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

# WTO assailed for greed

■ The trade organization's Seattle meeting is the focus of critics who say the group is anti-human rights.

SEATTLE - The World Trade Organization, getting ready to stage the largest trade event ever in the United States, was attacked Sunday by the Teamsters union president for putting "corporate greed" ahead of human rights.

With much riding on the outcome of the talks, the Clinton administration defended its decision to invite trade ministers from around the world to the Pacific Northwest in hopes of launching a new round of global trade talks.

Commerce Secretary William Daley said the administration's embrace of the global marketplace

the country's longest peacetime economic expansion.

"This economy is strong ... and it will remain strong because of the sort of outward view we've had about trade, not an inward view," Daley told Reform Party presidential hopeful Pat Buchanan in a joint appearance on NBC's "Meet the Press."

WTO Director General Michael Moore, the former New Zealand prime minister who has made a point of reaching out to critics, told a conference of union representatives Sunday that opponents were trying to create a false debate between labor and the WTO.

"Trade is the ally of working people, not their enemy," said Moore, who received a polite, but lukewarm response from the crowd of union

Moore said that some WTO opponents were using complaints about free trade to mask "a broader assault on internationalism - on foreigners, immigration, a more pluralistic and integrated world."

AFL-CIO President John Sweeney told reporters after Moore's appearance that union leaders will judge the WTO by whether it takes criticism seriously enough to include their concerns in upcoming trade talks.

Critics contend that the WTO is sacrificing workers' rights, environmental protection and human rights in order to please multinational corporations that want trade barriers erased.

Teamsters President James P. Hoffa, whose union is among the labor groups organizing the Seattle protests, said on "Fox News Sunday" See WORLD TRADE, Page 5A

# **FBI: lowa** lowest for hate crimes

■ While Iowa has the best ranking for hate crimes, some say the report is misleading.

Iowa had the lowest number of hate crimes last year among 46 reporting states, according to a FBI study on hate-crime statistics.

Iowa was the only state to have no reported hate crimes in 1998, the report said. In 1997, Iowa reported 63 hate crimes in a report that included 48 states.

The report includes information from city police departments and different university police departments within each reporting state.

Illinois reported 379 incidents in 1998, including three at the University of Illinois; Michigan reported 427, with two at the University of Michigan; and Minnesota reported 290, with five at the University of Minnesota

Iowa City Police Chief R.J. Winkelhake said the report may contain inaccuracies

"It's very difficult to have no reported hate crimes; it's very unlikely," he said. "I'd want to know why it went down. Education is more effective than enforcement has been or ever will be, and I doubt there has been that much education.'

Winkelhake couldn't speculate on why some departments report to the FBI and some cities - such as Cedar Rapids and Clinton - don't, leaving large population centers in the state out of the report, he said.

In order to be prosecuted as a hate crime, there has to be a clear victim, Winkelhake said, someone whom the act is specifically directed at, which is often difficult to prove.

It is possible that someone may report an incident as a hate crime to authorities, but after investigation, police may not be able to bring formal hate-crime charges, the police

chief said. Inaccuracies also occur when a hate crime is not properly reported to the authorities, said Faith Wilmot, the co-chairwoman of the Iowa City Hate Acts Rapid Response Team.

"I know things happen here but don't always get reported," she said. "They're difficult to prove, so some-

# Pointing & clicking into Super Bowl ads

Internet companies help to push the average Super Bowl commercial prices to \$2 million.

NEW YORK - Some Internet companies are paying more to advertise on January's Super Bowl telecast than they have generated in revenue, helping push the average commercial price for the game to a record of about \$2 million.

As many as a dozen "dot-com" Advertisers are expected to rub

shoulders with Anheuser-Busch, Pepsi-Cola, Federal Express, Visa and other longtime Super Bowl advertisers on the Jan. 30, 2000, telecast on ABC.


Dot-com advertisers have bought approximately 20 percent of the available commercials in the Super Bowl, industry insiders estimate.

Price evidently has been no object, as industry insiders say the average charge for a 30-second Super Bowl commercial has soared 25 percent from the old high of \$1.6 million on the last NFL championship game broadcast. Super Bowl ad prices are typically the highest on T

Marvin Goldsmith, ABC's head of sales and marketing, declined to comment on the prices but said sales have been helped by a strong economy and advertisers' renewed appreciation of broadcast TV's ability to reach a huge audience quickly.

The Super Bowl attracts the biggest TV ratings of the year in an era that has seen the broadcast networks' audiences steadily eroding.

"There are very few of these platform events that offer the opportunity to reach the masses in a 'concise' period," said Bob Flood, who oversees national TV ad purchases made by See SUPER BOWL, Page 5A

Offices located on North Clinton Street, such as the UI Housing Office, told the city they needed short-term places to park and the new meters have provided that, Davidson said.

The city has little incentive for increasing revenue from higher meter rates because the majority of the parking revenue goes toward maintaining the parking system, he said.

The City Council has determined that \$90,000 will go to city transit and \$400,000 will go to the general fund each year, but those amounts are set and do not increase with additional revenue, Davidson said.

There are currently no plans to install new meters in other parts of Iowa City, he said. A proposed meter installation on Washington and College Streets east of downtown was stopped by the council.

# I-80 may get artwork, landscaping

■ The local part of the interstate may be widened and it could act as a drive-by gallery.

The proposed addition of a third lane to Interstate 80 through the Iowa City area will only be the start to the changing face of the interstate, as local officials look to add artwork and landscaping to the roadsides.

A joint committee of officials from Iowa City, Coralville and Johnson County want to improve the visual aesthetic of the interstate area.

Interstate 80 would be widened between Highway 1 and Highway 380, under a proposed plan, which could begin to be put into effect late

A study to look at the proposed improvements and effects on the seven-mile area was conducted by the Des Moines-based landscape and architectural firm Dunbar Jones and Associates earlier this year. The survey was funded by the Iowa Department of Transporta-

The study found that widening the interstate would mean the addition of Jersey barriers, large slabs of concrete that are not visually attractive, said City Planner Karin Franklin.

"Our biggest concern is what to do with the middle dividers," she said. "Some places have put in large planters, but the problem with that is the maintenance."

Some proposed ideas for the roadside include native grasses, evergreen shrubs, and trees and art-

"Some of the visual improvements that have been suggested are decorative railings, natural plantings and artwork by the entrance and exit ramps," said Coralville City Administrator Kelly Hayworth. "Our first bridge will be Highway 965. It's scheduled for late next year."

Although the DOT funded the study, it has not committed to funding the extensive improvement project, Franklin said. The joint committee may apply for state grants to help pay for the project.

"It will hopefully make this a special place and draw more people off the interstate," Hayworth said. "It will be different than the rest of their trip on 80."

While no plans are definite, the improvement project may be completed by 2003; the notion of adding artwork is already gaining support from some Iowa City city councilors.

"I think it's a good idea," said Councilor Connie Champion. "The best thing they can do is localize the artwork to really show the identity of this area and really let it mean something."


"The fountain has been around for 20 years, and a lot of people in the community like it," he said. " It's not a question of if it will be relocated but to where."





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# McCloskey leaves UI

After several weeks of speculation on whether economics Professor Deirdre McCloskey would return to the UI, she resigned on Nov. 23 and decided to continue her work at the University of Illinois, Chicago.

McCloskey joined the UI faculty in 1980 and captured public attention in 1996 when she announced plans for a genderreassignment operation. McCloskey, formerly known as Donald, returned to the UI camous in 1997 after undergoing surgery in Australia.

She accepted a position as a visting professor at UIC and has been teaching there this semes-

Via e-mail, McCloskey informed UI Provost Jon Whitmore that she "must resign, effective immediately." McCloskey sent the message to Whitmore and later forvarded copies to other UI faculty. McCloskey expressed gratitude for her colleague's handling of her gender transformation but disappointment at the UI's lack of support for her work on the Project On Rhetoric of Inquiry.

McCloskey could not be reached for comment Sunday.

Professors leave on a fairly regular basis, and administrators at the business school are not overly concerned about how to replace departing faculty, Fethke said.

"It's always a loss to lose a senior person. I can't say her work fit into traditional economics. Doing work such as writing a book about her transformation are not related to research economics," he said. "She has had a lasting impact on economics, and we all wish her the greatest success."



reviewed within the faculty member's department, then by the college's tenure committee and by the Office of the Provost.

"It's not appropriate to talk about personal cases, but I can say we went through normal university procedures with this case," said UI Provost Jon Whitmore.

Doug Midgett, a UI associate professor of anthropology, said that if a tenure decision is negative, a faculty member can remain on staff at least one year.

When you don't get tenure, that means you're gone," Lake said. "You can't try again."

As a result, she said, she is being "forced out" after the completion of this semester. The Iowa Civil Rights Commission is investigating her case, but no legal action


has been taken yet, she said. A group called the Collective Movement for Equality formed in response to Lake's denied tenure. Its purpose is to raise money for


Lake's legal funds; the group includes six members that are current or former students of Lake's.

Marisa Cummings, a UI senior and a member of the committee, said there was no just reason to deny Lake tenure.


"She teaches things others may not want to talk about, and that's why she has received unfair treatment," Cummings said. "I think she is an excellent teacher and that this is a racist policy."

# WTO protest should raise awareness

This week, thousands of people will be gathered in Seattle to demonstrate against the World Trade Organization and the 135 delegates who will convene for the current round of trade negotiations.

The demonstrators will come from a variety of interests, including labor, human rights and environmental, just to name a few. Even so, they will have one common message: Public opposition is growing against the exploding global economy, an economy that is worried little — if at all — about human rights, the environment or distribution of wealth. And even if not heard, this growing group will continue to speak until it is.


The recent trade agreement between China and the United States, which will allow China into the WTO, has only added fuel to the protesters' fire. As it should. A perfect example of disregard for human rights and the environment when higher profits are at stake, the China-U.S. agreement represents everything that's wrong with the priorities of the global economy. Instead of discussing China's stand on human rights, which has gotten progressively worse, and the country's blatant disregard for the environment, the negotiations in Beijing were concentrated on the concessions that China would offer some U.S. industries. Higher profits at any cost seems to be the motto.

Interestingly, and disturbingly, nearly all major American presidential candidates are in support of the agreement. And those who aren't, namely Steve Forbes and Pat Buchanan, seem to base their opinion more on isolationism than human rights or environmental concerns. Even Al Gore, who has the powerful endorsement of labor and claims to be an environmentalist, is in support. If these politicians aren't careful, however, and these alarming trends resulting from free trade continue, the thousands of activists will multiply and demand a change in pri-

And so the Seattle summit, which will begin Tuesday, will be marked by the loud dissent against the current brand of globalization, a spectacle that won't end until the trend slows, if not stops. In whole, the dissenters will argue that there are other values that should be held more dearly than a super-efficient global market.

As Clinton said, "Every group in the world with an ax to grind is going to Seattle to demonstrate. I'll have more demonstrators against me than I've had in the whole seven years I've been president." Let's hope he's right and that the demonstrators are heard.

#### Lutgendorf comments were off the mark

I was disappointed to read Professor Philip Lutgendorf's column (DI, Nov. 16) decrying motivational seminars, corporate managers, vision and mission statements, and corporate

America in general. One source of disappointment in the column was numerous misstatements of fact. Professor Lutgendorf says the majority of Americans do not like their jobs and corporate managers are mostly motivated by

Let me set the record straight (based on sound empirical evidence, not armchair speculation) — 70-80 pecent of Americans are satisfied with their jobs and managers, like the faculty whose virtues the good professor extols, are most satisfied and motivated by the intrinsic value of their work. It is ironic that Professor Lutgendorf lauds the research enterprise, yet he ignores its findings in his own commentary.

Despite these misstatements, the real purpose of Professor Lutgendorf's column is to criticize university sponsorship of motivational seminars for its faculty and staff, and for wasting "precious" faculty time on vision and mission statements and strategic plans. I have no idea whether Michele Hunt's seminar is worth the price of admission. But I do believe in the value of vision, strategy and planning — and again, the literature supports the value of these processes. I am proud to work at a university with a president who also cares about the importance of values and a collective sense of purpose

I would like to set the record straight:

1) In business as well as in universities, most people are motivated and satisfied most by the intrinsic nature of the work they perform. In short, we are likely to be happiest and most productive when we choose jobs that reflect our values and interests.

2) Vision in all its forms — personal mission

statements, organizational visions, business strategy — helps guide and motivate actions in an ambiguous world. Individuals, organizations, and, yes, even department executive officers such as Professor Lutgendorf are most effective when they have a clear vision of where they want to take themselves and their organizations,

3) Whether participation in motivational and leadership seminars, or in vision and strategic planning, is a waste of time depends entirely on how seriously these efforts are taken. Approached with cynicism or a pro forma attitude, no effort at self or organizational improvement will succeed. It is the responsibility of all leaders to take these efforts to heart or, indeed,

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

Judy West, spokeswoman for Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians, said the main point of contention has been management's demand for more stringent orchestra attendance requirements.

She said the union "feels very strongly about wanting to get it resolved, which does not mean we're taking a position of surrender. We must protect our members," she said.

The ballet said its latest offer included financial incentives for musicians who agree voluntarily to adhere to "basic standards of attendance and rehearsals and performances," and a 3.7 percent raise for all orchestra members in the first year of a new contract.

# **Ulster nears groundbreaking Cabinet**

On the brink of achieving a joint government, a British official says he expects a speedy IRA disarmament.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — On the eve of forming a long-elusive new government for Northern Ireland, Britain's senior official in the province said Sunday that he trusted Sinn Fein leaders to deliver a speedy Irish Republican Army disarmament as part of the deal.

Four parties, including the IRAlinked Sinn Fein, are expected to nominate candidates today for a 12member Protestant-Catholic Cabinet, the key objective outlined more than 1½ years ago in the Good Friday peace accord.

The breakthrough was made possible by the Ulster Unionists, the province's major British Protestant

party, deciding on Nov. 27 to drop its demand for IRA disarmament before forming the new administration.

Northern Ireland Secretary Peter Mandelson praised Ulster Unionist leader David Trimble, who would lead the Cabinet, for overcoming "hostility and mental aggression" from hard-line Protestant critics. Trimble won 58 percent support for the policy change in a Nov. 27 vote by his party's governing council.

Mandelson's government plans to transfer substantial powers Thursday to the new Cabinet, reversing 27 years of direct rule by Britain.

And Mandelson said he hoped the IRA's promise to open negotiations Thursday with a Belfastbased disarmament commission would produce "quick progress" on an issue that has handicapped peacemaking work here for years.

Speaking in a British Broadcasting Corp. television interview, Mandelson added that he expected Sinn

Fein leaders Gerry Adams and Martin McGuinness — both reputed former IRA commanders — "to lead the Republican movement and ensure that they deliver on their side of the bargain."

"Whatever you might think about their past, they're people now who are committed to politics, not to violence," he said. "I don't think they would have asked the IRA, you know, to take part in this if they didn't know what the answer was going to be."

Mandelson, who said he thought the IRA would start disarming by January, described Adams and McGuinness as "two forward-looking politicians who ... should be given the benefit of the doubt."

But McGuinness, one of Sinn Fein's two candidates expected to receive posts today, warned that Trimble's unexpected setting of a February deadline for a start to IRA disarmament would make it more difficult to achieve.



#### Naked man attacks congregation with sword; 10 injured

LONDON (AP) — A naked sword-wielding man burst into a south London church during Mass Sunday, slashing and stabbing members of the congregation. Ten people were injured, three seriously.

Six of the injured suffered stab wounds, including a man who lost part of a hand. The others were hurt in a stampede to get out of St. Andrew's Roman Catholic Church in Thornton Heath, a London suburb.

Two other men armed with sticks followed the man into the church, lashing out at some of the 400-member congregation, the priest, Canon John Lennon, said.

Several men in the congregation, including an off-duty policeman, wrestled the man to the ground as he lashed out with the 3-foot-long sword, witnesses said.

#### Rampage highlights challenges for Russians in Chechnya

NAZRAN, Russia (AP) — Darkness and a damp chill had settled on Sleptsovskaya when Sgt. Sergei Sysuyev and four privates rolled into town from Chechnya in an armored personnel carrier. The village was jammed with Chechen refugees.

Visibly drunk, the soldiers approached a food kiosk and demanded vodka. Larisa Kitiyeva, a 21-year-old student working in the kiosk, said she could not oblige. According to military prosecutors, Sysuyev then fetched his submachine gun and opened fire, killing Kitiyeva and spraying approximately 16 bullets into a nearby crowd. The men scrambled back into their vehicle and drove off.

The Nov. 25 attack was the first such incident since federal forces entered Chechnya in September. But tensions have been high for weeks in places

Dean Oliver led Iowa with 19 points and six assists. Reserve forward Rob Griffin added 10 points for the Hawkeyes, who lost one starter to injury early in the game and had two others on the bench with foul trouble early in the second half.





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# Sampras edges Agassi for ATP win

Sampras beat the world's No. 1 player in straight sets.

HANOVER, Germany (AP) -No longer No. 1, Pete Sampras still has the heart and the game of a champion.

He stopped Andre Agassi 6-1, 7-5, 6-4 Sunday to win the ATP Tour World Championship, beating the man who supplanted him at the top of the

rankings. "I was humiliated a few days ago and I wanted to prove that I still have it. I was very pumped up, ready to go," he said.

"Today was a big match and I've always believed in myself, that I can rise to the occasion," Sampras added. "I really saved the best for last.

Earlier in this \$3.6 million tournament - a season-ending event for the world's top eight

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players - Agassi defeated Sampras 6-2, 6-2.

But Sampras, coming off a three-month layoff because of hip and back injuries, was at his best Sunday in a final pitting the player of the year against the player of the decade.

"I can still play this game, which I never questioned," he said. "But you don't really expect to play at the level I did today."

In 10 consecutive appearances at this tournament, Sampras has won the title five times to equal the mark set by Ivan

Sampras defeated Agassi four of the five times they played this year, and he leads their lifetime series 17-11. This was the fifth title of the year for Sampras, and the fire was clearly there.

"I was on top of him early," he said. "He always brings out the best in me.

He made a strong start by breaking Agassi in the second game. He broke again for a 5-1 lead, and after trailing early in the second set seized control.

"It was a bad day to be flat," Agassi said. "I was really unhappy with the way I played.'

Sampras had finished No. 1 for a record six years. His run ended this year and he will finish 1999 at No. 3, two spots higher than at the start of this tour-

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
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
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
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# New blood hits the bowl circuit in 1999

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
