## Rash of vandalism hits Maiden Lane

■ The police are making more frequent patrols in the area near South Gilbert Street.

Iowa City police say they are stepping up patrols in a Iowa City area that is heavily populated by students after receiving requests for a higher visibility and seeing an increase in violence done to area businesses.

"I've read requests for the past week for extra patrol, especially on Maiden Lane," said Iowa City police Lt. Matt Johnson. "The goal is to patrol the area more frequently than we usually would."

Amy Davies, a UI junior who lives at Blackhawk Apartments, 319 E. Court St., said she has seen a lot of damage in her building — including

"puke piles" in the halls on weekends and having her patio furniture thrown off her balcony — but not a lot of police in the area.

"The cops aren't around here a lot, so people think they can do stuff and get away with it," she said.

The requests for more police patrols came after some area businesses reported a spate of vandalism. Most recently, Studiolo, 415 S. Gilbert St., reported seven windows and two skylights broken by beer bottles last weekend.

"Apparently, there's an apartment building full of morons who get their jollies from throwing beer bottles through windows," said sculptor Gene Anderson, whose sculpture suffered

\$4,000 in damages in the incident.

Other nearby business have also been making repairs after being struck by vandals. When classes started three weeks ago, Rich VeDepo, general manager of City Electric Supply & Lighting Studio, 315 E.

Prentiss St., said his business spent \$400 to replace two windows that someone had thrown rocks through.

"I understand coming to Iowa City and wanting to raise a little hell, but you shouldn't do it at the expense of someone else," he said.

VeDepo said the company recently repaired a hole in the roof caused by a tossed beer bottle and a hole in a protective membrane caused by a lit torch. When the roofer went up to repair the damage, he found the gutter was full of broken beer bottles, he said.

He said the circumstantial evidence points to two separate apartment complexes near the store.

## Gas leak may have caused explosion

■ The Usovskys' "dream house" lies in ruins, as six survivors receive treatment at the UIHC.

RICHLAND, Iowa — The dream house that Jerry Usovsky built for his wife and two daughters lay in a heap of rubble Tuesday after an explosion that killed seven people and injured six others.

Friends said Usovsky had carefully landscaped the home and put several custom touches in the kitchen — glass shelves suspended from the kitchen ceiling and a Jenn-Air gas grill with an open flame.

Maria Reif, one of the first people on the scene after the blast Monday afternoon, said Usovsky kept saying, "The grill. The grill," before being taken to the burn unit at UI Hospitals and Clinics.

State Fire Marshal Roy Marshall said the explosion "may have been fueled" by liquid propane gas.

Fire Chief Mike Hadley said pressure tests had detected a break in the LP line leading into the house from a 500-gallon tank outside. The large propane tank behind the home was untouched in the explosion.

"There was raw LP coming out of the line," Hadley said. "We can't tell you that is the cause, but that's where the investigation is centered."

Hadley said the 3/4-inch copper line, buried just 4 inches deep, was severed a few days earlier while Usovsky was building a pen for the family's new dog. The break was found 8 1/2 feet from the

## 10-year-old survivor recovering at UIHC

After receiving a last-minute invitation to a Labor Day party in Richland, Iowa, from soccer buddy Trey Gartner, Josh Kleinmeyer's family says he's fortunate to be alive.

The party was held at a house in Richland that exploded and burned Monday, killing seven people and

injuring six.

"He's a great little boy, and we're very lucky he's still with us," said Josh Kleinmeyer's aunt, Celeste Kleinmeyer-Shoppa.

Ten-year-old Josh does not remember the tragic events — which is a good thing, Kleinmeyer-Shoppa said.

"He remembers one minute being on the couch and the next minute not being on the couch," she said. "He's in and out; they're keeping him sedated so he can rest. He doesn't seem to remember what exactly happened."

## Merger, she wrote: Viacom buys CBS

■ The deal establishes a media behemoth to rival Time Warner and Disney.

NEW YORK — Viacom Inc. is buying CBS Corp. in the richest media merger in history — a \$36 billion deal that combines the owner of hip properties such as MTV and VH1 with the old-line network that brought you "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote."

CBS, which changed hands just four years ago when it was bought by Westinghouse Electric Corp., will now become part of a radio, TV and film powerhouse to rival such conglomerates as Time Warner Inc. and Walt Disney Co.

Viacom will own last season's top-rated TV network, as well as Paramount Studios, MTV, VH1, Nickelodeon and the Simon & Schuster publishing house.

The new company will be called Viacom, but the CBS name — which carries the legacy of Walter Cronkite and Edward R. Murrow — will remain on the network.

"We will be global leaders in every facet of the media and entertainment industry, financially strong from day one, with an enviable stable of global brands," said Viacom Chairman Sumner Redstone.

Redstone will be chairman and chief executive of the new entity, but CBS management will have a major role. CBS President Mel Karmazin, 56, will be president and chief operating officer, becoming heir apparent to Redstone, who is 76.

Analysts praised the deal as a good fit. CBS will get a TV and film studio to provide shows for its network, while Viacom gains major advertising outlets to promote the films and shows produced by Paramount and its Spelling Entertainment TV studio.

"It's a good deal for everybody," said Chris Dixon, a media analyst at PaineWebber Inc. "You need to be big. You need to have a global presence."

While many of Viacom's properties have catered to a youthful audience,

## MyTalk may make e-mail a lot easier

■ A free Web service will offer e-mail access over the phone.

The UI is in the process of creating its own e-mail accounts on the Web, which would make accessing myTalk, a new Web service that uses telephones instead of computers, available from UI accounts.

The service allows users to access and reply to e-mail without ever touching a computer, making it easy for students without personal computers to check their e-mail by using a telephone.

Existing e-mail accounts can also access myTalk if they are compatible with POP3, an Internet standard. UI e-mail accounts are compatible with the standard, said Don McClain of the Information Technology Services.

The program to access myTalk from UI accounts is currently being tested in a UI class and by UI faculty.

"If all goes well, we'll be rolling it out by next semester, or definitely next fall," McClain said.

Users can call a toll-free number and listen to their e-mail or send replies via audio clip attachment files. They can also access e-mail online at the myTalk home page, said Judy Radlinsky, director of public relations for General Magic.

Checking e-mail would be more convenient, agreed UI freshman Caleb Syfert.

"It sounds kind of complicated," he said. "But it would be a lot easier than going down to the IMU."

UI junior Kate Minor said there are plenty of places on campus to check e-mail but that she might use myTalk off-campus.

"It would be most helpful if I was at home or out of town," she said.

In the future, it will be possible to compose messages on myTalk over the phone, Radlinsky said.

To subscribe to myTalk, users must visit the myTalk home page, located at www.mytalk.com. Each subscriber is given a toll-free number and a personal mailbox number; he or she then chooses a security code when signing up for a new account, Radlinsky said.

## UI project to scan surface of Mars for underground water

■ The university was awarded \$4 million to design a water-detecting radar to be used by the Mars Express.

A low-frequency antenna constructed by a UI engineering team will help a European Space Agency mission answer the astronomical question of what happened to the water on Mars.

The UI team received \$4 million from NASA to design and build the Mars Advanced Radar for Subsurface and Ionospheric Sounding in collaboration with NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., and

the University of Rome for the Mars Express spacecraft, said Donald Gurnett, a UI physics professor and co-investigator of the project.

"We received formal notification that we had been selected for the project on Aug. 4," he said.

The UI's part of the project includes the antenna that will search for water beneath the Martian surface and study the ionosphere in the Martian atmosphere by scanning below the red planet's surface, Gurnett said.

Mars appears to be as dry as the Sahara, but evidence has long suggested that water once flowed over its blighted surface, he said.

"Mars looks like a desert," Gurnett said. "It is pretty clear that there was water on the surface sometime

in the distant past."

Effects of the water erosion, such as canyons and riverbeds, are readily observable on the surface, but exactly what happened to the water is a mystery.

"One explanation is the water evaporated and was lost to space," Gurnett said. "The other is that the water is in the ground."

If the second explanation is correct, the water would be frozen in a permafrost state, such as what exists in much of Alaska.

"The temperature seldom gets above freezing on the surface," Gurnett said. "As you go down, the temperature gets above the melting point; it becomes water."

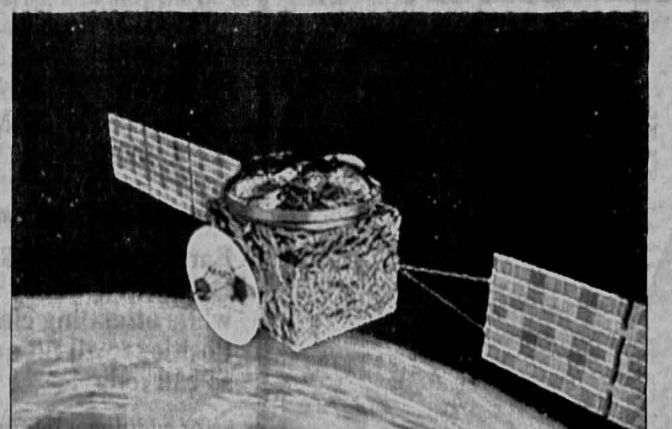

**McEwan's love not so enduring**

LONDON (AP) — Novelist Ian McEwan's ex-wife wore a gag to court Tuesday in her bitter custody battle over their two teenage sons.

Penny Allen arrived at the High Court with her fiancé, Ismay Tremain, who wore a gag and a diaper over his trousers.

McEwan, who won the Booker Prize for his novel *Amsterdam*, was granted sole custody of the boys, ages 15 and 13, after Allen, a spiritual healer and the rapist, moved to France to set up a retreat at a farmhouse.

She defied a French court order to return the boys after a visit and went on the run with her younger son. She was arrested on Sept. 3 and the boy was returned to his father.

McEwan didn't appear at the hearing, which was closed to the public.

**Eyes really wide shut**

SINGAPORE (AP) — Authorities have rejected an appeal to let *Wide Shut* run uncut in Singapore.

That means **Stanley Kubrick's** last work might not be screened in the tightly controlled Asian city-state because Warner Bros. is under contract to show it exactly as it was made.

"We're not allowed to tamper with the film at all in any way," studio spokeswoman Li Sok Heng said Tuesday.

The government-appointed Films Appeals Committee, a citizens' group with the final say in such decisions, insisted that a scene involving oral sex between two women be cut. The panel also said chanting from the sacred Hindu text the Bhagavad Gita, which accompanies an orgy scene, is religiously sensitive and must be "muted or replaced."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Despite health problems, **Jerry Lewis** hosted his 34th annual Labor Day Telethon, raising a record \$53.1 million in pledges for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The entertainer fought off double vision and headaches during the telethon and had to spend time resting backstage before returning for Monday's finale.

"He experienced some double vision, and his blood pressure spiked," said telethon spokesman Jim Brown. "With the double vision, he literally could not read the cue cards, and with a live broadcast, it becomes impossible to continue when you can't read."

Board candidates hold forum as election nears

■ Another candidates' forum will take place tonight at the Johnson County Senior Center at 7:30.

A forum held Tuesday night at the Iowa City School District Central Administration Office gave candidates the chance to answer questions on issues affecting the district.

Budget cuts, possible boundary changes, teacher morale and communication were the main issues.

Coralville resident Philip Wingert, who attended the forum, encouraged more community members to attend another forum, to be held tonight.

"I would think anyone with a child in the district would attend at least one forum," he said. "After tonight, I've made up my mind."

Tonight's forum will be held at the Johnson County Senior Center, 28 S. Linn St., at 7:30.

Board President Susan Mims and board member Cindy Parsons are

seeking re-election in the Sept. 14 vote, while Don Jackson, Lauren Reece, Dale Shultz and Tom Thrans are vying for the three member seats.

The three candidates who were not profiled in the Sept. 7 Daily Iowan are:

• **Don Jackson**, a quality-assurance manager at Procter & Gamble, who served on Iowa's Strategy II committee in 1998 as a community representative.

Because of his involvement in Strategy II, Jackson says, he has knowledge of the state's financing process, which could help straighten out the District's budget problems.

"Budget issues are an ongoing thing," he said. "I now have this knowledge that I would be crazy not to use."

Jackson also said he would like to

help the board anticipate problems before they arise.

"The board needs to lead, not react," he said. "Plans for boundary changes, budget processes and safety improvements were all done after the fact."

• **Cindy Parsons**, an incumbent and a general practice lawyer in Iowa City.

Because of her three years of service on the board, Parsons said, she wants voters to realize she has the experience.

Parsons has also sought public input and knowledge of changes people feel are necessary.

She wants to leave some of the districts' problems behind, she said, and begin to make the changes people have recommended.

"I would like to work with the new superintendent," Parsons said. "I

would like to see the district move in a new direction."

• **Susan Mims**, current board president and a professor/coordinator of pre-engineering at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids.

Mims says her experience will help with continuity, especially with a new superintendent.

"The budget needs work, and there are boundary changes coming up," she said. "The West Side enrollment is high, but the East Side is low."

Mims wants to get past budget issues and volunteer problems.

"It has been a difficult three years — unfortunately, there have been problems," she said. "I am open to input from (School District) staff and the community."

Report: UI faculty busy with research and creative production

■ The UI faculty do a great deal of research and creative production in addition to teaching.

Faculty at the UI are heavily involved in scholarly research and creative production, according to the findings of a Faculty Senate questionnaire presented at a meeting of

the UI Faculty Council Tuesday.

The main purpose of the anonymous questionnaire was to develop data concerning faculty involvement in scholarly productivity, artistic creation and service. The survey was conducted "in order to see whether we could develop criteria to measure faculty productivity in areas other than teaching," said

Jon Carlson, a law professor and the president of the Faculty Senate.

The most surprising finding was the large number of faculty who

were actively involved in institutional administration and service — more than 50 percent, or approximately 600 of the 1,131 faculty members who responded.

Mathematics Professor Dennis Roseman said he didn't respond to the questionnaire but wasn't surprised at the findings because most faculty members do research in order to receive promotions.

"We have a lot of young faculty, and if you want to get promoted, you are required to do research," he

said.

Analysis of the data revealed that some categories were too ambiguous to yield useful data, Carlson said. Some participants interpreted the questions more broadly than intended, and some recorded very large amounts of time, he said.

"It seems to me that the results of the survey are more or less accurate," Carlson said.

# Ex-secretary Cisneros agrees to plea bargain

■ The former HUD official pleads guilty to a single misdemeanor count, ending a four-year case.

WASHINGTON — Former Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros pleaded guilty Tuesday to a single misdemeanor count of lying to the FBI, ending a four-year investigation by an independent counsel.

Cisneros appeared before U.S. District Judge Stanley Sporkin to acknowledge that during his background checks for a post in the Clinton administration, he falsely told FBI investigators that he had paid his former lover no more than \$2,500 monthly.

Under terms of the plea agreement, Cisneros will pay a \$10,000 fine but will face no jail time and no probation. A government official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the deal with prosecutors also called for Cis-

neros to make a statement to the court taking responsibility for his acts.

The plea came at the start of the former San Antonio mayor's trial on 18 felony counts that he conspired with one-time paramour Linda Jones to conceal from the FBI the scope of his payments of more than \$250,000.

"I accept responsibility for the conduct as outlined," Cisneros told the court, adding that future aspirants to public office should learn that "truth and candor are important."

Sporkin, in accepting the plea agreement that he initially said he thought was too lenient, said: "I know there will be some second-guessing about this plea."

"I don't think the office of independent counsel had much choice in this matter," he said, defending the work of prosecutor David Barrett. But, the judge added: "We cannot permit an individual to lie his way into public office."

"We are just glad to have this over and done with," Barrett told reporters, declining further com-

ment. But in a prepared statement, he implicitly defended his \$9 million-plus investigation.

"This disposition should in no way be viewed as minimizing the serious ethical breach by Mr. Cisneros," the statement read. "However, a just disposition of any prosecution must include an evaluation of the defendant's overall conduct. In this case, the conduct, while egregious, was committed by a person whose life has been otherwise dedicated to public service, and this fact must season the final decision."

Cisneros left the courthouse without talking to reporters.

The plea came just as the process of jury selection in the high-profile case was about to get under way.

Cisneros had been named in an 18-count federal indictment charging that while he was being considered for a Cabinet post in Clinton's first administration, he conspired with Jones to conceal the scope of payments he made to her. He had initially pleaded innocent.

Jones, who herself ran afoul of

the independent counsel prosecuting Cisneros, was to be the government's star witness. But her credibility had come under serious attack from Cisneros' high-dollar legal team. She had agreed to testify against her ex-lover in a bid to gain a reduction in her 3½-year prison sentence.

Prosecutors Tuesday dropped two remaining felony counts that had been pending against Jones, who was indicted along with Cisneros and two aides in December 1997. Barrett agreed in July not to prosecute the aides.

Eighty-eight tape recordings that Jones secretly made of her phone conversations with Cisneros as their relationship soured were at the heart of Barrett's case. Cisneros' lawyers labored mightily during a 13-day pretrial hearing in July to prohibit their use, saying many tapes bore signs of heavy editing.

But Sporkin rejected the defense's argument, saying he would allow prosecutors to use all or parts of the 26 tapes they wanted to play for jurors.

## Men, women differ widely on gun-control

WASHINGTON (AP) — The fight over gun control reflects a battle of the sexes. American women say stricter weapon laws would curb violence, while men want better enforcement of existing laws, an Associated Press poll found.

The telephone survey by ICR of Media, Pa., found 56 percent of American adults favored stricter gun laws and 39 percent opposed them. Sixty-six percent of women favored the tougher laws, compared with 45 percent of men. Thirty percent of women and 49 percent of men were opposed.

In mid-April, just before the Colorado shootings, 55 percent of adults favored tougher gun laws. When the question was repeated in an AP poll a week after the shootings, the proportion jumped to 63 percent. The poll of 1,026 people taken Aug. 27-31 indicated that blacks were far more likely than whites, by 83 percent to 52 percent, to support tougher gun controls. The poll had an error margin of plus or minus 3 percentage points, larger for subgroups such as men and women. Democrats

were far more likely than Republicans to support more restrictions, by 71 percent to 43 percent.

Both Democratic candidates for president, Vice President Al Gore and former New Jersey Sen. Bill Bradley, have suggested stringent steps to control access to guns. GOP front-runner George W. Bush, governor of Texas, said recently he agrees with some gun-control steps, such as raising the age of gun ownership to 21 and banning large ammunition clips.

Republicans have found divisions in their own ranks. The Senate, with the help of some Republicans, agreed to legislation that requires background checks at all gun shows, outlaws importation of large-capacity ammunition clips, and requires the sale of safety locks with handguns. House Republicans initially stripped out that language but later asked for a compromise version that would require background checks for firearms sales at gun shows.

More than half of Americans say recent shootings in the news have made them worry more about their own safety. Almost two-thirds of women said they were likely to feel that way.

# East Timorese flee as chaos reigns

■ Charging that the army is aiding the rampaging militias, many observers want a U.N. peacekeeping force.

DILI, Indonesia — Driven by fear, killings and army gunfire, East Timorese jammed onto ships and into trucks Tuesday as their homeland sank further into chaos behind them. With an estimated 30,000 people having fled the provincial capital in the past few days, the streets of the city were empty save for looters and smoldering fires.

The international lens focused more closely on the war-ravaged territory Tuesday, with officials from the World Bank to the White House to the Vatican urging a halt to the shooting rampages and ter-

ror that erupted last week, when the East Timorese voted overwhelmingly to break away from Indonesia.

While leaders from East Timor, Australia, New Zealand and other nations pushed harder for an international peacekeeping force to intervene, the U.N. Security Council said Tuesday such talk was premature. Council members said first they wanted to hear from five U.N. ambassadors who had been sent to Indonesia to persuade President B.J. Habibie to rein in his military — said by witnesses to be orchestrating the carnage along with anti-independence militias.

The group, led by Namibia's U.N. Ambassador Martin Andjaba, was slated to arrive this morning. "They're going to make their own assessment of the extent to which the Indonesians are willing and capable of living up to their ...

security commitments," said Canada's U.N. Ambassador Robert Fowler.

The Clinton administration agreed.

"Once they've made a judgment on that ... we will, as will many countries, take a look at whether we participate," said White House Press Secretary Joe Lockhart.

The State Department sounded more foreboding.

"The maintenance of productive relations with Indonesia depends upon Indonesia adopting a constructive attitude toward both ending the humanitarian disaster in East Timor and supporting the U.N.-administered process by which East Timor will become independent," said spokesman James P. Rubin.

The increasingly powerless Indonesian government imposed martial law, which includes the authority to search without war-

rants, a curfew to keep people off the streets and "the shooting on sight of people who go against the curfew," said Foreign Minister Ali Alatas. The restrictions went into effect Tuesday.

One election observer said she overheard Indonesia military officials over the radio as they ordered militias to set up roadblocks, pull U.N. observers out of their vehicles, and execute them. Kristin Sundell of the East Timor Action Network said it was imperative that the United Nations send troops to East Timor.

"People are being killed en masse," she said. "The U.S. could stop this in a minute if it applied serious pressure on Indonesia. Every hour it waits is more people killed."

Indonesia's Defense Minister Gen. Wiranto rejected the possibility of allowing armed peacekeepers into East Timor.

# Earthquake claims 30 lives in Athens; 100 missing

■ The 5.9-magnitude temblor spooks Athenians.

ATHENS, Greece — Rescue teams and stunned residents used everything from cranes to garden tools Tuesday to dig for those pinned under wreckage from the strongest earthquake to hit Athens in nearly a century — a 10-second shudder that claimed at least 30 lives and left close to 100 missing.

The scenes of desperate searches and survivors too frightened to return indoors were sadly familiar — last month's monstrous quake in neighboring Turkey had moved many Greeks to put aside their historical enmity with Turks and mobilize aid.

But some significant differences came to light in the shared disasters.

Decades of progressively stricter building codes in Greece

allowed Athens to ride out the 5.9-magnitude temblor with much less misery than Western Turkey, where shoddy construction was blamed for the near total destruction of some places after the 7.4-magnitude quake on Aug. 17.

"Damage like we saw in Turkey is difficult to occur here with the modern buildings we have," said Manolis Skordilis, head of the Thessaloniki Seismological Institute.

Most of the damage and casualties were concentrated in working-class and immigrant areas north of Athens, where construction standards were apparently lower or builders used shortcuts, some officials suggested. More than 100 buildings collapsed, from multi-story apartment houses to factories, and hundreds more were left with cracks or crumbled facades.

State television reported at least 30 people dead, including several children. Most of the victims were crushed; a few suffered

fatal heart attacks.

The exact number of missing was unclear, but state media said approximately two dozen people were trapped in flattened apartment buildings. An estimated 40

workers were missing in a collapsed foam-products factory north of Athens, and approximately a dozen employees were reported under the rubble of an appliance factory.

Usovsky was in serious condition; his daughter was in good condition.

Barb Dyer and Bev Gartner were in critical condition, while Usovsky and Trey Gartner were listed as serious. Marlena Usovsky and Josh Kleinmeyer were in good condition.

"He has no serious burns, but his hair was singed pretty badly."

The family is not sure how long Josh will remain at UIHC, Kleinmeyer-Shoppa said, but it could be a while so that doctors can make sure no other problems surface.

"They want to watch how they set the bone," she said, "It was off by about one-half an inch."

Calls of concern have been pouring in to members of the fam-

ily, Kleinmeyer-Shoppa said. "We want people to know he's going to be fine; we're holding camp up here."

The vigil to be held tonight for the seven fatalities may be too soon for family members to come out, Kleinmeyer-Shoppa said.

"As a family, we haven't had a chance to talk about our plans. We're keeping a vigil for Josh and the people in the hospital from home," she said.

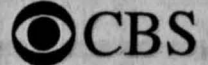

CBS has been successful with older viewers, who are attracted to such shows as "60 Minutes," "Diagnosis: Murder," "Touched by an Angel" and, before it went off the air a few years ago, "Murder, She Wrote."

The deal faces some regulatory hurdles, but analysts said they see no major problem. The company

may have to sell some TV stations to meet federal ownership rules, and Viacom's half-interest in the struggling UPN network may have to be sold or folded into CBS because of a rule that bars a company from owning more than one TV network.

The deal would be the latest transformation of CBS, which was founded in 1927 and became known as the "Tiffany Network" under the leadership of William Paley.

## UI project to search Mars for water

The low frequency is needed to penetrate the first several miles beneath the surface, he said.

etrate farther. High frequencies would be reflected at the surface."

The project will not determine exactly how much water Mars' surface holds but will discover if it is held underground, Plout said.

The Mars Express is scheduled to be launched in June 2003; if it misses that date, it will have to wait another two years. The orbits of the two planets have to coincide for the launch to be feasible.

"There is a very narrow window to get to Mars," Gurnett said. "It's every 780 days, roughly two years."

The project is moving swiftly, said Rich Huff, a research engineer and manager of Gurnett's engineering group. "Early prototypes should be ready in a few months' time," he said.

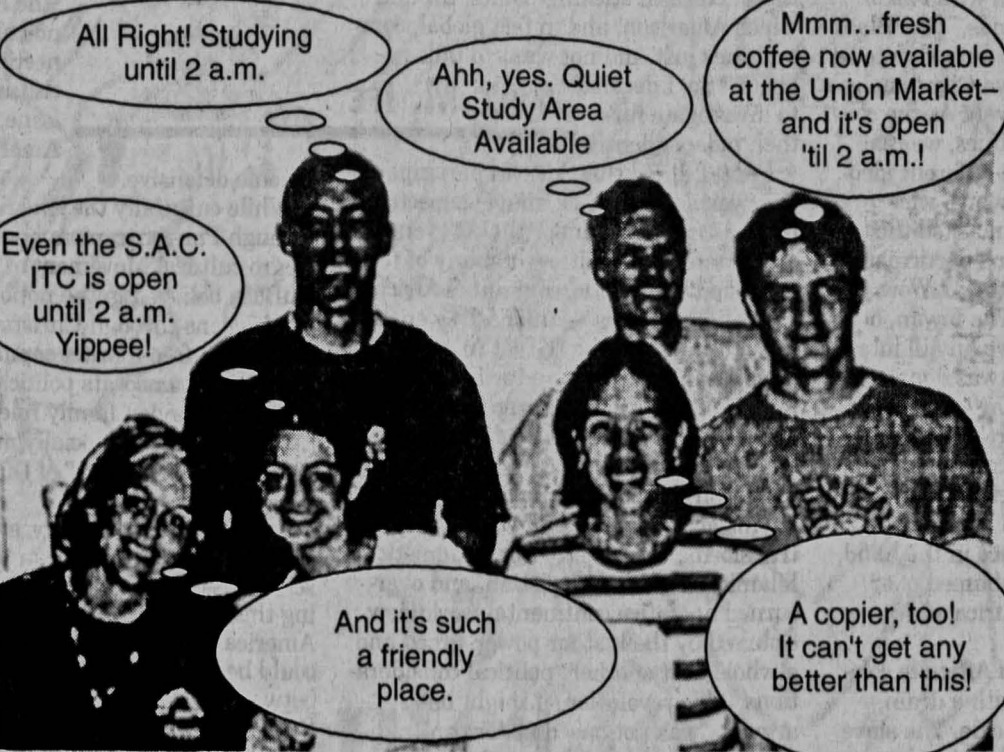

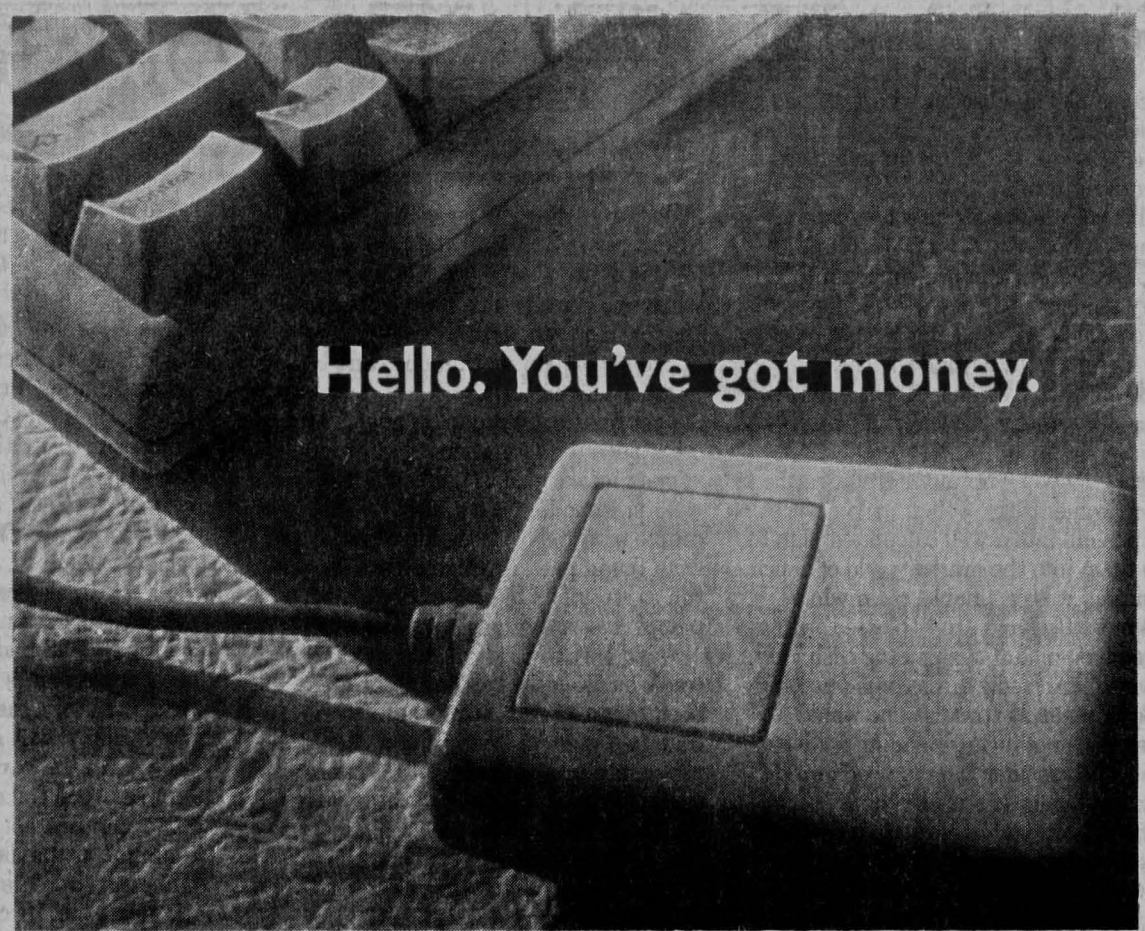

### ISIS improvements a step toward future

On Sept. 1, 1969, the first node of what would evolve into the Internet was installed at UCLA. How appropriate, then, that the UI would take the week of the Internet's 30th birthday to proudly take its first baby steps into the Information Age by announcing its much-anticipated ISIS upgrade.

Until now, the UI's great foray onto the Information Superhighway for purposes of grade retrieval, class registration and so forth was ISIS, a mainframe system. For students accustomed to the point-and-click interface of Macintosh and Windows operating systems, ISIS' archaic textual user interface is absurdly difficult to manipulate, requiring DOS-like commands such as "pine" and "v1."

ISIS' opening screen presents a suitable warning to its users: "Copyrights by IBM and by others, 1982, 1996." Yes, the UI's best effort at getting wired was out-of-date before President Reagan won a second term in office. Considering its meager beginnings, then, students were rightfully stunned by the dazzling World Wide Web version of ISIS now available for preview at <http://isis.uiowa.edu>.

The new ISIS presents a seamless point-and-click interface that rivals even Hotmail.com and Amazon.com in terms of ease-of-use. Everything students could possibly be looking for regarding their status at the UI is one click away. The registration process will be markedly easier for students, in that the upgraded ISIS will match course listings to course Web sites, as well as to course descriptions and even to campus maps.

Also, the new Web site will offer Hotmail-style, Web-based e-mail, allowing students to access their e-mail from anywhere in the world. This is certainly an improvement over the current system, which requires students to either tap into their e-mail via a third-party Web site (such as Hotmail) or by using an antiquated telnet interface. The entire "MyUIowa" interface is a marvelous collection of not only grade and course access but also financial information and news announcements that will keep students updated on campus activities.

Unfortunately, the upgraded ISIS lacks one feature that is clearly invaluable to the registration process: easy access to evaluations of course instructors. While course descriptions and campus maps are important, they are worth little if they offer no indication that the professor conducts class poorly.

For a first effort at an upgrade, though, the preview version of the new ISIS is a spectacular improvement over the current version of ISIS. The UI has finally taken its first leap into the Information Revolution of the 1990s ... just in time, by a year and four months, for the end of the century.

### I sold my soul to MasterCard

Everybody loves college freshmen. From the downtown bars seeking extra patronage to the cops who wait for unsuspecting patrons to stagger out of them, many are stirred by the annual influx of 18-year-olds onto the campus scene.

Nobody, however, appreciates new college entrants quite like the people at Visa and Mastercard. While businesses such as the Fieldhouse Restaurant & Bar certainly make their share of capital from the barely adult crowd, credit-card companies make an absolute killing, based on a tried-and-true process that guarantees the credit-card magnates fat paychecks after every fall.

This empire grasps its collegiate consumers innocently enough — from the innocuous fliers that are slipped into every student's bag at the bookstore to the casual booths on campus that offer free T-shirts. But beyond the cheaply made shirts, free water bottles and 3.9 percent interest rates lies something very sinister.

Students who encounter credit-card advertisements upon their arrival on campus fall into a well-calculated plan to lure them into the murky world of deficit spending. It is certifiable, meanwhile, that most students aren't blessed with an incredible amount of spending cash, and this is where credit cards come into play.

Good business strategy, one would guess, does not include lending credit to those who consider Ramen noodles a delicacy. But business sense becomes skewed in the twisted vortex of the college world. In this realm, passing out credit cards to those who can't really pay for them is perfect because they can't pay for them.

Asking cardholders to pay only \$15 each month while charging an interest rate near 20 percent is little more than a corporate stick-up. Those who would believe that they can take advantage of a credit-card company's outward generosity should realize that they are the ones being scammed.

I've been there, as have many others. Studies reveal that about three-quarters of college students own credit cards. The *Salt Lake Tribune* recently reported that the average credit-card debt among people in their 20s sits above \$2,000. Most, like myself, might have gotten their start at a booth somewhere on campus, lured by the promise of enticing gifts in addition to a credit card with their name on it.

I signed up mainly for the goodies, but the T-shirt I took home that day

ended up costing me more than \$600. A card came in the mail, and I set it aside for use in fiscal emergencies. Such as when one's car breaks down on the freeway or upon seeing that REO Speedwagon box set that one can't live another day without.

I got my start buying toothpaste and other such dazzling items, but gradually slipped into a spending tailspin that was well-documented in my bills over the next couple months. Not long after I recovered from the impact, my Mastercard fell victim to an unfortunate "accident" with a pair of scissors.

A sad loss, to be sure, but not nearly as tragic as the loss of money that I was beginning to notice. It has been more than two years since my credit-card phase, but interest rates and "finance charges" continue to dog me. After paying hundreds of dollars to the company over the past two years, my balance still lingers ominously in the triple digits — almost exactly what it was in the first place. The mathematics of it all still confound me.

Anyhow, prior experience prevents me from encouraging too many people to acquire plastic of their own. Granted, there are many who either have a greater amount of financial responsibility than poor saps like myself or have their parents footing the bills. In such cases, go ahead and charge it up.

Be forewarned, however, the world of credit cards is a dark and seedy place — one that I don't hope to go back to anytime soon.

At least not until I pay off what I owe from the last trip.

### On African participation in the slave trade

What can one say of the African participation in the Trans-Atlantic slave trade? Or, in the Arabian slave trade in the East for that matter?

This issue sets at the very core in race relations in America today, shaping African-American notions of identity, while at the same time acting as a thorn in modern international trade relations.

Recently, I shared lunch with two of my local "intellectual friends." One Black woman from New York — Brooklyn to be specific. The other, an Iowa City female who has traveled extensively. As the conversation moved on to politics, we realized that we all had quite different ideological frameworks from which we worked. Finally, the Iowan asked the New Yorker, "Well, Africans participated in the slave trade, didn't they?" Wow. Right between the eyes. The Iowan, of course, claimed not to have any ill intent in mind. But the damage was done.

It occurred to me that far too often, talk about the African participation in the slave trade is used as a political football or baseball bat. Either to wound, offend, but hardly ever to inform. Instead, it is used as an ace in the hand, to hide or celebrate, be ashamed of or proud. But this story of Africa and America is much more.

The story of the "fall" of Africa to colonialism actually begins with a drain, which started out as a trickle. The slave trade eventually engulfed Africa, leaving nothing untouched in all of West, Central and most of Southern Africa. It colors the relations between continental and diaspora Africans to this day, and finally, it is the sore spot that won't heal in American race relations. So, what do people really think about it?

Not too surprisingly, no one had much

to say about the subject. The Euro-American declined mostly so as not "to offend." Continental or diaspora Africans don't have much comment on it, either. It so occurred to me that this was one of these "cultural sticking-points" around which American, and in fact global, communities just "did not want to talk about." So, I decided to investigate further, independently.

First, I found that African participation was not minor, as many suspected, but was major. So major that it eventually led to the overthrow of many of the traditional animistic, communal African governing systems — themselves enslaving cultures. But the "Great African Revolution" that occurred with the import of foreign values and indigenous greed of power was the beginning of the end for the Africans, according to Basil Davidson's *The African Slave Trade*.

This accompanied a "revolutionary" transformation, mostly from Animistic to Islamic, then later Christian, and overturned an entire continental worldview. Spurred by the lust for power, greed and a whole host of other "political considerations," this revolution, it might be argued, "was not based in African traditional cultural at all!" (e.g., the rise of Dahomey — from a small satellite of the Great Yoruba/Oyo empires, to its masters.

But these betrayals and short-term gains led to the fall of the entire continental worldview. These mistakes should be studied and not repeated!

The lack of this type of information on

this unique, yet common, story of colonialization retards our abilities to study how and why Africans, and other victims, sold themselves out to foreigners and wound up losing everything. How and why do African-Americans, sometimes wrongly, romanticize Africa? Why do many believe, what E. Franklin Frazier argued at the early part of this century, that "the Negro has no cultural connection to African culture." On this issue, most black Americans would

become defensive. While culturally the American blacks, through Pan-Africanism and the New Negro cultural Movement of Locke and DuBois, believed in the notion of "civilizing Africans through Christianization religiously, free-market capitalism economically, Democrats politically and notions of gender, family roles through Bible-based values socially/morally" ... These are the "talents" of DuBois' "Talented Tenth!"

Looking at it differently, even DuBois' theory of African-American "double-consciousness," takes on a whole new meaning this way! The African-American, an American citizen of African descent, could be seen as being in a cultural dual between its African and black selves!! But the real question is: "Can Americans answer the tough questions of the 20th century?"

As the extremists in our midst continue to be the only voices heard, and our descendants continue to be lost, rootless and socialized by mass media, someone must be to blame ... but who is really at fault?

## Buddha reincarnated

and carefully handling ancient acetates.

"An old jazz guy once told me, 'I was too busy making a living to know I was making history,'" Miller relates. "That's kind of the situation we found ourselves in."

"People were too busy making music for here and now in 1935 to think that this Benny Goodman record was so special that 64 years later, its release would make history."

The fruits of those searches include Sinatra as you've never heard him before, singing with the Tommy Dorsey band before a live audience, and Waller rocking the house in a 1938 radio broadcast.

Those two albums are part of Buddha's *Stop Time* series, a collection of rare and historic records unearthed by Miller & Co. Glenn Miller and Louis Prima rarities were also in the first wave of these releases.

"I can't tell you how many times we've asked scholars, archivists, people in the studio, 'Have we heard this before?'" says Miller, who was stunned at

how often the answer was, "No."

"To find a new Benny Goodman, a Duke Ellington, early Sinatra ... what a treasure."

The originals were closer to tragedy than treasure: ancient 16-inch vinyl records, 15 minutes of music on each side. If discovered a decade ago, Miller says, they would have been historic but flawed.

Technology changed all that. Engineers were able to keep the music while losing the snaps, the crackles, the pops. It was time-consuming; Sinatra and the Dorsey Band were rescued by a five-day-a-week, 2½-month process to save the music while losing everything else.

"I had some sleepless nights," Miller confessed. But the final results were impressive.

Compilations kicked off with several volumes of *Big 12 Inches*, remixes of classic songs from the 1970s, '80s and '90s. The first three releases included a cross-section of dance hits, from Black Box's "Everybody, Everybody" to Vicki Sue Robinson's "Turn the Beat Around" to the Andrea True Connection's "More, More, More."

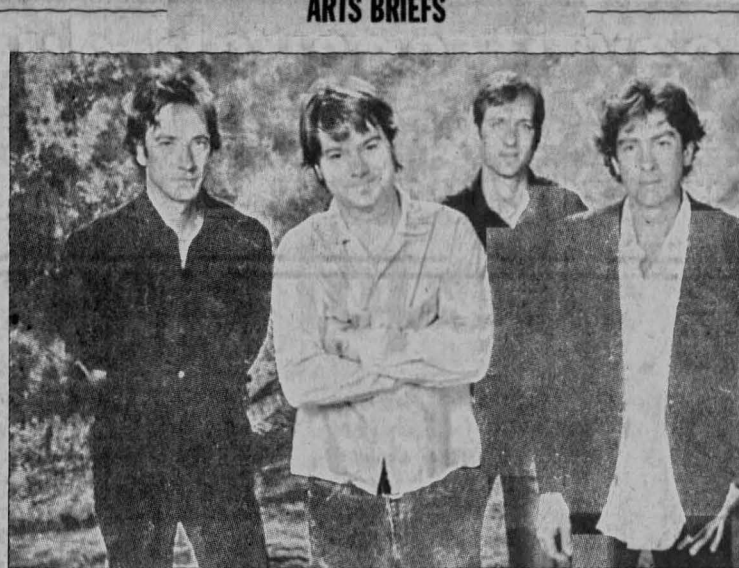

### Using traditional non-traditionally

The traditional forms of country, rock, blues and folk have been merged into a compound not as traditional as one would expect. Son Volt is the name, and something different is the game. This unique blend of country-influenced rock will be making its way to the Union Bar tonight.

The group's sound is founded upon the guitar, with various layers of musical additives ranging from harmonicas, dulcimers, piano, fiddle, violas, chamberlains, lap steels to the normal bass and drums.

Son Volt has been characterized as the creator of a country/rock that has several nameplates, such as "insurgent country," "yalternative" and "no depression music."

Son Volt first emerged in 1995 with *Trace*, which earned critical acclaim and considerable airplay on both video and radio with the first single, "Drown." Its second album, *Straightaways*, was released in 1997, and now the group is touring in support of its third album, *Wide Swing Tremolo*.

The music on *Wide Swing Tremolo* has a slightly harder edge than previous works. The group reached back to its garage-band roots for a more raw sound with the sweetness of country.

Its whole musical concept borders along the lines of experimental. Utilizing complex textures of varying instruments, the music on its latest release seems a little risky but a risk Son Volt was willing to take.

### Emory University library displays early letters of Malcolm X

ATLANTA (AP) — The only known collection of Malcolm X's personal letters and notes are on display at Emory University, and many offer a glimpse of him as a typical teen-ager who liked to jitterbug, admired pretty girls, and wanted to be a lawyer someday.

The writings differ from the public view of Malcolm X as a fiery orator and advocate of black nationalism.

"They are quite unique," James H. Cone of Union Theological Seminary in New York said Tuesday. Cone is the author of a 1992 book about Malcolm X and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

The only other known personal letters written by Malcolm X are in FBI files. The Emory collection — mostly letters and school notebooks written from 1938 to 1955, when Malcolm X was a teen-ager and young adult — is on long-term loan to the library.

Though not a large collection, the letters and notes could change the accepted view of Malcolm X's early years.

In his speeches and in his autobiography, the civil-rights leader described himself as a small-time hood who could barely read before he was converted to the Nation of Islam in prison.

But the early papers paint a much different picture. They show the 13- to 15-year-old Malcolm to be an articulate student who rarely misspelled words and usually used correct grammar. In one assignment, he wrote that he wanted to be a lawyer, a district attorney or a politician.

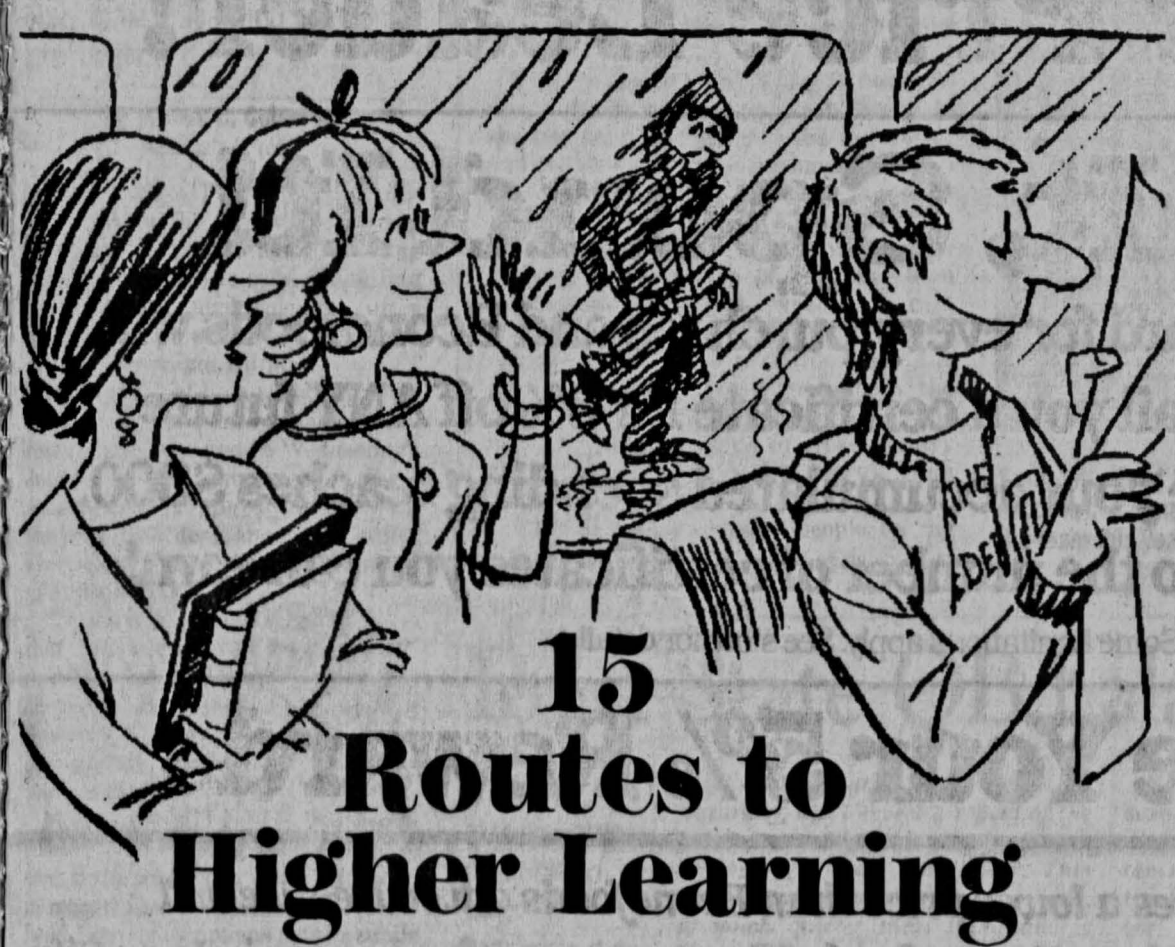

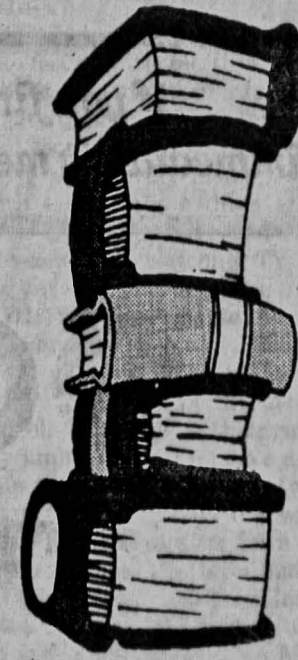

## Two head traumas troublesom

Young athletes who suffer multiple concussions are more likely to have learning problems later in life.

CHICAGO — Two or more concave blows to the head while playing sports can harm teen-agers' abilities for years to come, according to studies that suggest such injuries are more serious than some parents might think.

Nearly 63,000 high school athletes a year suffer mild concussions, researchers reported in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association. Young athletes with learning disorders appear to have even worse long-term problems from multiple concussions.

"This is a major public health problem that has been given short shrift," said Michael W. Collins, a neurologist at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit and a leader in the studies. "And this is information parents should know."

Most people still believe that a concussion means getting knocked out. But a concussion is any alteration in mental function after a blow to the head. Signs or symptoms may be a headache, dizziness, difficulty with balance or memory, confusion or personality change.

One of the studies did not measure the effects of concussions but how often they occurred in football, wrestling, soccer, basketball, baseball, field hockey and ice hockey at 235 high schools nationwide from 1995-96 through 1998.

There were 1,219 concussions reported, with 10 percent of them in football — 10 percent of them in football — students suffered two or more concussions.

The researchers led by John W. Posner, professor of kinesiology and an athletic trainer at Michigan State University. The researchers estimated more than 62,800 concussions among high school students nationwide annually in the sport studied.

# Darren Davis tops Hawkeyes' concern list

The Cyclone running back leads a favored Iowa State team into Saturday's game with the Hawkeyes.

For 15 years, Iowa football dominated Iowa State. After last year's loss, most Iowa fans aren't accustomed to their team being the underdog heading into Saturday's game at Ames.

For Kirk Ferentz, it's not that different. "My most vivid memories are losing (to Iowa State)," Ferentz said at his weekly press conference. "It's kind of a sick coach's mentality. I vividly remember getting beat in 1981 and 1982."

It may be a "sick" mentality, but perhaps it's an appropriate one as Ferentz prepares his players for a pivotal game against the in-state rival Cyclones. Iowa State is a four-point favorite in the game, which will start at 6 p.m. and be televised by Fox Sports-Chicago. Last season, the Cyclones were a 28-point underdog to the Hawkeyes.

The game will be a reunion of sorts for Ferentz and Iowa State coach Dan McCarney. They coached together as Iowa assistants under Hayden Fry during the mid-1980's. Ferentz said that he and McCarney still remain in contact from time to time, but they aren't as close as some might expect. Ferentz said that he doesn't send birthday cards to McCarney's family, though that's nothing unusual.

"I don't even send birthday cards to my own mother, or to my wife,"

Ferentz joked. Ferentz showed great respect for the Cyclones Tuesday, and he was most concerned about containing senior tailback Darren Davis. Ferentz compared Davis to all-time Big 12 great Barry Sanders. Davis terrorized the Iowa defense last year, rushing for 244 yards in Iowa State's shocking 27-9 victory at Kinnick Stadium.

"He's an excellent football player," Ferentz said. "At times, the guys lost

sight of the guy. He reads blocks well and comes out of the hole. Sometimes, boom, he comes out of there and there he goes."

Iowa's defenders were similarly complimentary. "He's tough," safety Matt Bowen said. "He's got the moves that some people can't even do in their dreams. I think he's better than he was last year. His legs look stronger, and he looks faster. It's scary."

The Iowa coach said he looks for Iowa State to show more of its offense against the Hawkeyes, taking into account that Indiana State is a Div. I-AA school.

"They played it close to the vest, but I look for more from them this week," Ferentz said.

During Iowa's upcoming practices, one thing that will be on the team's

## No longer running on empty

The newcomers include six past high school individual track or cross country state champions. One of the past high school state champions expected to contribute to this year's team is Sara Arens.

Last spring Arens was the Class 1-A Iowa state track champion in both the 1500 meter and 3000 meter runs. She holds six school records in cross country and track for Remsen St. Mary's High School.

"We didn't have many people on my

Iowa's men look to build on their first NCAA tournament bid in 32 years.

If last year was any indication of the future of Iowa men's cross country, 1998 could be one for the record books.

Coming off one of the most successful seasons in the history of Iowa cross country, coach Larry Wiecezorek is hoping the momentum carries over to this season.

"The experience and excitement of last year's team will pay big dividends this year," Wiecezorek said. "I hope to make a return trip to the NCAA meet."

Last season, Iowa automatically qualified for the NCAA Championships for the first time in 32 years. Nationally ranked for most of the season, the team finished 21st at the NCAA meet. They also recorded a fifth-place finish at the Big Ten meet.

Iowa lost its top two runners this season in Chad Schwitters and Stetson Steele. Both were past second-team all-Big Ten selections.

Their loss leaves a big hole to fill in the Hawkeye lineup. Coach Wiecezorek hopes the four returning runners who ran in last year's NCAA meet will be able to replace the loss of Schwitters and Steele.

"We will build around the top four guys we have returning off last year's team," Wiecezorek said. "Those guys need to step it up. It is their time now to fill in the one and two spots on our team."

The leading returner from a year ago is senior Paul Sarris who placed 18th at the NCAA regionals running a time of 31:38. He also placed second on the team at the NCAA meet.

# Iowa State QB balances school, football and family

After an intense battle in fall camp, Sage Rosenfels won the Cyclone quarterbacking job over Derrick Walker.

If Iowa State beats Iowa on Saturday, don't expect a repeat of the comments made last year by former Cyclone QB Todd Bandhauer. This year's starter, Junior Sage Rosenfels, is much quieter than Bandhauer. Some of that calmness can be attributed to the fact that at 21, Rosenfels is already a married man. This week, DI sportswriter Greg Wallace sat down with Rosenfels and talked about sharing time at quarterback, his connections to Iowa, and what it's like being married and quarterbacking a Division I football team at the same time.

DI: How are you dealing with sharing playing time with (fellow quarterback) Derrick Walker?

SR: Derrick and I both know that we're both going to be playing a lot in football games all season. It's a good feeling to know that the coaches have a lot of confidence in me to lead the team out there and do a good job.

DI: Is there any added pressure knowing that Derrick is going to be playing right behind you?

SR: I don't think it's added pressure at all. I think it's a good competitiveness. It's made us both a lot better since he came to school, and I think it's going to make our team better this whole season.

DI: What is your relationship like with Derrick?

SR: We're all teammates here. It's a Cyclone family. This guy may be at your spot, or even at a defensive position, but you're competitive on the field. But off the field, you have to help each other out, because the ultimate goal is to win football games. And (Walker) being a better player makes me a better player. That's what matters to me

most — to have a lot of good ballplayers on this team and win a lot of ballgames.

DI: What have you liked about your performance so far this fall?

SR: I thought I did a good job with organization and being the coach on the field in two-a-days and throughout since I've been here. The coaches only coach on the sidelines. They need someone to be out on the field to lead the team and gather them, and get them all going in the same direction, and I think that's something that I do really well.

DI: Is it hard being a married man and a Division I quarterback?

SR: The hard part is overrated. I think it's great. We still get to spend some time together. During the season it's tough, she (wife Maria) is taking a lot of hours and I'm taking classes too. Football takes up a lot of time, and traveling, but we make our time together count and we're excited for our future together.

DI: Does being married give

you a different perspective on things?

SR: I think it does. It puts things into focus a little bit. It makes you see what's important in life. And now, what's important is my family, school, and football. You want to make the most out of every moment you have with each of those three areas. The time that you do have, you don't want to waste it by watching TV or hanging out with your buddies.

DI: You're an eastern Iowa guy (Rosenfels is from Maquoketa). Were you recruited by Iowa?

SR: They did recruit me in high school, and I went to their camp after my junior year. They gave a scholarship to a kid from Iowa City West, a home town kid. That's fine with me. I was excited to come to Iowa State. It seemed to me like Iowa had been to their high level, and I was looking for a team that I could get into and bring up and improve, and Dan McCarney has really brought this program from almost nowhere to something really special.

### Pinches 3, Padres 1

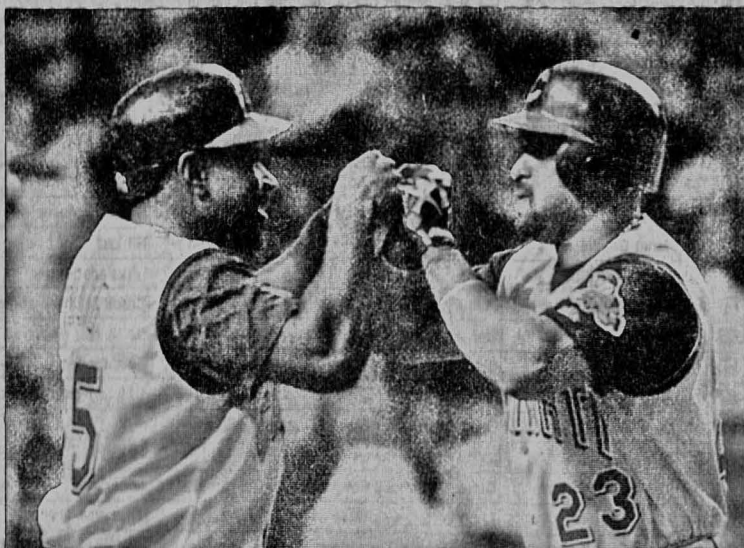

## Hingis, Williams breeze to semifinals

■ Rivals Martina Hingis and Venus Williams will meet in a much anticipated rematch at the U.S. Open.

NEW YORK — Neither seven double-faults by Venus Williams nor a whipping wind that sent shots flying as wildly as Wiffle balls in Martina Hingis' match could keep them from their inevitable rematch at the U.S. Open.

Two years after Hingis thrashed the inexperienced Williams in the final of her Open debut, the two will meet again in Arthur Ashe Stadium, this time in the semifinals.

"Last time, I honestly did not know what I was doing," Williams said of her 6-0, 6-4 loss to Hingis for the 1997 title. "I'm a different player now."

"The key for me is definitely to abandon all unforced errors. In order not to play her and myself, I have to stop making errors."

From 0-2 Tuesday, the top-ranked Hingis won 12 straight games amid stiff gusts to stroll into the semis with a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Anke Huber.

The wind died down a bit after a brief shower in the evening, and the No. 3 Williams unleashed an all-court attack that enabled her to overcome serving woes in a 6-4, 6-3 win against No. 12 Barbara Schett.

Williams dominated at the net and the baseline in the slugfest against the hard-hitting Schett, punctuating the first set with an overhead that caromed into the stands on set point. She broke Schett's service three times in the second set, the last time closing out the match with a backhand return that Schett couldn't touch.

Williams, 19, has won only three of her 10 matches against the 18-year-old Hingis.

Hingis couldn't quite get a bead on the balls Huber was sending her way during the first couple of games, and she couldn't tame the shots she was sending back.

Hingis' befuddlement didn't last long, though, as she demonstrated her talent for adjusting to difficult conditions and outthink opponents.

Players have complained about the wind in the stadium since it opened two years ago. But the remnants of tropical storm Dennis have buffeted the court for several days, making this year's conditions the worst so far.

"She used the wind very well today to her advantage," said Huber, who lost to Hingis for the ninth time in 10 matches. "She's just a very smart player, smarter than anybody else on the tour."

"The wind wasn't always against me, but it looked like it. I just overpowered the balls a little bit, made too many mistakes. It was very difficult because I play more aggressive than her. My shots are not as safe as hers. I thought maybe in these conditions, she's going to miss a little bit more, but she just

didn't make any easy mistakes or any mistakes at all."

Hingis eschewed modesty and agreed that she probably is the smartest player on the tour, at least when it comes to playing in the wind.

"Today I used the wind very much," she said. "I was able to handle it better than her. She was getting frustrated with the serve. It feels like weightlifting when you play against the wind. You basically have no control if the other player is just as smart. I would take advantage of that."

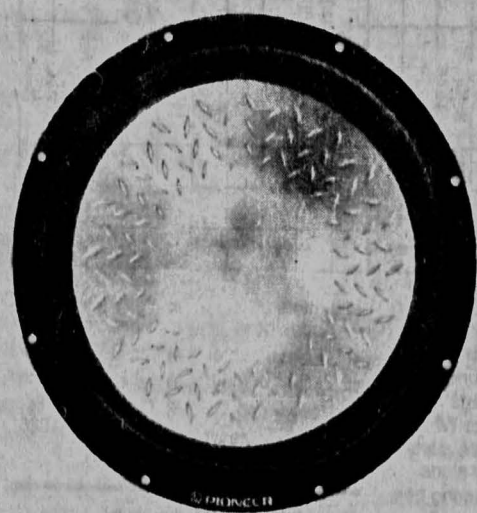
"The time wasn't important," said Greene, the 100-meter world

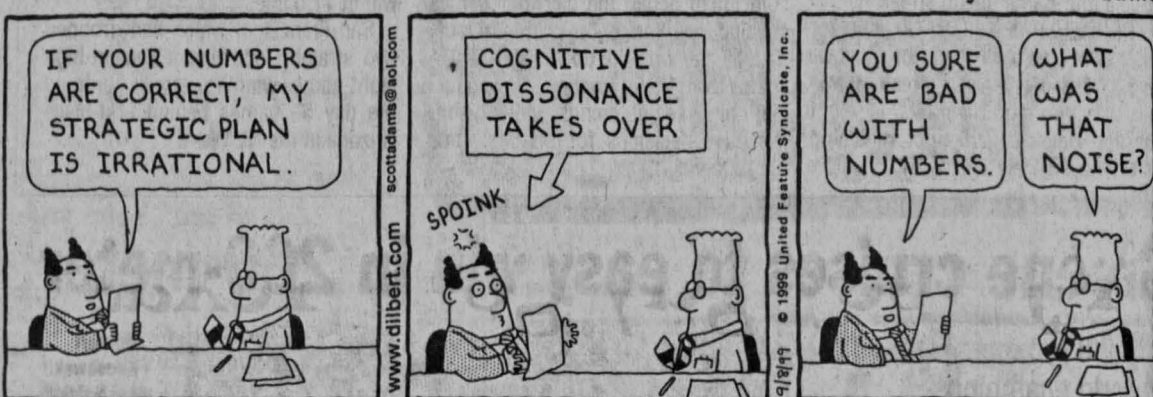

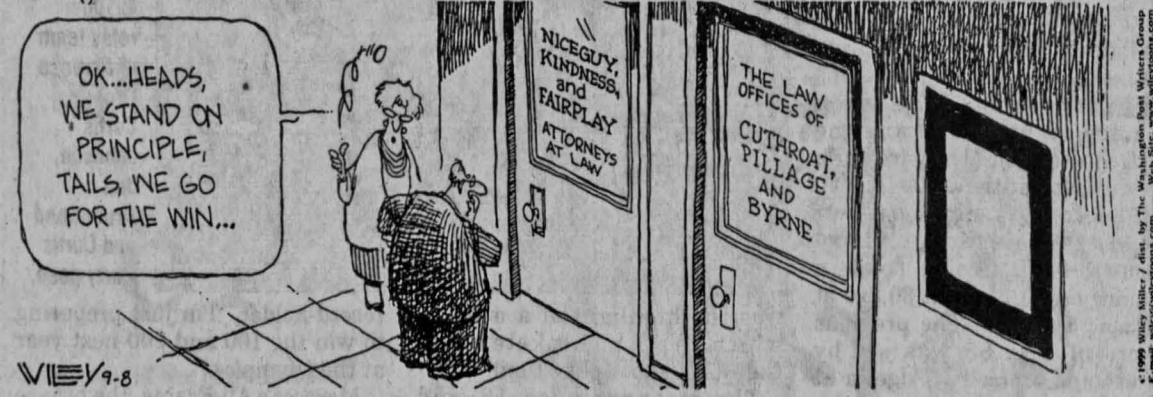

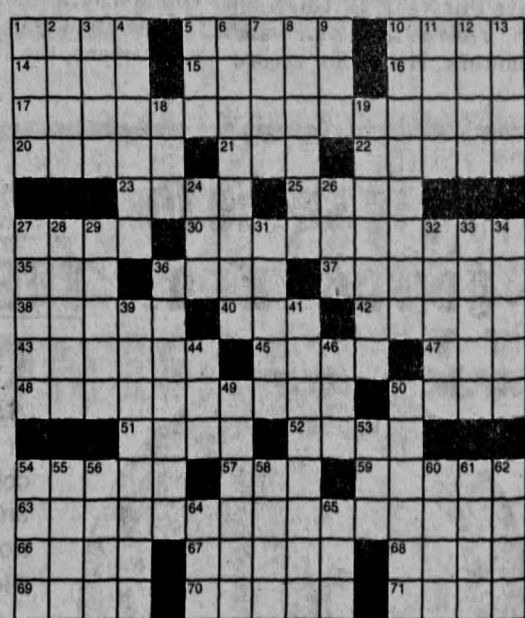

# Where's Rambo?

## OSU's Rambo remains patient after early disappointment

COLUMBUS, Ohio — After two years watching from the sidelines, the Kickoff Classic was supposed to be Ohio State flanker Ken-Yon Rambo's coming-out party.

Some party. After catching one pass for a single yard in Ohio State's 23-12 loss to Miami 10 days ago, a lot of feverish Buckeye fans are wondering what has become of the player touted as one of the top recruits in the nation.

"We've got 12 more games to go," the 6-foot-1, 190-pound junior said. "I'm still looking to catch a lot of passes and keep contributing to the team."

More than most first-time starters, Rambo carries the weight of exorbitant expectations on his shoulders.

The kid with the colorful surname came to Columbus after a glittering high school career that marked him as a worthy successor to Paul Warfield, Cris Carter, Terry Glenn and Joey Galloway in Ohio State's pantheon of receiving greats. He caught 79 passes for 1,096 yards and 17 touchdowns in 13 games as a senior at Long Beach (Calif.) Poly and was listed

as a USA Today first-team All-American.

Everyone raved about his speed, his instincts and his hands. Ohio State's media guide describes him as "the athletic, graceful, extremely fast and talented Ken-Yon Rambo."

Yet he spent most of his first two college seasons watching from the sideline. Unable to beat out incumbent Dee Miller, he returned 16 kickoffs for a 21.1-yard average and caught only 12 passes.

When Miller graduated last spring, many thought Rambo would finally step into the spotlight. But in his first game as a starter, the Buckeyes only threw his direction twice.

"Why didn't Rambo get the ball more?" Ohio State head coach John Cooper repeated. "I think they schemed us pretty good. Maybe we should have gotten him the ball more. But they did a nice job on him."

The Hurricanes throttled Rambo and wide receiver Reggie Germany by positioning their cornerbacks off the line and then playing combination coverages.

"It seemed they were scared of our speed," Rambo said.

Meanwhile, Ohio State had breakdowns elsewhere on offense. The line did not offer much protection for quarterback Austin Moherman, who was starting his first game. As a result, Moherman didn't have time to look for anyone other than the primary receiver.

"It wasn't that he wasn't seeing me," Rambo said. "He didn't have a lot of time back there. They had him shaken up."

Moherman said it wasn't Rambo's fault.

"Everybody's making a big deal out of Ken-Yon only having one catch," Moherman said. "But Ken-Yon did what he was supposed to do."

Doing a good job blocking and running routes doesn't show up in the stats, however. Fans are already howling that Rambo's speed is not being utilized.

A year ago, Ohio State's starting wide receivers averaged 12 catches and 196 yards receiving a game — but that was with Big Ten player of the year Joe Germaine throwing the ball. Rambo and Germany totaled five catches for 57 yards with a rookie quarterback.

Cooper said the 13th-ranked Buckeyes must get the wideouts back in the game plan if they hope to beat 14th-ranked UCLA Saturday. Otherwise, Ohio State could open 0-2 for the first time in 13 years.

UCLA stopped recruiting Rambo three years ago when he didn't meet freshman eligibility requirements. When he finally did make the grade, he narrowed his choice to Southern Cal and Ohio State because both continued to recruit him.

Rambo's position coach, Chuck Stobart, is confident that Rambo will have an impact.

"Ken-Yon is just a guy waiting for the opportunity. He's no different than what Terry Glenn was for a long time, or Dee Miller was or Dimitrios Stanley was," Stobart said, referring to three other late-blooming Buckeye receivers in recent years. "All those guys waited for their time to have the ball thrown to them. They waited a sufficient time until they could make plays."

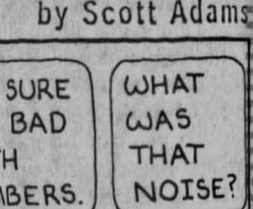

when freshmen were due. Having no car in town, he asked the hotel for help. It sent the hotel limousine service, a garish white van with leather seats and a wet bar. The van, and the two women attendants dressed in black suits and ties, left Simms feeling a bit sheepish.

"I told my mom I'm not riding in that. I knew I was never going to live it down," Simms said.

Longhorns players took one look at that on the evening news and dubbed Simms "Limo."

"As soon as the varsity got here, they had seen it on TV, they were like, 'What are you doing?' he said.

Simms loves the Italian food back home but is enamored of Texas barbecue.

"I can't recall one barbecue joint (in New Jersey)," Simms said. "I love barbecue. They make fun of me because I go out to dinner a lot and I eat barbecue almost every night."

Crawfish are another story. "They've got like tentacles ... I'll never eat the stuff."

His New Jersey accent and clothes — lots of blacks and grays and jeans slung low on his hips — sometimes prompts jokes from teammates who have never been east of the Mississippi.

"A lot of my friends call me the Italian Stallion," said Simms, who with a shock of blond hair and blue eyes looks about as Italian as Boomer Esaison.

"They're used to more happier colors here." The trip home will mean another chance for his dad to watch him play. ABC cut away to Phil Simms watching from the stands during the Stanford game, looking very hot in the 94-degree weather.

"It's fun watching him sit in

the stands and suffer in the heat having to watch me," Simms said. "I had to do it for him the for first 13 years of my life."

Simms was 3 of 7 passing in the fourth quarter when the game was all but over. After the touchdown, he spread his arms and ran around as if he were flying.

"I was like a kid in a candy store the first time," he said. "I couldn't get the smile off my face."

The debut wasn't perfect. His first two passes were batted down at the line.

"I'm 6-foot-5 and couldn't get it over the line. I couldn't believe that," Simms said.

Simms' toughest challenge may be living up to the expectations. Even with the return of quarterback Major Applewhite, the 1998 Big 12 freshman of the year, some fans speculated he could contend for the starting role.

Although coach Mack Brown has never indicated that's even a possibility, Applewhite has seemed to respond to Simms' presence. He's thrown for 669 yards and four touchdowns in two games.

Applewhite, one of the first to congratulate Simms on his touchdown pass, says the two have worked well together.

"It doesn't bother me," Applewhite said. "The backup QB is probably the most popular guy on the team."

# Cyclones being cautious with Iowa

■ Iowa State is not getting overconfident heading into its game against the Hawkeyes on Saturday.

AMES — Iowa State's football players are taking no chances.

Favored against Iowa for the first time in years, the Cyclones don't want to say anything the Hawkeyes could use as bulletin board material prior to Saturday's game in Ames.

So as the ISU players took turns talking to reporters on Tuesday, it was all plain vanilla.

They're preparing as if it's just another game, they said. Yes, Iowa State won last year to break a 15-game losing streak against Iowa, but that means nothing because this is a new year.

Iowa's offensive line looked weak in the Hawkeyes' 42-7 loss to Nebraska last Saturday, but the Iowa State defensive players weren't about to say that. Nor were they willing to talk about how they might exploit any weakness in that area.

"We say how we feel," safety Dustin Avey said. "We don't want to say something that might be taken in the wrong way or put in newspapers or put on TV in the wrong way."

"Our job is to go out and play," he said. "We don't want to be distracted or have our football team distracted with negative publicity."

Avey even pulled out the he-doesn't-read-the-newspapers cliché.

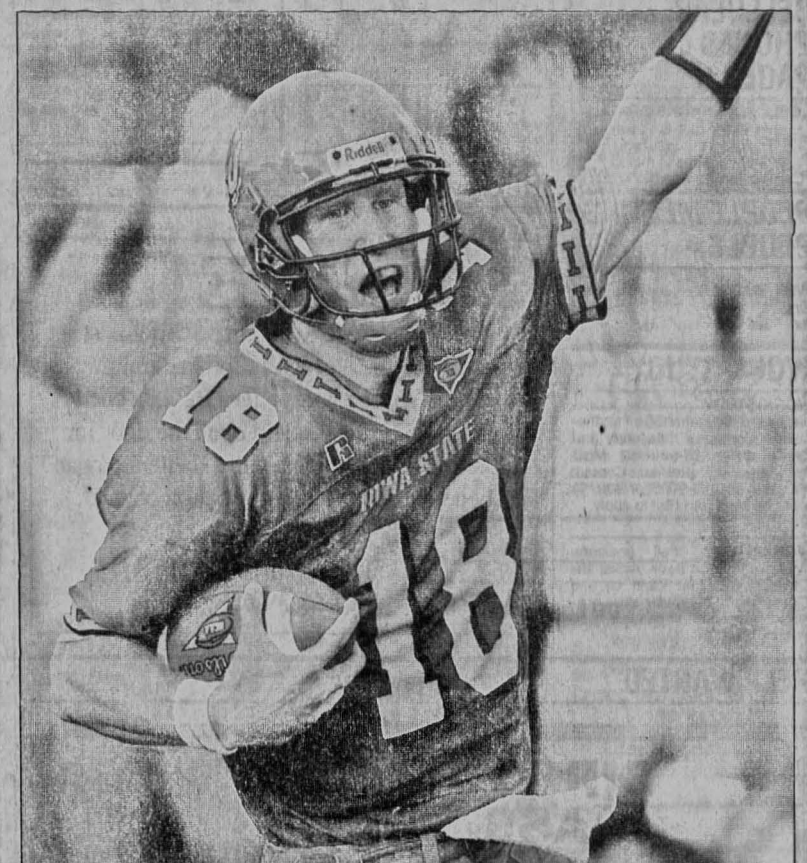
"You've got to concentrate on the game at hand and not worry about outside distractions, what people are saying, what predictions might come out," he said.

But as he was leaving, Avey turned to the note-taking reporters and said with a smile, "Don't take the newspaper comment too seriously."

Defensive end Kevin DeRonde also mouthed the familiar.

"We won last year, but that was last year. This is a new season. We have to do it, bottom line."

But DeRonde at least said he was looking forward to the game, which begins at 6 p.m. and will be televised nationally by Fox Sports Net.

"That just helps us get the support of the state behind us. That's very crucial. Especially as we go into the Big 12 season, we need all the support we can get."

Iowa State, which opened the season with a 33-7 victory over Indiana State, is favored by 4 points against Iowa. Tight end Mike Banks said he didn't even know the Cyclones were favored. Coach Dan McCarney knew but said it didn't make any difference.

## Husker Stadium renovation nearing finish

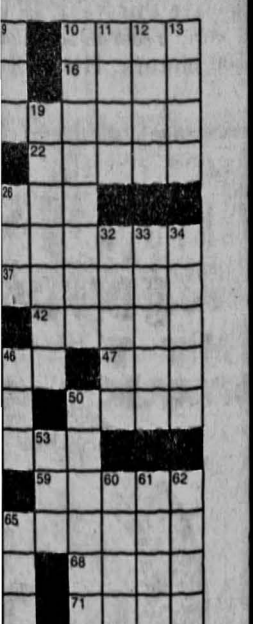
LINCOLN, Neb. — There may still be a stray drop cloth or can of paint found in the newly renovated Memorial

# Westbrook is healthy and ain't misbehavin'

■ Former Colorado star Michael Westbrook is having his best summer ever for the Redskins.

ASHBURN, Va. — When the Washington Redskins run wind sprints at the end of practice, Michael Westbrook is often near the back of the pack — sometimes loafing to finish dead last. On the attendance chart for summer workouts posted in the basement of Redskin Park, Westbrook was among the most frequent no-shows.

Last month, in the second exhibition game, Westbrook ran a pass route poorly in the end zone, leading to a sack. As a result, coach Norv Turner kept Westbrook in the game until the fourth quarter to give his receiver more work.

Yet the verdict is unanimous: This has been Westbrook's best summer since he was drafted No. 4 overall in 1995.

"Mike has picked it up," passing game coordinator Terry Robiskie said. "He's had a great camp. He hasn't led as far as making

tremendous plays and doing those things, but he has showed signs of maturing and being a leader."

Coaches are quick to praise Westbrook, and perhaps overlook a few things, because of two things: He hasn't misbehaved, and he hasn't been injured.

"It's the first time I've been healthy through the whole camp," Westbrook said. "It's been a lot of fun. I'm just really, really, more anxious than a lot of people around here to get this thing going."

When the ball's in play, Westbrook has been adjusting to a subtle change in position, from the "X" split-end receiver to "Z," the flanker. The "Z" receiver lines up a yard or so behind the line of scrimmage, allowing the Redskins to put Westbrook in motion before the snap in an attempt to throw off coverage.

"Z's easier than X," Westbrook said. "Not saying I couldn't handle X, but it's no big deal because Z is so easy."

When the ball's not in play, Westbrook has stayed out of trouble. He hasn't punched a teammate — as he did two years ago when he decked Stephen Davis and drew a \$50,000 fine. He hasn't ripped off his helmet to protest a call — as he did in 1997 against the Giants, drawing a penalty that cost his team valuable yards in overtime. And he hasn't failed to show for practice without a valid excuse — as he did one Saturday last year, prompting a two-game benching from Turner.

"There's been more ups than downs, but the downs were such big downs," Westbrook said. "I've

had three incidents in the four years since I've been here. Two of them were totally blown out of proportion, and the one that wasn't blown out of proportion, it was of such magnitude that I dug myself a really big hole with that one. But I came back and it's over and in the past."

The Redskins could have coped with the "downs" a little

better had Westbrook stayed healthy and productive. He has missed 16 games because of injuries over four years, and his best season was last year's 44 catches for 736 yards.

Westbrook missed the last three games in 1998 with a serious neck injury that required offseason surgery, but he said he's had no lingering effects.

# Ex-Hawk Hanks cut by 49ers

■ After nine years with San Francisco, former Hawkeye Merton Hanks was let go.

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Nine-year free safety Merton Hanks, a former Pro Bowl player known for his neck-shaking chicken dance after big plays, was surprisingly cut by the San Francisco 49ers Tuesday.

The release of the popular veteran and team leader was primarily dictated by salary cap constraints in the aftermath of a trade earlier Tuesday with Green Bay for cornerback Craig Newsome.

The 49ers saved more than \$1 million in cap room by releasing Hanks, who was the NFC's starter in four of the past five Pro Bowls.

He was coming off his worst season, however, and barely survived an offseason salary cap purge during which general manager Bill Walsh lopped off \$28 million in player payroll to get the 49ers under the cap.

"Merton Hanks has been a terrific player for us for nine years," Walsh said in a statement. "He has been a Pro Bowl performer and a dynamic personality on this team. It's truly one of the most difficult decisions we had to make. He's one of those guys who will

never completely be replaced."

It was a player's off day at the team's headquarters in Santa Clara and Hanks wasn't immediately available for comment.

Known as a ball-hawking playmaker, Hanks established himself as one of the game's best free safeties. Hanks has 31 career interceptions, including 29 since he became a fulltime starter in 1993.

He often celebrated his picks by breaking into a dance, punctuating the celebration with a wide wagging of his neck.

Last season was a tough one for Hanks, though. He was beaten several deep pass plays, including one in which Green Bay's Antonio Freeman zipped past him and Marquez Pope for an 80-yard touchdown on the first play of a 36-22 loss to the Packers last November.

Hanks also was involved in the play epitomizing the end of San Francisco's season last year when Jamal Anderson bowled him over en route to a touchdown in Atlanta's 20-18 playoff victory over the 49ers.

Walsh, who traded such veterans as two-time Pro Bowl guard Kevin Gogan in the cap purge, openly suggested he would deal or release Hanks because of the team's economic concerns before the side restructured his contract.

But the continued strong play of Bronson and a poor preseason by Hanks made his release more palatable to San Francisco.



# Same old Lions, with or without Sanders

■ Greg Hill is the new man in town, but he's not going to be able to replace Detroit's Barry Sanders.

PONTIAC, Mich. — After having Barry Sanders call their own, it's doubtful any running back will ever be revered by Detroit Lions fans again. Greg Hill, picked up in a trade just before the end of the preseason, seems to know that.

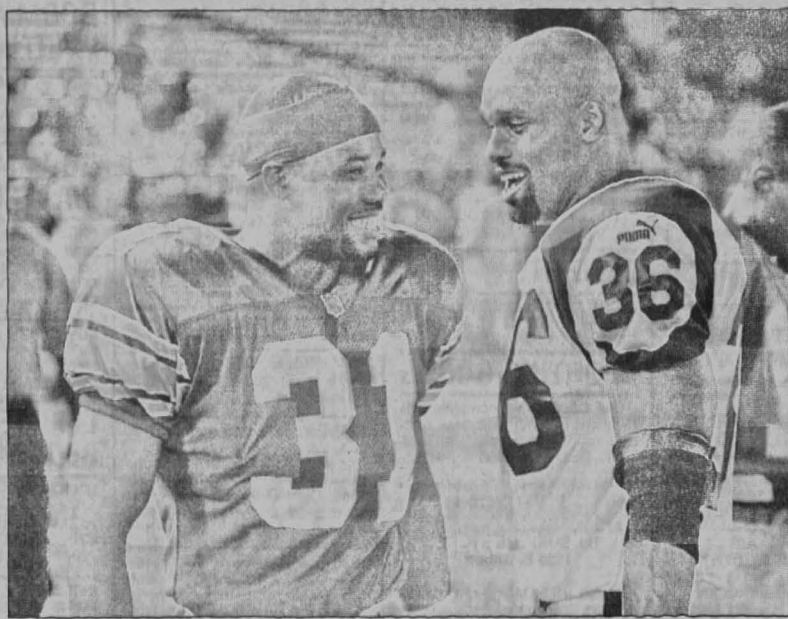
"I'm not the next Barry Sanders," Hill said. "In fact, I won't even be the main G. Hill in this town. I believe that honor would go to that Grant Hill guy, plays some hoops for the Pistons."

Smart. Does his homework.

Still, it's not likely to help the Lions much. The club went 5-11 last season with the most exciting running back in football in the lineup. That wasn't much fun, and Sanders retired despite needing only 1,458 yards to break Walter Payton's NFL career rushing record of 16,726 yards.

There is absolutely no reason to believe they'll do any better with Hill and backup Ron Rivers trying to pick up the slack left by Sanders' exit.

Even coach Bobby Ross admits

that much. But the coach prefers to put a little spin on the woeful situation that could cost him his job.

"There's no way you're going to be able to replace somebody of Barry Sanders' talents and the unique things he can do on the field," Ross said. "But we have the capability of having a more reliable ground game than what people may think."

With Sanders in the backfield, opponents would bring anywhere from seven to nine defenders near the line of scrimmage last season. The theory was that with rookie Charlie Batch playing quarterback, there wasn't much danger of getting burned through the air.

They would take Sanders out of the game and dare Batch to beat

them. Obviously, he couldn't do it often. So, only if Batch can play beyond his age and experience this season do the Lions have much chance of improving.

"I feel as if we are moving forward," said Batch, who completed 57.1 percent of his passes last season. "We just need to stop beating ourselves with penalties and stuff."

There was no sign of improvement in that area during the exhibition season. The Lions went 1-3, wrapping it up with a 17-6 loss to the St. Louis Rams in which Detroit drew nine penalties for 74 yards.

"We didn't do what we are capable of doing in training camp, and that's not a good thing," said Herman Moore, one of the league's

best receivers. "But I'm still very optimistic, because I know how good we can be once we get going."

Whatever it takes, Ross has to push the right buttons. He was so angry, he asked the NFL if he could fine players who commit dumb penalties. His request was denied, so he makes them run extra laps.

But he clearly is frustrated by the situation.

"To me, people have to be competitive," Ross said. "You've got to have a fire for this game. You've got to have that and I don't care whether it's in checkers or tiddly-winks or whatever the case."

On the plus side, Batch has four good receivers to throw to in Moore, Johnnie Morton, Germane Crowell and Brian Stabile. Tight end David Sloan also can catch.

But not even Hall of Famer Bobby Layne, still the benchmark for Detroit quarterbacks, could throw from the seat of his pants. And that's going to be a challenge for Batch, especially with the offensive line riddled by injuries.

Rookie Aaron Gibson, expected to play one tackle, is out for the season with a shoulder injury. Center Mike Compton will miss a few more weeks with a knee injury. Ray Roberts will start at left tackle and Jeff Hartings at right guard. The rest of the line will be patchwork.

The defense is solid across the front with Robert Porcher, James Jones, Luther Elliss and Travis Kirschke, who replaces Tracy Scroggins (knee surgery). The linebacking corps is decent with top draft pick Chris Claiborne, Stephen Boyd and Allen Aldridge.

# Schlichter pleads innocent to new charges

ANDERSON, Ind. (AP) — Former NFL quarterback Art Schlichter's gambling addiction could send him back to prison.

Released last week after serving less than half of a four-year sentence, Schlichter pleaded innocent Tuesday to new charges that he used prison pay phones to bet on football and hockey games through a Las Vegas bookmaker last November.

Schlichter was incarcerated at the time at the Correctional Industrial Facility in Pendleton. He was transferred to another state prison in Plainfield after prosecutor Rodney Cummings issued warrants on four misdemeanor counts of illegal gambling.

"There was an additional count of check deception from an incident in 1995 that had been pending," Cummings said Tuesday after the initial hearing in Anderson City Court. "I suspect it was because he was incarcerated, so there are five counts, not just the four for unlawful gambling."

A trial date of Nov. 17 was set.

Schlichter admitted to an Indiana State police investigator that he "had a relapse and needed help," according to a report published Aug. 26 in the Herald Bulletin of Anderson.

Schlichter, who won early release by earning two college degrees behind bars through Ball State University, avoided transfer to the Madison County Jail by posting \$5,000 bond, Cummings said.

The charge of check deception carries a maximum sentence of one year. Each of the four gambling charges could add 180 days. If convicted, Schlichter could be ordered to serve consecutive sentences.

In 1997, Schlichter was sentenced to four years in prison on charges of theft, forgery and fraud in connection with the theft of \$800,000 to support his gambling habit. Before beginning his Indiana prison term, Schlichter served a federal sentence in Kentucky for a probation violation. He surrendered to Indiana authorities Jan. 26, 1998.
