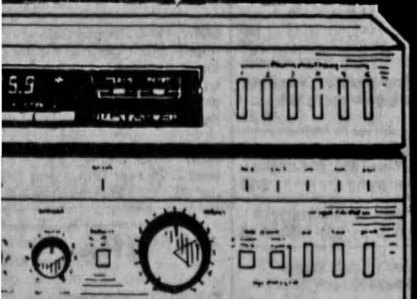
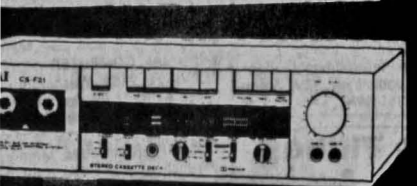


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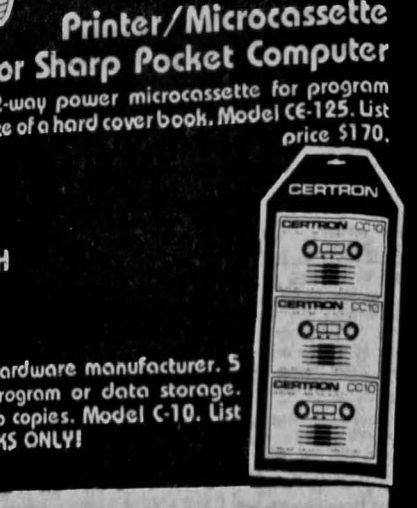

Regents brood over tuition hike

Student leaders spurn increase

"A mind is a terrible thing to waste," but student leaders from the three regent universities think it will happen if tuition rates are raised.

Student representatives from the UI, Iowa State University and the University of Northern Iowa told the state Board of Regents Thursday why they didn't think tuition rates should be increased.

• If tuition rates increase, low-income students will be denied access to college and the attrition rate of low-income students already enrolled may rise.

"This is unfairly discriminating against that portion of the student body," said UI Student Senate Vice President Ken Brill, referring to low income students.

Jim Fletcher, UNI Student Association vice president said, "Approximately 2.45 percent of students leave (school) with every \$100 (tuition) increase."

• Students are concerned whether financial aid provided by the universities will increase with the tuition in-

crease, especially because fewer funds are available on the federal level now.

"Many students are struggling to make ends meet," Brill said. "Almost one-half of the student body is in need of financial aid here. Students that depend on their parents or on summer earnings will have a difficult time if tuition is increased."

Executive Secretary for the Board R. Wayne Richey said, "the rate of tuition and the amount of financial aid are intertwined," indicating that the board is aware of the added need of students facing a tuition increase.

Freedman asks for vitality fund

UI President James O. Freedman prevailed upon the state Board of Regents at its meeting in Iowa City Thursday to return to the Iowa Legislature with requests for a vitality fund and \$4 million in program adjustments for the 1984-1985 academic year.

"The institutions vitality fund will be the number one thing we are asking for this year," Freedman said. "I believe

a sense of reward and a sense of being appreciated is enormously important to the people who teach our students."

The regents universities are requesting \$14 million from the legislature this session to help keep their faculty salaries competitive with comparable universities.

However, the regents docket states, "Due to the state's fiscal constraints, an increase of less than \$14 million may have to be considered."

In the 1982 legislative session the board requested money for the vitality fund, but did not receive it, and again in 1983 the board's request went un-

Hancher gets \$250,000 grant from the NEA

UI's Hancher Auditorium will receive a \$250,000 matching grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, Frank Hodsoll, chairman for the federal agency, announced today.

Hancher is one of only 35 major arts organizations across the nation that will receive part of the \$21 million in the federal agency's 1983 Challenge Grant Program.

Hancher is the only university-based arts organization to be included in the funding program this year as well as being the only organization not situated in a major metropolitan area. It is also the only organization in Iowa to receive the award.

The quarter million dollar grant is the largest single federal grant the arts organization has ever received, James Wockenfuss, director of Hancher Auditorium, said. The total of all other federal grants Hancher receives in 1983 totals \$93,000 dollars, but in about five of the last 10 years the organization has been dependant on box office revenues to break even, he said.

The Challenge grant program, which is designed to help arts organizations gain stability and financial independence, will award one dollar for every three non-federal dollars that Hancher can raise, up to \$250,000. Hancher plans to raise the \$750,000 necessary to obtain the funds as part of the Hancher Enrichment Campaign, a major fund drive with a goal of \$2 million by 1986.

"AS A COMPONENT of an educational institution, we feel we should take a leadership role in presenting and supporting new artists and art forms," Wockenfuss said. The funds will help give Hancher long-term security and relieve the organization's dependence on box office revenue, he said.

The revenue from the grant will be used to increase residency programs

and to support contemporary and non-traditional artists, he said. The money would not be used to support more commercially feasible projects like productions of Broadway plays, he said.

The funds will be dispersed to Hancher over a three-year period with Hancher taking the responsibility of raising a percentage of their matching funds each year. The money will be handled through the UI business office which will invest the funds on an annual basis, Wockenfuss said. Earnings from the capital investments will be used to support the artists, he said.

Hancher began the process of applying for the grant four years ago with the encouragement of then UI President Willard Boyd, who was a member of the National Council on the Arts. Seeking the grant is part of Hancher's long-term effort to raise funds.

THE \$2 MILLION that Hancher hopes to raise in its Hancher Enrichment Campaign will come primarily from personal solicitations from businesses, arts foundations, students and alumni, said Darrel D. Wyrick, president of the University of Iowa Foundation.

The NEA has suffered budget cuts under the Reagan administration, making the funding more difficult to obtain. Wockenfuss said Hancher's success in gaining the grant is a result of being more progressive in applying for the funding.

Other recipients of the 1983 Challenge Grants include prestigious organizations such as the Metropolitan Opera, the New York Shakespeare Festival, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Joffrey Ballet, the Art Institute of Chicago, WGBH in Boston, the New York City Ballet, the New York Philharmonic, the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, the Minnesota Orchestra, the New York Museum of Modern Art and The Chicago Symphony.



UI enrollment still growing, as expected

As expected, figures released by the UI Office of the Registrar Thursday reveal an increase in enrollment at the UI again this year.

A total of 29,599 students are enrolled in classes at the UI this semester, according to the Comparative Enrollment Report. That figure marks a 5.2 percent increase from last fall when the total was 28,140.

The new enrollment statistics came out

slightly below UI projections.

"We were expecting to be within 1 percent of 30,000 and this total is just a bit shy of that," said Philip Hubbard, UI vice president of student services.

UI Registrar Jerald Dallam said the smaller increase didn't come as a surprise.

"We still increased by 1,600 students over last year."

ALTHOUGH THE REPORT shows increased enrollments for the UI, the number of incoming freshmen and transfer students

dropped slightly from last fall.

"At one time this summer there were 31,000 people registered for fall classes," Dallam said. "But for some reason a lot of these people decided to cancel."

Hubbard said the announcement of the UI's plans to implement more stringent entrance requirements next year, as well as extensive publicity about overcrowding may have discouraged prospective students from coming here.

"Beginning in May there seemed to be a drop-off in the number of applications we

received so it is quite likely those could have been factors," Hubbard said.

He said the decrease in freshmen enrollments "would help to relieve the crowding in lower division courses."

"Enrollment will continue to increase for the next few years," Hubbard said, because the number of students graduating is still less than the number of incoming students.

Hubbard said the report will cause revisions to be made in UI enrollment projections. "The projections will be lower than

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Starck resigns as director of J-school

The director of the UI School of Journalism announced his resignation Thursday, saying he would like to get back to teaching.

Kenneth Starck, 49, who has been the school's director for nine years, submitted a formal resignation to Howard Laster, dean of the UI College of Liberal Arts, Aug. 29, but did not tell the school's faculty until a 4 p.m. meeting Thursday.

"This is something I have been think-

ing about for some time," Starck said. He added that his "preferred effective date" of resignation is the end of this semester, but said he will stay on until the spring if he is needed.

"I would be pleased to work with the dean in any way I can during the transition period," he said. "I do not want to leave the program in a lurch. I am not about to abandon ship."

The faculty expressed an interest in meeting with Laster to discuss a replacement.

STARCK SAID he is resigning because he wants to get back into the

teaching and research aspects of journalism. "I'm ready, the time seems right... it seems appropriate," he said.

Because the journalism program is coming under departmental review this semester and the school is up for re-accreditation next year, Starck said the department needs new leadership and new blood.

Another reason Starck is stepping down is what he termed the "frustration factor," concerning the tight budget that the journalism school faces. He said he has become tired of

working with the cutbacks that coincide with increasing enrollment.

This spring, Starck was offered the directorship at the University of Missouri Journalism School, but he said that it did not really interest him. Starck was one of the finalists considered, but the school eventually chose James Atwater, senior editor for Time Magazine.

KAY AMERT, UI Associate Professor of Journalism, said, "I'm very pleased with Kenneth Starck. I'm pleased with what he said in the

meeting. It is clear he is moving into a new area in his professional life."

Starck will not be leaving the UI, though. He plans to teach and carry on research at the university. In fact, it will be something of a full cycle because Starck started with the UI in the fall of 1974 as a teacher. He became acting director of the journalism department in 1975 and became full director the next year.

Starck was a reporter for the Commercial Appeal in Memphis, Tenn. and also worked for the Herald and Review in Decatur, Ill.

UI Palestinian rally draws Jewish reply

A UI Pentacrest rally held Tuesday by the General Union of Palestinian Students turned into a heated confrontation when members of the Jewish Students Association held a counter-demonstration.

Both sides displayed large banners and passed out pamphlets explaining their points of view concerning the massacre a year ago of hundreds of Palestinian and Lebanese civilians by Christian Phalangist militias in the Sabra and Shatila refugee camps in Beirut.

The rally, advertised by the GUPS as a rally in memory of Sabra and Shatila, quickly disintegrated into name calling and shouting between the two groups. Few people stopped to watch the rally because of the cold, wet weather.

"UI Campus Security Sergeant Charles Durr said the JSA were allowed to demonstrate against the rally because they were "not breaking any rules. They are not going to be able to use (audience address systems) because they have no permit."

"AS LONG AS they're (JSA) here as individuals, it's fine, but we don't recognize them as a group because they do not have a permit," Durr said as he displayed the permit acquired by the GUPS.

Robert Gussin, former president of the JSA, told pro-Israeli supporters "wait till they (the police) start coming toward us! Be strong!"

"They don't come here for education," Gussin said, "they (the Palestinians) come here to spread propaganda!"

"Wall Farsakh, former president of the GUPS, said the Palestinians were rallying "against genocide in general." He also said the GUPS wanted to "bring awareness to the American public about what's going on in Lebanon and

the West Bank."

When asked why the rally was not postponed due to inclement weather, Farsakh said, "Only rain is falling on our heads, U.S.A. bombs are falling on the heads of Palestinians and Lebanese in Lebanon."

THE PRO-PALESTINIAN students carried signs stating "Stop the Zionist settlements in the West Bank and Gaza," and "Palestinians have rights too!"

Gussin said the counter-demonstration "was to show that Jewish students on campus are vocal with emess, which is Hebrew for truth."

"The Palestinians are putting unjust blame on Israel for the Sabra and Shatila massacres. Christian Lebanese did the killing," he said.

Gussin said the JSA decided to counter-demonstrate "two days ago," but then asked that the quote be replaced with "no comment."

Farsakh said he realized Israel had pulled out of Lebanon and Syria had not. But he said the difference between the two countries was that "Israel had invaded Lebanon while Syria was invited by an elected Lebanese government."

"The best people to ask about the Syrians is the Lebanese... If they want them out, they will ask them like they (the Lebanese) did the PLO."

GUSSIN SAID, however, "The same hand that shot down the Korean jetliner gives arms and military aid to the PLO... Arab students are expected to follow PLO dogma or face termination of their funds from foreign countries."

One UI professor, who asked not to be identified, told Palestinian and Jewish protesters the idea of "a Mideast problem... due to the Israeli's is a bunch of crap."

"It is too bad the Palestinians were intimidated to have the PLO (Palestinian Liberation Organization) as their leaders," the professor said. "The PLO (members) are a bunch of terrorists."

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Research nixed by angry senate

The UI Student Senate decided by an overwhelming vote Thursday night to nix the requirement that its president and vice president must do summer research because the research was usually not used and caused disunity in the senate.

Senator Jeff Winick, chief sponsor of the amendment, said, "It (summer research) struck me as a waste of time." He said during last week's senate meeting the group discussed more of what was not done than what was done with the report.

"Something isn't going right," Winick said. "They (the reports) sit on the shelf and collect dust."

The amendment's passage means the president and vice president will still keep office hours during the summer, but will not have to do research.

SENATOR JOEL Mintzer brought up an amendment to the amendment which reads, "After the first senate meeting both (president and vice president) shall give a full non-debatable written account of what needed to be done over the summer and what actions were taken."

After debating whether that report should be written or oral, the senate decided to keep the executives' reports written.

Mintzer said the reasoning behind his amendment to the original amendment

is to "show that they have done their job."

Before the resolution was even discussed it had the backing of 22 of the 28 active senate members.

Winick said Thursday the summer research debate created "an uncomfortable atmosphere. It just isn't working...."

If research is to be done by the senate, Winick suggested, then any senator could take time out and do it on his own time rather than having it be a requirement for the executives, who have enough work to do already.

IN OTHER NEWS, the senate approved an amendment to change the process by which its executives are

replaced. The main change to the old process is the addition of two senators picked by the senate to join the nominations committees, which consist of all of the remaining executives.

Senator Allen Hogg, who opposed the changing of the old process said, "It's a very non-traditionalist thing to do."

Hogg said just because there was much debate this year on the appointment of the new vice president, Ken Brill, who replaced Michelle Martinez, it does not mean it will happen every year.

Winick said that with the addition of the two senators to the nomination committees there would be more room for communication with the senate in the nomination process.

Man sues for mobile home tax

A Johnson County man who is trying to obtain the title to a mobile home on his property told the Johnson County Board of Supervisors Thursday in its formal meeting that he is going to small claims court to collect \$1,300 in back taxes owed to the county by the person who owns the mobile home.

"I'm going to small claims court to collect taxes for the county on behalf of myself," Dan Yeager said.

Yeager purchased one acre of land located on RR 5 in Scott Township in November 1980. The structure on the land is a modular home with a permanent basement. When a piece of land is purchased with real estate on it, the structure becomes the property of the purchaser, Yeager said.

Yeager bought the land because he thought the home on the property was real estate, he said.

In May 1981, Yeager said he was informed by the Hawkeye State Bank, the bank that loaned Yeager money for

the purchase, that the structure on his land was not real estate but a mobile home.

ACCORDING TO Johnson County Attorney J. Patrick White, if a structure on a piece of land is real estate, it is the property of the purchaser. But if the structure is a mobile home, it is still the property of the original owner unless the title to it is transferred. "The title of a mobile home is controlled like a car title, while real estate is controlled through a series of deeds," he said.

Yeager said Wilma Cannon, who holds the title on the mobile home, owes \$1,300 in back taxes on it and that is why he is going to court. The back taxes on the mobile home have to be paid in full before Yeager can receive full title to it. "I want the title to my home," he said.

According to Yeager's wife, Jeanine, when she and her husband found out they did not have the title to their home and that Cannon owed \$1,300 in taxes on it, they called the Johnson County

Motor Vehicle Department and requested that it collect the taxes. The department handles all property taxes for mobile homes in the county.

They continued to call the motor vehicle department to find out what progress was being made on the collection. Jeanine Yeager also said a distress warrant had been issued by the Johnson County Treasurer's office.

A DISTRESS warrant is served to owners of property who are delinquent in paying their property taxes by the Johnson County Sheriff's office.

Keith Borchart, Cannon's attorney, said his client had not received the distress warrant.

According to Borchart, the building's designation as a mobile home was not hidden by Cannon. "It was not knowingly misrepresented," he said. Cannon thought she had taken all the necessary steps to change the designation of the structure from that of a mobile home to real estate before the close of the sale to Yeager, he said. The \$1,300 suit will be contested by

Cannon because, Borchart said, she is only responsible for half of the back taxes, while the Yeagers owe the other half. "There was a misunderstanding and we have made an offer that we feel is fair," he said.

Yeager said, however, she and her husband want Cannon to pay the full amount.

The county attorney's office is going to take several actions on the case, White said. First, it is going to determine the status of the distress warrant and see that it is served. It will also review the small claims action by Yeager and see if the county should participate.

In other county action, the board unanimously passed a proposal for implementing regulations for the county's daycare centers. The rate for the inspections should be set next week for a six-month trial period. Graham Dameron, director of the county health department, recommended a rate of \$40 per inspection to cover administrative costs.

Man arrested for assault, carrying weapon

A Barstow, Ill., man was arrested Wednesday for assault with intent to commit a serious injury and going armed with a dangerous weapon, Johnson County District Court records state.

David J. Petersen, 20, 309 N. Riverside Drive, allegedly wrote a check for

\$126.45 on a check blank stolen from a Western Springs, Ill., man, which he cashed at the First National Bank in Iowa City on Aug. 26. In cashing the check he used a checkbook he had stolen from one of First National's clients as a form of identification.

A Currier Hall resident was arrested Wednesday for criminal mischief in the third-degree, Johnson County District Court records state.

James Douglas Peters, 19, E232 Currier, allegedly used a knife to cut a nine-by-12-foot piece of carpet from the center of the lounge carpeting in

Currier Hall. Iowa City police have the knife and the carpet as evidence. Peters was released on his own recognizance.

A UI student pleaded guilty Wednesday to second-degree theft.

Torin Howard Jackson, 20, stole two calculators valued at \$326 and a typewriter valued at \$182 during two break-ins in Mason City on Feb. 20. The items were reported stolen to the Mason City Police and confiscated from Jackson's room in Slater Hall on April 10. Jackson was arrested May 3. Jackson was fined \$440.

Compromise plan sought on Marines in Lebanon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress and the White House groped Thursday for a plan to keep U.S. Marines in Lebanon, but an agreement appeared elusive as some lawmakers hardened demands that President Reagan bow to their authority under the war powers act.

White House chief of staff James Baker met with Senate Republican and Democratic leaders on Capitol Hill to discuss a proposed compromise sent to the White House Wednesday.

"We're working on it," Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Charles Percy said.

House Speaker Thomas O'Neill put off House action on a resolution asserting Congress's power under the war powers act to decide the future of the Marine contingent of the multinational peace-keeping force in Lebanon.

The proposal had been scheduled for a House vote Tuesday, but O'Neill, D-Mass., said, "I see no way it would get on the calendar next week."

HIS MOVE GAVE the administration and lawmakers time to work out an agreement on the war powers issue and the U.S. peace-keeping contingent in Lebanon.

O'Neill said he expects an agreement will be reached.

"The committee will work something out, I have every confidence," he said.

Some positions, however, appeared to be hardening as the delay continued.

An early proposal from House Democrats suggested Congress might vote to keep Marines in Lebanon for another 18 months, through the end of Reagan's present term, but a Senate source said that idea was fading.

"The chance of getting past this presidential term apparently is gone," the leadership aide said.

Opposition to the 18-month extension was reported among some House Democrats, and their Senate colleagues were on record with a demand that Reagan comply with the war powers act.

The 1973 act, passed in reaction to the Vietnam war, provides that Congress has 60 to 90 days to decide if U.S. troops can remain in an area of combat or armed hostilities.

THE ADMINISTRATION has attempted to skirt the issue, arguing the Marines are not in combat even though four Marines have been killed.

O'Neill told reporters Congress backs the Marine peace-keeping force in Lebanon and "any other message than that would be sacrilegious."

But he emphasized Congress is united in its refusal to simply rubber-stamp Reagan's policies, partly out of fear that a resolution of support would be used in the same manner that President Johnson used the Gulf of Tonkin resolution to expand the Vietnam war.

Balance-of-payment deficit hits a record \$9.7 billion

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's deteriorating trade position created a record \$9.7 billion balance-of-payments deficit in the second quarter and the trend shows the rest of the year will be worse, the government said Thursday.

The Commerce Department reported that the nation's trade in merchandise, together with its trade in services, jumped far ahead of the revised \$3.6 billion in red ink during the January-March quarter.

"The trend is definitely up for this deficit," said economist Anthony DiLullo, who helped prepare the Bureau of Economic Analysis report.

The quarter-to-quarter decline was entirely in the merchandise area, which turned in a record \$14.7 billion deficit from April through June compared to \$8.8 billion in the first quarter.

Both the export and import of services increased by about \$1.3 billion, leaving the surplus in that area exactly the same as in the first quarter and in the fourth quarter of last year, \$6.8 billion.

THE DETERIORATION in

merchandise trade and the lack of growth in the traditionally strong trade in services has been blamed on a number of factors but primarily on the value of the dollar compared to other currencies.

With its commanding strength, the dollar has made American-produced goods far less of a bargain for foreign buyers while turning imported goods into a better buy for Americans.

The deficit in the balance of payments, also known as the current account, was the highest ever, exceeding the previous high \$6.6 billion deficits in both the third and fourth quarters of last year.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige has predicted the 1983 balance of payments deficit will hit a record \$30 billion, exceeding 1978's previous high of \$15.4 billion.

In fact, the 1983 current account deficit so far, \$13.3 billion, is nearing 1978's record.

"If quarterly deficits continue close to the current quarter that (annual total) will be over \$30 billion," department chief economist Robert Ortner said.

Senate vote unanimous on Soviet condemnation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate unanimously approved and sent President Reagan Thursday a resolution condemning Soviet destruction of a Korean airliner, brushing aside conservative attempts to put "some teeth" in the measure.

"This nation is united in its outrage," said Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee.

The Senate vote was 95-0. The resolution passed the House 416-0 Wednesday night.

The Senate defeated a bid by conservatives to toughen the House-passed resolution with sanctions against the Soviets, heeding pleas that it was important for Congress to present a united front with Reagan.

The harshly worded measure denounces Moscow for an "infamous and reprehensible act" — the Sept. 1 attack on a Korean Air Lines jumbo jet that killed 269 people.

"The Kremlin is on notice," Reagan said. "When it comes to responding to its aggression, there are no

Republicans or Democrats, only Americans — united and determined to protect our freedom and secure the peace.

"I URGE THE American people to stand by the families whose loved ones were taken from them. And let us appeal to the conscience of the civilized world: The passengers of KAL 007 must never be forgotten. Nor must we rest until the world can prevent such a crime against humanity from ever happening again."

Five senators were absent for the vote. They were Sens. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., and Russell Long, D-La., and presidential candidates Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., John Glenn, D-Ohio, and Alan Cranston, D-Calif.

Percy said it was possible the condemnation could be signed by Reagan Thursday night. But three conservatives, determined to air their demands for stern punishment, offered amendments that prolonged the debate.

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Harkin on STAF hit list for '84

Two UI student-run organizations have declared they will try to keep U.S. Rep. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, from being elected to the U.S. Senate in the 1984 elections.

This story was written from reports by Patricia Thorn and United Press International.

The decision to oppose Harkin comes before Harkin has announced officially whether he will run against incumbent Sen. Roger Jepsen, R-Iowa. Neither of the student groups are affiliated with any Jepsen campaign organization.

Jeffrey Renader of The Hawkeye Review, a conservative newspaper, said most Iowans don't realize how far Harkin is from the "main stream" of Iowa politics.

Jerry Taylor, director of Students for Traditional American Freedoms

Political Action Committee, said that organization has raised \$30,000 through a nationwide direct mail campaign that solicited funds from conservatives.

Taylor said much of the money will be spent on "overhead," including salaries, phone bills, travel expenses and the printing of voter lists. He said that the rest of the money would go towards printing information on Harkin.

BUT, BARRY PIATT, press

secretary for Citizens for Harkin, predicted the conservative groups would have little impact on a Harkin-Jepsen Senate matchup "because they are so far out of the mainstream" of Iowa college students.

Piatt said their efforts are "an indication how far in trouble the New Right thinks Jepsen is in," and shows Jepsen "and his hit man groups" plan a "no holds barred, gouge your eyes out" campaign.

Renader also said Harkin is "anti-student. I've found that many of the students I've talked to are against Harkin because he follows the good old liberal viewpoint of tax-tax-spend-spend."

Renader said Harkin's student supporters will be "the perennial students

who dole out Marxist propaganda rather than going to class. Some of those people have been around for years. I doubt if they'll ever graduate."

STAF-PAC has no particular "strategy" for the campaign against Harkin, Taylor said, because "Tom Harkin's voting record is our best strategy. Once students know his record, they won't vote for him."

Taylor said, "It's going to be a very close campaign. Harkin is a very smooth politician. He manages to avoid the issues and run on his personality. He hasn't been running as a liberal or a democrat - he's been running as a nice guy. It's going to be tough."

take out a loan to supplement the added costs if tuition rates increase.

"Students don't want to accumulate a lot of loans," said Michael Keller, board member of United Students of Iowa.

Fletcher said, "Students will have to divert funds from other areas in their lives if there is a tuition increase.

"Interest rates are going up and many college graduates have trouble finding jobs as soon as they get out of school. And now you have to start paying back loans within six months of the time you graduate."

Students want to know exactly what the increase will be used for.

"If we are not able to prevent increases, we want to see tangible results, like better faculty salaries, more classroom space and a better

faculty/student ratio," said Tom Palmer, president of the UI Collegiate Associations Council. "These things are necessary for quality education.

"The population of the University of Iowa has increased 20 percent while the faculty has only increased 6.5 percent," Palmer said.

Because faculty salaries are frozen, the prospects of attracting new faculty members look grim. Students leaders complained that more classes are being taught by foreign graduate students who are sometimes hard to understand.

"The cost of living on the different campuses should be considered also," said CAC Vice President Sharon McMullin.

McMullin said the cost of off-campus

housing at the UI is 60 percent higher than it is on other campuses. Utility rates have increased and now the possibility of a tuition increase will make financing a college education very hard for a student.

Some of the student representatives said they felt they didn't have enough time to prepare for the meeting. But Regent Art Neu said, "This shows no continuity in the student body organizations."

Neu said he feels students should be aware by now that every year about this time the question of whether there should be a tuition increase comes up.

Fletcher defended the student organizations, explaining that there is usually a large turnover in student government offices because students graduate. He said it would be a good

idea if the student governments could work more closely with the board and possibly have a student representative on the board.

A student representative on the board could help gather information and influence the decision process before it comes before the public at the regents meeting, said Chris Morton, UI member.

The regents approved a tuition rate increase of 6 percent last year as part of a two-year plan, but did not pin down a specific figure for the second year. Officials estimated the probable increase would exceed 7 percent.

The regents listened to the views of the students and will take action on the tuition increases at their October meeting.

Iowa public universities," the regents docket states. "Yet, it is reported, comparable institutions elsewhere were granting salary increases."

Freedman said, "We are competing with schools in states that have very attractive climates. I wouldn't want anyone to leave the University of Iowa for money alone."

Freedman also indicated that the additional appropriations would be used for funding the UI College of Medicine and for projects to keep up with the pace of technology.

In an effort to stabilize the financial structure of the medical college, the UI

is requesting \$2 million.

The medical college has a \$4.9 million deficit. Almost doubled tuition of \$918,000, an internal temporary allocation of \$1.3 million, along with the \$2 million dollars in requested supplementary appropriations will help close the gap.

THESE ADDITIONAL funds are to correct the problem of unbalanced funding from its three major sources: the University General Fund, the University Medical Service Plan, and Gifts, Grants and Contracts. The money in the medical service

plan is income from professional fees earned by physicians on the UI faculty.

Currently, the medical school relies on 40 percent of its funding from the UI medical service plan and only 25 percent from the general fund appropriated by the state.

"We fear the force spreading so widely that we will become more service-orientated than academic-orientated," said John Eckstein, dean of the medical college.

The UI is also seeking \$1.64 million as a start-up fund to keep pace with equipment and technology advances.

"We won't be able to attract students and faculty if we don't have the equipment," said Freedman. "We run the risk of losing federal grants if we don't have state of the art equipment."

This fund will address needs such as increasing effectiveness of student computer stations, replacement of obsolete equipment and development of an expanded capability to exchange information between computers and data bases.

"The money we invest in technology builds upon itself," Freedman said. "This is a very modest request for our needs."

Enrollment

before, but not dramatically so."

The UI College of Liberal Arts had a greater increase in students than any college, increasing from 16,985 last fall to 18,050 this semester.

Howard Laster, dean of the Liberal Arts College, said, "We had been anticipating the increase but that isn't to say we have the resources to do it justice."

LASTER SAID the college is "struggling hard" to handle the number of students enrolled in classes and said he views the decreased size of the

incoming freshmen class with mixed feelings.

"It could indicate the leveling off that has been predicted for the past three or four years may finally be happening," Laster said.

But, Laster said the figure could be deceiving. "The size of the freshmen class remained about even, even though the number of students graduating from high schools in Iowa has been decreasing for the past several years."

Although the Liberal Arts College

had the largest numerical increase in students, the UI Graduate College reported the highest percentage enrollment increase, climbing 6.4 percent.

Duane Spiersbach, UI vice president for educational development and research, credited the increase to last year's economic recession. "Every time there has been a recession in the past, the relative number of people taking graduate level classes has always increased."

Spiersbach said, "This is very characteristic behavior... if a person is unable to find a job, they decide to

try and increase their potential for employment."

The report also shows that enrollment of women at the UI is continuing to increase. This year 5.6 percent more women are attending the UI than last year, compared to 4.8 percent more men.

The report shows that just less than half - 48.2 percent - of the students now enrolled at the UI are women.

"It is a very good sign that girls in high school are beginning to realize they can be whatever they want to be," Hubbard said.

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Chicago expected to clinch pennant

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago White Sox, still faced with the seemingly inevitable task of clinching the American League Western Division pennant, are preparing for a seemingly inevitable meeting with the Baltimore Orioles in the playoffs next month.

The Sox are expected to clinch their first American League flag since 1959 before a near-sellout crowd by the weekend, which will leave them with nearly two full weeks to prepare for their American League Eastern Division foe, apparently Baltimore.

Chicago won only five of 12 from the Orioles during the regular season but several of the games were filled with controversy. Richard Dotson, an 18-game winner for the Sox, had a no-hitter against the Orioles going into the eighth but lost the game on Dan Ford's two-run homer May 18.

THE SOX ALSO lost a decision to the Orioles last month when the umpires ruled that a fan had interfered with what appeared to be a Carlton Fisk home run.

Regardless of when the Sox clinch the flag, Sox Manager Tony LaRussa said he would stay with his starting rotation leading into the playoffs, which would start in Baltimore on Oct. 5.

He has shied away from saying who his starter would be for the first-ever appearance by the Sox in the playoffs, but he said any one of his four regulars would do the trick.

"Almost all of our staff has pitched well against the Orioles. Dot had the near no-hitter and (Floyd) Bannister has pitched well," LaRussa said. "About the only guy without much success against the Orioles has been (Jerry) Koosman."

BANNISTER WON HIS only two decisions against the Orioles this year. The free-agent acquisition has lost only one since the All-Star break but his earned run average against the Orioles this year is a lofty 7.80.

Twenty-game winner LaMarr Hoyt was 2-1 versus the Orioles while Dotson, who has won 14 of his last 16 decisions, is only 0-2 despite his near no-hitter. Reliever Dennis Lamp is 0-3 versus Baltimore and was the victim of a late-inning rally in the Sox' last trip to the city when Baltimore strung together five straight singles with two out to win a game.

"We've had some really good games against the Orioles, so it would be a great series if that's the way it shapes up to be," LaRussa said. "We'll stick with our rotation until the playoffs. There is a lot of incentive for some of the guys to go out and complete great seasons."

Seattle is in town for the first of a seven-game series.

Board concerned about Arena schedule

The Carver-Hawkeye Arena was supposed to be an end-of-the-line model in intercollegiate athletic complexes, but space is already at a premium in the new structure.

Because the Iowa athletic department chose not to install an entire floor in the main portion of the arena, Coach Vivian Stringer and the Iowa women's basketball team can be found practicing on the floor from 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m.

Women's Athletic Director Christine Grant told members of the Board in

Control of Athletics at their last regular meeting that the three teams sharing the use of the floor, the men's and women's basketball team and the Hawkeye volleyball team, would have to hold separate practices due to a space problem.

IT WAS DECIDED that the men's basketball team would practice on the floor from 1:30-4 p.m., and the volleyball team would take over from 4-6:30 p.m. The women's basketball team was left with a choice of an early or late practice.

"The best times for studies are in the

evenings, it wouldn't be right to have one team practice every single night (after 6:30 p.m.)," Grant said. "We talked extensively on the pros and cons, and if (the new schedule) doesn't work out, we'll sit down again and reconsider every possible solution."

The most feasible of those possible solutions has already been ruled out. Grant said the original plans had called for four volleyball courts on the floor, with the (women's) basketball and volleyball practices being held simultaneously.

INSTEAD, THE ATHLETIC depart-

ment decided to save the \$80,000 the additional flooring would've cost.

"I wish the facilities were such that the volleyball and basketball team could practice together," said Peg Burke, chairman of the UI Physical Education and Dance Department. "In the long run, I think the \$80,000 is not a substantial amount."

"We could have installed a net for safety purposes to split the two (practices)," Grant said. "In the spring, we made the decision to run without any additional flooring."

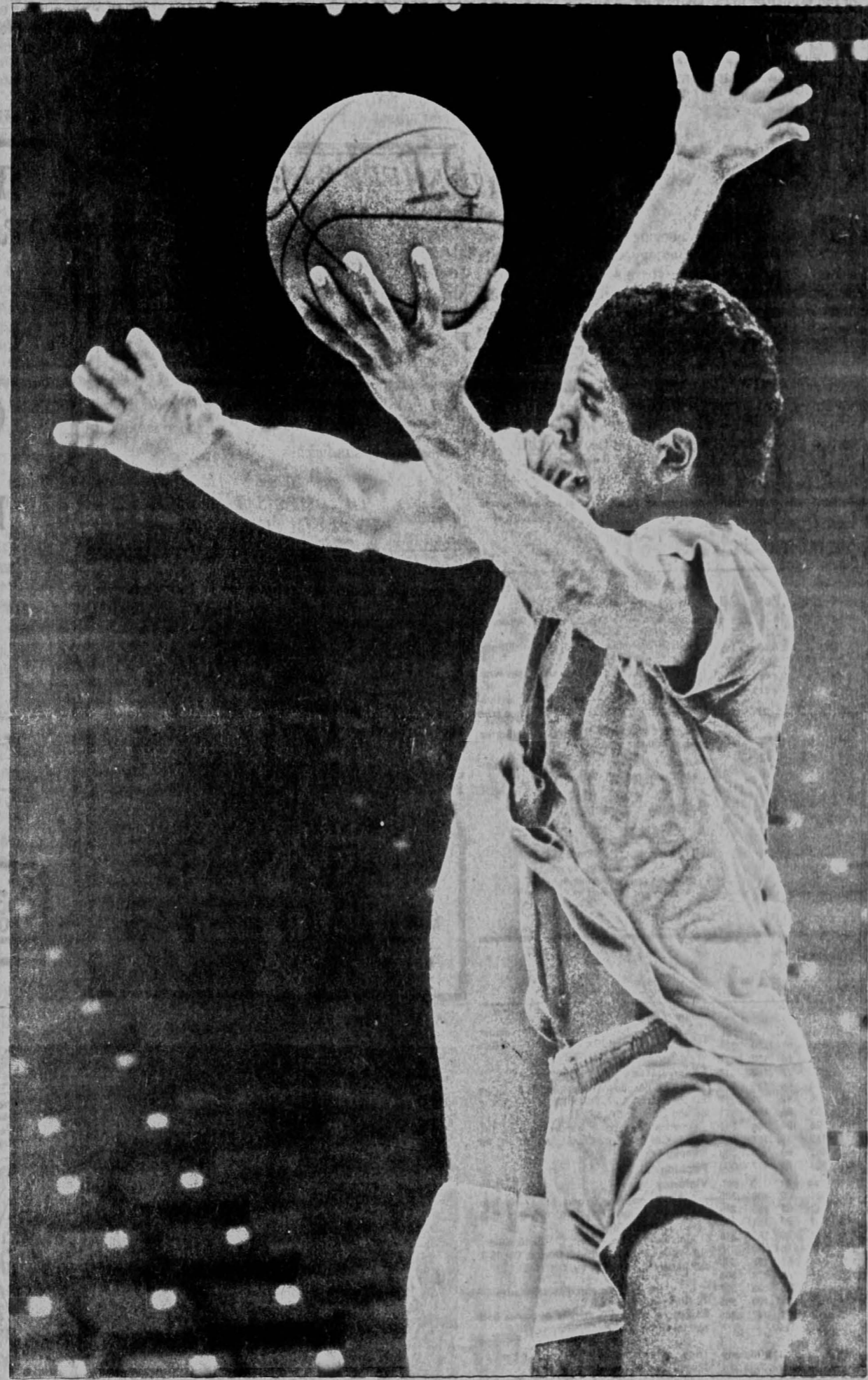
That decision has opened some serious questions that even Grant her-

self says she cannot answer until the program is actually underway.

"We haven't tried this yet... if it results in being adverse to academics or to the physical (well-being) of the athlete, (a new alternative will be incorporated)," Grant said. "Everyone's been going into this with an open mind — it's never been tried."

THE MAIN CONCERN being raised by Burke, also a member of the Board, is that practices are scheduled during "prime class time."

"I am very concerned of the en-

Nittany Lions pose threat to Hawkeyes

Joe Paterno and Hayden Fry, two highly-respected college football coaches who will oppose one another Saturday when Penn State entertains Iowa, each have the same problem. They both have to worry about the defending national champion Nittany Lions.

Paterno, who has been the coach at Penn State for 17 illustrious years and isn't accustomed to being 0-2 after the first two weeks of the season, is hoping one of his three young and inexperienced quarterbacks will come to the forefront against Iowa and solidify the position once and for all.

FRY, THE FIFTH-YEAR coach at Iowa, is hoping the Nittany Lions won't re-group after their disastrous start and take two weeks of frustration out on the 12th-ranked Hawkeyes when the two teams meet in Beaver Stadium in University Park, Pa.

Penn State has taken its lumps since winning the national championship last January, defeating Georgia, 27-23, in the Sugar Bowl.

The Nittany Lions have had to replace graduated quarterback Todd Blackledge, and so far Paterno hasn't found a suitable replacement for the departed All-American. Neither juniors Dan Loneragan and Doug Strang or freshman John Shaffer have come to the forefront, during Penn State's successive losses to Nebraska and Cincinnati this season.

The young and inexperienced threesome have combined to complete only 31 percent of their passes so far this season, and that concerns Paterno. "I don't know where I am (with the quarterback situation) and that's as frank as I can be," he said.

"I'VE BEEN IN this situation before with the quarterbacks. We have a good bunch of kids who will stick together and will work it out."

Against Iowa, Paterno has decided to give the quarterback job to Strang, who has completed only seven-of-19 passes this season.

But Paterno doesn't put the blame on his youthful signal callers, or any of his players for that matter. "When you're

playing as badly as we are, there's only one person to blame and that's yours truly," he said.

"I think I have let down these kids, because they are a better football team than that... When you're not (playing to your potential), you only have one guy to blame and that's the head coach."

Even with all the problems Paterno is facing in "Happy Valley," Fry is giving a definite advantage to the Lions. "We could have caught them at a better time," Fry said. "Penn State will be more emotional than they've ever been. They have been embarrassed, and the fans are booing and yelling at them. Those are things you don't do at Happy Valley."

"WE WILL NOT see the same ballclub as we've seen in the first two ballgames. They have a veteran coaching staff... Look at all the advantages Penn State has playing us compared to Iowa State."

But then Fry quipped, "I haven't talked about our advantages yet."

And Fry wouldn't really talk about the advantages the Hawkeyes have, but there are a number of them. First of all, Iowa has a quarterback, and a good one at that.

Chuck Long is second in the nation in

The Hawkeyes will be at home for the first time this weekend with two games in Kinnick Stadium.

Iowa will host Ball State today at 4 p.m. and will play Northern Illinois Sunday at noon.

"Ball State will be a big game for us," Davidson said. "They should be a little bit tougher than Northern Illinois and a lot tougher than Southwest Missouri State was."

IOWA AND SOUTHWEST Missouri State tied, 1-1, last weekend in St. Louis. During that game the Hawkeyes had trouble putting

pressure on the ball and didn't move well to the ball.

Davidson doesn't know what to expect in the game against Ball State because the Hawkeyes have never played them before.

Ball State has played Southern Illinois, a team who Iowa defeated, 3-0. Ball State also dropped the Salukis, 6-0. "I look for them to be scoring quite a bit," Davidson said. "Friday should give us the competition are defense needs."

"We need to get into a game where we are really tested on defense and can still win," she said. "I just hope Ball State doesn't blow us away."

There are two events scheduled for the day with different categories including a relay event. The first race, which is twice the distance of the second, begins at 7 a.m. and consists of

a 2.4 mile swim, 112-mile bike ride and a 26.2 mile marathon; the second involves 1.2 miles of swimming, 56 miles of bicycling and 13.1 miles of running. That race also begins at 7 a.m.

According to race director Mike Van Horn, all entries are closed for the event.

Van Horn said he has been working on the event since the first of the year and all proceeds from the event, which has a \$25 entry fee, will go to the Boy Scouts of America. All finishers of the

races will be involved in a drawing for bicycle parts.

AT THIS POINT one of the top men's competitors appears to be Bob McMurray of Cedar Rapids, because of his 'national class' swimming ability. According to Van Horn, he will be one of the favorites in the swimming event, giving him an early lead.

The top women's competitor at this point is Des Moines resident Connie Robinson, who has competed in the women's division of the Budweiser

Light Iron Man Championship. However, Jill Garlock of Omaha will challenge Robinson.

In the relay team event, which involves a different athlete in each category of the triathlon, the team to beat will include defending men's champion Craig Farson of Des Moines and Joe Robinson, a two time Iron Man competitor.

The main goal for these athletes is not only winning, but finishing the grueling event.

Conner, Liberty gain 2nd Cup win

NEWPORT, R.I. (UPI) - Liberty sailed from behind Thursday to a huge lead over Australia II Thursday when the Aussies got caught in a windshift midway through the second race of the America's Cup best-of-seven finals.

Dennis Conner, skipper of the burgundy-hulled Liberty, piled up a .48 margin on the fourth leg, leaving the stunned Australians struggling to overcome their worsening plight - already behind 0-1 going into the race.

Although Australia II was ahead rounding the first, second and third buoys, Conner

kept nibbling away at the gap which went from :45 to :31 and then to :21 on the second reaching leg.

But Australia II, skipped by John Bertrand, still looked good until the Aussies veered to the left in search of new wind as the breezes declined from 15 to 8 knots over the 23.4 mile sun-drenched course on Rhode Island Sound.

THE MOVE WAS a mistake, with an unexpected windshift pushing Australia back and giving Conner the chance he had been hoping for to crash through Australia

II's early lead. A wildly cheering spectator fleet was kept off the five-legged course by a flotilla of Coast Guard vessels.

Not only is the crown jewel of yacht racing at stake, but also a piece of sport's history - the United States' 132-year hold on the Victorian silver cup representing the longest winning streak in sports history.

The "Auld Mug," regarded as the oldest sporting prize in competition, was first won by the schooner America in 1851 in a race around England's Isle of Wight. The Americans have not lost since.

Rugged non-conference opponents challenge Big Ten football squads

The Big Ten Conference faces one of its roughest non-conference weekends in its history this Saturday with four teams in the top 16 in the nation meeting conference clubs.

The cream of the league may have the toughest battles. The top attraction is the battle between second-ranked Oklahoma and sixth-ranked Ohio State while 10th ranked Michigan must travel to 16th ranked Washington.

Minnesota hosts top-ranked Nebraska at the Metrodome and Michigan State must travel to fifth-ranked Notre Dame.

Things aren't much easier for some other clubs. Iowa, ranked 12th, must face a Penn State team smarting from two losses this year; Wisconsin hosts Missouri; Purdue visits Miami of Florida and Northwestern visits Syracuse.

THE ILLINOIS-STANFORD and Indiana-Kentucky games are the only ones in the conference where the league isn't a decided underdog.

The Ohio State-Oklahoma game promises to be an offensively explosive contest and could mirror the 1977 game which the Sooners won on a Uwe Von Schamann field goal in the last minute.

Buckeye Coach Earle Bruce said the game could hinge on the kicking game and turnovers.

"So often these games come down to the fourth quarter. You hope to stay close but you don't want to have any big mistakes," Bruce said. "You also want your kicking game to be sharp."

The game will pit two outstanding individual offensive performers. Mike Tomczak threw four touchdowns for the Buckeyes in their opening win last weekend while Oklahoma boasts All-American back

MICHIGAN MAY AGAIN be without quarterback Steve Smith when it travels to meet a Washington club that blanked Northwestern 34-0 one week ago.

"Washington is a team that could end up in the Rose Bowl, and their defense may be better than the one it was last year. It's going to be a tough, tough game," said Wolverine Coach Bo Schembechler. "I thought they handled Northwestern pretty well with an extremely strong defense and with an experienced quarterback and running back."

Michigan State Coach George Perles opened up with a victory in his debut last week against Colorado while the Fighting Irish were blasting Purdue 52-6. The Spartans will have to find a way to contain a potent Irish offense led by quarterback Blair Kiel.

"They have a Pitt-style defense," said Notre Dame Coach Gerry Faust. "We only scored 11 points last year against them and that was three field goals and a safety."

NEBRASKA HAS SCORED 100 points and gained nearly 1,200 yards in its first two games and will face a Minnesota team that barely ended an eight-game losing streak with a come-from-behind 21-17 win at Rice.

"We'll put on the helmets and give it our best," said Minnesota Coach Joe Salem. "I don't know who scheduled this game but we have to play it and we'll give it our best."

passing behind Ohio State's Mike Tomczak. The junior from Wheaton, Ill., completed 13-of-17 passes for 204 yards in Iowa's 51-10 romp over Iowa State last weekend.

The offensive backfield is steady with junior halfback Owen Gill and senior fullback Norm Granger leading the way. Gill rushed for a school record tying four touchdowns against the Cyclones as the Hawkeyes totaled 257 yards on the ground.

BUT ONE OF THE biggest keys on offense for the Hawkeyes is that sophomore Ronnie Harmon has settled in at wingback. "He will continue to receive experience at running back," Fry said, "but he is intelligent enough to know he will play more — especially as a starter — as a wingback."

"He's probably the only player on the team that could have caught the passes he caught against Iowa State."

coachments on the courses (women's basketball players) want to take," Burke said. "I'm sure Dr. Grant is making every effort possible to accommodate them," but I'm afraid a fatigue factor is going to interject. They are here first to get an education."



Museum's Elliott collection exhibits printmaking history

CEDAR RAPIDS art collector Owen Elliott and his wife began donating to the UI in the late '60s, stipulating that a museum be constructed to house the works. When the UI Museum of Art opened its doors in May 1969, there were few art works other than those given by the Elliotts. Since that time, their gifts have occasionally been lost in the procession of special traveling exhibits and other additions to the collection.

In tribute to the Elliotts, a portion of their large collection of prints is now on display in the front galleries through Oct. 30.

The accompanying catalogue details the development of the collection from the early years when the Elliotts first began searching and buying art objects, to the later trips to Europe, India and Japan, where they gathered items to add to their extensive group of works.

This collection covers many famous artists, from Durer through Rembrandt to more recent works by French impressionists. It spans most of Western Europe as well as encompassing some well-known Japanese printmakers.

A **WALK THROUGH** the exhibit is a parade through not only the styles of several artists but a capsule summary of the high points of art history during the last 300 years. Toulouse-Lautrec lithographs, several Whistler etchings and the Rouault "Le Christ en Croix" are reminders that a museum contributes to the public sense of beauty by displaying such works.

For the most part, the prints have been grouped according to their historical time so that they can be viewed as the various artists saw and played off each other's ideas. Thus a Braque, a Redon and a Renoir

can be seen in their relationship to each other and also to their time.

The catalogue lists over 400 Daumier works but only a few hang in the show. Is there a plan to feature this artist-social critic-cartoonist in some future exhibit? If so, seeing such a large selection of his works in one place would provide the museum-goer with a chance to explore the technique and thought of the artist at some depth.

To some extent this has been done for a group of Goya prints. Some 15 of his works are displayed in one of the side galleries, showing the Spanish artist as he portrays, with stinging clarity, Spanish customs and the violence of war.

THE ENTHUSIAST for modern or contemporary prints will find little to satisfy that interest, for the Elliotts found their aesthetic needs satisfied through the collecting of works by well-known older artists. As a companion exhibit and as an overview of contemporary woodblock printers, "Cuts," which is appearing in the Carver Gallery, offers a fine adjunct to this show. Perhaps by giving a historical perspective in their collection, the Elliotts have made possible a basis for seeing present day art trends as they relate to those of the past.


Since it isn't always possible to visit a large museum with its more complete historical collection, the Elliotts have done the UI and its students a service by donating their works to the museum.

And not only that: the museum has done art fans a service by organizing the current exhibit. It can only be hoped that from time to time more of the permanent collection will be organized to continue to give background, as well as display the museum's possessions.

James Abbott McNeill Whistler's "Becquet," a selection from the Elliott Collection, is on view at the UI Museum of Art Sept. 9 through Oct. 30.

MJQ opens season of jazz at Hancher

THE MODERN JAZZ QUARTET, arguably one of the finest small jazz ensembles that ever stepped onto a stage, is appearing this evening at Hancher Auditorium at 8:00, fully recharged after eight years of inactivity as a group.

With the fascinating group — Milt Jackson on vibes, John Lewis on piano, Percy Heath on bass and Connie Kay on drums — on stage for the first time since 1976, this concert promises to be a terrific way for Hancher to begin its new season. And it also signals the intention of the hall's administration to emphasize jazz this season.

Not only are the MJQ opening the year, but they are also breaking in the hall for Gerry Mulligan and Dave Brubeck, two exponents of "cool" jazz, West Coast variety (Oct. 7); the venerable Count Basie and his big band (Oct. 22); pop-jazzmeister Chuck Mangione, bringing cuts from his new album (Oct. 29); the Great Jazz Piano Celebration, featuring Marian McPartland and George Shearing (Nov. 4); and the highly impressionistic improvisations of Keith Jarrett (Nov. 21).

THE MJQ IS special, though. It was this group that forced critics and audiences alike to reappraise the question of jazz's "legitimacy" as an art

form and to bring into focus what role jazz played within the realm of music. With their deadly serious playing and their formal attire — as well as their seemingly Protean ability to meld their sound into any acoustic/cultural format — the MJQ demanded that listeners take their music as serious compositional efforts, not merely goodtime improvisations.

After the group's last concert in Avery Fisher Hall in New York City (the hall where the New York Philharmonic Orchestra plays) in 1974, vibist Jackson formed his own quartet and hit the road; pianist/composer Lewis became a professor; bassist Heath joined his brother Jimmy and formed The Heath Brothers Quintet; and drummer Kay layed in Benny Goodman's band.

A brief Midwestern jaunt in 1976 brought this second edition of the MJQ to Hancher, but this will mark the first time here.

Tickets are still available, but only the first two price brackets (\$10.50 and \$8) are left for students (non-students pay \$2 more per seat.) If you can afford it, go: These cats are an important part of popular musical history, and never has history sounded so good.

ESPN takes stock in the news

NEW YORK (UPI) — ESPN still advertises itself as the total sports network, but tucked in there amid all that jock stuff is two hours of comprehensive business programming — anchored by a woman.

While network TV's "ladies of the morning" — Diane Sawyer at CBS, Jane Pauley at NBC and Joan Lunden at ABC — are busy interviewing the three A's — Actors, Artists and Authors — ESPN's Consuelo Mack is using her seven years' experience on Wall Street to update execs on the latest in the world of business.

"Business Times," which runs from 5-7 a.m. Iowa time (the second hour is a repeat of the first), recently passed the 6-month mark. It already has picked up 26 corporate advertisers such as IBM and GM, a spokesman said.

"For me, this is a TV show that should have been done a long time ago," said the petite blonde graduate of Sarah Lawrence College in Manhattan.

"We aim our program at young professionals on the way up," she said. "We cover what's important in business news of the past 24 hours, trends in technology and features that put you ahead of the pack."

PBS' highly successful weekly program "Wall Street Week" is com-

pletely different from "Business Times," Mack said. "It's basically a summary of stock news. There are interviews, sometimes with people who don't know what they're talking about."

"I only go with people who have a performance record," Mack said. "I do more on portfolio strategies — not just what happened, but why and what it means and how it will affect the day's business decisions."

The staff roster includes Editor Douglas Ramsey, former business editor of Newsweek; Executive Editor William Wolman, former deputy editor of Business Week, and Managing Editor Peter Martin, former U.S. economic editor of the British news magazine The Economist.

Mack worked as an account executive for Merrill Lynch from 1974-76 and then headed the institutional sales department of Legg Mason Wood Walker until 1977, when she joined Mitchell Hutchins as an assistant portfolio manager specializing in small growth stock research.

"But I wasn't happy on Wall Street,"

she said. "I just didn't enjoy managing money."

While she was at Mitchell Hutchins, she took a course in broadcasting at the New School in Manhattan.

She made a few contacts there and eventually was asked to do market commentary a couple of times a week for two financial news programs, "Wall Street Perspective" and "Stock Market Today" on WWHT-TV, serving the tri-state region.

Then she joined the television station full time.

When James "Denny" Crimmins approached her with the idea of working on a financial show for cable, Mack said she hopped at the chance.

"I couldn't believe it was happening," she said. "Then I heard the hours. Well ... there had to be a hitch."

To get up at 2 a.m., Mack tries to go to bed by 7 p.m. — just about the time her husband of nine years, federal prosecutor Walter Mack of the Southern District Court in Manhattan, is getting home.

"Basically we treat it as if I was working in another city during the week," she said. "But we try to have one lunch together during the week and one day a week I try to get home early so I can take a nap and have dinner at 8."

"When I first started doing the job

I'd ask my cab drivers, 'How do you do it, working these hours,' and they'd say it was going to help my marriage."

Weekends the couple escapes to their home in Litchfield, Conn., where they have a dog, a cat and four horses.

X-rated movie projects protested

A student group that showed pornographic films last week as a fund-raising project has seized upon the controversy surrounding it to help finance a public forum on issues involving the First Amendment and UI policy covering the showing of such films.

Concerned Campus showed *Deep Throat* and *The Devil and Miss Jones* last Thursday and Friday at Phillips Hall. The films drew a small protest opening night, which included an incident between a UI Campus Security officer and a protester.

Scott Fitzgerald, vice president of the three-member student group, said the films were being shown for "fund-raising" purposes. Fitzgerald said after its fund-raiser spurred the controversy, the group decided a public forum is needed to solve the issue of whether the UI should allow the showing of pornographic films.

Though he said he did not know what the money gleaned from the event would be used for, the group's president, Chris Volker, said they would use a portion of it to help set up the forum.

"ONE OF THE main reasons (to show the films) was to raise interest in freedom of speech ... it should be debated," Fitzgerald said. "People have a right to see the movies." The group is currently looking for two parties to participate but have not yet set a date.

Concerned Campus, a group of three UI students recognized by the UI Student Senate, is dedicated to "educating students on the relevant issues facing the student community," according to its constitution, which is on file in the senate office. Fitzgerald said Concerned Campus would not take part in the debate, though.

Gerard Ng, a member of Representative '84, a student political party, said he advised members of Concerned Campus about the project.

Ng said he has been pushing for a forum on the showing of pornographic films. "There is an issue and it should not die down," he said. He added he would have liked to see Concerned Campus show a whole series of pornographic films "to make it so visible that the university would have no choice but to make a clear policy on this."

THERE HAVE been pornographic movies shown at the UI on several occasions in the past, Ng noted, including two such showings in the past year. A showing of pornographic movies last fall in Shambaugh Auditorium had to be evacuated because of a bomb threat.

The public forum may not be the only debate scheduled. Two student senators say they would

Lebanese, Syrian

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Lebanese troops clashed with Syrian soldiers in Lebanon Sunday for the first time in the growing radical revolt against the government of President Amin Gemayel, state-run Beirut radio said.

The attack was reported after Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy put his troops in Lebanon under Syrian command. There are an estimated 600 Libyans, and 10,000 Palestinian and 30,000 Syrian troops in the eastern Bekaa Valley.

The radio said there were "limited clashes" between Lebanese and Syrian troops in the Kesrouane district town of Oyoum Siman, 20 miles northeast of Beirut.

"The army silenced the fire with sorts of arms," the radio said.

The flare-up marked the first clash between Lebanese and Syrian forces since the outbreak of war between Lebanese government forces and Syrian-backed Druze Muslim militiamen in the Shouf mountains southeast of Beirut a month ago.

On Friday and Saturday, two warships off the Lebanese coast shelled targets in Syrian-controlled areas in response to the shelling of Embassy offices and the U.S. ambassador's residence.

In response, Syria warned it would retaliate against any attacks.

Police subdue

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Police used tear gas and clubs Sunday to put down Israeli and Arab protesters marking the anniversary of the massacre of Palestinians in two Beirut refugee camps last year.

"You are cowards, why do you prevent us from praying for the dead?" an Arab woman cried out as the police swinging clubs moved into a crowd of about 100 protesters just outside the walls of the Jerusalem's Old City. Police detained about 20 people, mostly leftists.

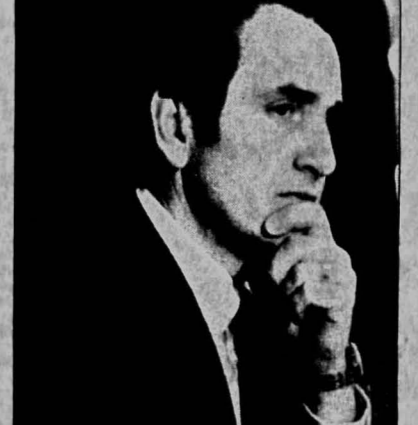
The protest in Jerusalem coincided with demonstrations in Nazareth, northern Israel, Nablus on the West Bank, and in the West Bank refugee camp of Dehaisha, near Bethlehem.

Protests came a year after 400 Israelis took to Jerusalem streets demanding an inquiry into the massacres at the Sabra and Chatila refugee camps in the Lebanese capital Sept. 16-18, 1982.

Lebanese Christian militiamen carried out the systematic slaughter of civilians, but an Israeli inquiry later discovered Jewish forces around the
