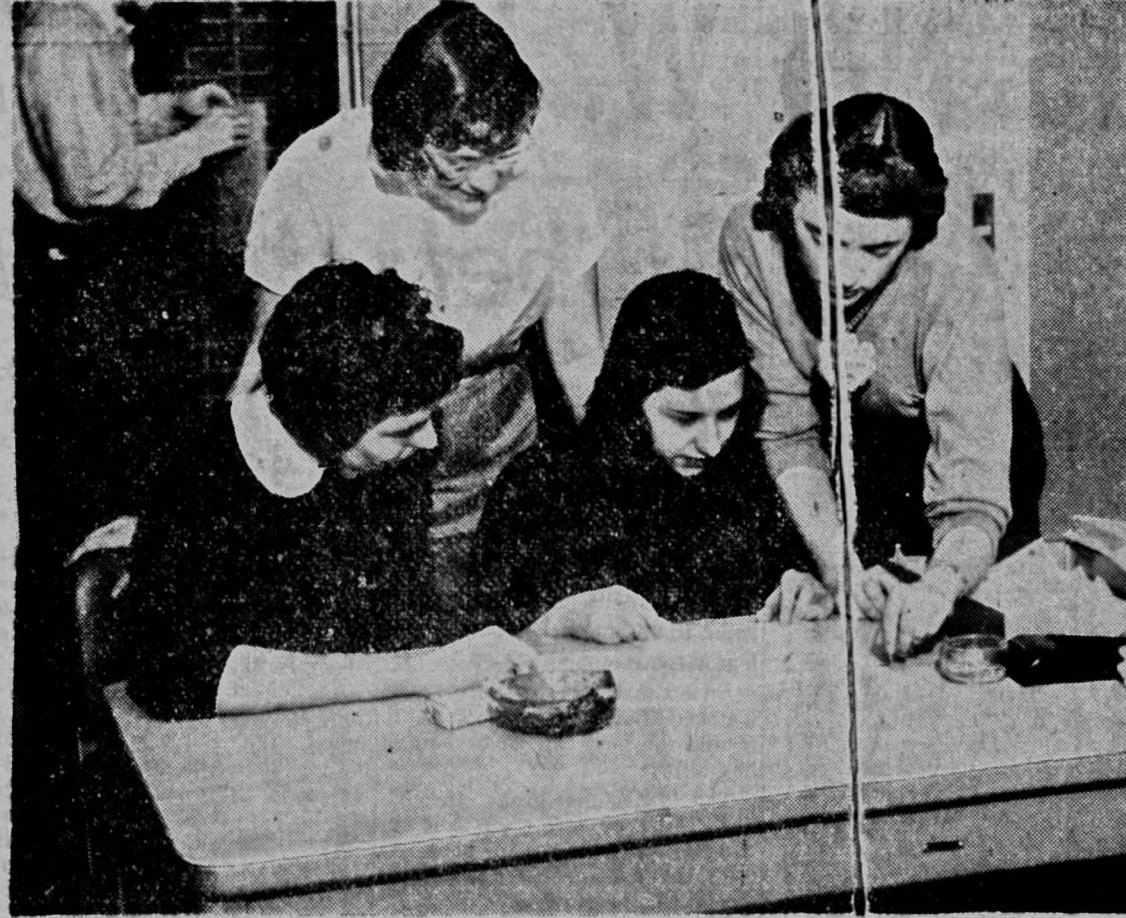

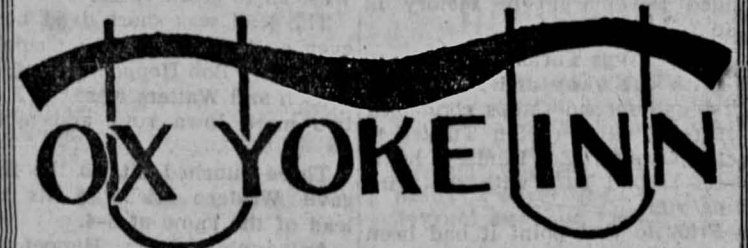

# Iowa Rallies 3 Times To Nip W. Michigan 7-6 In Opener

## Return Game To Be Played Here Today

Iowa's Hawkeyes came from behind three times here Thursday afternoon before pushing across a lone run in the seventh inning to earn a 7-6 victory over Western Michigan in the baseball opener for both teams.

The Hawks will meet Western Michigan again today at 3:30 p.m. Forced to rally from 2-0, 4-2 and 6-4 deficits coach Otto Vogel's Hawkeyes capitalized on seven infield hits to chalk up the win.

**Hawks Out-Hit Broncos**  
When the firing had finished the Hawkeyes held a 12-11 bulge over the visiting Broncos in the hitting department but it was their speed on the base paths that proved the difference.

A diving stab of Bill LaJolie's hard grounder in the eighth inning by first baseman Bob Miller saved the game for the Hawkeyes. Iowa had forged ahead in the seventh, but the Broncos had men on first an d third with two out when Miller made his sensational play.

Limited to only one extra base hit—a double in the fifth inning—by short stop Don Waldron—the Hawks' time and again beat out infield ground balls which were instrumental in six of their seven runs. One of those infield blows—a sizzling blast off the bat of second baseman Ron Capps—provided the margin of victory in the seventh inning.

**Capps Turns Tide**  
With one away and runners on first and second Capps connected off relief pitcher Ken Tucker to send Captain Ed Lindsey home from second base with the winning run.

Prior to that point it had been an uphill battle for the Hawks as they strove to offset Western Michigan's power hitting that connected for four extra base hits.

The visitors jumped on starting pitcher Merle Jensen in the first inning for two runs when first baseman Ron Heaviland drilled a double to centerfield and Al Nagel followed with a towering homerun over the left field fence.

Jensen, the Big Ten's top pitcher a year ago with a 4-0 record, gave up nine hits in the first six innings before giving way to reliever Doug Bogenreif who was credited with the win.

The Hawkeyes drilled three Western pitchers for their 12 hit total with starter Gary Graham leaving the mound after 5 2/3 innings. Reliever Roger Eggers was charged with the loss.

**AUGUSTA, Ga.**—An old pro and a young amateur shared the first day lead in the 18th Masters Golf Tournament Thursday as a rainstorm spoiled the hopes of the top golfing tourists.

Dutch Harrison from Ardmore, Okla., and amateur Billy Joe Patton, a Morgantown, N.C., lumberman, got a generous assist from the weather in making their two-under-par 70s good for a first place tie.

A sudden, soaking storm blew across the Augusta National Course just after the galleries had watched their idol, Ben Hogan, come in with an even par 72. Harrison was about the only one who played through it without suffering serious consequences.

Harrison, a 40-plus veteran, had a round of 34-36-70 playing five holes through the worst of the storm. Patton, who finished before the clouds gathered, shot 32-38-70.

One stroke behind, and the only other players to break par, were Jackie Burke of Klamath Lake, N.Y., with 38-33-71, and Lloyd Mangrum of Niles, Ill., with 36-35-71.

Par for the 6,800 yards of the sprawling course is 36-36-72. Hogan, racing an approaching storm around the back nine, matched par for both nines, with only one birdie and one bogey on his card. Tied with him for third place was Dave Douglas of Grossinger, N.Y.

More than a half dozen prominent pros were bracketed with 73s and a few more, including two-time Masters winner Sam Snead, had 74s.

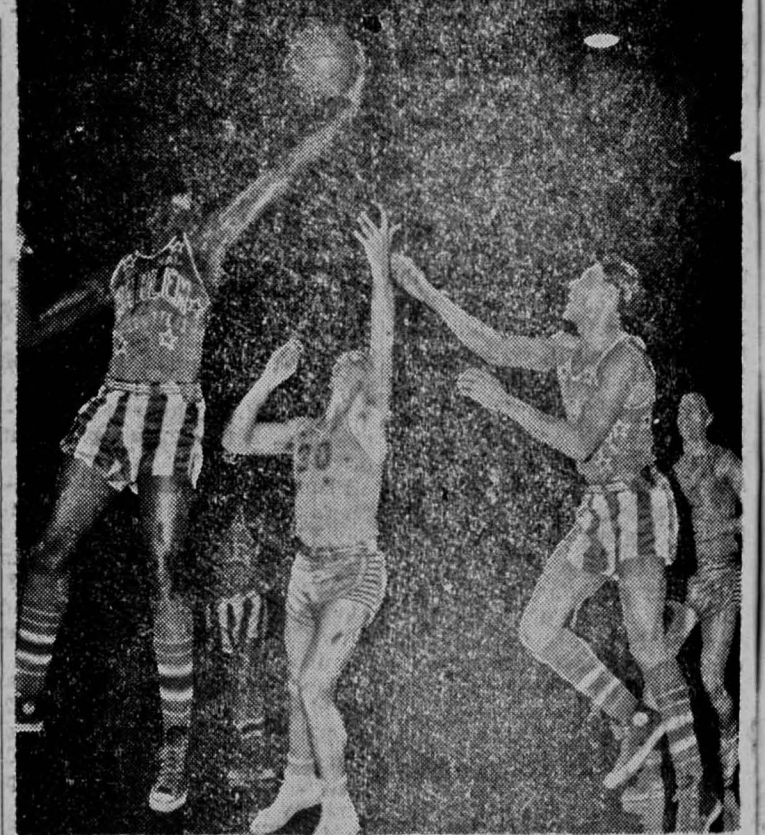
## Babe Zaharias Leads In Colonial Tourney

### UI's Coleman Prints Books in Spare Time

Book publishing business is one the impression of a big industrial process, but that is not the case of Prairie Press, the publishing firm operated by Prof. Carroll Coleman, typographer, of SUI school of journalism. He is a designer and printer in one-man business.

Coleman says that he has designed, printed and published over 200 books in the last 20 years. He has been printed from hand-type and run off on a platen press. All the work is done in spare time.

His latest books he has produced, "The House of Moonlight," "Psyche," both by August Mele, are included in this year's "Selectivity Books of the Year," selected by the American Institute of Graphic Arts. Their choice brings Coleman to receive this honor highest honor in American design and typography.

Coleman often prints the books in his spare time. He uses a platen press on imported hand-made papers. He says he has imported from several foreign countries, including some from England, Germany and the Netherlands. One special set of type was hand-cut by Victor Mayer, an Austrian craftsman living in America.

Coleman prints only two pages at a time, but his editions are small, averaging 300 to 1,000 copies.

**Prints Two Books a Year**  
Hours of careful planning go into book design and, he says he can produce about two books a year. He strives in designing to give an effect which will catch the spirit of the author's writing.

Of the books and pamphlets Coleman has produced in the past years, the majority have been original works by Iowa and midwestern writers.

Coleman is a one-man publishing venture. Prairie Press has its printing press, Coleman said. Beside the type required to set type and all the books, he has the problem of finding a market for his books. Lacking the large publishers' advertising funds, he has directed-mail contacts to be the best method of reaching customers.

**Likes to Play Golf**  
Since coming to the university, Coleman said, he has found little time for outside interests other than his book-designing work.

### Capote's Fantasy Opens — Grass Harp Is Well Acted

The university players presented Truman Capote's controversial play "The Grass Harp" Thursday night in the University Theatre. The play, a financial failure on Broadway, but hailed as an artistic success by some, deals with the simplicity and integrity existent in relationships. The university players did a great job with the material at hand. But we doubt that many people in the audience were capable of following the trend of thought of the play. The play, while sincere in its efforts, seemed a bit high and lofty. Capote's ideas were well presented by the players, but they seemed to lack a common thread with which the audience could grasp the over-all meaning. ### History, Social Studies Group To Open 3-Day Meeting Here

Louis Gottschalk, past president of the American Historical association and a University of Chicago history professor, will address the second session of the 32nd annual conference of teachers of history and social studies at 8 p.m. tonight in the Shambaugh lecture room of University library. His topic is "Reflections on Edmund Burke's 'Reflections on the French Revolution'." Approximately 150 history and social science instructors from high schools and colleges in Iowa and surrounding states are expected to be on the SUI campus today and Saturday for the three conference sessions. The event is managed by the history department in co-operation with the extension division, the college of education and the first graduate college.

### Alumnus Praises Water Fluoridation At Dental Meeting

Fluoridation of public water supplies for protection against dental decay was described at SUI Thursday night as a measure in keeping with a health profession's foremost responsibility: the prevention and control of disease. "Fluoridation, in its large-scale attack on mankind's most common disease, demonstrates tellingly the highest obligation of a health profession," Dr. W. Philip Phair of Chicago told the Student American Dental association at the SUI college of dentistry. Phair, who is secretary of the Council on Dental Health of the American Dental association, said continuing studies of all new evidence on the measure serve only to substantiate further the safety and effectiveness of the procedure. "The evidence continues to demonstrate that fluoridation will have no untoward effect on general health and will significantly improve health through the reduction of dental decay," said Phair, an alumnus of the SUI college of dentistry. As an example of continuing studies on the fluoridation program, Phair cited a recent report of the commission on chronic illness which urged that U.S. communities "adopt this public health measure as a positive step in the prevention of dental caries (tooth decay)." The commission's action, he said, was based on a report of a special committee appointed by the commission to study the effects of fluoridation on persons with chronic illnesses.
