Ex-inmate sues hospitals, doctors

| By Nick Schrup <br> Special to The Daily lowan <br> A former Iowa State Penitentiary inmate has filed suit against UI Hospitals and two staff doctors for negligence, according to records filed Friday in Johnson County District Court. <br> Anthony Jackson claims that improper equipment and procedures were used during a diagnostic test on his heart on Sept. 15, 1982, while he was an inmate at the penitentiary. The suit contends complications from the procedure led to Jackson undergoing heart bypass surgery. <br> According to the suit, doctors Walter J. Schoepfle and Nicholas P. Rossi failed to inform Jackson of possible complications that might arise from the diagnostic procedure. Two stories recently in the news go to the heart of the difficulty that state and federal legislators have in writing and balancing their budgets.

That paradox - a demand for costly services from government and an unwillingness to pay for them - underlies much of the budget and tax debate in this country. Every group contributes to dealing with high interest rates, but they want lower taxes. dealing with high interest rates, but they want lower taxes. o deduct the interest on their home mortgages and want social security for themselves and their parents, but they want to reduce the budget deficit and pay lower taxes. Conservatives like President Reagan want to spend massive amounts on the military, but they are unwilling to tax in order to support that spending. Each group wants its own benefits or programs maintained or increased. Each, however, is unwilling to pay for it. Instead, they all want to cut someone else's benents or taxes. They want, in other words, miracles.
