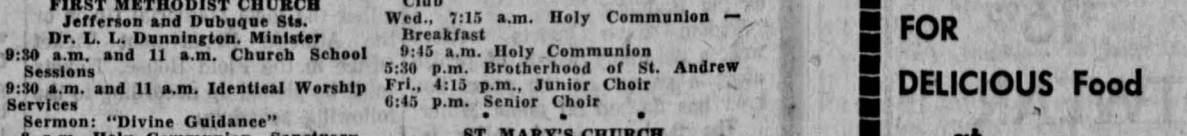

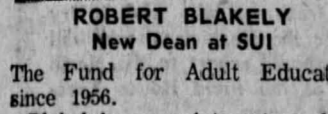

Regents Appoint Blakely as Dean

A prominent former Iowa newspaperman Friday was named dean of the extension division and professor of adult education at SU. He is Robert J. Blakely, former editor of Onawa, SUI graduate "with highest distinction" in 1937, editorial writer for the Des Moines Register and Tribune for 10 years, and vice-president of Blakely joined The Fund for Adult Education in 1951, one month after its founding, and managed its central regional office in St. Louis until 1956. The Fund is sponsored by the Ford Foundation.

As dean of the SUI extension division, Blakely will succeed Bruce E. Mahan, who has directed the division since 1929 and who has continued to serve some months past his regular retirement date until a successor could be found. Major responsibilities of the SUI extension division include correspondence study, production and distribution of audio-visual learning aids, and "continuing education" activities including workshops, conferences, short-courses, "refreshers" and clinics which bring thousands of Iowa adults to the campus each year.

Faculty Member Gives \$10 for Fence Costs

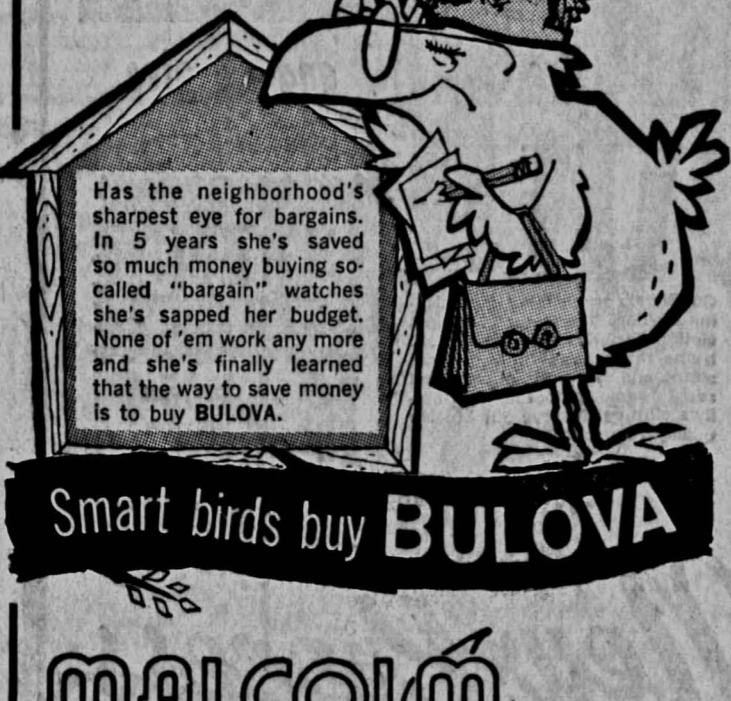

I.C. Student Registration, Voting Procedures Listed

One of the several privileges that come upon reaching the magic age of 21 is that of voting for national, state, county, and township officials. If you are in the 21 plus category and haven't made arrangements to vote, here is how you go about it.

Students who reside in the Hawkeye Apartments, University Heights, or Coralville are not required to register in order to vote. The state of Iowa requires only registration of voters. However, students living in these areas must fulfill residence requirements.

'Year of the Polaris'

"They do look like the doors of doom," said Edward R. Murrow to Admiral Raborn as he watched the little steel trappdoors pop open on the Polaris-bearing submarine, George Washington, with a malevolent squeak.

The closing words: "The Polaris means power — deterrent power. If it's ever fired, it'll have failed its purpose. Good night and good luck." Well, we sure need the luck.

Close to the opening, Rickover, the father of the atom-powered submarine, says: "The Nautilus is a new weapon as revolutionary today as the airplane in its day."

For instance, the Polaris-bearing submarine was first planned before the hydrogen bomb problem had been licked, before solid fuels had been invented. Many breakthroughs had to come before it would work and yet the submarine went forward anyway.

This is a harbinger of things to come. Many observers have felt these debates were a great addition to the democratic process and forecast that they would be unavoidable for future candidates.

The Polaris-bearing submarine is a breakthrough which will seriously affect not only the military thinking of both the free and Communist worlds but world diplomacy almost everywhere.

To take an immensely technical study, with its endless ramifications of Pentagon politics and scientific frustrations and fit it into a mass medium is a chore Friendly and Murrow have been messing around with a long time.

1st Symphon Slated for W

"Der Schwanendreher," a con-cer to for viola by Hindemith, will be the featured composition in the first SUI Symphony Orchestra concert Wednesday.

William Preucil, assistant professor of music and principal violist of the Symphony, will play the Hindemith concerto, which is based on medieval and Renaissance folk melodies. Paul Olefsky, associate professor of music, will direct the orchestra.

The composer in his notes on the original score says that "Der Schwanendreher" has been translated "The Swan Turner (or roaster)" and "The Hurdy-gurdy," but that neither is probably correct.

Notes on the 1936 score continue: "A minstrel, joining a merry company, displays what he has brought back from foreign lands: songs serious and gay, and finally a dance piece.

"Like a true musician, he expands and embellishes the melodies, preluding and improvising according to his fancy and ability.

"This medieval scene was the inspiration of the composition."

Whatever the title's meaning, the concerto is composed of several folk melodies, including texts such as "Between the mountain and the deep valley there runs a free highroad; whoever does not wish to keep his love, must let him go."

In composing the concerto, Hindemith has omitted the higher strings, violins and violas, in order
