

Cap-&-gown maker used prison labor

The company has yet to sign on to UI's Code of Conduct for apparel companies

Jostens Inc. has provided the UI with graduation items for several years.

The UI's provider of caps and gowns acknowledged Monday that it used prison labor to sew its products for more than four years in the

1990s. And the company is one of six licensees yet to sign the university's Code of Conduct for apparel companies.

Nonetheless, UI graduates will walk across the stage this weekend wearing caps and gowns made in a Mexican factory by a supplier for Jostens Inc. The university has done business with Jostens, a leader in providing graduation-celebration products, for several years.

University President Mary Sue Coleman is expected to send a letter to the company this week, warning that the school will cancel its licensing contract if the company does not sign the Code of Conduct within 30 days.

But such a cancellation would not cover caps and gowns, university officials say. Jostens' license, and consequently the UI's Code of Conduct, only covers class

rings, graduation diplomas and award certificates and announcements, which are all made in American factories.

At various commencements throughout the weekend, members of the UI Students Against Sweatshops plan to pass out fliers, urging people to write to Jostens and tell it to comply with the Code of Conduct and asking Coleman to enforce the code.

'A business decision'

Between 1993 and 1997, the Minneapolis-based company contracted with a women's correctional facility in South Carolina to produce caps and gowns, said Jostens spokesman Mark Cassut.

At the same time, it was producing caps and gowns at the same Mexican facility in which UI students' current

Bush harshly criticizes trade foes

The president takes aim at what he asserts is a "new protectionism."

WASHINGTON — President Bush sharpened his criticism of trade foes Monday, denouncing "a new kind of protectionism" that, he said, was thwarting the prosperity and spread of democracy that come with the free flow of goods.

"Open trade is not just an economic opportunity," the president said. "It is a moral imperative."

The president's address to a hemispheric business group laid the groundwork for his request later this week for broad treaty-making powers. Presidents from Ford to Clinton had authority to negotiate pacts that could be voted up or down by Congress without amendment, but the authority lapsed in 1994.

Critics of free trade, including many Democrats in Congress, say they fear that Bush would negotiate deals that drive jobs from America or don't live up to U.S. environmental and labor standards. Though he broke no new policy ground, Bush opened a fresh line of attack by accusing his opponents of undermining their own goals.

"By failing to make the case for trade we've allowed a new kind of protectionism to appear in this country. It talks of workers while it opposes a major source of new jobs. It talks of the environment while opposing wealth-creating policies that will pay for clean air and water in developing nations. It talks of the disadvantaged, even as it offers

Mother and daughter beat the odds

After almost 20 years of denying her aspirations, a 48-year-old woman has accomplished something she never thought was possible. But the real triumph for Cathie Stutsman Berglund comes from the fulfillment of her daughter's dreams.

Both Stutsman Berglund and her 23-year-old daughter, Emily Berglund, will graduate from the UI this weekend. Stutsman Berglund, who said her age was an advantage to her, will receive a master's degree in social work Friday. Berglund will receive a bachelor of science degree in nursing Saturday.

Although this weekend will mark huge triumphs in the lives of both women, who grew up in Iowa City, the story of their accomplishments is also one of a few tribulations.

As a child, Stutsman Berglund was told by some of the adults in her life, including teachers, that she was lazy and dumb because she had difficulties in school. Eventually, she came to believe it was true.

Despite her problems, she made it through school and went on to a community college. But the idea that she was dumb was reinforced when she

The continuing greening of Brian Davis

After drastically changing his career plans last December, Brian Davis says he couldn't be happier.

Instead of teaching and studying, the former UI physics graduate student spends his time giving speeches and preparing a platform for the upcoming Iowa City City Council election in November.

Davis decided to leave the university after a year and a half as a graduate student. He originally wanted to pursue the life of a writer but changed his plans as his interest in politics led him to chase a city government seat.

"I did what I should have done when I was a sophomore in [undergraduate] school and stuck with English or political science," he said. "I stuck with physics because it did interest

me. I'd been doing it for a year, and it seemed like the right thing to do."

After leaving school, debt closely followed Davis. His six-month grace period for student-loan payments is up in June, leaving him hoping for a deferment.

"I'm in debt up to my ears, and I'm not making enough money," he said. "I'm making enough to pay the bills, but I'm looking at student loans lingering on the horizon."

Despite Davis' continuing debt, the hopeful politician is looking toward law school and plans to apply for the 2002-03 school year, possibly at the UI.

He's planning to take the LSAT in October.

"If I get in [to law school], I would go if I could afford it, but I'm just trying to make ends meet now," he said.

To pay the bills, Davis is currently working two jobs — one at Reach for Your Potential, where he helps mentally disabled adults achieve their goals, and

Peaceful Fool shows downtown's demise

The storeowner, who is planning to close next month, has some ideas about what will follow him.

Since announcing on May 2 that the Peaceful Fool will close, the business' owner has been wondering what sort of establishment will occupy the building next.

Kevin Perez, who has owned the store for the last nine years, said last week that competition from Coral Ridge Mall is forcing the alternative clothing and gift store to shut down. The Peaceful Fool, 10 S. Clinton St., is expected to close between June 10 and June 15.

Although there are no definite plans for what will happen to the space, Perez said, he has been in contact with people interested in using it.

And he has an idea of what might occupy the building.

"I see an entertainment venue or a restaurant as the most likely to go in there," he said.

Coralville has become the place where people like to go shop, Perez said, so Iowa City

might eventually become a "center of entertainment" for visitors and residents.


The reason that locally owned shops such as the Peaceful Fool have been struggling is because they simply can't compete with bigger and cheaper alternatives, such as those offered at Coral Ridge, agreed Iowa City resident Scott Kading, who co-owns a downtown business and apartment complex at 13 S. Linn St.

This leaves business owners with no other alternative than to open bars and restaurants —

Cincy jury angers blacks

CINCINNATI — Angering black leaders, a grand jury returned two misdemeanor charges Monday against a white police officer whose fatal shooting of an unarmed black man touched off three nights of devastating riots last month.

As night fell, there were scattered reports of broken windows around downtown, where many businesses had been boarded up in case of new violence. Approximately 150 people marched peacefully at police headquarters, chanting "No justice, no peace" as officers on horseback and in riot gear watched nearby in a steady rain. The protest dispersed after an hour.

Officer Stephen Roach was charged with negligent homicide and obstruction of official business exactly one month after 19-year-old Timothy Thomas was shot as he fled down an alley.

Roach, 27, has said he thought Thomas was reaching for a gun, and his attorney said he planned to enter innocent pleas. If convicted of both charges, Roach would face no more than nine months in jail and could receive probation.

"I know that emotions are running high over the tragic death of Timothy Thomas, but the case against Officer Roach cannot be decided based on emotion," prosecutor Michael Allen said.

Thomas, being sought for 14

outstanding warrants, was the fifth black man killed in confrontations with Cincinnati police since November.

The grand jury's choice of misdemeanor charges drew immediate criticism from Thomas' mother, Angela Leisure.

"I feel it was a slap on the wrist," she said. "I don't feel like justice was served. I feel it was not severe enough for the severity of what he did. He took a life. Negligence — that doesn't cut it for me."

She added: "My feelings are borderline rage."

The shooting prompted the city's worst racial violence since the 1968 assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. in Memphis, Tenn. Dozens were injured during last month's unrest, and police made more than 800 arrests before a city-wide curfew helped to restore

order.

Prosecutors announced the grand jury's decision after most downtown workers had gone home. The Cincinnati Reds, who play downtown in Cinergy Field, are out of town until Friday.

The Rev. Damon Lynch, one of the city's most prominent black leaders, called for peace but criticized the grand jury's decision.

"I was expecting exactly what we got — or less," he said.

Earlier Monday, the Justice Department said it has formally opened a civil-rights investigation of the Cincinnati police. An agency official, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said authorities would look for patterns of illegal conduct, including the use of excessive force.

Bush nixes gas-price controls

■ The Bush administration says there is no cure for rising prices at the pump.

WASHINGTON — President Bush has no "magic wand" to wave away soaring gasoline prices, the White House said Monday, ruling out price controls and offering little hope of a reduction in the federal gas tax.

Presidential spokesman Ari Fleischer also dismissed suggestions that high energy costs should change American lifestyles. "That's a big no," he told reporters. "It should be the goal of policy makers to protect the American way of life."

The nation's average price of gas, including all grades and taxes, increased 8.58 cents to \$1.76 over the last two weeks — with the Midwest and West experiencing the biggest jumps at the pump, according to the Lundberg Survey of 8,000 service stations. Fleischer, peppered with questions about the remote possibility of \$3-a-gallon gasoline this summer, said there's not much a president can do.

"It's tantamount to a tax increase on the American people," he said. "That's one reason why it's so important for the nation to have an energy policy that reflects the challenges the nation is facing."

But the White House energy policy, due to be released this month, deals with long-term solutions to supply shortages and won't ease problems at the pump this summer. Fleischer said Bush is opposed to price controls and has not supported calls to repeal or cut the 18.4-cents-a-gallon federal gas tax.

"The president has not joined that chorus before," Fleischer said. "I do not rule it out but ... that is not something the president is focused on." He said reducing the tax would "create havoc" on national road and bridge programs that are funded by the tax.

Senior White House officials, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Bush expects pressure from Congress to reduce the gas tax, perhaps by rolling back the 4.3-cents-a-gallon increase that it imposed in 1993. Bush aides are telling lawmakers he doesn't support the reduction, though they are leaving some wiggle room in case approval of the decrease is critical to passage of his broader energy plans, the officials said.

"If any politician has a magic wand that they can wave over gas prices to lower them, the president ... would like to listen to them," Fleischer said.

"He has never sought a quick fix because quick fixes don't work," the press secretary said. "He will resist the siren song of moving from one short-term solution to another."

Administration officials say the energy report will include incentives for conservation and the use of alternative fuels, such as nuclear power, but Fleischer said energy policy should not disrupt the lives of Americans.

"The American people's use of energy is a reflection of the strength of our economy, of the way of life that the American people have come to enjoy," he said. "The American way of life is a blessed one, and we have a bounty of resources in this country."

The White House has taken a similar little-we-can-do posture as California struggles with electricity shortages. Bush has been criticized in California for his position.

White House advisers are aware that they will come under pressure if gasoline prices spike nationwide during summer vacations, and they are trying to lay the groundwork for Bush's defense.

Fleischer said the problem is because of the lack of an energy policy during the last five to 10 years, pointing a finger not only at President Clinton but also the first Bush administration.

"I picked those years carefully," Fleischer said. "This is not a matter of partisan politics."

U.S. resumes sky-spy flights near China

■ A U.S. surveillance plane monitors China in the first such flight since the April 1 collision.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. military resumed surveillance flights near China Monday, sending an Air Force RC-135 aircraft along the northeast coastline. No Chinese fighter jets tried to interfere.

The renewal of the reconnaissance flights came as the Bush administration pondered how to retrieve its downed Navy spy plane — sitting crippled on a Chinese military runway since the April 1 collision with a Chinese fighter jet.

At the White House, spokesman Ari Fleischer declined to comment on the latest flight beyond noting that the administration's position has been that the surveillance efforts preserve peace in the

region.

The administration had said it intended to resume surveillance missions at some point but refused to specify a time. China has demanded an end to the flights. Its military jets have routinely shadowed U.S. surveillance flights.

The RC-135 flew a "routine pattern" from Kadena Air Base on the Japanese island of Okinawa and then back again, a Defense official said, speaking only on the condition of anonymity.

The unarmed aircraft had no U.S. fighter escorts during the daylight mission, the official added. He declined to comment on whether more flights would soon follow or where they might be sent.

Monday's was the first such flight since the Navy EP-3E Aries II plane collided with the Chinese fighter jet last month and the U.S. plane was forced to make an emergency landing on China's southern Hainan island.

The pilot of the Chinese jet

was lost in the collision, and the 24 crew members of the EP-3E were held on Hainan for 11 days. The U.S. plane was badly damaged in the incident, and officials say the Chinese likely harvested valuable intelligence from the plane, although the crew apparently managed to destroy the most sensitive information.

The RC-135 and the Navy's EP-3E are older aircraft that have been rebuilt to collect and analyze electronic signals to monitor military communica-

tions and activities. The turbofan RC-135 operates with a crew of up to 27 people, including three pilots, two navigators, three electronic warfare officers, 14 intelligence operators and maintenance technicians.

On Sunday, Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld said he believed China would allow the United States to get the EP-3E back, and that the plane could be repaired sufficiently to fly it out. "We'll know later this week," he said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Penn State tightens graduation security after racist threats

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Penn State University said Monday it will set up metal detectors at entrances to commencement ceremonies this weekend as part of tightened security prompted by death threats against black students.

The university urged the 6,250 graduates — and tens of thousands of relatives and others — to arrive at least a half-hour early to allow for delays caused by the screening.

"We really want to assure everybody that they can come, they can come safely, and we are very confident that we will have everything in place," university spokeswoman Christy Rambeau said.

University officials previously announced the hiring of additional guards for the ceremonies, which run from Friday through May 13.

The university provided a 24-hour bodyguard for the president of the student Black Caucus, who was the target of some of the threats, and posted a reward for information leading an arrest and conviction.

On May 2, a weeklong occupation of the student union ended with an agreement between black students and Penn State's president to enhance black-studies programs and do more to promote racial equality.

gowns were made. Gradually, the company stopped using the prison labor and shifted all of its cap and gown production to Mexico.

"It was essentially a business decision," Cassut said of ceasing to use prison labor.

The company received virtually no complaints during the time it used prison labor, he said, but it has recently.

"We've received more calls and complaints over the past two years than we did the whole time we were using it," he said. "There's a lot of outdated information on the Internet ... We haven't used prison labor in more than four years."

Some state governments accept payments from private companies to make products in their prisons as a way to soften taxpayers' cost of housing criminals. Critics say it is the equivalent of using an overseas "sweatshop" for companies, who like the "made in the U.S.A." tags it produces.

'We'd hate to lose their business'

Of the 384 companies now licensed to use the university's name and logo on products and apparel, only six have yet to sign the UI's Code of Conduct. Jostens is one.

Under pressure from SAS, the university developed the Code of Conduct last spring. It outlines how companies should treat their workers, including the requirement of paying them a living wage.

The living-wage provision has been controversial because it varies from region to region. It has been the sticking point in "negotiations" between the UI and Jostens, Cassut said, because it's impossible to define.

He said the university will send the company a revised version of the Code of Conduct later this week. UI officials said Monday they will not send a revised version but rather will point out that the code is open to the company's interpretation.

For instance, some of the provisions, including that of the living wage, are "aspirational," said UI licensing director Mark Abbott. This means that the companies only have to show progress in working toward the goal and don't actually have to be in full compliance.

Abbott said he is confident Jostens will sign on in the near future and avoid having its contract canceled. In 1999, the latest year with statistics available, the university took in \$2,095 from royalties on Jostens' sales of class rings and graduation announcements, among other items.

"It's a nice sum of money, and we'd hate to lose the business," Abbott said. "And frankly, I don't think we will."

Lon Moeller, a member of the UI Human Rights Committee, said the university will have talk with the remaining companies, including Jostens and Nike, over the next few weeks. The goal is to see what their reasons are for not signing the code, he said.

"There's a huge difference in the companies saying, 'We don't know what this means' and 'We can't possibly do this,'" Moeller said.

Caps and gowns

But if the UI does cancel its licensing contract with Jostens, the university would still likely buy caps and gowns from it, said UI General Counsel Mark Schantz.

That's because the university is simply acting as a consumer, purchasing the products, he said. It's the same reason the UI would not cancel UI men's basketball coach Steve Alford's \$150,000 endorsement contract with Nike.

The goal of the anti-sweatshop movement has never been to stage a "boycott," Schantz said. Rather, it has been to use the university's logo as leverage

to try to improve workers' conditions across the globe, he said.

The two labor watchdog groups to which the UI belongs, the Worker Rights Consortium and the Fair Labor Association, have advised the university to patiently persuade the companies and to cut their contracts only as a last resort. The idea is to try to change the companies' labor practices.

"That's a good question," said Moeller, the UI's liaison in the Worker Rights Consortium, of whether the university should cut all ties with companies that decline to sign the Code of Conduct. "[But] that's not my decision."

Ultimately, it's Coleman's, and it would likely cost the university more money to use caps and gowns from other companies.

Jostens has provided the university its caps and gowns for "a number of years," said University Bookstore manager George Herbert. Each winter, the university sends bids to four or five cap-and-gown companies, he said, and signs on with the best offer for that year.

was turned down by larger colleges and universities at which she hoped to continue her education and get a bachelor's degree.

So she continued on with her life. She got married, had four daughters, and lived with the burden of not allowing herself to imagine the possibility of earning a college degree.

"It was a dream I didn't allow myself to dream," Stutsman Berglund said.

Not until 1995, when she underwent a psychological evaluation, did she find out the reason for her troubles — she has a learning disability in reading and math.

With the opportunity to receive help in the form of books-on-tape, and the encouragement of her friend Gloria, with whom she talked every Tuesday as Gloria lost her battle with cancer, Stutsman Berglund decided to go attend the UI. She earned her bachelor's degree in 1998 — the year Berglund graduated from Ellsworth Community College.

And now, Stutsman Berglund and Berglund, who has a learning disability in math, will once again share the glory of their achievements as the rest of the family looks on. The weekend will also mark the end of a trying time for Stutsman Berglund and her family.

Since going back to school, Stutsman Berglund has had less and less time to spend with her four daughters: Emily, Audrey, 20; Anne, 14 and Jayne, 11.

The last year has been especially hard. An internship at the Grantwood Area Education Agency and school work have caused Stutsman Berglund to be gone most of the day.

Audrey Berglund has taken care of the two girls while her mother has been away. Although it has also been difficult for her, this weekend will be rewarding.

"I'm very proud, especially of my sister, because she's done everything we didn't think she would do," Audrey Berglund said.

Stutsman Berglund is also exceptionally proud of Emily Berglund. The real excitement for her this weekend will be seeing her daughter graduate, not her own graduation, she said.

Over the years, the two have supported one another. As a child, the encouragement from her mother helped Emily Berglund persevere and accom-

plish her goals, she said.

But the encouragement has changed hands over the past few years. While Stutsman Berglund is still very supportive of her daughter, Emily Berglund has returned the support. Emily Berglund sent her mom e-mails and cards over the Internet almost daily this past year.

The thoughtful words always brightened Stutsman Berglund's day, she said. And although her mom was too exhausted to send any back, Emily Berglund knew her love and support were always there.

Stutsman Berglund's children, who once brought tears to her eyes when she heard them read, and the idea of helping other children who have learning disabilities, have helped her continue on her journey. After getting her master's, she hopes to work with children who have learning disabilities similar to her own.

Being able to help children is what she and her daughter

both hope to do. Emily Berglund would love to work with children as a nurse. Her mother still remembers when her daughter called and said, "Mom, I'm in my element," after she had given shots to some children.

Soon, both women will be in their element.

Emily Berglund will start nursing in July at the UI Hospitals and Clinics, and although Stutsman Berglund hasn't found a job, she has a good idea of what she wants to do.

The two-way support-system has helped both their dreams come true, and now the admiration for one another also goes both ways. Emily has always admired her mom and appreciated her love. Now her mom feels the same way.

"I really admire my kids," Stutsman Berglund said. "I want to be just like them when I grow up."

Texas Senate passes hate-crimes legislation

■ The bill, named for James Byrd Jr., was opposed by George W. Bush when he was governor.

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Senate Monday passed a hate-crimes bill named for James Byrd Jr., the black man who was dragged to his death behind a pickup truck. The measure now will go back to the House for final approval.

Two years ago, then-Gov. George W. Bush had refused to support the measure, saying all crimes are hate crimes.

The bill, which passed the Republican-controlled Senate on a 20-10 vote, strengthens the penalties for crimes motivated by race, religion, color, gender, disabilities, sexual preference, age or national origin.

Texas already has a hate-crimes law, but it does not list specific groups that are protected. Prosecutors said it is too vague to enforce.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry said he would decide whether to sign the bill when it made it to his desk.

"I think it's time for Texas to come together to pass a piece of legislation that clearly sends a message that we're not going to allow for hateful acts against Texas citizens," Perry said.

He added, however, that he had wanted to see legislation approved that would give all Texans the same protection.

Democrats have been struggling for years to pass a

stronger hate-crimes law and had seized on Byrd's death. The black man was chained to the back of a pickup and killed in 1998 in the East Texas town of Jasper. Two white men were sent to death row and a third received a life sentence.

A similar bill passed the House in 1999 but was turned down by the Senate when critics complained it created unnecessary distinctions for homosexuals. Bush refused to offer his support.

"We have come a long way together as Texans to address hatred and bigotry," said Senate sponsor Rodney Ellis, a Houston Democrat. "Today we have taken another step together on the long journey of

justice."

Byrd's mother, Stella Byrd, welcomed the bill's passage.

"I'm very happy," she said. "It just means that I can think some positive thoughts about my son. At last something positive happened from it. I think what happened to my son, and knowing there's a bill named after it will help me cope better."

The Democratic-controlled House, which previously passed the measure, will have to consider amendments attached in the Senate.

Most of the Senate debate centered on whether to single out specific groups for protection. An amendment that would have removed the list was killed on a 12-17 vote.

U.S. kicked off U.N. drug panel

■ The move reflects opposition to Bush's position on global warming, some say.

UNITED NATIONS — In another embarrassing blow, the United States lost its seat on an international drug-monitoring body on the same day it was voted off the U.N. Human Rights Commission, U.S. officials confirmed Monday.

The United States had campaigned for a third term for American representative Herbert Okun, who has served as vice president on the International Narcotics Control Board. But he was voted off on May 3 in the same secret-ballot procedure and by the same countries that cost the United States its seat on the human-rights panel.

"That, we find, very regrettable," U.S. State Department spokesman Richard Boucher said in Washington Monday. He said the United States would continue its "strong support" for the U.N. anti-drug programs.

The 13-member International Narcotics Control Board monitors compliance with U.N. drug conventions on substance abuse and illegal trafficking.

Seven countries — Iran, Brazil, India, Peru, France, Netherlands and Austria — were elected to the board on May 3. China, Russia, Nigeria, Turkey, Mexico and Chile complete their current terms in 2005.

In the corridors at the United Nations, diplomats and U.N. officials said after the human-rights defeat that the United States didn't lobby hard enough. The absence of a U.S. ambassador to the United Nations for nearly four

months has exacerbated the problem.

Many nations — including the United States' European allies — are angry at the Bush administration's decision to pull out of an agreement to reduce global warming and to move ahead with a new missile-defense system. President Bush has also refused to ratify the treaty creating an international criminal court, and the U.S. Senate refused to ratify the nuclear test-ban treaty.

Boucher would not speculate about why Okun lost reelection but, coupled with the loss of the human-rights seat, he said, "There's something happening out there."

"Clearly, I think it's fair to speculate there may be issues

related to how we handled ourselves, to how we position," he said.

Former U.S. drug-policy director Barry McCaffrey said the U.S. absence would be felt more by other countries than by the United States.

"It's a great loss to the international community to not have us in a leadership position. We play a dominant role in the research and development of drug-treatment programs in the world," he said.

"The assistance that we are able to provide the United Nations, the Europeans and former Soviet Union states could be adversely affected," McCaffrey told the Associated Press.

It's a 'rainy day'

Iowa's three state universities are struggling to maintain their quality of education. The state medical examiner is threatening to quit if she doesn't get the lab she was promised two years ago. Iowa's social-services workers are handling almost three times as many cases as national standards recommend they should. This year's budget cuts are hurting all Iowans, from children to college students to the police who need evidence supplied by the state medical examiner.

Iowa's state legislators are working overtime this week to balance the state's budget in the face of a \$300 million revenue shortfall. Gov. Tom Vilsack wants to use money from the state's "rainy day fund" to provide Iowa's state agencies and services with the money they need to serve

They ignore the fact that the quality of life that attracts people to an area is made up of more than just tax breaks.

Iowans, but the Legislature's Republicans disagree. They want to leave the rainy-day fund intact and balance the budget without any additional revenue.


Instead of using the money Iowa does have to help state agencies do their job, the Republicans want to use \$7.9 million in potential additional revenue from President Bush's tax-cut proposal for business tax cuts.

Iowa's Republicans say their tax-cut plan is designed to attract people to Iowa and keep them in the state, but they ignore the fact that the quality of life that attracts people to an

area is made up of more than just tax breaks. It's about pleasant, clean communities, good schools and feeling safe in your home at night. These are just a few of the things that government spending on state agencies and services helps provide through funding for community improvement, effective police forces and education.

The Legislature needs to get its priorities in order. The benefits that the Republicans' proposed tax breaks would provide for a few business owners are far outweighed by the benefits that many Iowans would receive from fully funded state agencies and services. If Iowa's Republicans are against using the state's rainy-day fund to help fund the state's services, they need to use the money the state does have to do so.

Mapping a foreign policy

Recent political events have prompted a bevy of international comment concerning a particular world player. Some have noted the country's lack of "dialogue and respect." Others have claimed the nation has "undermined the atmosphere for dialogue" and that the time has come for it "to enter into dialogue on equal footing with other countries, rich or poor, strong or weak" and to cease using "human-rights issues as a tool to pursue its power politics and hegemonism."

Many Americans might assume such criticism comes from the mouths of American and European diplomats, chiding possibly China on its position in international politics. Many Americans would be extremely surprised to discover that this criticism is in fact quite the opposite in nature — that China, France and much of Europe are increasingly viewing the United States not as a benevolent leader in the worldwide quest for democracy but

rather as a "hyper-power" bent on advancing its own interests.

The recent ouster of the United States from the U.N. Human Rights Commission and from its International Narcotics Control Board is seen by many in the international community as evidence of the mounting dissatisfaction much of the world feels in regard to U.S. behavior. While the Bush administration focuses its foreign policy through a seemingly Cold-War paradigm, the rest of the world concerns itself instead with ensuring safe food, procuring greater medical care and brokering peace.

True, Bush and his band have no interest in starting World War III or even a sequel to the Cold War; in addition, administrations in transition

are notorious for less-than-stellar international action.

But many of the administration's recent stances have puzzled the international community enough to create a sense of concern as to just what really is the plan for the next four years. Bush tried to tie Third World family planning funding to a condition of not mentioning abortion, while at the same time vehemently supporting the death penalty that is so reviled by the rest of the world. Such contradictory stances do nothing to clear up others' perceptions of the administration's foreign-policy course.

While campaigning last year, Bush indicated that he understood the current state of world politics: "If we are an arrogant nation, they will resent us. If we're a humble nation, but strong, they'll welcome us." Both his administration and the rest of the world would be better off if he was reminded of the views he once held.

Fighting a pot charge with music

■ Majimba, the Party Guise and other acts will play a concert to raise money for Joan and Scott Hayward's defense.

Some activists give speeches on safe sex and AIDS awareness. Others throw charity balls for muscular-dystrophy research. And still others raise money to defend themselves in court over possession of marijuana charges.

Local musical acts the Party Guise, Majimba, David Zollo, Kelly Pardekooper and the Devil's House Band will play Gabe's tonight as part of the Hayward Defense Fund Bene-

fit Concert — an event to raise money for Joan and Scott Hayward's legal fees.

Scott Hayward is a local musician who plays in Majimba and the Party Guise. A resident of Iowa City, he and his wife were recently charged with marijuana possession after police searched the garbage the couple had left outside their house for morning pick-up.

"The cops were very public in busting us, and we are very public in defending ourselves," Scott Hayward said. "When we first got busted, our friends and their kids said right away that we should have a concert."

In order to throw a show to raise money for their defense, Joan and Scott Hayward

turned to their musician friends, such as Zollo, a local roots and rock artist. He readily agreed to join the event once he heard about the charges.

"My performance is an indication of support for the family with whom I've been friends for a long time," Zollo said. "I think that community action is important and benefits like these are a good way of raising awareness, but I'm on board because of my friendship with the Haywards."

Despite the ill will that garbage-searches create, they are completely legal, said Iowa City police Sgt. Brian Krei.

"If the garbage is taken out to the curb, it's on public property, and it's open to the public," he said.

The law is based upon a

Supreme Court ruling declaring all property from the curb to the sidewalk, or the first four feet from the curb, as public property. While police finding drugs using a garbage search is not enough for actual charges to be brought against people, it can provide reasonable suspicion that translates to a search warrant. However, just because the police are legally permitted to dig through trash on the curb does not mean they will do so for no reason.

"A lot of times it's frustrated neighbors that call up ... fed up with it," Krei said. "It isn't like people think that they have to fear their garbage is being gone through."

"And his creation of the Tribeca Film Center shows his continued dedication to the filmmaking industry."

Past recipients of the IFP Gotham Award for Lifetime Achievement include Robert Altman, Meryl Streep, Sidney Lumet, Bob and Harvey Weinstein, Al Pacino, Robert Shaye, Sam Cohn, Martin Scorsese, Arthur B. Krim and Irwin Young.

Denver may shun Manson

DENVER (AP) — Shock rocker Marilyn Manson, who was accused by some of influencing Columbine High School killers Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold, has been asked to cancel a Denver appearance this summer.

The church-affiliated group Citizens for Peace and Respect says Manson promotes violence, hate and drugs, and he should not spread his message in Denver.

"We as a society seem to have grown numb to evil. There's a throwing up of our hands in exasperation, a feeling that we can't do anything to fight it," said South Sheridan Baptist Church youth pastor Jason Jantz, the group's founder.

Manson is set to appear in an Ozfest tour stop in Denver on June 21. He initially pulled out of the Denver

show because of a scheduling conflict but later reversed the move.

Some students quoted immediately after the April 1999 Columbine shootings speculated that Klebold and Harris were influenced by Manson's music, claims that were later denied. The two high-school seniors killed 13 people and wounded approximately two dozen more before taking their own lives.

Manson canceled a concert at Red Rocks Amphitheater after the shootings, and he has not performed in the area since. He also issued a statement afterward, expressing sympathy for the victims.

Free Elton John

PLATTSBURGH, N.Y. (AP) — Seems pop star Elton John is a fan of Plattsburgh Mayor Daniel Stewart.

Just before the rock superstar's concert with Billy Joel in Montreal, John surprised Stewart and a friend by offering them free, front-row tickets to the show.

"This guy came directly up to us and gave us these passes and said, 'Mayor

Stewart, this is compliments from Elton,'" Stewart told the *Plattsburgh Press-Republican*. "I didn't know what was going on, and I don't know how they knew I was even going to be there."

Stewart, who is the first openly gay mayor elected in New York state, met John, who also is gay, at the Los Angeles Gay and Lesbian Center in 1996 during a ceremony honoring the musician. The mayor mentioned he'd be attending the May 3 performance during a radio interview before the show.

"Elton is a great guy, and I really admire the work he's done for causes, especially for AIDS," Stewart said.

Frank & Ava, Puffy & J.Lo

NEW YORK (AP) — Frank Sinatra and Ava Gardner. Joe DiMaggio and Marilyn Monroe. Puffy and J.Lo?

Rap mogul Sean "Puffy" Combs says his relationship with singer-acress Jennifer Lopez has some of the torrid, timeless qualities of those classic celebrity love affairs.

"... I'm Frank, you know what I'm saying?" Combs says in the June issue of *Vanity Fair*. "Frank's gonna always love Ava, and Ava's gonna always love Frank, and everybody's just gotta deal with it."

Combs, 31, and Lopez, 30, broke up on Valentine's Day after two years in

the spotlight. Now, he says the two remain "good friends."

"She'll always be someone that I love. All she's gotta do is think — she doesn't even need to pick up the phone — and I'll be able to feel her," he says.

Even though they'd split up, Lopez says she stuck by Combs during his trial in connection with a December 1999 nightclub shooting, in which a jury acquitted him in March.

Davis enjoys continuing to work on his political platform and gaining support after he gets off of work at night. Two weeks ago, he became a registered member of the Green Party, which he's always supported, and spoke at the first county-wide Green Party Convention on May 5.

He continually hands out voter-registration cards to Iowa City residents and urges college students to involve themselves in their local government and vote in the upcoming municipal election.

A veteran of 10 years of guitar-playing, Davis still jams with other musicians at improvisational blues night at the Green Room, 509 S. Gilbert St., for relaxation every Monday. He is also a member of the UI Ski and Snowboard Club, which has closed its season for the summer months.

Overall, Davis' decisions over the past year have made him a content, optimistic political candidate.

Bush denounces 'new protectionism'

ideas that would keep many of the poor in poverty."

Bush did not mention his critics by name, but he was aiming at Capitol Hill.

"I urge the Congress to restore our nation's authority to negotiate trade agreements, and I will use that authority to build freedom in the world, progress in our hemisphere and

enduring prosperity in the United States," Bush told some 300 business leaders, ambassadors and government officials who attended the Council of the Americas event.

"I'm counting on the council's help to bring sanity to the United States Congress," he said.

A group of 61 senators sent Bush a letter Monday warning him that they will strongly oppose any new trade agreement that would restrict America's ability to use its laws to protect

American companies against unfair trade practices of other nations.

The letter cited America's anti-dumping law, which allows the government to impose penalty tariffs against imported products being sold in the United States at unfairly low prices. It also cited a law that allows the United States to impose higher tariffs in retaliation for unfair trade barriers erected by another country against American exports.

places that can cover the high rent in Iowa City, he said. And efforts made by the city to limit the number of bars downtown only hurt the business area more by causing even more vacancies. Recently, the council denied a liquor license to a proposed bar, Etc., that was to open at 118 S. Dubuque St.

Unique businesses are appreciated and provide an interesting niche in the downtown business scene, said Manny Poole, an assistant manager of the Wireless Store, 14 S. Clinton St., next door to the Peaceful Fool.

"That's why the Peaceful Fool stood out," he said. "It was pretty much different than anything on Clinton."

If someone tries to open a bar in the Peaceful Fool's space, it may not be as easy as it once was, said Connie Champion, an Iowa City city councilor. The alcohol ordinance that the council is working on should serve as a deterrent to any entrepreneur considering opening another bar downtown.

"I think all the bars will eventually go to 21," she said. "And as long as the council is talking about that, I find it hard to believe anyone would put a great deal of money into making

it a bar. I don't know how many bars we really need downtown."

Ultimately, Perez said, he would rather not have a restaurant or bar move into the spot, but he is still open to

that and other possibilities.

"I would rather have a restaurant/bar in there than an empty building."







NCAA to continue emphasis on rough play

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — College basketball is still too rough, and the NCAA is intent on doing something about it.

"The emphasis on eliminating rough play was most effective in the early part of last season, but that emphasis did not continue throughout the season to the level that we would have liked," Kansas coach Roy Williams, the chairman of the NCAA men's basketball rules committee, said Monday.

"But we knew this would be more than a one-year process," he said. "This year, we would like to aim for consistency from the beginning of the season to the end, with particular attention to inside play, where we thought last year's emphasis was least effectively called."

The men's and women's rules committees held their annual meetings last week. On Monday, they announced changes regarding technical fouls, the game and shot clock and, for the men only, a return to the jump ball as an experiment during the pre-conference season.

New Jersey staves off elimination

The final game of the Eastern Conference semifinals will be in New Jersey — where the Maple Leafs are 2-1 in the


series — Wednesday night.

Hawks ready for Big Tens

■ Iowa will take on either Ohio State or Wisconsin Thursday.

Looking at Sunday's 2-1 loss to Northwestern as simply one defeat will be crucial to the Iowa softball team's ability to bounce back heading into the Big Ten Tournament Thursday.

Strengthened by a one-game-at-a-time mental and physical approach all season, putting both wins and losses behind them has not been difficult for the No. 15 Hawkeyes.

However, on Sunday, the heads and shoulders of Iowa players hung a little bit lower.

After sweeping Big Ten front-runner Michigan on April 28-29, the Hawkeyes appeared unbeatable, especially by the sub-500 Wildcats, and on their way to at least a share of their second-straight Big Ten regular-season crown.

Prior to the loss, Iowa was 14-1 at home. The lone home loss was a 6-4 come-from-behind Iowa State win on April 18.

At Pearl Field, the Hawkeyes had outscored opponents, 81-19, including a 3-0 victory over the Wildcats on May 5. However, something didn't feel right against the Wildcats the second time around.

Northwestern was playing for its coach, Sharon Drysdale, who exited triumphantly in her final collegiate game. The team was playing for her birthday and a chance to learn what even some family members did not know — Drysdale's middle name.

Behind that extra motivation and inspiration, along with a stellar five-hit pitching performance from sophomore Lauren Schwendemann, Northwestern was able to stay in the game and gain confidence with every Iowa out, ultimately earning the win.

"The loss was a disappointment because the Big Ten title was a season-long goal," Iowa coach Gayle Blevins said. "But the beauty about sport is that you have opportunities to bounce back, and we have one of those this week."

As the No. 2 seed, Iowa will face the winner of the contest between No. 3 seed Ohio State and No. 6 seed Wisconsin at 1:30 p.m. at Alumni Field in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Hawkeyes swept both teams during the regular season.

"Confidence is a key," Blevins said. "I think the big thing is to continue keeping our approach game by game and not let it get bigger than that."

Tim Duncan, who came out wearing a white armband reading "DA, 1" led the Spurs with 25 points and 22 rebounds.


The best-of-seven series shifts to Dallas for Game 3 on Wednesday night.

Howard, who started the game, was 2-for-14 from the field and had nine points and 11 rebounds. Howard took the court to a roar of boos by Spurs fans, who hoisted signs reading "This is the NBA, not the WWF" and displaying Anderson's No. 1. Fans in the balcony unfurled a banner that read "Juwan Coward."

It was another poor shooting night for the Mavericks, who finished at 34 percent. Michael Finley had 24 points on 8-for-24 shooting and Dirk

Play at Big Tens indicative of Hawkeyes' future

■ The Iowa men's golf team has its best finish since 1994.

All spring long, the Iowa men's golf team struggled to put together three-consecutive rounds of great golf.

That changed this past weekend at the Big Ten championships, where Iowa had three terrific rounds, including the best in school history.

The only problem was that the championships were a four-round affair and once again, a mistake-plagued round cost the golfers a tournament trophy.

It was a bittersweet ending to the Hawkeyes' season, as the team went out Sunday and shot an 11-under-par 277, the best round of any Iowa golf team — as well as the best round of any team in the tournament. Iowa finished fifth, just two strokes out of third place. Sophomore Bo Anderson finished third overall.

The Hawkeyes were ecstatic over ending their season so well, but at the same time, they seemed a little disheartened that they hadn't played at that level earlier in the season.

"The way it did end is a little frustrating because this is the way we expected it to be all spring," Anderson said. "We expected to play this well. It

proves we weren't kidding ourselves."

Not only will Sunday's performance go into record books, it also sparked Iowa's best finish at the Big Ten meet since 1994.

"If it had to end anyway, I'm glad it ended like this," said senior Jason Wombacher, who closed with a 68 Sunday.

The only way Iowa could have made it to NCAA regionals was by winning the meet.

The Hawkeyes had the most successful fall season in recent years. They won the Hawkeye Invitational for the first time since 1996 and beat out Iowa State, Northern Iowa and Drake to win their first state championship since 1996.

Lima suspended five games, files appeal
HOUSTON (AP) — Astros starter Jose Lima was suspended for five games and fined by the commissioner's office Monday for hitting the New York Mets' Jay Payton with a pitch in a game last week.
The players' association immediately appealed, delaying the start of any penalty until after a hearing before Paul Beeson, baseball's chief operating officer.
Astros general manager Gerry Hunsicker claimed Frank Robinson, baseball's vice president in charge of discipline, played politics with his decision to suspend the pitcher.
"You think I'm going to hit a guy on purpose when we're behind 4-0?" Lima said. "I've got to appeal. I don't want to look like the bad guy."
"Last year I hit two guys and two guys in 1998. I'm human. I'm allowed to make a bad pitch, and I did. I'm disappointed that he didn't get suspended because he's the one who tried to kill me."
Court upholds dismissal of basketball lawsuit
DES MOINES — A federal appeals court Monday upheld the dismissal of a lawsuit filed by a former Marshalltown High School basketball player who was forced off the team after criticizing her coach.
The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in St. Louis said it had found no basis for the lawsuit, filed in September 1999 by Rebecca Wildman and her mother, Denise Wildman. The appeals court affirmed the earlier dismissal of the lawsuit by U.S. District Judge Harold Vietor in Des Moines.
The lawsuit focused on a letter Rebecca had written to her teammates about coach Christopher Rolwes' handling of the girls' basketball program during the 1997-98 season.
"She asked for her teammates' support to confront Rolwes with her complaints."
"We as a team have to do something about this," she wrote.
The coach "needs us next year and the year after, and what if we aren't there for him?... We deserve better than what we have gotten," she wrote.
Defending champion Norman knocked out in first round
ROME — One year after winning the biggest title of his career, Magnus Norman was a first-day upset victim in the rain-interrupted Italian Open.
The 24-year-old Swede lost, 6-4, 6-3, Monday to Italy's Vincenzo Santopadre, who is ranked 180th in the world.
Pete Sampras, still seeking a major clay-court title, had his match against Israel's Harel Levy suspended until today. Levy led, 7-5, 1-3, when rain halted play.
Norman, who reached last year's French Open final, looked slow and unsteady on the damp clay at the Foro Italico, racking up 30 unforced errors following a two-hour rain delay.
Having struggled in recent months, Norman was asked if he was suffering physical or technical problems.
"No," he said. "It's more in my head."
"This is one of the worst moments of my career," the fifth-seeded Norman said. "It's a self-confidence thing. It's tough. I don't know how to come out of it."
Norman was broken in the final game, shanking an easy backhand on match point.

Tiger not the only special golfer

■ Annika Sorenstam is dominating the women's tour with Tiger-like perfection.

STOCKBRIDGE, Ga. — Granted, Annika Sorenstam doesn't have trophies from four major championships sitting on her coffee table.

By any other measurement, Annika the Great stacks up just fine with Tiger Woods.

Tournaments won? Sorenstam has five victories this year, including a major, compared with three and a major for Woods. Both have played in eight events.

Scoring average? The 30-year-old Swede is at 68.89 per round — exactly the same as Woods.

Average finish? Woods is slightly better, 5.75, but it must be noted that Sorenstam's 6.5 cumulative includes a 43rd at the Longs Drugs Challenge, which ended her four-tournament winning streak. Otherwise, she has been first or second in every event she's played.

Indeed, golf has become a two-person game, with Woods dominating on the men's side and Sorenstam transforming the rest of the LPGA Tour into a bunch of weekend hackers.

She rallied from a four-shot deficit with six holes to play Sunday at the Chick-fil-A Charity Championship, stringing together five birdies and a par to force a playoff with defending tournament champion Sophie Gustafson.

On the second extra hole, Gustafson hit a shot into the water, allowing Sorenstam to win with a two-putt par. Afterward, there were the inevitable comparisons.

"I would love to play Tiger," Sorenstam said, assuming she hits from the shorter women's tees. "I like playing with the guys overall. It's a lot of fun to see how they play and

approach the game. You can learn something."

Woods became the first male golfer to hold all four major professional titles at the same time with his April victory at the Masters. But he's never shot a 59, which Sorenstam did this year in becoming the first woman to break 60.

"I think I'm doing pretty well," she said. "It's kind of apples and oranges, though. It's early in the season and isn't like we've already played 25 tournaments — just eight. It's not right to compare yet."

Sorenstam is just one victory short of her career high, set in 1997 — and it's only the first week of May. She is on pace to win 13 tournaments this year, which would equal Mickey Wright's LPGA record set in 1963, an era when the tour was still in its formative stages and not nearly as deep as it is today.

"I have goals, definitely," said Sorenstam, who has 28 victories overall. "I'm not going to say how many tournaments I'd like to win, but I am on the right track."

When it comes to their playing styles, Woods and Sorenstam could hardly be more different.

He overwhelms the course with power and feeds off emotion, whether its pumping a fist defiantly after making a big putt or cursing himself loudly when things aren't going right.

She is more methodical, beating her opponents with consistency and smart decisions while rarely displaying more than a girlish smile and hesitant wave for the gallery.

"I grew up with computers because my father worked for IBM," Sorenstam said. "I love to crunch numbers. I look at how many fairways I hit, how many greens I hit. I plan my way around the golf course."

"That's pretty much the way I am at everything. At home, I'm making lists all the time. It drives my husband crazy."

Sorenstam isn't the robot she appears to be, however.

"I'm not totally calm," she said. "This means a lot to me. I still get nervous and a little shaky. I still want to win. I have experience, and I've been in this position lots of times. I know what it takes, what shots it takes to win. But just because you've been there, it's not automatic."

Try telling that to those she keeps beating week after week.

"What's scary about her is that she doesn't make mistakes," Gustafson said. "You know you've got to beat her. She's not going to crumble."

Sorenstam has been a multi-winner on the LPGA Tour every year since 1995 while becoming the first woman with \$7 million in career earnings.

She was eclipsed the last two years by Australian Karrie Webb, who totaled 13 victories while Sorenstam was winning seven times. But the Swede has clearly regained the upper hand in that rivalry.

"Golf is such a confidence game," said Hall of Famer Beth Daniel, who finished one shot out of the playoff Sunday. "When you have confidence, you feel like you're going to win every week."

Niedermayer accuses Domi of threat before devastating hit

■ The Devils' forward speaks publicly for the first time since his season-ending injury.

TORONTO — Scott Niedermayer accused Tie Domi of threatening to hit him two games before doing so and even boasting it would be bad enough for a suspension.

In his first public comments since being knocked out on May 3 by the Toronto Maple Leafs' forward, Niedermayer said Monday that Domi planned the attack in retaliation for a hit from the New Jersey Devils' defenseman.

Niedermayer cut Domi over the bridge of the nose with his stick in Game 2 of the Eastern Conference semifinals but was not penalized. In the waning moments of Game 4, Domi hit Niedermayer with a vicious elbow to the head.

"He said he was going to take a suspension on me," Niedermayer said.

Domi was indeed suspended by the NHL and must sit out for at least the rest of the playoffs.

Niedermayer wouldn't reveal more details of Domi's threat, adding only that he believed Domi was going to go after him.

"So I kept one eye on him when I was on the ice and he was on the ice at the same time. But I never expected anything more than that," Niedermayer said.

Despite being on the lookout, Niedermayer said, he didn't see Domi coming in the final seconds of Game 4 until it was too late.

"I just remember turning around and seeing him. That

was it," said Niedermayer, who's seen one replay of the hit. "I don't remember having a chance to do anything, really. I vaguely remember him, not very well."

Domi was not immediately available for comment. The Maple Leafs had already left the Air Canada Centre to prepare for Monday night's Game 6.

On May 5, Domi said he regretted what happened, saying it was a "stupid reaction."

He then added: "I sincerely hope Scott will be well soon enough to play hockey again."

Despite the suspension, Domi is allowed to practice

with the team.

The Leafs have won two straight games to lead the best-of-seven series, 3-2.

Niedermayer, who sustained a concussion, was to miss his second game of the series Monday and wasn't sure if he will be ready to play by Thursday if the Devils force Game 7.

Niedermayer looked relaxed and spoke in a calm voice during a 20-minute news conference.

He said he is feeling better and has been able to sleep.

Niedermayer said Domi had left a message on his answering machine but that he's not sure whether he can forgive him.

"I don't know if it's really a place for me to talk about how I feel about what happened or my thoughts towards Tie at all in public," he said.

Stewart to do the 'double' again

■ Tony Stewart will race in the Indy 500 and the Coca-Cola 600 on the same day.

INDIANAPOLIS — Tony Stewart will be the busiest driver in auto racing on May 27.

He plans to drive in the Indianapolis 500 and, as he did in 1999, fly immediately to Charlotte, N.C., for NASCAR's Coca-Cola 600. There won't be much time to spare, if any.

If there's a rain delay in Indianapolis, as there was last year when Robby Gordon tried the racing double, Stewart can almost forget about winning the NASCAR race.

"We're trying to do everything we can off of what we learned in '99 to try to do this," Stewart said Monday. "We felt like we did it the right way, but we felt like we made a lot of mistakes at the same time, and we're making sure that we don't make those same mistakes this year."

Stewart, who won the NASCAR Pontiac Excitement 400 on May 5 and is seventh in the Winston Cup standings, and former CART champion Jimmy Vasser will drive cars originally entered at Indianapolis for rookies Bruno Junqueira and Nicolas Minassian.

Car owner Chip Ganassi announced the switch before Monday's practice.

"The decision was not made because Bruno or Nicolas did or didn't do something right," said Ganassi, who won the 500 last year with Juan Montoya. "Our team has proven we can train rookie drivers. But right now we need Bruno and Nicolas focused on their development in the CART series."

Ganassi said the two rookies, who have never raced on ovals, have not had enough experience for Indy because of CART's cancellation of two races: the Rio 200 in Brazil in March because of problems with the promoter and the inaugural Firestone Firehawk 600 in Texas in April, when

drivers complained about dizzying G forces on the high-banked track.

"When we originally put our plans together, our thinking was the experience they would have gained at the beginning of the season would have been sufficient when we arrived here at Indianapolis," Ganassi said. "We wanted to make sure these guys had the right number of miles under their belts, and we weren't able to do that before May this year."

"It was a dream come true with Juan last year, and we want to come back and defend our title in the right manner," he said. "Certainly these guys (Stewart and Vasser) know their way around this place."

Montoya is racing in Formula One this season.

Stewart, who started from the pole as an Indy rookie in 1996, was the Indy Racing League series champion in 1997. After finishing ninth in his last race at Indianapolis in 1999, he took a helicopter from the track to the airport and then a private jet for a 50-minute flight to North Carolina.

Fighting sickness and exhaustion, Stewart finished fourth in the Coca-Cola 600 that night, completing 596 of a possible 600 laps in the two races.

"We learned a lot from our first experience doing this," Stewart said. "So we've got a physical trainer with us that's going to make sure that I'm eating properly, stay off the

pizzas and sodas all month.

"If they can keep me off the sodas, that will be a major accomplishment," he said.

Last year, Gordon finished sixth at Indianapolis, but the race was delayed three hours by rain. By the time he arrived at Charlotte, the race was about half over and he finished 35th after replacing fill-in starter P.J. Jones. Gordon also qualified for both races in 1997, but his bid for that double was spoiled when rains washed out Indy for two days.

John Andretti is the only other driver to race in Indy and the Coca-Cola on the same day, but he crashed in 1994 and didn't finish the 600.

Vasser was seventh at Indianapolis for Ganassi last year but joined the Patrick Racing team this season.

"It seems a little funny to come back after what's gone on," Vasser said of leaving Ganassi. "But I'm stepping into one of the cars that has the best chance to win the race, and I very badly would like to win the Indianapolis 500."

Both Stewart and Vasser took their first practice laps Monday afternoon before a hard rain shut down the track three hours early.

Vasser's car was the 10th quickest, with a top lap of 219.381 mph. Stewart practiced in two cars, turning a top lap of 215.474 mph in his backup car and 196.347 in his primary car.

Court documents opened in Camby family standoff

MANCHESTER, Conn. (AP) — The man charged with sexually assaulting one of Knicks center Marcus Camby's sisters had threatened her hours before the attack, she told police.

In court documents opened to the public Monday, Camby's sister said Troy Crooms threatened her after she ended their relationship over the telephone.

Crooms is charged with first-degree sexual assault, kidnapping, burglary, unlawful restraint and possession of a weapon for an eight-hour standoff at the home of Camby's mother in South Windsor on April 23.

Camby's mother and two of his sisters were in the house when the standoff began; Crooms allegedly held one sister at knifepoint throughout the ordeal.

The sister told police she had known Crooms for about a year and started dating him in February. They had argued on the telephone the night before the standoff, she said.

Crooms was in court on Monday for a hearing in which his case was transferred to Hartford Superior Court. He did not speak to the judge during the brief hearing.

Crooms is listed on the state's database of sex offenders because of a 1993 conviction. He also has been convicted of forgery, nar-

cotics possession and other crimes.

Oliver out after being hit on hand

ARLINGTON, Texas — Texas pitcher Darren Oliver will be sidelined for at least two weeks after being hit on the left thumb by a line drive Monday.

Oliver was struck by a ball off the bat of Chicago's Tony Graffanino, who was leading off the game, a 7-4 White Sox victory.

While X-rays were negative, Oliver's thumb was badly bruised and had a cut that required stitches. The Rangers said they will place him on the 15-day disabled list today.

Oliver was replaced by R.A. Dickey, the Rangers' No. 1 pick in the 1996 amateur draft. He was making his fourth major league appearance.

Johnson can't go to Worlds if he doesn't go to USA meet

INDIANAPOLIS — Michael Johnson can't run at the World Track and Field Championships in August if he doesn't compete first at the USA Championships.

Johnson, running only relays in his final year of competition, had hoped to run on the U.S. 1,600-meter team in Edmonton this summer, but the USA Track and Field board of directors decided not to waive a rule requiring participation in the national meet.

The board of directors met over

the weekend and affirmed existing rules for selecting relay teams, spokeswoman Jill Geer said Monday.

Hobbs named George Washington coach

WASHINGTON — The underling talk Monday at the introduction of Karl Hobbs as the new basketball coach at George Washington University wasn't about wins and losses. It was about restoring a reputation.

University President Stephen Joel Trachtenberg focused on the academic standing of a school tarnished by the scandals that surfaced just before Tom Penders' sudden resignation. Hobbs mentioned communication, trust, care and teamwork long before he got around to his desire to win.

"We're going to do everything possible to make sure we do it the right way," said Hobbs, a first-time head coach who spent the last eight seasons as an assistant at Connecticut. "Winning is the most important thing to me — I want to make that very clear — but I will not do it at the expense of the institution and the players."

Penders cited burnout when he quit on April 20 with a 49-42 record over three years, including a 14-18 mark last season. Days before he stepped down, the university revealed there were possible NCAA violations involving long-distance calls made by several players and that junior forward Attila Cosby was facing nine new misdemeanor charges in connec-

tion with a felony rape charge that had been previously dismissed.

Ravens re-sign Woodson to five-year deal

OWINGS MILLS, Md. — The Baltimore Ravens re-signed safety Rod Woodson, who had been released in a salary cap move, to a five-year contract Monday.

Terms of the deal were not disclosed.

The signing of Woodson, 36, means the Super Bowl champions will return all but one defensive starter from last year, when they set the record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season.

"My main priority was to stay in Baltimore," Woodson said. "Being a mentor has been my role for the past three years, and I'm more than willing to do my part to help the team."

Reports: one dead, 39 injured in riot at soccer match

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast — One person was killed and 39 injured when fighting broke out between fans of two of Ivory Coast's leading soccer teams, news reports said Monday.

It was Africa's third soccer disaster in a month. A stampede killed 43 people at a stadium in Johannesburg, South Africa, on April 11. Eight people died in a stampede in Lubumbashi, Congo, on April 29.

Morris' notches first shutout since 1998

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Matt Morris pitched a four-hitter for his first complete game since 1998, leading the St. Louis Cardinals over the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-0, Monday night.

Pittsburgh, which made a season-high four errors, failed in its attempt to win three straight for the first time this season.

Rookie Albert Pujols and J.D. Drew each hit his 10th home run, and Ray Lankford hit his seventh for the Cardinals. Pujols, who also had a run-scoring groundout, leads the NL with 19 two-strike hits and ranks among the league leaders with 34 RBIs.

Morris (4-2), who struck out four and walked one, got his second shutout and sixth complete game, his first since a five-hit shutout against Houston on Sept. 22, 1998.

He missed all of the 1999 season after undergoing elbow surgery, and was in the bullpen all last year.

Morris didn't allow a hit until John Vander Wal singled open the fifth, and the other three hits he gave up were singles. For the sixth straight game he lowered his ERA, this time shaving off 52 points to 2.25.

White Sox 7, Rangers 4

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — When Carlos Lee is feeling good at the plate, it really doesn't matter how much he knows about the pitcher.

Lee homered, hit two doubles and drove in three runs against Texas rookie R.A. Dickey as the Chicago White Sox beat the Rangers, 7-4, on Monday.

Texas starter Darren Oliver was knocked out of the game and onto the disabled list by Chicago leadoff hitter Tony Graffanino. The Rangers replaced him with Dickey (0-1), their 1996 first-round pick, making only his fourth major league appearance.

"All of a sudden everything changes, especially a guy you've never seen," Lee said. "But I feel good at the plate. When you feel good, no matter what the pitcher throws, it's pretty good."

Phillies 5, Astros 0

HOUSTON — Robert Person pitched a two-hitter, the low-hit game of his career, and led the Philadelphia Phillies over the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-0, Monday night.

Person (3-3), who lost three of his previous four starts, got the second shutout of his career in stopping the Astros' four-game winning streak.

Houston's only hits were a first-inning double by Craig Biggio and a seventh-inning single by Brad Ausmus. Person struck out a season-high eight and walked four.

Person's other shutout was a four-hitter against Milwaukee last May 10.



Birds have not learned to fly in Baltimore

With few real wins, Orioles settle for moral victories.

BALTIMORE — Stuck in fourth place with 13 wins in 32 games, the Baltimore Orioles are resigned to counting moral victories in this long-overdue rebuilding season.

At spring training, the Orioles spoke optimistically about using a blend of experience and youth to make a run at a winning record. Thanks in part to several games against the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, Baltimore hovered around .500 through April.

Then the New York Yankees came to town.

The defending world champions completed a four-game sweep at Camden Yards Sunday, using a solid performance by former Orioles right-hander Mike Mussina in a 2-1 victory.

Mussina, the ace of Baltimore's staff for years, is now the No. 3 starter with New York.

That says plenty about each team's talent, and that is why Orioles manager Mike Hargrove took consolation in Baltimore's ability to at least stay close to the Yankees in all four games. New York outscored the Orioles 20-13, winning twice

by one run. "You don't like the outcome of the last four games, but you've got to look at where our club is and where we're trying to get to," Hargrove said. "We were very competitive. We can take some solace out of that and feel good about that."

Here's something else to be encouraged about: After a day off Monday, the Orioles travel to Tampa Bay for three games.

Nearly half of Baltimore's wins this season — six of 13 — have come against the Devil Rays, the only team below the Orioles in the AL East.

After that, however, Baltimore is going to have to endure an unbalanced schedule loaded with games against the Yankees, Boston Red Sox and Toronto Blue Jays.

The Orioles own the worst batting average in the majors (.226) and have hit the fewest home runs (20). Their starting pitchers are 7-15, and the bullpen is built around two rookies and 23-year-old closer Ryan Kohlmeier, who's already blown three saves.

In an effort to generate some offense, Hargrove has sent his players loose on the base paths. The strategy backfired Sunday, when Cal Ripken was thrown out trying to go from first to third on a single and three runners were cut down attempting to steal.
