Nobel laureate derides political indifference

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Indifference is as dangerous as fanaticism, Elie Wiesel says.

"I've been fighting my entire adult life for men and women everywhere to be equal and to be different," the Nobel laureate and Holocaust survivor told 2,000 people Wednesday at the North Carolina Blumenthal Performing Arts Center.

"But there is one right I would not grant anyone. And that is the right to be indifferent."

Wiesel, 68, also told about 900 students at Charlotte Latin School they should be as angry as he is about the world's injustices, but they shouldn't be bitter.

"You know bitterness is not something which I worship," he said. "It's not productive. Anger, yes."

Prince Philip moves to protect coral reefs

TOKYO — Prince Philip has coral reefs on his mind.

The president emeritus of the World Wide Fund for Nature was in Naha, Okinawa, Thursday to push for protection of the reefs around Japan's Nansei Islands, a 780-mile chain.

The 75-year-old husband of Queen Elizabeth II said a World Wildlife Fund research center to be established on Ishigaki Island will monitor the effects of soil erosion and pesticides on the coral reefs.

Gumbel jumps NBC ship, joins CBS

NEW YORK — Ending a three-network bidding war, Bryant Gumbel said Thursday he's leaving NBC and morning television for CBS and a prime-time magazine show, a deal that could net him more than \$5 million a year.

Gumbel and CBS' syndication arm also will form a company to produce three prime-time specials a year for CBS and other programming. He could rake in millions more if any of the projects become big hits.

Since his tearful goodbye on Jan. 3 after 15 years on "Today," the 48-year-old Gumbel has played golf and sifted through offers. He had worked for either NBC or the network's Los Angeles station since 1972.

"This is a very happy day for me. It really is," he said. "I'd be lying if I said I wasn't somewhat sad about leaving a place that was my home for a quarter-century. ... But this is my new home."

CBS offered a chance to enter new creative ventures and join people with whom he felt comfortable,

Gumbel said. His show has no title, time slot or starting date. Gumbel said the program probably will emphasize interviews and live television more than other magazine shows do, since these are his strengths.

CBS News had the room for him. The network runs "60 Minutes" on Sundays and "48 Hours" on Thursdays, but both ABC and NBC run more hours of prime-time magazine shows each week.

Dan Rather should rest easy; Gumbel said he had no interest in

anchoring the "CBS Evening News." During conversations with CBS News President Andrew Heyward, "he never offered it and I never asked for it," Gumbel said.

Gumbel, who broadcast sports before joining "Today," said he had no plans to participate in sports or breaking news at CBS. He will continue to produce his "Real Sports" show for HBO through 1998.

Gumbel also said he would start an internship program and make other opportunities available for minorities.

Suspect arrested in Ennis Cosby death

LOS ANGELES — A Russian-born teen gunned down Bill Cosby's son in a random robbery attempt, police said Thursday, confirming his arrest came after a tipster called the *National Enquirer* in hopes of claiming a \$100,000 reward.

Mikhail Markhasev, 18, who came to the United States eight years ago, acted alone and "there was no indication that there is any Russian gang or Russian mob ties at all," police Chief Willie Williams told a news conference.

"It appears that robbery was the motive. It was happenstance," Williams said. "This was a random stop as far as we know now. ... It happened to be a man in a car and the defendant who is now under arrest happened to come by."

Williams said also investigators had seized the gun and the knit, woolen watch cap believed used in the Jan. 16 slaying of Ennis Cosby,

who was shot along a road as he changed a tire on his \$130,000 Mercedes convertible.

Ballistic tests on the gun confirmed it was the weapon used in the killing, Williams said. He said the gun, which he did not describe, and the hat were found March 7 after a thorough search of the area with help from recruits from the Los Angeles police academy.

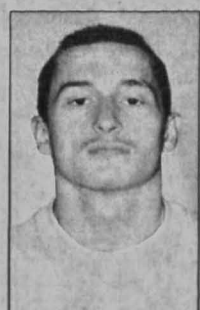
The chief noted that nothing appeared to have been taken during the robbery attempt, and the suspect apparently wasn't responsible for disabling Cosby's car.

Markhasev, who was arrested Wednesday night at his suburban North Hollywood home, will be charged with one count of murder. Two people brought in for questioning Wednesday night — a man and a woman — were released,

Williams said. The primary witness was a woman Ennis Cosby apparently was going to visit the night of the slaying. After Cosby had the flat tire, she went to the scene in her

JonBenet Ramsey artwork stirs anger

DENVER — An art student combined the image of JonBenet Ramsey with the words "Daddy's Little Hooker" in a display at the University of Colorado, angering some people enough for it to be torn down twice.

Paul Hidalgo, an undergraduate, said he hoped his two-panel work in the main hallway of the Fine Arts building would "raise issues about child pageantry."

"The ethics and morality behind them must be questioned. Exposing young and impressionable children to this very adult and superficial institution is a terrible thing," Hidalgo said in a telephone interview from the Boulder campus.

A spokesperson for the Ramsey family was outraged.

"Trying to sully the good name of a wonderful 6-year-old child who lost her life in a horrible way is not merely tasteless, it is disgusting

and vulgar," Patrick Korten said. The first panel has the word "Look" and an arrow pointing to a second panel, where Hidalgo mounted three 11-inch-by-17-inch color photocopies of a *Newsweek* magazine photo of the girl. The words "Daddy's Little Hooker" are above the photographs in large blue letters.

Hidalgo said the project, which cost him \$100 in supplies, had been torn down twice since it went up Monday. He said he has consulted with an attorney because of all the attention the display is getting.

Because of copyright concerns, Hidalgo would not comment on his use of the photograph, which does not show the *Newsweek* logo. It shows JonBenet in a white dress, full makeup and with a crown of white flowers in her hair.

Messages left by the AP for a spokesperson with *Newsweek* in New York were not immediately answered.

Fine Arts interim chairperson

Merrill Lessley said he too finds the work "hurtful," but he supported the student's right to use the space.

"The temporary display, as disturbing as it may be to many, falls under the constitutional protection of the First Amendment," Lessley said. "For centuries, artists have taken on provocative subjects. This work is no different."

A crush of reporters and photographers watched the 21-year-old Hidalgo, of Littleton, as he remounted the display on Wednesday.

The body of JonBenet Ramsey was found Dec. 26 in the basement of her family's upscale Tudor-style Boulder home, not far from the CU campus.

The 6-year-old beauty queen was strangled and may have been sexually assaulted, authorities have said.

An investigation into her death continues. No suspects have been named and no arrests have been made.

DES MOINES — Deep dive appeared Thursday as legislators prepared for another debate on how fast Iowans should drive.

At his weekly news conference, Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad made clear he wants no change in speed limit for interstate highways in Iowa, saying a modest change made last year is all that is needed.

Republican legislative leaders said they will try early next week to raise the speed limit to 70 mph on interstates. They said most already are way ahead of other states.

House Speaker Ron Corbett, Cedar Rapids, said the average speed on the interstate highway

Senate takes aim at crime issues

DES MOINES — Juice bars would be outlawed in Iowa, sex offenders would have to undergo hormone therapy and businesses would be classified as public nuisances if they rented or sold pornography to children, under bills approved Thursday by a Senate committee.

The proposals, which normally would have set off fiery debate, got lumped together and passed through the Senate Judiciary Committee as legislators rushed to meet a deadline.

The first "funnel" day of the session comes today, effectively killing most bills that haven't been approved by a committee in the House or Senate. The deadline is

used to limit the number of topics legislators have to consider.

Sen. Larry McKibben, R-Marshalltown, backed many of the bills Thursday, including the plan for sex offenders to undergo hormone treatments known as "chemical castration" to reduce their sex drive.

McKibben said he doesn't think the plan goes too far. "These are all common-sense approaches to address crime issues," he said.

The bill started out to require the hormone therapy only for those who committed sex crimes against children. Sen. Tom Vilsack, D-Mount Pleasant, got the committee to change that to include all sex offenders. Vilsack said elderly women should get the same protection from sex crimes as children.

"I know of 75- and 80-year-old

women who have been raped. I can't even tell you what I think about that," Vilsack said.

Another part of McKibben's bill would outlaw "juice bars" in Iowa that feature all-nude dancers. The state tried to close them down by banning nude dancing at businesses that have liquor licenses, but the juice bars got around that by requiring customers to bring their own liquor. McKibben's bill would ban the dancing at businesses that have a state sales tax permit.

Sen. Steve Hansen opposed the bill, saying it could violate the constitutional protection of freedom of expression. Hansen, D-Sioux City, also said that juice bars would find a way around the sales tax requirement.

"We're just going to turn them into theaters or museums," he said.

Branstad, Legislature spar over speed limit

DES MOINES — Deep divisions appeared Thursday as legislators prepared for another debate over how fast Iowans should drive.

At his weekly news conference, Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad made it clear he wants no change in the speed limit for interstate highways in Iowa, saying a modest change made last year is all that is needed.

Republican legislative leaders said they will try early next week to raise the speed limit to 70 mph on interstates. They said motorists already are way ahead of politicians.

House Speaker Ron Corbett, R-Cedar Rapids, said the average speed on the interstate highways is

74 mph.

The legal limit is 65.

"Basically, they've rejected the law that says 65 is the top speed limit," Corbett said.

House Majority Leader Brent Siegrist, R-Council Bluffs, said he has scheduled debate for Monday on raising the speed limit. He predicts easy approval in the House.

"We think it's something that a lot of people in Iowa want," Siegrist said.

Many legislators are eager to raise the speed limit, arguing it's something the Legislature can do that's popular and will be noticed by voters.

Branstad said safety officials warn increasing the speed limit will lead to more highway fatalities.

"I have not recommended any

changes in the speed limit this year because I feel the changes we made last year were appropriate," he said.

Last year, the speed limit was raised to 65 mph on some divided four-lane state highways.

Branstad said state transportation officials have made progress on cutting the number of traffic fatalities.

He said it is the wrong time to start going the other way.

"It's important to look at the impact that raising the speed limit can have on fatalities," Branstad said. "We have had some success in Iowa."

Corbett rejected that argument. "Fatalities aren't from higher speed limits," Corbett said. "Fatalities are from excessive speed in a particular weather condition."

Establishing a beachhead in abortion war

In the last two weeks, pro-choice forces have been caught promoting misinformation, if not an outright lie: that the procedure known as partial-birth abortion is extremely rare. This came to light when Ron Fitzsimmons, director of a major abortion clinic association, revealed there may be 5,000 such abortions in the United States each year. Most of these are purely "elective"; that is, the mother's life is not threatened by the pregnancy.

Obscured in the furor over partial-birth abortion is the more fundamental question of when should abortion be legal. Both sides in the debate have staked out all or nothing positions. However, it is possible that abortion should be legal at some points during pregnancy, and at some other points it should not. A national debate addressing this question finally might bring some sense to abortion laws.

Pro-choice advocates traditionally have argued a woman should have a right to an abortion whenever she chooses. The logic behind this is that what exists in the womb is not yet human because it cannot survive outside the womb.

This line of reasoning seems convincing enough in the first five months of pregnancy. During this time, the life inside the womb cannot survive outside it. Abortion should be a matter of choice during this time in the pregnancy.

But if the standard of survival outside the womb is employed past the fifth month — the point at which many partial-birth abortions occur — it becomes increasingly difficult to defend abortion. Modern medicine can, although it is still extremely rare, save a premature baby born at about five months. As the pregnancy goes on into the sixth and seventh months, the fetus' chances for survival increase. At some point during this period of the pregnancy, the fetus is a human life in that it can survive outside the womb.

Society, with the aid of the medical establishment, should decide at what point during a pregnancy the life in the womb is a human life. At that point a line must be drawn banning abortion, except in cases in which the pregnancy endangers the mother's life.

Banning partial-birth abortion is a first step in drawing such a line. Partial-birth abortion usually occurs in the fifth or sixth month of pregnancy. The gruesome procedure involves an incision in the fetus' skull with scissors and its brain being vacuumed out.

Fitzsimmons' recent revelation has compelled Congress to take up the issue again, voting on a proposed ban next week. It easily will pass the House and Senate. The question is whether President Clinton will sign it and legally ban a grizzly practice.

Chances are, though, Clinton will use the "health of the mother" excuse again to veto it. Clinton will convey the impression that he protected us from an extremist Congress that did not include an exception for mothers whose lives are endangered by their pregnancy.

It's a sham. First, partial-birth abortion is never preferable to other procedures. In January the executive board of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists concluded there are no instances in which partial-birth abortion is the only procedure by which a mother's health can be preserved. Second, the Supreme Court has ruled that exception for the "health of the mother" must be granted for any reason the doctor decides is relevant to the patient, including the vague categories of emotional and psychological reasons. Thus, by signing a bill that bans partial-birth abortion with a health of the mother exception, Clinton would be banning nothing.

Clinton should sign the bill Congress passes. Partial-birth abortion is a violent procedure. Banning it is a first step in establishing that at some point during pregnancy, there is a human life that must be protected.

The truth about the UI alcohol study

Everyone seems to have an opinion about how the UI should spend their grant to deal with alcohol-related problems among students, but few really have a clue what they are talking about.

Let's clear this up once and for all. Currently, the UI has a \$60,000 one-year development grant that is basically just for salaries, office supplies, copies, etc. Right now the UI is just looking for and researching solutions. They're simply exploring the possibilities.

If everything goes as well as hoped, the UI will begin receiving an additional \$770,000 for implementation of the plan on which they decide. The big money is not here yet. It is not festering somewhere or being squandered.

It is also important to remember this money is not from student tuition. Instead, it's a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, an organization that funds several large-scale programs to "improve the health and healthcare of all Americans."

The UI is getting this money to "promote health and prevent dis-

ease by reducing harm caused by substance abuse" because the UI has a very real binge-drinking problem.

Binge drinking is defined as four or more drinks in a row for women and five or more drinks in a row for men.

The 1995 Health Interest and Practice Survey found 60 percent of UI students binge drink. The College Alcohol Survey by the Harvard Public School of Health found the national binge-drinking average for large public universities is only 44.4 percent and 39.4 percent for public universities of all sizes.

The UI definitely has a problem. And it gets worse. The Alcohol Use and Misperception Study of students living in the residence halls in fall 1995 found binge drinking among those students is only 42 percent. Clearly, students increase their average drinking levels once off campus.

This is an even bigger problem. In a recent *DI* article, Julie Pbye, coordinator of the program designed to find and implement solutions to these problems, said one of their main goals will be to deal with the secondhand effects of binge drinking.

This makes sense in the context of the results of the UI Health Interest and Practice Survey done in 1995. This survey examined how UI students have been affected by drunken students. Thirty-nine percent have been insulted or humiliated, 26 percent have had their property damaged, 21 percent have been pushed or assaulted, 39 percent have had to ward off unwanted sexual advances, 61 percent have babysat or taken care of another student who drank and 79 percent have had their sleep interrupted.

This is a big problem, too. So now you know the real story, and now you have the right to make a judgment.

There are no easy answers when so many people and so much money is involved. Until we all finally decide to be a little more responsible and show a little more respect, this debate is going to continue for a very long time. At least now you'll know what you're talking about.

Uganda: 'The pearl of Africa'

Once described by the late British prime minister, Sir Winston Churchill, as the pearl of Africa, Uganda probably has seen the highest turnover of presidents than any other country in Africa: ten presidents since 1963.

With such a high heads-of-state turnover, Uganda's sociopolitical and economic problems also have increased, and for a long time Ugandans longed for the day that "Together we'll always stand." It probably has come with Yoweri Museveni.

Uganda became independent in 1962 with Milton Obote as prime minister and Kabaka Edward Mutesa of the Baganda Kingdom as the first president in 1963. There developed a struggle for power between Obote and the president. This culminated in Obote suspending the constitution together with the president. In the same year, he passed a new constitution, making him the executive president. The Baganda Kingdom, whose king had been the president, rejected the new constitution. This crisis laid the foundation that was to haunt Uganda for many years.

Obote fueled this crisis by abolishing the kingdoms in 1967, making Uganda a republic, and embarking on philosophies called the "Common Man's Charter" and "Move to the Left," literally meaning the Soviet Union. He declared the nationalization of the private sector, thereby giving the government 80 percent control of major industries. This did not endear him to the British government, which capitalized on the rivalry between Obote's men in the army and those of his joint chief of staff, Idi Amin.

Obote was overthrown in 1971, bringing to power Gen. Amin Dada. Amin received support from both Britain and Israel before he later turned against them. His first major political move was to bring back the body of Kabaka Mutesa from London to be buried in Uganda with full military honors. This won him support among the Baganda before he started eliminating them.

Amin preceded over erratic political, social and economic policies and public execution that left 500,000 people dead. He canceled the citizenship of Asians, accusing them of economic sabotage. They were expelled and their properties given out to his favorites with the aim of creating Black Patels. Most of these businesses failed.

As economic hardships bit Ugandans, Amin declared overcharging, hoarding and cheating as treasonable offenses punished by death. This too led to a number of deaths and exiles.

Amin's political career climaxed in 1975-76, when he became the chairperson of OAU. He ordered four British businessmen to carry him shoulder-high to the meeting to enforce his policy of "the White Man's Burden." He made then-British Foreign Secretary Sir James Callaghan kneel before him while seeking the release of a Britain!

Amin's activities led to the collapse of the East African Economic Community, with Kenya imposing oil embargo on Uganda, thereby worsening Uganda's economy. He later bombed Tanzania and threatened Nyerere to a boxing contest. The war with Tanzania in 1979 finally led to his fall in April.

A new president, Professor Yusuf Lule, was installed. He ruled for only 60 days while Uganda enjoyed peace. Lule was overthrown in a power struggle that led to the appointment of Godfrey Binaisa. Binaisa's main undoing was removing Yoweri Museveni from the powerful post of defense ministry.

Binaisa was replaced by Paulo Mwanga, who organized the elections that saw the return of Milton Obote to the presidency for a second time. Obote's second presidency was characterized by poor economic policies and human-rights abuse that ended with his overthrow in 1985 by General Tito Okello Lutwa and Bazilio Olara Okello.

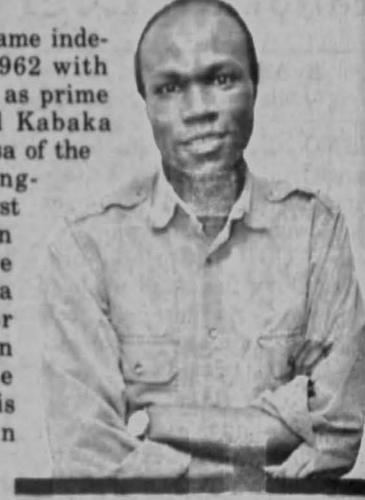
The two Okellos attempted to negotiate peace with Museveni, who had returned to the bush to fight the second Obote regime. The Nairobi Peace Talks failed, as Museveni had realized he was closer to power in Kampala.

In January 1986, Museveni quickly stormed Kampala, taking power from the two Okellos. His first major political move was to bring back the body of the late former popular president Lule to be buried in the Hero's Corner.

Museveni has opened a new chapter in Uganda by embarking on meaningful economic policies. He has helped improve Uganda's economy, returned the child soldiers who helped him win the war to schools and above that restored the old Kingdoms. Museveni also has created a broad-based government with leaders coming from all major political parties and ethnic backgrounds. He is attempting to solve the rampant politics of tribalism. Coups and counter-coups that have occurred in Africa have been driven largely by tribal agenda.

Museveni's efforts in restoring peace confirms what Chinua Achebe once recommended — that Africa needs enlightened dictators. Museveni is one.

How bicycle-friendly is Iowa City?

While entering Iowa City, the sign welcomes you: "Iowa City, A Bicycle Friendly Community."

Is this just lip service? With so much traffic flooding the streets, it seems strange to call Iowa City "bicycle-friendly." The city has done some good things toward making the town "bike-friendly," but it is bicyclists themselves who negate the title.

Jeff Davidson, assistant planning director for Iowa City, describes the national program in which Iowa City participates. In order to post the signs, the city must receive certification through the League of American Wheelmen by spending a certain amount of money on bicycle-related programs. He said Iowa City easily qualifies.

In order to make the city more bicycle-friendly, the city does many things. It has built trails and placed a large number of bicycle racks around the city. Traffic lights are designed so they will be activated by bicyclists. Also, the city has posted 160 "Share the Road" signs throughout the city, a "subtle reminder to motorists," Davidson said.

With the large number of people who use bicycles for transportation, the city's best interests lie in making bicycling safe. Unfortunately, the roads often become the set-

ing of a turf war between dangerous motorists and reckless bicyclists.

"We've even had people call in and complain about the signs," Davidson said. Many power-hungry drivers do not want to give up a portion of the road to bicyclists. Others, while not overtly aggressive, create danger by not being aware of cyclists.

On the other hand, many cyclists contribute to the problem by not obeying traffic laws. One cyclist complained, "How often do you see bicyclists stop at a stop sign? You wouldn't think of doing that in a car." He indicated that every year a new group of students comes to Iowa City, many of whom do not know how to bicycle safely in high-traffic areas.

Two cyclists said they thought, in general, Iowa City is bike-friendly. "I feel pretty safe," described

cyclist Sarah von Schrader, a UI graduate student. "There's plenty of places to park." Another cyclist agreed: "There are lots of bike racks so that people aren't locking their bikes to trees and fence posts."

Both cyclists complained of a lack of bike lanes. "In Seattle there were bike lanes everywhere," von Schrader said. "There was a place on buses where you could put your bike." Davidson indicated that where streets are particularly busy with auto traffic, safer routes are nearby. For instance, College Street has less traffic than Burlington Street, but even the bike routes leave something to be desired. With cars on both sides of the road, it is hard for motorists to see bicyclists.

Obviously Iowa City has room for improvement. In a perfect world, there would be bike lanes and more trails throughout the city. But the city has made substantial efforts to make Iowa City bicycle-friendly. Most of the danger can be attributed to a few aggressive motorists or to reckless bicyclists themselves.

Mutual respect on the road will enhance the city's efforts and continue to ensure Iowa City remains bicycle-friendly.

So you want to go to law school?

It's not even about learning court procedure — when to hold 'em, when to fold 'em and so on. Law school is about learning to think like a lawyer.

Just what the hell does that mean, you might well ask. An example: A few days ago I was sitting on my floor, amid a tower of cases and soda cans, trying to finish up a brief. I was expected to write in a partisan manner, presenting and coloring the laws and facts to make the most persuasive case for my client. Unfortunately for me, and my client, on one issue the law was clearly against us. And the facts fit the law to a T.

After staring at my ceiling for a couple of hours, I realized if my client was to have a chance, what was clear to me would have to become unclear; a spade could not be a spade. How do they make anti-gravity machines?

Your non-major scientist received a letter with the question, "How do they make those anti-gravity chambers to train those astronauts? I thought gravity was a law."

You are right, budding non-major scientist, gravity is a law. Mass warps space the same way a heavy weight placed on a rubber sheet pulls it down, and things on the rubber sheet would slide down toward the mass.

If space itself is warped, then everything would accelerate into

the well at the same rate. Try this with a dime and a quarter at that big round well thing at Wal-Mart.

Things fall at different rates in the real world because some things have more air resistance, like when you drop a feather and a hammer. The feather catches the air and drifts down. On the moon, there is no atmosphere and no resistance, and both the feather and the hammer fall at the same rate. On Earth, all things accelerate when falling at 9.8 m/s² (neglecting air resistance.)

Now, if things fall at the same rate due to gravity, we can take advantage of this fact to produce an "anti-gravity machine." All you need is an airplane.

NASA (and the guys on the movie Apollo 13) got into a plane and flew high into the atmosphere. Then, they put the plane into a dive at 9.8 m/s². The astronauts (and Tom Hanks) and the plane fell at the same rate, so they floated.

Another example of this would be an elevator. When you are riding down, the effects of gravity are lessened because you are falling.

So, while we can't build a real anti-gravity machine, we can fall at the same rate, and therefore appear to float.

WASHINGTON — The House voted Thursday to give Mexico 90 days to fully cooperate in the anti-drug war or lose its certification. President Clinton is counting on the Senate to protect his outright acceptance of Mexico as a full partner in the war.

The 251-175 vote came on a bill that originally called for immediate decertification — a proposition that is losing ground in the Senate. Even if the resolution wins Senate approval, the House margin was far short of the two-thirds required to override an expected presidential veto.

"This is an effort on our part to help the people of Mexico, to help

the people of Colombia and to help the American people," said House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga. Clinton decertified Colombia but certified Mexico as "fully cooperative" in fighting drugs.

The bill retains Clinton's right to waive sanctions against Mexico if he determines that is in the national interest.

The final vote was closer than the overwhelming defeat the Clinton administration expected. The vast majority of Democrats turned against it because it sharply criticized Clinton's anti-drug policies.

Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., who supported the original bill, said the 90-day provision also would put Mexican officials in a bind, with any effort to meet the congressionally imposed goals viewed as giving

up on its sovereignty leading into a July 6 midterm election.

"It puts President (Ernesto) Zedillo into a real box," Hamilton said before the House voted 212-205 on the 90-day amendment.

Rep. Benjamin Gilman, R-N.Y., chairperson of the House International Relations Committee, which voted 27-5 to decertify Mexico a week ago, said diplomatic relations "must not override the importance of fighting drugs in our bilateral relationship."

Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., called the House bill an insult to Mexico and to Clinton.

"Passing this ill-conceived legislation will make the Mexican government less likely to cooperate with us and it will make the Mexican people justifiably outraged,"

Lantos said.

The original House bill would have declared Mexico uncooperative in the anti-drug fight but allowed Clinton to waive sanctions — an option he already has.

Presidential spokesperson Mike McCurry said Clinton would not be surprised by defeat by a large majority in the House and was concentrating his efforts on the Senate. He met with several in the White House late Wednesday.

Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said the senators made it clear to Clinton they would not accept the current status of U.S. or Mexican efforts against illegal drugs.

"I think the situation in Mexico is worse," said Kerry, contradicting administration claims at a Senate hearing Wednesday of progress in

Mexico's efforts. But Kerry said he and others were willing to accept Clinton's decision.

Concerns about disrupting Mexico's fragile economy, souring relations with a close ally and hindering the war on drugs dominated discussion at the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee hearing. Several Republicans said they disagreed with the president's decision but were leaning towards letting it stand.

Sen. Paul Coverdell, R-Ga., co-sponsor of a decertification measure in the Senate, said he was looking for a third alternative to accepting or rejecting the president's certification of Mexico, something that "would move us off this no-win debate." But he did not offer a specific proposal.

"I just do not believe at the end of the day that Congress is going to accept the status quo," Coverdell said.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, said it was clear Congress was disappointed with Clinton's decision,

but he proposed a resolution that would hold off on decertifying Mexico while setting benchmarks the country should meet in order to keep that status.

Another co-sponsor of the Senate measure, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., called the State Department's rationale for certification of Mexico "a fairy tale."

"Whether or not our leaders can work together is less important than whether our cops can work together," Feinstein said, giving a litany of corruption and lack of cooperation by Mexican authorities. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, appealed for greater protection of U.S. ranchers and farmers along the Mexican border who she said are terrorized by drug gangs with "a sort of lawlessness we haven't seen in our country since frontier days."

But Hutchison said she was inclined to accept certification and would support an approach that would increase Mexican cooperation.

Janet Reno: FBI flap was misunderstanding

WASHINGTON — Attorney General Janet Reno said she stopped trying to tell National Security Adviser Anthony Lake that China might try to influence the 1996 elections because she thought the FBI would pass the word.

Reno said in her regular Thursday news conference she called Lake's office after receiving an FBI briefing last May about the intelligence information. "I was not able to reach Lake," Reno said, and she didn't pursue the matter further because "I was told the briefing went forward."

Both Lake and President Clinton have said they were not briefed about the FBI intelligence, which was given to two National Security Council officers. The White House says one of the two said he was told not to pass the information to his superiors.

Clinton's statement Monday prompted an unusual public quarrel with the FBI, which issued its own statement contradicting the president. The FBI said its agents put no restrictions on information it gave the NSC.

Reno has called the episode a misunderstanding.

"People just had a different understanding of what was said," she said. "There was no attempt by the FBI to restrict it within the NSC and (from) the appropriate chain of command at the White House."

While supporting the FBI's account, the attorney general indicated displeasure with the way the FBI publicly contradicted the president. "I knew they were going to put out a statement, but I did not know what the content of the statement would be," the attorney general told reporters.

Asked if she would have softened the wording, Reno said she would have tried to "make sure that everybody had communicated and understood exactly what was said, what people's memories were."

A Justice Department official speaking on condition of anonymity said Reno telephoned Lake while traveling and did not leave a message when told the security adviser was away from his office.

The intelligence information spawned an investigation into whether the Chinese government tried to funnel campaign donations into U.S. congressional elections.

After the information surfaced last June, the FBI warned six members of Congress that Chinese nationals might try to contact them.

Terrorist missile may have hit TWA jet

NEW YORK — The FBI agent in charge of the TWA Flight 800 investigation acknowledged for the first time Thursday that the plane could have been brought down by a shoulder-fired terrorist missile.

But so far, there is no evidence to prove that theory, James Kallstrom said.

And he condemned as ridiculous a new flurry of claims that the jet was destroyed accidentally by the U.S. military.

"This terrible, terrible tragedy was not caused by our military," Kallstrom said in an interview with the AP.

"Our military, in particular the Navy divers, are the heroes of this operation — not the culprits."

Investigators have focused on three possible explanations for the July 17 disaster: a bomb, a missile or a mechanical failure.

Kallstrom said it is "technically possible" a terrorist using a shoulder-fired, Stinger-type missile could have caused the tragedy, and he said investigators are examining that possibility.

He would not elaborate on where a missile could have been fired from or provide other specifics.

The plane was 10 miles offshore and more than 13,000 feet up at the time.

"This terrible, terrible tragedy was not caused by our military. ... Our military, in particular the Navy divers, are the heroes of this operation — not the culprits."

Kallstrom said there is no evidence to support the terrorist missile scenario over other theories.

But he noted that similar missiles have been used to down more than 25 commercial planes over the past two decades in places such as Africa, the Middle East and the former Soviet Union.

Stinger-type missiles are designed specifically to shoot down planes.

Flight 800 exploded after takeoff from Kennedy Airport, killing all 230 people on board and scattering wreckage across a five-mile stretch of the Atlantic Ocean.

The missile theory has been bolstered by people who reported seeing something in the sky before the disaster.

"There were too many people who describe strange events like flares and streaks of light in the sky" to ignore the missile possibility, Kallstrom said.

Kallstrom's remarks came in a week rife with reports that a missile was responsible for the explosion.

He was particularly incensed by claims by Pierre Salinger, a former ABC newsman and press secretary to President Kennedy, that the U.S. government is covering up the real cause of the blast.

"The outrageous claims of the Pierre Salingers of the world that are unfounded in any facts, absent any rational analysis ... do nothing to assist us in trying to find the answers to this horrific event," Kallstrom said.

Salinger offered an expanded version Thursday of his theory that a Navy missile shot down Flight 800.

At a Paris news conference, he released a 69-page document and a set of radar images from a video.

The tape "completely confirms a missile fired down TWA 800," Salinger said.

Kallstrom said investigators long ago eliminated any "friendly fire" scenarios or the possibility of a military cover-up.

The FBI reviewed radar and other sources to conclude the military could not have shot down the plane, he said.

Proposed bill would require national HIV disclosure

WASHINGTON — States would have to alert people to possible contacts with HIV-infected individuals under a bill being advanced by a Republican representative.

The measure also would create a national reporting system for the virus, require testing of anyone accused of a sex crime, require insurers to disclose HIV test results to applicants and allow disclosure of HIV status of children up for adoption.

Rep. Tom Coburn, R-Okla., said the provisions will protect those who aren't infected and help those who learn their status as soon as possible so they can take advantage of new, life-prolonging treatments.

The proposal "will return sound medical practices to our nation's public-health policy and curtail the spread of the deadly HIV epidemic," added Coburn, who also is a physician.

The American Medical Association,

which represents doctors, supports the measure, as it has many of the bill's provisions.

But the Human Rights Campaign, a gay political group, said the bill would intrude on the authority of local public health officials and do nothing to help at-risk individuals change their behavior.

The bill would require:

- Confidential, national reporting of new HIV cases to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. States currently report new AIDS cases, and 26 states report new cases of the virus.

- States to notify people they may have been exposed to HIV by a current or past partner. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention currently requires states to establish procedures for partner notification for AIDS cases.

- HIV testing for accused sexual offenders.

- Insurers to reveal HIV test results to applicants, and permit people to learn the HIV status of children they may adopt.

"Welcome to Auschwitz."

They entered the concentration camp and were separated into two groups. Fettman and his brother were sent to a line on the right that was for workers, while his parents, along with many other Jews, were sent to a line on the left. The people on the left were handed soap with initials written in German that meant "Pure Jewish Fat."

Fettman and his brother watched their parents walk into the gas chambers. They had no chance to say goodbye.

"Those people who haven't gone through the experiences will never know," he said. "The physical, emotional and mental scars will remain with me forever."

Fettman's brother was killed by a bomb dropped on the camp by members of the U.S. Air Force, who thought the camp was a Nazi camp. By the end of the war, 140 members of Fettman's family had been killed.

The camp's conditions crippled Fettman, who was ill and malnourished. Twenty prisoners were forced to live in one wooden barracks so small every person had to lie on one side, or else they all wouldn't fit. When the Nazis made coffee for themselves in the mornings, the captives were given the old black water and grounds that remained. For lunch and dinner they drank the leftover water the Nazis had from boiling potatoes and shared one loaf of bread between the 20 of them.

Fettman spent 13 months at Auschwitz, a time during which he attempted suicide. At one point, he was hanged by a Nazi and was saved only when the rope around his neck broke. He was forced to watch Nazi experiments and sometimes was ordered to participate in them.

On May 8, 1945, the war officially was over, but the Jewish prisoners didn't find out about it until a day later. Fettman and the other prisoners were released and taken back to Hungary by Russian soldiers.

Bombing suspect nailed with airplane ticket

SPOKANE, Wash. — The fourth suspect in a string of bombings and bank robberies was holding a one-way ticket to Albany, N.Y., when FBI agents arrested him in the downtown train station early Thursday.

Brian Ratigan, 38, sought in a nationwide manhunt since Oct. 8, was charged Thursday in the July bombing of a Planned Parenthood clinic and a robbery of a bank, both linked to white-supremacists.

He appeared before U.S. Magistrate Cynthia Imbrogno in the same courthouse where three men charged as his accomplices are on trial. The magistrate set a bail hearing for Monday.

Ratigan, 38, was arrested by two dozen FBI agents at the downtown station about 1:30 a.m. He was with his wife and two sons, who were not arrested, and traveling under the name "Jack O'Brian," prosecutor Earl Hicks said.

All four had one-way tickets to Albany, Hicks said. He did not say why they were headed there, but

Ratigan reportedly once lived in Troy, N.Y.

Ratigan was described by *The Spokesman-Review* this week as a former Army sniper who moved to Whidbey Island, about 50 miles northwest of Seattle, after leaving the military in 1989.

He moved in 1994 to northern Idaho, around Sandpoint, a region that has become a magnet for people with white-separatist, anti-government views.

Like the three defendants already on trial, Ratigan and his family did not stand when the magistrate entered the courtroom Thursday, a gesture intended to signify their refusal to recognize U.S. government authority.

The thin, lank-haired Ratigan made no statement during his brief court appearance.

His wife did not talk to reporters after the hearing.

The criminal complaint says Ratigan conspired with Verne Jay Merrell, Charles H. Barbee and Robert S. Berry, all of the Sandpoint, Idaho, area, to bomb buildings and rob banks in the Spokane area last year.

Associated Residence Hall (ARH) President Chad Doellinger said ARH selected a group of eight students who live in residence halls to work closely with Van Oel to come up with several proposals to take to the Regents.

"The increase in room and board rates were the proposal they voted on," Doellinger said. "(ARH) is in support of it."

Gunman kills 7 Israeli children

NAHARAYIM, Jordan — A Jordanian soldier opened fire with an automatic rifle Thursday, killing seven Israeli junior high school girls who were on a field trip to the "Island of Peace" in the Jordan River.

Six other eighth-graders were wounded before the gunman, who chased the students while firing, was overpowered by other Jordanian soldiers.

Initial reports said he started firing from a watch tower, but Israel TV said he was in a jeep. That report said he grabbed a weapon from a fellow soldier, shot him and then opened fire on the terrified students who were 50 yards away. He changed clips in his weapon and fired more shots before he was overpowered by other soldiers, who shouted "Madman! Madman!" at him.

The soldiers said the attacker was mentally unstable, but Israeli leaders linked the shooting to this week's harsh Jordanian criticism of Israel over the impasse in the Mideast peace talks.

The soldier, identified as Lance Cpl. Ahmed Yousef Mustafa, 22, opened fire while about 80 students stood near a Jordanian watch tower on a grassy hill on the island of Naharayim.

A sign at the entrance reads "The Island of Peace." Israeli

Defense Minister Yitzhak Mordechai ordered the site off-limits to Israelis until an investigation into the shooting is completed.

"I heard shots," said one of the wounded girls, identified only as Oranit. "I turned around and saw a soldier put in a magazine clip and fire. We ran down the hill and took cover. He fired at my hand."

A witness, Raz Hess, said at one point the soldier fired from close range and aimed at the head of one of the girls. Hess said other Jordanian soldiers stood by and "did nothing until he finished shooting."

The shooting comes at a time of crisis between Jordan and Israel over an impasse in Mideast peacemaking. King Hussein of Jordan cut short a trip to Spain and the United States and returned home.

In a phone call to Israeli President Ezer Weizman, Hussein said he felt the bullets had been directed "against him and his sons and daughters."

Israeli Foreign Minister David Levy suggested there was a link between the shooting and the king's unprecedented criticism of Israeli this week.

"Recent declarations created a psychological atmosphere that could lead to such tragic acts," Levy told Jordan's prime minister, Abdul-Karim Kabariti.

Hussein had accused Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of endangering

Mideast peace with his hard-line policies. In a letter, the king said he feared the lives of Israelis and Arabs were "fast sliding toward an abyss of bloodshed and disaster, brought about by fear and despair" over Netanyahu's actions.

"When I warned a few days ago of the danger of the possibility of violence, I never thought it would lead to this," the king said Thursday in Spain.

At the Feirst School in Beit Shemesh, 16 miles west of Jerusalem, dozens of chain-smoking parents clustered around the telephone, frantic for assurance their daughters were not among the dead or wounded.

"Ronit, it's mom," said Etty Vahalani, speaking into a cellular phone. "How are you? Talk to me. I'm waiting for you."

Students sat around in groups, sobbing.

"We're not supposed to be afraid of Arabs now — there's peace," said a stunned student, 12-year-old Edan Edri.

"How is it peace, when they are dead?" asked 13-year-old Oren Alouk. "This is peace?"

Netanyahu said he expected Jordan to act swiftly after the shooting.

"This was a violent, criminal attack," Netanyahu said. "Young girls were murdered. We expect the Jordanian government to act vigorously to bring the perpetrators to justice."

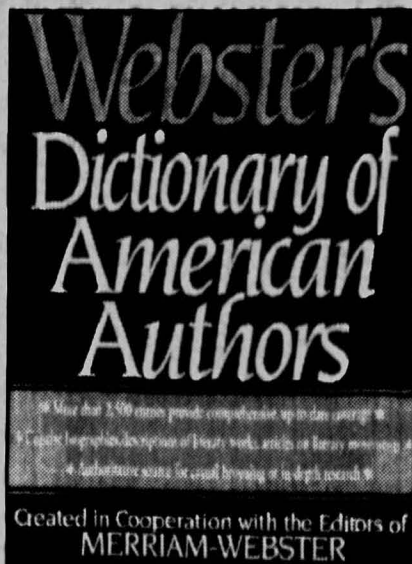

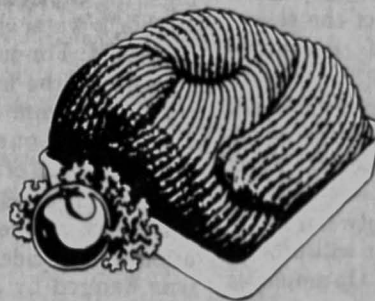

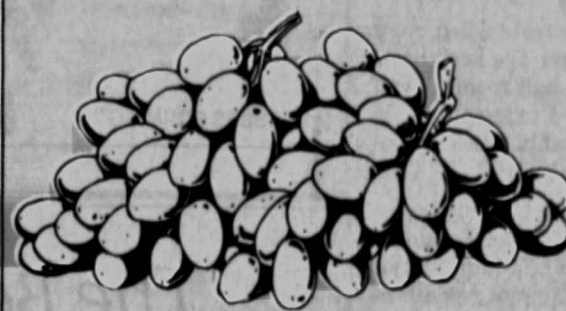

Iowa-N.C. State match-up may be best of round one

STORRS, Conn. — For the three teams in the Connecticut sub-regional of the NCAA women's basketball tournament, knocking off the undefeated Huskies would be monumental.

But for UConn head coach Geno Auriemma, surviving the round and possibly winning an NCAA title just comes second nature.

Iowa (17-11) and North Carolina State (19-11) will face off Saturday at 5 p.m., with the winner matching up with the Connecticut (30-0)-Lehigh (15-14) winner Monday at 8:30 p.m. on ESPN.

"We don't talk about being undefeated," Auriemma said. "That's no big deal here and if you lived up here, you'd know that. If we win another national championship it might not be a big deal. We've already done that."

To earn the task at dethroning college basketball's kings, the ninth-seeded Hawkeyes must first get past eighth-seeded N.C. State, a difficult task in its own.

The Wolfpack has had an up and down season, much like Iowa, just with higher highs and lower lows. N.C. State handed No. 2 Old Dominion its only loss of the season back on Nov. 17, '65-62, and has also beaten No. 4 North Carolina, No. 8 Alabama, No. 21 Clemson and No. 25 Duke.

The preparation for such an erratic team isn't easy, and both coaches know that.

"You just try to look at the best games that we each had and prepare for that team," N.C. State coach Kay Yow said. "From what I've seen, Iowa has great athletes. They are truly an All-American group that has been coming on strong in the stretch."

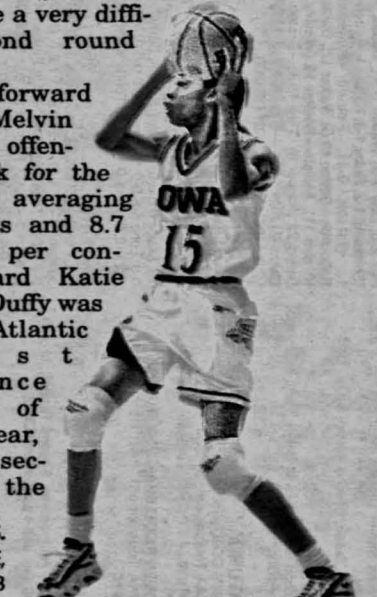
Auriemma, Yow, and Iowa coach Angie Lee all believe the N.C. State-Iowa contest is the best first round match-up in the entire tournament.

"You are talking about two teams in the preseason Top 10 that have had trouble with continuity or injuries or whatever," Auriemma said. "And you've got the Big Ten Tournament champion in the 8-9 game, and that's hard to believe."

"We're going to have to play the winner, and I'll tell you that's going to be a very difficult second round game."

Junior forward Chasity Melvin leads the offensive attack for the Wolfpack, averaging 16.1 points and 8.7 rebounds per contest. Guard Katie Smracka-Duffy was named Atlantic Coast Conference Freshman of the Year, ranking second on the

Domination

Iowa knocks off Virginia, 73-60, in the first round; faces defending national champion Saturday

SALT LAKE CITY — This year, the Hawkeyes aren't fooling around.

A year after squeaking past George Washington in the first round of the NCAA tournament, the Iowa men's basketball team left nothing to chance in Thursday night's tourney opener. Iowa ousted Virginia in a convincing 73-60 victory.

The win set up a Saturday showdown with defending national champion Kentucky.

"You have to rank a win like that right up there with the best," Iowa coach Tom Davis said. "Because of the importance of it. Because it is the tournament. It is March Madness."

The win made Davis a perfect 10-for-10 in NCAA first-round games.

Perhaps more unexpected than the ease of Iowa's victory was the impact made by its supporting cast. Freshman center Guy Rucker piled in 19 points, including 14 in the first half. And junior Ryan Bowen exploded on the boards, snagging 16

rebounds to go with 15 points.

"That's the good thing about being the point guard," senior Andre Woolridge said. "I don't have to score a lot of points every night. I can come out and get assists and still have a good game."

Ten of Bowen's rebounds came on the offensive end, helping Iowa to its hefty 44-27 rebounding advantage.

"That's something that you always dream about, having a game like that in a situation like this," Bowen said. "I never thought it would happen. It's really amazing."

Iowa, on the strength of its rebounding and lack of turnovers (3 total), went up by as many as 22 points in the second half.

After starting the first half somewhat cold (1-for-5), the Hawkeyes caught fire. The first 10 minutes belonged to Rucker, the next 10 to Bowen.

Rucker had 12 of his 14 first-half points by the 9:40 mark and scored 10 during an 18-8 Iowa run.

"Guy Rucker's a freshman in his first go-round, but he doesn't play like it," Davis said. "He plays with a lot of poise for

a young guy."

Bowen scored six points in the final 2:53 and finished the first half with eight points and eight rebounds. Reserve J.R. Koch also helped boost Iowa early, draining a pair of 3-pointers as the Hawkeyes took a 16-9 lead.

"With Koch hitting threes, Bowen's offensive rebounding and Rucker hitting what seemed like shot after shot, we were in bad shape," Jones said.

Even if the Hawkeyes are clicking on all cylinders again Saturday, they won't expect anything to come easy against top-seeded Kentucky (31-4). The Wildcats, like Iowa, prefer a fast-paced style of play with pressuring defense.

It's that kind of style that allowed the Wildcats to blow Montana out of the water despite a tight first 10 minutes.

But Davis isn't worried. Thursday night, he seemed almost excited.

"That's the fun of it. That's what the tournament is all about, to run into really top teams," Davis said. "And obviously, due to the luck of the draw, we get a top team right away."

Underdogs almost end N.C.'s title hopes

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — History came with a huge scare for Dean Smith.

In a surprisingly close game, Smith tied Adolph Rupp as the winningest NCAA basketball coach of all time Thursday night when North Carolina beat Fairfield, 82-74, in the opening round of the East Regional.

With all the pregame talk surrounding victory No. 876 for Smith, somebody forgot to tell Fairfield (11-19) it was supposed to play like a No. 16 seed.

Instead, the Stags, one of two teams in the 64-team field with a losing record, played a nearly flawless first half and led by seven points.

They stayed with the Tar Heels until the final minute before the pro-North Carolina crowd in Joel Coliseum, just 80 miles from the Chapel Hill campus, stood and cheered Smith.

Smith, who deflected talk about the record all week, laughed with relief after the Tar Heels (25-6) rallied for their 13th-straight victory.

When North Carolina players were asked what Smith said at halftime, the coach interrupted and said, "We talked about the record. Oh, you mean after the win-one-for-the-Gipper speech?"

The victory gave Smith an 876-253 record in his 36th season at North Carolina. Rupp, who died in 1977, had an 876-190 record in 41 years at Kentucky.

Smith will go for the record Saturday against the winner of the game between Colorado and Indiana.

Smith already has a few records all to himself. The win was his 62nd in the NCAA tournament and it was his 23rd consecutive NCAA appearance.

Smith said the Tar Heels beat Fairfield by playing their best basketball of the season in the second half.

"We were pounding the ball inside but

UCLA denies Princeton

Not this time, Princeton. The Ivy League champions, who stunned UCLA in this tournament a year ago, had another Pac-10 school in trouble in Thursday's opening round of the NCAA tournament before California came back for a 55-52 victory.

Missing Pac-10 Player of the Year Ed Gray, out with a broken foot, Cal trailed by six points at halftime before coming back on the 12th-seeded Tigers.

Tony Gonzalez, who plays tight end on the football team and power forward on the basketball squad, scored all five of Cal's points in the final minute as the fifth-seeded Bears ended the Tigers' 19-game winning streak.

Randy Duck led Cal with 16 points and Gonzalez had 13. Alfred Grigsby had 10 points and eight rebounds and blocked Gabe Lewullis' 3-point attempt to tie with three seconds left.

California will play Villanova in Saturday's second round in the East Regional. Villanova broke open a tight game to whip Long Island University 101-91 in the other East opener.

Colorado 80, Indiana 62
Chauncey Billups scored 24 points as Colorado handed Indiana an opening-round defeat for the third straight year.

Billups, a second-team All-American, scored 20 points in the first half as Colorado built a 46-31 lead. The Buffaloes (22-9), making their first NCAA appearance in 28 years, went on to beat Indiana (22-11) by 18 points, matching the Hoosier's worst NCAA tournament defeat in 71 games.

California 55, Princeton 52
Tony Gonzalez scored all five of Cal's points in the final minute.

Gonzalez gave the Bears the lead for good at 52-50 with a fadeaway 12-foot jumper with 58 seconds left.

He made the front end of a 1-and-1 with 33 seconds left for a three-point lead. Brian Earl scored on a backdoor cut with 15 seconds left to bring the 12th-seeded Tigers (24-4) within one, but Gonzalez made two free throws with 14 seconds left to make it 55-52.

Villanova 101, LIU 91
LIU, the nation's highest scoring team, got a lesson in fast-paced basketball. The fourth-seeded Wildcats (24-9) used an 8-0 run to end the first half and a 19-1 barrage in the opening 3 1/2 minutes of the second half to blitz the Blackbirds.

Freshman Tim Thomas had 28 points and 15 rebounds, while Jason Lawson added 21 points, 12 rebounds and seven blocks. Charles Jones, the nation's leading scorer, had 37 to lead No. 13 seed LIU.

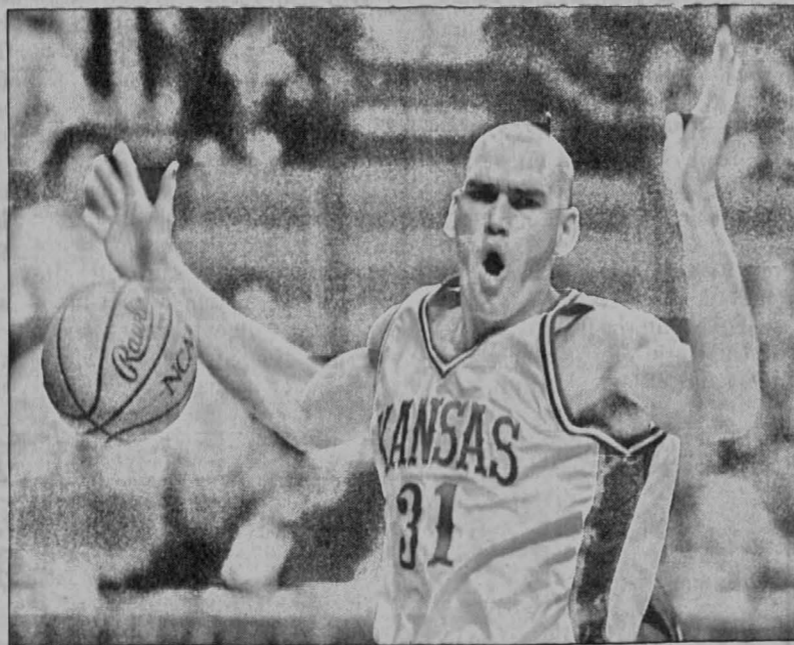

Kato, ISU swat away Redbirds

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. — Kelvin Cato picked a good time to have the best game of his career. And all it took to get him going was a rim-rattling dunk in the first half.

The senior center scored a career-high 29 points, had 12 rebounds and broke a Midwest Regional record with eight blocks, leading Iowa State to a 69-57 victory over Illinois State in the first round of the NCAA tournament Thursday.

"The ball was just falling in the hole," Cato said. "They were getting me the ball at the baseline."

Falling in the hole? Cato was actually slamming it through. The 6-foot-11 Cato had a big size advantage over anyone on Illinois State and had five dunks for the game.

Cato's eighth block came with about 14 minutes left and gave him one more than Temple's Tim Perry, Louisville's Pervis Ellison and Wake Forest's Tim Duncan. Cato's previous career-high in points was 21.

"It's the best I've ever seen Kelvin Cato play," said Iowa State guard Dedric Willoughby, who had 21 points. "Once, he got his first dunk, I knew he was ready to play. There was aggression. And I saw a lot more of them."

Cato led the sixth-seeded Cyclones (21-8), who earned a second-round meeting with Cincinnati on Saturday.

Rico Hill led Illinois State (24-6), the 11th seed, with 14 points and 14 rebounds. Dan Muller added 12 points and Jamar Smiley had 12.

The Redbirds never established an inside game, resorting to shooting from the perimeter. They tied the score at 53 on Skipp Shaeftbauer's 20-foot jumper with 4:04 remaining before Iowa State pulled away.

"We didn't come here for a moral victory, we came here to win," Illinois State coach Kevin Stallings said. "We had a chance, and we didn't get it done. We're bitterly disappointed."

Cato got his career-high in points with an 8-foot jumper in the lane that gave the Cyclones a 52-50 lead with 6:13 remaining.

Utah players not looking past Navy

TUCSON, Ariz. — Pardon Utah's basketball players if they aren't looking beyond the next game. They tried that approach recently and nearly threw away their conference title.

The Utes, seeded second in the West Regional, face Navy in a first-round NCAA tournament game Friday. They got enough scares during the Western Athletic Conference tournament to make them realize the spectre of Kentucky and Wake Forest down the regional road is something to ignore right now.

"If we talk about Kentucky and Wake Forest, we're jumping the gun," said Ben Caton, one of two seniors on the Utes (26-3).

The other senior is All-America forward Keith Van Horn, the only three-time WAC player of the year. Van Horn's heroics allowed Utah to overcome some carelessness in its approach to the conference tournament.

"I think sometimes losses serve as a wakeup call," said Van Horn, whose buzzer-beating shots lifted Utah over SMU and New Mexico last week.

"SMU was a near loss and that made us understand and think

back to how we got where we are and why we are as successful as we are. Playing hard and tough and smart is our style, and since the SMU game, we each looked at ourselves and we've come out with renewed commitment to where we want to be."

They want to be moving past Navy and then past the winner of Friday's other afternoon game between Georgetown (20-9) and North Carolina Charlotte (21-8) at the University of Arizona's McKale Center. That could bring Utah to the regional final at San Jose, where it might meet Wake Forest and Kentucky, the other powers of the West.

Wisconsin hopes to slow down Texas

PITTSBURGH — Maybe Texas doesn't belong in the NCAA tournament. What worries Wisconsin is once the Longhorns get there, they usually hang around.

In an intriguing matchup of styles as contrasting as their states' cuisines — ever seen a cheesehead in Austin? — Texas' run-and-shoot meets Wisconsin's slow-motion defense Friday in the NCAA East Regional.

"We like to run the floor, they like to run the clock," Texas coach Tom Penders said. "It should be fun."

Other pairings as the NCAA tournament visits Pittsburgh for the first time: South Carolina (24-7) vs. Coppin State (21-8), New Mexico (24-7) vs. Old Dominion (22-10) and Louisville (23-8) vs. Massachusetts (19-13).

There's a 'D' in Badgers but no 'O,' and that might be Texas' biggest advantage as the Longhorns (16-11) shoot — literally — to go 8-1 in first-round NCAA games under coach Tom Penders.

The Longhorns made it despite fewer victories than any at-large team in tournament history, and a two-game losing streak. Their argument for inclusion: A Top Ten

loaded schedule as demanding as their up-and-down pace.

"People said a lot about us — even in Austin — that we don't belong, but we know we do," said Texas star Reggie Freeman, whose 521 shots were more than Wisconsin's top two scorers combined. "We usually do well in the tournament."

The Badgers (18-9) rode an upset of No. 3 Minnesota to its best regular season in 80 years and an unexpectedly high No. 7 seed.

"We're a little ahead of schedule," said coach Dick Bennett, who coached Wisconsin-Green Bay to three NCAA appearances before moving to Madison two years ago.

UConn hopes for an ending like '95

Kara Wolters and Carla Berube can see the end of the road, and it's getting closer all the time.

The two Connecticut seniors know that even if they keep winning, their college basketball careers will be over in three weeks. One slip, and they'll be over even sooner.

"I think there's that sense of urgency that the season is coming to a close, especially this year," said Wolters, the All-America center who leads the No. 1-ranked Huskies into a first-round NCAA Midwest Regional game with Lehigh on Saturday.

"This is it for us, so there's an even more sense of urgency. This is the last shot ever with our best friends. We're going to try to do everything in our power to make sure it's the way we would like it to end."

What Wolters & Co. are hoping for, of course, is an ending like the one in 1995, when they won the national championship and finished 35-0. A championship this year would leave the Huskies 36-0.

The 1995 team showed remarkable poise, dispatching its opponents with cool efficiency. So far, this one has done the same. The Huskies (30-0), the nation's only unbeaten team, are winning by an average of 17 points.

"I think we still have the same kind of attitude we do every year heading into the tournament," Wolters said. "I think practices have shown that. They've been very competitive and aggressive. We couldn't ask for anything more. I think we're in the right mindset now entering the tournament."

Connecticut, the No. 1 seed in its region, is 129-7 in the four years that

Wolters and Berube have played. But the Huskies are not the only team entering the tournament on a roll.

Check out Old Dominion (29-1), seeded No. 1 in the Midwest and winner of 28 in a row. Or Stanford (30-1), the top seed in the West. The Cardinal, who play Howard (24-5) on Friday, have won 21 straight since a Dec. 17 loss at Old Dominion.

Montana (25-3) has won 20 in a row heading into a West Regional game against Texas Tech (19-8) on Saturday, and Grambling (24-5) risks a 19-game winning streak at defending national champion Tennessee (23-10) in the Midwest, also Saturday.

St. Joseph's (25-4) takes a 17-game winning streak against Kansas State (19-11) in the East on Friday, while Drake (23-6) puts a 16-game streak on the line in a Midwest game at Illinois (22-7) on Friday.

Connecticut should have no trouble with visiting Lehigh (15-14), which has the best record in the field. The Engineers were 12-14 before winning the Patriot League tournament to earn their NCAA berth.

The Huskies' second-round game could be interesting, though, because they might be facing Iowa for the right to advance to the Midwest semifinals at Iowa's Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Old Dominion, which entertains Liberty on Friday, breezed through the Colonial Athletic Association after a formidable non-conference schedule that included victories over Duke, Vanderbilt, Purdue and Tennessee in addition to Stanford.

The Lady Monarchs are led by two All-Americans — point guard Ticha Penicheiro and center Clarisse Machanguana. Penicheiro, one of the nation's flashiest players, was a first-team pick and Machanguana made

the second team.

Their first-round opponent is the nation's most improved team. An infusion of freshmen helped Liberty go from 5-22 a year ago to 22-7 now, only the second winning season for the Rev. Jerry Falwell's school since it became Division I in 1988.

"We were picked to finish seventh in the (Big South) conference at the beginning of the year and I knew we were better than that," coach Rick Reeves said. "It is truly amazing to see that we were able to accomplish what we have with five of the top eight players being freshmen."

The best of the newcomers came from Moscow, 6-foot-1 Elena Kisselova. She scored 30 points in her very first game and is averaging 21.7 points and 8.3 rebounds.

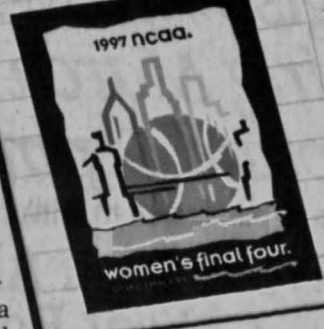
North Carolina (27-2), the No. 1 seed in the East, also had a dramatic turnaround.

The Tar Heels didn't even make the NCAA tournament last season, when they finished 13-14. But speedy guard Marion Jones returned after sitting out a year to concentrate on track and teamed with Tracy Reid and Chanel Wright to give coach Sylvia Hatchell an explosive perimeter game.

Reid is a second-team All-American and Jones made the third team. They'll lead the Tar Heels against Harvard (20-6) on Friday.

Colorado's NCAA prospects improved significantly with a strong finish to the regular season, which gave the Buffaloes (21-8) a subregional on their own floor and the No. 2 seed in the Midwest.

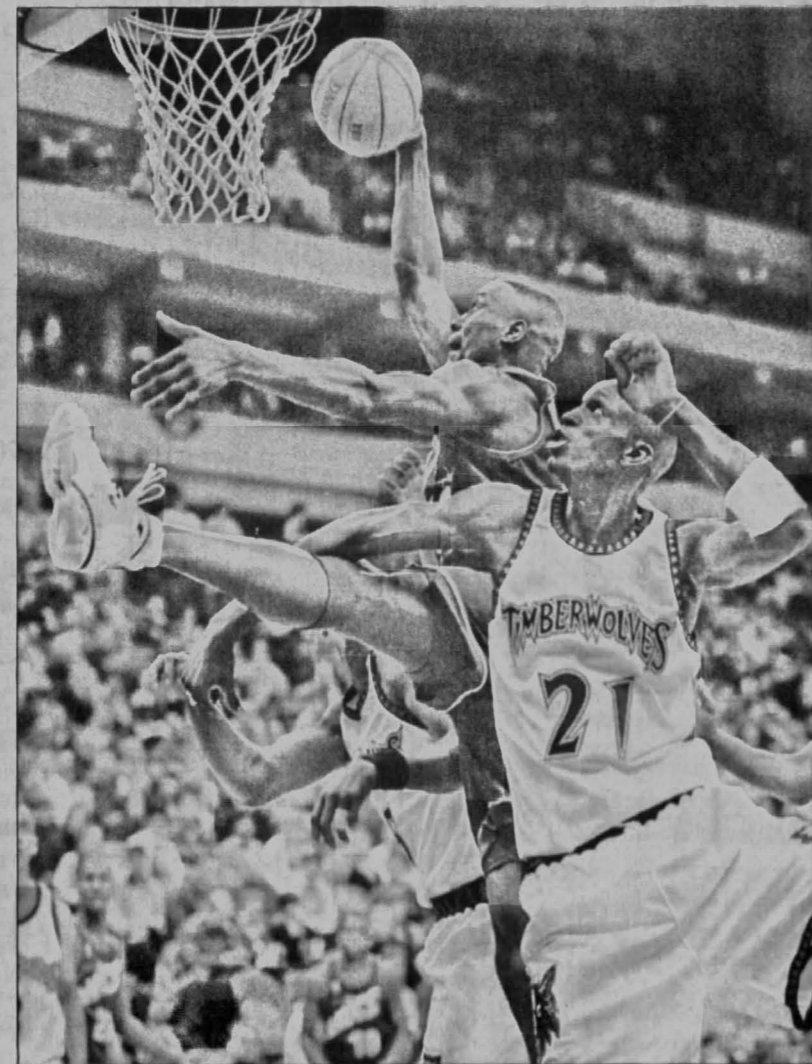

Report: Michigan players received cash payments

DETROIT (AP) — A Detroit man made cash payments, sometimes hundreds of dollars, to current and former University of Michigan basketball players, a published report said Thursday.
The Detroit Free Press quoted two sources close to the team as saying the payments were provided by Ed Martin, 63, of Detroit. Martin has given money to Wolverines players for years, the sources said.
The university said it hasn't found evidence of such violations.
They said several current players have received money during the season and during summer breaks, but they did not know how many and did not name any current or former players.
"But some players received 'hundreds' of dollars, sometimes during meetings with Martin after games and outside the locker room at Crisler Arena in Ann Arbor, one source said.
Other players received cash in envelopes hidden inside cake boxes that Martin gave them, and he provided money to some players through their girlfriends, that source said.
The Free Press said it could not reach Martin for comment.
Reports published earlier this week in the Free Press and The Detroit News identified Martin as a basketball program booster who allegedly tried to rent an apartment for a player and tried to buy plane tickets for players' relatives, but was stopped by coach Steve Fisher.
In a report filed last week, the university informed the NCAA about two minor violations involving contact between Martin and current players.
The university acknowledged that Fisher and his staff did not report the actions of the booster.
The NCAA is reviewing the university's internal report. It also is investigating on its own.

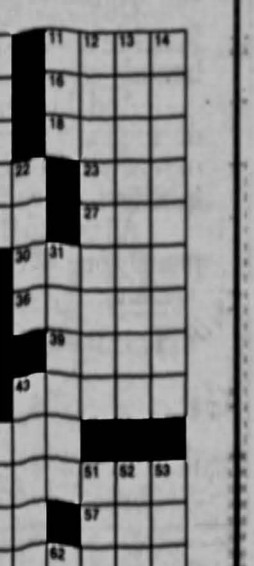

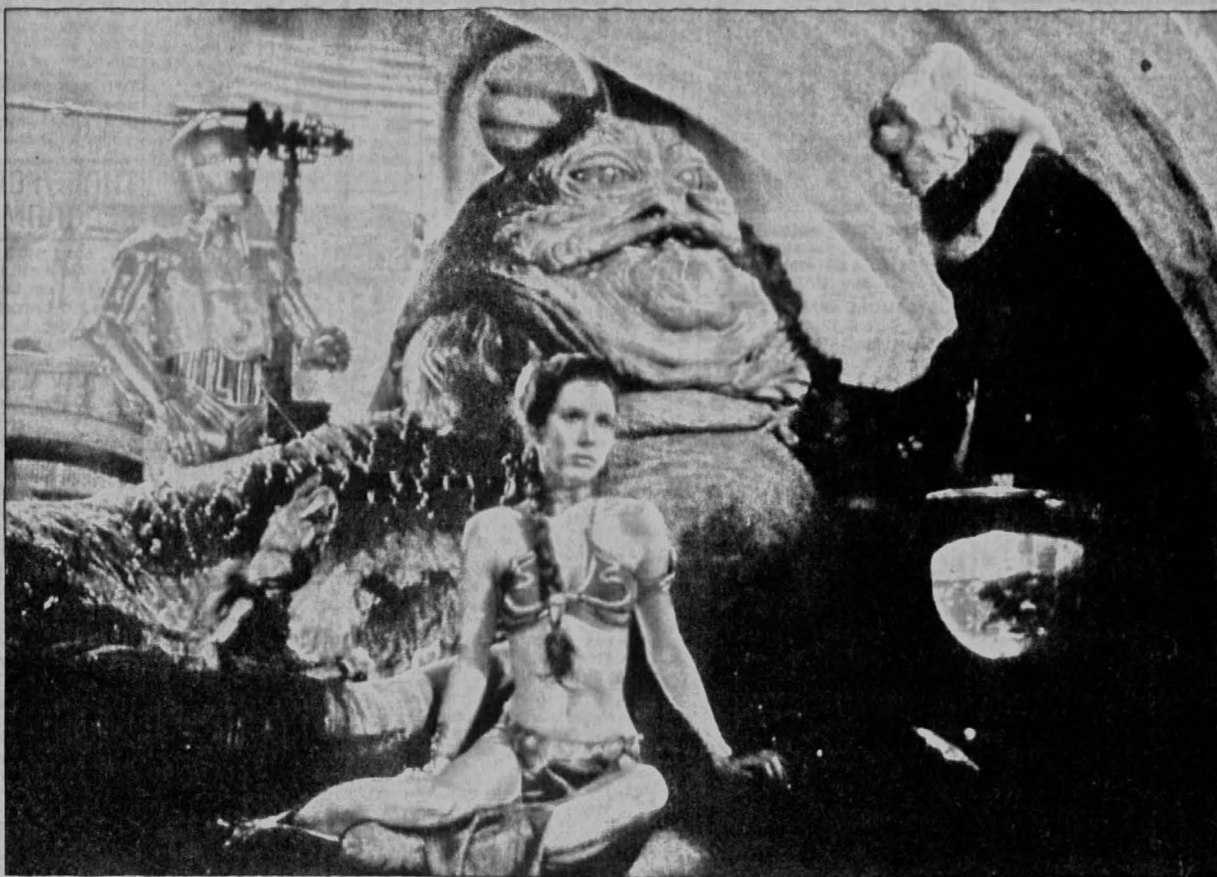
'Jedi' returns to theaters in full-force

Aside from the wonderful prologue at Jabba the Hutt's palace, which is regarded by many as the best thing about the film, "Return of the Jedi" wastes no time in getting to the business at hand, and that is constructing an unforgettable resolution to the troubling implications laid out in "The Empire Strikes Back." From there, the film sets forth upon a rather Gothic plot that seamlessly switches back and forth between its three main story lines.

made an entirely different film, there really is not much that's new. The band at Jabba's palace is highlighted more — but not too much, as feared originally — and the epilogue has been altered, but not necessarily changed. The infamous Ewok victory song has been deleted, making way for an initially awkward but ultimately satisfying instrumental score that sends off the trilogy on a more somber note. Instead of the triumphant glee that once followed the rebels' victory, there now is a sense of appreciation that the war is over, and everyone is among friends. The middle portion of the film, however, is identical to what audiences were treated to in 1983.

Comparisons, most of which are valid, often are made between the "Star Wars" saga and the legends of King Arthur. All the right components are present (with the exception of the Arthur and Mordred roles being reversed) and much of the dialogue in "Return of the Jedi" has the stilted, yet flowery taste of a good medieval epic.

Also, like those old legends, this is a film that achieves the highest levels of both ultraescapism and philosophical meaning. While it's intoxicatingly fun to watch the armies of the Rebellion bring the evil Galactic Empire to its collective knees, the redemption of Darth Vader remains the most powerful and profound element in the entire trilogy, and its dramatic impact would translate into any genre.

The changes made for the rerelease of this 1983 film rank, as the film itself does, better than "Star Wars" but still inferior to "Empire." Despite the eye-popping preview, which may lead one to believe creator George Lucas has

Beware of Clevo brings post-punk style to Gunnerz

Spanning the spectrum of subtle instrumentals to complex, multilayered vocals, post-punk band Beware of Clevo slowly is rising as one of Iowa City's most distinct new bands.

On tour for their debut album, *Stereo-boss Insomnia*, Beware of Clevo will perform tonight at 9 at Gunnerz, 123 E. Washington St.

Along with the band's classic center of guitar, bass and drums, Beware of Clevo also incorporates violins and multiple vocalists to create an orchestra-like effect. Many of the band's songs bring forth the textured singing, while others purely are instrumental.

"You can't describe our sound in a catch phrase," said Randy Isenhour, lead vocalist for Beware of Clevo. "We feature a guitar-wash with different instruments accentuating our sound. You can't say it sounds like Phish or any other certain band."

None of Beware of Clevo have ever taken formal music lessons, which contributed to their experimentation with these unusual sound arrangements, Isenhour said.

"Being self-taught keeps us more open-minded to a variety of music styles," he said.

While all of Beware of Clevo have appeared in other Iowa City bands, do not expect a familiar, sweat-soaked performance, said Nan Schwarz, vocalist, guitarist and violinist for Beware of Clevo.

"Our show is more of a low-key listening experience rather than a bouncing-off-the-walls style," Schwarz said. "It's not a rocking beat. Our stuff is slightly more ambient."

Although Beware of Clevo's unique collection of sound has led to praise from fans and critics, the band's rising status has generated a batch of rumors.

"We're very much alive to dispel rumors," Isenhour said.

Beware of Clevo will be joined in tonight's performance by Sugar Engine Red, formerly known as Sissy Bar, and Canary in the Mine.

"All three bands have strong vocal presences," Isenhour said. "It's a great chance to see the different approach going on right here in Iowa City."

The doors for the performance will open at 9 p.m., and admission will be \$5 at the door.
