Baer Denies Reports Of Resignation

DES MOINES (AP)—Benjamin F. Baer, director of state correctional institutions, said late Thursday he has not been asked to resign by the Board of Control.

"No, I have not," Baer said in a telephone interview from the Men's Reformatory at Anamosa where he is serving as acting warden.

"That is the only statement I will make," Baer said. "I am not thinking about resigning."

THE THREE members of the Board of Control—which operates Iowa's prisons and correctional institutions—refused to confirm or deny a report that they had asked for Baer's resignation.

"I don't want to comment on the subject in any way," said Board Chairman Jim Henry.

"There has been no official action taken," said Carroll Price, the other member of the board. Russell L. Wilson, declined comment.

GOV. HAROLD Hughes said he knew of no plans to ask for Baer's resignation.

Baer has been criticized because of riots and disturbances at the reformatory in recent months. Warden Ray Purcell retired in April and Baer has been serving as acting warden since then.

There have been reports of conflicts between Henry and Baer in the past. Some board members have said that Baer emphasizes rehabilitation programs at the expense of discipline in the reformatory and at the State Penitentiary.

BAER, however, contends he has emphasized discipline as well as rehabilitation.

He confirmed a report that Charles Haugh, an official of a federal penal institution at Leavenworth, Kan., was visiting the reformatory Thursday.

Haugh reportedly is being considered for appointment as warden. "We have had four or five people here to look at the institution," Baer said. He declined to say whether Haugh was in line for the appointment.

Henry said earlier in the day that the board believed it had settled on a successor to Purcell, and hoped to announce the appointment next week.

3 Plead Innocent To Anamosa Riot

ANAMOSA (AP)—Greg Roberts, 17, of Ottumwa, has pleaded innocent to charges of riotous conduct filed after a riot at the Men's Reformatory May 7.

Two other inmates with Roberts also have pleaded innocent. Five inmates involved in the prison outbreak pleaded guilty and five years were added to their sentences.

District Court officials said Thursday that Roberts' trial will start at the completion of the trial for John M. Anderson, 20, who goes before the jury June 15.

Trial date has not been set for Douglas Preston, 21, of Belle Plaine, the other reformatory inmate who pleaded innocent.

Romney Seeks To Shut Down Plant Again

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Angrily charging that the Essex Wire Corp. is "guilty of unfair labor practices and worse," Gov. George W. Romney sought legal authority Thursday to shut down anew the company's strikebound plant at Hillsdale.

At the same time, the governor had state labor mediators summon officials of both Essex Wire and the striking International Union of Electrical Workers to Lansing to renew negotiations which broke down Tuesday.

Meanwhile, approximately 1,000 National Guardsmen called out a week ago "to protect life and property" patrolled Hillsdale to prevent a new eruption of violence which caused Romney to establish a state of public emergency in that city of 7,629.

The 97-day-old strike was called by the IUE in an attempt to win a first contract at Essex, after having ousted the Teamsters Union as bargaining agent last fall.

In sending in troops, Romney shut down the plant. But he allowed it to reopen Wednesday, the governor holding this was mandatory after "re-establishment of law and order."

Romney disclosed his intentions to close the plant again if possible in a letter asking advice from Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley at the earliest possible date, whether there are any legal grounds on which he may do that. Kelley's office said it hoped to have an answer by Friday.

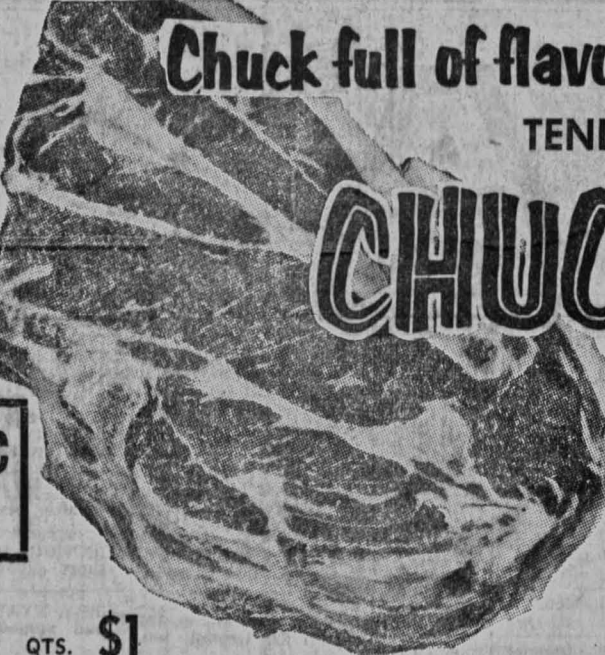

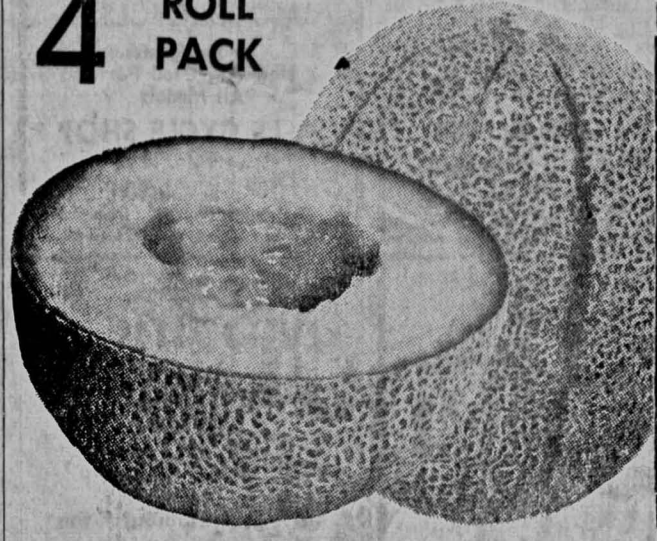

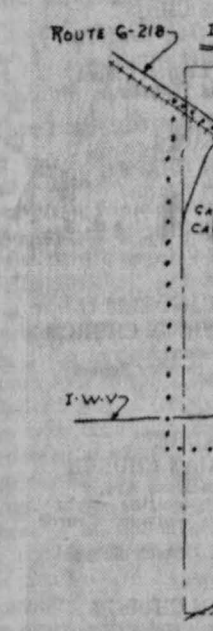
