Gas leak may have caused explosion

■ The Usovskys' "dream house" lies in ruins, as six survivors receive treatment at the UIHC.

RICHLAND, Iowa - The dream house that Jerry Usovsky built for his wife and two daughters lay in a heap of rubble Tuesday after an explosion that killed seven people and injured six others.

Friends said Usovsky had carefully landscaped the home and put several custom touches in the kitchen - glass shelves suspended from the kitchen ceiling and a Jenn-Air gas grill with an open flame.

Maria Reif, one of the first people on the scene after the blast Monday afternoon, said Usovsky kept saying, "The grill. The grill," unit at UI Hospitals and Clinics.

State Fire Marshal Roy Marshall said the explosion "may have been fueled" by liquid propane gas.

Fire Chief Mike Hadley said pressure tests had detected a break in the LP line leading into the house from a 500-gallon tank outside. The large propane tank behind the home was untouched in the explosion.

"There was raw LP coming out of the line," Hadley said. "We can't tell you that is the cause, but that's where the investigation is centered."

Hadley said the %-inch copper line, buried just 4 inches deep, was severed a few days earlier while Usovsky was building a pen for the family's new dog. The break was found 81/2 feet from the

After receiving a last-minute invitation to a Labor Day party in Richland, Iowa, from soccer buddy Trey Gartner, Josh Kleinmeyer's family says he's fortunate to be alive.

The party was held at a house in Richland that exploded and burned Monday, killing seven people and

"He's a great little boy, and we're very lucky he's still with us," said Josh Kleinmeyer's aunt, Celeste Kleinmeyer-Shoppa.

Ten-year-old Josh does not remember the tragic events — which is a good thing, Kleinmeyer-Shoppa said.

"He remembers one minute being on the couch and the next minute not being on the couch," she said. "He's in and out; they're keeping him sedated so he can rest. He doesn't seem to remember what exactly happened."

Even though the Kleinmeyer family is relieved that Josh is doing well, they empathize with the families that weren't so lucky, Kleinmey-

er-Shoppa said. "The fact that six lived and seven didn't puts things into perspective; we're glad for Josh," she said.

Josh is recovering well at the Ul

Hospitals and Clinics, she said. "He's doing fine - he had surgery

Merger, she wrote: Viacom buys CBS

■ The deal establishes a media behemoth to rival Time Warner and Disney.

NEW YORK - Viacom Inc. is buying CBS Corp. in the richest media merger in history - a \$36 billion deal that combines the owner of hip properties such as MTV and VH1 with the old-line network that brought you "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote."

CBS, which changed hands just four years ago when it was bought by Westinghouse Electric Corp., will now become part of a radio, TV and film powerhouse to rival such conglomerates as Time Warner Inc. and Walt Dis-

Viacom will own last season's toprated TV network, as well as Paramount Studios, MTV, VH1, Nickelodeon and the Simon & Schuster publishing house.

The new company will be called Viacom, but the CBS name - which carries the legacy of Walter Cronkite and Edward R. Murrow - will remain on the network.

"We will be global leaders in every facet of the media and entertainment industry, financially strong from day one, with an enviable stable of global brands," said Viacom Chairman Sumner Redstone.

Redstone will be chairman and chief executive of the new entity, but CBS management will have a major role. CBS President Mel Karmazin, 56, will be president and chief operating officer, becoming heir apparent to Redstone, who is 76.

Analysts praised the deal as a good fit. CBS will get a TV and film studio to provide shows for its network, while Viacom gains major advertising outlets to promote the films and shows produced by Paramount and its Spelling Entertainment TV studio.

"It's a good deal for everybody," said Chris Dixon, a media analyst at PaineWebber Inc. "You need to be big.

You need to have a global presence." While many of Viacom's properties

have catered to a youthful audience,

UI project to scan surface of Mars for underground water

in the distant past."

The university was awarded \$4 million to design a waterdetecting radar to be used by the Mars Express.

A low-frequency antenna constructed by a UI engineering team will help a European Space Agency mission answer the astronomical question of what happened to the water on Mars.

The UI team received \$4 million from NASA to design and build the Mars Advanced Radar for Subsurface and Ionospheric Sounding in collaboration with NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., and

the University of Rome for the Mars Express spacecraft, said Donald Gurnett, a UI physics professor and coinvestigator of the project.

"We received formal notification that we had been selected for the project on Aug. 4," he said.

The UI's part of the project includes the antenna that will search for water beneath the Martian surface and study the ionosphere in the Martian atmosphere by scanning below the red planet's surface, Gurnett said.

Mars appears to be as dry as the Sahara, but evidence has long suggested that water once flowed over its blighted surface, he said. "Mars looks like a desert," Gurnett

said. "It is pretty clear that there

was water on the surface sometime

Effects of the water erosion, such

as canyons and riverbeds, are readily observable on the surface, but exactly what happened to the water is a mystery.

"One explanation is the water evaporated and was lost to space," Gurnett said. "The other is that the water is in the ground."

If the second explanation is correct, the water would be frozen in a permafrost state, such as what exists in much of Alaska.

"The temperature seldom gets above freezing on the surface," Gurnett said. "As you go down, the temperature gets above the melting point; it becomes water.'



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

Report: UI faculty busy with research and creative production

Faculty at the UI are heavily involved in scholarly research and creative production, according to the findings of a Faculty Senate questionnaire presented at a meeting of the UI Faculty Council Tuesday.

The main purpose of the anonymous questionnaire was to develop data concerning faculty involvement in scholarly productivity, artistic creation and service. The survey was conducted "in order to see whether we could develop criteria to measure faculty productivity in areas other than teaching," said Jon Carlson, a law professor and the president of the Faculty Senate. The most surprising finding was

were actively involved in institutional administration and service more than 50 percent, or approximately 600 of the 1,131 faculty members who responded.

Mathematics Professor Dennis Roseman said he didn't respond to the questionnaire but wasn't surprised at the findings because most faculty members do research in order to receive promotions.

"We have a lot of young faculty, and if you want to get promoted, you are required to do research," he

Analysis of the data revealed that some categories were too ambiguous to yield useful data, Carlson said. Some participants interpreted the questions more broadly than intended, and some recorded very large amounts of time, he said.

"It seems to me that the results of the survey are more or less accurate," Carlson said.

Hanus was transferred to Hamilton City Hospital in Webster City; upon his release, ocal police arrested him on a Public Safety warrant, Papke said.

"I don't even remember doing it," Hanus said. "I was on different medica-

Hanus said he made no comments about the victim's sexual preference but does remember being annoyed about control over the TV.

Ex-secretary Cisneros agrees to plea bargain

WASHINGTON — Former Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros pleaded guilty Tuesday to a single misdemeanor count of lying to the FBI, ending a four-year investigation by an independent counsel.

Cisneros appeared before U.S. District Judge Stanley Sporkin to acknowledge that during his background checks for a post in the Clinton administration, he falsely told FBI investigators that he had paid his former lover no

more than \$2,500 monthly.

Under terms of the plea agreement, Cisneros will pay a \$10,000 fine but will face no jail time and no probation. A government official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the deal with prosecutors also called for Cis-

neros to make a statement to the court taking responsibility for his

The plea came at the start of the former San Antonio mayor's trial on 18 felony counts that he conspired with one-time paramour Linda Jones to conceal from the FBI the scope of his payments of more than \$250,000.

"I accept responsibility for the conduct as outlined," Cisneros told the court, adding that future aspirants to public office should learn that "truth and candor are important."

Sporkin, in accepting the plea agreement that he initially said he thought was too lenient, said: "I know there will be some second-guessing about this plea.

"I don't think the office of independent counsel had much choice in this matter," he said, defending the work of prosecutor David Barrett. But, the judge added: "We cannot permit an individual to lie his way into public office."

"We are just glad to have this over and done with," Barrett told reporters, declining further comment. But in a prepared statement, he implicitly defended his \$9 million-plus investigation.

"This disposition should in no way be viewed as minimizing the serious ethical breach by Mr. Cisneros," the statement read. "However, a just disposition of any prosecution must include an evaluation of the defendant's overall conduct. In this case, the conduct, while egregious, was committed by a person whose life has been otherwise dedicated to public service, and this fact must season the final decision."

Cisneros left the courthouse without talking to reporters.

The plea came just as the process of jury selection in the high-profile case was about to get under way.

Cisneros had been named in an 18-count federal indictment charging that while he was being considered for a Cabinet post in Clinton's first administration, he conspired with Jones to conceal the scope of payments he made to her. He had initially pleaded innocent.

Jones, who herself ran afoul of

the independent counsel prosecuting Cisneros, was to be the government's star witness. But her credibility had come under serious attack from Cisneros' high-dollar legal team. She had agreed to testify against her ex-lover in a bid to gain a reduction in her 3½-year prison sentence.

Prosecutors Tuesday dropped two remaining felony counts that had been pending against Jones, who was indicted along with Cisneros and two aides in December 1997. Barrett agreed in July not to prosecute the aides.

Eighty-eight tape recordings that Jones secretly made of her phone conversations with Cisneros as their relationship soured were at the heart of Barrett's case. Cisneros' lawyers labored mightily during a 13-day pretrial hearing in July to prohibit their use, saying many tapes bore signs of heavy editing.

But Sporkin rejected the defense's argument, saying he would allow prosecutors to use all or parts of the 26 tapes they wanted to play for jurors.

Men, women differ widely on gun-control

WASHINGTON (AP) — The fight over gun control reflects a battle of the sexes. American women say stricter weapon laws would curb violence, while men want better enforcement of existing laws, an Associated Press poll found.

The telephone survey by ICR of Media, Pa., found 56 percent of American adults favored stricter gun laws and 39 percent opposed them. Sixty-six percent of women favored the tougher laws, compared with 45 percent of men. Thirty percent of women and 49 percent of men were opposed.

In mid-April, just before the Colorado shootings, 55 percent of adults favored tougher gun laws. When the question was repeated in an AP poll a week after the shootings, the proportion jumped to 63 percent.

The poll of 1,026 people taken Aug. 27-31 indicated that blacks were far more likely than whites, by 83 percent to 52 percent, to support tougher gun controls. The poll had an error margin of plus or minus 3 percentage points, larger for subgroups such as men and women. Democrats

were far more likely than Republicans to support more restrictions, by 71 percent to 43 percent.

Both Democratic candidates for president, Vice President Al Gore and former New Jersey Sen. Bill Bradley, have suggested stringent steps to control access to guns. GOP frontrunner George W. Bush, governor of Texas, said recently he agrees with some gun-control steps, such as raising the age of gun ownership to 21

and banning large ammunition clips.
Republicans have found divisions in their own ranks. The Senate, with the help of some Republicans, agreed to legislation that requires background checks at all gun shows, outlaws importation of large-capacity ammunition clips, and requires the sale of safety locks with handguns. House Republicans initially stripped out that language but later asked for a compromise version that would require background checks for firearms sales at gun shows.

More than half of Americans say recent shootings in the news have made them worry more about their own safety. Almost two-thirds of women said they were likely to feel that way.

East Timorese flee as chaos reigns

Charging that the army is aiding the rampaging militias, many observers want a U.N. peacekeeping force.

DILI, Indonesia - Driven by fear, killings and army gunfire, East Timorese jammed onto ships and into trucks Tuesday as their homeland sank further into chaos behind them. With an estimated 30,000 people having fled the provincial capital in the past few days, the streets of the city were empty save for looters and smol-

dering fires. The international lens focused more closely on the war-ravaged territory Tuesday, with officials from the World Bank to the White House to the Vatican urging a halt the East Timorese voted overwhelmingly to break away from

While leaders from East Timor, Australia, New Zealand and other nations pushed harder for an international peacekeeping force to intervene, the U.N. Security Council said Tuesday such talk was premature. Council members said first they wanted to hear from five U.N. ambassadors who had been sent to Indonesia to persuade President B.J. Habibie to rein in his military - said by witnesses to be orchestrating the carnage along with anti-indepen-

dence militias. The group, led by Namibia's U.N. Ambassador Martin Andjaba, was slated to arrive this morning.

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Earthquake claims 30 lives in Athens; 100 missing

ATHENS, Greece - Rescue teams and stunned residents used everything from cranes to garden tools Tuesday to dig for those pinned under wreckage from the strongest earthquake to hit Athens in nearly a century - a 10-second shudder that claimed at least 30 lives and left close to 100 missing.

The scenes of desperate searches and survivors too frightened to return indoors were sadly familiar - last month's monstrous quake in neighboring Turkey had moved many Greeks to put aside their historical enmity with Turks and mobilize aid.

But some significant differences came to light in the shared disas-

Decades of progressively stricter building codes in Greece

allowed Athens to ride out the 5.9magnitude temblor with much less misery than Western Turkey, where shoddy construction was blamed for the near total destruction of some places after the 7.4magnitude quake on Aug. 17.

"Damage like we saw in Turkey is difficult to occur here with the modern buildings we have," said Manolis Skordilis, head of the Thessaloniki Seismological Insti-

Most of the damage and casualties were concentrated in working-class and immigrant areas north of Athens, where construction standards were apparently lower or builders used shortcuts, some officials suggested. More than 100 buildings collapsed, from multi-story apartment houses to factories, and hundreds more were left with cracks or crumbled

State television reported at least 30 people dead, including several children. Most of the victims were crushed; a few suffered



"There is a very narrow window to get to Mars," Gurnett said. "It's every 780 days, roughly two years."

The project is moving swiftly, said Rich Huff, a research engineer and manager of Gurnett's engineering group. "Early prototypes should be ready in a few months' time," he said.

ISIS improvements a step toward future

On Sept. 1, 1969, the first node of what would evolve into the Internet was installed at UCLA. How appropriate, then, that the UI would take the week of the Internet's 30th birthday to proudly take its first baby steps into the Information Age by announcing its much-

Until now, the UI's great foray onto the Information Superhighway for purposes of grade retrieval, class registration and so forth was ISIS, a mainframe system. For students accustomed to the point-and-click interface of Macintosh and Windows operating systems, ISIS' archaic textual user interface is absurdly difficult to manipulate, requiring DOS-like commands such as "pine" and "v1."

ISIS' opening screen presents a suitable warning to its users: "Copyrights by IBM and by others, 1982, 1996." Yes, the UI's best effort at getting wired was out-of-date before President Reagan won a second term in office. Considering its meager beginnings, then, students were rightfully stunned by the dazzling World Wide Web version of ISIS now available for preview at http://isis.uiowa.edu.

The new ISIS presents a seamless point-and-click interface that rivals even Hotmail.com and Amazon.com in terms of ease-of-use. Everything students could possibly be looking for regarding their status at the UI is one click away. The registration process will be markedly easier for students, in that the upgraded ISIS will match course listings to course Web sites, as well as to course descriptions and even to campus maps.

Also, the new Web site will offer Hotmail-style, Web-based e-mail, allowing students to access their e-mail from anywhere in the world. This is certainly an improvement over the current system, which requires students to either tap into their e-mail via a third-party Web site (such as Hotmail) or by using an antiquated telnet interface. The entire "MyUIowa" interface is a marvelous collection of not only grade and course access but also financial information and news announcements that will keep students updated on campus activities

Unfortunately, the upgraded ISIS lacks one feature that is clearly invaluable to the registration process: easy access to evaluations of course instructors. While course descriptions and campus maps are important, they are worth little if they offer no indication that the professor conducts class poorly.

For a first effort at an upgrade, though, the preview version of the new ISIS is a spectacular improvement over the current version of ISIS. The UI has finally taken its first leap into the Information Revolution of the 1990s ... just in time, by a year and four months, for the end of the century.

verybody loves college freshmen. From the downtown bars seeking extra patronage to the cops who wait for unsuspecting patrons to stagger out of them, many are stirred by the annual influx of 18-year-olds onto the campus scene.

Nobody, however, appreciates new college entrants quite like the people at Visa and Mastercard. While businesses such as the Fieldhouse Restaurant & Bar certainly make their share of capital from the barely adult crowd, credit-card companies make an absolute killing, based on a tried-and-true process that guarantees the credit-card magnates fat paychecks after every fall.

This empire grasps its collegiate consumers innocently enough - from the innocuous fliers that are slipped into every student's bag at the bookstore to the casual booths on campus that offer free T-shirts. But beyond the cheaply made shirts, free water bottles and 3.9 percent interest rates lies something very sinister.

Students who encounter credit-card advertisements upon their arrival on campus fall into a well-calculated plan to lure them into the murky world of deficit spending. It is certifiable, meanwhile, that most students aren't blessed with an incredible amount of spending cash, and this is where credit cards come into play.


Good business strategy, one would guess, does not include lending credit to those who consider Ramen noodles a delicacy. But business sense becomes skewed in the twisted vortex of the college world. In this realm, passing out credit cards to those who can't really pay for them is perfect because they can't pay for them.

Asking cardholders to pay only \$15 each month while charging an interest rate near 20 percent is little more than a corporate stick-up. Those who would believe that they can take advantage of a credit-card company's outward generosity should realize that they are the ones being scammed.

I've been there, as have many others. Studies reveal that about three-quarters of college students own credit cards. The Salt Lake Tribune recently reported that the average credit-card debt among people in their 20s sits above \$2,000. Most, like myself, might have gotten their start at a booth somewhere on campus, lured by the promise of enticing gifts in addition to a credit card with their name on

On African participation in the slave trade

hat can one say of the African participation in the Trans-Atlantic slave trade? Or, in the Arabian slave trade in the East for that matter?

This issue sets at the very core in race relations in America today, shaping African-American notions of identity, while at the same time acting as a thorn in modern international trade relations.

Recently, I shared lunch with two of my local "intellectual friends." One Black woman from New York - Brooklyn to be specific. The other, an Iowa City female who has traveled extensively. As the conversation moved on to politics, we realized that we all had quite different ideological frameworks from which we worked. Finally, the Iowan asked the New Yorker, "Well, Africans participated in the slave trade, didn't they?" Wow. Right between the eyes. The Iowan, of course, claimed not to have any ill intent in mind. But the damage was done.

It occurred to me that far too often, talk about the African participation in the slave trade is used as a political football or baseball bat. Either to wound, offend, but hardly ever to inform. Instead, it is used as an ace in the hand, to hide or celebrate, be ashamed of or proud. But this story of Africa and America is much more.

The story of the "fall" of Africa to colonialism actually begins with a drain, which started out as a trickle. The slave trade eventually engulfed Africa, leaving nothing untouched in all of West, Central and most of Southern Africa. It colors the relations between continental and diaspora Africans to this day, and finally, it is the sore spot that won't heal in American race relations. So, what do people really think about it?

Not too surprisingly, no one had much

to say about the subject. The Euro-American declined mostly so as not "to offend." Continental or diaspora Africans don't have much comment on it, either. It so occurred to me that this was one of these "cultural sticking-points" around which American, and in fact global, communities just "did not want to talk about." So, I decided WOLE M. IFE to investigate fur-

ther, independently. First, I found that African participation was not minor, as many suspected, but was major. So major that it eventually led to the overthrow of many of the traditional animistic, communal African governing systems - themselves enslaving cultures. But the "Great African Revolution" that occurred with the import of foreign values and indigenous greed of power was the beginning of the end for the Africans, according to Basil Davidson's The African Slave Trade.

This accompanied a "revolutionary" transformation, mostly from Animistic to Islamic, then later Christian, and overturned an entire continental worldview. Spurred by the lust for power, greed and a whole host of other "political considerations," this revolution, it might be argued, "was not based in African traditional cultural at all!" (e.g., the rise of Dahomey - from a small satellite of the Great Yoruba/Oyo empires, to its mas-

But these betrayals and short-term gains led to the fall of the entire continental worldview. These mistakes should be studied and not repeated!

what a treasure. The originals were closer to tragedy than treasure: ancient 16inch vinvl records, 15 minutes of music on each side. If discovered a decade ago, Miller says, they would have been historic but flawed.

Technology changed all that.

Engineers were able to keep the music while losing the snaps, the crackles, the pops. It was time consuming: Sinatra and the Dorsey Band were rescued by a five-day-aweek, 21-month process to save the music while losing everything else.

"I had some sleepless nights," Miller confessed. But the final results were impressive.

Compilations kicked off with several volumes of Big 12 Inches, remixes of classic songs from the 1970s. '80s and '90s. The first three releases included a cross-section of dance hits, from Black Box's "Everybody, Everybody" to Vicki Sue Robinson's Turn the Beat Around" to the Andrea True Connection's "More, More, More.

Using traditional non-traditionally

The traditional forms of country, rock, blues and folk have been merged into a compound not as traditional as one would expect. Son Volt is the name, and something different is the game. This unique blend of countryinfluenced rock will be making its way to the Union Bar tonight.

The group's sound is founded upon the guitar, with various layers of musical additives ranging from harmonicas. dulcimers, piano, fiddle, violas, chamberlains, lap steels to the normal bass and drums.

Son Volt has been characterized as the creator of a country/rock that has several nameplates, such as "insurgent "y'alternative" and "no depression music.

Son Volt first emerged in 1995 with Trace, which earned critical acclaim and considerable airplay on both video and radio with the first single, "Drown," Its second album, Straightaways, was released in 1997. and now the group is touring in support of its third album, Wide Swing

The music on Wide Swing Tremolo has a slightly harder edge than previous works. The group reached back to its garage-band roots for a more raw sound with the sweetness of country.

Its whole musical concept borders along the lines of experimental. Utilizing complex textures of varying instruments, the music on its latest release seems a little risky but a risk Son Volt was willing to take.

Emory University library displays early letters of Malcolm X

ATLANTA (AP) - The only known collection of Malcolm X's personal letters and notes are on display at Emory University, and many offer a glimpse of him as a typical teen-ager who liked to jitterbug, admired pretty girls, and wanted to be a lawyer someday.

The writings differ from the public view of Malcolm X as a fiery orator and advocate of black nationalism.

"They are quite unique." James H. Cone of Union Theological Seminary in New York said Tuesday. Cone is the author of a 1992 book about Malcolm X and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

The only other known personal letters written by Malcolm X are in FBI files.

The Emory collection - mostly letters and school notebooks written from 1938 to 1955, when Malcolm X was a teen-ager and young adult - is on long-term loan to the library.

Though not a large collection, the letters and notes could change the accepted view of Malcolm X's early years.

In his speeches and in his autobiography, the civil-rights leader described barely read before he was converted to the Nation of Islam in prison.

But the early papers paint a much different picture. They show the 13- to 15-year-old Malcolm to be an articulate student who rarely misspelled words and usually used correct grammar. In one assignment, he wrote that he wanted to be a lawyer, a district attorney or

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



CHICAGO - Two or more significant blows to the head while playing sports can harm teen-agers' thinking abilities for years to come, according to studies that suggest such injuries are more serious than some coaches and parents might think.

Nearly 63,000 high school athletes a year suffer mild concussions, researchers reported in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association. Young athletes with learning disorders appear to suffer even worse long-term problems from multiple concussions.

"This is a major public health issue that has been given short shrift," aid Michael W. Collins, a neuropsyhologist at Henry Ford Health ystem in Detroit and a leader of one f the studies. "And this is information parents should know."

Most people still believe that a concussion means getting knocked out, he said. But a concussion is any alteration in mental function after a blow to the head. Signs or symptoms may be subtle - a headache, dizziness, difficulty with balance or memory, confusion or a personality change.

One of the studies did not explore the effects of concussions but only how often they occurred in football, wrestling, soccer, basketball, softball, baseball, field hockey and volleyball at 235 high schools nationwide from 1995-96 through 1997-98.

There were 1,219 concussions -63percent of them in football - and 99 tudents suffered two or more, said esearchers led by John W. Powell, a professor of kinesiology and an athletic rainer at Michigan State University.

The researchers estimated that more than 62,800 concussions occur mong high school students nationride annually in the sports they

Darren Davis tops Hawkeyes' concern list

For 15 years, Iowa football dominated Iowa State. After last year's

loss, most Iowa fans aren't accustomed to their team being the underdog heading into Saturday's game at Ames. For

Davis State)," Ferentz said at his weekly press conference. "It's kind of a sick coach's mentality. I vividly remember getting beat in 1981 and 1982."

It may be a "sick" mentality, but perhaps it's an appropriate one as Ferentz prepares his players for a pivotal game against the in-state rival Cyclones. Iowa State is a fourpoint favorite in the game, which will start at 6 p.m. and be televised by Fox Sports-Chicago. Last season, the Cyclones were a 28-point underdog to the Hawkeyes.

The game will be a reunion of sorts for Ferentz and Iowa State coach Dan McCarney. They coached together as Iowa assistants under Hayden Fry during the mid-1980's. Ferentz said that he and McCarney still remain in contact from time to time, but they aren't as close as some might expect. Ferentz said that he doesn't send birthday cards to McCarney's family, though that's nothing unusual.

"I don't even send birthday cards to my own mother, or to my wife," Ferentz joked. Ferentz showed great respect for

Cyclones Tuesday, and he was most concerned about containing senior tailback Darren Davis.

Ferentz compared Davis to all-time Big 12 great Barry Sanders. Davis terrorized the Iowa defense last year, rushing for 244 yards in Iowa State's shocking 27-9 victory at Kinnick Stadium.

"He's an excellent football player," Ferentz said. "At times, the guys lost

sight of the guy. He reads blocks well and comes out of the hole. Sometimes, boom, he comes out of there and there he goes.'

Iowa's defenders were similarly complimentary.

"He's tough," safety Matt Bowen said. "He's got the moves that some people can't even do in their dreams. I think he's better than he was last year. His legs look stronger, and he looks faster. It's scary."

The Iowa coach said he looks for Iowa State to show more of its offense against the Hawkeyes, taking into account that Indiana State is a Div. I-AA school.

For the first time since Iowa coach Sara Swails took over the program two years ago, she doesn't have to worry about not having enough runners for a meet.

Swails welcomes 11 freshmen to this year's team. The freshmen will give the Hawkeyes a full squad of runners, a luxury they haven't had in recent years.

Iowa was forced to finish their season a meet early last year because they did not have enough healthy runners to take a full squad to the regional meet.


"I've had to start over with this program in order to build it into a respected Big Ten team," Swails said. "I've really worked hard the last two years to get this group of freshmen here. There will be strong competition for the top seven spots on our

lowa's men look to build on their first NCAA tournament bid in 32 years.

If last year was any indication of the future of Iowa men's cross country, 1998 could be one for the record books.

Coming off one of the most successful seasons in the history of Iowa cross country, coach Larry Wieczorek is hoping the momentum carries over to this season.

"The experience and excitement of last year's team will pay big dividends this year," Wieczorek said. "I hope to make a return trip to the NCAA meet."

Last season, Iowa automatically qualified for the NCAA Championships for the first time in 32 years. Nationally ranked for most of the season, the team finished 21st at the NCAA meet. They also recorded a fifth-place finish at the Big Ten meet.

Iowa lost its top two runners this season in Chad Schwitters and Stetson Steele. Both were past second-team all-Big Ten

Their loss leaves a big hole to fill in the Hawkeye lineup. Coach Wieczorek hopes the four returning runners who ran in last year's NCAA meet will be able to replace the loss of Schwitters and Steele.

"We will build around the top four guys we have returning off last year's team," Wieczorek said. "Those guys need to step it up. It is their time now to fill in the one and two spots on our team."

The leading returner from a year ago is senior Paul Sarris who placed 18th at the NCAA regionals running a time of 31:38. He also placed second on the team at the NCAA meet.



Hingis, Williams breeze to semifinals

NEW YORK - Neither seven double-faults by Venus Williams nor a whipping wind that sent shots flying as wildly as Wiffle balls in Martina Hingis' match could keep them from their inevitable rematch at the U.S. Open.

Two years after Hingis thrashed the inexperienced Williams in the final of her Open debut, the two will meet again in Arthur Ashe Stadium, this time in the semifinals.

"Last time, I honestly did not know what I was doing," Williams said of her 6-0, 6-4 loss to Hingis for the 1997 title. "I'm a different player now.





spring, many thought Rambo would finally step into the spotlight. But in his first game as a starter, the Buckeyes only threw his direction twice.

"Why didn't Rambo get the ball more?" Ohio State head coach John Cooper repeated. "I think they schemed us pretty good. Maybe we should have gotten him the ball more. But they did a nice job on him." The Hurricanes throttled

Rambo and wide receiver Reggie Germany by positioning their cornerbacks off the line and then playing combination coverages.

"It seemed they were scared of our speed," Rambo said.

Meanwhile, Ohio State had breakdowns elsewhere on offense. The line did not offer much protection for quarterback Austin Moherman, who was starting his first game. As a result, Moherman didn't have time to look for anyone other than the primary

"It wasn't that he wasn't seeing me," Rambo said. "He didn't have a lot of time back there. They had him shaken up.'

Moherman said it wasn't Rambo's fault.

"Everybody's making a big deal out of Ken-Yon only having one catch," Moherman said. "But Ken-You did what he was supposed to do."

UCLA stopped recruiting Rambo three years ago when he didn't meet freshman eligibility requirements. When he finally did make the grade, he narrowed his choice to Southern Cal and Ohio State because both continued to recruit him.

Rambo's position coach, Chuck Stobart, is confident that Rambo will have an impact.

"Ken-Yon is just a guy waiting for the opportunity. He's no different than what Terry Glenn was for a long time, or Dee Miller was or Dimitrious Stanley was," Stobart said, referring to three other late-blooming Buckeye receivers in recent years. "All those guys waited for their time to have the ball thrown to them. They waited a sufficient time until they could make plays."



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

Coaches are quick to praise Westbrook, and perhaps overlook a few things, because of two things: He hasn't misbehaved, and he hasn't been injured.

"It's the first time I've been healthy through the whole camp," Westbrook said. "It's been a lot of fun. I'm just really, really, really more anxious than a lot of people around here to get this thing going.'

When the ball's in play, Westbrook has been adjusting to a subtle change in position, from the "X" split-end receiver to "Z," the flanker. The "Z" receiver lines up a yard or so behind the line of scrimmage, allowing the Redskins to put Westbrook in motion before the snap in an attempt to throw off coverage.

"Z's easier than X," Westbrook said. "Not saying I couldn't handle X, but it's no big deal because Z is so easy."

When the ball's not in play, Westbrook has stayed out of trouble. He hasn't punched a teammate - as he did two years ago when he decked Stephen Davis and drew a \$50,000 fine. He hasn't ripped off his helmet to protest a call - as he did in 1997 against the Giants, drawing a penalty that cost his team valuable yards in overtime. And he hasn't failed to show for practice without a valid excuse - as he did one Saturday last year, prompting a twogame benching from Turner.

■ After nine years with San Francisco, former Hawkeye Merton Hanks was let go.

SANTA CLARA, Calif. - Nineyear free safety Merton Hanks, a former Pro Bowl player known for his neck-shaking chicken dance after big plays, was surprisingly cut by the San Francisco 49ers Tuesday.

The release of the popular veteran and team leader was primarily

dictated by salary cap constraints in the aftermath of a trade earlier Tuesday with Green Bay for

cornerback Craig Newsome. The 49ers saved more than \$1 million in cap room by releasing Hanks, who was the NFC's starter

in four of the past five Pro Bowls. He was coming off his worst season, however, and barely survived an offseason salary cap purge during which general manager Bill Walsh lopped off \$28 million in player payroll to get the 49ers under the cap.

"Merton Hanks has been a terrific player for us for nine years," Walsh said in a statement. "He has been a Pro Bowl performer and a dynamic personality on this team. It's truly one of the most difficult decisions we had to make. He's one of those guys who will

never completely be replaced."
It was a player's off day at team's headquarters in Sant Clara and Hanks wasn't immed ately available for comment.

Known as a ball-hawking pl maker, Hanks established hims as one of the game's best fre safeties. Hanks has 31 caree interceptions, including 29 since became a fulltime starter in 1993 Thursday, September 9

Schlichter pleads

ANDERSON, Ind. (AP) -Former NFL quarterback Art Schlichter's gambling addiction could send him back to prison.

Released last week after serving less than half of a four-year sentence, Schlichter pleaded innocent Tuesday to new charges that he used prison pay phones to bet on football and hockey games through a Las Vegas bookmaker last November.

unlawful gambling."

Schlichter admitted to an Indiana State police investigator that he "had a relapse and needed help," according to a report published Aug. 26 in the Herald Bulletin of Anderson.

Schlichter, who won early release by earning two college degrees behind bars through Ball State University, avoided transfer to the Madison County Jail by posting \$5,000 bond, Cummings said.

The charge of check deception carries a maximum sentence of one year. Each of the four gambling charges could add 180 days. If convicted, Schlichter could be ordered to serve consecutive sentences.

In 1997, Schlichter was sentenced to four years in prison on charges of theft, forgery and fraud in connection with the theft of \$800,000 to support his gambling habit. Before beginning his Indiana prison term, Schlichter served a federal sentence in Kentucky for a probation violation. He surrendered to Indiana authorities Jan. 26, 1998.
