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

Many months later, Old Capitol Mall sold

The current businesses hope the new owners will bring in stores

to fill the

After months in limbo and almost a year on the market, the sale of Old Capitol Mall to a Philadelphia-based company became final Monday.

Madison Realty Group Inc.'s first plans include finalizing negotiations with a tenant for half of the space that was formerly occupied by JCPenney.

"The mall is a unique investment opportunity with its on-campus, downtown location and tremendous potenSummers, Madison Realty Group president, in a statement. Representatives from the company could not be reached for further comment Tuesday.

Matt Klahn, an associate manager at Athlete's Foot, said he is happy that the new owners have made finding stores for the mall's numerous vacancies a priority. According to Madison Realty Group, only 62 percent of the mall is currently occupied.

"They weren't going to fill up while the mall was for sale," Klahn said.

NATO rejects cease-fire

■ Slobodan Milosevic wants an Easter cease-fire, but the allies call it a sham as air-raid sirens wail over Belgrade.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic declared a unilateral cease-fire Tuesday in his campaign to crush rebels in Kosovo, saying he wanted to nor the Orthodox Easter holida this weekend. Western leaders called the move a sham and pledged to press ahead with air strikes.

Moments after the cease-fire took effect at 8 p.m. (1 p.m. CDT), air-raid sirens wailed in Belgrade, heralding new NATO attacks.

At least six explosions could be heard late Tuesday in the direction of the Batajnica military airport, just north of Belgrade; tracer rounds from anti-air-See NATO, Page 7A

Kosovo conflict hits home for UI student

■ The graduate student awaits word from his family, which has been driven out of Kosovo.

Nine days ago, UI graduate student Ibrahim Gashi lost contact with his family in Kosovo.

As the NATO bombings in Yugoslavia continue and Kosovars such as Gashi's family are forced out of their homeland, their loved ones abroad can only wait and hope for

news about their well-being.
As Gashi does. His family has been broken apart by the latest Balkan conflict. He said his 24-year-old brother was not allowed to leave Kosovo and his 4-year-old son and elderly parents had to leave their home in Pristina for safety in Macedonia.

Having underestimated the flow of the refugees, NATO is now attempting to house and feed the nearly 400,000 Kosovars who have made their way across the Kosovo border.

While Gashi believes life in Mace-

donia is far from ideal, he remains "If nothing else, they will feel safer

there," he said. "The refugees will not have a normal life for a long period of time. Their immediate need is protection."

Gashi, 34, who is divorced, studies journalism at the UI. He was a journalist in Yugoslavia, where he witnessed the war in Bosnia in the early '90s.

Despite his concern for his family. Gashi firmly believes NATO's actions were necessary.

"The Serbs were not ready to accept the terms of the international community and the Albanian delegation. They would go on doing what they've been doing to the Albanians."

Gashi also said he thinks NATO's intentions are legitimate.

"The West recognizes the right of (Kosovars) to enjoy life in peace in a democratic system that would guarantee their human rights, their right to property and their right to live hap-

pily," he said.
"This isn't just another civil war," said political science Professor Arthur Miller. "Systematic genocide is not the

Kudos accorded to UIHC doctors

A survey shows that almost half of lowa's best physicians work at the UI.

Doctors at the UI Hospitals and Clinics say it's no surprise that almost half of Iowa's premier physicians work there.

A poll released Tuesday by Woodward/White Inc., of Aiken, S.C., reports that 152 of the state's top 309 physicians practice at the UIHC.

"It's a tremendous reinforcement of the talent and commitment at the UIHC," said Dean Borg, director of UIHC Information.

Woodward/White, a database company that compiles the "Best Doctors in America" survey, specializes in collecting health information, said Michael Sondergard, editor in the Joint Office for Planning, Marketing and Communication.

"If patients want to find out the best physicians in their area, they can access this list," he said.

More than 30,000 physicians were contacted nationwide and asked to rate the abilities of other doctors in their areas of specialization. Those receiving the consensus support of their colleagues were placed on the list.

The doctors were interviewed by phone, and each was asked the same question: "If you or a loved one needed a doctor in your specialty, and you couldn't treat them yourself, to whom would you refer them?" Sondergard said.

"I'm honored to be judged in good company by my colleagues," said David Skorton, the UI vice president for research, and a professor of medicine



In order to promote alcohol awareness, six UI law students got drunk Tuesday on Bud Light and vodka in the Student Legal Services office.

Three hours later, they were on stage in the Buchanan Auditorium, Pappajohn Business Building, participating in a demonstration about the consequences of drinking and getting caught titled "Know Your Rights."

The presentation, sponsored by the legal services, included Iowa City police Officer Charles Singleman, Johnson County Attorney J. Patrick White and District Court Judge Steven Gerard. An all-male audience, mostly consisting of fraternity members, attended the presentation.

"At any given time we have 60 cases; half of these cases are alcohol-related," said Chad Thomas, a supervisor at the legal services. "If we do the presentation right, hopefully we will not see any members of the audience as clients.

First on stage, UI law student Karrie Hruska was full of giggles and large gestures, she proudly announced that she drank five beers over the previous three hours.

Singleman administered the "onelegged stand" test in which Hruska was asked to stand on one leg and count slowly to 30 with her hands at her sides. She got to five and gave up.

"Maybe I won't be driving you all home," she said.

However, her Breathalyzer registered a blood-alcohol level of .082, which is still below the legal limit of .10 for drivers 21 and over.

"You can still be guilty of OWI even if you are under the legal limit," Singleman said. "And she would definitely be guilty.'

UI law student Brett Ryan drank 18 beers in the three hours before taking the stage with Singleman. He had a blood-alcohol level of .18.

White asked how many people in the audience were under 21 and how many of them drink, and both times, a majority raised their "The fact is if you are not yet 21,

it is illegal to drink. If you get caught, you will be charged. That charge will get on your record. And that will risk your future," he said.

Northeast residents dislike city plan

A developer says the plan "is not workable."

Public input in the Northeast District Plan is commendable, a resident said Tuesday, but added that more should be done to incorporate it in regards to First Avenue.

"I feel that it's in conflict with the main points of the plan, which is First Avenue," Iowa City resident Derek Maurer said of the input.

The Iowa City City Council continued to accept public comment on the plan at its meeting Tuesday night.

The plan, designed by the Planning and Zoning Commission during a series of meetings with area residents, includes extensions of Scott Boulevard and First Avenue to accommodate development. The plan also contains housing guidelines in the Northeast section of the city.

Maurer noted the November 1997 election, in which residents halted plans to extend First Avenue north to Dodge Street until 2002, and current resident sentiments against such an extension.

Larry Schnittjer, president of MMS Consultants Inc., 1917 S. Gilbert St., said he believed not enough time was put in on the plan.

"The plan, as it is currently illustrated, is not workable," he said. "I don't want to see the developers upset that they don't get the density they want, and I don't want to see the neighbors upset that they don't get the green space they want."
Schnittjer said the plan needs

"major changes." He was concerned about three parallel side streets that differ in height by 30 feet, which could create problems in grading, he said.

A citizens' group in the Northeast District came up with four demands during the planning

nate several proposed houses overlooking Hickory Hill Park.

The city attempted to comply by allowing houses on only one side of the streets near the park, but Iowa City resident Bennett Brown said three to five houses could still be

seen from the park. 'You wouldn't be able to see the feet of someone standing on their front steps, but you would be able to see

their knees and the house," he said. Hickory Hill Park is one of the few places in Iowa City in which people don't feel as if they're in a city, and houses in view of the park

would ruin that feeling, Brown said. The meeting was the second in which the council accepted comment on the plan. Residents will also have a chance to speak on the plan at a meeting on April 20.

Search for new superintendent begins

The Iowa City School District took the first step in its hunt for a superintendent by interviewing a national search firm.

PNR Associates of Minneapolis, which introduced outgoing superintendent Barbara Grohe to Iowa City nine years ago, was the first and only company to be interviewed by the School Board Tues-

Other firms that have contacted the board are Else Leadership Group in Cedar Falls and the

Bickert Group Ltd. from Glen Ellyn, Ill. The School Board will hold an interview with the Bickert Group on April 12.

A decision is expected at the April 13 meeting, said Susan Mims, School Board president.

Paul Plath, a partner at PNR Associates, said his company works in a three-phase plan, beginning with advertising and talking to members of the community. The next two phases include the search for the candidate and the final interview process.

Plath said the length of the three phases averages five

School Board member Alan Leff asked Plath if he felt the search would be rushed since the board would like a superintendent by

"It would be tighter than normal," Plath said. "But if your calendar is available, we can do

In addition, he suggested starting the first phase now by gathering information from community and board members and appointing an interim superintendent until a satisfactory candidate was

School Board member Linda Levey said Plath's presentation was fair. However, she would have liked to compare how the firm has dealt with other univer-

'It is part of a necessary process in hiring anybody," Levey said. "It would have been a little more reassuring."

More Iowa homicide victims are women

DES MOINES (AP) - Higher levels of family and domestic violence may be responsible for more women then men in lowa reported as the victims of homicide in the first quarter of the year, criminologists say.

"We're concerned about the murder-suicide rate, which seems to be rising," said Lynnette Irlmeier, the rural program director for the Des Moines-based Iowa Coalition Against Domestic Violence. "But there isn't any research to answer why.'

By comparison, state officials reported that 37 percent of the 1997 homicide victims were women, with similar percentages in 1994.

Five of this year's homicide victims have been women whose deaths were tied to cases in which the killer later attempted or commit-

In 1998, 51 percent of the state's 61 homikiller later committed suicide. In every case,

the weapon was a gun. In nine of the 10 cases, the killer was a man.

Irlmeier said men with a history of domestic abuse should be taken seriously if they talk about suicide because there's a chance they won't just take their own lives.

She said men who violate court orders to stay away from women also should be taken seriously because they've demonstrated a will-

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

China's premier arrives

Air strikes, human rights and missiles complicate Chinese visit to U.S.

WASHINGTON - Chinese Premier Zhu Rongji's visit to the United States comes at a time of particularly tense relations between Beijing and Washington, including a stark dispute over the bombing of Yugoslavia.

China has called for an immediate halt to the NATO air strikes. And Chinese leaders even considered postponing Zhu's six-city, nine-day visit that began Tuesday in Los Angeles.

Even so, Zhu still hopes to close deal with the Clinton administration to allow Beijing to join the World Trade Organization, which regulates international trade, after

China hopes to attract the foreign investment needed to help its slowing economy.

While in Washington, Zhu was to dine with Clinton Thursday

evening, hold meetings with officials of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund and meet Friday with a handful of lawmakers back early from the two-week congressional recess.

"We hope that they will understand better the importance of China-U.S. relations," said Yu Shuning, a spokesman for the Chinese Embassy.

Criticism in Congress of China's human-rights record is bipartisan and widespread.

Study: Teen smoking causes DNA damage

Barmed in A. Stick

A new report shows that starting cigarettes before the age of 18 is "uniquely bad."

WASHINGTON - Smoking in the teen-age years causes permanent genetic changes in the lungs and forever increases the risk of lung cancer — even if the smoker quits, a study finds. And the younger the smoking starts, the more damage is done.

The research, at a time when more than a third of teens take up the smoking habit, shows "there is

something uniquely bad about starting young," said John K. Wiencke, a genetics expert at the University of California, San Francisco, School of Medicine.

The research gives powerful laboratory evidence that starting smoking before the age of 18 can be particularly harmful to long-term health, said Wiencke, author of a study published Wednesday in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute.

Youthful smoking on a daily basis apparently causes lung damage that lasts a lifetime, he said. Such damage is less likely among smokers who start in their 20s.

"It looks like it is the age when

smoking starts that is important," Wiencke said. "It didn't matter if they were heavy or light smokers what mattered is that they started young."

Earlier studies have indicated that young smoking stunts the lungs' full development and increases the risk of breathing problems later in life. Studies have also shown that smoking in the teen years is more addictive and that smokers who begin young are less likely to break the habit.

But Wiencke's study for the first time shows dramatic and enduring DNA damage caused by youthful


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

threat to student life

Student groups of all types are steeped in controversies. Regardless of whether it

is tame or inflammatory, someone is bound to disagree with a student group.

This disagreement is healthy — but a recent appeals court decision about student groups in Wisconsin may end a good deal of funding for student groups because people oppose them. By allowing students to "opt-out" of paying student fees for programs they disagree with, the ruling would effectively kill most political, religious and alternative student groups

A three-judge panel of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in 1997 that, "The forced funding of such organizations significantly adds to the burdening of the students' free-speech rights." The ruling went on to say that the University of Wisconsin "cannot use the allocable portion of the objecting students' mandatory activity fees to fund (those) organizations."

The decision is currently being appealed, and the U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to hear the case. If the ruling stands, it will be a sad day for most student groups. Money from mandatory student fees keeps most smaller groups from going under. At the UI, every precious dollar of the \$748,000 allocated to student groups would be in jeopardy. Both conservative and liberal students should realize that it would be a mistake to eliminate funding for the groups they disagree with. The diversity of student groups on campus adds to the richness of education and provides opportunities for debate and discussion. A general fund made of student fees is the only way to

keep the wide range of student groups and activities on campus.

It could be said that 99 percent of people disagree with some way their tax dollars are being spent, but there is no "opting-out" of paying taxes. The same could be said about university students. Students pay tuition to get a complete education — and should receive everything that comes with it. Part of this education entails learning how to deal with those of opposite opinions.



Military intervention was never a serious option in either Rwanda or Yugoslavia. In both cases, the rest of the world has chosen to wait it out and clean up the mess afterwards. So if there is no difference. where is the racism?

On the other hand, I find Fons' snide suggestions troublesome. If it is racist to help white people being butchered by other white people and racist to not help black people being butchered by other black people, what is she trying to say? That some people, based on ethnicity, are worthy of help, and oth-

So I'm wondering if the complaints voiced by Fons that we are intervening in Yugoslavia but not Rwanda because of racism are not a more subtle form of racism. Given that Fons, in spite of her anguished pity for the butchered thousands in Africa, never bothered to look up Rwanda in a standard encyclopedia, I really have to wonder.

Hirings show UI's skewed priorities

HE recent recruiting and hiring of a new coach for the Iowa basketball team, and perhaps even the selection of the new football coach, points out that the rules in the UI Operations Manual, which is supposed to govern all of us, is not applied equally when it comes to the Athletics Department.

The search for the UI president required following Affirmative Action guidelines. The nepotism rules would not allow the UI president to hire her spouse as her assistant.

Yet the searches conducted by the Athletics Department continue to be secret, back-room deals that end up putting salary and perks packages together that fly in the face of stated UI policy.

It has always struck many as somewhat absurd that the football coach earned more than either the UI president or the state governor. Both of the latter have considerable constraints on their non-salary earnings and are subject to rules governing con-

flict of interest. How can an endorsement contract not at least raise the specter of a conflict of interest? What is perhaps most disheartening about the magnitude of the total compen-

sation package for the new coaches that the Athletics Department put together and is so proud of is that it appears that the UI can find the money to put into enhancing collegiate athletics while its academic programs have to struggle. As one case in point, take the Depart-

ment of Speech Pathology & Audiology. There are not many UI departments to have been named the No. 1 program in the country by U.S. News & World Report. The department has several faculty lines that were vacated by resignations, but the funds available to the College of Liberal Arts and the provost make it impossible to fill those positions.

Even if those lines were filled by the most senior candidates, the total cost would not even come close to the basketball coach's compensation package.

It is sad that, when an academic program at the UI achieves national distinction, the resources to maintain it are not available. At a time when one of the UI's stated goals is to enhance undergraduate education, it is sad when only one

out of seven requests to fill lines in the College of Liberal Arts can be granted. To those who argue that the

sources of funds for athletics are different, let me point out that the reason more endowment funds are not available to the College of Liberal Arts may be the result of where the emphasis on fundraising has been.

The number of employees at the UI Foundation who work specifically for the college is far smaller than it should be, given that the majority of the students attending the UI are served by the college and that the majority of UI alumni come from the college.

If our mission is one of education, then the priorities should be placed there. The current priorities seem to suggest that the new young coach, with the help of his dad, will be the highestpaid UI employee.

By contrast, the new young professorin the Department of Speech Pathology & Audiology will continue to have a salary that is in the basement of the Big Ten and will have to work even harder because of the added workload, which will be caused by the department's inability to hire permanent faculty replacements.

craft were seen in the night sky.

Yugoslav television stations reported further attacks Tuesday night around the Kosovo capital of Pristina; at Uzice, 75 miles southwest of Belgrade; near Kraljevo, 75 miles south of Belgrade; and at Pancevo and Cacak, two industrial towns. U.S. officials say a munitions plant is located at Cacak.

Another missile struck a residential district in Podgorica, capital of the tiny Yugoslav republic of Montenegro. There were no injuries but several buildings were damaged, according to Associated Press reporters on the scene.

The Yugoslav cease-fire declaration was clearly aimed at staving off further NATO attacks and at presenting Milosevic's government as a champion of peace.

President Clinton and NATO insisted that half-measures would not end the NATO air campaign that began on March 24; British Prime Minister Tony Blair's office said Milosevic's announced truce "doesn't go nearly far enough."

A rebel Kosovar spokesman also rejected the cease-fire, which was announced on Belgrade television stations, and said the only way the group would agree to a truce would be if NATO troops enforced it.

The statement also pledged the government would work for the

"I think it hits you, not being able to talk about what is important to you. It makes you think about people who have had bad experiences coming out. Most people don't realize how much you can lose," Fredenberg said. "I got involved when a friend of mine came out. It really made issues hit home.'



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



lowa's Elliott positive entering fight for his life

After spending most of the last 12 years preparing for football games as an Iowa Hawkeye assistant coach, Bob Elliott is preparing for his biggest battle yet.

The 45-year-old Elliott will begin treatment today at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics to battle a life-threatening blood disorder. Included in the procedure will be both radiation and chemotherapy along with a bone marrow transplant. Doctors have told Elliott his odds of survival are 70-30 - at best. Still, he remains upbeat.

"I feel good," Elliott said Monday. "I am ready for the treatment and feel I

have a good shot of making it." Beginning Wednesday, doctors will

administer about chemotherapy and radiation ments to kill all of Elliott's current bone marrow. After that, the new bone marrow - which was donated by his cousin - will be introduced to the body. Two weeks following

transplant, doctors should know whether Elliott's system accepts the new bone marrow or not. Until then, the expected side effects will not be pretty.

"The doctors have told me it will be like having a really bad case of the flu for three weeks," he said. "And that is the best-case scenario.'

Elliott suffers from polycythermia vera, a blood disorder that causes the bone marrow to produce too many white blood cells, red blood cells, and platelets. He first became aware of the disorder in 1991, when he had his spleen removed because of clotting. Since then, Elliott has discreetly visited the hospital once a week trying everything.

About a year ago, he decided he wanted to "go for broke" and have the bone marrow transplant. He kept the condition quiet until notifying the media and his players on Nov. 10, a few days before their showdown



All eyes are on Tiger Woods and David Duval entering Thursday's opening round of the Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. - Tiger Woods settled into his chair to size up his chances of winning the Masters for the second time in three years, the tournament that was thought to be his domain for years to come.

Right away, he realized he was no longer the center of

"How does it feel to be Avis?" came the first question. No. 1 now belongs to David Duval, whose four victories so far this year have been enough to surpass Woods atop the world rankings and make him the favorite this week at Augusta National.

"He's playing better, no doubt about it," Woods said.

"But I like my chances, too."

As he should. After all, it has only been two years since Woods set the Masters scoring record (270) and proceeded to set the world of golf on fire with booming drives and a charisma not seen on

the PGA Tour since Arnold Palmer. Even Jack Nicklaus predicted Woods might win as many green jackets as he and Palmer combined

Funny how three months and four victories, not to mention a 59, can shift the emphasis from Woods to Duval.

"Cool," Woods said. "It's fine. Everybody is going to have their runs and David is having his run right now. It's all part of the game." But Woods and Duval have become

a game within the game, virtually the only two players anyone is talking about in the largest field the Masters has had in 33 years. Duval won his first two tournaments

of the year, the winners-only Mercedes by a whopping nine strokes, then the Bob Hope Classic with the first Sunday 59 in tour history. Woods slowed the Duval Express by winning in San Diego and nearly winning again a week later. Back comes Duval, heading into Augusta with victo-

ries the last two weeks. "They're the best two players in the world," said Fred

Funk. "David got off to such a great start, and then Tiger

DI: Were you glad Chuck Long was retained as quarterbacks



Woods, Duval rivalry brews at Augusta

kind of answered him. Now David is playing great. Let's see if Tiger can answer the bell again."

More than just the first major championship of the year, the Masters has proven to be a spectacular arena for some of golf's best rivalries.

Byron Nelson and Sam Snead each won memorable playoffs over Ben Hogan, who still managed to win two Masters. The rivalry between Nicklaus and Palmer was born in the U.S. Open but flourished at Augusta, where they won six green jackets between them during a seven-year stretch.

The seeds for another great rivalry could be planted this week among the brilliant azaleas and sloping fairways of Augusta National.

"Is there a little bit of a rivalry between Tiger and David? Yeah, probably," said defending champion Mark O'Meara. "What David has done in the last two years is absolutely incredible. Natural, raw

talent. ... I've never seen anybody like Tiger Woods. He's got the most talent of any player I've ever seen

"He wants to be the man. David wants to be the man. That's good for golf."

The comparisons to a Nicklaus-Palmer rivalry are natural. Woods is a lot like Palmer, capable

of drawing masses to the game with his emotion and a swashbuckling style that can leave a gallery breathless. Tigermania took root at Augusta, the same place where Arnie's Army was born nearly 40 years earlier.

There is nothing fancy about Duval, as a person or a player. Like Nicklaus, his name is becoming a fearsome sight on the scoreboard. He is among the longest hitters, makes all the big putts and has such composure that he rarely

makes a mistake when it matters. "In my best sequence of events ... I felt like you walk to the first tee and you feel like, 'Who's going to finish second this week?' And you can see that with David right now," said Greg Norman. "I think there's one guy now dominating our tour. That's David."

Not that Duval and Woods are the only ones.

Ernie Els beat both of them down the stretch in Los Angeles, is a twotime U.S. Open champion and has a game that can hold up against anyone. Justin Leonard counts the British Open and Players Championship among his four victories, while Phil Mickelson has already won 13 times and is still 28.

That kind of depth is one reason rivalries are hard to come by these days. But what established previous ones was not so much quantity as quality. Palmer and Nicklaus staged their duels in the Masters and U.S. Open, not the Western Open and the Bob Hope Classic.

"It's difficult to say David and I are the best players in the world and we're going to see each other heading down the stretch on Sunday," Woods said. "What probably will end up happening, if David continues to play well and I win more tournaments, is we will probably play head-to-head eventually.

"Hopefully, it will happen in the majors."

No recruits for Lee today

The lowa women's basketball team will not have any recruits signing on the dotted line today, the first day of the late signing period for high school seniors.

Women's sports information director Derick Hackett said Iowa coach Angie Lee won't have any new players until after her potential recruits make their official visits.

"Some of the people they are going after will be making their official campus visits in the next week or two," Hackett said. Lee has only one commitment. Amber

O'Brien, a 6-foot-4 center from Minnesota signed with the Hawkeyes last November. lowa currently has only eight of its 15 scholarships in use. As far as finding a replacement for for-

mer assistant Kristi Kinne, Lee said she has just begun the process and does not have a specific timetable for filling the

Lee also said she is not looking for a "traditional" assistant coach. Instead, she is searching for a person who would be more of an administrative assistant rather than a coach giving on-the-floor instruction during games.

Elliott said nurses at the hospital have kept his wife, Joey, and two children, Grant and Jessica,

informed on the procedure and treatments he will be going through. "I think they are prepared for what is going to happen to me,"

As far as his relationship with the new coach goes, Range said, "Coach Alford's a good guy and a good coach. He's real interested in the team."

Anytime a new coach steps in, there are always questions about underclassmen returning. From all indications, Range's insistence that he's coming back means the team will stay intact. His teammates all

have said they will return.

Range's father, Jim Range, and his mother, Ola Cunningham, both said their son has given no indication that he was considering a transfer, going pro or simply quitting.

If that's the talk, it's news to me," Cunningham said. "As far as I know, he's not leaving the team."

Jim Range said, "He's gonna stay in school. Where would he go? You leave, and you lose a year. I haven't heard him talk about leaving."

Before coming to Iowa, as well as during the season, Range hinted about his desire to leave school early to play professionally. Those plans apparently have been placed on hold. "If he listens to us, he won't go

pro early," Jim Range said. To play in the NBA, Range would likely need at least a year or two to refine his game. Although he showed signs of brilliance last year, there were also obvious weaknesses in his game. His ball-handling skills were below average, and his outside shooting touch was mediocre.

Jim Range said his son is impressed by Alford, whom he compares to his high school coach, Mike Miller. Range admits he likes what he sees

NEW YORK — Women's pro basketball may be about to match the men, at least on the

At the same time as expansion WNBA franchises in Minnesota and Orlando added four players each Tuesday, stalemated labor negotiations are threatening the start of the season, scheduled for June 10.

The league has set a Saturday deadline for reaching a contract agreement with its players. Without one, the WNBA could order a lockout, the same way the NBA did in July. That labor dispute delayed the start of the NBA season until Feb. 5, cost players an estimated \$400 million in salaries, and reduced the schedule from 82 games to 50.


