Bush requests forgiveness of Egyptian debt

President wants write-off as thank-you for gulf aid

WASHINGTON—President Bush will ask Congress to write off Egypt's \$7 billion military debt to the United States as "a symbol of our appreciation" for help in the Persian Gulf crisis, the White House said Tuesday.

Meanwhile, Secretary of State James Baker gave Congress a ringing defense of the Bush administration's decision to pour troops and weapons into the Middle East, saying the United States had to

react vigorously to "one of the defining moments of a new era."

He noted that economic effects of the crisis already are being felt, in such ways as higher gasoline prices, but he said the issue was hardly that narrow.

"It is, rather, about a dictator who, acting alone and unchallenged, could strangle the global economic order, determining by fiat whether we all enter a recession or even the darkness of a depression," Baker told the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Baker also said the administration would consider "working with others to create a new security structure for the region," lasting beyond the end of the current crisis.

He gave little detail on how such an organization might work, though he pointed to success by NATO in curbing Soviet expansion during the Cold War.

Presidential Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Bush already

had consulted with members of Congress about forgiving Egypt's military debt and felt confident they would give the required approval. But Patrick Leahy, chairman of a Senate foreign aid panel, said the debt forgiveness would lead to similar requests from other nations and "I'm not willing to double or triple our foreign aid budget without a lot more understanding of what the United States gets out of it."

House Republican Leader Bob Michel, too, said the White House announcement "may be a little premature." He added, "I would like to hear firsthand from the administration the rationale" for the move.

Fitzwater said, "This decision, one stimulated in part by Egypt's leadership in resisting Iraqi aggression, is an essential component of the ongoing U.S. contribution to the current situation in the Persian Gulf."

In a White House briefing the day after Bush returned from his Kennebunkport, Maine, vacation, Fitzwater also said on other Persian Gulf topics:

■ There "is no conflict with the Saudis" on ultimate control of the operations of U.S. forces stationed in Saudi Arabia. He said the United States would not launch an offensive operation without consulting the host country, but he insisted that the chain of command for U.S. forces remains unchanged — from the president through the secretary of defense and to the commanders.

■ The U.S. Navy had stopped and boarded a tea-laden Iraqi-flagged freighter in the Gulf of Oman as part of the trade blockade against Iraq. The spokesman said, "The ship was ordered to divert. It did

Sailors board Iraqi freighter shipping tea


MANAMA, Bahrain — U.S. Navy and Coast Guard sailors boarded an Iraqi-flagged freighter in the Gulf of Oman early Tuesday as it was sailing to an Iraqi port with a cargo of tea.

The sailors planned to stay on the ship, the Zanoobia, and escort it to another port, the officials said. Thirteen hours after the boarding, U.S. military sources said officials had not yet designated where the freighter would go.

After Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait, the U.N. Security Council endorsed an economic embargo against Iraq and subsequently approved the use of force to back it up.

The 3,549-ton freighter was first challenged by radio by the USS Goldsborough when it reported it was bound for the Iraqi port of Basra with a cargo of tea.

Navy officials, reading from a Pentagon announcement, said the boarding took place after the vessel refused orders from the Goldsborough to either return to its port of origin or proceed to a non-prohibited port.



Shipping sources in the region had said the vessel, en route from Sri Lanka, was stopped before it could reach the Strait of Hormuz, the gateway to the Persian Gulf.

"The team met no resistance and they will remain aboard the ship until it reaches its due destination," the Pentagon statement said.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the U.S. Navy stopped and boarded the tea-laden Iraqi-flagged freighter in the Gulf of Oman as part of the trade embargo against Iraq.

"The ship was ordered to divert. It did not divert. It was then boarded and now has diverted," the spokesman said. "We don't have information now on where it's being diverted to."

Tuesday's incident was the first publicly acknowledged boarding by U.S. forces of an Iraqi-flagged vessel since the U.N. embargo was clamped on Iraq last month. But U.S. military sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, indicated that might not be the case.

They said Pentagon listings show more than 450 vessels have been challenged by radio by U.S. warships and that "less than 20 had been boarded, and less than five diverted."

When pressed as to whether other Iraqi-flagged vessels were involved, they said the records were not broken down by nationality.

The only other ship publicly reported to have been boarded by U.S. forces — and subsequently prevented from docking — was the 91,478-ton Kota Wirama, managed by the Pacific International Lines of Singapore.

Troops add to death toll in townships

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Soldiers fired on thousands of angry blacks Tuesday and rival gangs fought with axes, knives and spears as at least 40 people were killed in township violence.

The violence came as President F.W. de Klerk and African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela visited black townships near Johannesburg to call for a halt in fighting that has killed more than 550 people since Aug. 12.

The government has imposed emergency restrictions and has sent elite army units to the townships, but fighting between Zulu followers of the conservative Inkatha movement and other blacks loyal to the ANC raged for a fourth week.

In Sebokeng, a pre-dawn clash killed four people at a migrant worker hostel, police said. The victims were believed to be township residents abducted by hostel dwellers.

About 5,000 township residents angered by the killings gathered at the hostel, police said.

When the mob refused to disperse, army troops were called in and a "shooting incident occurred," said police Col. Frans Malherbe. "The bodies of 11 persons were found

after the mob dispersed."

South African newspaper photographer N. Khumalo told the South African Press Association that "people came toward (the soldiers) waving their hands, saying 'peace, we are not fighting.' Some of them even sat down."

The troops "took up position, cocked their guns — I thought maybe they wanted to scare the people," Khumalo was quoted as saying. "All of a sudden there was shooting. Many of the people ran. Some of the people fell."

The shooting marked the first time soldiers have been involved in a clash that has resulted in a loss of lives since they were deployed last month in the townships.

In March, police opened fire on black demonstrators in Sebokeng, killing at least five and wounding more than 150. A judicial inquiry criticized police for the killings, saying gunfire was unjustified.

Malherbe said both police and military were investigating Tuesday's shootings.

A later police report Tuesday put the Sebokeng death toll at 36, with the other killings occurring in sporadic clashes near the hostel and adjacent areas. Police said more than 150 people were arrested.

Black crowds also stoned journalists in Sebokeng and burned one reporter's car.

South African editor visits UI, talks of ethnic errors in press

The American press has inaccurately portrayed the recent clashes in his country as tribal violence, rather than political fighting, the editor of a South African newspaper said Tuesday.

But David Wightman, managing editor of *The Daily News*, the main paper in Durban, said during a visit to the UI that press coverage of South Africa has been fairly accurate.

"Generally speaking, American press coverage is not bad," he said. "Sometimes television coverage, which concentrates so much on the visual image... gives a superficial picture of what's happening. But I

think the press is fairer."

Wightman said the struggles between members of the conservative Inkatha movement and the more radical African National Congress are not merely ethnic struggles, because the division between the groups does not strictly follow ethnic lines. He added that Zulus are often on both sides of the clashes.

Wightman believes the violence stems from competition between the two factions over "just who is going to sit down at the negotiating table" with South Africa's white leadership, as the country prepares to develop a new government.

He also predicted violence would diminish once democratic negotiations and the construction of a new

constitution begin, which he believes will occur by early next year.

Asked if the principle of one-man, one-vote could work in South Africa, Wightman said he believed it could.

"I'm cautiously optimistic that a democratic solution will be found that will satisfy the people of South Africa," he said. "And the world outside."

Wightman said since the government of F.W. de Klerk legalized the ANC and lifted most of the constraints that existed during the state of emergency, working in journalism has been more rewarding.

Under the old system, journalists

Phone survey reveals discrimination

IOWA CITY — Discrimination and harassment against minorities is prevalent among students and faculty at the UI and off campus as well, a survey shows.

The telephone survey of 607 university and non-university residents was conducted in the spring of 1989 by the university's Social Science Institute to determine racial attitudes in the community.

It indicates that about half of all minority student and staff members and one-third of minority

faculty and community residents responding to the survey reported being victims of racial discrimination or harassment during the past three years.

Students and faculty members said education was one way to overcome prejudices.

"Eight in every 10 students surveyed support a general education requirement in race relations, and another 80 percent favor a GER relating to Third World cultures," it said. "Almost two-thirds (60 percent) support a GER in both."

The majority — 75 percent — of faculty respondents said they support a GER course in race relations of minority cultures, the survey said.

Prosecutor: Shooting was gang-related

WATERLOO—The prosecutor in the first-degree murder trial of Daniel Maurice Claybon said in closing arguments Tuesday that Claybon shot and killed Jeffrey Dean Wood to promote a gang.

Black Hawk County Attorney Tom Ferguson said Claybon wanted to make the name of the Black Gangster Disciples better known.

"What better way than to go out and shoot an innocent person in an area of town where it is less likely to happen?" Ferguson asked jurors who were hearing closing statements in district court.

Wood, 24, was shot the night of March 11 while he walked with his fiancée, Andrea Hurley. He died later at a hospital from a small-caliber bullet wound to the heart.

Authorities charged Claybon, 18, with shooting Wood in what they say was an unprovoked attack. Prosecutors say Claybon was riding in a car with companions and that they "stalked" Wood and Hurley.

"Everyone in that car knew what was going to happen," Ferguson said.

In his closing argument, defense attorney Brad Harris repeated an earlier plea for the jury to look at

the evidence and not get caught up in the emotions of the "senseless act of murder."

"What happened there was a stupid, senseless act," Harris said. "Jeffrey Dean Wood is dead and your verdict is not going to bring him back."

Harris said the state had not proven its case, and he pointed to what he said was inconsistent testimony from prosecution witnesses, including two who were granted immunity from prosecution in return for their testimony.

The attorneys' remarks came on the seventh day of the trial. The jury began deliberations Tuesday afternoon.

Hurley testified at the trial that she and Wood were out walking in her neighborhood on an unusually warm night when they were con-

fronted by two men. She said Wood was pushed against a house and then shot. The two men, who had been joined by a third, ran into the street and were joined by companions.

Ferguson told a packed courtroom in a nearly hour-long closing argument that the act was totally unjustified and that no one testified in the trial that anyone but Claybon was the man who killed Wood.

The trial began with jury selection Aug. 21.

Keith C. Walker is scheduled for trial Oct. 30 on first-degree murder charges in Wood's death.

Richard L. Smith and Harry B.

Johnson also are expected to stand trial in connection with the shooting, but no trial date has been set.

Derrick Wilder testified last week he was kicked out of the gang after he gave information to police about the shooting. The 17-year-old said he remembered Claybon saying he "wanted to shoot somebody in the head."

Police Chief Bernal Koehrsen said in an interview that he does not believe gang activity is widespread in Waterloo.

"Just because kids say they are members of a gang doesn't make it so. There is no organization. There is no true leadership element yet," he said. "They are wanna-bes."

A 21-year-old Iowa City man was charged with third-degree criminal mischief Sunday.

According to Johnson County District Court records, John P. Frey, 625 S. Clinton St., Apt. 3, was throwing steel horseshoes and rocks at vehicles near 700 S. Clinton St. Frey admitted to damaging the vehicles, records state.

Frey has been released on his own recognizance. A preliminary hearing has been set for Sept. 20.



Israeli professor: Crisis may lead to Arab peace

The latest Middle Eastern crisis presents an opportunity for a lasting Arab-Israeli peace, according to a former Israeli government adviser who spoke in Iowa City Tuesday.

Moshe Ma'oz, professor of Middle Eastern History at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, addressed about 75 people Tuesday evening at the Hillel House, 122 E. Market St., on the effects the current situation in Iraq will have on Israel.

Ma'oz, who has advised several Israeli governments and parliamentary committees, has also served in the Israeli Defense Forces as a colonel and is a former director of the Harry S. Truman Research Institute for the Advancement of Peace.

"The Almighty decided at some time that we (Arabs and Israelis) have to be stuck together. We better make the best of it," Ma'oz said, advocating a plan proposed by

U.S. Secretary of State James Baker to "negotiate for negotiations."

"Arabs want a litmus test for other Arabs," he said. This particularly relates to the issue of Palestinian sovereignty, he said.

Because Arab leaders want to finally settle this issue, Ma'oz said Israel can use the Golan Heights and the West Bank to secure order and a peace plan based on the Camp David model.

The opportunity for negotiations arises now because other Arab leaders fear Saddam Hussein, Ma'oz said.

"The Syrians fear Iraq more than Israel. This is also a personal rivalry between President Asad of Syria and Hussein of Iraq," he said. "Hussein doesn't forget the massive aid Syria provided Iran and still blames Syria for one-half million casualties in the war."

Ma'oz suggested two possibilities for Israel — intervening or relishing the focus on Arab militancy as the cause for Middle Eastern strife.

Avenson, Branstad launch positive TV campaign ads

DES MOINES — Don Avenson and Terry Branstad, rivals for governor, have opened their television commercial campaigns with relatively positive ads focusing on their achievements and families.

Branstad joined the fray on Tuesday with a 30-second commercial boosting his role in developing the state's economy. A commercial with a similar theme will begin today.

Avenson began his drive late last week with one commercial introducing voters to his family and another featuring Avenson talking about his efforts to push clean water legislation.

Both campaigns are running their commercials throughout the state. Avenson initially launched his effort in Sioux City, Mason City, Waterloo and the Quad


Cities, moving this week into other Iowa markets.

Neither camp would detail plans for the fall television campaign, but it's likely that they will be running commercials more or less constantly until the Nov. 6 election.

For incumbent Republican Branstad, campaign manager David Roederer said the television spots build on radio commercials the campaign began last month underscoring Branstad's efforts to manage the state during the economic turmoil of the 1980s.

"No final decision has been made" on advertising strategy, Roederer said. "It will be a mix of television, radio and newspapers."

For House Speaker Avenson, the commercials are designed to soften his image by playing on his family and connection to popular environmental programs, said spokeswoman Susy Robinette.

Chism sentenced for willful injury

Michael Chism was sentenced to "up to 10 years" in prison on Aug. 31 for willful injury for the Feb. 12 shooting of a man in Coralville.

According to Johnson County District Court records, Chism is "not eligible for probation because this was a forced felony." Chism has also been ordered to make restitution of \$4,089.39 in damages to the

victim. He will serve a minimum sentence of five years, though the court has given him credit for 49 days already spent in custody of the sheriff of Johnson County, records stated.

Chism, 32, of Oxford, Iowa, was charged Feb. 12 with the shooting of Larry D. Etten, 29, of Mason City, Iowa. Chism shot Etten with a 12-gauge shotgun, repeatedly hit him with the butt of the gun and

kicked him while the two were in the parking lot of Hawk-I Feed & Relay Station, 903 First Ave., Coralville, after reportedly finding Etten with his wife at the truck stop.

Etten was found by police at 3:15 a.m. in a semiconscious state and was taken to the UI Hospitals and Clinics Emergency Treatment Center, where he was treated and released.

not divert. It was then boarded and now has diverted. We don't have information now on where it's being diverted to."

Some planeloads of cargo, reported to be food, have violated the international trade embargo against Iraq, and trucks continue to make it through the leaky border with Jordan, but those leaks are not enough to significantly harm the overall effectiveness of the embargo.

Regarding Egypt, Fitzwater said that nation has shown "courage, determination and consistency" in its cooperation with the U.S.-led resistance to Iraq's President Saddam Hussein.

"It is a symbol of our apprecia-

tion" for Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak's role, he said of Bush's proposal to forgive the military debt.

Members of Congress also sounded appreciative of Egypt's role but suggested the White House was moving too quickly.

Leahy, D-Vt., whose Senate foreign aid subcommittee must be involved in any proposal to forgive military debt, predicted that such a major step as forgiving \$7 billion would trigger similar requests from Israel, Turkey, Greece, the Philippines, Morocco and Pakistan, among others.

"I know it's going to be necessary to increase some foreign aid dollars as a result of Operation Desert

Shield," he said in an interview. But he added, "It looks like some in the administration are saying let's have a blank check for foreign aid. I want to remind them that my subcommittee's still got the check-book."

He said forgiving the \$7 billion debt would mean the U.S. Treasury would forgo a payment of \$750 million this year, which would have contributed to the efforts to reduce the federal deficit.

The administration wants to go ahead with the debt forgiveness, he said, because "it's important. It's a small price to pay for the level of cooperation we've gotten from Egypt."

"incomplete" grades.

"An incomplete grade is an interim grade and can be completed later if that is arranged with the instructor," Dallam said. "We're trying to be as accommodating to the students as possible."

Dallam said this policy was recently developed by the three Iowa regent institutions after officials decided such a policy might be necessary in the future.

"We decided to develop this policy because it was our impression that it was an event some students here would be concerned about," he said.

"Other universities across the country have done something similar — developing similar policies," he added.

Peter Sliwa, a UI sophomore and

Marine Corps Reservist from Bluegrass, Iowa, welcomed the news but admitted he hadn't really thought about getting his tuition money back if he were called to active duty in the Middle East.

"I think it's a good idea," Sliwa said. "But I haven't really thought about what I would do if I got called over."

"(The tuition) doesn't make any difference to me, but the government should have something to say about my tuition money if I get called over," he added.

Dallam couldn't recall if a similar tuition refund policy had been adopted during any past crises.

"This is the first time to my knowledge, but it was probably done as units were called to active duty during the Vietnam War," he said.

Despite persistent instances of racial discrimination or harassment, survey participants still indicated that progress on race relations over the past few years was better in the community and on campus than in the country as a whole.

"The organization most frequently cited by community residents as having done the most in recent years to help minority groups get ahead in this community is the University of Iowa (endorsed by 46 percent) with businesses or local governments cited least frequently (3 percent each)," the survey said.

Yet a large number of UI minority staff respondents, including 84 percent of blacks, 57 percent of


Asians and 44 percent of Hispanics, thought the UI administration is not doing enough to ensure equal employment opportunity, it said. Slightly more than 25 percent of white respondents agreed.

The survey indicated that 83 percent of UI staff respondents think that some groups are not well-represented in supervisory or professional positions. One-third believe that preferential recruitment is needed to correct the problem, but nearly half advocate adherence to merit standards, it said.

Two-thirds of faculty surveyed feel minorities in their field are treated the same as others doing the same quality of work.

Judicial screening panel gives Souter top rating

WASHINGTON — The American Bar Association's judicial screening panel Tuesday gave Supreme Court nominee David Souter its highest rating for professional qualifications to sit on the nation's highest court.

The well-qualified rating is reserved for those who meet the highest standards of integrity, professional competence and judicial temperament, according to the guidebook followed by the 15-member Standing Committee on Federal Judiciary.

The committee vote was unanimous, the panel said in a letter to the Justice Department.

The rating is expected to give a boost to Souter's nomination, scheduled to be taken up Sept. 13 by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Still, Souter is expected to be questioned closely about his judicial philosophy, and Senators are expected to try to probe his views

on the landmark 1973 ruling that legalized abortion.

Souter received a similar well-qualified rating before being confirmed earlier this year to sit on the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Boston, but the ABA panel applies different standards for Supreme Court nominees.

As part of the most-recent ABA study, two teams of law professors at Stanford and Northwestern universities reviewed Souter's legal writings as a New Hampshire Supreme Court judge and New Hampshire state attorney general.

Another review was conducted for the ABA by a group of lawyers headed by former solicitor general Rex Lee, now president of Brigham Young University.

The legal writings of Souter, a Rhodes Scholar who graduated from Harvard Law School, provide few clues to his thinking on such pressing issues as abortion.

The chairman of the ABA panel, Ralph Lancaster Jr., told Deputy Attorney General William Barr of

the rating in a brief letter released by the Justice Department.

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, attending a law enforcement conference in Seoul, South Korea, issued a statement saying the rating confirms that Bush "has selected a man of superb intellect and qualifications."

The White House also welcomed the ABA's seal of approval.

"The president is pleased to receive this news and looks forward to a speedy confirmation," said White House Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater.

Prosecutor calls for rehearing

WASHINGTON — Iran-Contra prosecutor Lawrence Walsh sought a rehearing Tuesday of the split federal appeals court decision that set aside former White House aide Oliver North's three felony convictions.

The independent counsel petitioned the three-judge panel, which voted 2-1 to vacate North's convictions, to reconsider its decision and

suggested that the case be heard by the full 12-member U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia.

In a tartly worded petition, Walsh accused Circuit Judges Laurence Silberman and David Sentelle of incorrect legal analysis and "a plain misreading of the record" of North's trial to reach their decision.

On July 20, they ordered a "witness by witness" hearing to determine if the evidence against North

had been influenced by the testimony he gave Congress about the Iran-Contra affair under a limited grant of immunity from prosecution.

That so-called "use immunity" grant barred Walsh from using North's testimony as evidence in a criminal prosecution.

But Walsh called the panel's order "an unwarranted extension of use immunity protection" that was "particularly unjustified."

Intefadeh continues in West Bank; PLO uprising reaches 1,000th day

RAMALLAH, Occupied West Bank — When an army truck broke down recently in the middle of this West Bank town, Palestinian teenagers sprang into action.

"They trashed it," said an Israeli army officer who witnessed the scene. "They broke every window, smashed every door and fender."

The incident was a reminder that the Palestinian revolt against Israeli occupation, though eclipsed by the gulf crisis, persists as an angry war of stones and empty bottles against well-armed Israeli troops.

The uprising, known in Arabic as the "intefadeh," marks its 1,000th day Wednesday. The PLO-backed underground leadership of the revolt called for the anniversary to be marked with protest marches under the banner "Intefadeh until a Palestinian state."

That goal remains illusive for the

1.7 million Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, and the character of the struggle is changing amid a more restrained Israeli military policy and the impact of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Palestinian support for Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein has disappointed the United States and other Western nations that tried to mediate the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"There's no doubt that Israel is reaping political gains from the gulf crisis," said Ghassan Khatib, a Palestinian professor from this town just north of Jerusalem.

"There are fewer pressures on Israel from the United States to start a dialogue with the Palestinians," Khatib said. "There is no more talk about Israeli violations of human rights in the occupied territories."

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir on Tuesday dismissed reporters' questions about the

anniversary. "It doesn't have any impact on the progress of the Jewish people and the Jewish state," Shamir said.

Since the revolt began in December 1987, a total of 728 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli soldiers or civilians. In addition, 255 Palestinians have been killed by fellow Arabs, most on suspicion of collaboration with Israel. Forty-seven Israelis have died.

Under Defense Minister Moshe Arens, the army since June has reduced its forces in heavily populated areas and tightened firing rules, sharply reducing Palestinian casualties.

In the past three months, 11 Palestinians have died from Israeli army gunfire. In the same period last year, the toll was 77.

"It reflects more experience by the army in handling the situation," said an army spokesman, who cannot be identified by name under military rules.

Hostages freed from Baghdad

AMMAN, Jordan — Twenty-five Americans were among nearly 300 Western women and children to arrive here Tuesday from Baghdad on three Iraqi Airways planes.

The last flight to arrive just before midnight (4 p.m. CDT) brought 150 people, including the 25 Americans, 44 French, 36 British, four Australians and two Canadian women and children. They had been detained in Iraq and Kuwait since the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2.

One of the flights that arrived earlier in the day included 135 West Germans among its passengers, and the other brought 170 people, mainly Arab nationals.

A total of 175 Western nationals were expected to leave Amman early Wednesday aboard a Virgin Atlantic jumbo jet.

The jumbo had landed in Amman a few hours earlier with 30 tons of food and other supplies for the tens of thousands of Asian evacuees from Kuwait stranded in squalid camps in Jordan.

"We heard there was a potentially catastrophic problem in Jordan with young and old people dying and we had to do something before it was too late," Richard Branson, the British owner of the airline who flew in on the jet, told reporters on arrival.

Shortly after his arrival, Branson and his crew were thanked by Jordan's American-born wife Queen Noor, who went aboard the plane.

"We are grateful; we desperately need all this," the queen told Branson, pointing at sacks of wheat slung on top of the scarlet first-class seats aboard the plane.

"We will get this to the really desperate areas, and this kind of action that you've done is tremend-

ous help," she added.

Branson said later he "was upset" because he made 200 seats available to one Asian embassy to fly evacuees out of Amman, but a bureaucratic foulup meant the seats went unused.

He said he had provided the United Nations with a list of airlines and planes available for charter for a massive airlift to fly home the estimated 100,000 impoverished Asian nationals stranded in Jordan.

Mothers emerged from the planes with sleeping infants and shuddering older children who looked confused.

"I feel great," said a young American, George Issa, wearing a foot-

ball jersey.

Asked what he thought of Baghdad, American Taleb Subah said, "Better than Kuwait, I tell you that."

"Kuwait was a living hell," said the Davenport, Iowa, teenager. "You go to sleep on bombing and you wake up to it. ... It is like Vietnam. I saw dead people all over — they throw them in the trash."

An elderly American woman refused to say anything except, "I am so tired." She kept walking past reporters.

Most people were taken directly from the arriving airliners to the VIP lounge at the Queen Alia airport.

Korean prime ministers meet

SEOUL, South Korea — South Korea's prime minister, meeting his North Korean counterpart for the first time Tuesday, said the two must work together to "thaw the thick ice of distrust."

Their meeting marked the highest level of contact between the hostile Koreans since the division of the peninsula in 1945.

By holding formal talks starting Wednesday, Communist North Korea gives tacit recognition to the legitimacy of the South Korean government, which it has refused to recognize for more than four decades.

"I am so glad that you have taken the challenge of blazing an unbeaten trail through the thicket to come," South Korean Prime Minister Kang Young-hoon told his North Korean counterpart, Yon Hyong Muk, at dinner.

"If only we build confidence in each other by meeting again and again, we should be able to generate sufficient heat to thaw the thick ice of distrust," Kang said.

"National unification cannot be achieved by forcing ideology and thoughts on others," Yon responded in a toast.

The two leaders met informally twice during the day and spent about 15 minutes alone prior to a Western-style hotel banquet. After dinner, the 90-member North Korean delegation was taken to a movie on Korean cultural sites.

Talks on Wednesday and Thursday are to focus on easing military and political confrontation and launching multilateral exchanges — subjects general enough to cover almost anything either side wants to talk about.

South Korean officials have cautioned against high expectations, saying the talks are only a first step on a long road toward peace and unification.

North Korean radio, monitored in Tokyo, urged Seoul to approach talks "with a sincere attitude ... and cease from spoiling the atmosphere of dialogue."

About 200 radical students yelling anti-government slogans and hurling more than 500 blazing firebombs battled riot police at Seoul's Korea University. Eight students were arrested for trying to take unification banners to the border crossing.

Radicals and dissidents are

demanding immediate unification and the withdrawal of U.S. troops, positions supported by North Korea.

Soon after their arrival, the North Koreans asked to visit the families of South Korean dissidents jailed for illegally visiting the North, but the government indicated the request would be rejected.

The North Korean leader escaped injury shortly after he arrived when the car in which he was riding was involved in an accident with three other cars on the way to the hotel.

The accident occurred when a civilian car tried to cut through the motorcade speeding through downtown Seoul. Two North Korean diplomats riding in separate cars behind the prime minister were treated for minor injuries. One car caught fire and the windshield on the third was broken. Embarrassed South Korean officials apologized profusely for the incident.

The North Korean prime minister is staying in a \$1,500-a-day Royal Suite at a luxury hotel near the Olympic Stadium, site of the 1988 Summer Games.

Despite opposing ideology, the two leaders have much in common. Both have roots near the North Korean-Manchurian border. They are both in their 60s and each was appointed premier in 1988.

The Korean peninsula was divided into the Communist North and capitalist South in 1945, and the two nations fought a three-year war in the early 1950s.

Gene isolated as cause of osteoarthritis

BETHESDA, Md. — Researchers on Tuesday announced the discovery of a gene that in some families causes osteoarthritis, a degenerative disease that can lead to stiffness, pain and crippling of joints.

Dr. Darwin Prockop of Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia and Dr. Roland Moskowitz of Case Western University in Cleveland said the faulty gene was isolated in studies of three generations of one family.

The faulty gene appears to produce a protein mutation that leads to arthritis at an early age, they said. "We have taken a disease and defined a specific cause," Moskowitz said. "Knowing where to target now will help us immeasurably" in developing a specific treatment for arthritis.

Treatment now consists only of treating symptoms and relieving inflammation. Severe cases can lead to crippling that can be corrected only by replacing a diseased joint with an artificial one.

Ten families with several generations of arthritis have been examined, and the faulty gene found in three of those families, Moskowitz said. Examination of the genetic pattern of the others is not complete, he said.

"We think it is likely that other genes are involved," Moskowitz said, adding that it was unlikely that the single gene is responsible for all forms of inherited osteoarthritis.

He said a search is under way to find other genes that may play a role in the disease.

The cause of primary osteoarthritis has long eluded science even though it is one of the most common ailments among people past the age of 55. The disease

causes a breakdown of cartilage that covers and cushions joints. It can affect any joint, but most commonly is seen in the hands, ankles, knees and hips.

"We now know that a gene can cause the problem," Prockop said.

The studies, he said, showed that in some families there is one defective gene and one good gene for the production of collagen II, a protein that the primary component in cartilage.

The defective gene, Prockop said, changes a single amino acid in the collagen II. The result is an altered and weakened collagen, which leads to an early onset of arthritis.

"With this discovery, we hope to find ways to make the good gene work better and the bad gene work

less well," Prockop said.

Researchers, he said, are looking for ways to manipulate the gene or block its action. But Prockop said much more research is needed before candidate drugs can be developed.

The arthritis gene was found after a physician referred to Moskowitz a family that experienced the disease in three generations.

Using a tissue sample from one family member with arthritis, the scientists isolated the collagen II gene and found that it was mutated. They then checked that gene in the other family members and found it was defective in the nine who were affected with arthritis, but not in the 10 others.

Tests then were conducted on 57 unrelated individuals without arthritis and the gene was found to be normal.

John Stobo, a Johns Hopkins University medical professor and president of the American College of Rheumatologists, said the discovery "provides real hope that a cure will be forthcoming."

opposed to apartheid couldn't voice their opinion because of legal restraints prohibiting statements against the government, he said.

Police visited him on several occasions when the newspapers he worked for took anti-government positions.

"It's part of the game," he said. Although some restrictions remain, such as limits on the reporting of township violence, the easing of restrictions has boosted the morale of journalists. Wightman said he felt "a great sense of relief."

"It's a lot easier to give a broader picture to the people of South Africa," he said.

Wightman said the American press has covered the South African tensions so vigorously because the issue of racial division touches a nerve with American readers.

"There's a political dimension in the United States which has made South Africa really a high ranking issue," he said. "You have a black political voice here to which all intelligent politicians are sensitive. Apartheid is abhorrent to the people of the United States, and it's going to be a priority," he said.

Although inequality exists in many countries on the African continent, Wightman said that fact shouldn't take the focus off South Africa.

"It should be more than a Third World country," he said. "It should have better standards."

Wightman, who has worked at several papers with predominantly black readerships, currently works for one read mostly by Indians and whites.

He said the U.S. ambassador invited him to come to the U.S. to learn about American print media and its coverage of international affairs.

During the four-week tour, which is sponsored by the U.S. Information Agency, Wightman has visited newspapers in large and small markets across the country.

Wightman said he has found the U.S. to be very much like his native land, where lifestyles and culture vary widely in each of the four provinces.

"The U.S. is an amazing place," he said. "The way of life in San Francisco and Sacramento is so different from Little Rock, Ark., or Orlando."

A soundman for WTN, a British television agency, was arrested in Vosloorus after being told to leave the area.

WTN deputy bureau chief Vincent Francis said the soundman, Brian Green, told the bureau over a mobile telephone he was leaving when police assaulted and detained him. A police spokesman said any alleged assault would be investigated.

Police also reported three deaths in Vosloorus and one in Katlehong in overnight street clashes. Both

townships are southeast of Johannesburg.

Rival factions continued to skirmish Tuesday in Vosloorus with axes, spears and other crude weapons. Police fired tear gas and shotguns to keep the groups apart.

Mandela visited Sebokeng on Tuesday afternoon and said he was "outraged" after viewing bodies at a mortuary.

The ANC deputy president repeated his accusation that police fueled the violence by siding with Inkatha fighters.





\$66 Million for New Bedford cleanup

BOSTON — A New York company has agreed to pay \$66 million toward cleaning up New Bedford Harbor, where industrial pollution has forced closing of lobster and fishing grounds, the federal government announced Tuesday.

Officials said the payment — part of a settlement between the government and AVX Corp. of New York City — is one of the largest such payments in the history of the Superfund. The decade-old fund was set up to attack the nation's worst cases of hazardous waste pollution.

AVX was one of five companies accused in a federal complaint filed in 1983 of contributing to the pollution of New Bedford Harbor by releasing PCBs, or polychlorinated biphenyls, from manufacturing plants near the harbor. PCBs have been found to cause cancer, and their use has been restricted.

The complaint alleged that the PCBs damaged the harbor's natural resources, including 18,000 acres of beaches, fishing and lobstering grounds.

Teachers go on strike in four states

Teachers went on strike Tuesday in school districts in Michigan, Washington, Rhode Island and Pennsylvania, and New Orleans teachers voted to strike in two weeks unless their demands are met.

College professors walked out in contract disputes at Wayne State University in Detroit and Temple University in Philadelphia. A strike continued at the University of Bridgeport in Connecticut.

In all, the strikes disrupted education for a total of about 60,000 students in Saginaw, Mich., Yakima, Wash., and outside Seattle and Everett, Wash.

School openings are also threatened at three smaller districts in Cheboygan, Mich., North Kingston, R.I., and Ligonier, Pa., where school starts today and teachers have gone on strike. Those districts have a total of about 10,000 students.

A strike in New Orleans, where school started yesterday, could affect about 85,000 pupils. Teachers there overwhelmingly approved a strike pledge for Sept. 17 in a voice vote yesterday morning.

Dentist with AIDS writes to patients

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — A Florida dentist who may have transmitted the AIDS virus to a former patient urged others he once treated to be tested for the disease in an emotional letter released yesterday.

David Acer insisted in the letter he doesn't believe federal Centers for Disease Control reports that he may have given acquired immune deficiency syndrome to one of his patients, apparently during a routine tooth extraction.

The Atlanta-based CDC said last month it was the first case in the nation in which a health professional had apparently transmitted AIDS to a patient. The agency hasn't said how it happened.

"I do not understand how such a thing could have happened, and I do not believe it did happen," Acer wrote. "I am a gentleman, and I would never intentionally expose anyone to this disease."

Brinkley fights Lyme disease with hens

EAST HAMPTON, N.Y. — Oh, that Christie Brinkley. Cover girl, married to Billy Joel, mother of a beautiful daughter — and now she's figured out a way to fight Lyme disease.

Brinkley is raising guinea hens on her Long Island estate, and she believes the fowl are eating the deer ticks on her land. The ticks are carriers of potentially fatal Lyme disease, which has struck Suffolk County harder than any other county in the state this summer.

When the actress-model told Rep. George Hochbrueckner about the hens on patrol, the congressman quickly seized the (photo) opportunity.

Brinkley and Joel will soon be hosts to the congressman and a team of researchers who want to determine if the deer tick population is lower on the celebrity property than at the neighbors' homes.

Mass grave in Brazil holds lost activists

SAO PAULO, Brazil — Authorities on Tuesday uncovered a clandestine mass grave containing the remains of an estimated 1,700 bodies — mostly poor people but also some political foes of Brazil's former military dictatorship.

The skeletons were packed in blue plastic bags and buried in an unmarked section of the hillside

cemetery of Perus, a working-class suburb of Sao Paulo, the country's largest city.

Officials found the bones while checking up on what had happened to remains of paupers who died with no identification in the early 1970s.

"Up to 50 of the dead could be former political prisoners and opponents of the (1964-85) military regime," Luis Eduardo Green-

halgh, deputy mayor of Sao Paulo and a human rights activist, told The Associated Press.

He said at least six already had been identified as "disappeared" political activists, presumably killed by the dictatorship.

Greenhalgh said others may have been victims of police-backed death squads that summarily executed suspected criminals.

Cemetery director Antonio Pires

Eustaquio said most of the dead were paupers buried in 1971-72, whose identities were unknown at the time.

By law, such remains must be unearthed and placed in a bone depository after three years, Eustaquio said.

He said, "Cemetery records showed the removal took place but did not indicate what had been done with the remains."

Gorbachev, policies under fire

MOSCOW — President Mikhail Gorbachev's reform program is "on the brink of collapse," a leader of the Communist Party's traditionalist wing told 2,500 delegates at a Russian party congress in the Kremlin on Tuesday.

Ivan Polozkov, first secretary of the Communist Party in the Russian Republic, drew vigorous applause from the delegates, a group that includes many generals and career party officials who are believed to harbor reservations about Gorbachev's policies.


Gorbachev sat on the podium at the front of the hall, remaining virtually silent through a day of speeches that often contained scathing criticism of his leadership, though without mentioning him by name.

Some of the day's strongest applause went to Ivan Vtorushin, a worker from the Siberian city of Tyumen, who called for "returning the nation to 1985," the year in which Gorbachev assumed power.

"No matter what slogans are used, a policy resulting in falling living standards and bloodshed is against popular interests," Vtorushin said, referring to the Soviet Union's accelerating economic problems and ethnic strife.

The delegates are meeting this week to complete the process of creating a separate Russian branch of the Communist Party.

Until this year the Russian Republic, the largest of the Soviet

Union's 15 constituent republics, did not have its own party organization. Communists living in Russia were simply members of the Soviet Party.

The first meeting of the new Russian Communist Party, held in Moscow in June, was dominated by traditionalists and was widely viewed in the Soviet Union as an effort by them to gain influence and public support.

Since June, three reformist delegates have resigned their seats in the congress because of its domination by traditionalists. Another reformer, economist Otto Latsis, announced at Tuesday's session that he was resigning in protest from a committee drafting the party's platform.

Reformists also made some other moves on Tuesday, such as calling unsuccessfully for the resignation of the 55-year-old Polozkov.

In his hour-long keynote address, Polozkov urged delegates to counter the "deliberate discrediting of the Communist Party and the socialist choice as a whole."

He said the country's economic crisis, caused by the Soviet people's psychological unpreparedness for a market-based system, "is, in the final analysis, putting perestroika on the brink of collapse."

His comments echoed complaints expressed Monday by Muscovites who stood in line across the city to buy bread, which had been one of the few foods Soviet consumers could obtain easily.

Soviets suggest conference to discuss the Middle East

MOSCOW — The Soviets on Tuesday proposed an international conference to discuss the Persian Gulf crisis, the Arab-Israeli dispute and the Lebanese civil war.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir reiterated his opposition to discussing the Palestinian issue at an international conference, but he welcomed the idea of a conference on the Persian Gulf.

A spokesman for President Mikhail Gorbachev declined to say how hard he will press the issue at the summit with President Bush on Sunday.

"The Soviet president intends to discuss ... ways of defusing the Persian Gulf crisis, and he believes that all efforts, including those of a mediator, are viewed positively in the Soviet Union," presidential spokesman Vitaly Ignatenko told a news conference.

Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze proposed the conference earlier in the day during a speech in Vladivostok, in the Soviet Far East. Shevardnadze said the summit in Helsinki, Finland, "will mark a major milestone on the road toward resolving the crisis in the Persian Gulf."

But he said that "after one more look at the situation, we still have come to the same conclusion" that an international conference on the Middle East is necessary. He stressed that in the meantime, efforts to bring about a settlement of the Persian Gulf situation under U.N. auspices should continue.

Security Council embargo against Iraq after its invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2 and has given lukewarm support to U.S. Navy actions to enforce the sanctions.

This is a departure from the Kremlin's historic stance. In the past it shipped arms to militant Arab states, including Iraq, was hostile to Israel and supported the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Shevardnadze criticized the previous arms sales to Iraq, which ended after the invasion, and said the Soviet Union might re-examine its relations with Israel. But he also linked solution of the Persian Gulf crisis to the Palestinian issue, as well as to the civil war in Lebanon.

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein at one point proposed that a pull-out of his troops from Kuwait be contingent upon an Israeli withdrawal from the occupied territories. The United States rejected the plan.

"At this point in time, there is a growing awareness ... that a complex of problems involving the Arab-Israeli conflict, the fate of the Palestinians and the tragedy in Lebanon awaits its resolution in

the Middle East," Shevardnadze said in his speech, which was carried by the state news agency Tass.

"Presumably, Israel's agreement to (a conference's) convocation could exert a positive influence on the overall situation in the Middle East and on efforts to defuse the crisis in the Persian Gulf," he said.

"For its part, the Soviet Union ... might take a fresh look at the issue of Soviet-Israeli relations," Shevardnadze added.

The Soviet Union and Israel have not had diplomatic relations since the 1967 Middle East War, although both countries have been moving closer in recent months.

In Jerusalem, Shamir said in response to the proposal, "On the subject of the Persian Gulf, yes."

He continued, "We have our position about an international conference around the solution of the Israeli-Arab conflict. We will not participate in such an international conference."

Israel has vehemently opposed Soviet ideas to hold an international conference to resolve the Arab-Israeli conflict.

Khmer Rouge to boycott peace talks without prime minister

BANGKOK, Thailand — In a move that could undermine talks on a U.N. plan to end the Cambodian war, the Khmer Rouge said today it would not attend a peace conference in Indonesia unless the Cambodian prime minister agrees to go.

Khmer Rouge leader Khieu Samphan said he had planned to leave for Jakarta on Wednesday but changed his mind after hearing state radio report that Cambodia's Premier Hun Sen would not attend the talks, set to begin Thursday.

He said that showed Phnom Penh

and Vietnam "are not sincere in the search of a solution" and did not accept the U.N. peace plan.

Samphan said, however, he would go to Jakarta if Hun Sen also went.

"If Hun Sen doesn't go, there is no point in having any meeting," said another Khmer Rouge official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Fighting will continue, he said. "Fighting has the aim of forcing the Vietnamese to talk," he said.

Indonesia's foreign minister, Ali Alatas, said he was disappointed by the threat to the talks and said he was trying to resolve the problems.

"The whole world is placing its

hope on the Jakarta meeting," he said. "Now is the best time to try it. The Cambodian leaders should be able to see this."

The Khmer Rouge has by far the most powerful guerrilla army because of arms aid from China. Many countries say that despite the group's brutal record when it

ruled Cambodia in the 1970s, Khmer Rouge participation in a negotiated settlement is crucial because the guerrillas otherwise would keep on fighting.

Prince Norodom Ranariddh, whose guerrillas are allied with the Khmer Rouge, also said today he would not attend for the same

reason Samphan gave.

Both Ranariddh and Hun Sen said they were sending subordinates to the Jakarta meeting.

Hun Sen had announced he was not attending because Prince Norodom Sihanouk, Ranariddh's father and leader of the three-faction guerrilla coalition, said he was not attending.

Son Sann, who leads the third guerrilla group, the Khmer People's National Liberation Front, is expected to participate.

The guerrillas are allied in a coalition fighting the government that Vietnam installed in Phnom Penh after invading the country in

late 1978.

Hopes for a settlement were raised after the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council, who back different sides in the conflict, adopted a comprehensive peace plan for Cambodia last week. The members are the United States, the Soviet Union, China, France and Britain.

Their plan called for the United Nations to supervise five key government ministries in the period before a general election. A Supreme National Council, comprising representatives of Phnom Penh and the guerrillas, would act as a figurehead government.



CRISIS IN THE GULF

Vanishing act

The United States is off to war, with its young men and women taking up arms in the name of freedom, democracy and cheap gas. But while President Bush is making sure Americans get their money's worth when they fill up, all other national problems seem to have vanished from the agenda.

But where have they gone? Has the federal budget deficit been erased while no one was looking? Have all of America's homeless found a place to live while backs were turned? Has inner-city violence ceased as the drug war draws to a triumphant close?

No. So where did all of these problems go — the same issues that were on the tongues of politicians and activists alike not so long ago? They haven't gone away — they've been shunted

aside while the administration garners support for its policies in the Middle East. Bush is concentrating on a less controversial problem — one likely to boost his ratings in the polls: American hostages in Iraq.

Wait a minute. Would those hostages be there if the United States had kept its nose in its own business and on its own turf? Probably not. That crazy Saddam Hussein has taken Americans stranded in Kuwait and Iraq as hostages so that U.S. troops don't bomb him into oblivion. A radical concept, but it just might work. Hostage-taking is all the rage, and seems to be a trend that has carried over into the '90s. And nothing, it seems, raises the ire of true-blooded Americans more than to hear that some insane, power-hungry fascist has taken some of their own hostage.

So while the nation is filled with angry citizens calling for Saddam's head, other problems are being ignored. Bush does have history on his side. A precedent has been set through the years — find an enemy overseas and your problems at home disappear. Few seemed to get worked up when Bush kicked off the drug war, so Iraq's invasion of Kuwait was well-timed. At least for Bush's purposes. The federal budget deficit had loomed large on the horizon, but it was quickly overshadowed by the crisis in Iraq. So were the millions of homeless, the failing war on drugs and other problems that have plagued the Bush presidency.

To make light of the hostages in Iraq would be to miss the point. No matter whose fault it is that they are there, the fact remains that they are there, being held against their will. To secure the immediate release of those being held is a top priority. But Congress and the American public should not fall prey to Bush's hostage trap. He may wish otherwise, but the problems that faced the United States before the gulf crisis are still present. Burying his head in the sands of Saudia Arabia will not hide George Bush from the tasks at hand, of which resolution of the gulf crisis is only one.

I think the lights were synchronized for someone window shopping, as opposed to someone driving, and this is hardly fair, because the window shopping on Burlington Street isn't very good.

You can't even give it a good shot. You approach the first light, triggering a device that turns it red. As you bring your vehicle to a stop, you see the next light turn green. Then,

Oh sure, we get the occasional *jew-luh-ree* and *ree-la-tor*, but they aren't constantly barbing the air like those pointed little *as-tuh-riks*.



Real facts about drunken driving

To the Editor:
In a recent column ("They're 'piling on' alcohol," Aug. 28, *The Daily Iowan*), Kim Painter labeled as "incompetent boobs" Gov. Terry Branstad and others who have proposed lowering Iowa's legal intoxication limit from the current 0.10 percent blood-alcohol concentration to 0.08 percent. Drunken driving in Iowa, Painter implied, is not really a serious problem, since only 3 percent of Iowa's motor vehicle accidents involve alcohol.
A closer look at the facts contra-

dicts Painter's assertions. According to figures I obtained from the Iowa Department of Transportation, there were 67,901 motor vehicle accidents in Iowa in 1988. An accident is considered alcohol-related if one of the drivers involved has a blood-alcohol concentration of 0.01 percent or higher. Of those 67,901 accidents, 4,778 were alcohol-related. This works out to 7 percent, not the 3 percent Painter claimed. Of the 515 traffic fatalities in Iowa in 1989, 213 were alcohol-related. This is an appalling 41 percent. Of those 213 alcohol-related fatalities, 21 involved drivers whose blood-alcohol concentrations were between 0.05 percent and 0.10 percent.

The problem of drunken driving is not inconsequential, nor is combating drunken driving through a lower legal limit "piling on," as Painter says it is. Painter says, quite correctly, that current proposals to regulate alcohol use will not bring back the people already killed by drunken drivers. Certainly, however, many lives can be saved in the future through a combination of lower legal limits, greater enforcement, harsher penalties and better public education.



UI Theatres marks 70th anniversary; season filled with plays for everyone

The UI Theatres will celebrate its 70th anniversary with a 1990-91 season combining classics of Euripides and Shakespeare, a full-tilt British farce, an insightful study of the 1970s farm crisis, and a quirky new script from the Iowa Playwrights Workshop.

The plays, all staged in the UI Theatre Building, are: "Noises Off," by Michael Frayn, Oct. 11-21 in Mabie Theatre; Rebecca Gilman's "Canannie and Alice," the UI entry in the 1990-91 American College Theatre Festival Competition, Nov. 1-18 in Theatre A; "Medea" by Euripides, Feb. 7-17 in Mabie Theatre; "The Rivers and Ravines" by Heather McDonald, Feb. 21 through March 10 in Theatre A; and Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," April 11-21 in Mabie Theatre.

"Noises Off," which opens the University Theatres season, was one of the biggest comedy hits of the early 1980s on both sides of the Atlantic. Michael Frayn's backstage farce became the longest-running play in the history of London's venerable Savoy Theatre before conquering New York. In theater lingo, "noises

off" refers to sounds from backstage that interfere with a performance. In this case, a ragtag theater troupe is futilely attempting to stage a frothy sex comedy, but the mayhem backstage escalates as their performance disintegrates.

"Canannie and Alice" is about a neglected boy who literally lives like a dog, and about the two women who attempt to reclaim him. The production of this play by Playwrights Workshop student Rebecca Gilman will compete with productions from colleges and universities throughout the country in the American College Theatre Festival Competition, in which the UI has had success in the past.

Euripides' "Medea" has survived for 2000 years as a drama of hatred and passion run wild. The African princess, Medea, is willing to betray her father and kill her brother to aid Jason, the man she loves, in his quest for the Golden Fleece. When he abandons her after she has given up everything for him, her revenge is swift and terrible.

The characters in Heather McDonald's "The Rivers and Ravines" are victims of the farm crisis. Advised by the government to go into debt in the 1970s, they faced

foreclosure on the American Dream in the 1980s and were forced to choose between resigning themselves to failure or finding a new way to live.

University Theatres will conclude its season with "Twelfth Night," Shakespeare's comic tale of love and mistaken identity.

University Theatres, the performance arm of the UI Department of Theatre Arts, draws on many of the academic areas of the department, including undergraduate and graduate programs in acting, directing, design and technical theater, and the Iowa Playwrights Workshop.

Thrash funk in the Bay Area grows as the new psychedelia

SAN FRANCISCO — Born of an odd mixture of 1970s funk, punk rock, rap, California surf, skate-board and hippie culture, a wild musical genre called "thrash funk" has swept the San Francisco club scene.

The area that gave rise to acid rock in the 1960s is now the nation's hotbed of the colorful, youth-driven "punk-funk," and the record industry is ready to cash in.

"If any of these bands break through, you are going to have the entire industry swooping down on San Francisco to scoop up what they can find," said John Axelrod, director of artists and repertoire for RCA Records in Los Angeles.

Inspired largely by George Clinton's Parliament-Funkadelic era, bands such as Psychefunkapus, Limbomaniacs, Primus, The Smoking Section and Fungo Mungo make up a diverse musical scene linked by seething energy, a thumping bass, sometimes bawdy lyrics and a sense of humor.

"It's about intensity, which is always a good rock 'n' roll standard," said Butthouse, lead singer and bassist for Limbomaniacs.

Band members dismiss the label "thrash-funk" as confining, confusing and misleading and cite an array of influences led by Clinton and augmented by James Brown, Prince, Jimi Hendrix, Frank Zappa and Led Zeppelin.

"To me, each of these bands is completely different than the others," said Psychefunkapus bassist Atom Ellis. "Primus is really hard-edged. Fungo Mungo is more like James Brown meets the Red Hot Chile Peppers. Limbomaniacs are more of a go-go kind of thing. Smoking Section is a really smooth groove band. It's hard to say what we are."

Despite the diversity, the so-called

"punk funksters" seem to admire one another's music. And there's a street style of long hair, tattoos and muscular physiques shared by some of the band members and many of their fans.

Axelrod signed Psychefunkapus in late 1989 when he worked at Atlantic Records and plans to soon sign The Smoking Section to RCA. He says the bands present a wholly American sound that embodies San Francisco's liberal past.

"These are pseudo-hippies," he said. "It's another evolution of what the psychedelic movement was about in the first place — free love and peace, addressing the issues but remembering we are here to have a good time."

Six-year-old Primus, led by comical bassist-singer Les Claypool, is the thraziest of the thrash-funk bands.

After some personnel changes, the band released a self-pressed live album called "Suck on This." Four years of talks with Geffen Records failed to produce results, and the band produced its first studio album.

The thrash-funk audience is a heavily white, male crowd. The beat lures listeners to the dance floor. Braver souls head to the core of the throbbing, slam-dancing mob, where people are pushed and shoved, almost against the grain of the music.

The scene appears to have evolved almost by mistake, coming on the heels of the late 1980s success of Los Angeles groups The Red Hot Chile Peppers and Fishbone. Both are widely seen as progenitors of the funk-influenced thrash genre, although San Francisco musicians distance themselves from such bands.

"It seems like every one of these aggregate groups started on their own, with little influence from the others," said David Hawkins, drummer of The Smoking Section. "We came in a little later, but we'd never seen them or heard them until we got billed with them."

Primus and the Limbomaniacs came first, standing today as the bands with the strongest instrumental skills and the most funny and raunchy lyrics. Both have recorded albums on independent

"This is music that has found its root in live performance," said Creighton Burke, manager of Psychefunkapus. "A lot of the old 1970s rock created record sales out of the live performance. The New York Dolls, the (Grateful) Dead, Hendrix — those bands created album sales through live performance."

Fungo Mungo started three years ago as a "punk-funk" band, later integrating a funk-style bass.

"We all loved heavy rock bands from the 1970s: Black Sabbath, AC-DC. I love disco," said bassist Arion Salazar, 19, of Fungo Mungo. "Now, I love KC and Sunshine Band. I used to hate them. It was so cheesy. You're 8 years old and you see a bunch of guys with big bell bottoms jumping around. . . In hindsight, that was what was cool. It's kind of neat now."

Accomplished playwright joins UI workshop

Noted off-Broadway playwright Lavonne Mueller, a graduate of the Writers' Workshop, has become the interim director of the Iowa Playwrights Workshop in the University of Iowa Department of Theatre Arts.

More than a dozen of Mueller's plays have been produced in New York, where she has been writer-in-residence at the Women's Project. Her latest play, "Violent Peace," the final work in her trilogy of plays about war, has been optioned to Hollywood by Lee Grant, and Mueller is now at work on the screenplay.

Mueller just returned from Argentina, where she used a Fulbright

Fellowship to spend the summer with mothers of some of the 30,000 young people who disappeared during the "Dirty War" of the 1970s.

Mueller hopes to write a play about the Argentine women for the International Festival of the Arts next summer and is excited that she will be writing this play at the same time she is teaching a docudrama class in the Playwrights Workshop: "I really like rolling up my sleeves and working with my students."

Mueller explained that her approach to teaching is practical and production-oriented. "I don't want to help them write their file cabinets," she said. "I want them to write for production. I

hope to help them write producible plays."

The broad acting, directing, design and performance resources of the UI Department of Theatre Arts are consistent with the goal, Mueller said. "This may be the only place in the country where a young person can have anything they write produced," she noted.

In addition to the 1990 Fulbright Fellowship and the Woodrow Wilson Visiting Scholar grant, Mueller has been the recipient of grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, a Rockefeller Residential Scholar Award, and a Guggenheim Fellowship and a Rockefeller Grant for Playwriting.

Iowa-Penn State series to start in 1993

The Iowa football team isn't wasting any time welcoming Penn State to the Big Ten Conference. Iowa men's athletic director Chalmers "Bump" Elliott said Tuesday the Hawkeyes are the first team in the league to schedule Penn State since the Nittany Lions accepted the league's invitation to join the conference last June. Although Penn State's football team isn't expected to be eligible

for the Big Ten championship until 1995, Elliott said Iowa coach Hayden Fry and Penn State coach Joe Paterno agreed to start playing each other earlier. In 1993, the Hawkeyes will play host to the Nittany Lions at Kinick Stadium on Sept. 18, the third game of the year. Iowa travels to State College, Pa., for a rematch on Sept. 17 of the following season. Should the Nittany Lions become eligible prior to 1995, "there would have to be an adjustment made. I'm not exactly sure how," Elliott

said. "But we don't look for anything to happen before 1995," he said. Elliott spoke at the first meeting of the year for the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics meeting, where he unveiled Iowa's football schedule through the year 2000. Penn State last summer became the first addition to the Midwest-based conference since Michigan State joined in 1949. The school, with about 29,000 undergraduates, is a research-based land grant university at State College in cen-

tral Pennsylvania. The Nittany Lions are independents in football. The two teams first met in 1930, with Iowa winning 19-0. The series resumed in the 1970s, with Penn State winning five straight games by a combined score of 142-42 before Iowa halted the skid with a 7-6 victory in 1976. They didn't play again until 1983, when Fry was in his fourth season at Iowa City. The Hawkeyes downed the Nittany Lions 42-34 but lost the next year 20-17.

Sabatini, Fernandez advance to semifinals of U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Gabriela Sabatini danced along a tennis tightrope before knocking off a Soviet slugger, and American teen Mary Joe Fernandez delivered on the promise she showed in her first U.S. Open at 14. The shaky victories by No. 5 Sabatini and No. 8 Fernandez on Tuesday set up a semifinal match between them. Sabatini, considered from the start of the Open a solid contender to take Steffi Graf's title, found herself in a 2½ hour test of wills with unseeded Leila Meskhi before winning 7-6 (7-5), 6-4. Sabatini, teetering on the edge of defeat in the first set, fought off a set point in the 10th game, another in the 12th game when a lob by Meskhi landed an inch long, and came back from 2-5 down in the tie-breaker. The Argentine won the last five

points of the tie-breaker as Meskhi's composure finally cracked. Meskhi had been winning points with deep, hard groundstrokes and an aggressive net game. But in the tie-breaker, she double-faulted for the first time at 5-4, then hit a forehand long, drilled an easy overhead into the net and lost the set on a weak backhand that Sabatini volleyed hard into the cement. Sabatini, worried about early misses at the net, backed off and played into Meskhi's strength with topspin groundstrokes for most of the first set. But after realizing she could win points with low shots that Meskhi smacked into the net, Sabatini began to change her strategy. Sabatini broke Meskhi twice to take a 4-2 lead in the second set. Yet she rallied again, broke Sabatini back twice and was serving at 5-4 with a chance to tie the set. Once more, though, Sabatini held on and broke Meskhi for the final

time on a forehand long by Meskhi, ending the longest straight-set women's match of the tournament. Fernandez came back from a bout of second-set wildness and took target practice at the corners and lines to reach her second Grand Slam semifinals this year. Fernandez's 6-2, 2-6, 6-1 victory over Manuela Maleeva-Fragniere, the fourth-round conqueror of Martina Navratilova, confirmed that the 19-year-old Floridian's trip to the Australian final last January was no fluke. Fernandez was able to shake off a sloppy second set and stick to her strategy of coming in behind deep shots down the lines. She attacked Maleeva-Fragniere from the start, breaking her after two deuces, then raced to a 4-0 lead by taking control both at the baseline and at the net. "I got on top of her pretty fast in the first set," Fernandez said. "I knew I had to be aggressive. I

National League set to pick expansion sites

NEW YORK — At least 10 cities submitted bids for the National League's two new expansion teams before Tuesday's deadline, as well as a unique proposal for a franchise that would play in four cities. Eighteen groups said they gave the NL plans along with \$100,000 application fees, including three groups each from Miami and St. Petersburg, Fla. Denver, Phoenix and Washington submitted two bids each. Also handing in proposals were Buffalo, N.Y.; Charlotte, N.C.; Nashville, Tenn.; Orlando, Fla., and Sacramento, Calif. NL spokeswoman Katy Feeney said the league would not confirm which bids had been submitted until later in the week, so it is possible other groups made bids without making their intentions public. The new clubs, which cost \$95 million each, will not begin play until 1993. The NL will select a short list of finalist cities by Dec. 31 and will pick the two new clubs by Sept. 30, 1991. It will be the first expansion by the NL since 1969 and the first in the major leagues since 1977. Vancouver, British Columbia, which has a domed stadium, did not submit a bid, according to Canadian Senator Ray Perreault. He said funding for a group could not be completed. New Orleans

also did not submit a plan, Will Penney of the Superdome said. Several prominent people, a few former major leaguers and some major corporations were among those identified as majority or minority owners of some groups. The most unusual plan was submitted by Malcolm I. Glazer, president and chief executive officer of First Allied Corporation. His proposal calls for his club to play at least 19 games in each of four cities, picked from among Buffalo, Denver, Miami, St. Petersburg and Washington. "If you think about it for a while, it makes good sense to a lot of people," said Don Smiley, who owns television station KGNS in Laredo, Texas. The seven proposals from Florida were the most of any region, leading to the possibility that both teams might go to that state. But the American League is expected to object strenuously if the NL tries to do that. "When you add Miami, Fort Lauderdale and West Palm Beach together, we crack the top 10 media markets," said Don Smiley, assistant to H. Wayne Huizenga, who heads Blockbuster Entertainment Corporation and one of the Miami groups. St. Petersburg already has built the 42,306-seat Florida Suncoast Dome and Huizenga proposes to play in Joe Robbie Stadium, which will undergo \$6 million in renovations next year.

Majkowski back with Packers

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Don Majkowski, the Green Bay Packers' All-Pro quarterback, agreed Tuesday to end a 45-day holdout and sign a one-year contract that will pay him at least \$1.5 million, his agent said. Agent Randy Vataha said the contract agreement, which with incentives could pay Majkowski as much as \$2 million, was reached during a meeting with Packers vice president Tom Braatz in Detroit.

Vataha said the two sides reviewed contracts of other NFL quarterbacks as part of their discussions. He said Majkowski would sign the contract today. "Don's thrilled to be back," Vataha said. "We think it's a fair deal given the circumstances. Don is anxious to show what he can do." According to Vataha, Majkowski agreed to a one-year contract worth \$1.5 million, plus both personal and team incentives. The \$200,000 to \$300,000 worth of personal incentives, involving Majkowski's own performance

this season, could raise the salary to \$1.7 million to \$1.8 million, Vataha said. The deal also includes some team incentives, based on the Packers' success this season, that could add \$300,000, raising the possible total over \$2 million, Vataha said. Majkowski, who led the Packers to a 10-6 record and to within a game of the playoffs last year, recently had been seeking a deal for \$1.7 million a year plus incentives that would make the total package worth more than \$2 million.

Report: Iowa ranks high in graduation of athletes

The graduation rates of University of Iowa athletes remain higher than the general student body and compare favorably to other schools, a university official said Tuesday. However, communications studies professor Sam Becker acknowledged that some may question the objectivity of the numbers he arrived at over Labor Day weekend. "The last time I made this sort of comparison for the board, the point was made by someone on the board that Iowa could be made to look better or worse, depending on the

kinds of comparisons made. That, of course, is true," his report said. "I am not trying to make our athletic programs look either good or bad, though — at least not consciously; I am simply trying to give you the information that I believe is important and useful," Becker wrote to the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics. Becker is staff committee chairman of the board and faculty representative to the Big Ten Conference. He compared information gathered in the fall of 1989-90 and provided to the NCAA by 86 Division I-A public universities. According to Becker's report, the



Dorsett says he's better than current Dallas backs

DALLAS — Tony Dorsett says the Dallas Cowboys can solve their running game problems by bringing him back to the team.

"They don't have a running back out there that can do what I can do," Dorsett, 36, said in Tuesday's editions of the *Dallas Times Herald*.

The point may be moot. The Cowboys on Tuesday signed running back Emmitt Smith, their first

round pick out of Florida, ending a 48-day holdout. It was the longest rookie holdout in the Cowboys history.

Dorsett, the Cowboys' all-time leading rusher with 12,036 yards and No. 2 on the NFL's all-time rushing list with 12,739 yards, has recovered from the knee ligaments he tore in training camp last year with the Denver Broncos. He retired last season.

"There's no doubt in my mind I could play for the Cowboys right

now," he said. "Emmitt's no Tony Dorsett," he said.

Dorsett still is rankling over an abortive tryout he received with the Cowboys last month, when he was invited to Valley Ranch. Cowboys pro personnel director John Wooten liked what he saw, but coach Jimmy Johnson nixed a Dorsett return to Dallas.

"Supposedly, Jimmy thought I would be too intimidating a factor for the younger guys, which I didn't quite understand. They don't

have many veterans on that team right now, and I guess he thought the type of veteran I was over the years would not be conducive to his way of coaching," Dorsett said.

"I'm my own man and sometimes I'll say things that may be right and may not be. My thinking is that Jimmy wants more young guys that he can have control over."

Dorsett said the workout was improperly handled.

"If (Johnson) wasn't interested, I

didn't have to go out there and work out. He could have just told me he wasn't interested," he said.

Dorsett also is angry because free-agent running back Timmy Smith was given No. 33 — Dorsett's old number.

"I mean, I don't see Roger (Staubach's) number out there running up and down the field, and I can put myself on the same level as Roger Staubach as far as what I brought to the Cowboys' organization over the years," he said.

1992 Olympic return possible after changes in South Africa

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — The president of the International Olympic Committee said it is possible that South Africa could be back in the Olympics as early as 1992.

"The finishing line is getting nearer" for South Africa's return to international sports, Juan Antonio Samaranch said at the opening ceremony of the fourth International Conference Against Apartheid in Sport.

South Africa has been banned from the Olympics since 1970 because of its apartheid policy of racial separation.

"Maybe 1992 is too early, but if they solve the problems it's possible," Samaranch said. "Something important is happening for the first time in South Africa. We hope it's the beginning of the end (of apartheid)."

Samaranch said that the solution to the problem must originate within Africa and that the IOC would not move to end South Africa's isolation from international sports until black African sports leaders approve.

Jean-Claude Ganga, head of the Association of National Olympic Committees of Africa, said sports officials from South Africa and black African nations will hold formal talks for the first time in Harare, Zimbabwe, Nov. 3-4.







Despite 47 saves, Thigpen not 'best'

CHICAGO — Bobby Thigpen may have the major league record for saves, but he isn't ready to be called the best reliever in baseball.

"I'm not the best," said Thigpen, who earned his record-breaking 47th save Monday night in Chicago's 4-2 victory over the Kansas City Royals.

Thigpen concedes the honor to Oakland's Dennis Eckersley. "I've blown seven saves and that guy's blown only two," Thigpen said. "He's walked three the last two years. To me he's the best."

Actually, Eckersley, with 41 saves, has walked six in the last two seasons. He has only two blown saves but he had six last year to go along with his 33 saves.

Thigpen had 34 saves in each of the two previous seasons and each year had nine blown saves. He is not pleased with his seven lost opportunities this season but concedes "I'm not perfect. I'm not going to make the right pitch every time."

He did Monday when he took over in the ninth after Barry Jones, his personal set-up reliever, had

worked through the seventh and eighth innings.

Thigpen retired pinch hitter Kevin Seitzer on a grounder, gave up a single to Brian McRae but got George Brett to hit into a game-ending double play. He was then mobbed by his teammates.

Was it his toughest save? "It seemed like it," said Thigpen, who broke the record of 46 set by Dave Righetti of the New York Yankees in 1986. "It was more emotional than I thought it would be. But there are more games to go and I hope I can put a bunch more up."

Thigpen is on a pace to finish with 57 saves.

"I believe he's going to annihilate the record," said Manager Jeff Torborg, who was the Yankees' bullpen coach when Righetti set his record.

Carlton Fisk, who has been putting up a lot of numbers himself, also feels Thigpen will add to his record because of the team's inability to blow out opponents.

"It's too bad the team has to play that brand of baseball," said Fisk. "It's not like we can go out and get 19 hits and 15 runs. But we're ahead and that's what counts."

Pro-Bowler Duerson signs with Giants

Dave Duerson, the former All-Pro safety cut last week by Chicago, found a new home with the New York Giants and Freeman McNeil returned to the Jets Tuesday.

Emmitt Smith, meanwhile, finally signed with Dallas, leaving only one first-round choice, tight end Eric Green of the Steelers, unsigned. And Pro Bowl nose tackle Jerry Ball, who had been seeking to renegotiate his contract, finally reported to the Lions.

The 29-year-old Duerson, a fixture with the Bears teams of the mid-'80s, signed with the Giants as a replacement for strong safety Adrian White, lost for the season with a knee injury.

The 31-year-old McNeil, risked on waivers by the Jets Monday, was reclaimed in a move typical of the day — many teams claimed back players they had waived after conforming with the often-confusing injured-reserve rules.

"Experience in the league has taught most people who deal in personnel that there are very few players claimed at the final cut because people have a difficult time cutting down themselves," Jets' general manager Dick Steinberg said in explaining why he had waived McNeil, the team's all-time leading ground-gainer and a probable starter against Cincinnati Sunday.

"It was a calculated risk but we figured the odds were well in our favor," Steinberg said.

Duerson, a Pro Bowler from 1985-88, had been negotiating with San Francisco and Kansas City when the Giants called.

"It didn't take much of a selling job," said Duerson, who was convinced in part by another new Giant, former Cowboy Everson Walls. "This is just the right situation for me. It's a great organization and I like the style of defense they play. It's the style the Bears had in their glory days."

"He'd fit anybody's style," Parcels said. "I obviously thought he was an excellent player."

He can fill an obvious void created by an unfortunate circumstance."

To make room for Duerson, the Giants placed Jeff Stover, one of their two kickers, on injured reserve.

That was typical of Tuesday's action in the NFL, where players put on injured reserve after the 47-man roster is set can be brought back during the regular season and playoffs. Anyone cut before the roster is set must miss the entire season and can't practice with the team.

Atlanta, for example, claimed wide receiver Reggie Thornton on waivers from Minnesota, where he had been a fifth-round draft choice. The Falcons also re-signed wide receiver Stacey Bailey, tight end Troy Sadowski and safety Elbert Shelley while placing four players on injured reserve.

Green Bay, meanwhile, announced its cuts for the first time, a group of 10 that included quarterback Mike Norseth and punter Dale Hatcher.

Yanks pitch another suit at baseball

NEW YORK — Baseball was dragged into the federal courts again Tuesday when a New York Yankees executive sued Fay Vincent and accused the commissioner of trying to run him out of the game.

Leonard L. Kleinman, executive vice president and chief operating executive of the Yankees, made the allegation in a \$22 million lawsuit against Vincent and John M. Dowd, the commissioner's special counsel who directed an investigation of Steinbrenner's dealings with gambler Howard Spira.

Kleinman accused Vincent of framing him and Steinbrenner on charges they acted against the best interests of baseball and of covering up ex-Yankees outfielder Dave Winfield's involvement with Spira.

The lawsuit in Manhattan's federal court seeks to stop Vincent from holding a hearing

Thursday to determine possible disciplinary action against Kleinman. U.S. District Judge Leonard B. Sand will hear arguments Wednesday on Kleinman's request for a temporary restraining order to block Vincent's hearing.

"Vincent's course of conduct from the very beginning of his involvement in this matter demonstrates that he has harbored a prejudice against Kleinman and Steinbrenner and a desire to find a way to exclude them from being involved with the Yankees," the lawsuit said.

Vincent denied the allegations, saying that the investigation is within the purview of his office.

"The Sept. 6 hearing is part of a legitimate inquiry into the actions of Leonard Kleinman while he was employed by a major league club," Vincent said. "It is our belief that any attempt to prevent the hearing is without legal basis."

Steinbrenner agreed to resign as the Yankees general partner after Vincent ruled he acted against the best interests of baseball by associating with Spira and paying him \$40,000. Two Yankees limited partners sued in Cleveland to keep Steinbrenner in control, but a judge turned down their request for a temporary restraining order.

Spira claimed Kleinman arranged a money-market account for him at the time he was paid last January. That is one of the matters Vincent wants to discuss at his hearing.

"The initiation of the charges against Kleinman," the lawsuit said, "was done in bad faith with the intent to undermine his contract with the Yankees and to prevent him from succeeding Steinbrenner as the managing general partner of the Yankees."

The lawsuit alleged that Vincent and Dowd conducted an unfair and biased investigation and that Dowd tampered with transcripts.

Steinbrenner picked Kleinman to be general partner after Steinbrenner's son, Hank, declined to take the job.


