A New Junior High

On October 15th, the citizens living in the Iowa City, Community School District will go to the poils to say yes or no to a matter involving \$1,500,000 and the future of the junior high school educational facilities within the district. Irritated by numerous tax burdens, Mr. Voter may be inclined to say "Yes we need the schools, but I don't want to pay for them. Find some other way to finance the project."

Unfortunately or perhaps fortunately, there is no other feasible way. The decision rests with those who in addition to paying the cost, are most likely to reap the benefits.

Although there may be disagreement as to the methods of presenting an education to our youngsters, there is no serious opposition to the concept of making an adequate education available to all. Withholding funds because of disagreement with present education methods can only make a difficult situation worse. While those members of the district whose children will shortly be going to these schools will most likely best appreciate the need, other citizens need only look to where the school growth has failed to match population growth to see that refusal to improve the schools as the need arises is poor economy. Emergency stop-gap measures must then be taken, imposing a burden that well may be in addition to the cost of erecting school facilities when their need can no longer be ignored.

Proper planning in such cases is difficult, and might well prove less satisfactory while more costly than the carefully planned program. Thus not only construction economies may be realized, but also better education facilities might result from prompt action by the bond issue voter.

The Board of Education says that more classroom space will be needed in the fall of 1957, and present plans provide for it in additions to Central Junior High School. Central would then have a comparable set of facilities to those planned for the projected junior high. All this must be paid for by the bond issue. Iowa City Mayor Leroy S. Merer, in observance of this week, ssued a proclamation which calls ipon business and labor organizaions, individual employers, and Federal, state and local government agencies to provide wider employment opportunties for the

The Iowa City Veterans Adminstration Hospital, in cooperation with these two proclamations, is making a concentrated effort to

Because an individual'is disabled does not mean he is unemployable. Employers are urged to judge a man in terms of his abilities rather than his disabilities. If the person's handicap will not hinder his ability to perform a certain job, this handicap should not be held against the individual.

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has helped in providing jobs for the physically handicapped.

Each year several thousand persons with serious, permanent physical handicaps take their place in the Government's career civil service through the selective-placement program of the Commission. Since 1942, more than 137,000 disabled workers have joined Uncle Sam's civilian work force.

Selective placement emphasizes abilities - not disabilities. It is bared on the principle that the physically handicapped person who is placed in the right position is not handicapped on the job.

Selective-placement had its be-

ginning during the critical manpower shortage that developed early in World War II. In 1948,



'56 'New Faces' Not So Bouncy

"New Faces of 1956" is certainly not the highly polished and bouncy musical that its famous 1952 predecessor was. Neither is the new revue exciting theater or memorable music. What it is — well, let the new RCA Victor recording of the '56 version tell you.

"New Faces of '52" was filled with some outstanding performers who artistically poured effervescent material to theater and movie audiences thirsty for musical comedy refreshment.

Were it not for the excitement caused by "My Fair Lady" and 'Most Happy Fella," Broadway's biggest hits today, theater-goers might find the '56 revue more tasty than it really is. I judge from the Victor record, which tells me that the new show has performers, too, though few rise above competence...

Some of the material, instead of bubbling over, almost fizzles out. In sum, it's the sort of thing you might hear on any run-of-the-mill. TV

Yet, through all this emerges a female impersonator whose imitation of Tallulah Bankhead is the highlight of the album and, reportedly, of the whole show. His name is T.C. Jones and - on the record, at least — he is at all times hilarious. His version of "Til Be Seeing You" (with a few "daahlings" thrown in for good measure) is one of the funniest numeers I've heard since the 1952 revue's "Boston Beguine." The only other number I can remember from a couple of hearings is


