Rail strike snarls traffic for thousands

Striking commuter rail employees caused delays four times longer than normal in the Bay Area.

SAN FRANCISCO — A strike against the Bay Area's commuter rail system caused monumental traffic jams on bridges and highways Monday, including a backup more than 15 miles long.

The walkout Sunday by 2,600 union workers brought the 93-mile Bay Area Rapid Transit system to a standstill, forcing 275,000 people to find a new way to work. For many, that meant taking the bus or driving and waiting.

BART. Before, I took it for granted," said Dawn Adams, a lawyer from Castro Valley who took a bus. Her trip took more than two hours — four times longer than normal on BART.

It took up to 40 minutes to get through the toll plaza at the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge, the

main route into San Francisco from eastern suburbs. A backup of at least 15 miles was reported on Interstate 80.

Sharon Kidd of Berkeley said her normal 15-minute commute on BART turned into a 3 1/2-hour nightmare as bus after packed bus passed her by. She finally had to take a bus in the opposite direction to get one that had room to bring her into San Francisco.

Colin Jones, a spokesperson for the state Transportation Department, said the morning commute was one of the worst ever.

"We were hoping it wouldn't be this bad," he said.

The trip home was expected to be equally bad — especially with a Monday night football game between the Oakland Raiders and Kansas City Chiefs.

The striking train operators and mechanics are demanding higher pay and the end of a two-tier wage system, in which newer employees are paid less for the same job. Talks were to resume Monday afternoon.

BART's two largest unions voted last week to reject an offer that would have raised their pay 3 percent a year for three years.

BART workers are among the highest paid in the industry. Maintenance workers earn a base wage of \$48,000, and train operators and station agents make \$40,900, with overtime boosting most checks far above those levels.

"I understand that the employees want a better wage, but there's not that many people who make as much as they do," said Tommy Andrews, who carpooled to San Francisco from Oakland.

U.S. drops case against Al-Sayegh

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department moved today to drop charges against a Saudi dissident who was once thought willing to reveal information on a bombing that killed 19 U.S. airmen at Khobar Towers.

Hani Al-Sayegh had pleaded not guilty to an earlier plot to kill Americans in the desert kingdom. Late last month he backed out of a bargain to plead guilty to conspiracy charges in another case.

"Since we have not been able to develop the requisite evidence, it is necessary that this prosecution be withdrawn," the department said in a statement.

Albright heads to the Middle East

WASHINGTON (AP) — Facing her toughest challenge as secretary of state, Madeleine Albright heads to the Middle East on Tuesday to try to reverse the dangerous skid in Arab-Israeli relations.

The weeklong trip could be the Clinton administration's last chance in a long while to ease the "crisis of confidence" that has stalemated negotiations between Israel and the Palestinians amid a devastating swirl of terrorist attacks. The odds are long. But a senior State Department official on Monday noted the alternatives to not trying: "More violence, more victims, lost hope and the extremists win."

Albright intends to take a tough line with Yasser Arafat, the Palestinian leader, but also with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu.

Haitian ferry sinks

MONTROUIS, Haiti (AP) — An overcrowded ferry capsized and sank off Haiti's central coast Monday, killing as many as 400 people who were trapped inside the vessel, survivors said. One report said an equal number of people swam safely to shore.

Thousands of Haitians waited in grief on the pebbled beach of this fishing village as U.N. divers and a half-dozen fishing boats searched 200 yards offshore for victims. U.S. Coast Guard and U.N. helicopters hovered above the spot where the ferry, The Pride of Gonave, disappeared in 75 feet of water.

India

Mother Teresa's state funeral

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — Mother Teresa, whose message of peace and compassion went beyond the boundaries of creed and nationality, will go to her burial place on a gun carriage, draped in the Indian flag.

The military trappings of Saturday's state funeral might clash with the image of the Nobel Peace laureate — but church leaders said Monday it was just the government's way of giving Mother Teresa its most prestigious farewell.

The Rev. Anthony Rodricks, an aide to Calcutta's Roman Catholic archbishop, Henry D'Souza, acknowledged there had been objections to the gun carriage.

"People might think of war when they see a gun carriage, but this is not the way it should be taken. A state funeral is the highest honor the state government can give Mother, and that is the spirit in which the ceremony should be taken," he said Monday.

Family rejects return of royal title

Diana's family speaks out in thanks and appreciation, and also rejects the reinstatement of her title.

LONDON — The people's flowers, heaped outside the Spencer family estate, were gathered up and scattered on Princess Diana's island grave Monday, and Britain's tabloids pledged to stay out of her sons' private lives.

Diana's brother Charles, the 9th Earl Spencer, thanked people around the world for flowers and letters that "have genuinely helped us to mourn her death." He released photographs of the island carpeted in blooms.

"The knowledge that Diana's life gave so many people so much can now be balanced by the hope that, in death, her legacy will be immortal," Spencer said.

As the nation returned to work Monday on a perfect early autumn day, the crowds of mourners that lapped around the gates of royal palaces and Diana's ancestral home abated but did not cease.

Reminders of grief were abundant: flowers and candles, newspaper headlines and everywhere, Diana's expressive face — images of a woman incessantly photographed throughout her life.

The government began discussing a fitting public memorial for the "people's princess." And the Spencers rejected Buckingham Palace's offer to consider restoring in death the honorary title "Her Royal Highness," stripped in last year's divorce.

In Paris, the bodyguard who was the sole survivor of the Aug. 31 crash that killed Diana, her boyfriend Dodi Fayed and their driver was reported to be conscious, but not yet able to assist police.

Buckeyes kick three players off basketball squad

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Three players — including last year's leading rebounder and a top scorer — have been dismissed from the Ohio State men's basketball team, head coach Jim O'Brien said Monday.

Players Shaun Stonerook, Jermaine Tate and Trent Jackson retained their scholarships for the 1997-98 school year and may continue their studies at the university.

"For now, we are not kicking them out (of school)," O'Brien said. "I'm not interested in taking their scholarships, but they know they need to seek some other options."

The first-year coach said he discussed the move with his staff and with athletic director Andy Geiger.

"We spoke at length about this," O'Brien said. "I told him what my interests were and he was in full support."

The team now has 13 players on its roster: two seniors, four juniors, four sophomores and three freshmen.

Stonerook, a 6-foot-7 forward from Westerville, was the Buckeyes' leading rebounder as a sophomore last season and was sixth in the Big Ten Conference with an average of 7.7 rebounds per game.

He also ranked third on the team in points (11.6 per game) and second in assists (3.7) and steals (1.6).

Ohio State announced Friday that Stonerook was declared academically ineligible for the 1997-98 season.

Tate, a 6-9 junior from Toledo, sat out the final 11 games of the 1996-97 season after being diagnosed with cardiomyopathy, a heart condition. He averaged 14.1 points and 6.4 rebounds per game before being sidelined.

Jackson, a 6-4 sophomore guard from Rochester, N.Y., played in 14 games last year and averaged 2.9 points. On Aug. 22, he and Damon Stringer, who was captain of last year's team, were charged with disorderly conduct and resisting arrest after a scuffle with police outside a Columbus bar.

They pleaded innocent in Franklin County Municipal Court. No court date was set.

O'Brien said the two players' run-in with the law was "a factor but a small factor" in his decision to remove Jackson from the team. As for Stringer, a 5-11 junior guard from University Heights, he no longer is team captain.

"I talked to him very directly and told him how disappointed I was in his behavior," said O'Brien, who was hired on April 2 after serving as head coach at Boston College for 11 years.

O'Brien replaced Randy Ayers, whom Geiger fired on March 10 after eight seasons in charge of the Ohio State program. Ayers' last four teams had losing records — including 10-17 marks each of the past two seasons — and his tenure included an NCAA probation for recruiting violations and several player arrests.

Another current player in trouble with the law is Jon Sanderson, a 6-7 freshman guard-forward from Lexington. He pleaded innocent in Dayton Municipal Court last month to charges of assaulting a peace officer, underage drinking and public intoxication. No pretrial hearing had been set.

O'Brien will be keeping a close eye on the behavior of Stringer and Sanderson.

"I have no interest in either of them getting into a similar situation down the road," he said.

O'Brien said he struggled with his decision to remove the three players from the team.

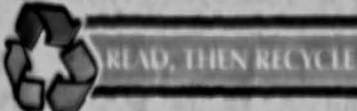

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Accountability, integrity, excellence and tradition. Tom Goss believes in all of that and more, especially where the University of Michigan is concerned.

His great love for his alma mater, coupled with his vast business background, helped Goss become the university's ninth athletic director Monday. His stiff resolve and fierce personal pride make him think he can restore an image many once saw as squeaky clean.

"I'm pretty clear on what I want," Goss said at a news conference in the stately Michigan Union. "There is no gray. And once you know what I want, I hold you accountable."

Goss, 51, will inherit several problems.

He is arriving about the same time that a private law firm is expected to conclude an internal investigation into alleged wrongdoings in the basketball program. He also will attempt to halt a series of embarrassing off-campus incidents involving players and coaches.

"Everyone should know the rules," said Goss, an all-Big Ten defensive tackle for the Wolverines in 1968. "They're there in black and white. When I was playing, if you screwed up

one of the rules, even if you were a star player, you weren't there. You were gone."

As Goss spoke at a podium in the front of the wood-paneled room, Michigan basketball coach Steve Fisher leaned against a wall, listening intently.

The men's basketball program has been under investigation for more than a year as the NCAA and a Kansas law firm — hired by the university — dig into allegations that players received money and other improper benefits from a booster, who now is banned.

Hungry Hawks continue non-conference run

Hungry for more wins, the Iowa volleyball team is ready to challenge North East Illinois at Carver-Hawkeye Arena tonight at 7 p.m.

With intensity and enthusiasm high after a first-place finish at the Hawkeye Classic on Saturday, the team is holding nothing back as it begins to face its non-conference competition.

"Fortunately for me, we have a team that is very, very hungry," co-head coach Matt Sonnichsen said. "They desperately want to be successful. And because of that, it makes my job a lot easier."

With very little time to regroup after their weekend performance, the Hawkeyes hope the momentum they gained from their last victory on Saturday will help carry them over into Tuesday.

The most difficult thing will probably be preparing for it," sophomore Shannon Smith said. "Last year we never had a Tuesday night match, or

played in a tournament on Saturday and then came right back and played on Tuesday. So preparing for it and being ready to play will be tough."

Watching recent videos of North East Illinois games, Sonnichsen said his Hawkeyes will be facing a team similar to Sacramento State and Tennessee Tech, both of whom they faced at the Hawkeye Classic.

"They are not the most physical team," Sonnichsen said. "They are not the biggest, most dominant team, but they play very well together. They play with a lot of pride and they keep sending the ball back onto the other team's side. So from that standpoint, it will be a very different match from what we played against Kentucky."

Using non-conference games to prepare for the Big Ten, the team's main goal is to keep improving, gain confidence and build momentum to carry into the tough conference competition it will begin facing at the end of the month.

"I think we need to work on serve receiving," junior Katie O'Brien said.

"That was a hard thing for us this weekend. We also need to watch out for the tips. Non-conference teams tend to throw some more trash, like tips and roll shots versus the hard hits. We need to pick up on those. Hopefully, we'll go in and get it over with fast in three tonight. We'll be more enthusiastic, because I think it was kind of a bonus we won our tournament this weekend."

While the Hawkeye Classic victories were a positive addition to their preseason play, the Hawkeyes said dwelling on it will only hold them back.

"We need to stay focused in the game on Tuesday," sophomore Jill Schmidt said. "We can't let this weekend influence us. The weekend is behind us now and we need to keep pressing-on."

With a large sophomore and freshman class making early impacts in the program, the team is looking to move on and add more wins to its record. Sonnichsen said the youth on his team only adds bonuses for the program and for the fans.



"The obvious advantage is that you have some athletes that are still very, very excited about collegiate athletics," Sonnichsen said. "It's still relatively new to them. You maybe lose a little experience, but you gain on the enthusiasm and effort. These kids are still very hungry to be successful."

PARK RIDGE, Ill. (AP) — Penn State quarterback Mike McQueary was named offensive player of the week and John Favret of Wisconsin received the defensive honor, the Big Ten announced Monday.

McQueary, a senior in his first collegiate start, broke two Penn State records. He completed 21-of-36 passes for a school record 366 yards in leading the Nittany Lions to a 34-17 victory over Pittsburgh on Saturday. He passed for two touchdowns. McQueary's 370 yards in total offense was also a school record.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL Post-game party causes damage in East Lansing

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Police say a post-football party dragged two police cars and led to the arrest of four people. The party began after Michigan State's 42-10 season-opening victory over Western Michigan on Sunday afternoon.

Witnesses said a handful of parties merged into one gathering shortly after midnight when someone started break-dancing in the street. Young, who sustained his latest concussion when he was kneed in the head by Hardy Nickerson during San Francisco's season-opening 13-6 loss at Tampa Bay, sat out Sunday's 15-12 win at St. Louis on the recommendation of his neurologist, Dr. Joseph Lacy. He visited Lacy on Monday and went over the results of a brain scan taken last Thursday. The scan found no abnormalities but Young was scheduled to see a neurosurgeon for a second opinion.

Nearby residents came out to watch, some bringing couches and drinks. A couch was soon set on fire, reportedly helped along by a stream of gasoline. Students flocked to the fire, which officials said burned at least two stories high. "It was like a concert out here," said Kim Lenz, a 21-year-old Michigan State student who lives nearby.

AUTO RACING Fittipaldi injured in helicopter crash

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — Racing champion Emerson Fittipaldi fractured his lower back when the small plane he was piloting from his family citrus farm plunged 300 feet into a swamp. The 50-year-old racer, one of Brazil's most revered athletes and a two-time Indianapolis 500 winner, is in stable condition. A friend and former driver described him as alert and talking normally. Chicago's Arlington to shut down

■ Owner decides to shut down prominent thoroughbred track due to competition from riverboat casinos.

CHICAGO — Bowing to competition from riverboat gambling casinos, Arlington International Racecourse, home of the Arlington Million, announced Monday it will shut down next month after completing its racing season.

Owner Richard Duchossois left open the door to some day resume racing at the track about 25 miles northwest of downtown Chicago, but said it won't happen next year.

"We won't be racing in 1998,"

spokesman Tony Rau said, pronouncing the 70-year-old racecourse the latest casualty in a war for gambling dollars that pits the nation's tracks against slot machines and blackjack tables.

Once the season ends on Oct. 10, the track's owners will start "to explore alternative uses for our property," Rau said.

Arlington is one of three Chicago-area tracks to offer thoroughbred racing. The others are Hawthorne Race Course and Sportsman's Park, which are located just a few blocks from each other just southwest of the city.

Arlington's problems are not unique. Several thoroughbred tracks across the country have been squeezed by competition from riverboats, Indian casinos and lotteries. Even famed Churchill Downs, home of the Kentucky Derby, will soon feel the pinch, experts say.

Riverboat casinos near Arlington are located in Elgin, Aurora and Joliet, as well across the state line in Gary, Hammond and East Chicago, Ind.

Arlington features three major races: The Arlington Million, with a purse of \$1 million, the \$500,000 Beverly D., and the \$400,000 Secretariat. But the track says quality

has dropped despite Duchossois' efforts to upgrade it.

Strict Illinois laws have sent top horses and trainers out of state, experts say. Assessing racing at Arlington in the current issue of Backstretch magazine, Dallas Morning News writer Gary West calls it "about as exciting as German opera."

Duchossois threatened to close in 1995 without such governmental help as a tax break and permission to install slot machines. He relented after lawmakers allowed Illinois tracks to simulcast and take bets on out-of-state races.

But that plan failed to stem the losses.

Arlington, damaged by a 1985 fire, has produced \$12.8 million in operating profit since reopening in 1989. With depreciation, the loss on Duchossois' original investment of \$200 million comes to \$69.8 million.

Mean-

while, spokesman Tom Hardy said Gov. Jim Edgar "is disappointed ... but understands that it's a business decision." He said no state bailout efforts were in the works.

Racing authorities say many tracks feel similar pressures. Tony Chamblin, president of the Association of Racing Commissioners International, a Lexington, Ky., based group that represents regulators, said that in the last 25 years the share of the gambling dollar spent on horse racing has dwindled from 27 cents to seven cents.

"Even in Las Vegas, slot machines have proven more popular than table games, and I think it's because it's no-brainer entertainment," he said. "... There is an intellectual challenge to handicapping a horse race if one wants to partake of that."

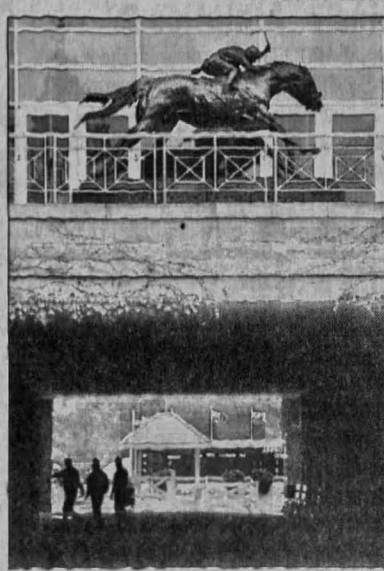

been affected by casino competition include Santa Anita and Hollywood Park in Los Angeles, Del Mar near San Diego, Monmouth Park in Oceanport, N.J., and Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Ark.

Hollywood Park, however, has fought back by installing gaming devices as have the Fair Grounds in New Orleans and Prairie Meadows in Altoona, Iowa.

Soon, Chamblin said, Churchill Downs will come under pressure from casinos along the Ohio River.

Rafter climbs from Down Under to top of the world at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Patrick Rafter has a smile that won't go away. "I never thought I would win a Slam," he said Monday. "I always dreamed of it, but I never thought I would actually win one."

But the 24-year-old Australian did just that, capturing the U.S. Open on Sunday by defeating Britain's big-serving Greg Rusedski 6-3, 6-2, 4-6, 7-5 with a clinical demonstration of serve-and-volley tennis.

Then, in the company of several Australian champions, including Tony Roche, John Newcombe and Ken Rosewall, Rafter celebrated until the wee hours. Among them, the Aussie contingent has 19 Grand Slam tournament titles.

Other former Aussie players at the party included Wally Masur, Brad Drewett, Darren Cahill and Paul McNamee.

"It ended with a great cake fight about 2 o'clock in the morning," Rafter said.

Until this year, Rafter had been in the pack of early-round losers, traversing the world in search of a victory and computer ranking points. He finished the past two years ranked No. 68 and No. 62

while battling injuries. His only other title came at Manchester, England, in 1994.

"I've won two tournaments in my

life, and one was the U.S. Open," he said, still awed by his accomplishment.

He had reached five finals this year before the U.S. Open. But with Sunday's victory, he shot up to No. 3 in the world behind Pete Sampras and his semifinal victim, Michael Chang.

Rafter is the first Australian in the top 10 since Pat Cash reached No. 10 in 1988. He's also the first men's singles winner from Australia since Newcombe in 1973.

"I started making changes at the beginning of the year," Rafter said. "Less off-court work, a change in the gym program, more on-court work. It was a lot of hard work. I felt so good within myself. I felt so much stronger this year."

He cites an interview after he reached the final at St. Polten, Austria, as the key to his changed outlook.

"They asked me if I felt I could win the French Open and I said no," Rafter said. "All of a sudden, I'm in the semifinals. I said to myself, the next time they ask me that question, I won't say no. I have a 1 in 128 chance, which is more positive than no."

Roche has been coaching Rafter, with Newcombe helping out occasionally.

"These guys have so much to offer," Rafter said. "Before Sunday's

match, I asked Roche how should I be feeling, playing a Grand Slam final. And he said, 'I'm not the right person to ask. I only won one of them. I've lost a dozen of them. Ask Newk.'

Newcombe's words? "Knuckle down and just be yourself."

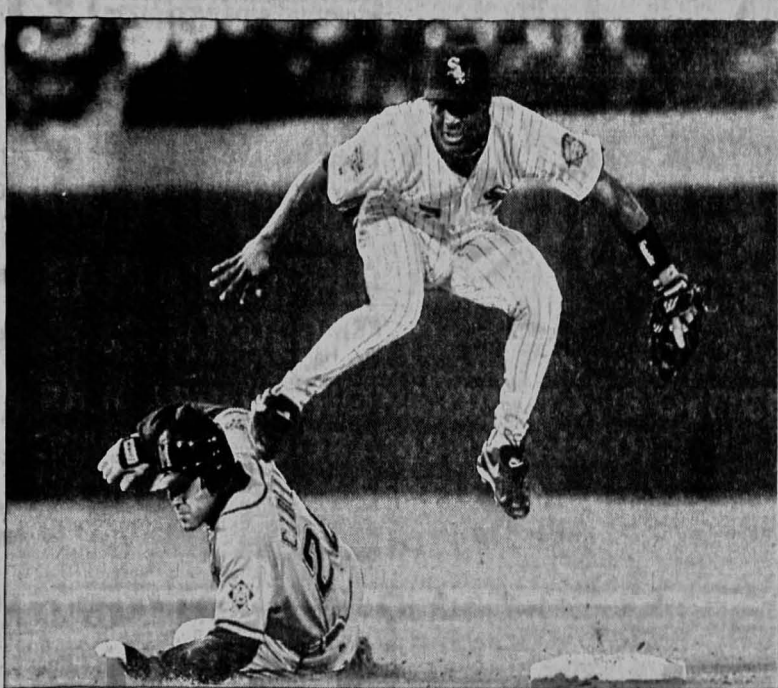

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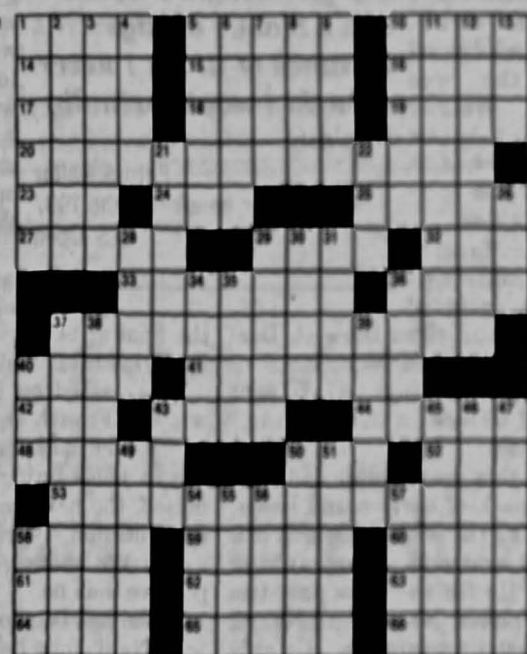

Fans speak out on realignment

Sixty-five percent of people surveyed in AP poll say they're not fans of Major League Baseball. Over half of all baseball fans feel geographic realignment is a good idea.

An Associated Press poll on baseball was taken Aug. 22-31 among a random sample of 686 adult Americans in all states except Alaska and Hawaii. Interviewing was done by telephone by ICR of Media, Pa.

The results were weighted to represent the population by key demographic factors such as age, sex, region and education.

No more than one time in 20 should chance variations in the sample cause the results to vary by more than 3.7 percentage points from the answers that would be obtained if all Americans were polled.

This margin of sampling error is larger for responses of subgroups, such as age categories.

There are other sources of potential error in polls, including the wording and order of questions.

Among the 2,010 people asked the first question, only those who responded that they were baseball fans or somewhat of a fan were asked the remaining questions.

1. Do you consider yourself a fan of major league baseball, or not? Yes, a baseball fan: 29 percent. Somewhat of a fan (volunteered): 6 percent. No: 65 percent.

2. Starting this year, National League and American teams all play each other in 15 or 16 regular-season games. Would you like to see more of these interleague games in future years, fewer, or the same number as this year? More interleague games: 35 percent. Fewer interleague games: 9 percent. Same number as this year: 47 percent. None: 4 percent. Don't know/no answer: 4 percent.

3. As you know, major league baseball is considering realigning

the leagues to group the teams geographically. Would that be a change for the better or a change for the worse? Change for the better: 54 percent. Change for the worse: 27 percent. Neither better or worse: 6 percent. Not familiar enough to say or don't know/no answer: 13 percent.

4a. I'm going to read some things people have said about the baseball realignment plan. Geographical realignment would enhance regional rivalries, since there would be more games between the Mets and Yankees in New York, the Cubs and White Sox in Chicago, the Angels and Dodgers in California, and so on. Does that make you feel more favorable or less favorable toward realignment, or does it make no difference? More favorable: 40 percent. Less favorable: 17 percent. Makes no difference: 42 percent. Don't know/no answer: 1 percent.

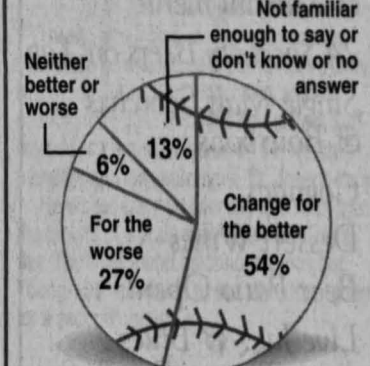
4b. Realignment would end the traditional distinction between the American and National leagues, and league records would lose their meaning. 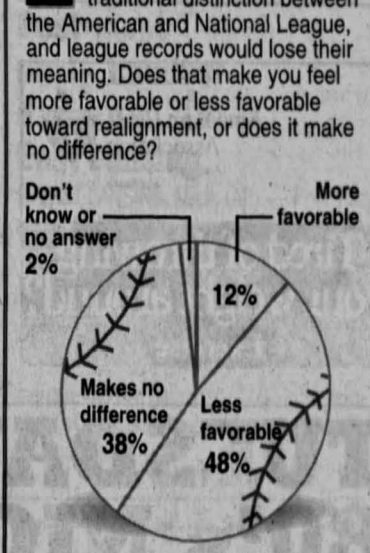

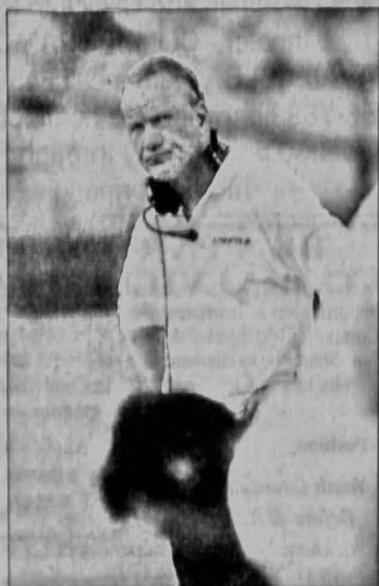
"When you lose like that it's frustrating," Aikman said. "Arizona did a nice job of mixing things up. ... We'll have to look at the films to determine exactly what happened."

"We waited down there 10 or 15 minutes for somebody to come with a key," Smith said. "We waited, waited, waited and waited for somebody to unlock the door. Finally, we just told them to forget it. In our stadium we always have somebody around to unlock the doors."

Smith rushed to the sidelines during the overtime but was never

used. His understudy, Sherman Williams, lost a fumble that Arizona converted into the winning field goal. X-rays taken of Smith's ribs after the game were negative.

"My ribs are bruised and we'll have to see how it goes the next few days," Smith said.

Smith said he felt fine about the way he was able to run the ball.

"It's been a long time since we've gotten offensive chunks of yardage like that," Smith said. "We're going to have a much better offense than last year. Last year is last year. All the mistakes we made can be corrected."

Smith was irritated that he got called for an unsportsmanlike penalty for taking his helmet off after a Dallas touchdown was called back for a holding penalty.

"I thought you had to be the individual who scored a touchdown for that rule to count," Smith said. "It's crazy. That rule can be interpreted in so many ways. It's a ridiculous rule."

Dallas coach Barry Switzer said the Cowboys got what they deserved.

"We beat ourselves," Switzer said. "They tried to give the game to us and we wouldn't take it."

Packers learning about life at the top

■ The Green Bay Packers are finding the role as defending Super Bowl champions to be quite a bumpy one.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Life at the top has been downright painful for the Green Bay Packers.

"We're going to get everybody's best shot every Sunday," said two-time MVP Brett Favre, who was knocked down 12 times in the defending Super Bowl champions' 10-9 loss at Philadelphia on Sunday. The game ended with rookie Ryan Longwell's missed chip shot field goal in the closing seconds.

It's not just the Packers' pride that's hurting, either.

Coach Mike Holmgren said Monday that center Frank Winters could miss up to six weeks after breaking several small bones in his left foot when he was stepped on in the second quarter.

Favre, who lost Pro Bowl tight end Mark Chmura for up to six weeks to a knee injury in the opener, calls Winters the true MVP of Green Bay's offense.

"It is a big blow," Favre said. "But the good thing about this team is we've responded well to injuries in the past."

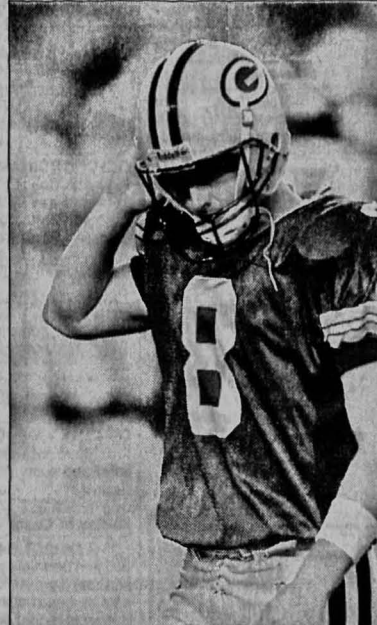
They're coming at a quicker rate and with costlier consequences, however.

Halfback Edgar Bennett was lost for the year with a torn Achilles' tendon in the exhibition opener and cornerback Craig Newsome was lost for the year with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the season opener.

The last thing the battered Packers needed was to lose the MVP's MVP.

Winters remained in the game and played until the end but is now on crutches and in a cast to prevent the bones from moving around.

Holmgren said Winters would be

listed as questionable for Sunday's game against Miami as the Packers try to bounce back from their first performance without a touchdown in 85 games.

"This is the type of injury, according to the trainers, that could be anywhere from one week to even six weeks," Holmgren said.

Twelve-year veteran Jeff Dellenbach would take Winters' place in the starting lineup against the Dolphins, for whom he played 10 seasons.

"I feel pretty comfortable with everything around here," said Dellenbach, who joined the Packers late last season to patch up their tattered offensive line. "It's just not second nature yet. But I'm comfortable with the calls."

Last second pass lifts Chiefs past Raiders

OAKLAND, Calif. — Adding more fuel to an old rivalry, Elvis Grbac threw a 33-yard scoring pass to Andre Rison with three seconds remaining Monday night as the Kansas City Chiefs rallied for a 28-27 victory over the Oakland Raiders.

The Chiefs got the ball at their own 20 following a punt with 61 seconds left in the game. Grbac got the drive going with a 21-yard completion to Lake Dawson and followed that with a 20-yard completion to Brett Perriman.

With 11 seconds remaining on the clock, Grbac faded back and found Rison in the end zone for the touchdown. Rison was mobbed by his teammates after making the winning catch.

Jeff George, making his home

debut for the Raiders, had third-quarter scoring passes of 37 and 16 yards to tight end Rickey Dudley as Oakland built a 27-13 lead. But George was intercepted twice late in the game, and one of them was returned 55 yards for a touchdown by Darren Anderson.

That pulled the Chiefs with 27-22. Oakland prevented the Chiefs' offense from moving effectively after that — until the final dramatic drive.

Grbac, Rison and Perriman all were free agents signed by the Chiefs this offseason and know little of the bitter, decades-old rivalry between Kansas City and Oakland. They now have become a part of that lore.

Grbac, who was 21-of-35 for 312 yards, also threw a 5-yard scoring pass to Kimble Anders. Pete Stoyanovich added field goals of 24, 23 and 23 yards for the Chiefs (1-1).

Have the Bucs finally arrived?

■ Tampa Bay and second-year head coach Tony Dungy finds itself 2-0 after beating the 49ers and Lions in the NFL's first two weeks.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers have lost at least 10 games in all but one of their last 14 seasons and haven't finished over .500 since 1982.

The Cardinals — St. Louis and Arizona — haven't had a winning season since 1984 and made their last playoff appearance in that same strike-shortened 1982 season, when the NFL put 16 of the 28 teams into the postseason.

Are things finally turning for both teams?

It may indeed be time for the Bucs, who have corralled some nice offensive players like Warrick Dunn and Mike Alstott in the last two drafts to go with what has been a solid defense for a while. Tampa Bay is one of just five 2-0 teams and is a game ahead of (gasp!) Green Bay in the NFC Central.

But let's wait on the Cardinals,

whose fans went dancing off into the stifling desert night, goalposts in hand, after their team rallied from 15 points down to beat the Dallas Cowboys 25-22 in overtime. It ended a 13-game losing streak to Dallas.

The signs of Tampa's emergence were evident at the end of last season, when the Bucs finished 5-3 after starting 1-7 in their first season under Tony Dungy. Dungy was into winning "coach-speak" after Sunday's 24-17 win in Detroit, disturbed with his defense for letting the Lions into the game late, then adding: "But it's better than saying, 'We're playing better, but we can't win.'"

The Cardinals won with their defense, which held the Cowboys without an offensive touchdown and knocked out Michael Irvin and Emmitt Smith. That allowed Kent Graham, imperfect but tough, to drive the team to two second-half

touchdowns against a Dallas defense under the influence of heat stroke. He also threw for a two-pointer and set up Kevin Butler's winning field goal.

Two things about the win: — Graham was the eighth quarterback to open the season for the Cards in their 10 seasons in Tempe. (Neil Lomax, Gary Hogeboom, Timm Rosenbach twice, Tom Tupa, Steve Beuerlein twice, Dave Krieg and Boomer Esiason are the others.)

— In typical Cardinals fashion, nothing came easy: Butler's game-winner, from just 20 yards, clanked off the left upright and bounced through.

"I've never had that happen before," said Butler, who has 16 winning kicks in 14 NFL seasons. "Usually they just come right back at me."

Maybe it's a sign.

PARITY or PARODY?: After two weeks, only six unbeaten teams are left in the NFL. Not among them are Green Bay, Dallas and San Francisco.

But try this on for size, by the inexact and always inaccurate method of comparative scores.

The Packers lost 10-9 to the Eagles on Sunday. The week before, Philadelphia was beaten 31-17 by the Giants, who lost 40-13 to Jacksonville on Sunday (with former World Leaguer Steve Matthews at quarterback for the Jaguars).

So that makes the Packers 15 points worse than the Giants, who are 27 points worse than the Jaguars and means ...

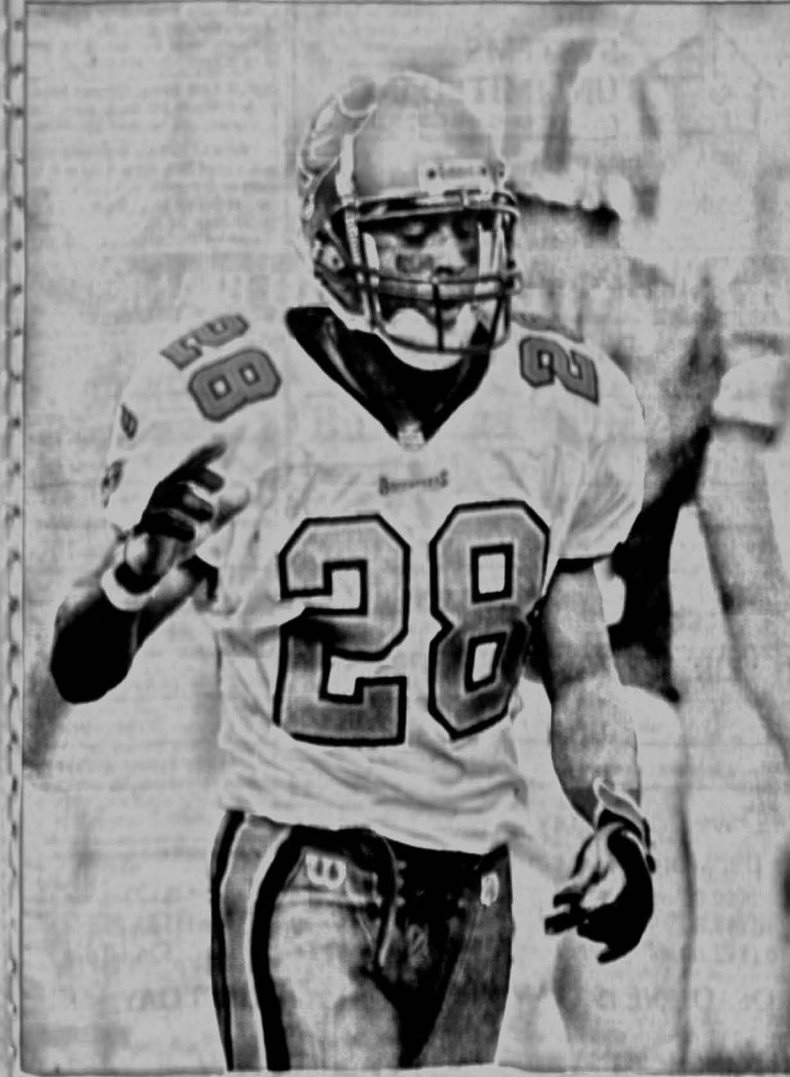
Jacksonville would beat Green Bay by 42 points? No, not yet.

GROUNDNUTS: Using the Jets' offensive line problems. Three were by Bryce Paup, Bruce Smith got credit for 1 1/2, and the venerable Jim Jeffcoat got a half-sack.

That's 36 years of experience (Jeffcoat 15, Smith 13, Paup eight) at getting to quarterbacks and 305 sacks (Smith 143 1/2, Jeffcoat 102 1/2, Paup 59). That doesn't match up well against a shaky OL.

Jeffcoat, who is 36, might have put it best when the salary cap took effect and veterans were getting lopped off rosters to save money.

"I'll play as long as I want to," he said. "Someone always has room for an aging pass rusher."

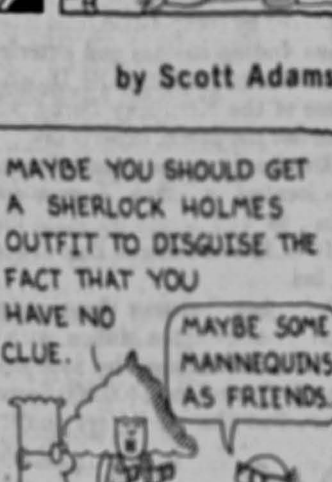
Warrick Dunn celebrates a first down during the Buccaneers 13-6 win over San Francisco on Aug. 31.

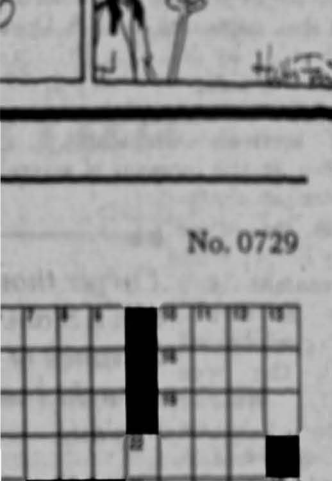
