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# Platform Hassle May Mean 'No' To Rockefeller

CHICAGO (AP) — Republicans bent on bestowing their Presidential nomination on Richard M. Nixon Friday watched a titanic tussle over the GOP platform dim the chances of getting Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller on the ticket with him.

The New York governor blasted, at long range, at projected platform planks on national defense, foreign policy and civil rights as "still seriously lacking in strength and specifics."

Also at long range, Vice President Nixon still was trying to mold the platform to his own liking.

Each man Rockefeller from New York, Nixon from Washington, was keeping a constant check on how the writing of the platform is getting along behind locked doors.

Any prospects of persuading Rockefeller to accept a call to second place on a ticket headed by Nixon have been pegged largely to hopes of party leaders of piloting through next week's Republican National Convention a platform acceptable to both men.

A declaration of party principles palatable to these two towering figures in the GOP still may emerge from the convention. It doesn't vote on the platform, or on nominations for the Presidency and vice presidency, until next Wednesday night.

Various convention figures waved conciliatory gestures at Rockefeller.

But for the moment, at least, the governor's criticism of present versions of key segments of the platform splashed ice water on the chances of luring him into running with Nixon.

His own public position on that is unchanged—he positively would refuse the vice-presidential nomination under any conditions.

His position still is the same on the Presidential nomination, too—he would accept a draft.

But Nixon already is looking down on Rockefeller from the vantage point of a mountain of some 1,000 of the 1,331 votes the GOP will cast in the convention next week.

Backers of an attempt to get a draft going for Rockefeller still talked bravely and went through all kinds of gyrations. They went off to fly their kites Friday—a hundred or so of them, with "win with Rockefeller" pleas, in the park across the street from convention headquarters.

Saturday they are staging a giant rally for the governor when

# Fires Rage Nine Western States; Worst in 30 Years

Four airmen died in flaming plane crashes Friday while helping thousands of ground fighters battle the worst forest fires in 30 years in nine Western states.

Tragedy befell two converted B-25 bombers—among many pouring fire-retarding borate solution just ahead of roaring flames. One crashed in eastern Oregon, the other in Southern California.

Highly trained U. S. Forest Service experts sped by plane from the eastern, southern and lake regions of the United States to help direct weary ground crews, some on the lines for a week.

"These men are not just fire fighters but trained supervisory personnel, equivalent perhaps to platoon, company and division infantry officers," explained Bert E. Holby, fire chief of the service's eastern region at Upper Darby, Pa.

Spreading fires, many lightning-set, blackened some 200,000 acres in California, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming and Arizona. In Idaho, the FBI investigated the possibility of arson.

More than 300 fires were battled by 3,000 men in British Columbia. The worst was a 13,000-acre fire along Spius Creek.

Damage was in uncounted millions of dollars—more than \$10 million in Southern California alone.

Fighters on the lines totaled thousands, including more than 1,000 Indians. Many were airlifted to critical areas.

In Los Angeles county in California, fires routed some 1,000 persons from their homes Thursday. There the flames have destroyed two score houses and cabins.

# Lodge Labels Russian Spy Charges Phony

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge accused the Soviet Union, Friday, of fabricating espionage charges in connection with the flight of a U.S. reconnaissance plane shot down by Soviet fighters July 1.

He denounced the charges as "an unconvincing thought sinister provocation."

At a session of the U.N. Security Council made dramatic by the presence of the wives of two U.S. Air Force men aboard the plane being held as spies, Lodge made a personal appeal to Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov for their prompt release.

Kuznetsov asked the council to approve a resolution condemning the United States as an aggressor

red-handed they attempted to display pharisaical concern for the fate of these airmen, shedding crocodile tears in that process."

**U.S. Expels Red Diplomat For Photos**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States Friday expelled another Soviet diplomat—the 12th in 10 years — on grounds he arranged for aerial photographs of American cities and defense installations.

The State Department ordered the immediate departure of Petr Y. Ezhov, 39, Soviet Embassy third secretary because he "flagrantly abused his diplomatic status by engaging in espionage activities."

The order was another in a recent series of strongly worded U. S. protests against Soviet cold war maneuvers.

Ezhov, a smooth-talking press aide, arranged for an unidentified pilot to photograph selected sites from a private plane. While under close FBI surveillance Ezhov paid more than \$1,000, the department said, to the pilot for the systematic aerial survey.

The department would not identify the flying photographer by name or nationality or say what action, if any, is planned against him.

Authoritative informants said most of the aerial photographs were taken along the East Coast—some of them about the time Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev was in this country on a goodwill visit last September.

Soviet diplomats are forbidden to acquire such aerial photographs. Regulations forbidding this activity went into effect five years ago to retaliate for similar restrictions against American diplomats in Moscow.

Ezhov apparently carried on operations of another Soviet diplomat, Vladimir F. Glinka, an assistant embassy naval attaché, who organized the project several years ago.

Glinka left for Moscow, informants said, before his role in the espionage work was detected. But Ezhov, as his successor, was carefully watched by FBI agents for months before enough evidence was collected to crack down on him.

# Congo Premier Abandons Threat To Call in Reds

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP) — Premier Patrice Lumumba turned from his flirtation with the Soviet Union and took off Friday for the United States and Canada in search of capital for the Congo's crippled economy. He said he wants to be friends with everybody.

Lumumba abandoned his threat to call in Soviet soldiers to force out Belgian soldiers. He told a news conference in this U.N.-Guarded capital there is no longer any need for Soviet military intervention.

The lanky Congolese leader, who only a few days ago was calling Western nations imperialist and issuing ultimatums to the United Nations signed one agreement with an American financier for development of mineral and power resources of the former colony Belgium freed June 30.

Lumumba also held out a hand to the Belgians. He gave the Belgians credit for helping to build the Congo and said he considers them "our friends."

He insisted only that Belgian soldiers evacuate the Congo, including the treaty bases of Kamina and Kikona.

"We have political independence and now we need economic independence. We need bread and happiness for our people," Lumumba said.

"We want the assistance of all the world, but we do not want charity. We offer, to all those who want to help us exploit the country, equitable remuneration on their investment and all necessary guarantees."

The shift in Lumumba's diplomatic stance was abrupt.

He expressed profound thanks to the U.N. for its quick action in

the Congo, although the Security Council set no deadline in renewing its call for the withdrawal of Belgian soldiers. He had been threatening to call in the Soviet Union and soldiers of the African-Asian bloc nations if the Belgian units did not leave immediately.

Lumumba set out for New York aboard a jet airliner in a hunt for international capital, technical and medical help to put this backward young African nation on its feet. The British-built plane was supplied by President Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana.

L. Edgar Detwiler, American president of the Congo International Management Corp. (CIMCO), founded just two months ago, signed a 50-year development pact with the Premier. The agreement is subject to ratification by the Congo's Parliament, now in recess.

Detwiler, who accompanied Lumumba on the plane, said his corporation will supply capital and management and training for Congolese who are expected to take over key positions.

He said crude mineral reserves of the Congo are estimated by his experts to be worth \$2 billion.

Detwiler, 62, has headquarters in New York.

# Loveless: Republican Party Is Thinking in the Past

DES MOINES (AP) — Gov. Herschel Loveless, Democratic candidate for U. S. senator, says the Republican Party has its head and thinking in the past.

The governor's office released Friday night remarks Loveless will make at the Iowa Democratic platform convention opening here today.

Referring to what he called failures at the Summit, in Japan, in Latin America and in the United States itself, he said:

"The most tragic failure of the Republican philosophy is to realize that the idealism of yesterday has become the realism of today."

Loveless said the Democrats will conduct a united, hard-hitting, clean-fighting election campaign on the national and state level.

The party's national ticket with Sen. Jack Kennedy of Massachusetts for president and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas for vice president is "one of the greatest presidential tickets in history," Loveless said.

Calling the party's platform adopted at Los Angeles a document of genius he said "it recognizes the close relationship between the mighty issues, foreign and domestic, that confront us."

The central struggle in the world now is the revolutionary fight to upgrade the material and spiritual well-being of people throughout the world, he added.

# New Daughter Costs Couple 94 Pounds—of Their Flesh

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sherman paid for their new daughter with 94 pounds of flesh.

That's how much they reduced in less than four months after an adoption court told them they were too fat to adopt a year-old child they had taken care of since her birth.

The County Adoption Bureau had said their excess weight would shorten their lives and imperil the girl's security.

Sherman, 39, a 6-foot-3 truck driver, showed up in court Friday weighing 277½, down 55½ from the 333 he weighed at the adoption hearing April 9.

His 5-foot-5 wife Bernice, 37, now weighs 214 — a loss of 38½.

Impressed, Superior Judge Ben Koenig approved their adoption of blonde, blue-eyed Janet.

The Shermans said they did it by strict dieting under a doctor's care, cutting their calories to 1,000 a day. That meant they ate mostly salads and lean meat, foregoing starches and sweets.

"We're the happiest people in the world," said Sherman. "It's been a long hard struggle."

But they plan to stay on their diet, hoping to lose another 15 pounds or more apiece.

The Shermans have another adopted child, Debbie, 5.

Dr. Millard M. Doughton, the couple's physician, said that when he first saw the Shermans he told them to prepare a list of things they liked best to eat.

"They said they couldn't think of anything they liked more than carrots," the doctor said. "They just liked to eat everything."

He said Sherman recently told him: "We haven't had any pies or cakes in the house since we started. Once in a while when we get the urge for sweets, we eat a little pound cake or dietetic ice cream. The first few weeks were the hardest."

Second Guessing

"Lots of hurdles to leap at Iowa before the Hawkeyes become formidable." That is the opinion of the writers of the 1960 College and Professional Football Roundup magazine now on sale at 50 cents per copy.

Street and Smith's 1960 Football Yearbook (also 50 cents) pretty much goes along with the above statement: "Strictly on the basis of cold figures," the magazine says, "the Hawkeyes should be picked deep in the second division of (the Big Ten)."

Street and Smith continues: "Only two regulars return along with only 15 other lettermen... But this doesn't take into consideration Forest Evashevski, who has brought Iowa up from the cellar to a Big Ten power... But obviously, sophomores will have to supply the bulk of Iowa's firepower."

Back to College and Pro Roundup: "Looking at the situation frankly, there would seem considerable doubt that he (Evashevski) could develop a team as good as the Hawkeyes in '59 when the season's record was 5-4... Graduation virtually wrecked Iowa's forward wall, but the picture has encouraging prospects with the return of Lloyd Humphreys and Bill Van Buren at the center position... The backfield likewise was riddled by graduation and only Captain Jerry Mauren stands as a rallying point in the rebuilding process... Then the article goes on to mention the promising Iowa sophomores who will help out during the coming season.

The views expressed in these two magazines seem to be much more realistic than the one expressed by Minneapolis Star and Tribune sports writer Dick Cullum in the 1960 NCAA Football Guide which came out a few weeks ago.

Cullum said: "Iowa is destined to rise again. Forest Evashevski was hit hard by ineptitude and unexpected failure at quarterback a year ago. Except for two or three soft spots, since mended, he has a potent squad... Iowa has the deepest tackle-to-tackle line, unmatched backfield speed and depth, and seasoned quarterbacking."

Could it be Cullum was looking at the wrong roster when he said this? Seems to me we had no "unexpected failure" at quarterback last fall. Olen Treadway passed for over 1,000 yards and showed himself to be an extremely smart signal caller. If anything, Cullum should have said: "Iowa had a pleasant surprise last fall when Treadway developed into one of the best quarterbacks in the conference."

And this "deepest tackle-to-tackle line." Somebody should cue in Evashevski on this. Last I heard, his feelings were just the opposite. Street and Smith picks the Big Ten this way: 1. Illinois. 2. Michigan State. 3. Ohio State. 4. Iowa. 5. Minnesota. 6. Michigan. 7. Purdue. 8. Indiana. 9. Northwestern. 10. Wisconsin.

Football roundup sees it thus: 1. Illinois. 2. Michigan State. 3. Northwestern. 4. Ohio State. 5. Iowa. 6. Purdue. 7. Indiana. 8. Michigan. 9. Minnesota. 10. Wisconsin.

The most amazing thing here is the fact that both magazines pick last year's champions, Wisconsin, to finish in the Big Ten cellar. Usually, forecasters base their predictions quite heavily on performances of the year before. Not so here, however.

Both magazines recognized the fact that Wisconsin had mostly a senior squad last year and will have only two returning regulars and just nine lettermen in all.

Says Street and Smith of favored Illinois: "Illinois has a new coaching staff, but veterans players at tackle and all backfield positions. Its roaring finish last year earns it the unenviable 'favorite' tag."

On Michigan State and Ohio State: "Inconsistent Michigan State, bristling with talent, especially at halfback and end, is a sure title contender and Ohio State's revamped, sophomore infused squad can't be overlooked."

Finally, to Iowa again and the reason why the magazine picks us to finish fourth: "Iowa suffered as much graduation damage as anybody, but a fancy sophomore crop and a fabulous offensive tradition figure to get the Hawks back in the first division."

Street and Smith deviated from Football Roundup's opinion concerning Northwestern: "Northwestern's chances depend too heavily on last year's absentees Dick Thornton and Albert Kimbrough and lack real depth."

Football Roundup agrees that the Wildcats lack depth, but goes on to cite the brilliant first-string performers they will have including Thornton, Kimbrough, Elbert Kimbrough, Mike Stock, Ray Purdin and Irv Cross.

Street and Smith makes national predictions and picks possible all-Americans, while Football Roundup does not. Here is Street and Smith's top dozen teams: 1. Mississippi. 2. Syracuse. 3. ## Counseling Workshop's Aim: Fill H.S. to Adulthood Gap

"Counselors help bridge the gap between our educational structure and adult society," Kenneth B. Hoyt, associate professor of education said, pointing out that the purpose of the annual workshop for high-school guidance-counselors is to train people to help high-school students bridge this gap.

Heavy emphasis is placed on post-graduate decisions; the choice of continuing their education and what school to attend. Counselors also assist students who are doing poorly in school, those who drop out of school and those with special social problems.

Hoyt, a consultant to the U.S. Office of Education on this program, said that there has been a great improvement in school counseling programs since the National Defense Education Act was passed in 1958. From Sept. 1, 1958 to Sept. 1, 1959, there was a 130 per cent increase in Iowa secondary schools employing counselors. Last summer the institute provided 49 teacher-counselors to schools which previously had no counselors at all.
