

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Klenske wants Coke \$'s for recycling

■ The UISG president wants to take some revenue to buy recycling bins.

The UI Student Government president wants the corporation whose products often go unrecycled on campus to play a bigger role in the university's recycling efforts.

Nick Klenske said he plans to ask the university to contribute some revenue from its Coca-Cola Co. contract to buy bins for recycling aluminum and plastic products, such as soda cans and bottles. He will also ask Coke, which has exclusive rights to sell its products on campus, to donate more recycling bins.

Ideally, the extra bins will establish a pilot recycling program that, if successful, would lead the university to begin recycling aluminum and plastic. The university spends \$385,000 annually recycling paper and cardboard.

UI President Mary Sue Coleman and Phillip Jones, the vice president for student services, will receive a letter from Klenske and UISG Vice President Dan Rossi with their request in the near future, Klenske said. The two will also send a letter to Coca-Cola.

But if all else fails, the UISG will dip into its supplementary funding to kick-off the recycling project and purchase additional bins, Klenske said.

The university's contract with Coca-Cola, signed in February 1998, included \$350,000 up front plus a 50/50 split of all revenues, at least \$400,000 per year, said Mary Jane Beach, the UI assistant vice president for business services. It has netted the UI more than \$750,000 a year, which funds scholarships and other campus projects and improvements, such as the

Zoning kills frat's plan to buy house

■ After prospective neighbors complain to the city, ATO loses out on its house deal.

Members of Alpha Tau Omega are once again looking for a new home after learning that a deal to purchase a house in a North Side neighborhood would violate a city zoning ordinance.

Some of the prospective neighbors, irritated at the idea of a fraternity moving in, learned that the five-bedroom house, 510 E. Ronalds St., is in an RS-8 zone, which is regulated for medium-density single family units — not fraternity houses. Originally, the city mistakenly told fraternity officials that living in the house, as long as it remained a duplex, would be acceptable.

When the city learned of Alpha Tau Omega's intent to buy the house, the fraternity board, its realtor and the seller's realtor were all notified that the property could not be used for a fraternity house, said Jann Ream, the city's code-enforcement assistant.

The fraternity's realtor, Tim Lehman, learned of the zoning violation from the city on March 30, but fraternity members did not learn of the violation until last week.

"It seems sad of what happened to the fraternity," Ream said. "There seems to have been a lack of communication. A heads-up would have been the polite thing to do to let the fraternity members know what was going on."

Some neighbors were worried the fraternity would become a party house and that there would be not enough parking to accommodate the 20 members for weekly meetings and social activities — the house has only three off-street parking spots. The neighbors voiced their concerns to the city's housing-inspection department.

"We are trying to keep our neighborhood one in which we can sleep through the night," said Tim Walker, who lives on North Johnson Street. "There

BREWING THE ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT

Because the UI's Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center isn't exactly normal, Associate Director Dennis Naughton figures its teachers can be a little different, too.

Naughton is new to the Entrepreneurial Center, and so is Grandma Kavanaw, his teaching assistant. The duo recently teamed up during Naughton's Strategic Management of Technology and Innovation class.

Wearing a blue feather hat on her gray hair, Grandma sat on Naughton's lap and joked about growing old and going to the bars. Somewhere in the mix was an introduction to the upcoming lesson, but you had to listen closely to catch it.

"So far, we're still getting acquainted," said Naughton, who paid his way through college and law school as a ventriloquist. Grandma is the newest dummy in his collection. "All I know so far is that she has a little obsession with Viagra and old age."

Naughton, a former entrepreneur himself, is not sure the dean of the Tippie College of Business knows about Grandma, but he figures it won't be a secret for long.

The 1-year-old Entrepreneurial Center is not much of a secret anymore, either. In September 1996, the business school received a \$1.5 million gift from John Pappajohn, one of the university's most renowned entrepreneurs, to help create the center.

Pappajohn's goal was to cultivate small-business developers and encourage them to build their businesses in Iowa, said Gary Fethke, the dean of the business school.

Fethke has been told the certificate offered through the center is the most comprehensive one in the nation, but because "entrepreneurs tend to exaggerate a little," he said, he is not sure whether it truly is.

It's not hyperbole to say the center is unique, however.

Engineering, computer science, music and busi-

Council to focus on Public Library parking

■ The council could spend \$44,000 to create one more space or \$10,000 to create 91.

Because of its decision to sell the parking lot adjacent to the Iowa City Public Library — thus decreasing the number of parking spots available — the Iowa City City Council will look at ways to increase available parking in the area.

In its work session tonight, the council will discuss two proposals drafted by city officials.

One of the options, suggested Library Board of Trustees, would put angled parking in front of the Public Library,

123 S. Linn St. The change would add an additional space, from five to six, and would cost roughly \$44,000. Funding would be come from the library project's budget, said Susan Craig, the director of the library.

The board initially suggested angled parking in response to complaints and to increase the visibility of signs designating short-term parking spaces located in front of the library, she said.

"Parking is the No. 1 issue we get complaints about, especially with short-term spaces," she said. "Signs (for short-term parking) will be better seen with angled parking."

The parking has not been


Those who still haven't filed their income taxes have until midnight to send their returns to the Internal Revenue Service by phone, Internet or mail.

The April 15 deadline for filing income taxes fell on a Sunday this year, giving Americans an automatic one-day extension to have their forms postmarked.

Those who submit their taxes late are subject to a late-filing penalty, said Brian Kooyman, the owner of Kooyman Tax Service in the Old Capitol Town Center. He



The brow wax makes the man

Local image consultants are noticing that males are caring more and more about their looks.

No one's supposed to know. Or at least admit to it. But it's not a secret.

Men care about their physical appearance. And it's becoming a trend, say some local image consultants.

"I don't know why, but men are becoming more concerned about their looks," said Jesi Cisney, a hair stylist at Buzz, 115 S. Dubuque St. "Males are definitely vain. They just don't show it."

Highlights, hair-care products and eyebrow waxes — traditionally considered female services — are becoming increasingly popular among the male clients at Buzz, Cisney said.

"It's good for me," she said. "I think a lot of it has to do with the way society is. I don't think it's changed the way they think; maybe it's changed what they do. The world's changing a lot."

It's shifting so much that such cosmetic companies as Estée Lauder, Clinique and Clarins are specifically targeting male customers.

Estée Lauder released its male line this March, and Clinique has carried a male line for the past few years. Clarins carries a sex-neutral line that is sold to both males and females.

"I have noticed more ads media-wise and commercials on TV," said Wendy Daedlow, a skin-care specialist at Younkers in the Coral Ridge Mall and a counter manager for Clarins. "(Men) are very,

very open when they approach the counter. I think it's getting enough courage to approach the counter to begin with (that's difficult). I was surprised (at first), but I think it's wonderful. A man has to take care of his skin, too."

And his eyebrows. Barber and stylist Daniel Pomales of Buzz has been waxing away unibrows and unshapely facial hair on male clients for a year. Word got around that Pomales' avocation of brow waxing was so impressive that Buzz began offering the service to customers, at a cost of \$15 per pair, last year. Pomales sees six to 12 male clients per month.

"It's not a surprise," he said. "I think more and more guys are going for a well-groomed look."

Girlfriends are sometimes the initial impetus men have to get their brows waxed, as well as the perpetrator of a man's first pore plucking, he said.

Iowa City head and neck surgeon Dwayne Capper said men are becoming increasingly interested in reshaping their faces, too.

Capper said he has performed cosmetic surgery on male clients as young as 16 and as old as 50 at Otolologic Medical Services PC, 540 E. Jefferson St.

"My thought about it is if it's something that'll make them feel better about themselves and something they want, that's great," he said. "(Men) are becoming more brave."

The most popular procedures among men are eyelid surgery, facelifts, brow lifts and rhinoplasty, or nose jobs, he said. Prices for the procedures cost between \$650-\$3,000.

The American Society of Plastic Surgeons reports that almost 11 percent of all plastic surgery procedures in 1999 were performed on men, a 2 percent increase from the previous year. According to the group's statistics, liposuction was the most popular procedure, making up approximately 28 percent of the procedures.

UI graduate student Nick Ford said that although the Abercrombie & Fitch model has become the Adonis of modern times, he and his friends are not affected by the messages peddling male vanity — except for a little hair complex. Ford said some of his friends do shave their chests and backs.

"With the media and what the ideal guy is portrayed as on TV, it's a little hard to look like that without a little help," he said. "I think it's a lot healthier than what the women have."

UI sophomore Katie Lynch said she doesn't see anything wrong with the trend of male vanity she's witnessed, but she admitted the guys with the perfect hair and nice clothes trigger apprehension in her.

"When I see guys like that, I find it strange," she said. "It makes me wonder how they judge other people's physical appearance. I think our society does invest a lot in physical appearance and attractiveness."

Capper, Cisney and Pomales all agreed that the trend in male vanity has some roots in the media, movies and society's emphasis on beauty.

And there's one truth they all know.

Pomales said, "Everybody knows everyone wants to be approved and accepted by other people."

Child believed to have started fire

A fire at an Iowa City duplex left eight without a home over the weekend.

According to reports, the Iowa City Fire Department received a fire alarm at 12:39 p.m. on April 14. Firefighters arrived at 2655 Indigo Court to find a unit at the duplex ablaze. Upon arrival, flames covered the door of the unit, and there was heavy smoke, according to a Fire Department report.

The occupants of the unit, Corinell Smith and seven of her family members, were assisted by the Red Cross.

The Iowa City Fire Department battalion chief, Elmer Brenneman, said the fire originated in the rear bedroom of the unit. There was extensive fire damage to two bedrooms and one bathroom, and heavy heat and smoke damage to the rest of the unit, he said.

Fire officials believe the fire was started by a child playing with matches.

Brenneman said he urges parents to make sure all matches and lighters are kept on a high place where children can't reach them.

Damage is estimated at \$60,000. There were no injuries to the occupants or the firefighters.

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Legislators ponder redistricting

The current proposal puts 70 incumbents into legislative districts with another incumbent.

DES MOINES — With their political futures in hand, lawmakers will decide on a new redistricting map this week that could dictate the congressional and legislative districts for the next decade.

The nonpartisan Legislative Service Bureau produced new political boundaries last week that pushed Republican U.S. Reps. Jim Leach and Jim Nussle into the same Eastern Iowa district and tossed 70 state legislators into districts with each other.

After a muted response on April 12, Republican leaders signaled reservations with the proposal. Senate Majority Leader Stewart Iverson, R-Dows, said the population differences in the newly drawn legislative districts could create hardships.

Echoing a complaint raised

by some Republicans, Iverson questioned population differences in some Senate seats, noting that the largest seat included more than 1,000 people than the smallest district.

"Before legislators start making retirement plans or renting U-Hauls based on this current plan, we need to take a hard look and see if this plan is really in the best interests of the people of Iowa," Iverson said.

Democrats — eyeing solid Democratic voter registrations in three congressional districts and hopes for a Statehouse majority — said the plan was fair and would create competitive elections.

Republicans hold four of the five congressional seats. Democrats said the new plan reflects the decline in rural areas, typically represented by Republicans, and growth in Iowa's urban regions.

"It's not some plot to throw people together in districts and create advantage. It's the changing demographics in this state, and that's the plan we have in front of us," said Senate Minority Leader Mike Gronstal of Council Bluffs. "It's

a competitive, fair, evenhanded plan that means we'll have competitive elections in 2002."

Under the state's unique redistricting law, lawmakers cannot change the map they received on April 12; they must accept it or reject it outright. If it's rejected, staffers would offer a second take-it-or-leave-it proposal. If the process moves to a third proposal, lawmakers can alter it.

On the surface, the large number of incumbents thrown into districts with each other — 50 percent of the House and 40 percent of the Senate — might indicate an abrupt dismissal of the plan.


But both parties would run the risk that a second plan would cause more problems for incumbents.

Even though many incumbents were forced to reassess their future, the proposal still left unharmed 30 members in the Senate and 50 in the House, providing strength among members looking for self-preservation.

about the shape of the congressional districts also acknowledge ways to maintain at least three seats.

Nussle and Rep. Tom Latham, a Republican from Alexander, could move into more friendly districts without much disruption to their lives.

The plan's fate could be determined by three public hearings scheduled to begin next week. The Legislature could vote on the plan as early as April 26.

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Cincinnati relatively calm after victim's funeral

■ The mayor eases the city's dusk-to-dawn curfew for Easter.

CINCINNATI — The mayor rolled back the city's dusk-to-dawn curfew Sunday in response to a calm night following the funeral of a young black man whose shooting triggered a week of unrest.

Mayor Charles Luken said the curfew will start at 11 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. to allow families more time to celebrate Easter together.

"Hopefully, today can be a day of prayer. A day of peace. A day of coming together," he said.

The April 7 death of Timothy Thomas, 19, led to three days of rioting in predominantly black neighborhoods, which stopped when the mayor instituted the curfew on April 12.

Thomas, who was wanted

on 14 warrants for misdemeanors and traffic violations, was unarmed when he was shot while running from police. He is the fourth black man killed by police since November in this city of 331,000 — 43 percent of which is black.

Stephen Roach, the officer who shot Thomas, is on paid administrative leave.

Overnight on April 14, police arrested 187 people for curfew violations and got calls about shots being fired and sporadic instances of rocks and bottles being thrown at police cruisers.

"It was almost a boring night for us," Police Chief Thomas Streicher said.

Since Thomas' death, more than 700 people have been arrested for looting, arson, vandalism and curfew violations.

The Rev. Al Sharpton, who cut short a trip to Africa to fly to Cincinnati, said Sunday that the federal government must take a leadership role in

improving relationships between city police departments and blacks and that President Bush must get involved.

"He has a crisis in his country," said the Baptist minister, a leading critic of New York City police's violent confrontations with blacks. "It's time for a national response and real change, not just telling us to quiet down."

Later in the day, Sharpton led mourners in prayer at the site where Thomas was shot and urged that justice be done.

Minutes after Sharpton stood at the spot where Thomas was shot, Thomas' brother Terry, 17, walked up and touched the concrete wall where someone had spray-painted "RIP Tim." Others hugged him as he looked down at the flowers, Bible, football and other items that well-wishers had left on the ground.

On April 14, hundreds of pro-

testers marched through the riot-scarred Over-the-Rhine neighborhood after the funeral.

Four people were injured by crowd-control bean bags shot by police and State Highway Patrol officers, but the march was otherwise peaceful. Police and the FBI were investigating why officers also shot bean bags at a group milling on streets shortly after the funeral ended.

"We don't feel completely like this is over. We recognize that in certain parts of the city tensions still are a little high," Luken said.

NAACP President Kweisi Mfume and Keith Fangman, the president of the local police union, appeared on "Fox News Sunday" and ABC's "This Week With Sam Donaldson and Cokie Roberts" to debate the deaths of 15 blacks by police since 1995.

Fangman said 12 deaths involved suspects who confronted police with deadly weapons. He questioned

Mfume on whether police officers should have the right to use deadly force in a life-threatening situation.

"Do you believe that when an unarmed suspect is run-

ning from police, has no weapon, makes no deadly moves, should be shot down in a dark alley like a dog, like a pig, like an animal?" Mfume said.

Ex-con charged in bar shooting

ELGIN, Ill. — The man accused of shooting 18 people in a crowded bar was an ex-con obsessed with guns and the movie *Natural Born Killers* who shaved his head and donned fatigues before the attack, acquaintances and witnesses said Sunday.

Police said 42-year-old Luther "Luke" Casteel returned to the bar early on April 14 after being asked to leave. Bar patron Michael York, who huddled inside a garbage can behind the bar during the shooting, said he heard Casteel shout, "I'm the king — how do you like me now?"

"I can still hear that laugh," York said. "How can you laugh when you're killing people?"

Two people were killed and 16 others wounded by gunfire. Five patrons suffered cuts, bumps and bruises when they tried to escape, police said.

Casteel was wearing military-style fatigues and carry-

ing two handguns, two shotguns and 200 rounds of live ammunition, police said.

On Sunday, Casteel — described by acquaintances as a divorced construction worker — was ordered held without bond. He is charged with first-degree murder, attempted murder, firearms violations and assault.

Police said Casteel had served 13 years in prison on a 1978 armed-robbery conviction.

Neighbors in blue-collar Elgin, approximately 35 miles west of Chicago, said Casteel lived alone in a town house with his dog.

"It is a shock," said Brian White. "He was a good neighbor. I've never seen a hostile bone in his body."

A friend of Casteel's who was at the bar with him earlier in the night said he was obsessed with guns, military paraphernalia and the film *Natural Born Killers*, in which two killers embark on a crime spree.

"He gets this attitude, like there's a devil in his eye," said Angela Barnhill, 24.

Barnhill said she met Casteel five days earlier and that the two were dating. She said

Casteel was kicked out, allegedly for hassling a female patron and arguing about his tab with a bartender, and that she followed him home and spoke with him in the parking lot.

"I said, 'What's wrong?' and he said, 'Go home! And I went home,'" she said.

Witnesses said Casteel returned to JB's Pub approximately an hour and 15 minutes later, at 12:30 a.m., and began firing shots outside the bar. He then went inside and continued shooting as customers scattered, police said.

The gunman was tackled by other patrons, who held him until officers arrived. Approximately 200 people were in the bar at the time of the attack.

Killed were bartender Jeff Weides, 38, and patron Richard Bartlett, 48, both of Elgin.

The cheerful exterior of the tavern — in a long, white building with a festive green, purple and yellow awning and a sign promising "food, fun, drink" — became somber in the hours after the shooting as mourners left flowers and notes to the victims.

No court-martial for sub skipper

■ The *New York Times* reports the Greenville commander will receive a lesser punishment.

NEW YORK — The three admirals on the Navy's court of inquiry into the USS *Greenville's* sinking of a Japanese fishing vessel have unanimously recommended that the submarine's skipper not be tried by a court-martial, the *New York Times* reported Sunday.

Instead, the skipper, Cmdr. Scott Waddle, is likely to face a lesser form of punishment such as a punitive letter or reprimand, the *Times* said, citing unnamed senior Pentagon officials.

A reprimand would effectively end Waddle's career and could reduce his retirement benefits. But it would not result in a jail sentence, as a court-martial could.

The Navy's chief spokesman, Rear Adm. Stephen Pietropaoli, said Sunday that he could not confirm the report.

"I don't know it to be true," he said. "Am I surprised? No."

Various media reports last week said the panel was split in its recommendation, with one report saying it was unlikely Waddle would face a court-martial. Military officials did not comment on those reports.

On Feb. 9, the *Greenville* surfaced beneath the Japanese fishing vessel *Ehime Maru* near Honolulu while conducting a rapid-ascent drill for 16 civilian guests. Nine people on the boat were killed in the accident.

The collision strained relations between Japan and the United States and prompted criticism of a Navy public-relations program that allows civilians on submarines at sea.

Coke is it for Cyclone nation

■ ISU is close to signing a contract with Coke that would put its logo all over campus.

AMES — Iowa State University is close to a deal with Coca-Cola Co. that would bring the school nearly \$4 million, officials estimate.

The deal would give Coke exclusive rights to campus vending machines, athletics events, concerts and other venues.

Coca-Cola would get more than profits. Coke executives want access to 16 skyboxes at Jack Trice Stadium, 14 courtside seats at basketball games and season passes and choice parking at several athletics events, the proposal says.

Coke officials also want

royalty-free use of the ISU logo, sponsorship of ISU events and free entry to coaches' camps for youths.

ISU officials sought bids from other soft-drink suppliers, but 90 percent of the campus already serves Coca-Cola through minor contracts, said Warren Madden, ISU's vice president for business and finance.

There would be some visible signs of the deal. Bike racks, for instance, would bear the logo of Powerade, a Coke product. Vending machines would carry pictures of Beardshear Hall with Coca-Cola banners wrapped around its columns.

Some ISU faculty members oppose the deal, saying it "belittles the dignity of the institution," said Lehman Fletcher, and economics professor.

Entrepreneurial center breaks out of the box

ness majors sit side-by-side in classes. Adjunct professors, with real-world experience in entrepreneurship, head most of the hands-on courses. And camps are in place each summer for elementary and high school kids with business dreams.

The center is about to conclude its first official year and has seen enrollment reach approximately 900 on-campus students. While undergraduates in any major can enroll in the courses, David Hensley, the director of the center, said there are some universal traits in the students.

"The majority of them have a sincere interest in controlling their own destinies," he said. "I'm surprised by how many say that two or three years after graduation, they want to go out on their own."

"I certainly know when I was in school that wasn't the case. You went to school, you got a job, you wanted to be assistant vice president by 35, VP by 45, and then get your gold watch."

With a new attitude on college campuses — students dreaming of being their own boss straight out of school — the center has to provide accordingly, and everyone seems to be benefiting.

Some UI students have gone on to create successful businesses right out of school, or, in the case of Tara Cronbaugh, the founder of the Java House, while she was still in school. Others have been taught that running a business might not be in their futures.

"These professors are just different from other ones," said senior Mitch Peyton, who plans to start his own trucking company in Iowa after graduation. "When you go into other teachers' office hours, all they want to do is talk about their class. These professors are more concerned about you and your future. They want you to be a successful entrepreneur. The others couldn't care less."

The primary goal of the center is to help find a niche for all the students. And if that lands them in the boundaries of Iowa, you won't hear any complaining.

"Obviously, people are going to follow the opportunities," Fethke said. "In the business school, 40 percent of our enrollment is from out-of-state.

Some will stay in Iowa. Not all of them, but some of them. Some who grow up in Iowa will leave. And that's the way it is.

"We're here to find them opportunities. And if the Entrepreneurial Center can help people develop their skills to create businesses in Iowa — all the better, all the better."

Fethke emphasizes "all the better" as if knowing Pappajohn would not only want it repeated, he would want to sing the phrase. Pappajohn has maintained a keen interest in the program despite spreading most of his energy between his own business endeavors in Des Moines and New York City.

"He is always enthusiastic," Fethke said. "I've never seen that man not enthusiastic. He often tells me that I need to be more enthusiastic."

If Fethke lacks gusto on some days, Hensley has plenty to go around.

Hensley is almost giddy when he talks about his students and the center he runs. He smiles at every inch of it — the brilliant and the laughable ideas his students try to devel-

op into small businesses. Each seem to amaze him in one way or another.

"One thing I have learned," he said, "is that I've seen many people with ideas that I thought were very good, but nothing ever came of it. And I've seen other students with ideas that I didn't think merited much consideration that turned them into fairly suc-

cessful businesses.

"We can't guarantee success. We can teach the students lessons that will increase their probability of success. But there are a lot of other factors that come into it. We try to teach them about the playing field they are entering, so they plan accordingly."

recent purchase of new furniture for the Main Library. Coleman decides how the funds are dispersed.

The university is also automatically supplied with some recycling bins under the conditions outlined in the contract, said Kent Palma, the cold-drink manager for Coca-Cola in Cedar Rapids.

Klenske said he is still unsure of the number of bins the university would need. The cost per bin is also yet to be determined, said Belinda Marner, the assistant vice president for student services, adding that Klenske has been considering various types of containers.

Past instances of contamination, in which aluminum and plastic recyclables were mixed with paper products, could stand in the way of the university adopting the proposal, she

said. In addition, officials said, extra labor costs may be difficult to cover because of the tight university budget.

"I'm just trying to respond to their request, work with them, help them, and see what we can do," said Marner, who is collaborating with Klenske and other campus organizations to establish the program. "The pilot program is really just a test to see if it's going to be effective."

As for the university's future with Coca-Cola, Beach said, "We have options."

After the contract expires in 2003, the UI may choose to extend it for up to two more years — totaling five years with the company — or bid it out again, she said. The university can spend a maximum of five years with Coca-Cola before it will be forced to open bidding again.

THE REGISTRATION RITUAL RESUMES ...

Register for some aspirin

Today marks the first day of registration — more appropriately known as "Mandatory Headache Week." This seemingly simple process should not be as torturous as it is, but, thanks to UI procedures, many people would rather rip their own hairs out one by one than register for classes.

Several of the recent rules and regulations the university has imposed upon students have done nothing but stir up groans and create countless hurdles to overcome.

The first hurdle to get over is finding a printed course schedule. It costs \$1.50 — 75 cents more for the Liberal Arts Guide. If you are not willing to shell out the money for an essential pamphlet the university should provide for free, than to the Web you must go — an alternative, but certainly less convenient.

The next hurdle to get past is registering at a decent

have been bad, for the semester-hours cap was lowered. This was done to prevent people from saving a class for a friend and dropping it at a later date. But while this credit-hour cap was meant to help people out, it only hinders students' abilities to get all the classes they want or need.

Registration is pure hell. It is rare for students to get all the classes they want or to get a satisfactory registration date. Though the university can't do anything to fix the registration date problem, they can improve other aspects of registration. Before the next round of registration arrives next fall, the school should raise the semester-hour registration limit to 18, provide course books for free ... and provide complimentary beverages in the ITCs to lessen the stress. It's the least the UI could do.


Fortunately, Douglass rebelled against his slave master and found freedom. How long will it take for us to rebel against our slave master and find our freedom?

New Spade film dumb as dirt

In trying to write an appropriately witty opening line to this review, I came up with two possible options: "From the producers of *Big Daddy* and *Deuce Bigalow* comes an equally unfunny waste of six bucks." Or, "*Joe Dirt* is so bad, David Spade should be neutered." All (bad) jokes aside, it does seem wrong somehow to rip on a stupid movie like *Joe Dirt*. After all, it's not trying to be *Citizen Kane*; it just wants to make you laugh. But that's exactly why comedies are the easiest movies to review — because the criteria are so simple. If it's funny, then it's good. If it isn't funny, then it's bad. Regrettably, much like its title character, *Joe Dirt* is mostly a failure. Then again, humor is subjective, and while the movie

didn't produce many laughs for me, it did have a quite a few 13-year-olds in the audience in stitches.

The plot, for what it's worth, is sort of a watered down, white-trash version of *Forrest Gump*. Instead of recounting his life story while sitting on a park bench, Joe (David Spade) takes to the airwaves. As a janitor at an LA radio station, the mullet-haired, Lynyrd Skynyrd-loving Joe gets suckered into being the object of ridicule on a popular morning talk show hosted by the sarcastic Zander Kelly, played by Dennis Miller, who is basically playing himself.

Joe becomes a regular guest on the show as he chronicles the sad tale of how his parents abandoned him at the Grand Canyon when he was 8 and how he has been criss-crossing the country ever since in search of

his family. He also talks about Brandy (Brittany Daniel), the gorgeous blonde who was his only true friend.

When I reviewed the Adam Sandler comedy *Little Nicky* a few months ago, I asked lamentably: "Where's the crass, vulgar comedian we used to know and love?" Although his humor was never quite as crude as Sandler's,

the same question could be asked of Spade, who was hilarious on "Saturday Night Live" and also in *Tommy Boy* and *PCU*. In all of these cases, however, Spade wasn't the star. Since becoming a comedic leading man, he has appeared in the forgettable *Lost & Found* and now this disappointment, both of which he co-wrote.

Joe Dirt does manage a few good laughs, such as when Joe pays a police sketch artist to

draw his parents. Curiously, his dad resembles Father Time, while his mom ends up looking like the infamous serial killer Richard Ramirez (a.k.a. the Night Stalker), complete with pentagram tattoo.

Perhaps the film's best scene — and certainly the most uncomfortable to watch — is when Joe encounters a dog named Charlie, whose testicles have frozen to a porch (never mind the fact that it's summer). Whenever poor Charlie tries to stand, his scrotum stretches like silly putty. Sure, it's tasteless and gross, but hey, at least it's original.

Unfortunately, that is where the laughs stop ... and I do mean stop. Except for the occasional chuckle, I can't recall a single genuine laugh during the last half-hour of the movie, which tries too hard to be warm and fuzzy — not even the 13-year-olds behind me were laughing. In a movie filled with numerous fart jokes and other scatological comedic delights, that can't be a good sign.

Spy Kids, Spider retain box-office holds

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A bawdy romance, a funeral flick, a gross-out comedy and a cartoon adaptation could not compete with a family of spies and cops on a kidnapping case.

Spy Kids held the top spot at the box office for the third-straight weekend, grossing \$12.8 million to bring its 17-day total to \$68.6 million, according to studio estimates Sunday.

Last weekend's No. 2 film, the abduction thriller *Along Came a*

Spider, held the second spot again with \$11.3 million to boost its 10-day take to \$33.7 million.

The top six films were bunched up within a few million dollars, and the rankings could change today when final figures are released.

In third place was the new film *Bridget Jones's Diary*, starring Renee Zellweger as a lovelorn Londoner who sets out on some lusty misadventures. The film had a solid average of \$6,713 a cinema playing in 1,611 theaters. The film was adapted from the novel by Helen Fielding, who co-wrote the screenplay.

The movie did well with women from ages 18 through their 50s.

"Many of them brought their husbands and boyfriends, so it was a good date movie," said David Brooks, the executive president of marketing for Miramax. "In many cases, you had packs of women going, which is always a good thing."

Bridget Jones opened simultaneously in Great Britain, where it had a strong debut weekend of \$8.4 million.





Ferentz finds depth at spring game

■ Most of Iowa's starting lineup will be decided during fall practice.

The annual spring football game on April 14 provided fans with a first-hand realization of what every Iowa coach and player already knows — a whole lot of men will be fighting for very few spots come September.

On display in Iowa's first-string team's 35-2 victory over the reserves was some depth that coach Kirk Ferentz has been searching for since his arrival in 1998.

And the head Hawkeye is in no hurry to break up the scrum of players fighting for either starting or back-up roles, especially at the key positions of quarterback and running back.

Ferentz said the competition between senior Kyle McCann and sophomore Jon Beutjer for the quarterback job is healthy for the team and will likely carry into the first weeks of camp in August, with junior-college transfer Brad Banks a hopeful contender.

"I don't think at this point it's advantageous for me to make a call," Ferentz said. "It's too close to call. It's pretty clear we have three guys that will help us win next fall."

Both McCann and Beutjer directed two scoring drives apiece for the black shirts Saturday. McCann completed seven of nine passes for 137 yards, while taking snaps on the winning side. Beutjer was six of seven for 76 yards. Banks threw for 38 yards and two interceptions on four of 11 attempts for the white-shirt squad.

In addition, those contending for star running

Iowa was just one stroke away from earning the runners-up trophy, which went to Indiana. Last weekend, the Hawks finished 79 strokes behind this Hoosiers. This week, they almost beat them. Furthermore, Iowa outshined Big Ten foes Wisconsin and Minnesota, not to mention a good Kansas squad.

Michigan easily took the team title with a three-round total of 902. Michigan's Kim Benedict won the individual title in a four-way playoff over teammate Le Anna Wicks,

Split with Illini heats up conference race

The Big Ten sends its top six teams to the conference baseball tournament at the end of the season. With three weeks remaining in the season, Illinois and Iowa sat at sixth and seventh heading into last weekend's four-game series in Iowa City.

The Hawkeyes swept the Illini in a April 14 double-header but lost in single contests on April 13 and Sunday to split a crucial series with Illinois at Duane Banks Field. The sweep puts Iowa at 14-15 overall and 5-8 in the Big Ten. The Illini held on to sixth place as they moved to 7-9 in conference.

"We've got to remember what we're playing for," Iowa coach Scott Broghamer said.

One day after losing to NAIA Mt. Mercy, the Hawkeyes looked like they were on a mission, as they jumped to a 3-0 lead in the April 13 game, scoring one run in the first and two in the second. The Illini forged a strong comeback, scoring eight unanswered runs,



Iowa gets big home wins over Big Ten foes

Seniors Tyler Cleveland and Tom Buetikofer go out in style.

In arguably the biggest dual meet of the year for the Iowa men's tennis team, the Hawkeyes' fate may have hinged on something more than just a simple Tyler Cleveland passing shot.

When Iowa seniors Cleveland and Tom Buetikofer's singles matches ended almost simultaneously and both in victory for the Hawkeyes, it appeared that maybe destiny was at play in Iowa's 5-2 win over Michigan at the UI Recreation Building.

"This was something like a Hollywood script," Iowa coach Steve Houghton said. "I predicted to the assistant coaches that the meet would come down to Buetikofer on senior's day, and he would win, and

we'd win the meet. But with both him and Tyler winning at the same time, that was really something special."

Cleveland and Buetikofer's wins were the final blows in the strongest day of the season for the Hawkeyes (11-8, 3-5 in the Big Ten). Iowa won all three doubles matches for the second-straight Big Ten dual meet. The Hawkeyes also got a straight-set win from sophomore Stuart Waters and an injury-default win from senior Jake Wilson to set the stage for the last home matches for Cleveland and Buetikofer.

Cleveland's 7-6, 6-7, 6-3 win over Michigan's Henry Beam Jr. was far more dramatic than Cleveland would have liked in his final home match. Cleveland let a 5-2 tiebreaker lead in the second set slip away and dropped the tiebreaker 7-5 before flinging his racket the length of the court in frustration.

Cleveland then broke Beam's strong serve early in

the third set and never looked back on the way to improve his season record to 17-2 and his school-best career mark at Iowa to 101-34.

"While I was playing I started thinking about all sorts of things, which I probably shouldn't have been," Cleveland said. "I was thinking about how it was my last match and how we've never beaten Michigan since I've been here. I couldn't think of a better way to go out."

Buetikofer, who is a junior athletically, but will likely forgo his senior year of eligibility, managed to outlast the Wolverines' Jeremy Edelson, 6-1, 3-6, 7-5.

"I woke up this morning, and I started thinking about how this was my last match at Iowa," Buetikofer said. "I got off to a slow start in the second set, and I dropped that one, and I just told myself I had to come out in the third set and go out with a bang. It was awe-

some."

The Hawkeyes also managed to defeat Michigan State, 5-2, on April 14 at the Klotz Tennis Courts, fueled by three doubles wins and key singles wins from Wilson, Stuart Waters and Hunter Skogman.

Wilson fought off three match points after falling behind 5-4 in the second set before winning the set, 7-5, over MSU's Jimmy Maguire and dominating the third set, 6-3, in front of a boisterous Iowa crowd.

"A few of my buddies were out there, and they were cheering for me," Wilson said. "That helped out because they came at a time when the match was really tight, and things were crazy. After that, it was just a matter of having confidence in my game."

Iowa will return to the road to square off with Minnesota Friday before concluding the Big Ten regular season at Wisconsin Saturday.

Grant expects more Iowa athletes to travel to Lawrence, Kan., for the Kansas Relays Friday and Saturday.

The Iowa women's rowing team fought hard in the Buckeye Invitational against a handful of the top-ranked rowing schools.

Iowa's No. 11-ranked Varsity 8 boat kept up with some of the nation's best but landed in fifth in the morning session of the first Varsity 8 competition in a time of 6:51.69. All seven schools in the invitational on April 14 raced at the same

time in this particular race.

Iowa also finished fourth in the morning session of the First Varsity 4 race in 8:00.88.

Eleven Hawkeyes took to the road this weekend to compete in the Lee Calhoun Memorial Invitational, hosted by Western Illinois University.

Two Hawkeyes ventured to Arizona State on April 14 for the Sun Angle Classic. Hawkeye sophomore Russell Peterson finished second in the 400-meter hurdles (52.61). Wiczorek was impressed by his performance in the highly competitive, large-meet setting.

"We used this weekend to prepare our team for Mt. Sac. and some for UNI," Wiczorek said. "Mt. Sac. is a national meet, and we are trying to get good performances on the national scene."

Hopkins outpoints Holmes for WBC title

NEW YORK (AP) — Longtime IBF middleweight champion Bernard Hopkins said if he didn't knock out WBC champ Keith Holmes in their title fight Saturday night, he didn't deserve to win.

The unanimous decision will do, though.

"First of all, I did predict I would knock him out," Hopkins said. "Second of all, I lied. No more guaranteed knockouts."

Winners can afford to make jokes, and Hopkins was a decisive winner in the opener of the unification series. The unanimous decision was a workman-like job by Hopkins, who was never in trouble

against Holmes.

The victory earned him a Sept. 15 date against the winner of next month's fight between WBA champ William Joppy and undefeated Felix Trinidad, who is moving up from the 154-pound division. The September fight will produce an undisputed middleweight champ.

Holmes, idle for almost a year, said he was head-butted in the first round and complained of double vision after that.

"I didn't want to throw the left because I didn't know where he was," Holmes said. "It was really hard to see. He head-butted me in the eye in the first round. He uses his head well."

Hopkins lost a point for a low

blow in the fifth round and was warned twice more after that.

"I have to fight the way I was taught to fight in Philadelphia," he said. "There might have been one or two low blows, but they were not intentional."

"Immortality! That's what I'm fighting for."

Judge George Colon had it 118-109 for Hopkins. Larry Hazzard Jr. had Hopkins ahead, 117-110, and Tom Kaczmarek scored it, 119-108. The Associated Press card had Hopkins winning 119-108.

After the fight, Holmes embraced Hopkins.

"We're two warriors and we went at it," he said. "You move on. I stay here."

Hawkeye women notch consecutive wins

The No. 33 Iowa women's tennis team posted its first back-to-back wins since Feb. 24 over the weekend in dominating fashion, upping its record on the season to 10-8 (4-4 in the Big Ten) with two crucial conference meets remaining.

After meeting up with the Big Ten's best for more than a month and having mixed results, the Hawkeyes took out their frustrations on the state of Michigan, first on April 14 with a 7-0 pounding of Michigan State in East Lansing. Iowa then won the doubles-point and four singles matches on route to handling Michigan on Sunday in Ann Arbor.

Sunday's victory was keyed by a strong doubles showing

for the Hawkeyes, who dropped both doubles points against Illinois and Northwestern on April 7 and 8. The top duo of junior Toni Neykova and freshman Deni Alexandrova rallied from facing a set point at 7-5 and managed to pull out a 9-7 win.

The team of senior Erica Johnson and sophomore Steffi Hoch also posted a win at the third spot, 8-4.

"The big thing was how our senior players played; they

have been playing very well recently" said Iowa coach Paul Wardlaw. "The trick has been that in the last two or three years, our success has been a tribute to how our older players play. It's nice to see we're following in form."

The Hawkeyes will return to Iowa City to host Minnesota Saturday, followed by a showdown with Wisconsin on April 22.

Huge comeback lifts Sorenstam to win

LOS ANGELES — Not even a 10-shot deficit could keep Annika Sorenstam from picking up another trophy — and four more lines in the record book.

The Swedish sensation birdied four of the last nine holes and got help from Pat Hurst's back-nine collapse to win a record-tying fourth-consecutive LPGA Tour title in a playoff on April 14.

Not since Hall of Famer Kathy Whitworth in 1969 has anyone captured that many consecutively scheduled events. Mickey Wright, another Hall of Famer, accomplished the feat in 1962 and '63.

"I think about those things, but it's tough being out here just trying to win tournaments," said Sorenstam, who has four wins and two seconds in six events this year. "I tried not to build it up too much for myself. But if you had asked me if it would end this way, it would have been tough to believe."

Especially because she trailed Hurst by 10 shots

entering the final round of the Office Depot at Wilshire Country Club.

As Sorenstam headed for the back nine at 3-under, she was reminded by her caddy that victory was still possible. She nodded at him.

"I felt it inside," she said. "I was so calm and confident in my own game."

In addition to her record-tying win, Sorenstam added her name to three more marks in the LPGA record book.

She:

- Set a record for biggest comeback in tour history.
- Broke Karrie Webb's record for fastest player to reach \$700,000 in season earnings. Sorenstam leads with \$756,448 in six events.
- Became the tour's career money leader with \$6,957,044.

Sorenstam couldn't decide which was more amazing: her comeback or becoming the first woman to shoot 59 in a tournament last month.

"Wow! It's unbelievable," she said. "I don't know what I've done to deserve all this. It's got to be destiny."

At 30, she already has qualified for the LPGA's Hall of Fame. However, she can't be inducted until she's played 10 years on the tour, which won't happen until the end of the 2003 season.

In a losing effort, junior D. J. Johnson, along with Pagel, who played both for both teams, had a game-high eight tackles.

With both Kahlil Hill and Ramon Ochoa out of action, Iowa was thin at wide receiver on both sides. However linebacker-turned-tight end, Dallas Clark emerged as perhaps the biggest receiving surprise, snaring three catches for 55 yards and a touchdown.

"This spring has been phenomenal," he said. "I've just been trying to pick up things and learn from my mistakes."

Learning from mishaps and building on positives will be

the theme through the summer drills into the August two-a-days. While Ferentz said the team has grown closer through the competition and created added depth, the Hawkeyes are not ready to take a Big Ten title.

questioning the decision by Ferentz to stick to his guns on Kyle McCann.

That didn't happen, as none of Iowa's passers distinguished themselves. This makes it much more convenient for Ferentz to say there will be no changes to his current depth chart for the position. The spring-game showdown between the three showed no need for change.

McCann is the current choice to hold down the top slot at QB because of his experience and his performance when Jon Beutjer was injured late last season. Meanwhile, Beutjer's play last season after he took over for Scott Mullen in the middle of Big Ten play

makes a strong case for him as well. Brad Banks is the admitted long shot after transferring from junior college. He is still learning the system, and thus he committed a few more transgressions than his veteran counterparts.

The format of the spring game did nothing to help the case of either three men. There are no sacks in the scrimmage, so anytime a defender lays a hand on one of the QBs, the play is ruled a sack. McCann had a couple long pass completions ruled incomplete because a defender touched him. Banks, the most mobile of the three men, was "sacked" the only time he attempted to scramble out of the pocket, though he clearly was going to escape the defender.

Just as in Florida, each

camp seems to have a number of dedicated fans ready to make an argument for their man. And just like last year, none of the candidates seemed to be able to do anything to distance himself from the rest of the field. The only difference between the two scenarios is that one case was settled in the court of last resort, and the other will be decided by one man.

Voters expected a decision to be announced in November, and Hawkeye fans believed a winner would emerge from the field on April 14. Instead, the Hawkeye nation must wait until September to see what the final ruling in the case of McCann vs. Beutjer vs. Banks will be.
