# City can't buck federal judge on deer kill

Four animalrights groups win a federal injunction, effectively stopping lowa City's planned deer kill.

**By Steven Cook** The Daily Iowan

After months of fighting between animal-rights groups and Iowa City officials over the city's deer-kill plan, the groups succeeded Tuesday in stopping this year's kill indefinitely.

U.S. District Judge Gladys Kessler granted an injunction against the U.S. Department of Agriculture, halting efforts by the city to use the agency to implement its plan to shoot up to 240 deer in the Iowa City area.

which still leaves open the possibility that the city could use a private contractor to shoot the animals. Although he didn't rule that out, Dennis Mitchell, an assistant city attorney, said that, with only four weeks left before a state-imposed deadline, hir-

ing a private contractor is "unlikely."
"We would have to make sure a private contractor would be safe. I'm concerned about trying to rush something like that at such a late date," he said. "We're better served taking the time to

preparations for next year.

"To say it's a disappointment would be an understatement," he said of the judge's ruling.

Four animal-rights groups — including the UI Animal Rights Coalition and several local people filed a lawsuit in federal court against the USDA on Feb. 3, asking the federal judge to stop the deer kill for this year.

The groups argued that the USDA didn't allow for adequate comment time, entered into the contract with

the city before finishing an environmental assessment, and intended to use the Iowa City plan statewide.

The earliest the next hearing on the groups' suit could be held is May. Dena Jones, of the Animal Protection Institute, said she was glad the legal process worked and the deer-

kill plan was "out of business." "The law is there for a purpose, and we were able to use the law in such a way to stop something we thought was

harmful," she said. Even though they succeeded in stopping the kill this year, Jones said the groups are going to see their suit to the end to ensure that an alternate deer-management plan is instituted and that the USDA's plan won't be used again.

While saying he's "extremely happy" about Tuesday's turn of events, Clayton Foley, a UI Animal Rights Coalition member, said the group still has a long battle ahead in attempting to persuade the city to use non-lethal means of solving the problem.

# Trial opens in dragging death

JASPER, Texas - A sheriff testified Tuesday that he figured out pretty quickly the accident he was investily after a lighter with three interlocking K's was found along the bloody trail left by a black man who had been dragged to his death.

"I'm a brand-new sheriff. I didn't

even know the definition of a hate crime, but I knew somebody had been murdered because he had been black," Billy Rowles said. "Once we saw the KKK emblem on cigarette lighter, that's when we started having some bad thoughts."

Rowles was the first witness as alleged white supremacist John William King went to trial on murder charges in the gruesome death of James Byrd Jr. Byrd, 49, was chained to the back of a pickup truck June 7 and dragged for three miles as his body was ripped to pieces.

King, a 24-year-old unemployed laborer, is the first of three white men charged in the crime to stand trial. He could get the death penalty.

Prosecutor Guy James Gray said in his opening statement that King's tattoos and writings in his apartment show King was an angry racist who wanted to form a hate group and "needed to do something dramatic in order to gain in their warped world respect for his newly formed gang."

The jury consists of 11 whites and one black. Jasper County, from which the jurors were drawn, is 18 percent

King's attorney, Haden "Sonny" Cribbs, made no opening statement, reserving the option to do so later. "The evidence, it appears overwhelming," he acknowledged Monday. "But you've got to prove the accused has done the offense.

The sheriff described to jurors what he saw early in his investigation: The

# UI fails in retaining blacks, students say

Students say they do not get what they expect from the UI and the community.

When UI graduate student Josh Walehwa first came to the UI as a freshman, it took him almost a week to find someone else who was black. "It was scary. Being realistic, everybody usually hangs out with

someone you have something in common with," Walehwa said

And the UI has also had a difficult time keeping the already small number of black students enrolled here.

Figures from the 1997-98 school year show that 21.4 percent of black freshmen leave the UI compared with 15.4 percent overall. The rate is the highest among minority groups on campus. Since 1988, black freshmen have

# Coleman lobbies for more money

■ The UI president urges legislators to reverse Gov. Vilsack's budget cuts for libraries and undergraduate education.

UI President Mary Sue Coleman lobbied state legislators in Des Moines Tuesday, pressing them to reduce Gov. Tom Vilsack's recommended cuts in the UI budget.

Coleman's efforts were in response to Vilsack's move in November that more than halved or completely eliminated parts of the UI's initial \$10.5 million budget request - including funds to modernize classrooms, enhance undergraduate education, recruit new science faculty and increase funding for UI libraries.

Vilsack's recommendation was \$3.2 million higher than that of former Gov. Terry Branstad, and it included many of the UI's main budget priorities, but Coleman said she was still a little disappointed with the new governor's budget.

"I always want as much as we can possibly get for the UI," she said. "I was pleased with his recommendations, but I hope that the Legislature will do much better."

Coleman gave members of the Education Appropriations Joint Subcommittee a progress report that said more UI students are doing internships, receiving honors and studying abroad. She also pointed out that 62 percent of incoming freshmen are signed up for the four-year plan.

"The state Legislature is proud of the UI and its students," Coleman said. "The budget is so we can have as much investing in the future as possible."

Within the next 30 days, the subcommittee will give its recommenda-

résumé, McShea presented recruiters with the information upon request. few steps and meet with recruiters in After learning about the positions See JOB FAIR, Page 7A







# Paralyzed Marine to confront his attackers

Five white men who beat the Marine pleaded guilty to felony assault last month, avoiding life sentences.

SAN DIEGO - Carols Colbert, a black Marine who was paralyzed after five drunken white men beat him and broke his neck at a Memorial Day party, can move his left hand only slightly.

He turns on a television with a device he manipulates with his mouth. Doctors say the 21-year-old Colbert will never walk again and will need constant care.

Today, Colbert will face his attackers at his sentencing and tell them how they've changed his life, prosecutor Craig Rooten said Tuesday.

Jesse Brian Lawson, 20, Trenton Joe Solis, 18, Robert Rio, 23, Jed Allen Jones, 21, and Steven Lawrence Newark III, 18, pleaded guilty last month to felony assault, thus avoiding the possible life sentences they could have received had the case gone to trial and they been convicted of committing a hate crime.

"There were a lot of people involved, and there was a lot of

alcohol involved, making it a difficult case to sort out," Rooten said.

Colbert was one of just a few blacks who attended a mostly white party last May at the home of Tim Bullard, a fellow Camp Pendleton Marine. At least 100 people packed the small house at Santee, a rural community 20 miles northeast of San Diego.

When a fight broke out in the front yard, there were no streetlights to illuminate what was happening, and most of the people were drunk, Rooten said.

But Rooten said one common denominator was that the attackers punched and kicked Colbert while shouting racial slurs and white power." At a hearing last month, Judge

Frederic Link asked Lawson if he beat Colbert because he was black, and he tearfully said: "That is correct." Lawson's admission means he

faces two to 11 years in prison. The others face a five-year probation with one year in jail. They will receive credit for jail time already served. The parents of some of the

attackers recently went on a radio talk show, saying their sons were coerced into confessing that the crime was racially motivated and maintaining that it really was merely a drunken brawl.

American's parent company, AMR Corp., would not comment on whether there would be a fare sale. The bargains are aimed at peo-

# 21-year-old Des Moines student wins at Powerball

DES MOINES (AP) — The latest Powerball jackpot winner says he'll stay in college

Timothy E. Schultz, 21, of Des Moines claimed his prize Tuesday and said he bought the winning ticket at the convenience store where he worked. The Feb. 10 Powerball jackpot

was \$28 million, but Schultz chose a lump-sum cash payment of \$15.9 million instead of having payments spread out over 25 years.

Schultz, a student at Des Moines Area Community College and a clerk at Coastal Mart, said he was shocked when he found out he had won.

"My father woke me up and told me to check the numbers," he said at a news conference at lottery headquarters. "It's like a dream; I still can't believe it."

He was accompanied at the news conference by his father, mother, brother and attorneys. "I am going to take a trip to the

Bahamas, take some time to travel to some other places and attend school full-time as opposed to parttime." he said

The jackpot is only the second won by a ticket sold in Iowa.

The Powerball game is overseen by the West Des Moines-based Multistate Lottery Association and is drawn in a studio in that suburb.

Schultz bought the winning ticket the night of the drawing. He let the computer pick the numbers: 10, 20, 27, 31, 42 and the Powerball 26.

Powerball players match five white balls from a pool of 49 and one red Powerball from a pool of 42. The price of a ticket is \$1; the odds are 1 in 80.1 million.

The game is played in Iowa, Washington, D.C., and 19 other states: Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and West Virginia.

# Kurd's arrest sparks protest

■ Turkey says it has won a crushing victory after capturing a Kurdish leader.

> **By Suzan Fraser Associated Press**

ANKARA, Turkey - A Kurdish rebel leader was arrested after waging a 14-year guerrilla war for autonomy from Turkey, setting off massive protests Tuesday \* as enraged Kurds seized embassies and held hostages across Europe.

With the capture of Abdullah Ocalan, Turkish officials claimed a crushing victory over his rebel movement and hoped for an end to the long conflict that has claimed 37,000 lives and strained relations with neighboring countries.

Kurds, however, were outraged by the arrest of the man seen as the symbol of their drive for autonomy. And they took out their fury on Greece, accusing it of allowing Ocalan to be taken out of hiding from the Greek Embassy in Kenya and transported to Turkey for arrest.

capture of rebel leader Abdullah Ocalan. Breaking down doors and smashing windows, Kurdish protesters occupied Greek embassies and consulates in at least 21 European cities, and briefly occupied consulates in Vancouver, British Columbia, and Sydney, Australia. At least four protesters tried to set themselves on fire, while weeping demonstrators waved the red flag of Kurdistan and held up posters of Ocalan.

European governments - particularly Germany, which has the

largest Kurdish community in Western Europe - feared that they would continue to feel the brunt of Kurdish outrage, because Turkey was expected to put Ocalan on trial for terrorism charges.

Greek and Kenyan diplomats were briefly trapped in occupied embassies in Bonn, Germany, and Milan, Italy. Police freed hostages when they stormed the Kenyan Embassy in Paris and the Greek consulate in Leipzig, Germany.

In Vienna, Kurds took the Greek

ambassador and four others hostage and burst into the Kenyan Embassy, but they abandoned their day-long protest at both embassies peacefully after authorities agreed not to arrest them immediately, ORF television reported.

In The Hague, Netherlands, they broke into the ambassador's residence and, finding the ambassador wasn't home, took his wife and 8-year-old son and their Philippine maid hostage. All the hostages were reported uninjured.

# MDs miss abused kids, study says

Physicians are more likely to miss abuse-related injuries in children from white, twoparent homes, the study says.

CHICAGO - Doctors failed to notice abuse-related head injuries in toddlers and babies nearly a third of the time, a new study reports.

They were especially likely to miss such injuries in white children from two-parent homes.

"We all have our particular preconceived notions of what child abuse would look like. But, in fact, it's not a problem that's isolated to children of color or those from sin-gle-parent families," said Dr. Carole Jenny, a pediatrician way led the study while at Children's Hospital in Denver. She is now a professor of pediatrics at the Brown University.

The study, published in today's Journal of the American Medical Association, said doctors missed even life-threatening brain hemorrhaging and skull fractures.

Prompted by the case of a braindamaged child who had visited eight doctors before being correctly diagnosed at the Denver hospital, Jenny and her colleagues reviewed medical charts compiled from 1990 to 1995 for 173 children under age 3 who had been treated by doctors throughout the Rocky Mountain

They found that 54 of the chil-- 31 percent - had abuserelated injuries that weren't caught for an average of seven days. Five of the children died...

The researchers determined that four of those five might have been saved if the abuse had been noticed sooner because they were among 15 children who were injured again after the missed diagnosis.

Kevin Kirkpatrick, a spokesman for the Chicago-based National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse, said those date fit with his agency's finding that 41 percent of abused children who died in 1995 through 1997 had been seen by officials from child protective services. Doctors in the study missed

nearly four in 10 abuse-related head injury cases in white children or those from two-parent families, while missing about two in 10 cases in non-white children or those living with a single parent. "We all need to adjust our mind-

set," Kirkpatrick said.

In an accompanying editorial, Dr. John Leventhal, a professor of pediatrics at Yale University, said it's unlikely doctors will make the correct diagnosis all the time, but 'physicians can do better."

Jenny recommended developing blood tests to detect enzymes released in the bloodstream when a child is injured through shaking or impact.

### Serbs defy new U.S. ultimatum

■ Slobodan Milosevic refuses to agree on the only stumbling block in the Kosovo talks: peacekeeping troops.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia -President Slobodan Milosevic defied a renewed threat of NATO attack Wednesday, rejecting deployment of foreign troops in Kosovo to police a peace deal.

The statement - coming after a four-hour meeting Tuesday night with U.S. envoy Christopher Hill, who arrived in from the Kosovo peace talks in Rambouillet, France - left the status of those negotiations in more doubt than

Western sources at the talks in France said Hill flew in to tell Milosevic that if he doesn't accept a Kosovo agreement by noon Saturday that calls for foreign troops in Kosovo, he will suffer NATO air strikes.

But Milosevic, who has been known to bow to diplomatic pressure at the last moment, showed no signs of doing so yet.

In a statement issued early today by the official Tanjug news agency, Milosevic said "our negaeign troops is not only the attitude of the leadership, but also of all citizens of our country."

The deployment of an international force is a take-it-or-leave-it deal proposed by the United States and backed by other powers at the conference outside Paris. As many as 30,000 NATO troops including some 4,000 American soldiers - would be sent to Kosovo immediately to police the agreement.

Hill was dispatched to Belgrade after U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright telephoned Milosevic to warn him to accept the peace deal, including the troops deployment or face NATO

But Milosevic showed no more willingness to do so than the Serbian officials at the talks, which opened in the 14th-century French chateau on Feb. 6. His negotiators have said NATO troops would jeopardize the sovereignty of their country and vowed to fight against the foreign aggression."

In his statement, Milosevic reiterated the Serb stand that there can be no independence for Kosovo and that all ethnic communities in the province should

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. - In a sign that President Clinton's legal troubles aren't over, a federal judge said Tuesday she is prepared to consider whether he should be found in contempt of court for his testimony about Monica Lewinsky in the Paula Jones lawsuit.

U.S. District Judge Susan Webber Wright said she waited to address the issue because of the impeachment trial and because

Jones' case was before an appeals court. It was settled in December 1998 for \$850,000.

"Accordingly, I believe that now it is time for the court to address the contempt issue," she said in an order issued Tuesday after a conference with lawyers

Wright also said she would step aside from the case if she were asked to do so by attorneys because of her contact with a House impeachment case manager. She gave lawyers until Friday to file a request.

The White House referred all requests for comment to Clinton's private lawyer in the case, Robert Bennett. Bennett did not immediately return a call to his office seeking comment.

Jones' spokeswoman, Susan

Carpenter-McMillan, said she had not talked with Jones, but added that Clinton should be held for contempt. "My God, he lied," she said. "If he can get away with not being held for contempt, I suppose we could all lie.'

Wright raised the possibility of contempt in a footnote to her decision on Sept. 1, 1998, to release a transcript of Clinton's testimony in a deposition in the Jones sexualharassment case. At the time, Wright said she




Minkowitz also finds that in many of the religious-right movements she investigated, worship of God has a distinctly sexual character. At a gathering of Total Woman Ministries, a women's Pentecostal church, Minkowitz describes the language used by the women in attendance as often overtly sexual and occasionally reminiscent of sadism and masochism.

"I noticed that from the beginning with the religious right, that many religions are full of a sexual attitude towards God," she said. "I think their proscriptions around sex almost make them want to put more sex into their relationship with God."

Minkowitz uses her own experiences with sex and S&M as material for her book, a process she described as both difficult and satisfying.

"In some ways it was hard to be exposed, but in some ways it was good to be exposed," she said.

The originality and the honesty of her book is paying dividends beyond her own self-awareness. It was recently nominated by the Quality Paperback Book Club for the Annual New Visions Award, given for the most promising and visionary new book by an author.

# Groups: Savings accounts drain funds

■ The money people keep in savings accounts are costing them billions in interest, two financial organizations claim.

WASHINGTON - Americans are losing tens of billions of dollars in interest each year by keeping their money in traditional bank savings accounts instead of certificates of deposit and credit-union accounts, the Consumer Federation and a credit union group say.

Switching to certificates of deposit and credit unions "is really a no-brainer. People ought to be doing it," Stephen Brobeck, executive director of the Consumer Federation of America, told a news

conference Tuesday. Americans have about \$1.5 trillion in traditional savings accounts and money-market deposit accounts, which pay on average less than 2 percent annually, Brobeck said. Rates on certificates of deposit - also federally insured usually exceed 4 percent.

In addition, credit unions pay on average more than 1 percentage point above what banks offer on the same kind of accounts, said Brobeck and Dan Mica, president and chief executive officer of the Credit Union National Association. Their figures were based on data compiled by Bank Rate Monitor, an industry trade publication.

Switching to a CD or a credit union is "an opportunity for consumers to save an awful lot of money" quickly and easily, Mica said.

Penalties for early withdrawal from CDs rarely reduce the yield to consumers below that of traditional savings accounts, said Brobeck.

Nancy Ness Judy of the American Bankers Association responded to their statements by saying banks offer consumers a wider range of financial products, such as brokerage and trust services.

Savings accounts are not the whole picture," said Judy, the group's consumer-affairs manager.

For example, she said, banks generally offer lower rates than credit unions on home mortgage loans. Rates on 30-year, fixed-rate home mortgages currently average 6.80 percent at banks and 6.86 percent at credit unions, Bank Rate Monitor says. At savings and loans, the average is 6.74 percent. Many credit unions lack the capital to make mortgage loans directly and must go through brokers.

In addition, Judy said, approximately 4,000 of the nation's 11,300 credit unions do not offer checking

# Study throws tomatoes at cancer as prevention

■ A new report says the regular consumption of tomatoes can substantially decrease the risk of many cancers.

WASHINGTON - Spaghetti sauce and tomato paste can be good for you, says a study that confirms a long-suspected view: eating lots of fresh and processed tomatoes can lower the risk of some kinds of cancer.

The summary study in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute found that there is now enough data to show convincingly "that high consumers of tomatoes and tomato products are at substantially decreased risk of numerous cancers, although probably not

The study, to be published today, analyzed 72 past studies that had examined the link between various cancers and the consumption of tomatoes and tomato-based products. Some of the studies also examined the blood levels of lycopene, a compound, found principally in tomatoes, that powerfully protects cells from oxidants that

have been linked to cancer. In all, 57 of the 72 studies linked tomato intake with a reduced risk of cancer, said Dr. Edward Giovannucci of Harvard Medical School, author of the report. In 35 of these studies, he said, the connection was strong enough to be "statistically significant"; in another 15, the link was inconclusive or only "slight."

The data are most compelling for cancers of the prostate gland, lung and stomach, Giovannucci said. The findings also suggest links between tomatoes and lower levels of several other cancers, including pancreatic, colorectal, esophageal, oral, breast and cervical cancers.

Dr. Clare Hasler, executive director of the Functional Foods for Health Program at the University of Illinois, called Giovannucci's work the most comprehensive to date on the issue.

"It shows that people who eat a large amount of tomato have a reduced risk for a number of types of cancers," she said.

Overall, the study shows, "it is good to eat tomatoes as a part of a diet that is rich in other fruits and vegetables," said Dr. Moshe Shike, director of the Cancer Prevention and Wellness Program at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York.

individual Giovannucci examined included tomatoes in many forms, including raw, ketchup, spaghetti sauce, tomato paste, soup and salsa. Benefits were found from all those forms, the study concluded, and cooking and processing tomatoes did not diminish the effect.

### Iraq has little chance to follow up on threats, U.S. says

WASHINGTON (AP) - Iraq's threats against Turkey, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia for supporting recent U.S. air attacks are being taken seriously, but there is little chance Iraq's depleted air force could launch attacks deep into neighboring territory, a Defense Department official said Tuesday.

"It's a sign of Saddam Hussein's desperation and isolation that Iraq is making such threats," said Kenneth Bacon, spokesman for Defense Secretary William Cohen. "I think the threats will get him nowhere."

Bacon said Iraq could try three ways to carry out its threats: fire Scud missiles, attack by air with planes or conduct terrorist raids. "All of these would be difficult, given the circumstances that Iraq faces today," Bacon said, referring to the deterioration of its military since the 1991 Persian Gulf war, the effect of the

### N. Ireland legislators OK plan for government

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) -Northern Ireland's politicians Tuesday approved the blueprint for a new Protestant-Catholic government, a historic vote that still leaves a formidable

hurdle to making the setup work: the IRA's refusal to start disarming.


Ten months after striking their historic peace accord, legislators in the Belfast Assembly voted 77-29 in favor of plans to create a 12-member administration for Northern Ireland. The verdict followed months of

painstaking negotiations and two days of often bruising debate. As expected, all 40 Catholics and eight "neutral" politicians present voted in favor of the blueprint, which

outlines plans for the transfer of some powers from the British government. More significantly and against expectations, Protestant leader David Trimble, the new government's designated head, kept the support of exactly

half the Assembly's 58 pro-British,

Protestant members. Trimble had appeared likely to lose a majority of the Protestant votes, a worrying sign for those trying to make the deal work. Two members of Trimble's Ulster Unionist Party had vowed to defy their leader, but one changed his mind at the last moment.

# Still hope for Clinton legacy

Don't be surprised when the first sentence in history books about Bill Clinton mentions something other than Monica, Don't be surprised when the second sen-

When his presidency ends in 2001, Clinton will be 54 years young and will surely spend his remaining decades modifying his legacy. So however tarnished he may seem now, expect both Clinton and historians to wear it off. And expect history books to look at Clinton for doing more than just Monica.

Maybe Clinton will be remembered as the Social Security president. When he came into office, Clinton had high hopes of reforming the health-care system and Social Security. With health care dead, Clinton seems compelled to reform Social Security with money from the budget surplus. If he achieves this pet project, it could easily be the most important legislation of his presidency.

Maybe Clinton will be remembered for leading the nation's record economic expansion. Freer trade, a soaring stock market, the further emergence of the global economy and a budget surplus will for now maintain public support for Clinton. This is currently his best chance for glorifying his legacy once out of office.

Maybe Clinton will be remembered for the re-emergence of the Democrats in the White House. In being the first Democratic president to be re-elected in 32 years, and the first president elected since the end of the Cold War, Clinton may show up as the president who moved the Democratic Party closer to the center.

# Going coed not all bad

A revolutionary change is starting to creep into Greek life. Fraternities are going coed. Although this trend has begun on the East coast, most recently at places such as Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H., its effects could someday reach large, public universities such as the UI.

And maybe they should. The UI has no plans to force fraternities here to go coed, and, in fact, such plans probably would not succeed.

anything else. The move does make some sense - even for UI Greeks It could improve living conditions, boost membership rates and foster more respectful relationships between men and women. A lot of change - especially in attitudes - is needed to make the transition from the separation of the sexes to

coed, though. Living conditions in the houses will need to be reconstructed: New dining areas and recreational places built, more and better bathrooms installed. These seem more like perks than things Dartmouth Greeks should be complaining about.


Interest in UI fraternities has been on the wane in recent years. Fraternity membership has plummeted from more than 1,600 in 1988 to just more than 900 this year. The image of fraternities has been tarnished since the drinking death of a pledge a few years ago. And just this year, the UI Greek system went dry.

Maybe coed fraternities could stop this downward spiral and provide a spark to increase membership. Either way, the population could rise from men and women living together. But most importantly, going coed could break down gender stereotypes and make men and women more respectful of each other. As it is now, fraternities are seen as places where men learn to be misogynistic and sororities are where women become subordinate. Whether this is true is uncertain, but going coed could only improve the way men and women interact with and think of each other.

Dartmouth and other liberal arts schools in the Northeast are leading the way to change - and hopefully improve - Greek life. Going coed will be a revolutionary change. But it's a change that should be welcomed, not feared.

# Respectfully disagreeing with UI policy toward gays

N our society, political labels can be used to stigmatize a group or provide that group with an umbrella of legitimacy. Therefore, the power to define a political label for a group is immense.

ideas that defines labels based on an exchange of competing claims. The UI, however, has rejected that approach and, as a result, has dictated to students that homosexuality is a "human right," even though some would disagree

The UI Human Rights Policy says that no aspect of any UI program should discriminate against the treatment of persons "because of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, or any other classification that deprives the person of consideration as an individual."

The motivation behind defining homosexuality as a human right, however, was based solely on political grounds. The UI does not need a human-rights policy to stop discrim-

A curb on that power is the free market of ination based on immutable characteristics on this campus.

That point is clear because the UI, as a public institution, is held accountable to the faithful execution of laws under the U.S. Constitution, which prohibits discrimina-

tion based on such characteristics. Federal law, however, does not protect homosexuality. And thus the UI has incorporated sexual orientation into its humanrights policy in an attempt to raise gay rights to the same protected class as race and gender.

The problem is homosexuality is not, and can never be, analogous to race or gender, because homosexuality is based on a behavior and not an immutable characteristic.

The classification of homosexuality as a human right has all but barred an honest debate about whether homosexual behavior should be sanctioned by the UI.

Evidence of that point can be seen through the historical antagonistic treatment that is directed at our nation's military when it attempts to recruit on the UI campus. The UI has developed a contemptuous attitude toward the military because it, backed by our federal courts, has found that openly gay individuals are detrimental to our military's effectiveness.

Therefore, according to the UI's policy, our nation's military should in turn be discriminated against and potentially barred from campus for its failure to adhere to a code of human rights.

That point, however, would be insidious to the families of the 95 service members who were either killed or wounded while serving in a 1993 human-rights mission in Somalia. To those soldiers, human rights were not merely a political label but rather a cause worthy of their life.

Nonetheless, the UI continues to use its human-rights policy in an attempt to endorse its political friends and demean

When military recruiters came to the College of Law last week, they were greeted by a billboard signed onto by the administration that condemned the military's homosexual policy and its breach of the UI's human-rights policy. A federal law requires

institutions accepting federal money, such as the UI, to allow military recruiters on their campuses.

Conversely, when President Bill Clinton, our commander-in-chief, and initiator of the current discriminatory policy against gays in the military, came to speak here in 1996, he was greeted with open arms by the UI administration.

That hypocritical use of the humanrights policy to condemn some members connected with the military, but not others, is direct evidence that the UI's policy is merely a hollow political label used for political means.

The UI's attempt to use a political label to



the students of this campus is an egregious breach of intellectual freedom.

Under the human-rights mantra, homosexuals now have their lifestyles legitimized, and others are ostracized for their honest - but different - opinion about the efficacy of the homosexual movement.

The UI has mistakenly tailored its human-rights policy to incorporate and advance a behavior that many believe is more analogous with a human wrong instead of a human right. In the spirit of intellectual freedom, the UI should discontinue its use of applying the political label of human rights to homosexuality.

In turn, that would allow all individuals and groups who morally oppose homosexuality the right to enter the UI in an open and free atmosphere that is void of unfair and disingenuous hostility.

"I can breath a sigh of relief for a second," said Foley, who has been involved in the protest against the deer kill since last summer.

He said he wants the city to take a longer look at why the deer are there in the first place and at how to prevent damage due to the animals. Because of the problems the city

had with the USDA, Mitchell said he believes the city should "weigh the pros and cons of using someone else." The Iowa City/Coralville Deer Management Committee is expected to meet in the next two months to draw up next year's deer-management plan. The city must get approval from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources

to use sharpshooting next year.

Doug Jones, a committee member, said he agreed with Mitchell's assessment that private contractors should be considered for next year. He also shared Mitchell's sense of frustration.

"It's appalling," he said of the plan's demise. "The more you delay, the larger number of deer need to be slaughtered, and the more unsavory the whole affair becomes."

A count within the Iowa City and Coralville city limits that was conducted last month found nearly 800 deer. USDA officials were able to shoot for two days last month before being forced to stop when the animal-rights groups threatened to sue. A total of 22 deer were killed in northeast Iowa City's socalled peninsula area.

Some residents living near the peninsula area had mixed reactions to the halt of the deer kill.

Mark Brown, of Foster Road, said he and his wife have discussed the plan often and haven't been able to make up their minds. He said the deer were one of the reasons that drew them to the area two years ago.

We like having them around," he said. "But there sure are an awful lot of them. But I'm not sure what the solution is.

Joyce Chiles, also of Foster Road, said her property has suffered because of the animals. She said she can't plant roses because the deer will eat them, along with her evergreens.

"Something has to be done," she said. "I can't plant anything they'll eat it."

evidence wasn't consistent with a routine hit-and-run accident; there were no skid marks, and the bloody trail did not run parallel to the tire tracks.

"It was going through my mind: We've got a problem. Somebody's dragging something," Rowles said.

The lighter with three K's forming a triangle was also engraved with the word "Possum," the nickname King picked up while in prison for burglary.

The jurors were given a folder of photos of Byrd's battered remains, which an investigator said were missing a right arm, neck and head.

"It looked like an animal drug down the road," Tommy Robinson

An 18-year-old Jasper woman, Michelle Chapman, testified that during a two-year period while King was in prison, she received 19 letters from him, some of them filled with racist venom. One included the proclamation: "White

When he got out, Chapman said, King visited her in June 1997 and showed the tattoos he got while imprisoned, including one of a black man who had been hung. Gray, the prosecutor, said the tattoos also include a burning cross, a Confederate flag and Nazi swastikas.

The lighter, King's DNA on a cigarette and less than a drop of the victim's blood on King's shoes all will link King to the killing, the prosecutor said.

Investigators also found handwritten notes in King's apartment that included a constitution, bylaws, a code of ethics and a membership application for a group to be called the Texas Rebel Soldiers of the Confederate Knights of America, Gray said.

King showed little reaction in court, responding only, "Not guilty, your honor," when asked how he

# Iowa City not so liberal, black students say

the 1996-97 school year. However, there is currently no system of tracking where black students go after they leave the UI, said Joe Coulter, interim director of Opportunity of Iowa. Most transfer to other universities or community colleges, he said, adding that the true drop-out rate

is lower than 5 percent. Active recruiting of black and minority students has helped exceed Iowa state Board of Regents goal of 8.5 percent for minority enrollment. At 9.5 percent, the UI is the only Iowa university to meet that goal, yet the UI has the lowest percentage of minorities among Big

Ten universities. "Basically, we think if this is going to be a top university, we need a diverse student body and diverse faculty that at least somewhat resembles what's out there," Coulter said. "If we aspire to prepare a student to go out into the United States, they need experience with something besides the

homogeneity we have here in Iowa." Programs such as Opportunity at Iowa do a terrific job of attracting black students to the UI; the only problem is the university does very little to keep them here, said UI senior Jada Collier.

"I work for the admissions, and I see a lot of recruiting," Collier said. "The same effort dosen't go into retaining them."

### "Set up for failure"

UI junior Endia Mosby said she attended the UI's Future Is Yours orientation her senior year of high school, a program designed to recruit minority students.

"I felt like I was misled," Mosby said. "At orientation, I came down and didn't see too many black students. At the Future Is Yours, there's 100 African-American and minority students.

"The first day I walked into Burge (Residence Hall) and I didn't see any African American students for three days," she said. "I was sort of upset because they sort of set me up for failure."

her by creating the image of a large

black community before she got here. "They make you feel really welcome and really wanted, but when you come here, you realize you truly are a minority," said Collier.

Some students say the UI also misleads students by offering them large financial-aid packages to first attract them, only to cut back in later years.

"My money got less and less every year I came. Tuition gets fully covered the first year, but once they got you here, you put in two years of credits — all of a sudden they've now allotted so much money to bringing in more black students," Walehwa said.

### Making Iowa City a home

While many white students would say that Iowa City is a liberal town, Walehwa said most black students would disagree.

"People are trying to be liberal. It's kind of the fad to be liberal here," he said. "Try pot. Date a black guy. It's going to get old if you're not sincere. This town is liberal for Iowa, but if you're talking about left-wing liberal, it's just like

everything else. For instance, hip-hop and jazz music are hard to find in downtown bars, and cosmetic products made for blacks are hard to come by, Collier said.

Though Iowa City may not be very liberal, other black students see the low numbers of black students as an asset.

"I'm a black man trying to make t," said UI senior Renaldo Johnson. "I know that black people don't run the world, white people run the world. In order to make it, you need to learn to get along with everybody. And here is as good a place as any to learn how to get along with people who run the country."

But for most black students, taking pride in a school that seems to disregard them once they're here can be difficult, said Traevena Potter-Hall, director of Scholar Recruitment Programs. Potter-Hall works to recruit minority students to the UI and was herself an black student at the UI.

"I think African-American stu-

Collier said recruiters also misled dents don't invest as much emotionally into the school," Potter-Hall said. "Many students will not

call this home.' Black students also said the The Daily Iowan is no friendlier towards the black community than the town. Many black students criticized the DI for being too negative

in its coverage of black students. Johnson said the DI is quite inconsiderate toward its black

Walehwa said positive articles tend to get buried in the back pages of the paper.

"First off, you have things in the paper saying the black graduation rate is the lowest here at the University of Iowa. But you turn around and see a black frat doing a sleep-out for the homeless fourth page, two paragraphs long.

"It does nothing for your psyche but make you feel bad about yourself," Walehwa said.

### Building a support system Walehwa said joining a tradi-

tionally black fraternity was probably one of the main reasons he

remained at the UI. "What I enjoyed most was the brotherhood. I had guys who were pushing me to do well in school," Walehwa said. "I had guys who liked to party as hard as I liked to party. They were truly friends who'd isten to me if I had a problem."

For what the black community lacks in numbers, it makes up for in strength, Collier said.

"I think it's fairly tight knit; there's definitely a security system within the community." she said. There's a certain level everyone's on. If we didn't have a community, there'd be less of a reason to stay," UI junior Acooa Lee said the

campus is what you make it. "The way I see it is, when you get out of college and start working professionally, there's going to be

few African-Americans out there." "In an ideal world, race shouldn't matter," Walehwa said. "Unless you have lived as a minority all your life, you really don't know how uncomfortable and how alone you really feel."





Based upon a handful of recent rumors, Charlotte Hornets guard B.J. Armstrong appears to be a wanted

Armstrong, a former Iowa star from 1986-89, is reportedly being sought after by the Los Angeles Lakers, who are looking for some experience to complement their young talent.

Closer to home, the 31-year-old Armstrong's name is being thrown around as a possible successor to Iowa coach Tom Davis, whose contract expires after this season and will not be renewed.

In Tuesday's editions of the Charlotte Observer, Armstrong denied reports that he is a candidate for the Hawkeyes' head coaching position.

"I haven't talked to anybody. If this is true, it's news to me," Armstrong

In December, Basketball Times magazine reported that Armstrong could have the Iowa job if he wanted it. Armstrong and UI officials quickly squashed the report.





# 0.J.'s Heisman sells for \$230,000

■ Only a little more than \$300,000 was collected in an auction of O.J. Simpson's belongings.

ANGELES -Simpson's Heisman Trophy fetched \$230,000 Tuesday night at auction to benefit the estates of the former football star's slain ex-wife and her

Other Simpson items were sold for between \$10 and \$10,000 at the auction held at Butterfield & Butterfield. Bidders were allowed to make offers by phone, in person and over the Internet.

Among the items sold were a life-sized metal statue of Simpson for \$3,250, a glass University of Southern California Hall of Fame award for \$1,800, and a player of the year trophy give by ABC Wide World of Sports in 1973 for \$1,700.

The auction proceeds, estimated to be above \$300,000, came nowhere close to satisfying a \$33.5 million judgment owed to the estate of Simpson's ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and the family of Ronald Goldman.

The judgment stems from a civil wrongful death suit in which a jury found Simpson liable for the killings of Ms. Simpson and Goldman. Simpson was acquitted of murder in an earlier criminal

The high bid for the Heisman Trophy was made over the telephone. No other information was

immediately available on the winning bidder.

Another bidder told reporters afterward that he spent \$16,000 and plans to burn everything, including a \$10,000 Hall of Fame plaque. Web site operator Bob Enyart of Denver said he raised the money from visitors to his site.

In the audience for the muchtouted auction was Ms. Simpson's father, Lou Brown.

Simpson's possessions were seized and stored in a sheriff's warehouse while lawyers battled over what could be sold and when. A baby grand piano used by Simpson's mother was seized and then returned when a judge ruled it was her property.

His home also went into foreclosure and was sold at auction. It subsequently was demolished by the buyer who wanted to build a different style house on the property.

Simpson continues to live in Los Angeles with his two children and is fighting a custody battle with his former in-laws, Louis and Juditha Brown. They want the children to live with them.

The civil trial verdict is still on appeal, but that did not prevent the auction from going forward.

He said the L.A. and Houston markets have fan interest, large populations and television appeal. The main difference is there is only one group, headed by Robert McNair, vying for the franchise in Houston, and it has a plan for a new retractable-roof stadium.

Two rival groups in Los Angeles are bidding for the expansion franchise, each with its own stadium

Hollywood mogul Michael Ovitz has lined up an all-star roster of investors, including actors Tom Cruise and Kevin Costner, to build



a combined stadium and shopping mall in Carson, 21 miles south of downtown. Developer Ed Roski Jr. and billionaire Eli Broad are proposing to renovate the Los Angeles Coliseum. Los Angeles has been without a

franchise since the Raiders returned to Oakland and the Rams moved to St. Louis before the 1995 season. The Houston Oilers left for Tennessee in 1997.






# Flyers defeat Coyotes, 4-1
