Rawlings resigns from UI

Students stunned by decision

UI students were shocked at Saturday's announcement by UI offi-cials that UI President Hunter Rawlings will leave June 30.

Although rumors circulated last week, Rawlings' resignation was not confirmed until a press conference Saturday afternoon. Students agreed the resignation was unexpected, but the news evoked a wide span of student sentiment, ranging from feelings of loss to unconcern. "It's a shocker because you kind

Cornell post entices president

After six and a half years as president of the UI, Hunter Rawlings announced Saturday he will step down from his position to take over the presidency of Cornell Uni-versity in Ithaca, N.Y.

Vice President for University Relations Ann Rhodes made the announcement that Rawlings, 49, would resign as UI president at the end of June. Rawlings flew to Itha-



ca Friday night and is expected to return to Iowa City at the end of the week.

"Hunter Rawlings, president of the UI, will be leaving on June 30 to assume the presidency of Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y.," Rhodes said at a news conference Saturday. "He will assume the presidency there on July 1."

Rawlings was unavailable for comment but released the following statement to be read at the press conference: "Cornell University represents an extraordinary opportunity for leadership, and I am honored to be asked to assume its presidency. I want to emphasize that I have enormous affection and respect for the University of Iowa, one of this country's academic gems. It has been, and continues to be, a real pleasure for me to serve as its president."

Cornell University is an Ivy League school with a combined undergraduate and graduate student enrollment of approximately 19,000. Kawlings will succeed Frank Rhodes as the 10th president of Cornell. While colleagues expressed disappointment, none were surprised that Rawlings had been named as Cornell's next president. Dave Skorton, UI vice president for Research, said the announcement was unexpected, but he was not surprised other universities were recruiting Rawlings. "Someone of his stature gets asked to look at a lot of jobs," Skorton said. Iowa state Board of Regents President Marvin Berenstein said Rawlings' appointment reflects well on Rawlings, the UI and the system of public higher education in Iowa. "I believe people seeking new leaders look to a system like ours because the administrative leaders have had an opportunity to act on their own behalf," he said. "It is a compliment to Hunter and the regent system in Iowa." Faculty Senate President Richard Hurtig said Rawlings exhibits the high-quality leadership many universities look for. "We live in a time when there is a continual search by institutions

Coffee culprit ordered to clean bathrooms

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. (AP) - A man who was videotaped urinating into a company coffee pot has received an appropriately unpleasant sentence: cleaning bathrooms.

Milton Ross, 41, pleaded guilty Friday to third-degree assault. He was placed on two years' probation and ordered to spend 100 hours cleaning public restrooms.

"I made a stupid choice," said Ross, who was fired from his job after the incident. "Although I did do it, I didn't expect it would be on tape and become a worldwide issue. Now I want to get on with my life."

A covert camera set up by a co-worker caught Ross urinating into a coffee pot at Wire Rope Corp. of America in July. Ross said his action was part of an ongoing feud with the co-worker.





STUDENT FAINTS AFTER 72-HOUR SESSION Freshman passes out in studying marathon

One UI freshman learned the hard way that pots of coffee and two-liter bottles of Coke just won't replace a good night's sleep when cramming for finals.

A total of nine hours of shuteye throughout a three-day studying binge wasn't enough for Tolstoy Mahendra Patel, who fainted in his Currier Residence Hall room Saturday night while studying for his engineering, physics and calculus finals.

Patel, 17, was sprawled on the floor of his room when floormates Mark Skala and Judd Picco discovered him and called 911.

"We noticed he was laying on the floor, and it didn't look nor-mal, so I picked him up and set him on his bed," Skala said. "He

seemed disoriented, so we called 911, and the paramedics came and took over."

Patel admitted that Saturday was not the first time he had passed out after studying too long without sleep. When para-medics arrived, Patel refused to be admitted to a hospital because he was confident he could recover without medical attention, he said.

"The paramedics asked if I needed to go to the hospital, but this has happened before so I knew what I had to do," he said. "I knew I needed sleep, and I knew if I took an hour to myself to recover I would be all right."



"I always wanted to do sports," Morgan said. "This is the best TV play-by-play job in the state because of the fans."

A lack of physical skills steered Morgan away from the court and to the microphone at an early age.

"I had no athletic ability whatsoever," he said. "If I could do it, I wouldn't talk about it.'

Talking about sports has been Morgan's job for 20 years as sports-casting for high-school and college games took him from Kansas to California and eventually to Des Moines, where he called Drake University football and basketball games.

For 12 years, Morgan's days have begun at 3:30 a.m., working as a morning disc jockey for KGGO, a Des Moines radio station. As half of the morning team known as "Lou and Larry," Morgan entertains his listeners as they battle rush-hour traffic.

On game days, Morgan leaves the radio station after his show is done at 9 a.m. and heads to Iowa City for a day with the Hawkeyes. The first game-day events are practice sessions for each team, during which Morgan and co-host Mac McCausland talk with coaches and players.

"Basically, at that point a lot of your work is done," he said. "I just try to think what the game means and kind of relax."

At tip-off time, usually 7:05 p.m., the fun begins for Morgan, who is assisted by a TV monitor which shows the broadcast and a headset that connects him to the program's producer.

Aided by a meticulously pre-pared notebook containing team and player statistics, Morgan channels his enthusiasm into an exciting play-by-play for television viewers. Morgan said he spends two hours before every game compiling the career highs and averages for each team's players.

"You never want to use all the stuff you have because that means A, you're talking too much; and B, you don't have enough information," he said.

After the game, Morgan attends press conferences held by Tom Davis for comments to use during his morning radio broadcast.

Morgan returns home at 10:45 p.m., after putting in more than 18 hours at work. He said although game days are long, the fun he has work compensates for a lack of

"If you enjoy what you do, it's not a big deal," he said. "You could let that get to you, but I try not to."

Morgan said he plans to sportscast until he retires.

"I'd like to keep doing this as long as I can do it," he said.







Policy struggle unaffected by resignation

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The immediate effects of Hunter Rawlings' departure on the UI classroom materials policy are unclear, but UI officials said the issue has been directed away from Rawlings in recent months.

Rawlings was the author of the current policy, which contains the controversial phrase "unusual and unexpected materials." The phrase has become part of the rallying cries of policy opponents, and the policy itself has spawned numerous protests and debates since its implementation almost one year

Iowa state Board of Regents President Marvin Berenstein said he hopes to have the issue fully debated and resolved before Rawlings officially resigns on June 30.

"I expect this issue to be resolved within the next six months," Berenstein said. "I'm tired of it. Hopefully, this matter will be done with before the new president comes on board."

The classroom materials policy, commonly referred to as the "sex act" policy even though it doesn't specify sexual content, is primarily in the hands of the UI Faculty Senate, Berenstein said.

"I don't think President Rawlings' leaving will have any effect on the policy," Berenstein said. "Lately it has not been involving the president. I don't think that President Rawlings has as much to do with it as the Faculty Senate does."

The pressure to solve the policy issue has been placed on Rawlings too often, Berenstein said.

Rawlings was criticized by the Campaign for Academic Freedom for composing the final draft of the policy while students and faculty were on winter break last year. The policy was proposed on Jan. 17 and approved unanimously by the regents on Jan. 19. The debate has continued since then, with CAF being the most vocal opponent. The Faculty Senate reopened

debate on the issue, deciding to oppose the "unusual and unexpect-ed" clause at the Nov. 29 Faculty Council meeting.

Faculty Senate President Richard Hurtig said the issue created the wrong image of what the UI is about and faculty members are anxious to resolve the situation.

"I don't think that his leaving is going to necessarily alter any time course," Hurtig said. "The faculty would like to see this issue resolved quickly, independent of the departure of President Rawlings.

The ball is now in the Faculty Senate's proverbial court, Hurtig said

"This is in the faculty's hands," Hurtig said. "We're trying to come up with something that is acceptable to the faculty and to the regents.'

The UI should continue to work on this and other issues throughout the search for a new president, Hurtig said.

'We don't want to put the university in a state of suspended animation until we find a new president," he said. "There are a number of problems that still have to be addressed.'

Campaign for Academic Freedom Co-chairman Israel Reyes said he nopes the decisions surrounding he policy are made judiciously.


"I hope that any action taken isn't taken precipitously just to get it over with," Reyes said. "If they do get rid of the policy, I hope it's done with the intention of bettering the situation at the university and not as a going-away present for Hunter Rawlings."

INSTRUCTOR TO TEACH WESTERN CIVILIZATION SINCE 1792

Controversial professor to take on GER

A UI history professor accused of having an abrasive teaching style by many of his students will be teaching one of the largest classes at the UI next semester.

Earlier this semester, many of Professor David Schoenbaum's students said he frequently yelled at his classes, calling them "stupid" and "just part of the MTV generation." Three-fourths of the students in his Historical Perspectives I class dropped the course.

Despite the complaints against him, Schoenbaum will teach Western Civilization Since 1792, a General Education Requirement class taken primarily by underclassmen. Up to 352 students may enroll in the course.

Schoenbaum volunteered to teach the course, said Jeffrey Cox, chairman of the history department.

"It's always a challenge to get people to teach the class," he said. It's difficult to teach because it's large and a required course. He volunteered. He's taught it before in the many years he's been here."

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

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Elders' firing expected by UI students, faculty

President Clinton's forced resignation of controversial Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders on Friday didn't come as a surprise to UI students, faculty and staff.

Elders, 61, was ordered to resign after she stirred up controversy at the Dec. 1 World AIDS Day conference in New York, when she advocated masturbation awareness as part of sex education.

The resignation of the nation's top medical officer came as a disappointment to Linda Kroon, program assistant at the Women's Resource and Action Center, 130 N. Madison

"Most of the American public have a difficulty talking about sexuality in a direct way, and that's what Elders was doing," she said. Government officials should be able to say what they mean and to be direct."

of her downfall, said UI junior and marketing major Jodi Minard. She added that Elders was probably fired after embarrassing the president once too often.

"She had to resign because of her total lack of tact," Minard said. "I think (masturbation) is a pretty controversial issue to speak out on and one that the majority of American parents wouldn't want to be taught."

Faculty members of the UI's political science department said Elders' choice of topics contributed to her termination, aggravating conservatives in the face of an overwhelming Republican victory in November's midterm elections.

Elders' resignation may be evidence that the White House is moving to the political center, said UI political science Associate Professor Cary Covington.

"She was expressing positions that the president felt personally

administration in a bad light," he said. "Clinton wants to reclaim the moderate Democratic image of himself that he forged in his 1992 campaign."

The outspokenness of the surgeon general is a phenomenon which began during President Ronald Reagan's administration with Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, said UI political science Assistant Professor Charles Shipan. Ironically, Koop also advocated extremely liberal policies

"The difference is that Reagan was already seen as so conservative," Shipan said. "If his surgeon general made liberal comments, it ouldn't lead people to think, 'Well, there he goes again.' This is a problem for Clinton.



Elders' candidness was the cause uncomfortable with and that put his negative impact on future surgeons general, Shipan said.

"What it means is the next surgeon general will be looking over their shoulder a bit more," he said. "The position will remain a bully pulpit of sorts, but my hunch is that it's not going to be occupied by someone who is very liberal.'

UI freshman and political science major Brian Macke said Elders' resignation will have a negative impact on public policy.

"My personal feelings are that she had some good ideas," he said. "She was sort of getting us to wake up to the fact that 200 years of puritan ideas aren't necessarily the best way. Personally, I think that children should be taught about all forms of sexuality at an early age

CHILE MAY JOIN NAFTA Trade pact inked at Summit of Americas

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MIAMI - Leaders of 34 Western Hemisphere countries signed a free trade declaration Sunday that President Bill Clinton called "a watershed in the history of our hemisphere." Clinton announced a drive to

make Chile the first South American nation to join a free trade pact that now covers the United States, Canada and Mexico. "This should be evidence that we

intend to accelerate the process" of achieving the summit's goal of trade without barriers across the two continents by 2005, Clinton said.

Talks will begin in May to bring Chile into what is now called the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

The Chile announcement, which had been expected, came after Clinton ended the three-day Summit of the Americas, which he said "has more than fulfilled our expectations."

Later, at a news conference - one dominated by domestic and political questions - Clinton defended the summit's failure to take a position denouncing Cuban President Fidel Castro. He said the omission reflected disagreement over how to best foster democracy in Cuba, rather than mixed views on Castro.

"I don't think you should underestimate the depth of feeling through-

Bosnian Serbs stymie U.N. aid effort

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina Bosnian Serbs found new ways to thwart U.N. operations on Sunday, effectively stopping humanitarian aid convoys from reaching most of the country.

The Serbs said they would no longer allow U.N. armored personthrough the 70 percent of the counthey could not work without U.N. tary planners. protection.

"I think this is just another way of making life difficult for the U.N.," said Lt. Col. Jan-Dirk von Merveldt, a U.N. spokesman in Sarajevo.

The Serbs lifted restrictions on most of the 200 peacekeepers they had been holding hostage, the United Nations said. But they continued harassing U.N. forces in other ways.

A three-truck Danish fuel convoy was hijacked in Bosnian Serb territory Saturday night after gunmen armed with rifles and rocket-propelled grenades blocked the front and rear of the convoy, von Merveldt said.

Also Saturday evening, two Dutch communications vehicles were hijacked along with all of their satellite equipment, von Merveldt said.

Declety said the only peacekeepers still being restricted were about 40 at the Serb military barracks in Lukavica, outside Sarajevo.

Federal Reserve woes

In response to strong economic indicators and a growing economy, the Federal Reserve Board is expected to give the United States an early Christmas present: Chairman Alan Greenspan will meet with Reserve policy-makers Dec. 20 to discuss raising interest rates.

The nation's bank already has raised interest rates six times this year in trying to contain growth, keep prices under control and hold down inflation. This means that - just in time for Christmas and in the final days of retailers' most important season - bank loans and credit card purchases will be more expensive.

Greenspan last week told a congressional committee that the economy is growing across the board and that it's only a matter of time before inflation flares. He said inflation generally follows an economic surge and ignoring that would be taking "unacceptable risks."

It was this type of song and dance that brought about the recession during the Bush administration.

The Federal Reserve has sovereign power and complete control over the interest rates on money it lends to the nation's banks. The Reserve chairmanship has grown to be a position of great power and arrogance. Greenspan sees himself as the great controller of the economy and the nation's growth.

Our free-market economy isn't free. The Federal Reserve takes an active part in when and to what degree our country will grow. To further compound the problem, convolute the solution and corrupt the system, some elected leaders in Washington think they, too, should have a say in the direction and management of the economy.

Congressional Republicans are calling for a capital gains tax cut. They say cutting taxes will stimulate growth in the economy – the economy that Greenspan says is growing too quickly.

If the Republicans are correct, then the economy will grow after a tax cut. If Greenspan is correct, inflation will increase with the growing economy, and he will be forced to increase interest rates yet again. If he increases interest rates, the economy will slow, and Republicans will call for additional tax cuts. Additional tax cuts will spur the economy, and interest rates will climb again, slowing the economy.

It was this type of song and dance that brought about the recession during the Bush administration.

Two weeks ago, President Clinton said that he wouldn't support any measures that would increase the budget deficit and that a tax cut would be difficult at best. Few people understand the budget deficit, and even fewer care, so the president will find few supporters who really want to balance the budget and erase the deficit. In simple terms, tax cuts will reduce the money the government takes in and, without spending cuts, increase the deficit.

If congressional Republicans truly want to help the economy, they will forget tax cuts and let the economy continue to expand. If Greenspan wants to control inflation, he should increase interest rates only after inflation starts to grow.

If Greenspan and Congress want to give the country a Christ-

Too many people are jumping with joy over the fact that President Clinton "finally" demanded the resignation of Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders. Before we get carried away celebrating the Clinton administration's willingness to retreat whenever the GOP elephant stamps its foot, let's look at the incident for which Elders

was asked to leave.

Context: World AIDS Day conference. Place: New York. Date: Dec. 1, 1994. Elders was asked if she felt masturbation is something we should discuss with greater candor in our culture.

The response for which our president fired his surgeon general:

"I think that (masturbation) is something that is a part of human sexuality, and it's a part of something that perhaps should be taught. But we've not even taught our children the very basics. And I feel that we have tried ignorance for a very long time, and it's time we try education.'

I have heard more than one person say emphatically that Elders is a lunatic or that she presents herself in a way that makes it easy to label her such; I don't find any objective reason to agree. It looks to me like a combination of cultural schizophrenia, repression and backlash against a very mouthy woman who held an office that requires a mouthy incumbent to be effective.

Anybody who thinks Elders would advocate a "how-to" course in masturbation is an idiot indoctrinated in conservative froth and in need of a good 12-step program. She was saying masturbation is simply one of an entire range of human sexual behaviors, part of what should be

viewed as a complex and unified picture. She was saying we have only harmed ourselves by fragmenting this picture. When we teach bits and pieces of sexuality to our children but omit other pivotal information, we leave them bewildered and susceptible to great harm.

Elders continually spoke against the harms of ignorance. The tone of her speeches was sharp and rightly so, given the tremendous human toll taken when public-health policy is dictated by fear. Elders saw every day what most parents do not have to see: pregnant children, lives messed up and the ignorance that brought it about.

It was ignorance she hoped to combat. But the lucky Americans - the wealthy and white Americans, Americans whose children have access to crisp, freshly laundered information about sexual matters - would not have it. A strong black woman speaking like Harry S. Truman about drug legalization, masturbation and access to abortion was more than they could take.

Rep. Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., called Elders "remarkably destructive." As usual, his pointed words reveal more about the speaker than the target. Elders effectively cut away the type of emotional and superstitious hypocrisy Gingrich will still be clutching like a baby when he's lowered into his grave. And she managed to peel that hypocrisy off topics notoriously coated with an adhesive of controversy: birth control, sexuality, and teaching our children about the pleasures and dangers of the body.

Elders had great respect for youths. Her brother is a preacher, and he preaches abstinence to young people from his pulpit. As her life's work progressed. Elders saw that such preaching wasn't taking hold outside the church building. She knew that more had to be done for the sake of youth, and she fought to do more. She provided access to birth control, information and instruments; frank talk about AIDS (like C. Everett Koop, the outspoken white male surgeon general who preceded her); and harsh words to Catholics to work against the church hierarchy's "love affair with the fetus." All were long overdue, effective and just what the country needed.

For all the Republican whining, American attitudes about sexuality have never been more hypocritical. Conservative think tanks produce a steady stream of articles and data to prove the failure of sex education. Balderdash. In order to fail, sex education would have to have been given a try; in most places it never was. Here on the edge of 1995, we're so unready for sexual honesty that our president fired the surgeon general for the innocuous statement above.

So have a nice party in the wake of Elders' departure. Be appropriately thankful for the demon's demise at your prayer breakfast, send Gingrich a telegram patting him on the back or call White House operators and say, "Right on, Bill." But don't pretend at the same time to care about the dissemination of important medical information to our children. Don't claim you're not willing to play political or religious games of chance with the lives of poor youths. You can't have it both ways.

Asked if politics had a hand in her dismissal, Elders said, "I'm not enough of a politician to know the answer to that." That simple statement goes a long way toward proving we lost a gem when Elders was sacrificed at the hungry altar of political expediency. She will doubtless be replaced by a smooth politico, and a presence both vibrant and disturbing will be gone from our national conversation about health.

Sexual harassment is not just the domain of white males of European descent. Sex is a weapon used in power struggles every day, whether it is on the job or at a bar. Both men and women are susceptible to being manipulated in such a manner. Women can play this game just as well, if not better, than men.

Society should look carefully at the situation before rendering any profound judgments of guilt. If it is a case of an entry-level employee being harassed by a superior, it is likely to be true. However, if it involves two equals, it is probably a political power move rather than a true case of harassment.

We should have a healthy case of skepticism until the whole story is told. One person's locker room talk is someone else's harassment.

On Tuesday, Nov. 29, I saw the film presentation of "A Reason to Believe," which was sponsored by the UI lecture series. The major topic of the film was acquaintance rape. A panel discussion followed the film.

From beginning to end, Charlotte's boyfriend was manipulative and controlling. He believed his fraternity brothers' insinuations about Charlotte being the seducer, he raised his fist as if he was going to hit her when he confronted her, and his idea of turning the corner and being supportive was to ask how it felt when the offender was raping her. Near the end of the discussion, a panelist began talking about understanding the boyfriend, how men are not allowed to express their emotions the way women do and equal

DI coverage of Jewish holidays not thorough To the Editor:

Given The Daily Iowan's treatment of Jewish holidays in the past, we were disappointed with the newspaper's front-page story on Hanukkah titled "Hanukkah illuminates Jewish traditions" (DI, Nov. 29).

As Rabbi Portman emphasized to Devon Alexander, the author of the article, Hanukkah is a minor Jewish holiday. In spite of Portman's comments, the editors decided to print the article on the front page. Meanwhile, the DI has virtually ignored major Jewish holidays. There was no article on Rosh Hashana, which took place on * Sept. 6. There was no article on

Sukkot or Simchat Torah, which took place between Sept. 20 and Sept. 28. Although there was an article on Yom Kippur, it appeared on the seventh page ("Activity in Israel grinds to halt as Jews prepare for Yom Kippur," DI, Sept. 15). Even then, Yom Kippur was only mentioned because the holiday led to a postponement of the Mideast peace talks. The article was written by an Associated Press journalist, not a DI reporter, and it made no references to the celebration of Yom Kippur in the United States

We don't doubt that the intentions of the DI staff in running the Hanukkah article were excellent.


Jews because much of the country seems to unite in celebration of the holiday. Your impulse toward inclusion is considerate

In spite of the editors' kind intentions, however, the DI article only exacerbates the problems for Jews. It gives the comforting illusion of inclusiveness without the substance. Rather than making Jews feel more comfortable, the Hanukkah article merely reassures Christian readers that everyone is celebrating the "holiday season" along with them, and it obscures the fact that the Jewish holiday season (if such a thing exists) finished with Yom Kippur in September. Like so many falsely inclusive ideas, it erases the few but significant cultural and religious differences between Jews and Chris-

We appreciate the good intentions behind the DI's decision to print the Hanukkah article, and we do not mean to discourage you from learning about Judaism or informing DI readers about the religion and culture. We only encourage you to do it in a way that is respectful to Jews. If a rabbi tells you that Hanukkah is a minor holiday, consider the implications of his statement. If you decide to print an article on Hanukkah, cover major Jewish holidays, too, and give them the attention they deserve.

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

All four are seniors who have never beat the Hawkeyes in Iowa City. Iowa lost at Hilton Coliseum last season, 86-79.



Poor shooting keeps Starks on bench

NEW YORK (AP) - Still dogged by his 2-for-18 shooting disaster in Game 7 of the NBA Finals, Knicks guard John Starks is struggling - and sitting.

Starks' shooting has been so off, he wanted to be taken out of the starting lineup. So coach Pat Riley put him on the bench --and kept him there.

Starks, 37-for-117 over his previous 10 games, didn't play a minute of New York's 107-103 victory over Philadelphia on Saturday night.

"I didn't think I wasn't going to play," he said. "But that's happened before, so it wasn't weird."

But Starks, who last month signed a \$13.1 million extension through 1999-2000, hadn't missed a game because Riley didn't play him since Nov. 24, 1992.

A scrappy player, Starks worked his way up from the CBA to become an all-star last season. He played a key role in the Knicks' run to the NBA Finals, forcing a Game 7 with Houston by scoring 16 points in the fourth quarter. But his performance in the final game left him to spend the summer mulling the defeat.

Starks is - like the Knicks themselves - finding the going tough this year. Besides his shooting woes, the 6-foot-5 Starks has had trouble stopping taller players on defense and hasn't been drawing fouls.

His frustration reached a peak this week at Atlanta. Starks missed 10 of his 14 shots from the field, and New York lost 89-85.



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
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

Governors to decide next move in lockout

The wait is on.

With a lull in the NHL labor talks, everybody is waiting until today to see what the league's braintrust decides about the remainder of the season.

League governors will be in New York for an emergency meeting to determine what the next move will be in the lockout, which entered its 72nd day Sunday.

What appears likely is that owners will give commissioner Gary Bettman a deadline to work out a deal, and that date will likely fall within a week from today.

"I think the vote will be 100 percent to keep talking," said Boston Bruins president Harry Sinden. "There is a group that might want to pull the plug right away and another that feels we should give and take whatever they give us.

Larsson receives early Christmas gift

MUNICH, Germany - It is unlikely that things will get a whole lot better on the tennis court for Magnus Larsson, but that's not bad.

One week after helping Sweden take the Davis Cup title, Larsson upset top-ranked Pete Sampras to win the richest prize in tennis -\$1.5 million.

Larsson won 7-6 (8-6), 4-6, 7-6 (7-5), 6-4 in the final of the Grand Slam Cup, at \$6 million the most lucrative tennis tournament in the world.

"This is the best Christmas present I could get," Larsson said. Larsson nearly equaled his career prize money of \$1,690,317, and more than doubled his 1994 earnings, which had stood at \$639,105 before the final.

The economic news wasn't bad for Sampras, either.

The American, who won the inaugural Grand Slam Cup in 1990, earned \$750,000, plus a bonus of \$500,000 for the two Grand Slam titles he won in 1994 the Australian Open and Wimbledon.





Salaam runs away with Heisman

NEW YORK - All season long, Rashaan Salaam has placed team goals over individual achievements. So his reaction to winning the Heisman Trophy wasn't surprising.

"I'm honored that I won the award, but I'd trade it for a win over Nebraska in a second," the Colorado tailback said. "I would love to be playing for a national championship right now.

Nebraska handed Colorado its only defeat of the season. If the Buffaloes had won that game, they would be playing for the national title in the Orange Bowl instead of Nebraska.

Instead, they're going to meet Notre Dame in the Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 2. Four days later, Salaam will announce whether he'll enter the NFL draft or return for his senior season

"I've already made my decision," he said Saturday night during the Heisman ceremony at the Down-town Athletic Club. "But I'm not

going to announce it until Jan. 6 because I want to concentrate on the Fiesta Bowl.'

Salaam, the nation's leading rusher and scorer, is the 12th junior to win the Heisman. Four of the last five junior winners skipped their final year of eligibility to turn

"I believe getting a diploma is important," said Colorado coach Bill McCartney, who is leaving his job after the Fiesta Bowl. "Making all that money doesn't make a man happy. But I'm not going to advise Rashaan what to do.

Whatever decision Salaam makes, McCartney will keep track of his career.

"I'm going to watch him whether he's playing at Colorado or playing on Sundays in the NFL," McCartney said. "He's as good as any back I've ever been around."

Salaam thanked his teammates, family and coaches.

"I feel blessed, but I'm not going to let it change my life," he said. "I'm 20 years old and I'm still going to do the things that young guys

Coach orders baskets for opponent

Salaam got almost twice as many votes as the runner-up, tailback Ki-Jana Carter of Penn State. Alcorn State quarterback Steve McNair finished third and Penn State quarterback Kerry Collins

was fourth. Carter and Collins are the first teammates to finish in the top five since Nebraska's Mike Rozier and Turner Gill in 1983.

"I think it's great that we both did so well, but I'm sure playing on the same team made it harder for us to win," Collins said.

Collins, who led Division I-A in passing efficiency, said he was proud to be recognized as one of the best players in the country.

"I can say I was a Heisman finalist, and there's not too many people in the world that can say that," he said.

Miami tackle Warren Sapp finished sixth, the only defensive player in the top 10. No one-way defensive player has won the Heisman.

"I see the trophy has a ball," Sapp said. "You have to have the ball to win it."

RYE BROOK, N.Y. - Baseball owners removed their escalating payroll tax Sunday and replaced it with a flat tax that the players claimed would act like a salary cap.

Management negotiator John Harrington said the plan was a "substantial move" by the owners, who received the union's latest proposal just 27 hours earlier. The plan also has provisions for a secondary tax that owners said would ensure salaries don't escalate.

It didn't seem as if the day's bargaining produced progress, but owners said their plan embraced some of he union's ideas on future joint ventures.

"They offered us some very interesting, enlightened concepts yesterday that seemed to have opened the door to a partnership," Atlanta Braves president Stan Kasten said. "We think it behooves us to go through that door."

Union head Donald Fehr said his side needed time to analyze the plan but his initial reaction wasn't positive

"It appears to be all the elements of a cap," he said. Even as they offered the new plan, owners said their salary cap proposal of June 14 remained on the table. 

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
Keenen Ivory Wayans wrote, directed and stars in "A Low Down Dirty Shame," a flawed, semi-straight-faced action film.

Wayans' 'Shame' lives up to name

It's a shame about Keenen Ivory Wayans, whose past work in film and television satire showed a great deal of promise. His new film, "A Low Down Dirty Shame," proves Wayans has lost his direction entirely. But there's one thing to be said for the flick: It can't be nailed for false advertising.

The movie is just what its title implies. It's a comedy with recycled jokes, an action film with very little action and a protagonist lifted straight out of the 1970s "blaxploitation" flicks which Wayans has so successfully parodied before. It all emerges in "Shame" as a labori-



ous and overdone rerun of a concept with enough clichés left over to fashion two extra seasons of the corniest daytime drama. It's a shame

on to meet an old girlfriend who's just sexy enough to be appealing in spite of her bitchiness. He raids his old wardrobe for an outfit which is apparently from his days with the police, although it makes him look like a refugee from an old "Soul Train" episode. And finally, he hops into a slick sports car which has been hiding under a tarp the entire film, so as to discourage any audience speculation about how a downand-out private eye could possibly afford such a vehicle. "Shame" is full of holes like these, which makes it hard to take the film seriously.

Wayans himself is to blame, having written and directed this mess. As an actor and comedian, he still has undeniable presence, but his writer / director alter ego didn't take the time to separate the parody from the serious stuff. The jokes are all redressed gags from old "Good Times" episodes. The action sequences can be found in any one of a thousand nameless B-movies. Even in his casting calls, Wayans is off the mark.

Charles S. Dutton is severely miscast as Shame's traitorous turncoat buddy Rothmiller. Dutton is the wizened and insightful type of actor (see him in "Alien 3") with an occasional oafish tendency thrown in for good measure (see the Fox TV sitcom "Roc"). Pouring him into a role like this is like casting Mickey Rooney as Judas Iscariot - it just doesn't work.

But along comes an old police buddy, Rothmiller (Charles S. dy, like Wayans' directorial debut, "I'm Gonna Git You Sucka." Instead, parody takes a back seat to some serious issues that are treated with carelessness and a lack of attention to detail. Creativity and freshness are abandoned to the whims of action film clichés. The result of Wayans' poor deci-

sions is a weird hybrid of a farce worry - it gets worse. Shame goes that can't really decide where to go.

Year-end dance concert shows off range of talent

When dance students are showing their pieces, the audience knows they will see dancing and choreography running a gamut of styles, moods and abilities. That is exactly what the "Space / Place Plus Concert" delivered Saturday night.
