Dear Sudent:
On Tuedday, Octoo r 18 th, you will have an opportunity to vote on a very important question. The question the United Students of lowa (USI). This fee is an investment in your future. Tuition has increased $78 \%$ since 1975 and will probably increase another $\$ 150$ next year. A 75 cents per semester investment is a small price to allow USI to fight against higher tuition increases. We hope that you will read this letter carefully and consider the importance of having a student representative organization in Des Moines.
WHAT IS USI: USS is the only student advocacy group in Des Moines representing the students of lowa in the three state universities. It is one of the few statewide organizations in the country that benefit all institutions
in the system, including The University of lowa.
WHAT DOES USI DO USI represents the students to the General Assembly. The primary mission of USI
is to increase state subsidy (which results in lower tuition) and increase student financial assistance USII howis to increase state subsidy (which results in lower tuition) and increase student tinancial assistance. UsI, how-
ever, has and will take on other issues such as establishing and/or developing student legal services, providing off-campus housing and tenants rights information, lowering textbook prices, publishing student academic evaluations, and most importantly, maintaining access to education for all students and increasing the quality of education. USI also represents the student viewpoint with the legislature, college presidents, faculty and Board of Regents.
WHY IS USI NECESSARY: USI is necessary to complete the circle of representation. The university administrators have organizations and councils which work to keep them informed of what is happening statewide Also, the faculty has a statewide advocacy organization. USI is needed to complete this circle. Only when
strong state stydent association is in place will students have an organization which represents them and their needs. This is nothing more than the logical thing todo. The only question is WHAT'S THE ALTERNATIVE? WHY IS USI REQUESTING A DIRECT FEE: Presently USI is funded through student governments of state universities, and a one-time direct fee from the students at The University of lowa. USI must implement a direct fee at all three universities so that all students contribute the same amount in the same fashion. USI needs enough money to pay for travel expenses, office supplies, rent and phone bills, plus much more. A direct fee will allow USI to know exactly how much money it will receive each semester, and will enable the organiza-
tion to grow, expand and BETTER SERVE THE STUDENTS. The fee is refundable within 30 days of the first lion to grow, expand and BETTER SERVE THE STUDENTS. The fee is refundable within 30 days of the firs WHAT WILL USI DO WITH THIS MONEY: The first thing that USI will do is hire staff, including maintaining an Executive Director who will operate the office on a day-to-day basis. USI would also hire a legislative liaison who would be responsible for maintaining contacts with state and national legislators, and other agencies maintaining contacts with other state and national student organizations, and publishing ras mootthy organizizing to students. This staff is imperative to an organization which must represent, educate and organize 65,000 students statewide
WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO USI WITHOUT THE DIRECT FEE: If USI does not receive the necessary funds that this fee will provide, the association will eventually die. USI must maintain professionalism when it deals in professional circles. We cannot afford to have a rinky-dink organization in Des Moines. USI needs a stable
financial base, which this fee would provide. NO other plan will give USI much needed stability' Any organiza tion which does not have financial stabilitye. will eventually become ineffective. It would be pitiful and irrespons
