

## Ruling to affect abortion counseling

Last month's U.S. Supreme Court ruling on abortion counseling and referrals may have a negative impact on health care for low-income women, according to Susan Long, director of the Iowa City Family Planning Clinic. The May 23 Supreme Court decision states that federal funds cannot be used to provide abortion counseling or referrals and forbids using federal monies to finance abortion services. Based on this decision, if a woman goes into a federally funded clinic, she will be unable to discuss the option of an abortion, receive any abortion counseling or be referred to another doctor for abortion services.

"If a woman walks into a clinic and says 'Hi, I'm pregnant and I need an abortion,' (the doctors) have a script they have to follow," said Gail Sand, an associate director of the Emma Goldman Clinic for Women, 227 N. Dubuque St. "They must say 'abortion is not an appropriate method of family planning. I cannot give you any information or referral about abortion.'" The purpose of the Title X Act, which is responsible for the federal funding of family planning clinics, is to provide contraceptive information and services "in order to help lower the incidence of unintended pregnancy, improve maternal and infant health, and reduce the incidence of abortion." Priority in distribution of these federal funds

is given to low-income persons. According to Long, the court's ruling creates a two-tier health-care system where low-income people will not receive the same care as women more financially stable. "Health care for the rich is not a problem, but for low-income people, the access to even information is being denied," Sand added. Jill June, president of Planned Parenthood of Greater Iowa in Des Moines, said the ruling may keep doctors from performing their ethical duty to inform patients fully of their medical options. June said a list of patients' rights is on display at all Planned Parenthood clinics. The clinics believe one of these fundamental rights is the right of patients to know their health status. "Decisions should be up to the

physicians and licensed medical practitioners, not the government," June said. She added that Planned Parenthood will turn down any federal funding if it determines that regulations imposed by the government might infringe on patient rights. But Family Planning, the only Iowa City clinic to receive funds directly from the government, may not be able to afford to provide services without the support of federal funds, Long said. A large

portion of the clinic's budget — about \$150,000 — comes from federal funding. If Family Planning were to turn down these funds, Long said the clinic may be unable to provide complete health care. But supporters of the anti-abortion movement are cheering the court's recent decision. Jackie Fordice of Iowa City Defenders for Life agrees with the ruling. "The original intent of federally

funded family planning clinics was to provide family planning services to its clients," Fordice said. See Abortion, Page 5

## L.A. police chopper crashes, killing 3

Flaming helicopter just misses day care

LOS ANGELES — A police helicopter crashed in a parking lot and burst into flames Thursday, killing three people and narrowly missing a day care, police and witnesses said. The crash killed both officers in the helicopter and a person on the ground, authorities said. The pilot reported mechanical problems just before the late-morning crash, police said. "I seen it coming down. It started vibrating and shaking and then just crashed," said Tammie Christmas, whose house is across the street from the crash site. The helicopter had just taken off and was on patrol when the pilot radioed he was having engine trouble, Police Chief Daryl Gates said. The craft clipped a street light pole, then crashed into the parking lot across the street from Normandie Avenue Children's Center, a day care on an elementary school campus, three miles southwest of downtown Los Angeles. "It will be some time before we really know what took place. The

pilot did call in to report engine trouble," Gates said. "I would think the pilot looked and saw the school and wanted to avoid that." The crash set fire to several cars in the parking lot, and the blaze spread to the side of a one-story duplex, blackening part of the building and knocking out windows. It took firefighters about 30 minutes to put out the flames; they were hampered by exploding gas tanks from the cars, said city Fire Department spokesman Greg Acevedo. Dozens of children were evacuated from the preschool, which was not damaged. "We heard like a crash or an explosion," said Renee Porter, an office assistant at the center. "We looked outside and saw a car was on fire, a front yard was on fire, a house was on fire, and I believe a body was in the yard." Maria Contreras said a man in the helicopter either jumped or fell out of the door just before the helicopter struck the ground. But she said the man was enveloped in flames. "When it was coming down, the man fell out of the side and fell back," she said.

## U.S. prices, sales see upturn; joblessness continues decline

WASHINGTON — Big increases for gasoline, vegetables and tobacco pushed wholesale prices up a surprising 0.6 percent in May, the government said Thursday. But in more favorable economic news, retail sales rang up a broad-based gain last month while Americans' new claims for unemployment benefits posted a fourth straight weekly decline — developments seen by some economists as proof that the recession is over. Analysts were especially heartened by the large 38,000 decline in

the number of Americans filing for jobless benefits, dropping the total to a seasonally adjusted 401,000 for the week ending June 1. The last time new unemployment claims had fallen for four consecutive weeks was in October 1982, just before the end of the severe 1981-82 recession. "If there were any doubts that the recession ended in May, today's jobless figures should put them to rest," said Irwin Kellner, chief economist at Manufacturers Hanover Trust in New York. ## Many grads searching for jobs

Economy hinders employment hunt

In today's tough economic times, many college graduates are discovering that having a degree isn't necessarily the ticket to getting a job. Record numbers of students are graduating without having found work in their chosen field, according to Nancy Noth, assistant dean in the College of Business and director of the Business and Liberal Arts Placement Office. "It's been a very difficult year for finding jobs," Noth said. "Not just in Iowa, but nationwide." Noth said the current job climate was reflected in the UI business school's 1991 pre-graduation survey, which showed that only 55 percent of UI grads had found jobs — down considerably from the average 66 to 70 percent. Stacey Williamson, who graduated from the UI in May, said she has spent a lot of time looking for jobs but has had no luck so far. "There are just no jobs out there. It's depressing," said Williamson, a journalism major. "It makes you feel like you wasted four years of your life. I'm probably going to be starting in a job that's not even close to what I wanted." Noth said the jobs are there, but graduates will have to look much harder for them, adding that students can't wait for the employers to come looking for them.

"It's going to take longer to find a job," she said. "In past years students answered ads, or they had geographical preferences as to where they wanted to work. Now they're broadening out and going where they feel there are opportunities. They're looking at jobs that might not be their first choice." Graduates will change jobs an average of eight to 10 times during their careers, Noth said, so starting in a less-than-ideal job shouldn't be discouraging. Placement Office Associate Director Don Moffett said graduates in certain majors will have more luck finding employment than others. "Engineering on the whole hasn't

## Abortion foes naming names

LIVONIA, Mich. — Patients entering an abortion clinic here last weekend saw the usual array of signs by anti-abortion protesters: "Don't Kill Your Baby," "It's Not Too Late." But the signs were different from the usual ones in one respect: They included the names of two patients scheduled to undergo abortions that day. The tactic, not surprisingly, has horrified abortion-rights advocates, who see it as a gross invasion of the patients' privacy. Anti-abortion activists defend it as an extreme, but justified, weapon in their battle against abortion. "It's very unusual, very rare," said Randall Terry, the head of Operation Rescue, a national anti-abortion group that has engaged in numerous clinic demonstrations — although not, apparently, this one. "I think that in certain circumstances it is appropriate. Absolutely."

Barbara Radford, executive director of the Washington-based National Abortion Federation, which represents abortion providers, said she'd never heard of the tactic being used before. "But it doesn't surprise me," she added. "It's just one more in a long list of ugly tactics. They just don't have any respect for people's private lives." A group of about 20 protesters gathered Saturday outside the Women's Advisory Center in Livonia, a Detroit suburb, with the signs that included the two women's names. Lynn Mills, a spokeswoman for the protesters, said the group used the tactic because police barricades prevent abortion foes from getting near the patients. "Our goal is to get them to come and talk to us so we can offer them help," she said. "The signs were big enough so that if they were looking through the abortion-mill window, they could see them," Mills added.

# Peer helper class offered this summer

2-week workshop teaches 'life skills'

While in college, students may acquire a number of skills — from writing essays to interpreting the financial page. What they may not learn, however, are the often more important skills of human interaction.

Recognizing this need, Health Iowa, the educational branch of Student Health Services at the UI, developed a program to help students become effective peer hel-

pers. This summer Peer Helper Training will be offered as a workshop through the Saturday and Evening Class Program.

The coordinator for the class is Lisa Broek, health educator at Health Iowa. She calls the workshop a unique opportunity for students.

"It is a wonderful opportunity to not only earn credit, but also to learn important life skills," she said.

The class will cover topics such as crisis management, decision-making, human development, program planning and self-esteem.

Students can earn two credits for the class, which will meet for two weeks beginning June 17. Because

it is a workshop with no pre-registration, Broek does not know how many students to expect. Twenty-five students enrolled for the class last fall.

Although the workshop is open to everyone, instructor Mary Peterson expects more non-traditional students — older students returning to school — to attend this summer.

Broek said one of the goals of the class is to provide training for students interested in peer-helping positions on campus, such as being resident assistants or leaders in the greek system.

"It provides students with the skills necessary to be effective peer helpers," she said.

Peterson agreed, saying peers are

often a very influential part of one's life.

"This class teaches students to deal with these peers and learn valuable skills we use in everyday life," she said.

One unusual feature of the class is that it is taught by a team of six instructors.

"Students are exposed to many different people and learn a variety of things," Peterson said.

Other teachers of Peer Helper Training include Tim McMahon, education program coordinator at Residence Services; Laurel Van Ham, University Counseling Services; and Barb Petroff, director of Health Iowa.

## Dems: Sue Branstad over vetoes

DES MOINES — Democratic legislative leaders Thursday said they may push for the Legislature to sue Gov. Terry Branstad over his veto of \$34 million in pay raises for state workers.

Republicans suggested a lawsuit was simply a way around a political disagreement.

"We ought to refrain from using the court system every time we disagree," Senate Minority Leader Jack Rife, R-Moscow, said.

The issue surfaced at a meeting of the Legislative Council, a bipartisan panel of legislative leaders that conducts business between sessions. That's the group that would have to approve of a lawsuit against Branstad.

Veteran Rep. John Connors, D-Des Moines, urged the panel to sue Branstad over "these rotten vetoes." He said legislators should defend the rights of public workers.

The largest union representing state workers already has filed suit, saying Branstad violated the state's collective bargaining law when he vetoed the money for the pay raises.

Branstad has said the state cannot afford the higher pay and said he has a constitutional responsibility to balance the state budget.

Connors said challenging Branstad in court would underscore the Legislature's commitment to the issue.

## Supervisors renew special taxi service

The Johnson County Board of Supervisors voted Thursday to renew the taxi service that supplements rides given to seniors and persons with disabilities through Johnson County SEATS (Special Elderly & Handicapped Transportation System).

The taxi service is primarily used to provide transportation for seniors and disabled persons when scheduling conflicts make SEATS vans unavailable. SEATS asks only a donation for the service.

The taxi service, provided by Old Capitol Cab, 822 Gilbert Court, is part of a cooperative agreement among Johnson County, Coralville, Iowa City and University Heights.

In other business, the board decided to continue hearing presentations by insurance consultants regarding the county's employee health benefit plan.

Although the county's health plan currently is administered through Blue Cross Blue Shield, the board

has been considering other options for its health plan.

At Thursday's meeting, Larry Timinski, an international marketing coordinator, told the board the county could save about \$4,900 in administrative costs if it were to change plan administrators from Blue Cross Blue Shield to American Medical Security.

"While I cannot advise the board to change administrators for only \$4,900, I think when the whole package (offered by American Medical Security) is considered, it might be something that one would jump at," Timinski said.

James Newman of James Jaynes Group Benefit Consultants asked the board to present additional alternatives for the county's employee health coverage.

But Teresa Bennett of Blue Cross Blue Shield told the supervisors her employer would match any program proposed to the board.

"If the services we provide you could be provided at a substantially cheaper rate, you'd have 10 people in here with proposals."

## Registration, locks cut down on bike thefts

Bicycle theft in Iowa City is a thriving business. Over 350 bikes were reported stolen in Iowa City last year and very few of those were recovered.

There are two kinds of thefts, according to Iowa City Police Officer Robert Gass, joy-riders and real thefts.

"Joy-riders are usually drunks who find an unlocked bike and ride it home from the bars," Gass said. "We usually recover those bikes in someone's yard or an alley."


Recovery of stolen bicycles is rare. "We figure the expensive bikes that are stolen are on their way to Chicago or some other town," Gass said.

The Iowa City Police Department holds an auction every spring to sell all the bikes that were recovered and not claimed. About 250 bicycles were auctioned off last year, with the proceeds going toward the bike program.

Operation Identification, a new program beginning next week through the ICPD, will register bikes with a unique identification number. Each household will be assigned one number to register bicycles, VCRs, televisions and other home ware. The number will be entered into a new nationwide computer system.

"Then if your bike or television shows up in California, the police there will be able to trace the item back to you in Iowa," Gass said.

Bicyclists who have already registered their bikes with the ICPD will have to re-register their bikes

to receive a number in the new system.

Merchants in Iowa City also register bikes when they are purchased.

"When we sell a bike, we register it on our computer," David Wells, with The Ordinary Bike Shop, said. "That way we have a complete record of the purchase and description of the bike if it ever is stolen."

Bike shops also encourage owners to check with them if their bicycle is stolen.

"Go to every bike shop and check for it; leave your name and a description of the bike," James Tomkins, bike shop manager at Racquet Master Bike & Ski, said.

"Most local thieves will hide the bike for a while and then take it out when they feel the pressure is

off. Eventually the bike will have to get worked on, and someone will recognize it. It's also not a bad idea to check shops in Cedar Rapids, Muscatine and the Quad Cities."

Tomkins encourages riders to keep a detailed description of the bicycle and the serial number.

"Theft is a big problem, and getting worse," Tomkins said. "If you don't have the serial number you can't get the bike back, even if I know you," referring to an instance when he knew a particular rider and his bike, but the rider did not have a record of the serial number.

Cable locks are easiest to break and not recommended, Wells said. Thieves will snip the cable with wirecutters and take the lock with

them to avoid suspicion. He recommends the U-bar locks, which are much more difficult to break.

Charges for stealing a bicycle depend on the value of the bike. If the bike stolen is worth between \$100 and \$500, the charge is an aggravated misdemeanor. If it is worth over \$500, it is a felony.

"Thefts range the gambit," Gass said. "I don't think people realize if they are caught stealing a bike they will go to jail."

## Cyclists, motorists square off as city's summer rivalry resumes

Iowa City bicyclists face more than their share of obstacles — potholes, pedestrians and protesters to name a few. But none are more dangerous than the motorist.

"There is a big rift in this town between motorists and bicyclists," Iowa City Police Officer Robert Gass said. "Most motorists who aren't bicyclists are rather annoyed by them, and Iowa City is a town with more than its share of bicyclists. You have to be extremely defensive."

"I think most motorists regard bicyclists as a road hazard — they just want to pass them as soon as possible."

Gass said most of the more serious accidents occur in areas bicyclists should avoid — such as Highways 1 and 6, and the Coralville Strip.

"We've had two or three bicyclist fatalities on the strip," Gass said. "In these areas, cars are traveling at 40 or 50 mph and have to pass bicyclists riding on the road. They

are just accidents waiting to happen."

James Tomkins, bike shop manager of Racquet Master Bike & Ski, 321 S. Gilbert St., said some accidents could be avoided.

"Iowa City drivers don't like bikers. I know of instances where people have gotten deliberately hit

## Traffic laws difficult to enforce

Although Iowa City bicyclists are expected to follow the rules of the road while riding, the laws are sometimes contradictory and may be enforced inconsistently.

Rules and regulations of the road apply to bicyclists only when they are riding on the road and not the sidewalk, although it is only legal to ride on certain areas of sidewalk. But local police do not stop every bicyclist who they see disobeying traffic laws.

"Our enforcement is a little spotty," said Iowa City Police Officer Robert Gass. "Bikes are hit and miss because officers feel it is more worthwhile to correct a motorized vehicle. A bicyclist will usually only hurt himself if he disobeys a traffic law. A car can do a lot more damage."

According to the Iowa City Code of Ordinances, bicycles can ride on sidewalks in non-commercial districts. In Iowa City, the commercial district is defined as the area outlined by Burlington, Jefferson, Clinton and Gilbert streets.

"Bikes are kind of dual creatures; they must have

"What has evolved over the years is that the federal money has been used more for abortion services and less for family planning services to prevent pregnancies," she added.

Forde said she hopes the ruling will force Iowa City clinics to focus more on family planning and less on providing abortion services. She said the decision is an effective way to reduce the number of abortions.

But Sand expressed concern the

decision will eventually go beyond a ban on abortion counseling.

"I think the ruling creates an environment where people start to think abortion is already illegal because, after all, if your federally funded clinic can't talk about it, it must be illegal," Sand said. "We've already had calls here from women who want to know if abortion is still legal."

Long called the ruling an attempt to reduce access to abortion.

"Abortion is a federally mandated

thing, so (the ruling) is restricting access to something legal," she said.

Since the May 23 decision, no specific guidelines have been developed regarding implementation of the ruling. Individual clinics are waiting for lawyers to review the decision to determine if they can receive federal funds without cutting medical services.

Other clinics, such as Emma Goldman, have never received federal

funding. The Iowa City Planned Parenthood clinic operates on private funding but could be affected by the ruling if its national organization refuses federal funding.

The two Iowa City clinics which could be affected by the ruling — Iowa City Family Planning Clinic, 242 Westlawn Building, and Planned Parenthood, 2 S. Linn St. — together see an estimated 10,000 women in the Iowa City area each year.

Association, added, "It's looking more and more like the economy has turned the corner on the recession and we're starting to turn up."

Other analysts were more cau-

tious, however. While agreeing that rising spending by consumers and fewer job layoffs were hopeful signs, they said it was too soon to declare with certainty an end to the recession.

Richard Rahn, chief economist of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said it appeared that overall economic activity, as measured by the gross national product, was growing in the current April-June quarter after two consecutive quarterly declines.

But he predicted this would be just a brief pause with GNP turning negative again and the recession dragging through the rest of the year.

Michael Boskin, chairman of the

president's Council of Economic Advisers, also expressed caution.

One encouraging sign was May's 1 percent gain in retail sales — led by a 1.7 percent advance for autos — following a 0.4 percent drop in overall sales in April. Analysts said the increase provided fresh evidence that the consumers, who account for two-thirds of total economic activity, were beginning to spend again following the uncertainty caused by the recession and the Persian Gulf war.

by a car. The driver wants to see how close they can get to the bike and just hit it," Tomkins said. "You have to watch out for yourself."

White lines designating bike lanes on major streets and bike trails throughout campus would help, Tomkins added.

David Wells, an employee at The Ordinary Bike Shop, 203 N. Linn St., said motorists may be more inclined to give bicyclists leeway if they followed traffic laws.

"I've seen people riding crazy. Motorists would take bikers more seriously if they observed traffic rules and wore helmets," Wells said.

Helmets and protective wear are highly recommended for bicyclists, Gass said, but are not required by law.

"Most injuries that result from bike injuries are head and neck," Gass said. "Most of the time, after an accident, the bicyclist is going to be taken to the hospital."

Most bicycle helmets are constructed out of condensed plastic foam and are designed for one major impact. When the rider's head hits the ground, the foam absorbs the blow and spreads the

pressure throughout the helmet. Costlier plastic-coated helmets are more aesthetically appealing and may be safer than the helmets without coating, Wells said.

"When a rider falls, the plastic coating will slide along the ground, whereas the Styrofoam may catch on something and jerk the rider's neck," Wells said.

Helmets have not been very popular among bicyclists in the past, but that trend may be changing.

"People are starting to get better about helmets," Tomkins said, whose store offers a free helmet with the purchase of a bike.

"By offering them along with the bikes, we are both giving a free accessory and encouraging people to use them," he said.

They also make great gift ideas. "Children are buying helmets for their dads for Father's Day," Wells said. "There is a greater awareness now of safety precautions."

Wells added that most students do not buy helmets because of the appearance.

"All helmets give you that bubble-head look, but you have to decide which is more important — looking good or saving your head."

having found one," he said.

headlights and reflectors on the roadway but not the sidewalk," Gass said. "It makes for very difficult enforcement."

Bicycles on the road between dusk and dawn must be equipped with a headlight and a rear reflector visible from 300 feet.

There are also regulations regarding the parking of bicycles downtown and on campus. The ICPD is authorized to remove bicycles that are obstructing the public and is not responsible if a chain or lock must be removed to do so.

Once the new ICPD community service officer begins duty July 1, Gass said residents will see a sharp increase in the number of bicycle laws enforced.

"The CSO will patrol downtown and confiscate a lot more bikes for improper parking than we do now," Gass said.

Gass said most of the time he only issues a warning to bicyclists stopped for traffic infractions, but if a ticket is issued, it may cost \$10 plus court costs and surcharges.

# Mt. Pinatubo covers Filipino villages, mountains with inches of ash, pumice

MANILA, Philippines — Mount Pinatubo blew a cloud of ash and pumice 80,000 feet in the air Thursday, coating tropical villages and mountainsides with a thick carpet of the snow-like debris. The early morning explosion was among the strongest of seven eruptions that have shaken the 4,795-foot volcano since Wednesday. White ash 3 inches deep covered tropical areas as far away as Olongapo, 25 miles to the southwest; vehicles that stalled under a deluge of ash dotted the roadside. "What we are seeing now are phenomenal eruptions," said Raymond Punongbayan, director of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology. "The story of Mount Pinatubo is not quite over yet."

## Salvadoran rebels obtain new missiles

WASHINGTON — President Alfredo Cristiani of El Salvador said Thursday the Salvadoran rebels have acquired high performance surface-to-air missiles in a shipment that he believes was sent by Cuba. Cristiani, who ended a state visit here Thursday, said the Soviet-made SAM-16s are more sophisticated than the SAMs obtained previously by the rebels in their 11-year war against the U.S.-backed government. The State Department agreed with Cristiani that the SAM-16s were provided by the Cubans. In El Salvador, rebel commanders told reporters they indeed have SAM-16s. They said the missiles came from the international black market.

Pacific Ocean east of Luzon island and could strengthen into a tropical storm by Friday. Punongbayan warned that heavy rain would increase the threat of devastating mudflows that could send giant boulders and tons of ash crashing down Mount Pinatubo into lowlands as far away as 25 miles. Two deaths have been reported from the eruptions, both on Wednesday. A Filipino serving in the U.S. Navy was killed when his car veered off an ash-slickened road near the Subic Bay naval base, 30 miles southwest of the volcano, and struck a bus. An Aeta tribesman who lives on the slopes of Pinatubo said he saw his uncle die in an eruption. There was no official confirmation, but the man was himself badly burned.

Thursday's explosion sent thousands more refugees streaming into evacuation centers, and looters ransacked offices at a U.S. military garrison on Clark Air Base that was evacuated Monday. In all, 50,000 people have been evacuated from areas near the volcano since last week. The latest eruption occurred Thursday morning and lasted a half-hour. It unleashed giant mudflows down the jagged, ash-covered western slopes of the mountain and into the Marella River. The eruption sent a gray avalanche of deadly ash and molten rock down the slopes. The billowing cloud and pumice the size of hailstones turned day to dusk. Debris from the eruption covered roads, and huge boulders, some the size of cars, littered gullies and riverbeds.

Associated Press reporter Claro Cortes, who was 10 miles west of the crater when the eruption occurred, said residents fled on foot in panic, some clutching chickens and holding handkerchiefs over their faces. About 40 reporters and photographers ran for their cars, taking in

as many residents as they could. Geologists predicted more violent activity from the volcano, which had been silent for six centuries before beginning to spew on Sunday. "We are still expecting it to reach a peak again," said Jesse Daligid of the volcanology and seismology institute. Looters took advantage of the confusion to ransack offices of the U.S. military's Crow Valley aerial gunnery range, according to the governor of Tarlac province, Mariano Un Ocampo. Crow Valley is on the northwest end of Clark Air Base, about 10 miles east of Mount Pinatubo. Nearly 15,000 American troops and their families fled Clark on Monday for Subic Bay naval base.

# At the end, key player is Paxson

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Who was that man making all the key jumpers down the stretch as the Chicago Bulls won their first NBA championship?

It wasn't Michael Jordan or even Scottie Pippen. John Paxson stepped up and hit big shot after big shot as the Bulls beat the Los Angeles Lakers 108-101 Wednesday night to win their first title in 25 years in the league.

"Three or four years ago we depended on Michael to pull games out for us down the stretch and that was unfair to him," Paxson said after scoring 20 points on 9-for-12 shooting. "That's why it was satisfying to win the championship as a team."

Even with Jordan still the dominant player on the team, the rest of the Bulls brought their game up to a championship level, one which had eluded and haunted them since he joined the team in 1984.


"I've never been like this, emotionally in public," Jordan said. "But I don't mind. It's been a seven-year struggle for me and for the city of Chicago."

"And we did it as a team; all season long we did it as a team." Jordan is no longer the star without an NBA championship ring. He is no longer a one-man team.

"I played my consistent game, but they really did it," said Jordan, who had 30 points and 10 assists.

Pippen scored 32 points, had 13 rebounds and seven assists in the clincher and Horace Grant added 11 points on 4-for-5 shooting.

But it was Paxson who had five field goals in the last four minutes, each a backbreaker for the Lakers and their fervent Forum fans.

Paxson scored 20 points on 9-for-12 shooting in the Bulls' clincher.

"The great thing to me is that we did it as a team and will dispel that thing about being a one-man team," Paxson said. "At least until next season."

"And this will get rid of any thoughts that Michael Jordan can't win an NBA championship."

"It's a great feeling to be No. 1 but it was a lot of hard work; nothing was easy," said Pippen who became the first player other than Jordan to lead the Bulls in scoring in the 17 playoff games. "I know we will celebrate at least two days because we're not going home until tomorrow."

No matter how much praise was heaped on the rest of the Bulls, talk always returned to Jordan.

Chicago coach Phil Jackson said Jordan's contributions as a team player shouldn't be overlooked, explaining, "He would drive to the basket and always find the open guy. He shared all his efforts with the other guys."

Jordan also had some praise for Jackson, who won the NBA championship as a player with the Knicks in 1973, and now had a ring in his second year as a head coach.

"Phil has been a unique coach. He reminds me of Coach (Dean) Smith," Jordan said referring to his college coach at North Carolina. "They both use psychology to get the most out of you."

The mind games worked just fine.

# Lightning kills fan at U.S. Open

CHASKA, Minn. — Lightning killed one spectator and injured five others Thursday as they stood near a tree during a delay at the U.S. Open golf tournament at Hazeltine National golf course.

"I just felt something and then my legs went entirely numb and I went down," said Glenn Engstrom, 36, who was in stable condition at Ridgeview Medical Center in Waconia.

"Then guys behind me started yelling for help and I joined in and hollered for help," he said in a telephone interview, adding that paramedics arrived "fairly quickly."

The man who died suffered cardiac arrest, said Dr. Dale Bohlke, director of emergency medical services at St. Francis Regional Medical Center in Shakopee. His identity was not immediately released.

In serious condition at St. Paul-Ramsey Medical Center was John James Hannahan, 42, of the St. Paul area, said hospital spokeswoman Robin Rainford.

Also in stable condition at Ridgeview Medical

Center were Ray John Gavin, 49, of Mendota Heights; Scott Aune, 29, of Spring Park, and Jeffrey Skalicky, 32, of Waite Park, a spokeswoman said.

The lightning struck near the 11th tee about 10 minutes after play was suspended with just 24 players in the 156-man field having completed the first round.

"With that amount of lightning, there could have been a lot more injuries," said Dr. Bob Nordland, co-medical director of the tournament.

Mark Pollich, a tournament official, said all six were within 15 feet of each other, clustered under the same tree.

The storm struck shortly before 1 p.m. with an estimated 40,000 spectators swarming over the Hazeltine National course 30 miles southwest of Minneapolis.

"Clearly something like this is the nightmare you hope you don't have," said David Fay, executive director of the U.S. Golf Association. "We can handle the safety of the players and caddies pretty well, but when you have 40,000 people on the course, it is not an exact science in how to get them to a safe area."

# Astros see chance to move

HOUSTON — At least three National League club owners say they will not support any move by John McMullen to sell his Houston Astros to out-of-town buyers who could move the team to another city.

"I can't see going along with that," Pittsburgh Pirates owner Doug Danforth told *The Houston Chronicle*.

Bill Giles of Philadelphia said he would not approve of moving the Astros from the Astrodome "unless they could prove it was an extreme situation."

Bob Lurie of San Francisco said he would not vote for such a move.

"You can't say it isn't a possibility that somebody will buy a franchise and move it — anything is possible," Lurie told *The Houston Post*. "I just don't think it is probable."

McMullen and Louis Sussman, a former St. Louis Cardinals official who now works for Salomon Brothers, the investment banking firm retained by the team, met Wednesday with the eight-member

major league ownership committee in Santa Monica, Calif.

McMullen wants to test the interest of the four cities who failed to earn expansion teams. He's already contacted groups in Washington, D.C. and Orlando, Fla.

One committee member who asked not to be identified told *The Chronicle* that McMullen and his associates requested permission to sell the franchise to an out-of-town buyer.

There has been speculation McMullen would want to sell to one of the groups that lost out on an NL expansion team: Tampa-St. Petersburg, Fla., Washington, Buffalo, N.Y., or Orlando, Fla.

"Their report was they are having trouble selling the club," said George W. Bush, minority owner of the Texas Rangers and a member of the ownership committee.

Bush refused to comment on whether McMullen had support from other owners to sell the team to investors who would move the

franchise.

To move the team, McMullen would need approval from National League owners, eight American League owners and Commissioner Fay Vincent, who said he will not allow teams to move unless circumstances are extreme.

Houston's attendance has declined in each of the last two seasons. Astros drew 1,834,908 fans for an average of 22,364 at 82 home games in 1989. Last year, attendance dropped to 1,310,927 or 15,986 home game. The NL average attendance is 25,000 per game.

Through 34 home dates so far this season, the Astros have drawn 433,535 fans to the Astrodome, an average of 12,751 per game.

McMullen refused to answer reporters' questions after Wednesday meetings. But he told the *Orlando Sentinel*, "I have intended from start to start to someone who did not want to move the team. And still want to do what is in the best interests of baseball."

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — There are always the whispers.

For great players who haven't been champions, the whispers grow into a chorus of criticism. They may not believe it, but they can't ignore it.

"If he's so great, then how come he's never won a title?"

Oscar Robertson heard it. Certainly, Wilt Chamberlain did. In baseball, the sound of Ernie Banks' bat as he cracked out another of his 512 homers couldn't drown it out.

And Michael Jordan heard it, too.

perfect throw to the plate to double up pinch runner Tony Perezchica trying to score from third.

"That double play secured Chicago's 4-3 victory over the Giants."

"Yes, I was surprised he went," Dawson said. "But you can't take it for granted. He might have been breaking just to see where the throw was going."

Will Clark opened the inning with a pinch single and Mike Felder walked. Dave Anderson sacrificed the runners to second and third. With first base open, Willie McGee, who had extended his hitting streak to 17 games earlier in the afternoon, was walked intentionally. That loaded the bases and brought up Kingery to bat for pitcher Jeff Brantley.

"I'm not going to second-guess my third base coach, Bill Fahey,"

Giants manager Roger Craig said. "Dawson made a good play. It took a perfect throw. I would have done the same thing."

Mike Bielecki (8-4) was the winner in relief and Paul Assenmacher threw one pitch to Kingery to earn his fifth save.

After Williams had put the Giants ahead 2-0 against Bob Scanlan, the Cubs tied it in the fourth when George Bell and Dawson homered on successive pitches off Trevor Wilson (2-5).

**Twins roll over Yanks for 12th straight**

MINNEAPOLIS — The Minnesota Twins broke a team record with their 12th straight victory and Scott Erickson set a club mark with his 10th consecutive win Thursday night, beating the New York Yankees 10-3.

Chili Davis hit two home runs as Minnesota snapped the team record of 11 straight wins set in 1980. The Twins have won 15 of their last 16, including a three-game sweep of the Yankees.

Erickson (10-2), leading the majors with a 1.60 ERA, broke the Twins' record for consecutive wins in one season, held by Frank Viola and Stan Williams. Bert Blyleven and Ray Corbin each won 10 straight over two seasons for Minnesota.

Erickson allowed two runs on nine hits, struck out five and walked none in seven innings. He

became the fastest 10-game winner in Twins' history, topping Viola's 10th victory on June 17, 1988.

Davis hit two home runs in a game for the third time this season. His solo shot in the third inning was his 13th homer of the year, surpassing last season's total, and he hit a two-run, 459-foot drive in the eighth.

Minnesota led 7-0 after four innings. The Twins scored four times in the first, including three off Mike Witt (0-1), who left the game with a sore right elbow after retiring just one hitter.

**Lightning steals Henke's thunder**

CHASKA, Minn. — Golf became an after-thought Thursday when tragedy and death scarred the opening round of the 91st U.S. Open.

"All those people with no place to go. I feel real bad," a subdued Nolan Henke said after taking a share of the lead in the round that was delayed by a killer storm and, eventually, postponed overnight.

With 33 players stranded on the course by darkness, Henke shared the top spot with Payne Stewart at 67, five under par.

"It was almost like we weren't playing the U.S. Open. People were hurt and killed out there. So how

can you be upset or concerned about a bad hole or a bad score," said Tom Byrum, who was one shot back of the leaders.

The 11 threesomes stranded by darkness are scheduled to return at 8 a.m., CDT Friday to complete play, with the second round to be held as scheduled.

Stewart, a former PGA champion who sat out a good portion of the season with a serious back problem, played without a bogey and was among the last players to finish before darkness fell.

"Playing after the storm was an advantage," he said. "The winds subsided, the greens were a little softer and very smooth."

Stewart, wearing a brace to support his ailing back, birdied three

of his first four holes

only one green in regulation. Henke, who scored his second career victory in Phoenix earlier this season, found the cup with a 177-yard 6-iron for an eagle-2 on the first hole.

He played the front in 32, went five under par with a downhill wide-breaking, 35-foot putt on the 10th and rolled home on a string of eight consecutive pars.

Byrum, whose only victory in a six-season career came in the 1988 Kemper Open, closed within a shot of the lead with a 20-foot birdie putt on the 16th and a 10-footer on the final hole.


