## Gorbachev may end embargo against Lithuania

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev moved to hold together a splintering Soviet Union on Tuesday by proposing the 15 republics agree on a new, looser federation of sovereign states, officials said. The presidents of Lithuania and Latvia emerged smiling from two meetings with Gorbachev and indicated it could be the beginning of a solution to the country's problems with its restive republics. Lithuanian President Vytautas Landsbergis hinted Gorbachev might soon end the economic embargo against his republic, which declared independence from the Soviet Union on March 11. By redefining the Soviet federation, Gorbachev could deal with the three Baltic

republics' demands for independence as well as lesser separatist moves across the vast country.

On Tuesday, those problems heightened when Russia's parliament, led by Gorbachev rival Boris Yeltsin, approved a resolution declaring its laws supercede the national ones. This could dramatically reduce Gorbachev's authority because the Russian republic includes 52 percent of the Soviet Union's population and three-quarters of its land mass.

Latvia came away from Tuesday's meetings in the Kremlin with an offer from the Soviet president on starting negotiations toward independence, according to Latvian President Anatoly Gorbunov.

At a Moscow press conference with Gorbunov, Landsbergis implied that Gorbachev also offered his republic a compromise on independence. But he refused to elaborate, saying he would tell the people of Lithuania first.

Asked if Gorbachev would end his embargo of Lithuania, which has put 26,000 people out of work, Landsbergis replied, "The blockade will not be canceled tomorrow, but the day after tomorrow we shall see."

Gorbachev ordered the blockade of oil, most natural gas and other raw materials to Lithuania on April 18 because it declared independence. Latvia and Estonia, the other Baltic republics, have proceeded with slower transition periods toward independence,

which they lost when annexed in 1940.

Estonian President Arnold Ruutel said on republic radio Tuesday night that Gorbachev had recognized the need for talks and a transition period toward independence, Neme Brus of Estonian Radio said without elaboration.

The Russian parliament approved its resolution declaring sovereignty by a 907-13 vote. The statement was weaker than originally proposed, however, because it says sovereignty and priority of its laws over national ones will be worked out in a new Russian constitution and a new union.

The Baltic officials met with Gorbachev after participating in Tuesday's meeting of Gorbachev's advisory Federation Council.

## Book co-op revisions scheduled

Non-students, who hold more than 500 books in the Union's book co-op store, won't be allowed to trade their books there anymore.

The room was running out of space for the materials, and staffing the store was becoming difficult, according to Campus Programs Director Kevin Taylor, who said the store had become a financial drain.

"The co-op has turned into a warehouse," he said.

The storage burden and financial difficulties triggered an organizational audit of the store this year. That audit suggested several changes in the way the store will be run.

All co-op contract holders who are not registered students, faculty or staff or whose books are not current semester texts must remove their books from the co-op within 30 days, Taylor said. All non-current-semester texts will become property of the co-op if they are not removed before the deadline.

"We're going to attempt to get back to the original intent of the co-op," Taylor said. "The intent was to have an avenue for fair book exchange for students."

In the future, contract holders must be registered UI students,

## Jury begins deliberations in local trial

After more than two weeks of testimony in the defamation trial of UI Anatomy Professor Robert Tomanek, jury members left the courtroom at 1:45 p.m. Tuesday to begin deliberations.

Tomanek is being sued by UI Associate Anatomy Professor Jean Jew, who claims Tomanek damaged her career by spreading rumors that she was sexually involved with Terence Williams, former anatomy department head.

In their closing remarks, lawyers for the defendant and the plaintiff asked the jury to consider whether it could prove that Jew and Williams maintained a sexual relationship, and consider the extent of damages that the circulation of such rumors caused Jew.

Jew's lawyer, Carolyn Chalmers, focused on the fact that Tomanek initiated a "smear campaign" that was a "systematic effort to destroy the reputation of Dr. Jew."

This tainting was a source of humiliation for Jew, Chalmers said, and caused her to suffer a major depressive disorder.

"This damage will remain with her for years," she added.

But Tomanek's lawyer, Charles Traw, pointed out that none of Jew's family or friends testified "to show how she suffered."

He further asked the jury to focus on the truth, and to consider the number of witnesses who testified

## Report: Farm chemicals only part of water quality problem



While nitrate problems have plagued the Iowa City water supply much of this spring, a Washington, D.C., trade association is contending that the role of agricultural chemicals in Iowa's water woes is exaggerated.

The National Agricultural Chemicals Association has released a report contending that publicity surrounding announcements of contaminated wells has overplayed the role of pesticides and fertilizers contributing to nitrates and other pollutants in the water.

While much of Iowa City's water supply is surface water from the Iowa River, most of Johnson County's rural residents and about 70 percent of all Iowans receive their water from wells.

The report may have some validity, according to Dale Shires, extension service director for Johnson County. Poorly constructed or



abandoned wells, which are difficult to seal, are part of the problem.

The wells can allow surface water to enter with its contaminants, Shires says.

Richard Fawcett, an agricultural consultant in Huxley, Iowa, who reviewed the reports for NACA, agreed. Fawcett also said that wells close to feed lots and areas where farmers rinse their sprayers

tend to be the most contaminated.

But UI Assistant Professor Burton Kross pointed out that chemical fertilizers leaching in from fields are still a major cause of nitrate contamination in wells.

Kross, who is with the Preventive Medicine Department, participated in a recent study of rural wells by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. The study found that 55 to 60 percent of all nitrates in rural Iowa wells was from fertilizers, with much of the chemicals entering through the soil under fields.

Kross also cited a 1987 DNR study that found in some cases farmers apply more than twice the amount of fertilizer than the crop can use. The surplus nitrogen often runs off into streams and rivers or works its way down through the soil into the underground water systems.

One reason for over-fertilization may be that the low cost of fertilizer makes it cheaper for a farmer to use too much than to risk a

## Durenberger censured for improprieties

### Senate Ethics Committee is still probing financial misuse

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Dave Durenberger has brought "dishonor and disrepute" on the Senate and should be censured by his colleagues for engaging in unethical conduct, the Senate Ethics Committee's special counsel told the panel as it opened a hearing into the senator's alleged financial improprieties.

Counsel Robert Bennett also said that the evidence showed a "pattern of unethical conduct" by Durenberger in a book-promotion deal, transactions involving his Minneapolis condominium and his acceptance of free limousine rides.

"Your loyalty here is not to Sen. Durenberger," Bennett told the committee.

Durenberger, looking stunned, sat with his hand on his cheek as Bennett pointed out to the six-member committee that it sat under a Senate seal.

"Sen. Durenberger has tarnished that seal and has brought this institution to dishonor and disrepute," the counsel said. "Your loyalty to this institution now summons you to denounce this senator and his actions."

Bennett, who earlier told the committee that Durenberger exhibited "very serious insensitivity to the ethical demands of his office," told senators they should "denounce Sen. Durenberger publicly for knowingly engaging in unethical conduct which has brought dishonor and disrepute to this institution."

The senator and his attorney, Jim Hamilton, were scheduled to speak after Bennett, a prominent private attorney specializing in white-collar crimes.

The hearing took on the aura of a trial as the 12-year senator stared from across the room when Bennett, standing at a lectern, accused

Durenberger of making fake promotional appearances in 1985 and 1986 for his two books.

The speeches were really "a gimmick" to "magically" turn honoraria earned from appearances before trade groups into book promotions, allowing Durenberger to make \$100,000 beyond his Senate salary and exceed the chamber's speaking-fee limits, Bennett said.

The scheme was concocted, Bennett said, as the senator neared the legal maximum for honoraria.

Bennett said Durenberger's attempts to change ownership of his Minneapolis condominium was a scheme to improperly collect \$40,055 in Senate travel reimbursements from 1983 through 1989. He would not have been eligible for the payments if he had owned the residence outright, Bennett said.

"The senator consistently engaged in a pattern of unethical conduct and showed very serious insensitivity to the ethical demands of his office," Bennett told the six-member committee.

About 200 spectators attended the first of the hearings, which the committee will use to determine if Durenberger broke the chamber's rules and federal law.

The panel has found "substantial credible evidence" that Durenberger may have committed violations in the condominium deal, the book arrangement, and the limousine trips.

If the panel finds wrongdoing, it can recommend that the Senate punish Durenberger by handing out anything from a mild rebuke to expulsion — although the latter is unlikely.

In his book deal, Durenberger received \$100,000 from a Minneapolis publisher, Piranha Press.

## McCartney show scheduled to reach Ames this summer

AMES (AP) — Rock star Paul McCartney will make his first Iowa appearance this summer.

Iowa State University officials announced today that the former Beatle will appear at Cyclone Stadium for one show at 8:30 p.m. July 18.

"This is a really big show," said Patricia Cotter, media coordinator for the Iowa State Center. "It puts us on the map with some big wigs, let me tell you."

According to Cotter, Ames is the smallest town on McCartney's seven-city U.S. tour this summer.

Tickets go on sale Saturday at all Ticketmaster outlets and at the Iowa State Center box office in Stephens Auditorium. Tickets are \$33 plus a fee of about \$3.50 each to cover Ticketmaster's fee. She said the extra fee also will be charged if patrons buy tickets at the Iowa State Center box office.

There is a limit of eight tickets per customer. "Pretty much everything came together in the last two days or so," she said. Cotter did not know details of the contract.

Cyclone stadium holds about 50,000 but Cotter said the concert featuring the Rolling Stones last summer drew more than 56,000.

# D.C. trip impresses UI exchange student

## Lee meets Iowa's senators

The road from Singapore recently led UI senior Teck Lee to Washington, D.C.

Lee, an exchange student from Singapore, was among two UI students selected by the U.S. Congressional Youth Leadership Council to attend a six-day National Young Leaders Conference in Washington.

He got back from his tour of the nation's capital Monday, having rubbed elbows with Iowa's two senators, Democrat Tom Harkin and Republican Charles Grassley.

"We didn't have much time with Senator Grassley because the Senate was in session, but he gave us a lot of good advice," Lee said. "He especially emphasized community service."

Lee also attended a breakfast panel discussion led by several journalists at the National Press Club.

"It was a well-rounded panel of people having various different ways of looking at a particular story, whether they were reporters, columnists or analysts," Lee said.

Lee said a forum describing the grassroots lobbying process in Washington was particularly enlightening.

"The fact that lobbying in politics was not done behind closed doors — but rather out in the open — was a peculiarity to me," he said.

Lee said the need for people to

communicate was one of the most important lessons he got out of the conference.

"To know and to learn the American democratic system, realizing that it's not just one group of people making all of the decisions, was important," Lee said.

"It dawned on me that people should talk over things in all areas. I believe this will affect my style of leadership in the future," he added.

Nancy Paulson, administrative assistant in public affairs for the Congressional Youth Council in Washington, said applications were sent to students the council felt would be interested.


"Students are then invited to attend the conference based on an essay and their scholastic record," she said.

The program is designed to educate students on the inner workings of Washington and to inspire them to become involved.

"Our theme for the conference was The Leaders of Today Meeting the Leaders of Tomorrow," Paulson said. "What we hoped to do was to inspire and educate the individual of what is happening in Washington and how they can make a difference."

"We wanted to show how accessible Washington can be to them," she added.

Lee plans to return to Singapore with a degree from the UI in Business Administration and with a high degree of respect for the

president of the United States.

"This trip was insightful because we wonder why (the president) takes so long when he makes decisions, but he has so many advisers showing him so many

sides. . . . It's a tough job," he said.

The conference runs five weeks with 175-200 students across the country attending each week. Another UI student, Mike Krause, will attend in late June.

# Grant has researcher jumping - really

A lot of people would probably jump at the chance to get paid to study sports.

And James Hay is jumping. Well, at least some of his subjects are.

Hay, a UI professor of exercise science and physical education, has been awarded two grants totaling more than \$21,500 to research long-jump and discus-throwing techniques by The Athletic Congress, a national track and field organization.

Hay has used biomechanics in the past with the UI men's track team to analyze field-event athletes and help them improve their techniques.

"My research results on jumping are likely to have applications improving any sport involved in jumping, particularly football, basketball or gymnastics," Hay said.

Hay will begin videotaping athletes June 14 at the 1990 TAC championships in Walnut Hill, Calif. The data obtained from the high-speed films will be used to build computer-simulated models to analyze body movements — particularly speed, placement and angles.

The models are created by digitizing each frame of the videotape and placing it in a computer. Former UI discus thrower and shot-putter Norm Balke said, "Hay would

determine through the computer if field-event athletes were using their body to the fullest potential for throwing or jumping."

Hay said that he will try to determine the mechanisms at takeoff in the long jump that transform horizontal velocity from the approach run into vertical velocity at the jump.

"We're interested how the athlete performs this change from running to jumping," said Hay.

In the discus throw, Hay said, he is trying to identify the factors important to success in throwing. "We're looking at identification factors of technique, not size," he said. "The way the body moves is more important than size or shape of the athlete."

"Hay looks at body position and how best to apply force to jump farther or make the discus go farther," Balke said. "He's not a coach, but he can dissect your technique and help you see what you are doing from a scientific approach."

Hay was granted \$14,100 for his research in the long jump and \$7,670 for studying discus throwing. He will also be videotaping athletes at the Goodwill Games in Seattle and the U.S. Olympic Fest in Minneapolis later this summer.

Hay has worked on previous funded research projects in the past four years in close cooperation with TAC, which acts as the administrative body for track and field in the United States. The organization uses applications in science to improve athletics.

# UI football player Polly receives suspended sentence for assault

Iowa football player Ed Polly received a suspended sentence in Johnson County magistrate court Tuesday.

Polly was charged with three counts of assault causing injury after his involvement in a large fight that injured three people at the Phi Kappa Sigma fraternity house, 716 N. Dubuque St., June 2, 1989.

That night, Polly allegedly struck two women and one man, according to court records. One victim alleged that Polly struck her in the head with a baseball bat during the incident, according to court records.

Polly was originally charged with two counts of assault without intent to cause injury on January 16 after two UI students identified him from a photo line-up as the man who struck them June 2.

February 27, the charges were changed to assault causing injury and the third charge, alleging he struck a man in the knee and elbow with a bat, was added.

## Courts

May 8, Polly pleaded guilty to a charge of disorderly conduct in exchange for the assault charges.

An Iowa City man was charged with assault yesterday after he allegedly cut another man with a beer glass at "The 'Que," 211 Iowa Ave., according to Johnson County District Court records.

The defendant, Matthew B. Klein, 21, reportedly hit a 22-year-old man in the bar with a beer glass after a verbal dispute, records stated.

The man was rushed to UI Hospitals and Clinics where he received

treatment for cuts.

Preliminary hearing in the matter is scheduled for June 27, according to court records.

A Cedar Rapids man was charged with possession of stolen property in the third degree after a radar detector he took in for repairs was found to have been stolen, according to Johnson County District Court records.

The defendant, Robert E. Grafton II, 24, of 1610 Park Towne Lane, No. 2 NE, reportedly worked for Carousel Motors, 809 Hwy. 1 West, on Aug. 11, 1988, when a radar detector was stolen from the business, records stated.

On May 18, 1990, Grafton sent the radar detector to be repaired. During a telephone conversation with the repair company, Grafton was told that the unit didn't belong to him. According to court records, Grafton failed to report to the police that the radar detector was stolen.

## Bond possible for Blumberg

DES MOINES (AP)—The attorney for Stephen Carrie Blumberg, the Ottumwa man implicated in a multi-million dollar rare-book theft case, predicted that Blumberg will be released on bond Wednesday.

"I imagine that the magistrate will impose some conditions, but I anticipate that he'll be released from jail," said attorney Don Nickerson.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Linda Reade declined to comment on the case, although she said she and Nickerson have been negotiating a set of release conditions for several days.

Blumberg is charged with interstate transportation of stolen books in connection to the alleged theft of rare books from libraries and collections around the country. Blumberg was arrested in March after police staked out a house he owns in Ottumwa. The FBI found 11,000 rare books.

# Pickets return to clinic, say they'll test the law

The first day of the UI summer semester was like any Iowa City summer days — complete with heat, humidity and a few pickets in front of the Emma Goldman Clinic for Women, 227 N. Dubuque St.

Although the group has a permit to protest this week, next week it won't, and it plans to continue the picket — even if it means getting arrested.

Tuesday, the six pickets walked peacefully outside the clinic from 10 a.m. until noon. Four of them were from Iowa City and two were from Dubuque.

Some sang and one man played "Taps," among other tunes, on his harmonica. They didn't hassle anyone trying to enter or leave, except for some jeering at the employees.

The employees carried on with their usual daily clinical activities — with one exception, the "Pledge-A-Picketer" program.

Clinic Director Gayle Sand said the program is a means of collecting money from pro-choice supporters who donate on the basis of the number of anti-abortion pickets in each month. Money raised goes directly to lowering the abortion fee for low-income women.


The program has been in place for about a year and has raised close to \$1,000, Sand said.

Sand said the program has been very successful because the pickets' presence works toward increasing, rather than decreasing, women's access to abortion and counseling.

But the group of pickets was only slightly riled by the banner advertising "Pledge-A-Picket."

The group will continue its cause — permit or not, Cynthia Schlichting of the Apostolic Church in Dubuque said.

"I have the right to pray and picket in public without a permit," she said.



"Picketing and voting," she said, "are about all we can do."

But they can also get arrested. "We will be out next week without a permit, testing the law. We fully expect to be arrested for picketing without a permit," she said.

She said it was a matter of First Amendment rights.

Groups of six or more who wish to picket are required by a city ordinance to obtain a permit so that the city can avoid potential traffic problems, according to City Attorney

But she pointed out that the police only get involved if an individual engages in disruptive behavior such as trespassing, assault, obstruction and the like. She said the city stays within the First Amendment because

arrests are made only for conduct — not speech.

Gentry also said that the process of applying for a permit and the ordinance that requires one are both being reviewed by her office.

# Zoning plans debated at hearing


Public hearings on two controversial zoning proposals enlivened Tuesday night's Iowa City Council meeting.

Bob Vevera, of 2839 Friendship St., expressed frustration over a recommendation by the Planning and Zoning Commission to annex land east of Scott Boulevard for residential development.

Vevera, a former city council member, reminded the council that Scott Boulevard had originally been constructed to attract industry to that area of town and away from the Kirkwood area. "It took 20 years to get that bypass built, and the city spent lots of money to attract industry," Vevera said. "If we open it up, it will become like Highway 6 and in five years we'll need a new bypass. We'll put our children and grandchildren into debt."

Controversy was rekindled concerning 7,800 square feet of land at 1841 Lower Muscatine Road. The owner of the lot, Rex Brandstetter, of 1483 High Country Road in Coralville, has requested an ordinance to conditionally change the use regulations on the property, which is currently zoned as single-family residence.

Residents opposed to the change had intended to present a petition that would require an extraordinary majority vote of the council to approve the ordinance. The petition did not contain the requisite number of signatures, and the hearing has been held over until the June 26 meeting.

## CAMPUS RACISM

## Disturbing comments

On May 21, some Iowa newspapers carried a story by The Associated Press which included statements by Ann Rhodes, acting director of university relations. Rhodes suggested that racism motivated the group of students who blew the whistle on gross misappropriation of Student Senate funds by last year's Student Senate executives. Such comments are disturbing given Rhodes' visible position at the UI.

One of the purposes of education is to create awareness about philosophical and moral impediments to societal harmony, such as racism. Precisely because racism is such a serious issue, the term "racist" should not be applied to anyone without thorough consideration and substantial evidence. Rhodes seems to have neglected these considerations when making her comments.

The facts are simple. Every concern expressed by the Committee was supported by a report from the state auditor's office. Rhodes, however, told the AP that she and other university officials are "worried" about "whether there was racial motivation."

Why?

"Everyone the committee for ethics named were people of color," she explained.

Apparently Rhodes neglected to notice that Jenó Berta and Lori Meyers, both named by the Committee, are caucasian.

Questioning the inclusion of former Student Senate President Pepe Rojas-Cardona in the Committee's report, Rhodes asked, "Was it the fact that Pepe is so flamboyant? ... so visible? ... so arrogant? ... Or was it the fact that he's Hispanic?"

Or was it the fact that Rojas-Cardona abused his position and misused university funds? The state audit says that he did. It even suggests he committed forgery.

It is reprehensible that a university spokesperson would publicly slander a group who volunteered hundreds of hours to protect their tuition dollars, and those of every student on this campus, from documented abuse. If the committee had not been composed entirely of white students, Rhodes could not have expressed such unfounded suspicion. Her comments are contingent on nothing more than the color of their skin. And that is racism.

In the future Rhodes should acquaint herself with the facts before speaking on behalf of the UI. She should also consult a dictionary.

## FLAG BURNING

## Waste of time

The flag-burning controversy was supposed to be over. But with Monday's Supreme Court decision to overthrow the year-old federal law that made burning the U.S. flag a crime, the issue has been thrust once again into the spotlight. While the flag-burning concern is certainly one of significance to most Americans, it is not important enough to receive the attention it has.

Justice William Brennan defended the Court's decision by stating, "Punishing desecration of the flag dilutes the very freedom that makes this emblem so revered."

Brennan has a rational point, but the renewed presence of this issue in the media presents the risk of drawing attention away from concerns that are far more important. Bush has already announced his intent to use this issue to amend the Constitution and thus restrict the First Amendment for the first time in its 199-year history. Making changes in the Constitution for the sake of symbolism wastes both the time of the Supreme Court and the tax dollars of American citizens.

It would be foolish to argue that the flag-burning issue is not important to many Americans. The countless demonstrations and editorials about the subject reveal the passion for the flag felt in this country. But this passion, coupled with overemphasis by the media, has blown the issue tragically out of proportion.

Freedom of speech is vitally important to the life and character of the United States. Without it, this forum for criticism would not exist. The flag-burning issue, however, is not important enough to draw American attention away from concerns of more vital prominence. Tangible problems such as illiteracy, homelessness and terrorism warrant the attention of representatives in Washington more than idealistic arguments over a symbol.

# Asking the wrong questions

## Most children abducted by family, not strangers

Seeing the photos of Jacob Wetterling and John Gosch and all the other abducted youths on trucks and milk cartons and toll booth plazas leaves me with a singular feeling of helplessness. What can be done about these kidnappings? Though I doubted there was an answer, I did a little digging and found I was in fact asking the wrong question.

In May the Justice Department released the results of the first comprehensive study of missing children in the United States. Data were compiled based on phone surveys and tracking of police and FBI records for 1988. The missing children were categorized as either runaway, family abducted, non-family abducted, thrown away or lost. The final figures surprised even experts in child welfare.

According to the new study, the number of children missing in 1988 was estimated at 499,750, roughly 40 percent more than previous estimates. Of this figure, children abducted by family members comprised the largest group, totaling 163,200. Runaways were estimated at 133,500. Thrownaways, or children who left home involuntarily, numbered 59,200. Children abducted by non-family members — the Johnny Gosches — were estimated at between 200 and 300. Those lost or otherwise missing were estimated at 139,100. Bear in mind that these are conservative figures based on rigidly defined criteria.

Two hundred stranger abductions a year are too many, but that figure is nowhere near the 20,000 or 30,000 in our heads, misconceptions which have distorted the fear of abduction. Even Peter Schneider, the skeptic who propounded the "myth of missing children," estimated many more.

The mechanisms for prevention of this offense

are in place. Schools and parents teach "stranger danger". Children are told to not venture off alone, to say "no", to learn their phone numbers and dial an operator. Parents are told to keep current photographs and to write names and phone numbers in indelible ink on clothing tags.

A few years ago in Coralville a city-wide fingerprinting project was undertaken as a preventative measure to help identify the city's

children. Spokespersons for the Coralville and Iowa City Police Departments indicate that parents may bring their children in to be fingerprinted at any time.

Other than that, not much can be done. Just keep your eyes out for the children whose faces stare out from the trucks and milk cartons.

The figure that astonished the child welfare community was the number of family-member abductions. The typical scenario involves divorce or separation, when one parent takes the child in desperation, then conceals and transports the child out of state. Most often, the child is taken not out of love, but out of spite for the ex-spouse. An interminable divorce case, a contended judicial system, disputed custody or visitation can lead to the frustration ending in an abduction.


Runaways have been the subject of frequent studies in the past. The numbers in the Justice Department report coincide with previous estimates. But coupled with the family-member abductions and the children "thrown away", their multitude is symptomatic of the real problem with missing children. And this is where I asked the wrong question. The most significant problem is not what to do about the stranger in the car offering the child a ride home (we have that covered), it's what to do about the American family.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children was established by a mandate from Congress in the Child Welfare Act of 1984. The center primarily functions as a clearinghouse and resource center. It works closely with social and law enforcement agencies. Parents or children with a problem can contact the center for assistance at (800)843-5678.

Child Find is a not-for-profit organization located in New York. It specializes in finding children abducted by family members and assists families who have lost their children to strangers. But the staff at Child Find is most excited about their mediation services, which are offered to estranged parents battling for custody or visitation. By becoming involved before an abduction, they have a chance to encourage communication and amicability, possibly circumventing an incident. Child Find can be reached at (800)292-9688.

Fortunately, this new study has crystallized the missing child problem. Unfortunately, the problem begins at home.

# Peace requires world conference

When I first met Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in December of 1985 in Geneva, Switzerland, I came away impressed by his vision of the world. After having the privilege to meet with him again at a luncheon he hosted for American political leaders, entertainers and scholars during a recent summit in Washington, I am even more convinced of his commitment to world peace.

When we first met, he had the courage and boldness to step outside the assumptions of the old Cold War bureaucracies. I was in Geneva leading a delegation of United States peace activists who were supporting the first summit between Gorbachev and President Reagan. We had one million signatures on petitions urging a reduction in the

arms race. We hoped to present the petitions to both Gorbachev and Reagan. Our president refused to see us. But the man he labeled as the leader of an "evil empire" did see us.

Standing in a crowded rotunda inside the Soviet embassy, I saw Gorbachev at the other end of the hall. Before his stunned aides, our excited delegation and more than 100 press people, we greeted each other and held our talk there in the open, rather than in a private room. He accepted the petitions and we exchanged views.

In the years since then, Gorbachev has played a major role in planting new seeds of hope. It is as if he is adhering to the pleas of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who once said, "We must learn to live together as brothers and sisters or we will die apart as fools."

At the luncheon, which was attended by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, economist John Kenneth Galbraith and others, Gorbachev caught many of his guests off guard. Many of these advocates of the Cold War military buildup were stunned by his pronouncements that a new world order is before us. He talked about joint ventures in oil exploration and joint ventures on our environment and space development initiatives.

Without the threat of dropping any bombs, Gorbachev has helped bring the world from the brink of war to discussions of long-term peace. The world has indeed substituted hope for fear. We are moving away from nightmarish thoughts of nuclear war. We are moving toward finding new avenues to increase tourism and expand student exchange

programs between the two countries.

For this optimism to spread, however, it is important that world leaders convene and dialogue. Unfortunately, when Bush and Gorbachev hold summits, only a minority of the world is represented. Together, the Soviet Union and the United States comprise only one-tenth of the world's population. The point is that 60 percent of all human beings on earth are Asian; one-third of that 60 percent are Chinese. One-eighth of the human race is African; more than one-fifth of Africans are Nigerian. There are more than a dozen nations in the Middle East. There are 883 million people in India, 300 million more than the United States and the Soviet Union combined.

Two-thirds of our neighbors in the America's speak mainly Spanish and Portuguese. Most people in the world are yellow, black, brown, non-Christian, poor, young and don't speak English.

Our global village is not that big. Four years ago, when we first got word that there had been an accident at the Chernobyl nuclear plant, it was dismissed as a Soviet problem. But it was actually a problem of all the Soviet Union's neighbors. And later, cattle as far away as Oregon had health problems related to that accident.

If Bush and Gorbachev can meet to discuss matters that affect all of us on earth, then why can't the leaders of the Middle Eastern countries also be there? Why not have a delegation of African presidents at the negotiating table, as well as leaders of the Far East and Central and

South America? The ultimate peace agreement will be the one when the rest of the world is represented at the table.

This hope explosion is taking place at the right time in our history. It will inevitably have a providential impact on our national debate regarding the peace dividend, as we insist that the military budget be drastically cut and the benefits be directed to meet urgent needs at home.

The ultimate benefactors in this peace process will be the children of the world. They will no longer have to grow up burdened and fearful of nuclear war. That's why the decision to save the world should be a shared vision of all the leaders of the world.

# Branstad may block casino sale

DES MOINES (AP) — Gov. Terry Branstad on Tuesday said he would block any effort by Mesquakie Indians to buy the struggling Prairie Meadows horse track for use as a casino.

Branstad said he has "been very clear and very emphatic" in his opposition to expansion of legalized gambling, and that extends to converting Prairie Meadows into a casino.

"I will not support Indians buying land separate from their settlements or reservations," Branstad said. "I don't intend to support a casino purchased by the Indians at Prairie Meadows."

Branstad's position throws cold water on suggestions that the Mesquakie tribe could take the money-losing track and convert it to a hotel-casino complex.

The track has lost money since it opened last year and is being propped up by millions in subsidies from Polk County. County officials also have guaranteed \$40 million that was borrowed to build the track.

County taxpayers have been angry because they never were given a chance to vote on the question. Three county officials involved in the decision to guarantee the loans lost primary elections last week.

One member of the Mesquakie tribe suggested that the Indians could buy the track, convert it to a casino and end the possibility that taxpayers could be stuck with a big bill.

Branstad, who must approve Indian gambling operations, ended hope of that.

"I've been very clear and very emphatic about my opposition to expanding gambling in Iowa beyond what has already been authorized by law," the governor said.

Branstad said there's no difference between his opposition to a casino at Prairie Meadows and a proposal for the Santee Sioux to purchase land next to Bluffs Run in Council Bluffs to operate a casino.

"The difference is it's Polk County versus Pottawattamie County," said Branstad.

He said voters want a way out of paying for the track.

"I know there are some people in Polk County who are upset they didn't get an opportunity to vote on it," Branstad said. "I do support changing the law so that no major indebtedness of this kind can be incurred without a vote of the people."

Branstad said imposing the same limits on an Indian casino as those in the state's riverboat gambling law — \$5 per play and \$200 loss limits — would have no impact on his decision.

# ISEA backs Harkin for Senate race

DES MOINES (AP) — Leaders of Iowa's teacher union have voted overwhelmingly to endorse incumbent Democratic Sen. Tom Harkin's bid for a second term, campaign aides said Tuesday.

The decision will be announced at a news conference Wednesday, said the aides, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Iowa State Education Association endorsed Harkin in his 1984 race for the office when he first won election. There have been no major rifts between the two since then.

The decision will mean a \$10,000 contribution for Harkin and will give him access to the organizational resources of the 31,000-member teacher union.

Harkin is in a heated campaign with GOP challenger Tom Tauke.

The decision also returns the union to the Democratic fold where it lands most of the time in major elections. The teachers surprised and angered many Democrats when leaders last weekend decided to endorse incumbent Republican Gov. Terry Branstad over Democrat Don Avenson.

That marked the first time in 16 years the union had endorsed a Republican candidate for governor. Endorsing Harkin would ease the sting that move left with many Democratic activists.

ISEA officials defend their split decision, arguing that its members break down evenly by Republicans, Democrats and independents.

While the endorsement of Harkin is expected, it is valuable to his campaign.

# Branstad continues debating lieutenant governor decision

DES MOINES (AP) — Gov. Terry Branstad said Tuesday his decision on a lieutenant governor will not be disclosed until just before next week's Republican State Convention.

He said his lieutenant governor would have an "important and meaningful role" in state government and said he won't be looking just to further the political career of the person he picks.

"I don't intend to look at grooming somebody to run" as his successor, Branstad said at his regular news conference.

Branstad said he is considering both men and women for the job and refused to narrow the field of potential running mates.

His decision on a running mate is the last suspense in setting up this year's general election.

Democratic nominee Don Avenson picked Lt. Gov. JoAnn Zimmerman as his running mate, and she is expected to be confirmed at this weekend's Democratic State Convention.

There has been speculation that Branstad will pick a pro-choice woman to balance his own anti-

abortion views and diffuse that issue in the general election.

Avenson and Zimmerman are pro-choice.

Among the women mentioned as possible Branstad running mates are Cedar Falls Sen. Joy Corning and Bettendorf Sen. Maggie Tinsman. Men who are mentioned included Iowa Republican Party Co-Chairman David Oman and outgoing Senate Republican Leader Cal Hultman of Red Oak.

"I'll make the decision before the convention," Branstad said. "I don't have a short list. I don't intend to release names. I would expect it will be fairly close to the convention."

"I'm considering both men and women for the job," Branstad said.

He predicted his choice will win easy ratification at the GOP convention.

This year is the first that the lieutenant governor and governor candidates run as a team, and the new governor will decide on the role the lieutenant governor will play.

Avenson has said Zimmerman, a nurse, would head the Department

of Public Health in his administration.

Branstad said he was leaning toward making his running mate an adviser working out of his office and a representative at events he was unable to attend. He said the lieutenant governor would have a real role in state government.

"That's something to be worked out between the governor and lieutenant governor," said Branstad. "That person will work very closely with the governor and be part of the team."

Branstad said his pick would have a "responsible role as part of the administration. I want that person to play an important and meaningful role in the administration."

"I also want to visit with whoever I choose to see the role they want to play... so it's truly a team and so they have an input in those decisions as well," he said.

"I look at the lieutenant governor to have a responsible role as part of the administration," said Branstad. "I don't look at it just as something that's done to try to placate a group or anything like that."

reduced crop if not enough is used, according to Ken Choquette of the Iowa Department of Public Health.

Choquette said that new education efforts and equipment are steering Iowa's farmers in the right direction and teaching them to use fewer chemicals in a more efficient manner — such as waiting until after spring rains to avoid run-off.

He also said that repairs to older wells, especially the insertion of a steel or plastic casing to protect the top 20 feet of the shaft, can reduce

nitrate and virtually eliminate bacteria from the water supply.

As the public becomes more concerned with environmental issues, farmers and agricultural scientists are racing to catch up to new standards.

"It used to be that dilution was the solution to pollution," said Shires.

"If absolute purity is essential, then we have a problem," he said. "There's no such thing as total purity in water. Not even Ivory soap is 100 percent pure."

faculty or staff. New contracts will be given for current-semester texts only.

More than 1,100 contract holders have been sent letters informing them of the changes.

"Right now there are people with no relation to the university with books in the co-op," Taylor said. In the future, contract holders will not be allowed to have more than 50 books in the co-op at one time.

Instead of operating year-round, the co-op will only be open at the opening and closing weeks of each semester. Taylor said having the co-op open every day was the big financial drain. "The reason it suffered a financial loss is that it turned into a book store," he said.

The money saved in man-hours will benefit contract holders; the co-op will not have to take as large a percentage from each book sale.

"We're hoping to get it back down to 10 percent when we don't have to run it all year," Taylor said. Percentages currently run between 13 and 40 percent.

Steven Gray, coordinator of campus programs, is also pleased with the changes.

"I think it will help students to know that there are only current semester texts because they won't have to waste time leafing through old editions," he said.

In addition, the co-op will be moved to the Union's Lucas-Dodge Room.





# Bush pushes vote on flag amendment

WASHINGTON (AP)—President George Bush, saying flag desecration is "unacceptable and must carry a price," asked Congress on Tuesday to pass a constitutional amendment restoring special protection by the Fourth of July.

House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., said he would allow a vote within two weeks, but added that he would break tradition and vote on the measure himself in order to emphasize his opposition to what he saw as meddling with the First Amendment. Foley accused Bush of trying to "take political advantage" from an issue that goes to the heart of the Bill of Rights.

"What that flag encapsules is too sacred to be abused," Bush said at the White House after receiving on his 66th birthday a miniature replica of the Iwo Jima Memorial, the Marines' famed flag-raising sculpture.

Bush joined Republican lawmakers in demanding quick action from the Democrat-controlled House and Senate on the amendment, which would restore legal protections wiped out by Supreme Court rulings last June and again on Monday.

Foley said they would get their vote, but he also said he didn't like

what was being done in the name of patriotism.

"Every country has a flag. We are one of the few countries that has a Bill of Rights," he said before Bush spoke.

"To make it a partisan issue — to attempt to take political advantage out of a question that has a deep relevance to the protection of our constitutional integrity and to the protection of the First Amendment — is not in my judgment worthy of the president, and I'm sorry he's doing it," Foley said.

Bush said it was not a partisan issue, but he said "You're darn right" when asked if he planned to talk about the flag in the upcoming election campaign.

He said the amendment was "an American issue. And so I call on the Congress to act by July 4, this nation's birthday."

"The law books are full of restrictions on free speech and we ought to have this be one of them," said the president. Flag burning "endangers the fabric of our country and I think it ought to be outlawed," he said.

Bush said the amendment is "the surest, safest way to guarantee that while speech remains free, flag desecration is unacceptable and must carry a price."

# Senate fails to halt Bush Amtrak veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate failed to muster a two-thirds majority Tuesday to override President George Bush's veto of legislation providing federal support for the Amtrak passenger rail network.

The action kept Bush's streak of successful vetoes intact at 11.

The 64-36 vote to override the veto on Bush's 66th birthday was three votes shy of the two-thirds majority needed. Bush had vetoed the measure last month because he objected to a requirement tightening regulation of freight railroad ownership, and the House voted last week to override him.

Republicans maintained that Bush otherwise supported the \$2 billion Amtrak authorization provisions even though his and the Reagan administration before him have routinely proposed an end to federal subsidies for rail passenger service.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, voted to sustain the veto in a parliamentary move aimed at giving Democrats another shot at overriding the president.

Only a member of the winning side may ask a vote be reconsidered, and Mitchell

promptly did so, giving the Democrats time to try to switch votes. Another vote was not immediately scheduled.

The other 54 Democrats in the Senate voted for the override. They were joined by 10 of the 45 Republicans.

The vote "shows that we obviously had the strength," said White House spokesman Steve Hart. Earlier, White House officials had predicted a close vote.

Sen. Robert Kasten Jr., R-Wis., said a bill without the objectionable part has already been introduced in the House and was ready for Senate introduction if necessary.

"The fight is not over the funding of Amtrak," said Kasten, who led the Republican debate. Hart at the White House added, "If they send us the bill without the ICC provision, he'll sign it."

It was Bush's first veto of 1990. He returned 10 bills to Congress last year. None of them had been overridden.

The bill authorizes government subsidies for the passenger rail system for three years. It also includes a provision that allows planning for a commuter line between Washington,

D.C., and northern Virginia suburbs.

Bush vetoed the bill May 24 over a requirement that the Interstate Commerce Commission, which regulates railroads, must approve any acquisition of a major freight line by a company not in the railroad business. The commission already must approve the acquisition of one railroad by another.

Bush called it "an unwarranted regulatory roadblock to the financial restructuring of the railroad industry."

But Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., and other Midwestern lawmakers said that without closing that regulatory loophole, thousands of miles of track could be ripped up and be sold off to repay the debt incurred in a buyout.

"The president's veto is wrong in terms of passenger traffic in this nation," Simon said. "It is infinitely wrong in terms of the ICC approval."

"What we want to avoid is a situation where people come in and buy the railroad and then just dismember it," he said.

Sen. James Exon, D-Neb., argued that Republicans should put national interest over concerns with a favor for Bush.

# Jury selection for Barry trial continues

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jury selection ground through a seventh day Tuesday in Mayor Marion Barry's drug and perjury trial as top Barry aides said anew that he would announce he was abandoning his re-election plans.

He will do it, but the only question left is when," said one top Barry adviser, speaking only on condition of anonymity. "We're all waiting."

The mayor was meeting with his staff late Tuesday, but city officials said they expected only a routine discussion of city affairs.

Barry told his top advisers and fund-raisers at a meeting Sunday that he would give up his plans for a fourth four-year term. Several aides said the mayor was making the move in hopes of restarting stalled plea bargain talks in his case.

In courtroom proceedings Tuesday more people were assigned to a list of prospective jurors by U.S. District Court Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson. That brought to 68 the number of people accepted for the pool from which 12 jurors and alternates are to be chosen.

One woman included in the pool who she attended church three times a week and that she prayed for Barry.

She also works in the city Department of Human Services, but said she didn't know any of the more than 50 potential witnesses in the case. Those on the list include David Rivers, the former human services department chief who is on trial for alleged bribery and conspiracy in connection with city contracts. The judge said he was unable to conclude the woman was a witness. He said also that her prayers for the defendant were not incongruous with her assurances that she could be a fair and impartial juror.

Barry has pleaded innocent to 10 misdemeanor cocaine possession charges, one misdemeanor cocaine conspiracy charge and three felony counts of lying to a grand jury about his alleged drug use.

The judge has said he expects jury selection, which began June 4, to continue through this week.

# Joint Berlin government meets, will bring down rest of wall

EAST BERLIN (AP) — A single Berlin government met for the first time in four decades on Tuesday and decided to swiftly demolish the rest of the Berlin Wall.

City council members from both sides of the city gathered in East Berlin's historic Rotes Rathaus, a monumental red brick building that was the seat of local government for more than a century.

The two councils agreed to begin today the final demolition of the wall that split the city for 29 years.

"We are already now one city," said East Berlin Mayor Tino Schwierzina, who was elected in East Germany's first free local

elections in May.

One section of wall is to remain standing as a memorial to the people who were killed trying to flee from East Germany to the West.

The demolition is to be completed by July 2, when the two German states are to merge their economies in the major step to full unification.

The meeting of the West Berlin Senate and the East Berlin Magistrate was the first involving local officials from both Berlins since 1948, after Germany and its capital were both carved in two by the victorious World War II Allies.

The two councils, which meet separately once a week, plan to meet jointly every two weeks until full unification takes place and a single government is chosen in new local elections.

East Germany's former Communist government was toppled by mass protests in October and the wall was opened in November. Since then, Germans have been able to pass back and forth between the cities and the two nations.

Border crossings still are staffed by guards on both sides of the wall and cursory passport checks are still made. Foreigners can pass only through two

points.

Some of the most famous stretches of the Berlin Wall have already been demolished, but most of the wall still snakes around West Berlin.

Berlin was divided into four sectors following World War II, with the Soviets in control of the East and with France, Britain and the United States in control of the West.

East Berlin is the capital of East Germany, but West Berlin is still technically under military occupation and not part of the territory of West Germany.

The four Allies are expected to negotiate

an end to their direct involvement in the cities during the series of ongoing talks that also are dealing with the future strategic allegiance of a united Germany.

The Allies are to hold their next negotiations on June 22 in East Berlin.

"The unity process in Berlin is being carried out considerably faster than in any place else in Germany, but also the problems are greater than anywhere else," West Berlin Mayor Walter Momper told a news conference after the council meeting.

Last week, U.S. officials said they would take down Checkpoint Charlie

## Liberian government, rebels begin peace talks

FREETOWN, Sierra Leone (AP) — The Liberian government and rebels began peace talks Tuesday, and President Samuel Doe reportedly said he would welcome an international peace-keeping mission to his West African nation.

In Liberia, government officials took journalists to the international airport 35 miles from the capital to prove that, contrary to rebel claims, they controlled the airport.

The peace talks were held in the auditorium of the U.S. Embassy's cultural center in Freetown, and the Liberian Council of Churches was mediating.

They had been scheduled to start Monday but were delayed when rebel sources said their delegation was taking a roundabout route to avoid the danger of attack.

Sierra Leone's foreign minister, Abdul Karim Karim, opened the evening meeting by saying his government wanted an end to the 5½-month-old war, which has claimed more than 1,000 lives. Thousands of refugees have been crossing the Liberia-Sierra Leone border to escape the fighting.

After Karim's statement, Sierra Leone and

U.S. officials left and the Liberian delegations met behind closed doors.

The talks could break down if rebels stick to their demand that President Doe resign and leave the country before they will agree to a cease-fire.

Doe agreed to the talks after the rebels, led by former civil servant Charles Taylor, had advanced to within 25 miles of the capital, Monrovia. His troops, unable to halt the rebels since they invaded from Ivory Coast on December 24, were accused of killing hundreds of civilians believed to support the insurgents.

Liberian state radio Tuesday quoted Doe as saying he would welcome the presence of an international peacekeeping force in Liberia if one were agreed to at the Freetown negotiations.

The rebels had met little resistance until a week ago, when government troops managed to retake the headquarters of a U.S.-managed rubber plantation near the international airport.

Rebels claim to have subsequently retaken the plantation.

On Tuesday, a group of foreign reporters, accompanied by a Ministry of Information official, drove to Robertsfield International Airport, which is next to the plantation.

Reporters said they passed through several heavily manned checkpoints and that many soldiers guarded the airport.

They said they heard only the occasional sound of a gunshot in the area where residents have reported artillery and gun battles. Airlines halted flights to the airport June 3, a day before rebels overran the plantation.

More than 100,000 plantation workers and war refugees, including more than 20 expatriate managers, have been trapped by the fighting.

Expatriates have asked the U.S. Embassy to send a helicopter to evacuate them, but diplomatic sources said such action was not considered safe and noted that the embassy earlier had warned its nationals to leave.

The British Embassy announced Tuesday it was organizing a convoy to Sierra Leone today. More than 1,000 Britons remain in Monrovia.

## Israeli government rebuffs promise; West Bank population to increase

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's new right wing government said Tuesday it will spend more money on Jewish settlements in the occupied lands, rebuffing superpower demands for Israel to promise not to settle Soviet Jews in the territories.

Agriculture Minister Rafael Eitan, a member of the Cabinet's defense committee, said Israel should deport the leaders of the 30-month-old Palestinian uprising in the West Bank and Gaza Strip to quell the revolt.

The government, moving on its first working day, suggested Israel is set on a collision course with the United States.

Washington opposes deportations of Palestinians and the Jewish settlements of lands seized from Arabs in the 1967 Middle East war. It also has urged Israel to show restraint in dealing with the uprising against Israeli rule.

Since the rebellion began, 717 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli soldiers or civilians, and 45 Israelis have also died in the violence.

Israeli newspapers across the political spectrum were critical of the new coalition government, made up of 10 rightist and religious factions led by the Likud bloc of Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir. Parliament approved the government Monday.

Tuesday he would try to patch up strained relations with Washington, but did not elaborate.

Relations have been troublesome since Shamir, prodded by Levy and fellow hard-liner Ariel Sharon, rejected a proposal by U.S. Secretary of State James Baker for preliminary peace talks between Israelis and Palestinians in Cairo.

Ties have also been burdened by the stepped-up settlement activity fostered by Shamir's outgoing caretaker government, despite sharp objections from President George Bush.

Defense Minister Moshe Arens said in an unusually candid interview published Tuesday in Yediot Ahronot that Bush had "an obsession concerning the settlements" and suggested the president knew little about the subject.

"I'm not certain President Bush ever saw a settlement in his life," said Arens, the outgoing foreign minister. "He is among those who imagine a settlement as a place where a few guys sit in a small tent. He, like many others, doesn't know we are talking about a massive presence in Judea, Samaria and Gaza."

Judea and Samaria are the biblical

names for the West Bank, where about 70,000 Jewish settlers live alongside 1 million Arabs. About 7,000 Palestinians live in the Gaza Strip.

The Bush administration has demanded a halt to all settlements and specifically called for assurances that Israel not settle Soviet Jewish immigrants in the occupied lands.

Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev has also hinted he might slow Jewish emigration unless Israel promises not to settle Soviet Jews in the occupied lands.

More than 51,000 Soviet Jews have arrived since last year, and of those about 3,700 have settled in the West Bank and Israeli-annexed Arab east Jerusalem.

Sharon rejected the superpower demands Tuesday, saying Israel was a democracy and could not tell its citizens where to live.

"I don't think Israel has to make any declarations. Israel doesn't need any document of honesty," he said after taking office as housing minister.

Also Tuesday, the director general of the Interior Ministry, Dov Kehat, met with Jewish settlers in the Gaza Strip.

The independent *Haaretz* daily wrote that Shamir's proposed polices "will only worsen Israel's international isolation." The left-leaning *Al Hamishar* said they would "cause further incitement among the Palestinian population."

The conservative *Maariv* daily wrote that "no government in the country's history was born of greater sin than the present one."

Shamir's coalition was built with the help of defectors lured by promises of cabinet posts and money.

## 2 Live Crew records blacklisted in Texas

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — City police warned record stores Tuesday to stop selling the controversial album "As Nasty As They Wanna Be" by rap group 2 Live Crew or face possible obscenity charges.

"There's no prior restraint. We're just asking for voluntary compliance," said Lt. Jerry Pittman, commander of the vice squad.

In about five days, police will begin conducting undercover investigations and arresting anyone still selling the album, Pittman said.

"Unfortunately, when something like that occurs, the clerk that sells the record is often the one that gets arrested," he said. "I don't think the business owners want that."

Pittman said Bexar County Assistant District Attorney Mike Schill reviewed transcripts of the album lyrics and listened to them on tape before determining that some words violate state obscenity laws.

However, Schill, reached later by telephone, would say only that the lyrics in question could violate state obscenity laws.

"I have my opinion, but my opinion doesn't count," Schill said. "It's what the jury or the judge think." Schill said his role would be to decide whether to prosecute a case if police bring him one.

But, he added, "I think the federal judge in Florida was correct — which was that it's obscene."

In Florida last week, U.S. District Judge Jose Gonzalez ruled material on the album obscene under that state's law. On Sunday, two 2 Live Crew members were arrested on obscenity charges after performing the banned lyrics at an adults-only nightclub concert. Two days earlier, a record-store owner was arrested on an obscenity charge for selling the album.

The group's attorney, Bruce Rogon, said he filed an appeal Monday with the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta.

Pittman said, "We believe that it is obscene as well in the state of Texas," adding that the album describes "deviant sexual intercourse" and "is inundated with obscene language."

State law requires that someone convicted of selling obscene material be aware that it is obscene, Pittman said. He said officers are "diplomatically" going to about 84 local stores to explain what the album contains, and added, "We're getting compliance."

Sound Warehouse stores in San

Antonio removed the records Tuesday to comply with the law, said branch manager Mark Christy, who had a note from vice detectives saying the records contain obscene lyrics.

"I'm glad to see that they're doing it," Christy said. "I'm not one of the people for censorship, but I think this music is ridiculous."

Greta Colvin, manager of a Hasting's Records and Tapes, said local stores in that chain

also are removing the albums, but said she disagrees with police.

Colvin said officers came to her store Tuesday and asked her to sign a statement that she had been informed the lyrics violate obscenity laws. She said she told them that Hasting's rates albums and that any rated "R" may not be purchased by people under 18, but the officers didn't seem to care.

"It's censorship," she said. "If someone comes out with another song that somebody with a political influence finds offensive, they're going to come around again."

Pittman said he'd hoped to keep the police action out of the limelight at first to avoid publicity-booster sales.

The penalty for conviction of selling obscene material in Texas — a Class A misdemeanor — can be up to a year in jail and a \$2,000 fine.

2 Live Crew is to perform in Huntsville, Ala., on Saturday. City Attorney Clyde Blankenship said some lyrics on the album appear to violate the local obscenity ordinance, which the City Council on Monday night expanded to include live performances.

A local pastor threatened to block off the concert center with "a human ring" if the group is allowed to perform. But the council said it could not block the performance, which the band's promoter, Eddison Walters, said would be appropriate "for kids."

## Firefighters gain control of tanker flames

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — Firefighters on Tuesday boarded a burning supertanker and began gaining control of a fierce blaze that has left the oil-laden vessel crippled and leaking in the Gulf of Mexico, officials said.

A thick cloud of gray smoke surrounded the superstructure of the 886-foot Mega Borg, replacing the balls of flame and towering columns of black smoke that had been billowing from the Norwegian vessel since an engine-room explosion Saturday.

"The fire situation has improved," Coast Guard Capt. Thomas Greene said. "It's cooler, and you can see this by the gray smoke. The fire in the pump room is out."

"At this point, I'm encouraged by the progress that's been made. We're still not out of the woods yet, and I'm not going to sleep well yet until it improves more. There's still potential for major problems from (an oil) release."

The Coast Guard also revised its estimate of the amount of oil on the water to less than 2,000 gallons, a fraction of the 100,000 gallons officials estimated earlier. The amount that

had spilled from the tanker, which was carrying 38 million gallons of light African crude, was not determined.

Crewmen boarded the tanker to determine if it had cooled enough to be sprayed with flame-smothering chemical foam. Foam spraying has been delayed since Monday because the ship was too hot and crews feared another explosion even if the flames were doused.

Officials speculated it could take as little as an hour to pump the foam into the engine room and other burning areas.

"We're hoping the foam application is a success," said Coast Guard Petty Officer Howard Holmes. If it isn't, "we can't deny the fact that we could be in trouble, but we are optimistic that the foam will work."

Crews on Tuesday aimed 10 water streams from five fireboats stationed at the sides of the tanker, and firefighters had placed another water hose on the deck, pointing it toward the burning stern.

"They've kept applying water in great quantities, and it's continued to cool the structure,"

Greene said. "They'll continue to do that. There's progress being made. They're making ground."

Efforts to dissipate an oil leak apparently also were having some success. The oil slick around the ship diminished to 13 miles by five miles, Petty Officer Gene Maestas said. Most of what remained appeared in a light sheen with few heavy concentrations.

The ship is 57 miles southeast of Galveston. None of the spilled oil is expected to reach the coastline immediately.

"We're still not completely safe from a major release until the fire is out and the ship is stabilized and it is brought on an even keel," Greene said.

Once the fire was extinguished, ships were standing by to begin transferring the remainder of the Mega Borg's cargo of crude. Greene said that operation could be dangerous because the ship is listing slightly and crews might have to pump water into the holds to keep the vessel balanced.

## 2 people killed, 2 injured in fireworks plant explosion

COLUMBUS, Miss. (AP) — Explosions leveled a fireworks factory Tuesday, killing two people, injuring two others and shaking windows as far as 30 miles away, authorities said.

"It sounded like the biggest bomb that ever was," said Norma Oswalt who lives about three miles northeast of the plant. "It shook my back porch and shook the screens all over the house."

The names of the two people found dead were not immediately released. Both were believed to be employees at the Mid-South Pyrotechnics plant six miles southeast of this east-central Mississippi town.

Witnesses said plant owner Gene Beatty was slightly injured, and another person had been hospitalized.

"We felt two distinct booms, and the windows on the east side of our building, which is located in the center of campus, were rattled," said Sammy McDavid, spokesman for Mississippi State University, 30 miles to the west. "It did no damage here."

"It was one of those things that you say, 'What was that?'" Lowndes County Sheriff Ed Prescott said a one-mile evacuation was ordered immediately after the initial explosion for fear more blasts would occur.

"My concern is that there is another full ton of fireworks that haven't exploded there," said Prescott. "People in the area might be endangered."

Several smaller explosions were reported after emergency units arrived on the scene, authorities said, and the sounds of exploding firecrackers could be heard from the plant area several hours after the initial blast.

Representatives from the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms were dispatched to the

scene, said local Emergency Director Bennie McDow.

Authorities had no idea what might have sparked the explosion or how much gunpowder or chemicals were stored at the plant, McDow said.

In Elkton, Md., a fireworks plant exploded Tuesday afternoon, seriously injuring a worker, authorities said. The worker, whose name was not immediately released, suffered third-degree burns over 90 percent of his body, said Frank Muller Jr., Cecil County Emergency Management Services coordinator.

The worker was inside a building at the New Jersey Fireworks plant when the explosion occurred, witnesses said. He was flown to the Francis Scott Key Burn Center in Baltimore.

The first explosion occurred in a building used to make Roman candles. Fire then spread to a second building. Both buildings were destroyed, a fire department spokesman said.

## Penalty for beating flag burners lessened

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — A state Senate committee Tuesday approved legislation reducing to \$25 the maximum penalty for beating someone burning an American flag.

The panel's 3-2 vote came the day after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the federal flag protection act. The bill was approved by the state House in a 53-39 Memorial Day vote. The full Senate gets the bill next.

Rep. James David Cain said his bill was needed to demonstrate the people's desire for a constitutional amendment protecting the flag.

"The whole point of the bill is to send Washington a message to do something now," Cain told the committee.

Cain's bill would amend state laws on simple battery. The crime now carries a maximum \$500 fine and six months in jail. The change would specify that a person who commits simple battery on a flag burner would face no jail time and a maximum \$25 fine.

## Former FBI agent sentenced to 16 years

PIKEVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A former FBI agent pleaded guilty Tuesday to strangling a pregnant informant with whom he'd been having an affair, and was sentenced to 16 years in prison.

In a signed confession, Mark Putnam said he choked Susan Daniels Smith, 27, on June 8, 1989, "in an act of extreme rage" while the couple argued over support of her expected child.

Putnam, 30, of Sunrise, Fla., entered a guilty plea to one count of felony manslaughter in the June 8, 1989, death of Smith.

Immediately after the hearing, Putnam was handcuffed and taken into custody by Kentucky State Police officers.

It was apparently the first case in FBI history in which an agent had been charged with a homicide, said Terry O'Connor, the FBI's top agent in Kentucky.

The victim's family expressed outrage they were not consulted in the drafting of Putnam's plea bargain. They had wanted him to stand trial for murder.

The victim's sister, Shelby Ward of Freeburn, was cited for trying to conceal a .38-caliber handgun in the courtroom by Kentucky State Police, and was released.

## Deserter ready to turn self in

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Cleveland man who fled the Marines for Canada rather than risk being sent to Vietnam returned Tuesday to take his chances on military justice 21 years later.

Ron Jacko, 42, said he would turn himself in Wednesday at the Marine base in Quantico, Va.

He said he wants to clear the slate so he can be around when his mother needs him.

"I wasn't able to go home for my father's funeral," he said. "My mother's still alive, I'm an only child and she's about 74 herself right now. She just went through three operations in about the last six months."

"I don't want to be in a similar situation with my mom. I want to be able to be there."

Jacko said he opposed the war from the onset, but decided to enlist in the service in hopes of fulfilling his duty by pulling an assignment that didn't have direct involvement with Vietnam.

He first tried to join the Navy, but flunked the entrance exam. The Navy recruiter then referred him to the Marine recruiter.

The 21-year-old volunteer completed basic training and was assigned to communications school. That assignment convinced him he was likely to be shipped to Vietnam, so while on leave he went home, said goodbye to his family, and headed for Canada.

# AIDS infections on rise in developing countries

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rapid spread of the AIDS virus in developing countries means the disease will be more widespread in the next century than previously thought, the World Health Organization said Tuesday.

The current projection that up to 20 million people will have been infected by 2000 also is expected to be pushed up by a rise in heterosexual transmission of the disease in industrialized countries, said Michael Merson, director of the WHO Global Programme on AIDS.

"It is very unlikely that the global prevalence of HIV infection will stabilize or level off for at least several decades," he said.

WHO estimates that 6 million to 8 million people worldwide have been infected with the human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, that causes AIDS.

WHO considers its forecast that 15 million to 20 million people will be infected by the turn of the century to be a minimum estimate, and new projections won't be ready until late this year or 1991, Merson said.

"The global balance of HIV infection is rapidly tipping toward the developing countries," Merson said in an interview.

"In 1985, somewhere around 50 percent of the world total infections, we estimated, were in developing countries. But now we esti-

mate that by the year 2000, 75 to 80 percent will be in developing countries and by the year 2010 as much as 90 percent," he said.

"In addition, if HIV infections increase rapidly in Asia and Latin America, as they did in Africa, then the current projections of 15 to 20 million . . . will need to be revised significantly upward," he said.

Merson declined to estimate how high the projection could go.

The virus is spread mainly by sexual contact, needles or syringes shared by drug abusers, infected blood and blood products, and by pregnant women to their babies.

In the United States, most of the people with AIDS have been homosexual men and intravenous drug users.

However, Merson said that in industrialized countries — such as the United States — with inner city poverty and high rates of intravenous drug use and sexually transmitted diseases, heterosexual transmission is increasing. Spread of the AIDS virus is more likely when a sexually transmitted disease with open sores is present.

About 60 percent of HIV infections worldwide have resulted from heterosexual intercourse, but by the turn of the century, that proportion is expected to rise as high as 80 percent, Merson said.



# Ryan's no-hitter - a family affair

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Fourteen-year-old Nolan Ryan took his broken hand and rubbed the aching back of his father, 43-year-old Nolan Ryan.

"It was one wonderful sight," said Texas manager Bobby Valentine, who let Nolan Ryan's son, Nolan Reese Ryan, sit next to his father in the dugout Monday night in what turned out to be Ryan's sixth career no-hitter, a 5-0 decision over the Oakland Athletics.

"That's just the kind of kid he is, wanting to do anything to make me feel more comfortable," said Ryan, who became the oldest pitcher in major league history to pitch a no-hitter.

Ironically, the oldest previous to do it was the man after whom baseball's most prestigious award is named — Cy Young, who was 41 when he no-hit the New York Yankees in 1908 for the Boston Red Sox. Even more ironic is that the Cy Young Award is the one major honor Ryan has never won.

Ryan was making only his second start since spending 15 days on the disabled list with lower back pain. His son, though, was still disabled, having broken his pitching hand playing baseball with the Alvin, Texas, Pony-

Colt League White Sox team last week.

So instead of playing in the All-Stars tournament back home, Reese made the trip to Oakland with his parents and sister Wendy. "Mom" — Ruth Ryan — was in the stands watching Monday night, but Reese had the best seat in the house.

"My mom came down and said, 'Aren't you glad you broke your hand now?'" said Reese, who was helping clean out his father's locker after the game.

Reese, who was only five years old when his father pitched his last no-hitter in 1981, said he asked his dad if his back was bothering him when he sat next to him after the seventh inning and started rubbing his back.

"He told me it felt OK," Reese said. "Then after the eighth, he just came back, looked at me and smiled. I think he knew he was going to do it."

Reese said he could not remember his dad's 1981 no-hitter in Anaheim, but was around last season for a near-miss in Texas.

"I was in the nursery helping out with the kids the last time he had a no-hitter going," Reese said. "And by the time I got to the field, he lost it." Ryan lost a no-hitter in Arlington on Aug. 10, 1989 when Detroit's Dave

Bergman singled with one out in the ninth.

"This time, I made sure I stayed in the dugout and stayed in the same seats," he said. "I told the other batboys, 'Let's get a lot of (sunflower) seeds because I didn't want to leave my seat.'"

The Ryans named their second son after Jimmy Reese, a coach with the Angels when Ryan played there. "My dad was real fond of him. Since they don't want to call me Junior, they call me Reese," young Ryan said.

Ryan's oldest son, Robert, was at home watching the game on television with the mother of Ranger pitcher Jamie Moyer.

The senior Ryan said when school gets out every summer, he takes his family on the road as much as possible.

"They're very family-oriented in the Rangers organization," he said. "That was a very big factor in my decision to play here. You're gone from your family so much in this game, I want them with me every opportunity I can."

Asked how often family members get to sit in the dugout, Valentine said: "Not that often, but we might make it a different policy from now on."

# Americans expect tough matchup in World Cup soccer tilt with Italy

ROME (AP) — American soccer players would be wise to heed that old saying, "When in Rome, do as Romans do." In other words, play like the Italians.

Little was expected from the United States team making a return to the World Cup for the first time in 40 years, and little was produced in an opening 5-1 loss to Czechoslovakia.

Now, the Americans prepare for a far more difficult opponent. Italy is one of the World Cup favorites. It's unlikely the Italians will come into Thursday night's game at Olympic Stadium feeling they can coast and still match Czechoslovakia's achievement.

"We have our biggest challenge ahead of us against Italy and it's going to take our utmost best," said midfielder Paul Caligiuri, who scored the U.S. goal against Czechoslovakia. "I look at it as inspiration to play against the best in perhaps the most spectacular environment there will be.

"They're at home. They need to come at us. They're looking for a victory and, also, their fans are probably expecting a lot of goals. They probably want more than five goals to be better than Czechoslovakia."

The Italians insist complacency will not be a factor.

"The U.S. team played well enough in the first 10 minutes against Czechoslovakia, but I think they were a bit surprised by the strength of the Czech's counterattack," said midfielder Roberto Donadoni, one of the stars of Italy's 1-0 victory over Austria.

"They're an agile team, with some quick players. Their goalie is strong, but he committed some errors born of inexperience. We obviously have more to lose than to gain from beating them, and our biggest mistake would be to undervalue them.

"But it shouldn't be a problem if we come in with our concentration intact."

Azeglio Vicini, Italy's coach, isn't looking for a rout, either. "Surely the Americans are going to make some tactical changes, and we can't expect them to surrender five goals again," Vicini said. "We expect their goalie to make some good saves, while our attackers might miss some easy shots like they did against Austria."

Belgium missed shots early against South Korea, but wore down the Koreans and won 2-0 Tuesday on goals by Marc Degryse and Michel De Wolf. But the inspiration for

the victory came from Enzo Scifo, the enigmatic midfielder.

"I feel I am ready to play a leading role on the team. I am ready to take the responsibility," Scifo said after dominating the second half and setting up Degryse's goal. "I have that job at Auxerre (in the French league) and I could do it for the national team."

In Tuesday's night game, Egypt continued the trend of first-round surprises by rallying for a 1-1 tie with the Netherlands, holders of the European championship.

Magdi Abdel-Ghani converted a penalty kick with eight minutes remaining for Egypt's first World Cup goal in 56 years. The slow Dutch defense, trying to protect the lead, allowed swift striker Hossam Hassan to break free. Ronald Koeman pulled him down in the penalty area and Abdel-Ghani took the penalty shot, beating goalie Hans van Breukelen low to the left corner.

The Netherlands struggled for almost an hour against Egypt's conservative style before substitute Wim Kieft scored on a crossing feed from Dutch star Marco van Basten at 58 minutes.

"If, with the talent we have, we cannot win a match like this, then it is a debacle," Kieft said. "Their equalizer was well-deserved."

Five German fans arrested during Sunday's clashes with police in Milan were sentenced to two years in prison on Tuesday.

The chief of security with the West German squad, Willi Hennes, said that between 1,000 to 2,000 German rowdies have come to Italy for the championships. Hennes added that a few hundred troublemakers ignited Sunday's violence in downtown Milan and that at least 20 were from East Germany.

The West German team denounced those actions.

CHICAGO (AP)—A tape-recorded conversation with a University of Iowa basketball recruiter and player Deon Thomas supports NCAA allegations that Thomas received a cash offer to play for the Illini, a newspaper reported Tuesday.

Thomas discussed the offer in a telephone conversation with University of Iowa assistant basketball coach Bruce Pearl, who secretly recorded the comments and sent the tape to the NCAA, the *Chicago Tribune* reported in Tuesday's editions.

Spokesmen for the universities and Thomas all said the report was not new but declined to comment further on the matter. Thomas has said he received no improper offer

from the University of Illinois.

The NCAA also declined comment on the report.

"We do not make comments about specific cases until those cases have been fully processed," said Jim Marchiony, director of communications for the NCAA.

According to the newspaper, a transcript of the April 9, 1989, conversation reveals Pearl asking Thomas if he was upset about Illinois assistant basketball coach Jimmy Collins offering him \$80,000 and a car during a recruiting visit.

Thomas replied, "Yeah, somewhat," the *Tribune* said. When Pearl asked if the offer turned him off, Thomas replied, "No, not really," the paper said.

The comments came in a phone call Pearl had made to Thomas after the player backed out of a recruiting visit to Iowa, according to the *Tribune*.

The NCAA is investigating Illinois' recruitment of Thomas from Chicago's Simeon High School, and the recruitment of Notre Dame's LaPhonso Ellis from East St. Louis' Lincoln High.

After Thomas became the focus of the NCAA investigation, he said it was Pearl, not Collins, who made the offers to him.

During his telephone conversation with Thomas, Pearl asked if he had offered the recruit anything beyond helping him get a good summer job, the newspaper said.

Thomas said yes, but his response

when Pearl asked him to explain is unintelligible on the tape, the *Tribune* said.

Pearl then asked "Beyond a good job?" and Thomas replied "No," according to the newspaper.

Pearl declined to discuss the tape, saying he wouldn't comment until after the Illinois case is resolved, the *Tribune* said.

Iowa spokesman Steve Malchow said Pearl was on vacation Tuesday and unavailable for comment.

Malchow said the existence of Pearl's tape and the alleged comments Thomas and Pearl made have been reported previously.

"That's been old news for months," he said by telephone Tuesday from his Iowa City office.

But Malchow said he had not heard the tape and did not know what was said during the conversation.

Pearl has previously denied any improprieties with Thomas.

Thomas has publicly maintained that he didn't receive any illegal offers from Illinois. His attorney, Steven Beckett, declined to comment "Beyond what I have said in the past."

"In the past I had remarked that Deon has stated publicly that when Mr. Pearl called and did this conversation it was in the evening, Deon was trying to do his homework, (Deon) attempted to be polite and get the gentleman off the telephone," Beckett said by telephone Tuesday.

"He acknowledged that it sounds like on the tape that he acknowledges he received an offer. But he maintains he did not receive an offer," Beckett said.

Illinois spokesman Mike Pearson declined to discuss the report.

"Our people won't make any comments on the case until it goes before the (NCAA) infraction committee in August, Pearson said.

The NCAA could not be reached for immediate comment Tuesday. A secretary in the public relations office said spokesman Jim Marchiony was the only one who could discuss the matter but that he was not in the office. He did not immediately return a telephone message.

## Hawk ace signs with Dodgers as free agent

Iowa senior John DeJarld's summer break hadn't started out well.

After winning the regular-season league baseball title, the Hawkeyes finished third at the Big Ten Tournament, then went on to lose both games at the NCAA Regionals.

And the major league draft began June 4 and finished several days later without a phone call to the Hawkeye hurler... until Tuesday morning.

That was when Los Angeles Dodgers Midwest scout Glenn Van Poryen invited DeJarld to sign with his club.

"I watched John when he played in high school and then four years at Iowa, and he's a very, very good pitcher," Van Poryen said. "His fastball's a little short of what we consider major league standards, but he's a great competitor and has great control."

"We needed three or four more free agent pitchers and his name was at the top of my list."

Although DeJarld wanted to play baseball professionally, he was planning to turn Van Poryen down — or at least negotiate. But when the scout made his offer, DeJarld accepted it immediately.

"I wasn't going to (accept) at first," the Joliet, Ill., native said. "I thought he was just going to offer me a plane ticket to get there. But he put together a pretty good deal. He had talked to some guys that got picked in the lower rounds

(of the draft), and it's more than what some of them got.

"... When he gave me the offer, I didn't think I was worth more than that. I'm pretty happy with it."

DeJarld was one of several Hawkeyes expected to be drafted in the beginning of June. Only two of those players — juniors Tim Costo and Chris Hatcher — were picked. Hatcher — a 6-foot-4, 220-pound

outfielder — signed with the Houston Astros last weekend after being drafted in the third round. He will begin his career at the Astros' Auburn, N.Y., club in the New York-Pennsylvania League.

An all-American shortstop, Costo was the school's highest-ever draft pick when he was chosen eighth by the Cleveland Indians. But he has yet to sign with the club.

"I'm holding out for the toaster oven," he said Tuesday from his parents' home in Glen Ellyn, Ill.

Costo and his parents are scheduled to meet with Cleveland scouting director Chet Montgomery this week.

"I'm happy that I'm going to play, but I was shocked when I heard I didn't go in the regular draft," DeJarld said. "I thought with my

stats, I would be drafted."

"It did surprise me a little that with all the players drafted, he wasn't picked," Van Poryen said. "But it doesn't make any difference where you start; it's where you end up that matters."

DeJarld — a first team all-Big Ten selection — ended the conference season with a league-leading rec-

Ripken, who went 0-for-4 and is batting .213, moved past Everett Scott into second place on the all-time consecutive games list. Lou Gehrig leads with 2,130, meaning Ripken must play every day until mid-1995 to break the record.

Brewers relief ace Dan Plesac took over to start the ninth with a 3-2 lead. He retired the first two batters before Tettleton, after hitting a long drive that hooked foul, connected for his eighth home run.

**Blue Jays 5, Twins 4**  
MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Second baseman Fred Manrique's three-base error allowed the Toronto Blue Jays to score two unearned runs in the seventh inning and defeat Minnesota Twins 5-4 Tuesday night, the Twins' fifth straight loss.

It was the first Metrodome victory in seven tries dating back to July 27, 1988, for Toronto. The Blue Jays have won five of six overall and are 9-2 in their last 11 road games.

The Twins have followed their best May ever (21-7) with a 2-8 start in June.

## Portland's last shot too late; Pistons grab 3-1 lead in Finals

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Detroit Pistons took command of the NBA Finals Tuesday night, when Isiah Thomas took command in the second half.

Thomas, whose bank shot with 26 seconds remaining enabled the defending champions to hold off a desperate rally and beat the Portland Trail Blazers 112-109 for a 3-1 lead in the best-of-7 championship series.

The outcome was in doubt for just a few seconds after the game as Danny Young's 3-point attempt went in but was ruled after the buzzer after a discussion by the officials.


Thomas scored 32 points in the game, 22 in the third quarter, to seemingly put the Pistons in control as they extended a five-point halftime lead to 81-65 with 2:16 left.

Portland, which got 34 points from Clyde Drexler and 33 from Jerome Kersey, responded with an 8-0 run to close the gap to eight, then rallied further in the fourth quarter, taking the lead on a baseline jumper by Terry Porter with 5:21 to play.

The lead changed hands five times before Detroit's Joe Dumars hit two free throws to make it 98-97 with 3:47 to go.

The Pistons stayed in front until Drexler, who was 14-for-19 from the field, made two free throws with 31 seconds left for a 107-106 lead.

Porter then lost control driving to the basket and Thomas was fouled after picking up the loose ball. He made both free throws with 8.4

## Henderson nabs two to reach No. 900

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Rickey Henderson of the Oakland Athletics became the third player in major league history to steal 900 bases in a career Tuesday when he stole two bases in the first inning of Tuesday's game with the Texas Rangers.

Only Lou Brock, the all-time leader with 938 career stolen bases, and Billy Hamilton, who stole 937 bases before the turn of the century, have stolen more bases.

Henderson, 31, who broke Ty Cobb's 62-year-old American League record for career steals on May 28, reached first with a leadoff walk, and stole second on Bobby Witt's first pitch to Willie Randolph.
