

# Ford discloses U.S.-Soviet pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford, pronouncing inflation a "deadly long-range enemy," prodded Congress Monday night to act immediately on his budget-cutting and unemployment-aid programs.

At a two-phased White House news conference, the President also disclosed that the terms of his arms agreement with Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev would permit each nation an arsenal of 2,400 nuclear missiles or bombers. As many as 1,320 missiles in each country could have multiple warheads.

Ford said the terms of the accord, which has yet to be turned into a detailed agreement between the two superpowers, would cap future arms buildups and would not, as some critics maintain, "permit an agreed buildup."

Without the strategic arms ceilings, Ford said, there would have been a renewed arms race. He said the United States had information that the Soviet Union would have increased its

nuclear arsenal, adding that the United States would have had to do the same.

Ford said that will not be the case now. But he also said that U.S. defense budgets will be going up, and that the administration has an obligation to enlarge the U.S. nuclear force "to stay up to that ceiling" set in the Vladivostok agreement.

The President's news conference, held in the Executive Office Building, across a narrow street from the White House, was divided into two parts, each with an opening statement from Ford.

First, he disclosed the arms accord terms, answered questions about it and foreign policy for about 20 minutes.

In that segment of the nationally broadcast and televised news conference, Ford also said he and Brezhnev had agreed that in Middle East settlement efforts, Israel and her Arab foes should make a maximum effort to keep negotiations going.

"We think our step by step approach

is the right one for the time being ..." he said. "We also agreed that at a certain point, a Geneva conference might be the final answer."

Then, Ford switched from foreign to domestic matters, and for the second half of his news conference, concentrated on the economy.

Again, he began with a prepared statement, saying "Our greatest danger today is to fall victim to the more exaggerated alarms that are being generated about the underlying health and strength of our economy."

He said recession is a serious threat that has hurt many Americans and alarms many more, but "hopefully, it is a shorter-range evil" than inflation.

"We are going to take some lumps and bumps, but with the help of Congress and the American people, we are perfectly able to cope with our present and foreseeable economic problems," he said.

Ford announced no major new economic programs, instead prodding Congress again to approve his proposals to trim the 1975 budget by

\$4.6 billion and to enact his job program.

But in his prepared remarks he did not repeat his plea for Congress to approve his controversial 5 per cent surtax proposal on upper-level incomes, although during the question and answer period that followed he did ask Congress to consider it.

He repeated his opposition to a big increase in the federal gasoline tax and said he thought the majority of the American people support him on this, even though his advisers have urged him to reconsider.

In addition to restating his firm opposition to an increase in the gasoline tax, Ford also said he doesn't anticipate any need for gasoline rationing. He also said he does not think there will be any serious shortage of gasoline.

In calling for quick congressional approval of his budgetcut, unemployment relief and other proposals, Ford said "Action is more hopeful than criticism at this stage and every week the Congress delays makes the

prospects a little bleaker."

The President said "times are nowhere near desperate enough to paraphrase President Franklin D. Roosevelt's great rallying cry that 'the only thing we have to fear is fear itself.' Still, it is a good thing to remember."


Ford said at least four measures deserve special and immediate attention by the current Congress:

—His \$4.6-billion budget-reducing actions, without Congress adding additional spending.

—A National Employment Assistance Act to provide useful work for those who have exhausted unemployment benefits and to aid others unemployed not previously covered.

—The Trade Reform Act, which Ford said "can help immeasurably in fighting both recession and inflation by creating more jobs and providing more goods as well."

—The tax reform bill, which he said, would provide needed tax relief for low-income citizens.

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# Pioneer 11 slips behind Jupiter; no radiation damage expected

Pioneer 11, traveling faster than any previous man-made object, plunged deeper into Jupiter's immense and deadly radiation field Monday night and headed towards an uncertain fate.

Scientists at NASA's Ames Research Center in Mountain View, Cal., where the mission is being monitored, are concerned that the instruments aboard the space probe may be damaged or destroyed by Jupiter's intense radiation bands.

In an interview last week, UI professor and Iowa Pioneer 11 team leader James Van Allen said, "Pioneer will be coming in at low latitudes and leaving at high latitudes and will dodge a great deal of the Jovian radiation." (Jupiter's radiation is centered in its equatorial regions.)

Van Allen went on to say that although Pioneer 11 will be passing three times closer to the planet than its sister spacecraft, Pioneer 10, he is "not

at all frightened" of the radiation danger, since the total accumulated radiation Pioneer 11 will experience is just slightly greater than the amount Pioneer 10 encountered. Pioneer 10 was undamaged by the radiation.

A UI experiment aboard the spacecraft was functioning perfectly, according to Michelle Thomsen, a member of the UI research team in California. The UI instruments are

designed to measure the energy, density and direction of energetic electrons and protons trapped in Jupiter's magnetic field.

Thomsen said the data obtained so far are in excellent agreement with a model of the Jovian magnetosphere calculated from Pioneer 10 data by UI research associate Bruce Randall.

Pioneer 11 passed behind Jupiter at 11:00 p.m. Iowa time, blocking radio contact with Earth. Pioneer made its

closest approach to Jupiter (26,600 miles) at 11:21 p.m. Iowa time, while travelling 107,000 miles per hour.

The craft was expected to re-emerge from behind Jupiter at 1 a.m. Iowa time. If no damage is incurred, Pioneer 11 will beam back to Earth the data recorded while transmissions were blocked by Jupiter. Analysis of this new data will take months, as it did for Pioneer 10.

# Soviets rehearse joint mission

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union sent the backup crew for the Soviet-American joint mission into space Monday aboard Soyuz 16 in a rehearsal for the Soyuz-Apollo linkup next July. Tass announced the new Soviet manned flight 1½ hours after the spacecraft was launched from the Baikonur space center on the central Asian steppe at 12:40 p. m. — 4:40 a.m.

EST. Several hours after liftoff, Tass said flight commander Anatoly Filipchenko and flight engineer Nikolai Rukavishnikov had adapted to weightlessness and were feeling well. Tass said the craft was circling the earth every 88.4 minutes in an orbit ranging from 110 to 140 miles from the earth.

Both Col. Filipchenko, 46, and Rukavishnikov, 42, are veterans of earlier Soyuz flights and they have been named the backup team in the Soyuz-Apollo project to cosmonauts Alexei Leonov and Valery Kubasov.

Filipchenko said the tests would ensure that the joint U.S.-Russian mission will go "without a hitch," Tass reported.

## Lack of off-campus housing cited

# Fewer students requesting parietal rule exemptions

Substantially fewer students have requested parietal rule exemptions this year than last.

Theodore M. Rehder, director of resident services, reports that the housing office received 981 exemption requests this year. Of these, 978 have been granted.

An interrogatory to a lawsuit against the parietal rule shows that as of Oct. 5, 1973, the UI had received 1,304 requests for exemptions and 1,292 were granted.

The parietal rule, requiring most UI freshmen and sophomores to live in dormitories, was created in 1971 by the Board of Regents.

In October, 1973, a class action suit representing all students under the parietal rule was filed in the U.S. District Court in Des Moines.

The interrogatory was filed in December, 1973, by an attorney retained by Student Senate and answered by the state in April 1974.

Rehder said he has been aware of the

decrease in exemption requests but offered no explanation for it. He said more students have considered applying for exemptions.

"Sometimes a person comes in and casually asks for a certain form, looks it over and sometimes just leaves without the form," he said.

Student Senate President Debra Cagan, A4, blamed the city's apartment shortage for the drop in exemption requests.

"I think probably the big reason for the drop is that people are freaked out by the housing shortage," she said.

"Or maybe students are just fed up with trying to lie to get out of their contracts," she added.

Charles Eastham, G, agreed with Cagan that the decrease might be due to the housing shortage.

Eastham, who is aiding a Des Moines attorney in preparing the parietal rule lawsuit said he doesn't expect the drop in exemption applications to affect the case.

The number of students in the dormitories under the parietal rule has increased along with the number of dormitory residents.

Rehder said Monday there are 3,988 students in the dormitories under parietal rule qualifications. There were 3,787 on Oct. 1, 1973, according to figures listed in the interrogatory response.

Freshmen and sophomores may obtain exemption forms from the University Housing Office. Exemptions may be granted if:

- A student lives with a relative or at a place of employment;
- A student cannot fulfill religious obligations while living in a dormitory;
- A student lives in a fraternity or

sorority;

- A student's medical condition dictates living outside a dormitory;
- A student has completed four semesters of dormitory residence;
- A student is an armed forces veteran;
- An administrative exemption is granted.

The administrative exemption is given in cases not specifically covered by regent exemptions. From 1971 to March 25, 1974, only 49 administrative exemptions were granted.

## in the news Briefly

### Gerber

John C. Gerber, director of the UI School of Letters and chairman of the Department of English, was honored by the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) in New Orleans Saturday. In presenting him with their Executive Committee Award, the group cited Gerber's efforts as founder of the 25-year-old Conference on College Composition and Communication, his presidency of the NCTE in 1955, and his numerous administrative, professional, and scholarly activities.

A former instructor at the Univ. of Pittsburgh and the Univ. of Chicago, Gerber joined the UI faculty in 1944. He served as president of the Midwestern Modern Language Association in 1965-66 and of the Association of Departments of English in 1964.

### Ethiopia

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — Terrorist bombs exploded in a tourist hotel and the City Hall Monday, causing injuries and possible deaths, as Ethiopia appeared to slide toward long-predicted chaos.

Machine-gun fire and grenade blasts were heard from an area near the British, Soviet and Belgian embassies on the outskirts of the city. Reliable sources said the battle erupted when troops went to arrest an Ethiopian noble wanted in an alleged plot against the government.

There were unconfirmed reports of attempted bomb attacks elsewhere, in Addis Ababa's teeming market place and at the airport, where a bomb damaged a fuel depot Saturday night. Another unconfirmed report said the Dutch-Ethiopian Wonji sugar plantation about 50 miles from Addis was attacked. An official spokesman denied all of them.

### Israel

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Palestinian guerrillas claimed on Monday that Israel is mov-

ing troops from the Syrian cease-fire line to the Lebanese border for possible assaults against southern villages.

Guerrilla sources said a significant transfer of smaller infantry units from the Syrian front has sparked fears of an Israeli ground offensive in southern Lebanon in reprisal for stepped-up guerrilla raids against Israeli settlements in upper Galilee.

The troop movements have reportedly prompted a strategy meeting by the commanders of Assifa, the military arm of Yasir Arafat's large Al Fatah guerrilla group, to discuss countermeasures.

### Mine workers

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — Snowstorms slowed balloting Monday by striking United Mine Workers on a proposed new coal industry contract. The union extended the voting period, delaying announcement of the results until Thursday.

The extension through Wednesday was authorized by UMW President Arnold Miller for those locals hindered by the storm.

A union spokesman said that if the pact is ratified, the earliest the mines could open would be at midnight Sunday. UMW mines, which produce more than 70 per cent of the nation's bituminous coal, have been shut down since the union's old three-year pact expired Nov. 12. Updated figures on layoffs in coal-related industries, especially by steel mills and coal-hauling railroads, showed that about 25,000 workers have been idled because of the walkout of the 120,000 miners.

### Italish

ROME (AP) — First Franglais, and now Italish.

Even as French linguistic purists are battling the pollution of pure Francais by words Anglais, English words are flooding the language of Dante.

Spoken Italian is as yet relatively unaffected, but daily papers and gossip magazines have ever less Ital-and ever more ish.

"I can no longer understand my own language, studded as it is with strange words like

'blackout,' 'snack,' 'poster' and 'puzzle,'" — pronounced "pootsle" — an "ordinary housewife" wrote to Turin's daily La Stampa.

Words like "l'austerità," "il manager" and "i posted prices" are now common in economic parlance and understood in the specialist circles they move in. But "l'outsider" — pronounced "looter-seeder" — and "il rush" — pronounced "roosher" — are problematic.

## On stage with Annabel: Mills kills 'innuendoes'

WASHINGTON (AP) — "I think I was right," says Rep. Wilbur D. Mills of his on-stage appearance with stripper Annabel Battistella in Boston. "Of course, I could be wrong..."

Mills said in an interview Monday that his weekend trip was born mostly of what he felt was good strategy "to dispel all these innuendoes."

Mrs. Battistella, who now performs under the stage name Fanne Foxe, was a central figure along with Mills in an early morning episode Oct. 7 that ended when police stopped the car they were riding in and she plunged into the Washington Tidal Basin.

Capitalizing on the publicity over that episode, she subsequently accepted a \$3,000-a-week stand at the Pilgrim Theater in Boston as "The Tidal Basin Bombshell" and Mills attended her final two performances there, making an onstage appearance Sunday night.

"I went up there to be seen," the Arkansas Democrat said. He was accompanied in Boston by Mrs. Battistella's estranged husband, Eduardo, he said, and dined with her between performances at a well-known restaurant.

Mills said this was not the way a man would behave if he had a clandestine relationship with a woman.

As for rumors that Mills and his wife might be considering ending their 40-year marriage, Mills said "certainly not."

He said he had spoken by telephone with Mrs. Mills at least five times while he was in Boston over the weekend.

Mills returned Monday to the Capitol, where the Democratic caucus of the new Congress is beginning sessions that might strip Mills of some of his power as chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

He said, however, he does not think the latest surge of publicity has hurt him. He was reelected after the original Tidal Basin episode and he said he thinks the furor over that made his friends in Arkansas work harder for him.

At a news conference in New York, Mrs. Battistella said: "I love Mr. Mills and he loves me. But we are not lovers. We're just friends — very close friends."

In Washington, some Democrats, not speaking for quotation, disputed Mills' estimate that the latest episode would not hurt him with his colleagues.

There are moves in the caucus to take away from the Democratic members of the Ways and Means Committee their function as nominators of other Democrats for posts on other committees — and to enlarge the committee to 37 members and thus change the predominantly conservative cast it has maintained under Mills' chairmanship.

Moreover, the caucus has the final word on the naming of committee chairmen.

# Three Iowa City sites proposed for elderly housing project

Iowa City's proposed elderly housing project could be located on either of two sites in the downtown area, or on West Benton Street, according to proposals received by Iowa City officials.

By 2 p.m. Monday, the official deadline the official deadline for receipt of housing proposals, the city had received three.

One of the two downtown sites is the west end of Chauncey Swan Plaza, and the other is on the northeast corner of Dubuque and Court streets.

The two downtown proposals were submitted by two local developers, the First Christian Church, represented by Duntson Construction Company, and Old Capitol Associates, the city's urban renewal developer.

A site on West Benton Street, immediately east of the Hillsboro Apartments, was proposed by Mid-States Development, Inc., of Sioux City, Iowa.

Mid-States Development is proposing a 62-unit structure, 60 units of which would be one-bedroom units, and two two-bedroom units.

Rent for these units would be \$266 for one-bedroom units, and \$338 for two-bedroom units.

Mid-States' proposal calls for a two-building complex with each building two stories high.

The West Benton Street area is outside of what the City Council has designated the "preferred downtown area."

William Jacobson of Mid-States said, "I really think the residential area is the place to locate housing for the elderly. What good does it do to locate them (the elderly) downtown?"

"As long as they're within distance from a vehicle we feel we're doing well by putting them in a residential area."

The city transit service provides access from a three-block distance to the West Benton Street site.

Old Capitol is proposing to construct a seven-story, 100-unit structure on the northeast corner of Dubuque and Court streets, with 98 one-bedroom and two two-bedroom units.

Rental rates would vary. A one-bedroom for either single occupancy or the handicapped would be \$266; a one-bedroom for double occupancy would be \$296; and a two-bedroom would be \$388.

Knutson Construction Co., for the First Christian Church, is proposing a nine-story building located on the southeast corner of Washington and Gilbert streets.

This structure would house 60 one-bedroom apartments and four two-bedroom apartments.

Rental for a one-bedroom unit would be \$260 and a rent of \$330 would be charged for a two-bedroom unit.

Now that the proposals have been received, they will be reviewed by the city staff and the city's Housing Commission, which will make recommendations to the City Council.

A "tentative" decision on the successful bidder by the City Council is expected on Dec. 17.

A public meeting, with the developers present to answer questions, is scheduled for Dec. 12, at 7:30 p.m., in the Council Chambers.

Developers will also be present to confer with the council at the council's 4 p.m. meeting of Dec. 16.

Once the council decides on a proposal, a decision will be forwarded to the federal department of Housing and Urban Development for final approval.

# Sirica considers Christmas recess

WASHINGTON (AP) — John D. Ehrlichman's lawyer asked U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica Monday to consider declaring a Christmas recess in the Watergate cover-up trial to delay its completion until former President Nixon is well enough to testify.

William S. Frates made the suggestion while submitting a formal request for permission to take a deposition from Nixon in California.

Three court-appointed doctors reported to Sirica on Friday that the earliest Nixon could give a deposition would be Jan. 6. They estimated he would not be well enough to travel to Washington before Feb. 16.

Sirica said he had not decided what he will do and he asked all parties to submit legal briefs by Wednesday morning.

Ehrlichman, a former White House aide, subpoenaed Nixon to testify as a defense witness. Frates said he considers the former president's testimony an indispensable part of his client's defense.

Frates suggested that the jurors, who have been separated from their families since Oct. 11, be allowed to go home if a Christmas recess is called. Asst. Special Prosecutor Richard Ben-Veniste called that suggestion unrealistic.

The jury was out of the room during the discussion.

The request for a recess took place just prior to former White House aide H.R. Haldeman returning to the witness stand to continue testifying in his own defense.

Under questioning by his attorney, John J. Wilson, Haldeman denied he ever lied to the Senate Watergate committee.

Haldeman, Ehrlichman, former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell, former Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert C. Mardian and Kenneth W. Parkinson, one-time lawyer

for the Nixon re-election committee, are charged with conspiring to obstruct the investigation of the Watergate break-in.

In his motion asking permission to take a deposition from Nixon, Frates noted that the former president was named an unindicted co-conspirator by the grand jury that indicted the defendants in the cover-up case.

"Mr. Nixon is an indispensable witness because he will be able to testify as to the sequence of events involved in the Watergate matter, that Mr. Ehrlichman was not part of a

conspiracy," Frates said in his brief.

He added that "the government has contended and the evidence now shows that Mr. Nixon was at the heart of the activity which the government now seeks to contend is a violation of the laws of the United States."

Meanwhile, former White House counsel John W. Dean filed a motion with Sirica asking for a reduction in the one-to-four year sentence he began serving last Sept. 3.

Dean pleaded guilty Oct. 19, 1973, to a single charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice and

agreed to cooperate with the prosecutors.

His attorney, Charles N. Shaffer, said that a lesser sentence would satisfy the court's purpose "in letting the members of society know that abuse of public office must be punished by a period of incarceration."

The motion asked that Dean's sentence be reduced either to time served or at most a flat sentence of one year and a day.


Police are continuing their investigation.

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**Attempt to address global problems**

**World politics course update planned**

Changes designed to update an undergraduate course in world politics were outlined Monday night for faculty members of the UI's Center for World Order Studies.

James Murray, professor of political science at the UI and instructor of the course said, he is still in the process of redesigning the course.

Previously, he said, the course was organized to provide a general introduction to the nations of their world and their relations to each other. This semester, Murray has attempted to include some of the revisions on which he is currently working. These include sections

on global problems such as energy, the ratio of population to resources, environment, human rights and military affairs.

In the past, Murray said, "I was told that the problems in Uruguay, the Mongolian People's Republic and Tanzania affected me, but I didn't really believe it. But I tell my students that I'm willing to bet they will be affected."

The radical revisions in his course represent an attempt to address these global problems. The reaction of his students to the revisions introduced so far has been good, he said, but some students have expressed the feeling that there is nothing to be done about world problems. Murray hopes that they will be encouraged to take other courses being developed for

the Center for World Order Studies. Murray said he discusses things like dependence on oil, and the use of oil as a political weapon.

Another area of concern is the problem of food and population control. Murray agreed with a statement from the audience that population policy cannot merely limit itself to plans for reducing the population. It must, he said, provide those benefits given by large families: help on farms and old age support.

Burns Weston, director of the Center for World Order Studies and a UI law professor, brought up the potential problem of developing countries using nuclear threats to gain their needs, such as food.

**GSS requests warnings for potential students**

Potential graduate students should be warned about the housing and grocery situation in Iowa City before they hit town, members of the Graduate Student Senate (GSS) said last night.

The GSS was responding to a request by the Graduate College for suggestions on communications with potential students. Also mentioned was providing more extensive information on the student health insurance plan, and listing and comparing alternative sources of insurance available to the student.

The GSS allocated \$35 to the Botany Club for a four-part lecture series on biostatistical design. It will be held beginning in January, and will be conducted by Robert F. Woolson, UI Department of Preventive Medicine, Division of Biostatistics.

The GSS also voted to sponsor an information night for graduate students. It will be presented by the Department of International Education, and will concern opportunities available abroad for graduate students. No date was set.

The GSS also distributed its election schedule for the Spring semester. Nominations will open on Feb. 7, 1975, and will close on Feb. 14. The election opens Feb. 17 and closes Feb. 24. Election results will go to the GSS Feb. 26.

The GSS also discussed ways in which it could let extension graduate students know it existed, so that if they had problems they would know who to contact. A block in the plan was that at present the GSS has no way to find out who the extension students are.

James F. Jakobsen, associate dean of the Graduate College, told the GSS that enrollments are not complete until about the 8th week of the semester, and that a list would not be available until from the 8th to 12th week. He said that there were approximately 350 such extension graduate students.

**Sugar price boosts grocery survey**

Sugar price boosts of more than 50 per cent in a month pushed up the family grocery bill in November, an Associated Press marketbasket survey shows. But there were signs that the sugar spiral may be easing as three of the nation's major refiners announced wholesale price cuts.

The reductions announced Monday were the first wholesale cuts in more than a year. The action came amid new government hearings into soaring profits for refiners whose earnings have been boosted by the growing worldwide demand for the sweetener.

Amstar Corp., the nation's largest cane sugar refiner, Sucrest Corp. and CPC International's industrial sugar division said they were lowering wholesale prices of fine granulated sugar — the kind you buy

in the grocery store — to \$66.75 per 100 pounds. Amstar and Sucrest cut \$5.20 from the price of 100 pounds of sugar at the wholesale level; CPC reduced its price by \$5.10 per hundredweight.

Amstar said the cut will bring the wholesale price of a five-pound bag of sugar to about \$3.47. That's actually higher than the price in most supermarkets because the sugar on the shelves was processed several months ago and the retailers haven't caught up with more recent wholesale boosts.

It will take a while for Monday's reductions to reach the retail level and, in between, consumers will face the higher price tags prompted by earlier increases.

Supermarkets have urged customers not to buy sugar and some stores are limiting purchases. Many people already are boycotting sugar.

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the prices on March 1, 1973 at a supermarket in each of 13 cities and has rechecked at the start of every month.

The latest check showed sugar increased in every city except Dallas, where the specified five-pound size was unavailable at the supermarket used for the survey. The monthly increases ranged from 21 per cent in Chicago, where the price went from \$2.39 to \$2.89, to 55 per cent in Miami, where the cost jumped from \$2.13 to \$3.31.

Because of sugar, the total marketbasket bill also jumped sharply in every city except Dallas, rising an average of 6 per cent during November. If sugar was removed from the total, however, the average increase was only seven-tenths of a per cent and the bill in 6 of the 12 cities declined.

A comparison of current prices with those at the start of the year showed the marketbasket bill up an average of 20 per cent, with sugar contributing a disproportionately large share of the increase.

Most authorities say food prices over-all will rise in the beginning of next year, partly because of smaller-than-expected crops this year and partly because farmers, who claim they are losing money, are cutting back production.

David Stroud, president of the National Livestock and Meat Board, said in Columbus, Ohio, on Monday that meat prices will go up next year.

The cities checked were: Albuquerque, Atlanta, Ga., Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Detroit, Los Angeles, Miami, New York, Philadelphia, Providence, Salt Lake City and Seattle.

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

## AFSCME Policy Statement on Wages and Benefits For University Employees

The following letter was sent to the State Board of Regents on Nov. 26 from the AFSCME Regent Coordinating Committee:

To: State Board of Regents

The following proposals for the Board of Regents Merit Pay Plan, 1975-76, are made on behalf of the three AFSCME locals in the regent system: Local 2659, University of Northern Iowa; Local 870, Iowa State University; Local 12, University of Iowa.

Proposal number 1: The number one need of regent employees is a sizeable across-the-board increase in basic wages in order to recover at least part of the income already lost to inflation. This increase must be of a flat dollar amount, rather than based upon a percentage, because percentage-based wage increases merely accentuate the disparities in workers' incomes. This system is further justified because the heaviest burden of the current cost spiral comes in the area of the basic items—food, fuel, housing—where the burden, percentage-wise, falls heaviest upon those at the bottom of the economic scale. The increase must be significant because of the current high rate of inflation and the erosion of workers' spending power over the last several years.

Each step on the pay matrix should be increased by \$175 per month, or approximately \$1 per hour. This would guarantee every worker a real cost-of-living increase, and would, at the same time, alleviate the problems of the "red-circled" employees. The steps on the pay matrix would be increased and employees, remaining at their present step, would receive the full increase without losing earning potential.

Proposal number 2: In order to forestall the possibility of the wages of regent employees falling so desperately far behind the cost-of-living as they have in the past years, this next year's pay plan must incorporate an automatic adjustment to wages, based upon increases in the Consumer Price Index (1967 base).

The formula for this adjustment should be a one cent per hour increase for every .3 increase in the Consumer Price Index. This adjustment should be made at the end of each quarter. Again, these adjustments should be made in the pay matrix, with each employee's wage rising with his or her step in the pay grade.


To give you an idea how this would work, based upon the experience of 1974, had this formula then been in effect, hourly wages would have increased by approximately 45 cents.

Proposal number 3: The long-range, 16-step pay grade should be abandoned, and a short-range, three-step pay grade system adopted for every position. The top three steps, after cost-of-living adjustments, of each pay grade would then become that pay grade. Increases over that range would be made on the basis of longevity, with an adjustment for each affected employee each year of \$5 per month increase for every year of service.

Proposal number 4: The time has come for the Board of Regents to recognize the special importance of Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays to whether any amount of money can compensate an employee for having to work on a weekend or a holiday, but in recognition of the special hardships caused by such scheduling assignments the following adjustments in basic pay rates should be made: for Saturday, the employee should receive one and one-half his or her regular rate; for Sunday, double time; and for holidays, double and one-half time.

Proposal number 5: Employees who work overtime must be compensated at the overtime rate of one and one-half the basic rate. Under the present system, an employee who works 40 consecutive hours, but works no more than that week, receives no overtime. Overtime should be paid anytime: 1) an employee works more than 8 hours in a 24-hour period, or 2) an employee works in excess of 40 hours in a workweek. And in all situations, the employee should have the choice of whether to receive overtime compensation in the form of cash payment or compensatory time off.

Proposal number 6: When the Board of Regents, at our urging, finally approved a shift differential program last summer, we said that we were made both happy and unhappy by the decision. Happy because shift differential was such an urgent need; unhappy because the amount was so small as to be almost considered trivial. This year, we repeat our request of last year in calling for a shift differential program with the following rates: 20 cents per hour differential for second shift, 30 cents for third shift.



Because of the administration of the shift differential program so far, we must also specify that the shift differential, if to be consistent with other types of compensation, must be paid on all hours for which an employee on shift work is paid.

Proposal number 7: This proposal is really a series of proposals dealing with that other major area of employee compensation—fringe benefits. While these proposals were previously presented to you at your meeting on Nov. 14, 1974, we are resubmitting them in the context of consideration of the 1975-76 Merit Pay Plan. We feel strongly that the regents should act upon these proposals and incorporate them, where necessary, into their legislative program.

A) The Board of Regents should pay the full cost of employee and dependent for hospitalization-medical insurance, with such coverage significantly improved over plans now in effect in the regent system (office calls, for example, should be covered). Health coverage should be further expanded to cover costs of dental care, prescription eyeglasses, eye examination, and prescription drugs.

B) The Board of Regents should pay the full cost of life insurance protection for employees, with the policy coverage to be established at two and a half times the employee's annual salary, and with a minimum coverage of \$25,000.

C) The Board of Regents should provide uniforms, safety glasses, shoes, gloves, and any other job-related protective clothing or equipment which employees are required to wear, and should also stand the cost of maintaining these items.

D) Employees should be provided with seven emergency leave days per year, in addition to vacation, sick leave, and funeral leave.

E) The funeral leave policy should be standardized across the Board of Regents system, to provide up to five days funeral leave in the event of death in the immediate family, with no loss of other forms of paid leave.

F) Employee parking should be provided at no cost to employees of the Board of Regents.

G) Sick leave policy should be amended in the following ways:

—any time the employee is at the maximum allowable sick leave, the sick leave credits earned thereafter should be "banked" and provided in cases of extended illnesses.

—at the end of each year, employees with unused sick leave credits should be granted additional vacation days at the ratio of one vacation day for every six days of unused sick leave; this in no way diminishing the employee's accrued sick leave.

—an employee's accrued sick leave should be paid off in cash to the employee at the termination of employment with the Board of Regents.

—the total accrual limitation should be raised from 90 to 365 days.

Proposal number 8: We are including this section on reform of the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS), not because we are asking or expecting the Board of Regents to make any initiative in this area, but because we do consider an adequate retirement system to be an integral part of an employee's compensation

and because AFSCME, with the joint council on IPERS, will be working to bring about significant improvements in IPERS this next year.

The details of the IPERS reform program we will be supporting are not relevant in this discussion, but we will be endeavoring to bring IPERS up to parity with other public employee retirement programs in Iowa (e.g., IAA-CREF). A change in the employer-employee contribution ratio, from 1:1 to 2:1, plus changes in the manner by which benefits are calculated, all need to be made.

Though not in the form of a specific proposal, we do wish to additionally stress that we urge and will strive for the elimination of all discrimination, whether it be based upon age, race, sex, creed, color, religion, national origin, or disability from the Regent Merit System. We also wish to stress that implicit in all our proposals is the notion that part-time and full-time employees must be treated and compensated equally.

We have outlined herein the basic position that will be advocated by AFSCME at the Public Hearing on the 1975-76 Pay Plan. We may, of course, have additional comments to make at that time in response to proposals made by Hayes and Associates, or in response to changing economic circumstances. There will also be many workers who will wish to comment upon the allocation of jobs to pay grades, for much improvement remains to be accomplished in that respect.

Finally, we call upon the Board of Regents to face squarely up to changing realities and accept the presence of a law providing for public employee bargaining in Iowa. Before the time comes for consideration of a 1976-77 Pay Plan, the Board of Regents should voluntarily submit to the "duty to bargain" provision of the Public Employment Relations Act, thus allowing the orderly, democratic process of selection of a bargaining representative to begin.

## Further Down the Line

In the last two years, major forces of change have begun to emerge in South Africa. The rise of a greater sense of militancy on the part of many black leaders and among African workers has been paralleled by the rise of black labor unions. Within the white community a debate is raging on the institution of apartheid. This debate is found even within the stronghold of the status quo, the Nationalist Party.

Nor are all the pressures for change internal. The coup in Portugal, which forced the subsequent move to grant full independence to the southern African Portuguese colonies of Angola and Mozambique, has broken the buffer zone between South Africa and the black states to the north. Also the one-year banishment of South Africa from the United Nations, which occurred only a few weeks ago, has further isolated the Pretoria regime from the world community.

The ruling white government, of Prime Minister Vorster and the Nationalist Party, is divided against itself. In early November, Vorster gave a speech to his home district constituency of Afrikaners in the Transvaal in which he stated that the foreign critics of apartheid should "give South Africa a chance of about six months and they will be surprised at where this country will stand."

Even the minister of foreign affairs, Hilgard Muller, stated publicly that the time was running out for South Africa and that changes had to

come. However, any real structural changes are not in the cards. Any changes made will be cosmetic at best, and even these will likely be toned down to avoid problems from the right-wing of the Nationalist Party.

The "separate development" of the 15 million blacks, two million "Coloureds" (those of mixed races), and the 620,000 Asians in South Africa will likely continue as is. Any black government would be limited to the Bantustans, which comprises a total of 13 per cent of the land of South Africa (on which 70 per cent of the population must live).

This rigid social-economic-political structure is not going to change in any measurable way in the short-term future. What Pretoria has done is to conduct a diplomatic rear guard action against the threat of international isolation.

The South African Information Department has received an increase of funding—equal in amount to that of budget of the Foreign Ministry. Also Vorster has been making diplomatic counter-attacks in both Africa and among the Western nations. Using the carrot of increased trade, South Africa has attempted to woo moderate black governments to the north. While at the same time, South African officials have attempted to reinforce the "special relationship" between Pretoria and London, Paris, and Washington.

Pro-South African articles on the strategic maritime importance of the Cape route and the South African naval base of Simonstown have appeared on a more frequent basis in British and American defense journals over the past two years.

The stick aspect of the South African strategy for dealing with the threat of isolation has not been neglected. The South Africa defense budget is now up to \$474 million—over 50 per cent of the total national budget. The manpower for the army has jumped from 44,250 to 109,300 in just three years from 1970 to 1973. The tank forces grew from 300 to 800 in the same time period and the air force now has over 100 combat jet aircraft. South Africa is clearly the strongest, most modern, and most heavily armed of any military south of the Sahara.

The internal problems facing Vorster and his government are also very real and are growing. The small reformist Progressive Party has gained six seats in the Parliament early last spring during the elections. Even the second largest political bloc, the United Party, is seeing a growth in the reformist wing of the party. However, the Progressive Party is far too small and the United Party is far too weak and divided to successfully influence South Africa's race policies.

Within the Nationalist Party, the younger

"verligte" wing (enlightened Nationalists) are rising a storm of protest demanding reforms before South Africa is overtaken by a racial Armageddon. But the more reactionary Afrikaners are firmly entrenched in the party and the Parliament and will oppose any effective reforms.

If the white Afrikaner house is divided against itself, the blacks of the nation are finding a greater and greater sense of unity and political power. The traditional tribal leaders are showing a greater willingness to openly oppose Vorster and Pretoria. Western educated black leaders, such as Chief Gatsha Buthelezi of the KwaZulu tribe, have become leaders of the moderate reformist elements and are becoming increasingly outspoken.

More revolutionary black elements are still small and disorganized and armed outbreaks have yet to occur in any systematic manner. But the rising militancy of black miners, dockworkers, and other laborers is a clear sign that the maintenance of the status quo is no longer going to be an easy matter.

The Vorster regime is trapped between rising demands for full social, political, and economic rights by blacks, while the reactionary members of the Nationalist Party continue to hold the "thin white line" of the South African social system based upon racism.

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# Politics / GOP governors appraise party....

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Republican governors received sharply contrasting appraisals of the state of their party Monday as they met to consider the GOP's future in the wake of last month's election setbacks.

However, all of the speakers and most of the governors at the post-election Republican Governors Conference here agreed the GOP must broaden its appeal to women, minorities, young people and political independents if it is to restore its

national strength.

"The stark and unvarnished truth is that the 'Republican party clearly suffered a loss of major proportions in the elections," Gov. Winfield Dunn of Tennessee, the conference chairman, told the opening business session.

"We got clobbered," declared Michigan GOP Chairman William McLaughlin, adding that the Republicans are "a minority party" and that "the long road back is a hard one" that

will take many years and can't rely on possession of the White House.

He said the GOP base "is incredibly narrow" and that the party suffers from being portrayed as "the country club set," and "the party of big business."

Gov. elect Robert F. Bennett of Kansas, however, declared "I personally think the Republican party is not in shambles," adding "I feel that it's a mistake that we talk about the

shambles that we're supposedly in."

Republican National Chairman Mary Louise Smith told the 13 GOP governors and governors-elect "we're alive and well," noting that Republicans have recovered from past election setbacks and adding that, in the future, "Success depends on whether we have the will to win."

She told the conference the GOP should appeal to the "ma-

majority of Americans who think Republican, whether they know it or not, but who are not among the 23 per cent right now who call themselves Republicans."

Mrs. Smith said the GOP "must mount a crusade designed to generate a Republican reawakening among the good, hardworking men and women who are disillusioned with a government that has not lived up to their expectations."

Although most of the 24 GOP governors and governors-elect were due here for part of the conference, with California Gov. Ronald Reagan the most notable absentee, President Ford declined an invitation to appear because of the press of

other matters.

Both Dunn and Oregon Gov. Tom McCall, usually the most outspoken GOP state executive, defended Ford's absence with the Tennessee governor noting that Ford's recent heavy travel schedule requires him to stay in Washington now.

But conservative Gov. Mel-drim Thomson of New Hampshire noted "we're talking about problem-solving and the problem here is the future of the Republican party," adding "I certainly think that some word should be relayed to him about the importance of this meeting."

Dunn said the governors would consider that later.

## ...While Demos 'back together again'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Robert S. Strauss says he's just about got the Democratic party back together again.

"I think I'm home," the party chairman said in an interview. "In another week we'll know."

He was talking about the Democratic mini-convention in Kansas City this week — starting Wednesday — which must adopt a party charter. Strauss hopes the charter will incorporate enough reform to satisfy the liberal wing without bringing desertion from the right.

Compromise and conciliation have been the 54-year-old Texas lawyer's task since he became chairman in December 1972, one month after George McGovern had suffered the worst drubbing of any Democratic presidential nominee.

"I knew exactly that what was needed," Strauss said. "The Democratic party was fractured, there was bitterness, there was rancor, there was suspicion and dislike and distrust."

"We had carried only one state. We had come out of the convention badly divided and executed a campaign that gave George McGovern no chance no matter how hard he tried."

Unlike many other old-line Democrats, Strauss had not set out to campaign. He raised \$1 million for Democratic congressional candidates, which helped most of them survive the Nixon landslide.

"The first thing I did was to call on everyone, from Shirley Chisholm to George McGovern to George Wallace, to enlist their assistance and support," he said.

"My idea was let's see who we could go out and bring in," he said, "and I've been working on it hard ever since."

One of his first acts as chairman was to find a new party job

for Jean Westwood, the McGovern-picked chairman he replaced. He also juggled the rules to save the job of the party's first black vice chairman.

When a special party commission began rewriting the rules for selecting convention delegates, Strauss walked a tightrope over the middle, pushing back moves to erase reforms but seeing that they became compatible to the party regulars.

Strauss created an advisory panel of Democratic public officials to assuage many who said they had been squeezed out by the McGovernites. New rules also make it easier for them to become convention delegates.

He created a strong party role for Democratic governors and mayors. He went to Capitol Hill to court the Democratic congressional leadership.

A special campaign committee was created at the na-

tional level to help Democratic candidates in this year's elections, which turned into a Democratic landslide.

The new delegate rules and a draft charter, drawn by another commission, do away with the system of quotas for women and minorities which caused so much strife in 1972. But they keep requirements that the party be open and that state parties actively recruit the under-

## CAC financial resource survey sent to regents for approval

A draft of the Collegiate Association Council's (CAC) proposed student financial resources survey has been sent to the Board of Regents for approval, CAC President John Hedge, G, announced at Monday's CAC meeting.

The survey, which will be conducted by the CAC at registration Jan. 9, will attempt to examine the financial resources of all enrolled UI students.

Information obtained from the survey will be given to the Board of Regents for analysis following completion of the survey, Hedge said.

As it now stands, the survey includes questions regarding types of student employment, the number of hours employed, current sources of student financial assistance and total monthly expenditures by students.

A CAC committee will finalize survey plans, following formal approval by the regents, Hedge said.

In addition, the committee will investigate the possibility of giving a \$300 tuition grant to a randomly selected survey respondent as "incentive" for completing the survey, he said.

At the meeting, CAC members also agreed to Hedge's suggestion to invite representatives from the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) and a UI administrator to the CAC to explain their stances regarding 1975-77 UI faculty salary increases.

The AAUP has recommended an across-the-board faculty salary increase, while the administration has adhered to the present UI

policy of awarding faculty salary increases on the basis of merit.

"This is one of the things that the CAC should have a view on since it is a certainty that action either way has implications for the academic quality of an institution," Hedge said.

Following a hearing, the CAC might pass a resolution expressing CAC's opinion on faculty salary increases, according to Hedge.

The resolution would then be sent to the Board of Regents and the administration as an expression of student body opinion, he said.

**Hancher's 'army' marches quietly**

**Finding seats is just part of the job**

Like the token army of a tiny country such as Liechtenstein or Monaco, the ushering staff of Hancher Auditorium performs work which is more ceremonial than military. Yet, the 88 Hancher ushers form the thin gold line between order and chaos in the sprawling complex of the Iowa Center for the Arts.

Since Hancher opened in 1972, the men and women who wear the distinctive gold blazers of a Hancher usher have shown more than a quarter of a million patrons to their seats, checked thousands of coats, and cleaned up after countless upset stomachs. Their job is both glamorous and mundane.

Applications for ushering positions are made in early September. Any student at the UI is eligible. The application process begins with the filling out of a form listing job experiences, personal information and previous theater work. This year almost 200 persons made applications.

Applicants are screened during an interview with members of the house management staff. Hancher House Manager Lance Willett

has the final responsibility for hiring new personnel. According to Lance, the chief things he looks for in an applicant are **friendliness, personality, maturity, and the ability to smile readily.**

He also thinks that it is important to draw new ushers from as many backgrounds as possible. He does not accept the notion that only music or theater students make good ushers. The 1974 roster of ushers includes persons from almost every class, school and department at the UI.

About 40 new ushers were hired this year. They are trained by, and work alongside, persons who have had previous experience at Hancher. Of the 88 staff members, 63 are women.

Ushers at Hancher do more than just show patrons to their seats in the auditorium. Ushers perform essentially seven tasks, some of which the audience never sees.

Ushers may be assigned during a given performance as a seating usher in the auditorium or as a program usher in the lobby. Others will be assigned as aisle captains,

who are responsible for keeping things moving smoothly at each of the six aisles.

Several ushers will work as door persons, taking tickets and directing patrons to their appropriate aisle. Usually four persons will work as coat checkers on both floors.

A floor captain will be chosen to oversee the ushers on each floor. In addition, one usher is employed as a security captain to guard against unlawful entry to the auditorium.

Seating and program ushers are paid at a rate of \$2 per hour. Aisle captains, door persons and coat checkers are paid \$2.20, while floor captains receive \$2.30 per hour. Security captains earn \$2.45 per hour.

An average evening at Hancher begins more than an hour before the curtain goes up. For an 8 p.m. performance, ushers are required to be in uniform and checked in by 7. At 7:10, the House Manager holds an informal briefing session to discuss possible problems and conflicts during the performance. At that time he assigns ushers to their jobs.

Half an hour before the curtain, aisle captains open the aisle doors and the job of

seating patrons begins. For an average performance, about 40 ushers will be employed. Hancher Auditorium has a capacity of 2,684, meaning that the patron-to-usher ratio is nearly 70 to 1. Despite that, there are rarely any serious problems with seating.

Occasionally, when a show is at Hancher for more than one performance, a patron will come to the auditorium with tickets for the wrong night. Then the box office will have the unpopular task of either sending the patron home or coming up with an unsold seat in exchange.

At the beginning of the show, seating and program ushers, as well as coat checkers, are dismissed by the aisle and floor captains, who remain for the entire performance. Their function during the show is to check for the illegal use of cameras and tape recorders, as well as to be available to answer questions, keep order, and assist anyone who should become ill.

Usually, patrons who arrive after the start of a performance will not be allowed into the auditorium. They are seated instead in one of three glass-enclosed observation booths at

the rear of the main floor. At the first intermission, observation booth patrons are taken to their seats.

During a performance, Hancher personnel will perform a number of little-appreciated tasks. These include distributing cough drops to patrons in the acoustically near-perfect auditorium. An usher will also sweep the lobby before intermission.

In addition to their work at Hancher, ushers are also assigned to Clapp Recital Hall, E.C. Mabie Theatre, and the Studio Theatre. Normally an usher will have two jobs during a given week.

While ushers are assigned to many shows, they may sign up for additional work. It is possible to be excused from an assignment if there is a conflict or if the usher has a test the next day. However, if an usher misses more than six assignments during a semester, he will be asked to meet with the House Manager to discuss the problem.

In addition to an usher's salary, members of the staff are allowed to see any performance for which they have worked for free. Ushers may sit either in

an observation booth or in a seat which has not been claimed at the start of the show. If the owner of the seat arrives later, the usher must of course move somewhere else.

Another reward not included in an usher's monthly pay envelope is the excitement of an opening night, or the thrill of an extraordinary performance. There's also the opportunity to meet a great variety of persons who come to Hancher. Any usher will tell you that for every rude patron there are dozens who are friendly and courteous.



**Ice Sailboating**

**QUESTION:** Where could a person contact someone who either builds ice sailboats or makes plans for them?—SK

Staff member Jim Delaney discovered that "ice sailing" is a rather popular winter sport in the Midwest.

Jim reports that ice boats look like a "kayak on runners" with sails. They are often pictured flying across a frozen lake gliding on a single runner. By tacking, an ice boat is able to attain speeds literally faster than that of the wind which is propelling it along the ice.

On the larger frozen lakes in Michigan, an ice boater can cruise along at 45 knots (50 m.p.h.) all afternoon, with occasional blasts whipping the boat to speeds of 65 knots. Since the temperature on the lake may be below zero, a trip in an iceboat going 50-75 m.p.h. puts a chill through your bones. Apparently the thrills of swishing along on one runner at precariously fast velocities attracts a type of sportsperson who is oblivious to the small inconveniences (i.e., freezing yourself solid) attendant to iceboating.

Each year more people are becoming ice boat enthusiasts; there are many ice boating clubs in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, and northern Iowa.

In other words, no, you cannot get out of the Club at this point without breaching your contractual obligations to the Club.

## Prisoner finds caring the 'key'

In the September 10 and 11 issues of The Daily Iowan there appeared a two part series describing the recently established Cedar Rapids chapter of the 7th Step Foundation, a rehabilitation and remotivation program for cons and ex-cons.

It's been remarkably successful at instilling its members at the Men's State Reformatory at Anamosa with a contagious enthusiasm for getting and staying free — an amazing achievement when viewed in the context of the 70 per cent national recidivism (return-to-prison rate) among ex-cons in general.

Sometimes it is difficult to measure the effectiveness of any program based on appeal to humanitarian impulses, especially among cons; their unwritten code denies them a license to practice sensitivity. Caring isn't cool in the "joint." It's a good way to get stepped on.

But there's another kind of "steppin'" going on at Anamosa now; caring is the key, and the effectiveness is evident — at least for one man.

In one of their recent weekly meetings, 7th Stepper Pepper Harris walked up to the podium to read "a little something" that will appear in the 7th Step Foundation's November newsletter. "I'm not a poet or nothin'," joked Pepper, "so don't laugh, you hear?"

"Realizing now that my life and my future are but a subtle step ahead of me, I offer this lecture, or testament, if you will, so that others, both

outside and within my own grasp of reality will know and accept me for what I am.

"I am all that you may call me, but even more...I am a man. My thoughts, my desires, and all of my experiences, both past and present may be drastically different from yours, but we are brothers. Although we may not be brothers of the blood, we are brothers of the soul, brothers of the earth, wind and mind. My thoughts are as deep and sincere as yours for my thoughts are of Freedom.

"In all my 25 years of life, I have been searching for, but have never found, the ultimate and complete satisfaction of Freedom. Each day of these years I have been locked up, locked out or mistreated. As I sit here within these walls, I can only see resentment, hate, mistrust and chaos.

"I have been through the steps of life, but somewhere I missed a step. And now that I have back-tracked and started over, I can see that step...that 7th Step. All of a sudden the lights are no longer dim...I can see through the plastic faces and images that previously have barred my path. The step is there...the one that I had previously overlooked...before me. Upon the threshold of that step is a simple written word... freedom. Hopefully my search is at an end.

Freedom shall be mine. I have pledged myself to Freedom, and as I take this final step, my words are these,

"Thank you, My Brothers, for you are the inspiration and guiding light that I have always needed."

Nobody laughed.

But they go on, unaccosted. Intellectual Mohammed Alis', licking cone-sul of Haagen-Das ice cream. I am the greatest. While the Joe Fraziers of the world have to be content with Dairy Queen—Baskin and Robbins if they're lucky. The atmosphere in Cambridge is astonishingly apolitical. Even Feminism is

not a terribly hot item. I looked for a Women's Center on campus—the 10 or 12 people I stopped for directions had no idea where it was. I never did find it.

# Iowa's guards to be tested at Drake

Iowa will be without starting guard Cal Wulfsberg when they travel to Des Moines tonight to meet Drake at 7:30 in the first round of the mythical state championship.

Wulfsberg, who injured his right knee in Saturday's home opener against Virginia Commonwealth, will be operated on this morning and will be out for six to 10 weeks.

Sophomore John Hairston will replace Wulfsberg at the point position.

Team physician Dr. Harley Feldick said that X-rays taken Monday afternoon showed a definite torn cartilage in the

medial area of the knee.

Feldick said it was "unpredictable" at this time to say if Wulfsberg would miss the rest of the season.

"It all depends on how he recuperates," he said, "but the average time of this type of injury is six to ten weeks."

Wulfsberg's injury came after he jumped high in the air to intercept a pass early in the first half. Dr. John Albright, who has operated on many Iowa athletes and will perform the surgery on Wulfsberg, called it a "twisting injury" after reviewing video tape replays of the game Monday.

"The replays show that Cal came down hard on his right leg and just twisted the knee," said

Albright.

Coach Lute Olson said that Wulfsberg, a 6-3 recruit from Long Beach City College, would not be red-shirted.

"People have come back in six weeks from this type of thing before. If the minimum is six weeks then it will be six weeks," said Olson.

"We're just going to have to face the fact that he'll be gone for possibly six weeks," said Olson, after Monday's light 90-minute workout.

Olson indicated that along with Hairston, junior Larry Moore and sophomore Archie Mayes will see action at the guard spot.

The rest of Iowa's line-up is set. Dan Frost and Larry

Parker are the forwards, Bruce "Sky" King is the center and Scott Thompson the other guard.

Parker scored a career high, 31 points in the Hawk's 95-80 win over Virginia Commonwealth Saturday night and Frost and Thompson contributed 18 apiece.

When Wulfsberg left the game early in the first half, Iowa lost its playmaker and floor leader. Although Hairston and Moore did respectable jobs, the Hawks made 25 turnovers.

King led Iowa in the rebounding department with 12, but it wasn't until the second half that the Hawks were getting position under the basket against the smaller, in-

dependent team.

They'll have to take command of the offensive board against the Coach Bob Ortel's team tonight. Starting for Drake will be Larry Haralson and Andy Graham at the forwards, Paul Mellen at center, all who are 6-9, and guards Ron Caldwell, 6-3, and 6-5 Terry McKissick.

The Hawks must also stop the excellent driving of Caldwell and jump shot of Haralson at

the key.

"There's a similarity between Virginia Commonwealth and Drake," said Olson. "They both run out of a 1-4 offense and do a lot of screening toward the ball. I don't know if they'll put the long range shots that Commonwealth did. They're much more patient and, I'm sure, a better ballclub."

The winner tonight can claim a mythical state title by beating Iowa State later this month.

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## Griffin favored to win Heisman

NEW YORK (AP) — Ohio State's Archie Griffin, who rushed for more yardage than any player in major college football this season, is favored to win the Heisman Trophy Tuesday as the outstanding player in the country.

If so, Griffin would be the 38th offense back in the 40 years of the Heisman award to win the coveted trophy. No interior lineman ever has won the Heisman and the only two to win it who were not backs were ends Larry Kelley of Yale in 1936—the second year of the award—and Leon Hart of Notre Dame in 1949.

The 37 offense backs to capture the Heisman include 24 running backs, 12 quarterbacks and 1 flanker—Johnny

Rodgers of Nebraska in 1972. Running back John Cappelletti of Penn State won it last year.

Griffin, a 5-foot-9, 187-pound junior tailback, led the nation by gaining 1,620 yards in 11 games. He has rushed more than 100 yards in 22 consecutive regular-season games, a collegiate record—plus the 1974 Rose Bowl.

However, most of the ballots usually are in well before the deadline, which might hurt the chances of Southern California tailback Anthony Davis, 13th in the voting a year ago.

## Maryland's White picked as top college lineman

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Randy White, a 6-4, 248-pound defensive tackle from Maryland, won the Outland Trophy as the top college guard or tackle as the Football Writers Association announced its 1974 All-American team on Monday.

White led a list of 23 honorees, including four top candidates for the Heisman Trophy—running backs Archie Griffin of Ohio State, Joe Washington of Oklahoma and Anthony Davis of Southern California, and quarterback Tom Clements of Notre Dame.

In addition to Washington, Oklahoma placed linebacker Rod Shoate and offensive guard John Roush. Joining Griffin were Ohio State offensive lineman Kurt Schumacher and punter Tom Skladany.

Clements was joined by Notre Dame teammate linebacker Greg Collins while Southern California defensive back Charles Phillips was picked along with Davis.

She'll be joined in the guard court by Kathy Peters, a 5-8 sophomore. At the forwards will be freshmen Lynn Oberbillig, 5-8, and Margie Roubow, 5-9. Iowa's center will be Becky Moessner, a 5-10 freshman.


