# Committee: OWI on record for life

Drivers convicted of operating while intoxicated (OWI) will have the offense on their record for a lifetime instead of six years in a new bill drafted by the House committee

The committee voted 17-2 to approve a drunken-driving bill that will be debated by the Iowa Legislature next week. The bill also extends driver's license revocation for a second OWI from one year to two years and mandates an ignition interlock device for drivers who commit a second offense.

Drivers who refuse to take a

licenses revoked for a year instead of 240 days, and for second offenses, it will be revoked for two years instead of 540 days.

Rep. Minette Doderer, D-Iowa City, called the bill "very, very tough" and referred to it as problematic. She abstained from voting, she said, because she both agreed and disagreed with parts of the bill.

Although a proposed increase in UI residence hall room and board is the lowest in five years, UI stu-

dents say it is still too much. Students living in UI residence halls and eating in UI cafeterias would pay a 3.7 percent increase in the rates they pay currently if the Iowa state Board of Regents approves the UI's proposal, which is scheduled to be presented at

their monthly meeting Wednesday. The overall cost of residence ser-

vices will rise 3.63 percent under the proposal. That includes average rate increases of 3.98 percent for rooms, 3.06 percent for meals and 3.51 percent for UI apartments and family housing.

A Holocaust survivor plans to recount his story of days in a concentration camp to UI students

The blankets Leo Fettman slept on for 13 months evoked nightmares of shoveling bodies into mass graves and watching his parents the Fettman walk into a gas chamber.

After four weeks, the prisoners of the ghetto were informed they were leaving the country. At this time, the 19 other Jewish boys, posing as Christian Nazis, decided unanimously to burn their uniforms and leave with their families, knowing the war would end soon.

The following day, the captives were taken to a train, where 70 people were forced into one boxcar. During the two-day trip, they had no access to food or toilet facilities. When the train reached its destination, the hostages were met by Dr. Joseph Mengele, who said to them,

:Wiesel, 68, also told about 900 students at Charlotte Latin School they should be as angry as he is about the world's injustices, but they shouldn't be bitter.



# JonBenet Ramsey artwork stirs anger

DENVER - An art student combined the image of JonBenet Ramsey with the words "Daddy's Little Hooker" in a display at the University of Colorado, angering some people enough for it to be torn down

Paul Hidalgo, an undergraduate, said he hoped his two-panel work in the main hallway of the Fine Arts building would "raise issues about child pageantry."

"The ethics and morality behind them must be questioned. Exposing young and impressionable children to this very adult and superficial institution is a terrible thing," Hidalgo said in a telephone interview from the Boulder campus.

A spokesperson for the Ramsey family was outraged.

"Trying to sully the good name of a wonderful 6-year-old child who lost her life in a horrible way is not answered. merely tasteless, it is disgusting

and vulgar," Patrick Korten said. The first panel has the word

"Look" and an arrow pointing to a second panel, where Hidalgo mounted three 11-inch-by-17-inch color photocopies of a Newsweek magazine photo of the girl. The words "Daddy's Little Hooker" are above the photographs in large blue

Hidalgo said the project, which cost him \$100 in supplies, had been torn down twice since it went up Monday. He said he has consulted with an attorney because of all the attention the display is getting.

Because of copyright concerns, Hidalgo would not comment on his use of the photograph, which does not show the Newsweek logo. It shows JonBenet in a white dress, full makeup and with a crown of white flowers in her hair.

Messages left by the AP for a spokesperson with Newsweek in New York were not immediately

# Establishing a beachhead in abortion war

n the last two weeks, pro-choice forces have been caught promoting misinformation, if not an outright lie: that the procedure known as partial-birth abortion is extremely rare. This came to light when Ron Fitzsimmons, director of a major abortion clinic association, revealed there may be 5,000 such abortions in the United States each year. Most of these are purely "elective"; that is, the mother's life is not threatened by the pregnancy

Obscured in the furor over partial-birth abortion is the more fundamental question of when should abortion be legal. Both sides in the debate have staked out all or nothing positions. However, it is possible that abortion should be legal at some points during pregnancy, and at some other points it should not. A national debate addressing this question finally might bring some sense to abortion

Pro-choice advocates traditionally have argued a woman should have a right to an abortion whenever she chooses. The logic behind this is that what exists in the womb is not yet human because it cannot survive outside the womb.

partial-birth abortions occur - it becomes increasingly difficult to defend abortion. Modern medicine can, although it is still extremely rare, save a premature baby born at about five months. As the pregnancy goes on into the six and seventh months, the fetus' chances for survival increase. At some point during this period of the pregnancy, the fetus is a womb.

Society, with the aid of the medical establishment, should decide at what point during a pregnancy the life in the womb is a human life. At that point a line must be drawn banning abortion, except in cases in which the pregnancy endangers the mother's life.

Banning partial-birth abortion is a first step in drawing such a line. Partial-birth abortion usually occurs in the fifth or sixth month of pregnancy. The gruesome procedure involves an incision in the fetus' skull with scissors and its brain being vacu-

Fitzsimmons' recent revelation has compelled Congress to take up the issue again, voting on a proposed ban next week. It easily will pass the House and Senate. The question is whether President Clinton will sign it and legally ban a grizzly

hances are, though, Clinton will use the "health of the mother" excuse again to veto it. Clinton will convey the impression that he protected us from an extremist Congress that did not include an exception for mothers whose lives are endan-

gered by their pregnancy. It's a sham. First, partial-birth abortion is never preferable to other procedures. In January the executive board of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists concluded there are no instances in which partial-birth abortion is the only procedure by which a mother's health can be preserved. Second, the Supreme Court has ruled that exception for the "health of the mother" must be granted for any reason the doctor decides is relevant to the patient, including the vague categories of emotional and psychological reasons. Thus, by signing a bill that bans partial-birth abortion with a health of the mother exception, Clinton would be banning nothing.

Clinton should sign the bill Congress passes. Partial-birth abortion is a violent procedure. Banning it is a first step in establishing that at some point during pregnancy, there is a human life that must be protected.

The UI definitely has a problem.

And it gets worse. The Alcohol Use and Misperception Study of students living in the residence halls in fall 1995 found binge drinking among those students is only 42 percent. Clearly, students increase their average drinking levels once off campus.

This makes sense in the context of the results of the UI Health Interest and Practice Survey done in 1995. This survey examined how UI students have been affected by drunken students. Thirty-nine percent have been insulted or humiliated, 26 percent have had their property damaged, 21 percent have been pushed or assaulted, 39 percent have had to ward off unwanted sexual advances, 61 percent have babysat or taken care of another student who drank and 79 percent have had their sleep inter-

This is a big problem, too. So now you know the real story, and now you have the right to make a judgment.

There are no easy answers when so many people and so much money is involved. Until we all finally decide to be a little more responsible and show a little more respect, this debate is going to continue for a very long time. At least now you'll know what you're talking

# How bicycle-friendly is Iowa City?

V Thile entering Iowa City, the sign welcomes you: "Iowa City, A Bicycle Friendly Community.

Is this just lip service? With so much traffic flooding the streets, it seems strange to call Iowa City "bicycle-friendly." The city has done some good things toward making the town "bike-friendly," but it is bicyclists themselves who negate the title.

Jeff Davidson, assistant planning director for Iowa City, describes the national program in which Iowa City participates. In order to post the signs, the city must receive certification through the League of American Wheelmen by spending a certain amount of money on bicycle-related programs. He said Iowa City easily qualifies.

In order to make the city more bicycle-friendly, the city does many things. It has built trails and placed a large number of bicycle racks around the city. Traffic lights are designed so they will be activated by bicyclists. Also, the city has posted 160 "Share the Road" signs throughout the city, a "subtle reminder to motorists," Davidson

With the large number of people who use bicycles for transportation, the city's best interests lie in making bicycling safe. Unfortunately, the roads often become the the set-

ting of a turf war between dangerous motorists and reckless bicy-

'We've even had people call in and complain about the signs," Davidson said. Many power-hungry drivers do not want to give up a portion of the road to bicyclists. Others, while not overtly aggressive, create danger by not being

aware of cyclists. On the other hand, many cyclists contribute to the problem by not obeying traffic laws. One cyclist complained, "How often do you see bicyclists stop at a stop sign? You wouldn't think of doing that in a car." He indicated that every year a new group of students comes to Iowa City, many of whom who do not know how to bicycle safely in high-traffic areas.

Two cyclists said they thought, in general, Iowa City is bike-friendly. "I feel pretty safe," described and a UI graduate student.

cyclist Sarah von Schrader, a UI graduate student. "There's plenty of places to park." Another cyclist agreed: "There are lots of bike racks so that people aren't locking their bikes to trees and fence posts.

Both cyclists complained of a lack of bike lanes. "In Seattle there were bike lanes everywhere," von Schrader said. "There was a place on buses where you could put your bike." Davidson indicated that where streets are particularly busy with auto traffic, safer routes are nearby. For instance, College Street has less traffic than Burlington Street, but even the bike routes leave something to be desired. With cars on both sides of the road, it is hard for motorists to see bicyclists.

Obviously Iowa City has room for improvement. In a perfect world, there would be bike lanes and more trails throughout the city. But the city has made substantial efforts to make Iowa City bicycle-friendly. Most of the danger can be attributed to a few aggressive motorists or to reckless bicyclists themselves.

Mutual respect on the road will enhance the city's efforts and continue to ensure Iowa City remains bicycle-friendly.

Unfortunately for me, and my client, on one issue the law was clearly against us. And the facts fit the law to a T.


In terminating the Unified Program "Unified Program terminated by UI" March 11), the university is giving up on one of its most unique and valuable


The Unified Program offers its students so many wonderful opportunities that are often difficult to attain at a

It is a shame that students will no longer be able to enjoy the benefits of a program that helped set the University of lowa apart from so many other large

WASHINGTON - The House voted Thursday to give Mexico 90 days to fully cooperate in the antidrug war or lose its certification. President Clinton is counting on the Senate to protect his outright acceptance of Mexico as a full part-

# Terrorist missile may have hit TWA jet

NEW YORK - The FBI agent in charge of the TWA Flight 800 investigation acknowledged for the first time Thursday that the plane could have been brought down by a shoulder-fired terrorist

But so far, there is no evidence to prove that theory, James Kallstrom said.

And he condemned as ridiculous a new flurry of claims that the jet was destroyed accidentally by the U.S. military.

"This terrible, terrible tragedy was not caused by our military," Kallstrom said in an interview with the AP.

They entered the concentration camp and were separated into two groups. Fettman and his brother were sent to a line on the right that was for workers, while his parents, along with many other Jews, were sent to a line on the left. The people on the left were handed soap with initials written in German that meant "Pure Jewish Fat."

Fettman and his brother watched their parents walk into the gas chambers. They had no chance to say goodbye.

"Those people who haven't gone through the experiences will never know," he said. "The physical, emotional and mental scars will remain with me forever."

Fettman's brother was killed by a bomb dropped on the camp by members of the U.S. Air Force, who thought the camp was a Nazi camp. By the end of the war, 140 members of Fettman's family had

been killed. The camp's conditions crippled Fettman, who was ill and malnutritioned. Twenty prisoners were forced to live in one wooden barrack so small every person had to lie on one side, or else they all wouldn't fit. When the Nazis made coffee for themselves in the mornings, the captives were given the old black water and grounds that remained. For lunch and dinner they drank the leftover water the Nazis had from boiling potatoes and shared one loaf of bread between the 20 of them.

Fettman spent 13 months at Auschwitz, a time during which he attempted suicide. At one point, he was hanged by a Nazi and was saved only when the rope around his neck broke. He was forced to watch Nazi experiments and sometimes was ordered to participate in

diers. The prisoners didn't know how to react when they saw the Russian soldiers; they couldn't believe it finally was over.

"We really didn't know what to do," he said. "Shall I laugh? Shall I sing? Shall I dance? Shall I cry?"

He was 20 years old, crippled and 80 pounds of skin and bones. He had no home or family to return to. He questioned why he still was

Fettman stayed in a hospital while his leg healed and then returned to Germany, to a displaced persons camp. After four years, he was granted permission to go to Canada, where he stayed for 12 years. In 1960, he came to the United States and became an American citizen.

Fettman said it took him three years to be able to talk about the Holocaust. A book written by a Northwestern professor inspired him to begin speaking about his experiences. He began to realize he was left on the Earth to fulfill his mission in life. Talking about the Holocaust, he felt, was part of that

To this day, he still can remember vividly the very first time he spoke publicly about his experiences with the Holocaust. Standing at a church podium in Ontario, looking down at a piece of paper, he told his story. Afterward, people came up to him and asked for a copy of his speech. He gave them the blank sheet of paper at the podium. He had no need to write his experiences down, he said, because they permanently were written in his memory

Despite the hardships Fettman has faced, he said he doesn't harbor any hatred, although he has bitter emotions toward the Nazis and other people around the world who stood by and watched while the Holocaust was happening.

# Bombing suspect nailed with airplane ticket

SPOKANE, Wash. — The fourth suspect in a string of bombings and bank robberies was holding a oneway ticket to Albany, N.Y., when FBI agents arrested him in the downtown train station early

Brian Ratigan, 38, sought in a nationwide manhunt since Oct. 8, was charged Thursday in the July bombing of a Planned Parenthood clinic and a the robbery of a bank,

both linked to white-supremacists.

He appeared before U.S. Magistrate Cynthia Imbrogno in the same courthouse where three men charged as his accomplices are on trial. The magistrate set a bail hearing for Monday.

Ratigan, 38, was arrested by two dozen FBI agents at the downtown station about 1:30 a.m. He was with his wife and two sons, who were not arrested, and traveling under the name "Jack O'Brian," prosecutor Earl Hicks said.

All four had one-way tickets to Albany, Hicks said. He did not say why they were headed there, but area last year.

Ratigan reportedly once lived in

Ratigan was described by The Spokesman-Review this week as a former Army sniper who moved to Whidbey Island, about 50 miles northwest of Seattle, after leaving

the military in 1989. He moved in 1994 to northern Idaho, around Sandpoint, a region that has become a magnet for people with white-separatist, anti-government views.

Like the three defendants already on trial, Ratigan and his family did not stand when the magistrate entered the courtroom Thursday, a gesture intended to signify their refusal to recognize U.S. government authority.

The thin, lank-haired Ratigan made no statement during his brief court appearance.

His wife did not talk to reporters after the hearing.

The criminal complaint says Ratigan conspired with Verne Jay Merrell, Charles H. Barbee and Robert S. Berry, all of the Sandpoint, Idaho, area, to bomb buildings and rob banks in the Spokane



# Kato, ISU swat away Redbirds

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. Kelvin Cato picked a good time to have the best game of his career. And all it took to get him going was a rim-rattling dunk in the first half.

The senior center scored a careerhigh 29 points, had 12 rebounds and broke a Midwest Regional record with eight blocks, leading Iowa State to a 69-57 victory over Illinois State in the first round of the NCAA tournament Thursday.

"The ball was just falling in the hole," Cato said. "They were get-ting me the ball at the baseline." Falling in the hole?

Cato was actually slamming it through. The 6-foot-11 Cato had a big size advantage over anyone on Illinois State and had five dunks for the game.

Cato's eighth block came with about 14 minutes left and gave him one more than Temple's Tim Perry, Louisville's Pervis Ellison and Wake Forest's Tim Duncan. Cato's previous career-high in points was 21.

"It's the best I've ever seen Kelvin Cato play," said Iowa State guard Dedric Willoughby, who had 21 points. "Once, he got his first dunk, I knew he was ready to play. There was aggression. And I saw a lot more of them."

Cato led the sixth-seeded Cyclones (21-8), who earned a second-round meeting with Cincinnati on Saturday.

Rico Hill led Illinois State (24-6), the 11th seed, with 14 points and 14 rebounds. Dan Muller added 12 points and Jamar Smiley had 12.

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
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

"We just want to complete this," guard Bobby Jackson said Thursday. "Without the national championship, it's all no good."

The first step for Minnesota (27-3) is to get past 16th-seeded Southwest Texas State (16-12) on Friday.

# 'Jedi' returns to theaters in full-force

Contrary to the hopes of many "Star Wars" fanatics, the cute, furry Ewoks still play an integral part in the special edition of the trilogy's final chapter, "Return of the Jedi."

The inclusion of the fuzzy, teddybear-like creatures has long been a thorn in the side of those who like their sci-fi/fantasy a little more on the darker side (no pun intended). But the little fur balls should not detract from the fact that "Return of the Jedi" is an extremely wellstructured and exciting film. True, it is the only segment of the trilogy that does not stand on its own as far as the story is concerned, but even someone who knows nothing about "Star Wars" (if there is such a person) could not deny that "Return" is a hell of a ride.

Aside from the wonderful prologue at Jabba the Hutt's palace, which is regarded by many as the best thing about the film, "Return of the Jedi" wastes no time in getting to the business at hand, and that is constructing an unforgettable resolution to the troubling implications laid out in "The Empire Strikes Back." From there, the film sets forth upon a rather Gothic plot that seamlessly switches back and forth between its three main story lines.

That is what's best about "Return": It covers all bases. For the action-movie fan, sit back and enjoy the rebels' struggle on Endor; for the fan of aerial dogfights, feast your eyes on the untouchable Death Star battle sequence; and, for those more into heavy-handed Zen confrontation, endless fodder for meditation is provided by Luke's



final battle with the dark side of the Force and Darth Vader's final battle with himself.

Comparisons, most of which are valid, often are made between the "Star Wars" saga and the legends of King Arthur. All the right components are present (with the exception of the Arthur and Mordred roles being reversed) and much of the dialogue in "Return of the Jedi" has the stilted, yet flowery taste of a good medieval epic.

Also, like those old legends, this is a film that achieves the highest levels of both ultraescapism and philosophical meaning. While it's intoxicatingly fun to watch the armies of the Rebellion bring the evil Galactic Empire to its collective knee, the redemption of Darth Vader remains the most powerful and profound element in the entire trilogy, and its dramatic impact would translate into any genre.

The changes made for the rerelease of this 1983 film rank, as the film itself does, better than "Star Wars" but still inferior to "Empire." Despite the eye-popping preview, which may lead one to believe creator George Lucas has
