 train from Helsinki to Leningrad, traveling through 283 miles of Finnish and Russian countryside. The train had left at noon on June 20 and we would arrive at our destination at midnight that night. It was large and roomy, but still uncomfortable.
 The compartments, which sat from eight to sixteen and slept four, were on one side of the coaches, with a narrow corridor at the other side. A small table sat next to the one window in each compartment, topped by a ridiculously ornate and wobbly table lamp. Loudspeakers in each compartment and the corridor blared forth Radio Moscow.
 The steward brought in some very hot Russia tea. It smelled odd but in the 25 days behind the Iron Curtain ahead of us, I would learn to relish it.

 Coder said the following things are regarded as change of personal status: change of mailing address; marriage; additions to the family; any and all deaths in a man's family; divorce or separation; permanent change of job; serious injury or physical defect; student status; Reserve or National Guard affiliation.

Williams, Musial Almost Cinches for Bat Titles

NEW YORK (AP)—Veterans Ted Williams and Stan Musial, numbering 75 years between them, go into the final week of the 1957 baseball season with substantial leads in the major league batting races.

The 39-year-old Williams virtually clinched the American League crown with a perfect weekend series against the New York Yankees. The Red Sox slugger went 4-for-4 and his average rose to .383, 18 points higher than runner-up Mickey Mantle, the Yanks' defending batting champion.

Musial, who led the Giants' Willie Mays by just three points a week ago, opened the gap in the National League. The 36-year-old Cardinal ace boosted his average to .345, while Mays dropped to .334.

If Williams, seeking his fifth batting crown, maintains his superiority, he will become the oldest play-

er ever to win a major league batting title.

"The Thumper" who saw limited service during the week because of the lingering effects of a chest cold, had five hits in five at bats and lifted his average seven points.

Musial, a six-time batting champ, also displayed a good finishing kick. "The Man" delivered 8 hits in 18 at bats and his average soared three points.

Prescott, Lewis Back On 1st Team; Hawks Work On Timing

Coach Forest Evashevski placed emphasis on timing Monday as he sent his Big 10 champions through a two-hour workout in preparation for this season's opener with Utah State here Saturday.

Two major changes were made in the Hawkeye lineup. Bob Prescott, junior right end from Sioux City, replaced sophomore Don Norton of Anamosa, on the first squad. Mac Lewis, junior center from Chicago, replaced sophomore Bill Lapham on the first eleven.

Collins Hagler, of Washington, D.C., and Bill Hoppel of Cedar Rapids, both right halfbacks, returned to active duty Monday. Both had been out with injuries.

Hagler was running with the first squad and Hoppel with the second team. Monday's workout was devoted mainly to blocking, pass defense, kicking and dummy practice.

Craziest! Braves' Fans Go Wild After Sunday Win

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The New York Yankees, who wear their championships with a kind of quiet dignity, will be in for a big surprise if they meet the fans of the Milwaukee Braves.

There is nothing quite like the Braves' fan in baseball. He is intensely enthusiastic, intensely loyal and intensely demonstrative.

You may say a lot of fans are like that all over. But where else have you seen fans dancing in the aisles, parading in the stands with placards and banners, shaking hands and kissing feminine fans just out of sheer joy of victory?

At Chicago's Wrigley Field Sunday when the Braves virtually clinched the pennant with a 9-7, 10-inning victory over the Cubs, the field reverberated and rocked with every Braves hit.

The crowd was only 25,651, but it sounded like 50,000. And when the Braves seventh inning came, it looked as though everybody in the park stood up. There didn't seem to be a Cub fan in the place.

The excitement that will grip this town when the Braves make certain they'll be in the World Series will be terrific. So will the demand for tickets.

One tavern keeper has posted a standing offer of \$150 for a pair of tickets to any game in County Stadium where the series will be played Oct. 5, 6 and 7. The regular price for a set of two seats for the entire three games is \$42.

Winning the championship this season, in the minds of most Milwaukee fans, was inevitable. From the moment the Braves switched from Boston to Milwaukee in 1953, the average fan here assumed the championship came with the franchise.

Only one belittling voice was heard in Milwaukee. It was a proprietor of a downtown grog shop, who snorted: "Without Red Schoendienst, Warren Spahn and Hank Aaron what are the Braves? Nothing but an American Assn. team."

He was speaking, however, to out-of-state patrons.

Utah State's Ace Will Throw Ball

LOGAN, Utah — When Utah State University has the football, the opposition can look for the hoghide to be thrown downfield from most anywhere on the lot. That's the play form coach Ev Faunce has charted for Bob Winters, the hard throwing Aggie quarterback.

"Winters," Faunce brags, "is as good as any quarterback in the country."

The senior from Yakima, Washington, already has his passing arm zeroed in. September 14 in the season opener against Hawaii, Winters completed 14 passes, pitched four of them for touchdowns.

"Our season will be based on Winters' performances as we go along," says Faunce. "Our T-Wing system is a better throwing offense for Winters. . . it gives him more time and better protection." Last season from the Split-T, Winters was 12th in the nation in pass completions.

Five On Cyclones Injured List, May Miss Syracuse Tilt

AMES (AP)—Coach Jim Myers sent his Iowa State football squad through light workouts Monday in preparation for the Cyclones' encounter with Syracuse next Saturday.

Myers listed five players who remained on the doubtful list with injuries and perhaps won't see action in the game at Syracuse.

They are Gale Gibson of Ankeny right end; Don Metcalf, tackle from Knoxville; Ron Pohl, fullback from Davenport; Prentis Lamont, fullback from Cherokee, and Frank Powell, center from Omaha, Neb.

Despite the injuries, Myers said the general condition of the squad was good. Regarding Saturday's 10-0 victory over Denver, Myers said his Cyclones were "making plays they never thought they could make."

Murtaugh Reired As Pirate Manager

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Danny Murtaugh, a wise cracker, with a lot of baseball know-how, Monday was named manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates for 1958.

Murtaugh said he is elated at the opportunity to direct the Pirates for a full season and added his first goal will be to obtain a power hitter and more pitching help.

The 39-year-old Irishman, who moved into the managerial job with the sudden dismissal of Bobby Bragan on Aug. 3 in Chicago, has fused the Pirates to a respectable .500 class, winning 24 and losing a like number since he replaced Bragan.

General Manager Joe L. Brown announced Murtaugh's appointment at a news conference.

Two New Instructors Join School of Religion

"The maverick on the university campus today is not the scoffer at religion but the student who is interested in religion and willing to give it a hearing," William H. K. Narum said in an interview Monday afternoon.

Narum is associate professor in SUI's School of Religion. This year he is taking the place of Dr. George Forell who is on leave of absence on a Fulbright grant to teach at the University of Hamburg in Germany.

Joining Narum and the SUI School of Religion faculty is Rabbi Ben-Zion Gold. This year Rabbi Gold will take the place of Frederick P. Bargebuhl who is on leave of absence on a Warburg Institute fellowship to work in Medieval Arabic and Hebrew studies at the University of London.

Both Narum and Rabbi Gold feel

that on the university campuses all over the country today there is an awareness of a new need for religious education. This interest has produced the new maverick, the one who no longer scoffs at religion but is willing to give religion a hearing.

Narum and Rabbi Gold believe this new interest in religion has sprung from some of the bad effects resulting from the separation of Church and State.

"The separation of Church and State," Rabbi Gold explained, "was a necessary expedient but it has had a neutralizing effect on the forces of religion within our culture. It has led to the feeling that Americans can have morals and ethics without having religion."

"Morals and ethics without religion," Rabbi Gold said, "are like cut flowers. They look nice but they have no future. The separation of Church and State has helped create a spiritual vacuum in the modern American."

Rabbi Gold pointed out that man cannot neglect religion because he is a mixture of body and soul and without religion he cannot properly develop the spiritual aspect of his being.

"If man does not develop the spiritual aspect of his being," Rabbi Gold said, "it degenerates, be-

comes a burden to him and a source of suffering."

Rabbi Gold compared man's neglect of his religious development to the neglect of his emotional development.

"Today," he said, "men know that unless they develop and educate their emotions, their emotions turn inward and cause problems. The same thing happens when men neglect their spiritual development by neglecting religion."

The purpose of religion, Rabbi Gold said, is self fulfillment.

"What comes after this life is something I am unable to speak about. I believe there is an existence after this life, but what it is I am not prepared to say. I know God is just and so what He will do to man in the next life will be just."

Rabbi Gold believes religion has its purpose in this life and the purpose is to help the individual fulfill himself. The religion that is important is the one the individual professes.

Each man directing himself by the principles of his own church will understand himself, his own uniqueness and the uniqueness and inviolable sanctity of others.

This understanding of the uniqueness of the individual, Rabbi Gold said, makes him aware of the freedom to be different he has. This freedom to be different is a pre-

requisite to all the other freedoms. Narum believes the purpose of the study of religion is merely to give the student a knowledge of religion.

"Religious teaching," he said, "is not evangelism, not preaching. I am inclined to think knowledge of religion is knowledge gained for its own sake, though I could be Platonic and say that it is character education, too."

Socrates in the Platonic dialogues maintained that everything a man learns has an effect on the development of his character.

Narum also said that knowledge of religion was necessary if a man is to become fully educated.

"The liberal arts student exposes himself to the basic areas of reality, nature, man. In order to complete his picture of reality, the student must know something about God and his own relationship to God."

"A liberally educated man is one who is able to explain and solve the problems that confront him in his daily living. There will be a number of these problems that he will be unable to understand or solve unless he can prove to himself that God exists and that he stands in some relationship to God."

Asked what he thought about SUI's multi-denominational School

of Religion, Narum said he thought it was excellent.

It is impossible, Dr. Narum believes, to have a true university without a theological faculty. He thinks the multi-denominational faculty at SUI helps to preserve the ideal sought when Church and State are separate.

The purpose of the separation of Church and State was to keep any one religion from dominating our country, Narum said. The SUI School of Religion — by teaching the students about all denominations — helps prevent any one religion from dominating the state.

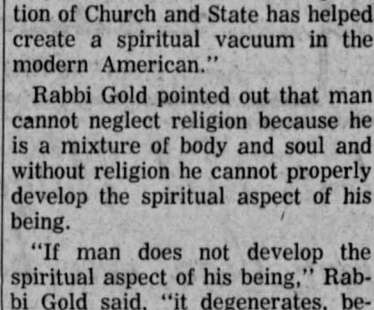
Narum studied at St. Olaf's College, Northfield, Minn., at the Lutheran Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., and did his graduate work at Princeton. For the last 10 years he has taught philosophy and theology at St. Olaf's College. During the year 1954-55 he had a Fulbright Grant and taught at Goettingen and Heidelberg Universities in Germany.

Rabbi Gold was born in Poland

and came to the U.S. in 1947. He has studied at the Seminary School of Jewish Studies and at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York City. Last year he studied at the University of Jerusalem.

NROTC Applications Now Available for SUI Men

Applications are now available for the Navy's twelfth competitive examination for its nation-wide NROTC college training program, according to a recent announcement by the Navy Department. The mental examination is scheduled for December 14, 1957, and is open to all high school seniors and graduates who can qualify.

those who apply and qualify, assignment to flight training is available.

Male citizens of the United States between the ages of 17 and 21 are eligible to apply for the aptitude test. Persons attaining a qualifying score will be given the Navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February.

From the pool of qualified candidates remaining in competition, approximately 2,000 young men will be selected for appointment as midshipmen and will enroll in one of the 52 colleges of their choice where a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps Unit is located.

College men enrolled in the regular NROTC program will spend part of three of their summer vacations on training cruises with the Fleet, and will receive \$600 annual retainer pay until commissioned.

Successful candidates will start their Naval careers in colleges and universities across the country in 1958, with substantial financial assistance from the government.

After a normal college education, graduates will be commissioned as regular officers in the Navy or Marine Corps, for active duty with the Fleet throughout the world. For

Benson Defends His Price Support Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson Monday defended his action extending corn price support aid to noncooperating farmers on grounds the Federal corn control program is "unsound and unworkable."

Benson announced Friday that corn grown in excess of Government acreage allotments this year will be supported at an average of \$1.10 a bushel. Until he took this action, such corn was ineligible for Government market assistance.

Benson's action brought criticism from some farm leaders. And Rep. Poage (D-Tex.) called it unfair to cotton farmers who comply with the Government's cotton control program.

Benson told a news conference that the corn program "can never be made to work" because corn producers do not like it. He said not more than 30 per cent of corn producers cooperated with the program this year.

Benson said his objective in offering corn supports to non-complying farmers was to help stabilize livestock feed grain markets and to try to head off a possible overexpansion in livestock production resulting from cheap feed.

"It is a sound action," he said. The secretary replied "no" when asked if there had been any "pressure from Republican politicians" for the new corn support action.

Seventy-nine coeds at SUI have been accepted as candidates for the Scottish Highlanders, the world's largest all-girl bagpipe band, Director William L. Adamson announced Monday. More than 350 tried out for the group.

The majority of the new Highlanders will spend their first year in a training program, taking lessons in either the bagpipes or drums and learning the Scottish dances and folk songs which the group represents.

The Scottish Highlanders will make their 1957 debut during pregame and half-time ceremonies of the Utah State football contest Saturday in Iowa City.

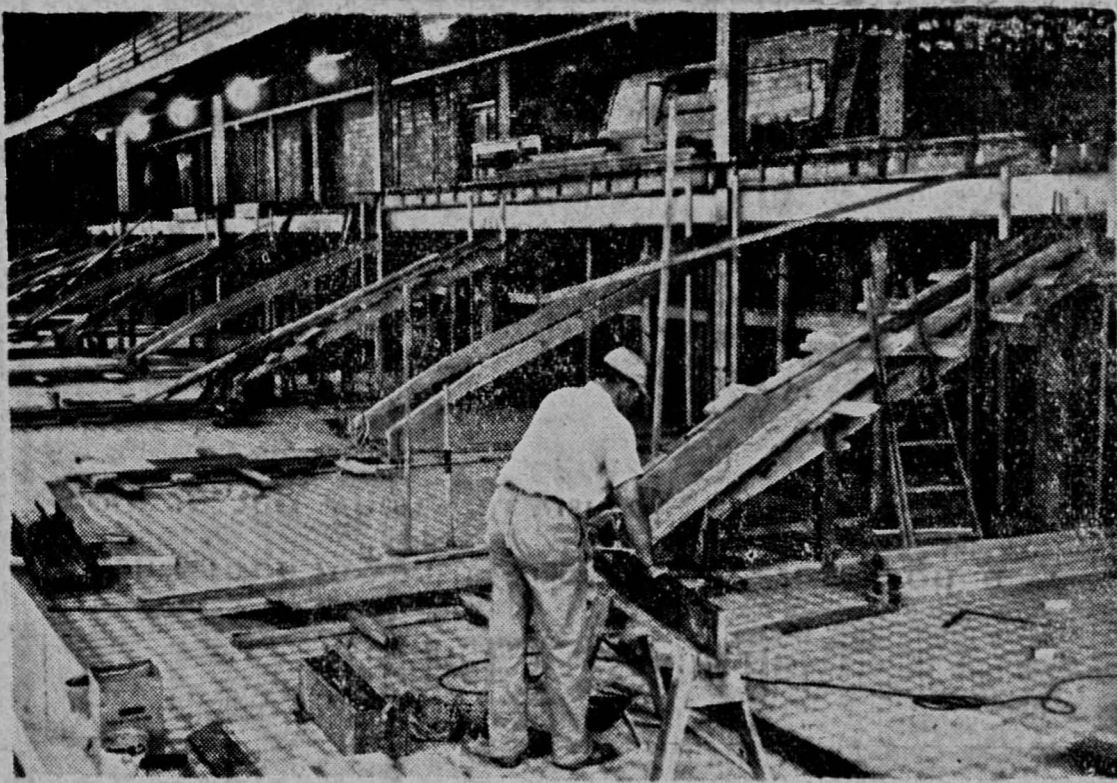

'Pamir' Still Missing, Rescue 5 Survivors

HAMBURG, Germany (AP)—A U.S. freighter rescued five survivors of the German bark Pamir Monday from a lifeboat they shared with five dead men.

Lights and flares spotted in mid Atlantic raised hopes that others of the 86-man crew lived through the hurricane that struck the four-masted sailing ship 550 miles west-southwest of the Azores.

The Isbrandtsen Lines freighter Saxon made the first rescue in the hunt underway since the Pamir radioed this SOS Saturday:

"Heavy hurricane. All sails lost. 15-degree list, danger of sinking."

The 7,251-ton Saxon told Isbrandtsen's New York office of picking up the five men and the line immediately notified the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Coast Guard said 10 men were in the small boat, but only five survived.

THE SAXON, like the Pamir, had been on a grain-carrying mission.

The steel-hulled Pamir, 3,103 tons, was bound from Buenos Aires to Hamburg with a cargo of barley when she ran into Hurricane Carrie, the third hurricane of the season.

The Saxon had left Baltimore Sept. 14 with a cargo of grain for Trieste.

There was a report Monday night from West German radio stations that five men had been saved by the Tacoma Star, a 7,197-ton British freighter, but this proved incorrect.

A monitoring agency said the Tacoma Star had simply relayed a report from the Saxon of her rescue of the five.

THREE DIM orange lights spotted by a U.S. Skymaster 550 miles southwest of the Azores before dawn Monday had spurred the air-sea effort to reach any survivors and finally determine the Pamir's fate.

Ten ships were summoned to that area.

Radar of the Skymaster, one of six Azores-based aircraft in the hunt, indicated the lights came from neither a large vessel nor anything made of steel.

"The rescuers are working on the theory they might have come from a lifeboat, made of wood," a U.S. Air Force spokesman said.

NINE NEW POLIO CASES

DES MOINES (AP)—Nine new polio cases, three of them paralytic, were reported in Iowa last week, the State Health Department said Monday.

The new cases bring to 25 the number so far this month. At least one of the three new paralytic cases had received no Salk vaccine.

SUI Demos Plan First Fall Meeting

SUI's Young Democrats club will hold their first meeting Thursday, Oct. 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Pentacrest Room of Iowa Memorial Union with Prof. Russell G. Whitesel of the University's Political Science Department speaking.

The University chapter of the Democrats had more than 450 members last year, and was recognized as one of the largest YD clubs in the nation.

Other prominent speakers for the year will include Gov. Herschel C. Lovless and Iowa Congressman Merwin D. Coad.

Iowa Gets Award For Excellence Of Driver Education

Iowa was one of 20 states selected to receive the Award of Excellence for the extent and quality of their driver education programs conducted during the 1956-57 school year.

Thomas N. Boate, manager of the Accident Prevention Department of the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies which sponsors the award program, cited three factors as significant to the growth of this program during the past decade:

A steady gain in the number of states offering financial aid to high schools; lower premiums offered by most insurance companies for graduates of driver education courses meeting national standards; an increase in the number of organizations and groups supporting the program.
