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UI professor: Racism behind tenure denial

An anthropology teacher says she is being forced out even though her qualifications equaled tenured professors'.

Obiagele Lake, a UI assistant professor of anthropology, says she may seek legal action against the university to appeal what she depicted as a racist decision that denied her tenure. A press conference has been scheduled for today by Lake, who says a "racist" decision was made in 1997 denying her the promotion. Lake, who is black, asserts that race could be the only reason she was denied tenure based on her qualifications that were at least equal to tenured professors.

"In the 30 years that the Department of Anthropology has been in existence, there has never been a tenured professor of African descent," Lake said.

Linda Maxson, the dean of the College of Liberal Arts, denies that race is involved in any decisions made by the tenure committee.

"All tenure decisions are made strictly on the information at hand," she said. "Race never enters into it."

Applications for tenure at the UI are generally considered after the candidate has taught for five years; the criteria are teaching, service and publications, Lake said.

"There are faculty members in the anthropology department who had fewer publications when they applied for tenure, but their applications were granted," Lake said.

Applicants are judged differently because of race, and the departments that made this decision only emphasized the negative, she said.

"The claims were that my teaching was inadequate, but a majority of my student-evaluation forms and reviews of my portfolio by other tenured faculty were positive," Lake said. "When there is no other reason to take a negative path, then it becomes racist."

WTO assailed for greed

The trade organization's Seattle meeting is the focus of critics who say the group is anti-human rights.

SEATTLE — The World Trade Organization, getting ready to stage the largest trade event ever in the United States, was attacked Sunday by the Teamsters union president for putting "corporate greed" ahead of human rights.

With much riding on the outcome of the talks, the Clinton administration defended its decision to invite trade ministers from around the world to the Pacific Northwest in hopes of launching a new round of global trade talks.

Commerce Secretary William Daley said the administration's embrace of the global marketplace and lower trade barriers has contributed to booming U.S. exports and

the country's longest peacetime economic expansion.

"This economy is strong ... and it will remain strong because of the sort of outward view we've had about trade, not an inward view," Daley told Reform Party presidential hopeful Pat Buchanan in a joint appearance on NBC's "Meet the Press."

WTO Director General Michael Moore, the former New Zealand prime minister who has made a point of reaching out to critics, told a conference of union representatives Sunday that opponents were trying to create a false debate between labor and the WTO.

"Trade is the ally of working people, not their enemy," said Moore, who received a polite, but lukewarm response from the crowd of union leaders from more than 100 countries.

Moore said that some WTO opponents were using complaints about free trade to mask "a broader assault on internationalism — on foreigners, immigration, a more pluralistic and integrated world."

AFL-CIO President John Sweeney told reporters after Moore's appearance that union leaders will judge the WTO by whether it takes criticism seriously enough to include their concerns in upcoming trade talks.

Critics contend that the WTO is sacrificing workers' rights, environmental protection and human rights in order to please multinational corporations that want trade barriers erased.

Teamsters President James P. Hoffa, whose union is among the labor groups organizing the Seattle protests, said on "Fox News Sunday"

FBI: Iowa lowest for hate crimes

While Iowa has the best ranking for hate crimes, some say the report is misleading.

Iowa had the lowest number of hate crimes last year among 46 reporting states, according to a FBI study on hate-crime statistics.

Iowa was the only state to have no reported hate crimes in 1998, the report said. In 1997, Iowa reported 63 hate crimes in a report that included 48 states.

The report includes information from city police departments and different university police departments within each reporting state.

Illinois reported 379 incidents in 1998, including three at the University of Illinois; Michigan reported 427, with two at the University of Michigan; and Minnesota reported 290, with five at the University of Minnesota.

Iowa City Police Chief R.J. Winkelhake said the report may contain inaccuracies.

"It's very difficult to have no reported hate crimes; it's very unlikely," he said. "I'd want to know why it went down. Education is more effective than enforcement has been or ever will be, and I doubt there has been that much education."

Winkelhake couldn't speculate on why some departments report to the FBI and some cities — such as Cedar Rapids and Clinton — don't, leaving large population centers in the state out of the report, he said.

In order to be prosecuted as a hate crime, there has to be a clear victim, Winkelhake said, someone whom the act is specifically directed at, which is often difficult to prove.

It is possible that someone may report an incident as a hate crime to authorities, but after investigation, police may not be able to bring formal hate-crime charges, the police chief said.

Inaccuracies also occur when a hate crime is not properly reported to the authorities, said Faith Wilmot, the co-chairwoman of the Iowa City Hate Acts Rapid Response Team.

"I know things happen here but don't always get reported," she said. "They're difficult to prove, so some"

Pointing & clicking into Super Bowl ads

Internet companies help to push the average Super Bowl commercial prices to \$2 million.

NEW YORK — Some Internet companies are paying more to advertise on January's Super Bowl telecast than they have generated in revenue, helping push the average commercial price for the game to a record of about \$2 million.

As many as a dozen "dot-com" advertisers are expected to rub

shoulders with Anheuser-Busch, Pepsi-Cola, Federal Express, Visa and other longtime Super Bowl advertisers on the Jan. 30, 2000, telecast on ABC.

Dot-com advertisers have bought approximately 20 percent of the available commercials in the Super Bowl, industry insiders estimate.

Price evidently has been no object, as industry insiders say the average charge for a 30-second Super Bowl commercial has soared 25 percent from the old high of \$1.6 million on the last NFL championship game broadcast. Super Bowl ad prices are typically the highest on TV.

Marvin Goldsmith, ABC's head of sales and marketing, declined to comment on the prices but said sales have been helped by a strong economy and advertisers' renewed appreciation of broadcast TV's ability to reach a huge audience quickly.

The Super Bowl attracts the biggest TV ratings of the year in an era that has seen the broadcast networks' audiences steadily eroding.

"There are very few of these platform events that offer the opportunity to reach the masses in a 'concise period,'" said Bob Flood, who oversees national TV ad purchases made by

times they won't charge them." The FBI report acknowledges that not every law enforcement agency participates in the hate-crime program but says the information the agency receives provides a good example of where and when hate crimes occur and under what circumstances.

The report's data can "capture information about the type of bias serving as the motivating factor, the nature of the offense and the characteristics of the victims and offenders."

That the FBI report shows no hate crimes occurring in Iowa last year may have a mixed effect,

said Heather Shank, the director of the Iowa City Human Rights Commission.

"I think it will be helpful to know that this is a place in which hate crimes don't normally happen, but it's not true that it doesn't happen at all here," she said. "Sometimes, we delude ourselves if it doesn't happen to us personally."

The report's release follows a number of recent hate-related incidents that have occurred in the Iowa City area.

The week of Nov. 8 saw two separate cases of hate-related vandalism, one at the UI Field House and the other at a house under construction on Teg Drive.

Hate literature was distributed in southeast Iowa City on Nov. 13 and was also recently distributed

in parts of Cedar Rapids, Shank said.

The hate-acts team and the Human Rights Commission held a town meeting in Iowa City after a 16-year-old boy was charged with a hate crime after allegedly burning a cross on the lawn of an interracial couple in West Branch.

A number of groups gathered to discuss specific areas related to tolerance and diversity, which shows that a large part of the community is interested keeping Iowa City a tolerant place, Wilmot said.

"It might help prevent things from happening in the future," she said. "There's just no room for this stuff in our society."

Professor alleges bias in tenure decision

reviewed within the faculty member's department, then by the college's tenure committee and by the Office of the Provost.

"It's not appropriate to talk about personal cases, but I can say we went through normal university procedures with this case," said UI Provost Jon Whitmore.

Doug Midgett, a UI associate professor of anthropology, said that if a tenure decision is negative, a

faculty member can remain on staff at least one year.

"When you don't get tenure, that means you're gone," Lake said. "You can't try again."

As a result, she said, she is being "forced out" after the completion of this semester. The Iowa Civil Rights Commission is investigating her case, but no legal action has been taken yet, she said.

A group called the Collective Movement for Equality formed in response to Lake's denied tenure. Its purpose is to raise money for

Lake's legal funds; the group includes six members that are current or former students of Lake's.

Marisa Cummings, a UI senior and a member of the committee, said there was no just reason to deny Lake tenure.

"She teaches things others may not want to talk about, and that's why she has received unfair treatment," Cummings said. "I think she is an excellent teacher and that this is a racist policy."

the demonstrators simply want a "seat at the table" to ensure that the WTO stops putting "corporate greed, corporate profits, above human rights."

Buchanan denounced the administration for agreeing to support China's entry into the WTO in return for reduced Chinese trade barriers. U.S. farmers and manufacturers have long complained that those barriers were costing them billions of dollars in lost sales each year.

"This was a complete and total giveaway," Buchanan said. "We

got nothing in the way of human-rights improvement, nothing in the way of a build-down of the missiles aimed at Taiwan, nothing in the way of reduced belligerence for this country."

The formal four days of WTO discussions are aimed at starting a new round of trade negotiations, a follow-up to the Uruguay Round of trade talks, which were completed in 1993.

The discussions will not get under way until Tuesday. But already, thousands of officials from the 135 WTO member countries and 30 more observer nations were filling the hotel rooms and holding informal meetings in an effort to win converts for their negotiating positions.

Online marketers especially want to use the Super Bowl as "a showpiece for their Internet address and to say to the world that 'we are playing with the big boys,'" said Bill Croasdale, a top commercial buyer at Western In-

tiative Media in Los Angeles.

But paying more for a 30-second commercial than you have generated in sales is a bold move even at a time when excess is the norm.

"We have not generated a dime yet," conceded Ethan Russman, marketing director of Angeltips.com, which is paying \$2 million for Super Bowl exposure with start-up money it raised from investors, mostly from Europe and Asia.

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Not quite live at the NYC Lincoln Center

A recording fills in for the orchestra when musicians strike New York City Ballet's *Nutcracker*.

NEW YORK — As the New York City Ballet opened its holiday season with a performance of *The Nutcracker*, it wasn't the rise of a maestro's baton that got the show underway.

Instead, somewhere in venerable Lincoln Center, someone pushed "play."

Sugar-plum fairies twirled to a recording of Tchaikovsky's famous score on Nov. 26 as the company's orchestra sat out the holiday classic due to a contract dispute.

The two sides were still talking after the performance started at 8 p.m., said Bill Dennison, an official with the union. No information on their status was provided later in the night.

In a statement, the ballet said using a recorded score was the only

way to fulfill its obligation to the public.

"We do not want a darkened theater," it said. "Our only alternative is to proceed with tonight's performance of *The Nutcracker* to taped music."

That angered ballet-goer Andrea Alonso of Engelwood Cliffs, N.J.

"I want a refund," she said moments before the curtain was drawn. "I came with four kids, and I don't want to hear a cassette."

Dennison said the musicians had offered to play during the holiday season while talks went on but that

the ballet had wanted the musicians to agree to play during the spring season as well.

The 63 musicians refused, prompting the ballet to lock the orchestra out, Dennison said. The musicians went on strike on Nov. 23.

"Dancers crossed the lines, all other workers crossed the line ... We did not. They are on strike. They are still on strike," said Christopher Ramsey of the New York City Ballet.

Judy West, spokeswoman for Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians, said the main

point of contention has been management's demand for more stringent orchestra attendance requirements.

She said the union "feels very strongly about wanting to get it resolved, which does not mean we're taking a position of surrender. We must protect our members," she said.

The ballet said its latest offer included financial incentives for musicians who agree voluntarily to adhere to "basic standards of attendance and rehearsals and performances," and a 3.7 percent raise for all orchestra members in the first year of a new contract.

Ulster nears groundbreaking Cabinet

■ On the brink of achieving a joint government, a British official says he expects a speedy IRA disarmament.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — On the eve of forming a long-elusive new government for Northern Ireland, Britain's senior official in the province said Sunday that he trusted Sinn Fein leaders to deliver a speedy Irish Republican Army disarmament as part of the deal.

Four parties, including the IRA-linked Sinn Fein, are expected to nominate candidates today for a 12-member Protestant-Catholic Cabinet, the key objective outlined more than 1½ years ago in the Good Friday peace accord.

The breakthrough was made possible by the Ulster Unionists, the province's major British Protestant

party, deciding on Nov. 27 to drop its demand for IRA disarmament before forming the new administration.

Northern Ireland Secretary Peter Mandelson praised Ulster Unionist leader David Trimble, who would lead the Cabinet, for overcoming "hostility and mental aggression" from hard-line Protestant critics. Trimble won 58 percent support for the policy change in a Nov. 27 vote by his party's governing council.

Mandelson's government plans to transfer substantial powers Thursday to the new Cabinet, reversing 27 years of direct rule by Britain.

And Mandelson said he hoped the IRA's promise to open negotiations Thursday with a Belfast-based disarmament commission would produce "quick progress" on an issue that has handicapped peacemaking work here for years.

Speaking in a British Broadcasting Corp. television interview, Mandelson added that he expected Sinn

Fein leaders Gerry Adams and Martin McGuinness — both reputed former IRA commanders — "to lead the Republican movement and ensure that they deliver on their side of the bargain."

"Whatever you might think about their past, they're people now who are committed to politics, not to violence," he said. "I don't think they would have asked the IRA, you know, to take part in this if they didn't know what the answer was going to be."

Mandelson, who said he thought the IRA would start disarming by January, described Adams and McGuinness as "two forward-looking politicians who ... should be given the benefit of the doubt."

But McGuinness, one of Sinn Fein's two candidates expected to receive posts today, warned that Trimble's unexpected setting of a February deadline for a start to IRA disarmament would make it more difficult to achieve.

Naked man attacks congregation with sword; 10 injured

LONDON (AP) — A naked sword-wielding man burst into a south London church during Mass Sunday, slashing and stabbing members of the congregation. Ten people were injured, three seriously.

Six of the injured suffered stab wounds, including a man who lost part of a hand. The others were hurt in a stampede to get out of St. Andrew's Roman Catholic Church in Thornton Heath, a London suburb.

Two other men armed with sticks followed the man into the church, lashing out at some of the 400-member congregation, the priest, Canon John Lennon, said.

Several men in the congregation, including an off-duty policeman, wrestled the man to the ground as he lashed out with the 3-foot-long sword, witnesses said.

Rampage highlights challenges for Russians in Chechnya

NAZRAN, Russia (AP) — Darkness and a damp chill had settled on Sleptsovskaya when Sgt. Sergei Sysuyev and four privates rolled into town from Chechnya in an armored personnel carrier. The village was jammed with Chechen refugees.

Visibly drunk, the soldiers approached a food kiosk and demanded vodka. Larisa Kitiyeva, a 21-year-old student working in the kiosk, said she could not oblige. According to military prosecutors, Sysuyev then fetched his submachine gun and opened fire, killing Kitiyeva and spraying approximately 16 bullets into a nearby crowd. The men scrambled back into their vehicle and drove off.

The Nov. 25 attack was the first such incident since federal forces entered Chechnya in September. But tensions have been high for weeks in places

such as Sleptsovskaya, a volatile mix of refugees, soldiers and residents, many of whom are putting up refugees in their homes.

Dozens injured in bombing in Africa

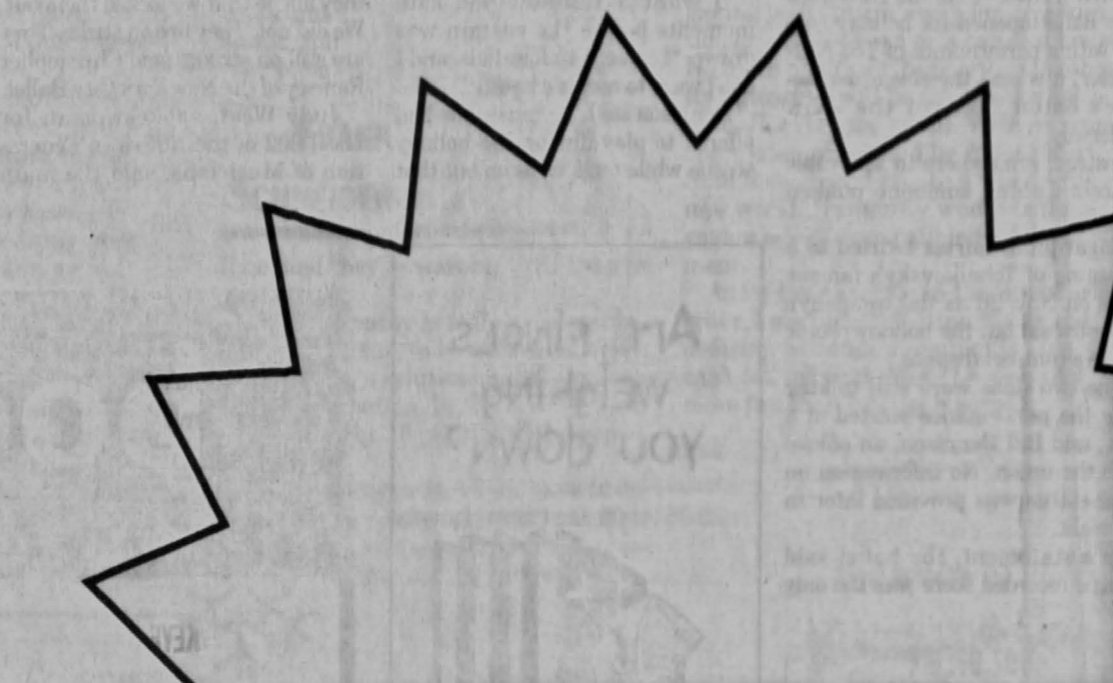
JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A pipe bomb exploded inside a crowded beachfront restaurant Sunday, injuring at least 43 people, police said. The blast near Cape Town came just weeks after police in the area all but declared victory in a war against terrorist bombings.

In a flash, a lazy weekend afternoon at a scenic cove turned into a nightmare, with the injured crawling through debris and pools of blood in the St. Elmo's pizza restaurant in Camps Bay, just south of Cape Town.

Police Capt. Neville Malila told the Associated Press by telephone that the pipe bomb was placed under a table inside the restaurant.

Iowa women finish season with losses

The 1999 season ended the way it began for the Iowa volleyball team — with a string of losses.

After opening up the season with six-straight losses, the Hawkeyes closed the season losing 15 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes finished up this weekend, Iowa (4-23) was shut-down by Illinois and Indiana (2-15, 12-15) and (6-15, 12-15, 4-15) respectively.

"This weekend goes like the rest of the season," Crockett said. "We had our two seniors sick."

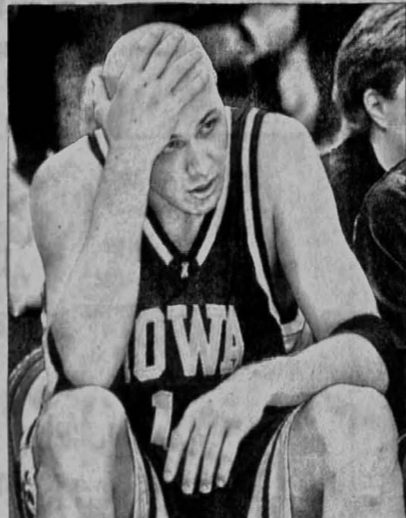

OMAHA, Neb. — Creighton doesn't want to consider its latest victory over Iowa an upset.

The Bluejays shot 56 percent Saturday night while beating the No. 23 Hawkeyes for the second straight season, 85-76.

"We expected to beat these guys," said Creighton forward Ben Walker, who scored 19 points and pulled down six rebounds. "We said they're only as good as we are so let's go out and do it."

Ryan Sears also scored 19 and had six rebounds. Matt West had 13 points and Nerijus Karlikanovas

added 11 for the Bluejays, who beat Iowa 75-73 last season in Iowa City.

"I hope we're to the point after five years that this is just a nice win. It works, but it's not a make-or-break win," said Creighton coach Dana Altman, who is starting his sixth season coaching the Jays.

Creighton (2-0) trailed just once, after Iowa center Jacob Jaacks opened the game with a layup, and never let the Hawkeyes even tie it once they took the lead. Creighton fans, who chanted "over-rated" in the final minute, rushed the floor after the buzzer and swarmed the Jays at midcourt.

It was Creighton's fourth straight victory over a team coached by Steve

Alford, who left Southwest Missouri State to take over the Hawkeyes (2-2). Alford is 1-3 in Omaha's Civic Auditorium.

"We were lucky and fortunate, but our guys did play hard," Altman said. "Things look pretty when you're hitting shots."

Dean Oliver led Iowa with 19 points and six assists. Reserve forward Rob Griffin added 10 points for the Hawkeyes, who lost one starter to injury early in the game and had two others on the bench with foul trouble early in the second half.

"We made some tough shots — kept hitting 3s but we couldn't catch

"I think that I made her angry in the first half," coach Angie Lee said. "Her and I weren't getting the good

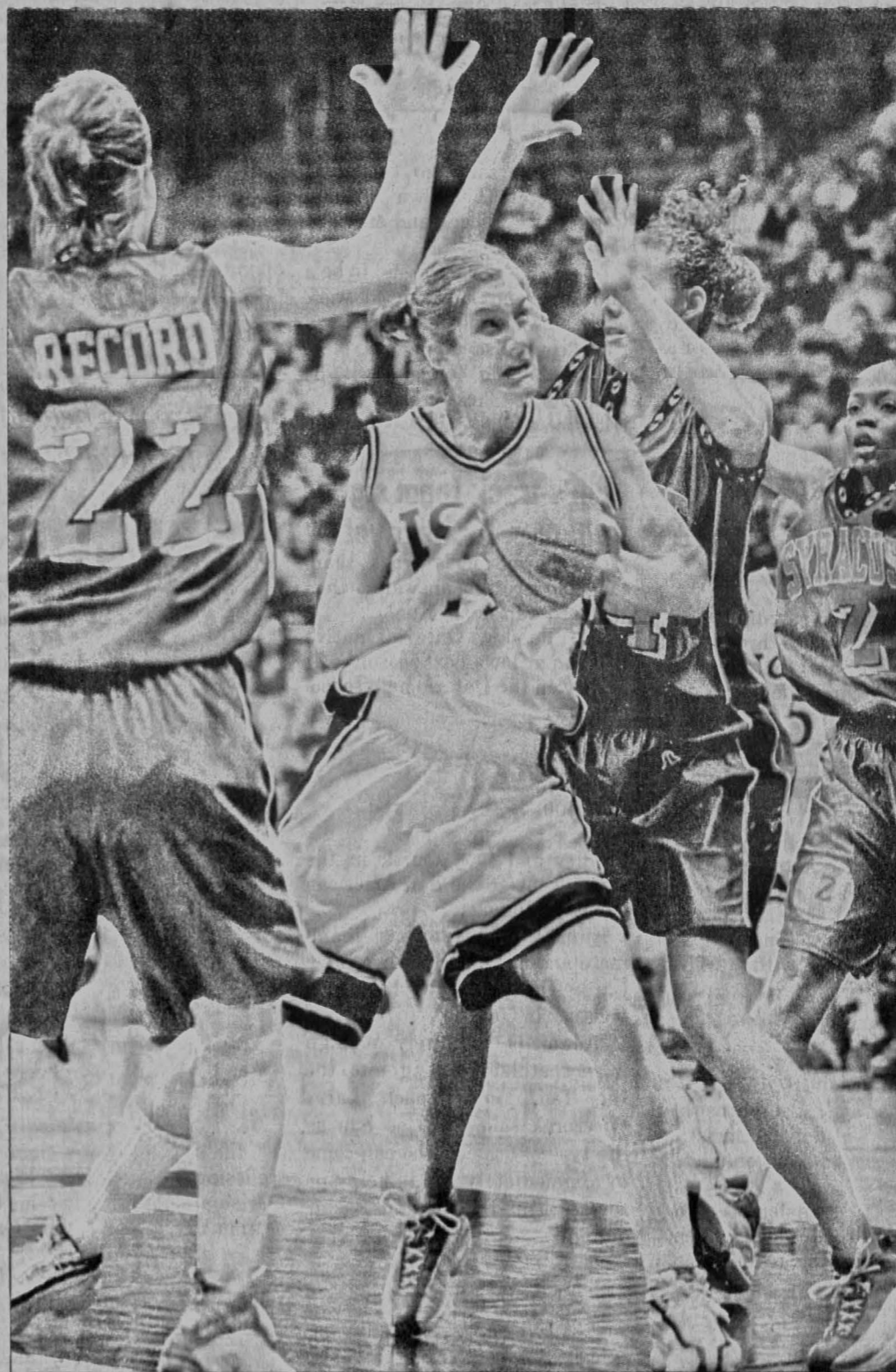

Cyclone men fall to top-ranked Cincinnati

HILO, Hawaii — Top-ranked Cincinnati's first real test of the season was a physical one.

The Bearcats passed it with a 75-60 victory over Iowa State on Sunday night in the championship game of the Big Island Invitational and avoided joining the long list of pre-season Top Ten teams to lose before December even starts.

Kenyon Martin had 22 points, nine rebounds and nine blocked shots to lead Cincinnati, which won its first three games of the season by an average of 28 points, but were only up five on the Cyclones (3-2) with 1:59 to play.

Iowa State's three-guard offense left it at a size disadvantage, but

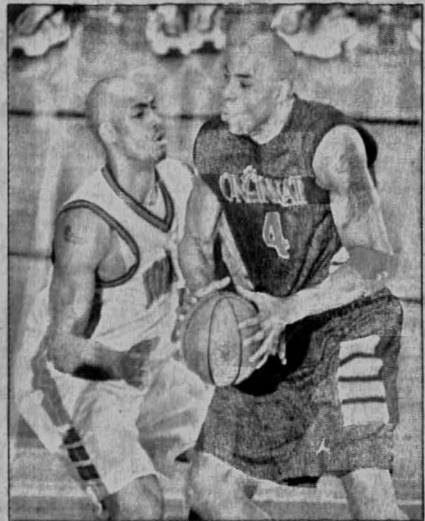
with forward Marcus Fizer battling up front for 26 points, the Cyclones trailed 65-60 on his drive with 1:59 left.

Steve Logan, who made six of the closing free throws and was 12-for-12 in the game, finished with 16 points and DerMarr Johnson had 14 for the Bearcats.

After helping the Iowa wrestling team beat two over-matched opponents a combined 96-0 Friday night, heavyweight Wes Hand says there's still room for improvement.

It wasn't perfect in that sense, but it was close enough. The Hawkeyes thoroughly dominated South Dakota State in the night's opener, 47-0, and continued the trend by blanking Iowa Central Community College 49-0 in the nightcap.

Both teams were highly regarded in their respective divisions, with SDSU ranked No. 2 in Division II and ICC ranked fifth in the junior college national poll.

The duals served as more of a warm-up than a challenge for the Hawkeyes, who open their home schedule Wednesday night at 7 p.m. against Northern Iowa in Carver-Hawkeye-Arena.

"I think we're going to be all right," Hand said. "We just have to keep improving every day to get where we want to be in the end."

Iowa coach Jim Zalesky said that the meet helped his wrestlers get some mat legs before Wednesday night.

"I think this helps us get the matches in, get the team together," Zalesky said. "This is the first time our team's all competed at the same time. Guys like T.J., Juergens, Strittmatter, this is their first competition. So it's good to get everyone some competition before they hit UNI."

Iowa scored bonus points — awarded for a major decision, technical fall or pin — in 16 of the 20 matches. Time and time again, Hawkeye wrestlers simply wore down and broke their opponents, physically and mentally.

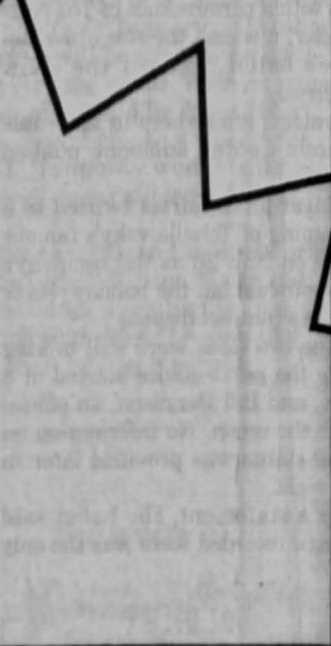
Senior Paul Jenn, 184-pounds is a key example of this mentality. During his match against SDSU's Lance Thury, Jenn repeatedly wrenched Thury's ankle, causing him to cry out in pain. When Jenn began working his opponent's leg, the score was tied, 2-2. Three minutes and 20 seconds into the match, Jenn had given the Jackrabbit a serious limp and was the owner of a 20-5 technical fall win.

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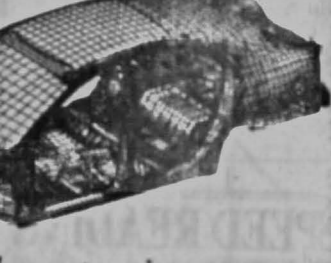
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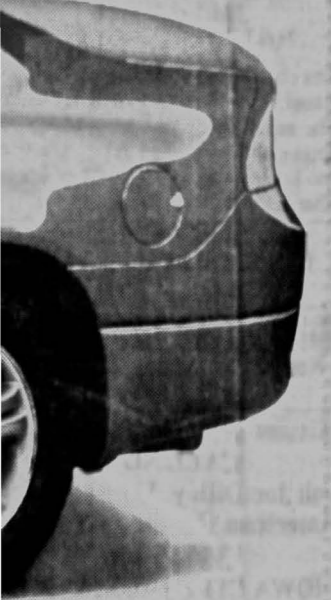

Redskins 20, Eagles 17, OT

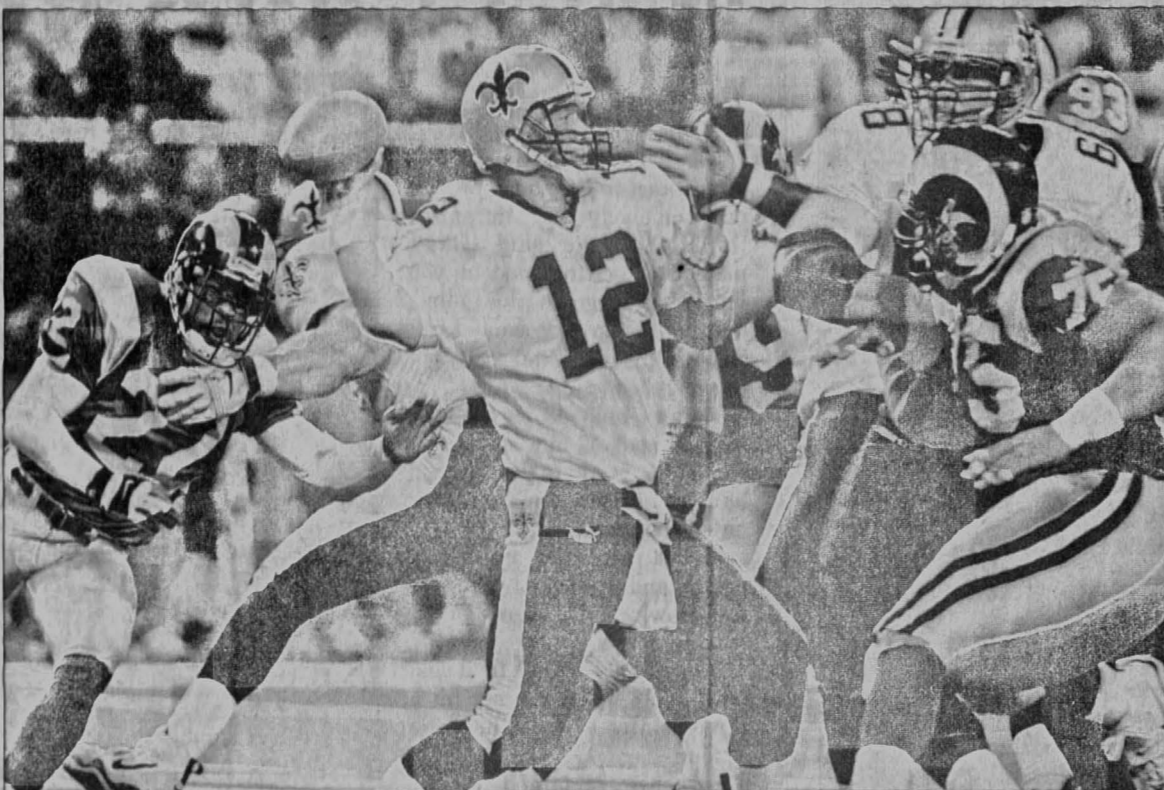

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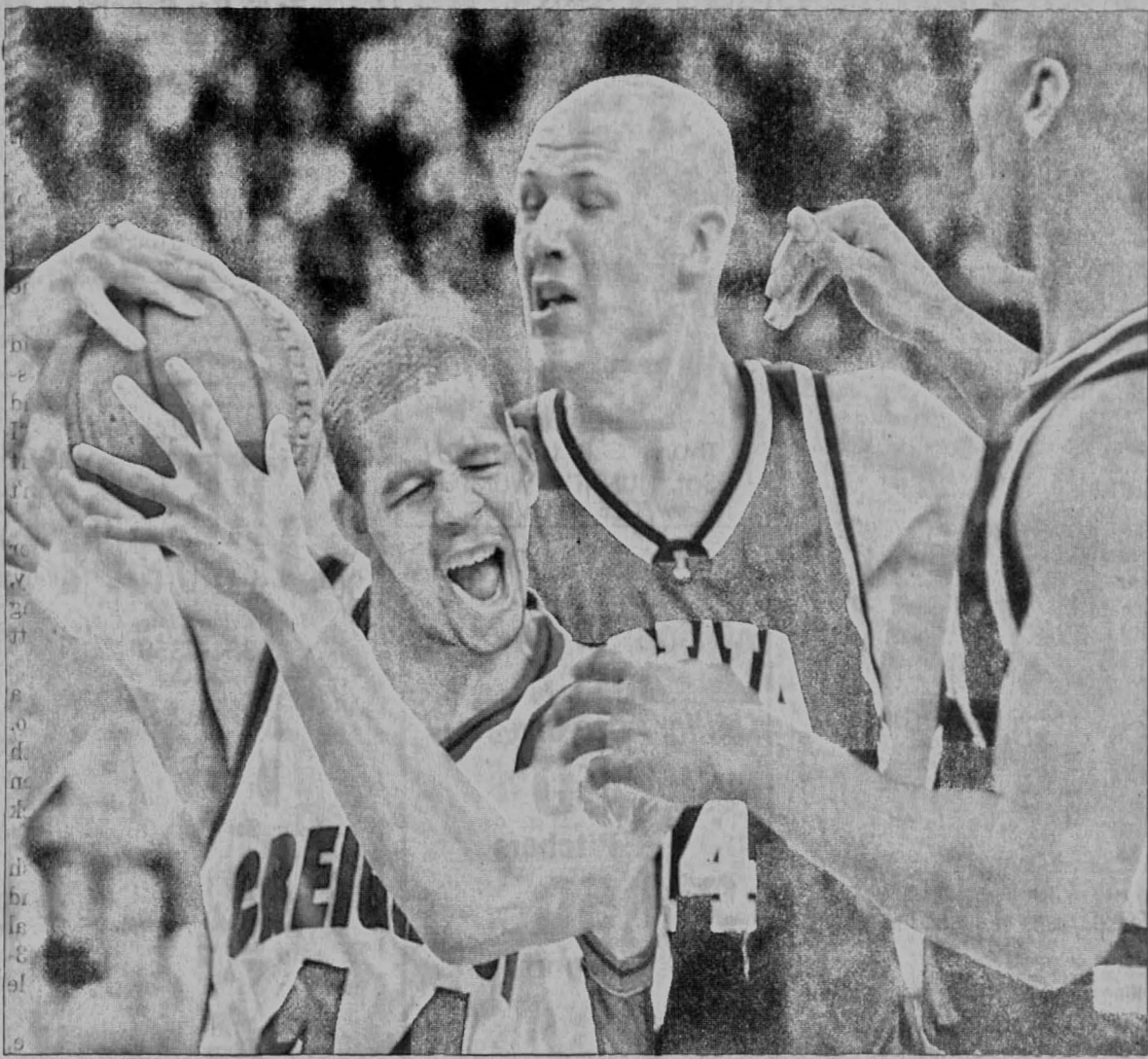

Sampras beat the world's No. 1 player in straight sets

HANOVER, Germany (AP) — No longer No. 1, Pete Sampras still has the heart and the game of a champion.

He stopped Andre Agassi 6-1, 7-5, 6-4 Sunday to win the ATP Tour World Championship, beating the man who supplanted him at the top of the rankings.

"I was humiliated a few days ago and I wanted to prove that I still have it. I was very pumped up and ready to go," he said.

"Today was a big match and I've always believed in myself that I can rise to the occasion," Sampras added. "I really saved the best for last."

players — Agassi defeated Sampras 6-2, 6-2.

But Sampras, coming off a three-month layoff because of hip and back injuries, was at his best Sunday in a final pitting the player of the year against the player of the decade.

"I can still play this game, which I never questioned," he said. "But you don't really expect to play at the level I did today."

In 10 consecutive appearances at this tournament, Sampras has won the title five times to equal the mark set by Ivan Lendl.

Sampras defeated Agassi four of the five times they played this year, and he leads their lifetime series 17-11. This was the fifth title of the year for Sampras, and the fire was clearly there.

"I was on top of him early," he said. "He always brings out the best in me."

He made a strong start by breaking Agassi in the second game. He broke again for a 5-1 lead, and after trailing early in the second set seized control.

"It was a bad day to be flat," Agassi said. "I was really unhappy with the way I played."

Agassi, enjoying the best year of his career, won the French Open and U.S. Open and lost the Wimbledon final to Sampras. He will end the year with the top ranking for the first time.

"He had an incredible year and deserves to be No. 1," Sampras said.

Sampras had finished No. 1 for a record six years. His run ended this year and he will finish 1999 at No. 3, two spots higher than at the start of this tournament.

"The ranking isn't quite as significant," Sampras said.

Couples on the money at Skins Game

INDIO, Calif. — Fred Couples earned a huge payday and a new nickname.

"Freddie is 'Mr. Skins,' or even better, Fred 'Skins' Couples," Mark O'Meara said, laughing.

Couples, already the leading money-winner in the history of the Skins Game, added \$635,000 to his earnings this weekend. His haul included a one-hole record \$410,000 for winning the final hole.

He joined O'Meara, David Duval and Sergio Garcia in the four-player field as a replacement for Payne Stewart. Couples pledged 30 percent of his earnings to the Payne Stewart Memorial Fund, honoring his friend who died in an Oct. 25 plane crash.

O'Meara won \$245,000, Garcia \$120,000 and Duval zero.

Couples again proved ideally suited for this format in which horrible play on some holes can be offset by good shots and big putts at the right time.

Couples did just that on No. 18. He pulled his drive to the left and the ball wedged into a shrub, 6

inches off the ground. But a recovery shot to the fairway, a fine 4-iron within 15 feet of the pin and a birdie putt left Couples with riches for the hole and his third Skins Game title.

"There's a lot of luck involved," he said. "Going down to that last hole, I hit it into the shrub, and I still wind up winning the biggest skin. That's luck."

Couples made nine birdies over the two days and won 11 skins, both records in the event that began in 1983. He ran his total earnings to \$1,975,000 in seven appearances, the equivalent of seven rounds of golf.

O'Meara, the 1998 Skins Game champion with \$430,000, finished second this year with five skins.

Garcia, the 19-year-old Spaniard and youngest player ever in the Skins Game, had two skins. He missed a 10-foot birdie try on No. 18 that would have sent the tournament into extra holes and kept \$620,000 on the table for the players to shoot for.

Garcia called his first Skins

Game a "great experience," adding, "I was disappointed I didn't make a few more putts."

O'Meara added: "We are, too, especially on 18."

David Duval, playing his second Skins Game, was blanked for the second time.

"Nobody helped me out," said Duval, whose game was inconsistent and whose birdie putts did nothing more than tie holes. "I wish I'd won some skins, but that's just the nature of it. I don't worry about it."

Couples, who won two holes for five skins and \$125,000 Saturday, began the second day by adding \$100,000 with a 2-foot birdie putt at No. 10.

O'Meara won \$170,000 with a curling, 40-foot birdie putt at No. 13. Garcia collected \$70,000 with a 2-foot putt birdie at No. 14, then the pot built until Couples struck it rich on the final hole.

After Couples hit into the bush on No. 18, O'Meara hit his second shot into a fairway bunker. Duval ruined his chance by hitting his 3-wood at the par-5, 563-yard hole into the water.

With the other three in trouble, Garcia appeared in great shape to win the rich hole and the championship.

New blood hits the bowl circuit in 1999

Perennial bowlers like Ohio State and Notre Dame are out and Hawaii and Oregon State are in.

Gaze at the projected bowl lineup and it's easy to see college football is about to complete one long, strange season.

Consider: Hawaii, Minnesota, Oregon State and Wake Forest are still playing; Arizona, Notre Dame, Ohio State and UCLA aren't.

With No. 1 Florida State (11-0) and No. 2 Virginia Tech (11-0) waiting for the Bowl Championship Series to finalize its Sugar Bowl matchup — the final BCS standings will be released Dec. 5 — let's pause to look at the minor bowls, which are missing a bunch of major teams.

Arizona, ranked No. 4 in the preseason after going 12-1 in '98, finished 6-6 after a 42-27 loss to Arizona State in a game where the winner was invited to the Aloha Bowl on Dec. 25. The Sun Devils (6-5) will play Wake Forest (6-5), bowing for the first time in seven years.

Notre Dame (5-7) completed its worst season since 1963 with a last-play, 40-37 defeat to Rose Bowl-bound Stanford (8-3). Since '87, the Irish have played in four Cotton bowls, three Orange bowls, two Fiesta bowls and one Sugar, Independence and Gator bowl.

Ohio State (6-6), ranked No. 9

in the AP preseason poll, is out of the postseason for the first time in 13 seasons, its bowl fate sealed on Nov. 20 after a 24-17 loss to Michigan.

And then there's UCLA, which opened 10-0 in '98, and has fallen apart since, losing to Miami, dropping the Rose Bowl to Wisconsin, and going 4-7 in '99 — good for ninth place in the Pac-10. The Bruins played in five bowls in the 1990s.

Moving into the postseason are surprise teams such as Hawaii (8-4) and Oregon State (7-4) — matched in the O'ahu Bowl on Dec. 25.

The Rainbow Warriors were beaten by Washington State 22-14 on Saturday night, but the loss did nothing to dampen June Jones' first season as Hawaii's coach.

Hawaii (8-4, 5-2 WAC) shared the conference title in a year it set an NCAA record for biggest single-season turnaround for a team that went winless the previous year. Hawaii was 0-12 last season.

The Beavers, in their first season under coach Dennis Erickson, broke their NCAA Division I-record streak of 28 straight losing seasons and move to a bowl for the first time since the 1965 Rose Bowl.

Minnesota is off to its first bowl game in 13 years after finishing 8-3 — its best record in 32 seasons. The Golden Gophers closed with wins against previously unbeaten Penn State, Indiana and Iowa.

There were a few bowl adjustments involving Southeastern Conference teams on Sunday. — Arkansas (7-4), despite a 35-10 loss to LSU, looks set to play in the Cotton Bowl against Saturday's Big 12 title game loser (Nebraska or Texas).

— Georgia (7-4), a 51-48 loser to Georgia Tech on Saturday, is now set to play Clemson in the Peach Bowl on Dec. 30.

— Mississippi (7-4) is headed for the Independence Bowl, with Colorado its likely opponent.

The SEC title game winner is set to play Michigan in the Orange Bowl; Tennessee is set to play the Big 12 title game winner in the Fiesta Bowl; the SEC title loser will play Michigan State in the Citrus Bowl; Mississippi State is in the Outback Bowl against Purdue; and it'll be Kentucky vs. Syracuse in the Music City Bowl.

In Saturday's Top 25 games, it was No. 6 Tennessee 38, Vanderbilt 10; and No. 17 Georgia Tech 51, No. 21 Georgia 48.

No. 6 Tennessee 38, Vanderbilt 10

At Knoxville, Tenn., the defending national champs put themselves in line for a return to the Fiesta Bowl, but a title won't be at stake like it was last year at Tempe.

Travis Henry ran 19 times for 153 yards and scored a TD before leaving with a neck injury.

Carruth's bond set at \$3 million after arraignment

The Carolina wide receiver was charged with conspiring to kill his pregnant girlfriend.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Rae Carruth's bail was doubled to \$3 million after he and two other men were arraigned on charges they planned to kill the pregnant girlfriend of the Carolina Panthers player.

Bail had been set Friday at \$1.5 million for each of the three defendants. But that night Judge C. Jerome Leonard raised Carruth's bond to \$1 million for each charge against him. The judge declined to give a reason for the move.



Carruth, 25, the Panthers' first-round draft choice in 1997, and William Watkins, 44, of Charlotte, were arrested Thursday. They were charged with conspiracy to commit first-degree murder, attempted murder and shooting into an occupied vehicle. Michael Kennedy, 24, of Pineville, was arrested.

All three remained in jail Friday night. Authorities have said Charlotte-Mecklenburg police believe up to four people were involved in the Nov. 16 attack on Cherica Adams, shot four times from a passing vehicle as she drove down a Charlotte street.

Investigators would not comment Friday on whether they thought they were close to another arrest.

Adams, 24, and her baby boy, delivered 10 weeks prematurely by emergency Caesarean section after the shooting, remained in critical condition Friday at Carolinas Medical Center.

Carruth, who police say is the baby's father, did not attend Friday's arraignment. He appeared on a closed-circuit video feed from the county jail across the street, a standard practice for many felony defendants.

After prosecutors asked Leonard to set a substantial bond, defense attorney Leonard Kornberg argued that such a move was unnecessary. He said Carruth had never been arrested before, was a recognized athlete and had willingly stayed close to his Charlotte home since the shooting.

"I think that shows that if he had any intent to flee, he would have done so already," Kornberg said.

Carruth is in the third year of a four-year, \$3.7 million contract that calls for him to get a 1999 salary of \$652,500, or \$38,382 in each of the 17 weeks that NFL players are paid during the season.

UNI student gro votes to arm safety officers

UISG President Lana Zak disagrees with the UNI Student Government on arming Public Safety officers.

While the University of Iowa Student Government supports the arming of UNI's Department of Public Safety officers, the UISG Government says there is not here.

The UNI student group passed a resolution on Nov. 17 by a vote of 1, acknowledging that Public Safety officers are "trained and certified professionals" who are currently not permitted to carry firearms.

It continues to recognize that Public Safety officers are primarily responsible for police protection on campus and have mutual-aid agreements with surrounding law enforcement agencies.

However, information provided by the UNI Department of Public Safety says sufficient aid has not been provided and therefore student government and students are in favor of obtaining firearms.

"We talked with people on campus and they were not in favor of it. No one was gun-ho for getting it, but we also think it's necessary for the safety of the community here," UNI Student Government President Nick Arnold said.

But most students at the time agreed with UNI students' opinion that Public Safety officers, UISG President Lana Zak said.

"They're (students) feeling that it's not a good relationship between Public Safety and the Department of Public Safety," she said. "The idea of an armed police officer with a holstered handgun walking your way — it's absolutely unnecessary."

Zak and Arnold agreed that Cedar Falls and Cedar Rapids are different communities, and though it is beneficial for one Public Safety officer to have guns, it may not be necessary for the other.

"Public Safety has a lot of contact with the Iowa City police," Zak said. "The police and Public Safety are able to handle everything."

Arnold said that's not the case in Cedar Falls. "There may have to be some form of tragedy," he said. "That's what needs to happen to bring it around."

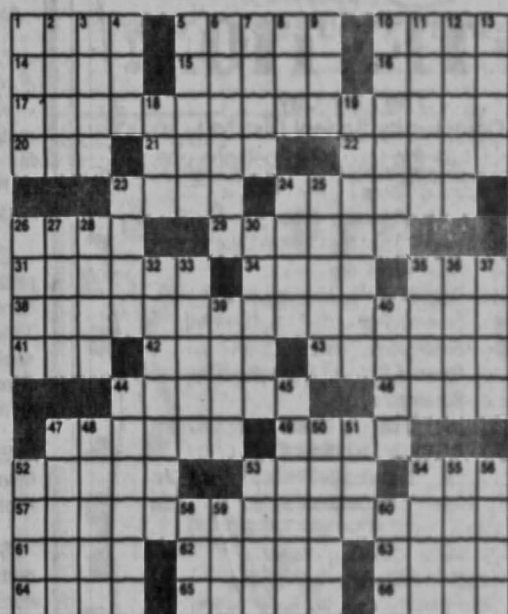

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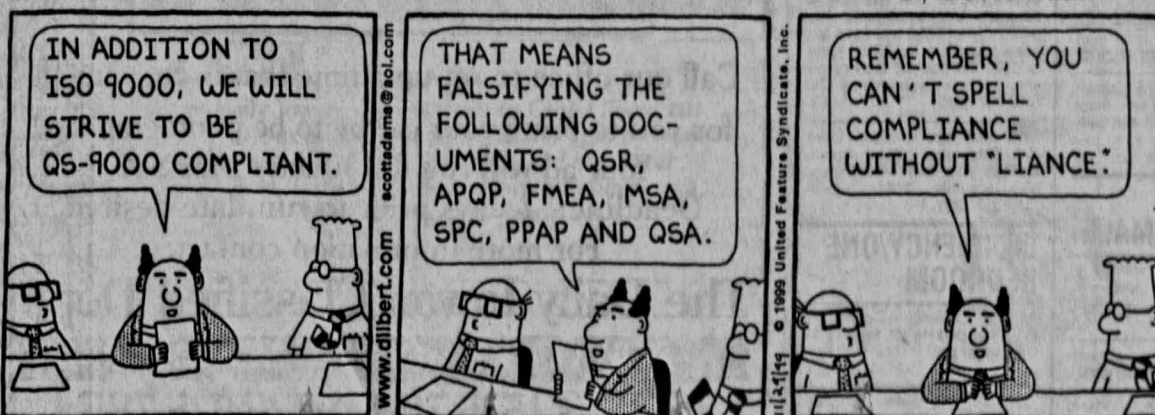
