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Gable 'interested' in governor bid

■ The former UI coach will meet with top GOP officials this week.

Legendary former UI wrestling coach Dan Gable said late Wednesday he would meet

with key Republican leaders during the next week as he makes a decision on seeking the GOP's nomination for governor in 2002.

"I'm interested only from the standpoint to find out if I am interested (in running for governor)," he told *The Daily Iowan* after returning from a

fishing trip in Minnesota. "Maybe this is what's out there for me. Maybe there's another position. I just have to find out."

Gable said he has scheduled a meeting Friday with former Gov. Terry Brandstadt in Des Moines and may meet with President George W. Bush

when the president is in Iowa the same day.

The 52-year-old Waterloo native also said he would talk next week with Des Moines businessman Marvin Pomerantz, a prominent Republican and former president of the state of Iowa Board of Regents.

After Gable met with Bush

last month, GOP leaders have been actively recruiting him to run for the position. Apparently, the orders were coming straight from the president.

"By the end of the day, they were after me," the former Olympic gold medalist said. "But I can't just get talked into it. This decision will have to

come from within."

State Republicans have made regaining the governor's office a top priority, and Gable could be the high-profile candidate the party wants to knock off the fairly popular Democratic Gov. Tom Vilsack.

Gable said he will likely

Artisans in and beyond Iowa City

The Iowa Arts Festival will bring together sights and sounds from around the world as it fills downtown Iowa City with diverse music, visual art, and food, beginning this afternoon and continuing through Sunday evening.

The annual festival kicks off at 5:45 p.m. with the dedication of two sculptures by Christoph Spath at Black Hawk Mini Park, located at the intersection of Dubuque and Washington streets on the Pedestrian Mall.

Festival Executive Director Vicki Jennings said the festival's Executive Board increased its advertising outside the Iowa City area and recruited a greater variety of artists and musical performers from across the country this year.

"We want to make this a regional festival," she said. Approximately 40,000 people attended the festival last

Judge denies McVeigh appeal

■ He says McVeigh's guilt is unquestioned despite new evidence.

DENVER — A judge denied Timothy McVeigh a further stay of execution Wednesday, saying nothing in newly disclosed FBI documents could change the fact that he was the "instrument of death and destruction" in the Oklahoma City bombing.

McVeigh's lawyers said they would file an appeal Thursday. The 33-year-old Gulf War veteran is set to die by injection June 11 at a federal prison in Terre Haute, Ind.

After a hearing that lasted a little more than an hour, U.S. District Judge Richard Matsch said he was shocked that the government waited until six days before McVeigh's original execution date to begin turning over more than 4,400 pages of documents in the case.

But he brushed aside McVeigh's bid to force a hearing over the mistake and said the findings of the jury that convicted McVeigh in 1997 still stand.

The jurors "executed their moral judgment as a conscience of the community," said Matsch, who presided at the trial.

"Whatever role others may have played, it's clear that Timothy McVeigh committed murder and mayhem as charged," he said. "Whatever may in time (be) disclosed about possible involvement of others in this bombing, it will not change the fact that Timothy McVeigh was the instrument of death and destruction."

McVeigh's attorneys had argued that the execution should be delayed because the FBI documents released last month could have helped

UI details its response to cuts

■ No emergency enrollment requirements, but cutbacks are expected.

University officials ruled out the possibility of heightening entry requirements or capping enrollment in an effort to deal with state budget cuts.

After receiving guidance from the state of Iowa Board of Regents last month, the university has decided against those measures, according to a report released Wednesday.

By not placing a restriction on enrollment numbers, the UI will maintain its ability to offer "an excellent and accessible education to all Iowans," said Steve Parrott, UI director of Communications and Outreach.

"We have a commitment to providing a quality education to students, and (UI President Mary Sue Coleman) didn't want to restrict that opportunity," said Linda Maxson, UI Dean of the College of Liberal Arts.

The report spells out how the UI will be affected by a 6 percent budget reduction for

A new address for Shambaugh House

When UI alumnus Benjamin Shambaugh began plans to build the house that would someday bear his name, he told his architect that he wanted a house that would stand the test of time. However, he never specified exactly where it was to stand.


In late summer or early fall, the UI will uproot the Shambaugh House, 219 N. Clinton St., from its home of 99 years to make way for the development of the \$14 million Honors and Careers Center.

"It's a trade for coziness and comfort," said Alice Fulton, director of the UI Honors Program. "The house looks nice to the eye, but

Workshop: More room, please

The UI Creative Writing Program hopes to initiate a \$2 million construction project that would add more classroom and office space to the Dey House.

The State of Iowa Board of Regents will consider that request — an attempt to alleviate a lack of office and classroom space, as well as to build an archive — at its meeting in Ames next week.

Additional space may be either constructed in a new building next to the house or added to the existing structure, which was built in 1857 and is home to the internationally renowned Writers' Workshop. The house is located at 507 N. Clinton St. and overlooks the Iowa River.

Frank Conroy, director of the writing program, said the project is currently "in the talking stages" and added that there are no concrete building plans. However, the writing program would like the design to conserve the architectural features of the 144-year-old house.

Funding for the project will come mainly from private donations, although project coordinators will also seek university funding, said Ethan Canin, creative writing professor and coordinator for the project. A report sent to the regents Wednesday stated the entire addition would be fund-

ed from private gifts.

Glenn Schaeffer, a Writers' Workshop alumnus, has donated \$1 million to help support the project, with the hope that the UI would match the funds. Schaeffer, who was a collector of rare books, wanted his donation to help build a library and archive to house works of writers from the workshop.

The Dey House has become a "tourist attraction" for those who want to know more about the famous workshop, Canin said. People come to the house hoping to see the original works of Flannery O'Connor, a graduate of the workshop, but currently cannot because there is nowhere to display them. The addition of an archive would also provide a place for the more than 100 works of fiction produced by the workshop every year and would become an "inspirational museum" for current students, Canin said.

Space is also needed for offices and classrooms. Professors often hold classes in their offices, in other buildings, and even in the Xerox room of the Dey House due to the lack of room, Canin said.

Although the decision to proceed with the planning of the new space rests with the board of regents, it is likely that permission will be granted, said Steve Parrott, director of UI Communications and Outreach.

Pfizer expands free drug program to 50 poor countries

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.S. pharmaceutical giant Pfizer Inc. announced Wednesday it will expand its free distribution of a drug for AIDS patients in 50 of the world's least developed countries.

The drug, Diflucan, is already being distributed free in South Africa as a treatment for cryptococcal meningitis, an infection of the brain that occurs in 10 percent of AIDS patients. It also treats esophageal candidiasis, a fungal infection of the esophagus reported in 20-40 percent of patients with HIV/AIDS.

Dr. Henry McKinnell, Pfizer's chairman and CEO, said free distribution of the drug, generically known as Fluconazole, will begin as quickly as possible.

"We will support this initiative for as long as it is needed, and we will continue to work with the U.N., the World Health Organization, and other international organizations on how public-private partnerships like the Diflucan program can be most effective," he told a news conference to launch the initiative.

The drug is currently being shipped to South Africa and distributed in 185

clinics there. In the United States, the drug costs \$10 per dose, and those suffering from cryptococcal meningitis may need a lifelong daily regimen. AIDS patients with this form of meningitis are usually believed to have a few years to live.

Pfizer believes some 12 million people are infected with HIV in the areas where the drug will be available. But with almost no statistics on the two diseases treated with Diflucan in those regions, the company said it has yet to estimate the cost of the overall program.

Pfizer says the program in South Africa will cost the company about \$50 million over the next two years.

McKinnell's announcement was welcomed by representatives from several African nations that will receive the free drug, including Namibia, Malawi, Botswana, and Lesotho.

In South Africa, 11 percent of the population is infected with HIV; in Botswana, the figure is 19 percent.

The Pfizer announcement came just weeks before the U.N. General Assembly's special session on HIV/AIDS which is expected to adopt a global action plan to combat the epidemic. Secretary-General Kofi Annan has called for an annual fund of \$7 billion to \$10 billion to fight the disease.

Time's up for retirement decision

■ The UI may recommend an extension past the 2002 expiration date for the early retirement program.

The UI must determine during the next month whether to extend an early retirement incentives program by two years to lessen the impact its termination will have on employees.

The Iowa State Board of Regents released a report Wednesday that told of already-announced plans to end the Early Retirement Incentive Program on June 30, 2002.

But the UI and the Board Office anticipate that a recommendation will be made to the regents in July to allow for a two-year extension of the program. The possibility of an extension, which would benefit employees who had planned to take part in the program past the 2002 expiration date, had never been announced until Wednesday.

Employees who would be able to take part in an extension must be eligible for the program when it ends in 2002.

With the extension, the institutions hope to avoid an abrupt end to the program, which might encourage many employees to take retirement before next year's expiration date. The UI must make a final decision on whether to recommend the extension by July.

Under the current program, an individual retiring at 57 would receive a paid-up life insurance policy between \$2,000 and \$4,000 — equal to what the individual would have received had he or she retired at the age of 65 — along with other benefits.

Michael Wichman, former Staff Council President, said that without an extension, the UI could face an employee shortage.

"If an abundance of faculty and staff decided to retire early to take advantage of the retirement benefits before they're gone, it could leave the UI with gaps in some of their most important positions," Wichman said.

And with the university facing an \$18.7 million funding cut for fiscal year 2002, those positions would be hard to fill.

The program provides incentives in retirement contributions, such as health, dental, and life insurance to faculty, professional, scientific, and merit staff members employed at state-funded universities. The employees must be 57 or older and have 15 years of service to be eligible.

Pat Arkema, Staff Council President, said the UI needs to keep early retirement incentives as an option, even if the board discontinues the plan.

"If they eliminate retirement incentives it impacts the UI (in the) long term," Arkema said. "I think those employees that have worked 20, 30 years should have some sort of incentive once

they retire. "We knew there needed to be some changes to the Early Retirement Incentive Program. Our office is working on other options to have some form of early retirement as an option."

UI President Mary Sue Coleman declined comment on the current situation; she will be in attendance when the issue is discussed at next week's regents meeting.

At the end of the month, a total of over 2,000 faculty and staff statewide will have participated in the program since it began.

Meanwhile, the UI will continue to offer phased retirement until June 30, 2007. Phased retirement allows a staff member to go from a full-time to no more than a half-time appointment before retiring.

U.S., N. Korea to resume talks

WASHINGTON — After a lengthy policy review, the United States is prepared to resume low-level security talks with North Korea, focusing on Pyongyang's missile program and its heavy troop deployment near the Demilitarized Zone, an administration official said Wednesday.

Secretary of State Colin Powell will inform South Korean Foreign Minister Han Seung-soo of the U.S. plans during a meeting Thursday, said the official, asking not to be identified.

There have been no negotiations with Pyongyang since the Clinton administration

left office.

A main element of the policy review has been to determine ways to verify a missile control agreement with North Korea, should one be reached.

Powell will discuss the state of play of the review with Han over lunch Thursday and will seek his opinions, said the officials, who asked not to be identified.

Asked about the review, State Department spokesman Richard Boucher said it was "virtually complete."

During Clinton's final months in office, the United States and North Korea were making significant progress on a deal under which Pyongyang would agree to curb development and export of long-range missiles.

In announcing the policy review in March, Bush used the occasion to take some verbal shots at North Korean

leader Kim Jong Il, whom he said was untrustworthy and did not live up to agreements.

Powell suggested weeks later that the Clinton-era negotiations were too narrowly focused on missiles. He said new negotiations should be expanded to include the North's "huge army" of 1 million largely deployed along the 2 1/2-mile wide Demilitarized Zone on the 38th parallel, within easy striking distance of Seoul and of the 37,000 U.S. soldiers stationed in the South.

Angered by the delay in negotiations, North Korea has issued a number of statements hostile to the United States and has cut off reconciliation efforts with South Korea.

North Korea also has told American visitors that it will reconsider a 2-year-old moratorium on long-range missile tests if the administration doesn't resume negotiations.

Senate Dems step into new shoes

■ A "very, very slim majority" will force the new leadership to work with the GOP.

WASHINGTON — The Senate met under new, Democratic management on Wednesday, completing an unprecedented shift in power that dislodged Republicans and ushered in a new era of divided government. Majority Leader Tom Daschle swiftly suggested changes in the GOP-crafted budget.

"Both sides have to come to the middle. We can't just lob bombs," the South Dakota senator said, although he also made clear he was prepared to oppose President Bush on occasion in his role as Democratic leader.

Sen. Trent Lott of Mississippi, the GOP leader, ceded

power to Daschle with a pledge of "continued friendship" — and a list of accomplishments forged in six years of Republican rule.

"I think you will not see him more combative but much more aggressive," Sen. Bill Frist, R-Tenn., said of Lott. "He'll be able to more closely define and articulate Republican views without having to pay respect to the other side."

The new power relationships will take weeks or months to develop, but some changes occurred swiftly.

West Virginia Sen. Robert Byrd, 83 and the longest-serving Democrat, replaced South Carolina Republican Strom Thurmond, 98, as president pro tem, a constitutional office that makes him third in line for the presidency.

Senators debated education legislation, picking up where they had left off on

Tuesday — almost. Sen. Judd Gregg, R-N.H., supplanted James Jeffords of Vermont as the Republican manager of the bill.

Jeffords, whose switch from Republican to independent aligned with Democrats triggered the seismic shift in power, sat on the Democratic side of the aisle for the first time. "I was in awe knowing that I was entering a new phase in my life," said Jeffords, whose desk had been moved overnight.

Daschle praised the Vermont lawmaker for his "courageous decision." Lott did not mention Jefford's move.

The change in command ended the first period in 50 years in which Republicans held control of the White House and both houses of Congress. It also marked the first time in history that one party ceded power to another without an intervening election.

Former Luther College student next in line for Nepalese throne

DECORAH, Iowa (AP) — A former Luther College student is second in line for the throne in Nepal, where a massacre has devastated the royal family.

Crown Prince Paras Shah, 29, attended the small Northeast Iowa college during the fall and spring of 1990 and 1991, Luther officials said.

At the time, he was fifth in line to the throne. This week, he became second in line behind his father.

The former Crown Prince Dipendra killed his parents, King Birendra and Queen Aiswarya, and seven other members of the royal family Friday before turning the gun on himself. He died Monday.

The prince's uncle, Suraj Shamsher Rana, said Dipendra had been drinking and was thrown out of a royal gathering by his father, the king, before he returned with an assault rifle and gunned down his parents and relatives.

The death of the 10 royal family members left King Birendra's brother, Prince Gyanendra, as king. Shah, Gyanendra's son, was named crown prince.

Nepalese students have attended Luther since the late 1980s when a woman from Nepal, who worked for an international Lutheran organization, sent her son to Luther. Since then up to 20 Nepalese students have attended Luther each year.

Jeffords' switch matters little


As it is, a middle-of-the-road approach is the only one that

Operating under a president known for his coalition-building abilities, the Senate will be able to work out solutions for what Americans currently see as problems: the energy crisis, Medicare and Social Security overhaul, and the education system.

Many Democrats are acting as though Jeffords' move will open the door for liberal causes, or at least slam the door shut on conservative issues. It is likely instead that a few liberal and conservative ideas will sandwich an overwhelmingly moderate Congressional session.

The video-game war has claimed its first victim.

Sega, a longtime leader in the video game industry, has raised the white flag — before the war's even started. If Nintendo is smart, it will do the same.

In its recent decision to stop producing Sega Dreamcast home console systems and instead license its games to other companies formerly in competition, such as Sony, Nintendo, and Microsoft, Sega forfeited its spot in the console competition.

Sega hopes to broaden its market by offering its games to everyone, should people choose to purchase Sony's Playstation 2, Microsoft's X-BOX, or Nintendo's Game Cube. However, the X-BOX and Game Cube are not scheduled for release until November. Because of the slow sales of the Dreamcast during the last Christmas season, Sega apparently thought things could only get worse once its competition

arrived.

The choice on Sega's part was bold and intelligent. The company could no longer survive in a market against current gaming greats Nintendo and Sony, as well as the strongly hyped newcomer, Microsoft. Nintendo should follow Sega's lead.

Yes, Nintendo. Nintendo should still release the Game Cube. Far too much money has been devoted to research, development, and marketing to let the project die, and the console will sell. It just won't win.

Nintendo is releasing a product of inferior quality to that of Microsoft and Sony. The classic company is aiming to keep the

price \$50 lower than the \$299 retail price of its competing companies, and in doing so, is making the system less functional. In addition to stronger processors, the X-BOX and Playstation 2 will both offer a hard drive, DVD player, e-mail and Web browsing capability, as well as the Linux operating system in Japanese versions of the Playstation 2. Nintendo opted not to include such features, claiming that, despite an expected market for them in the future, its audience currently is not interested in such functions.

With less advanced and durable technology, the only draw Nintendo will have to its system is its long-loved game trademarks, such as the Mario Brothers and Zelda series. However, its trademark games will not be enough to keep its inferior system alive.

New adaptations to such classics will be enough to keep Nintendo alive — just not as a maker of platforms.



'Park'ing with the Bard and the stars

The Shakespearean comedy *As You Like It* begins tonight and will run through June 24.

The Riverside Theatre Company will perform Shakespeare the way the playwright would have liked it as the second Shakespeare in the Park festival kicks off tonight.

When the Shakespeare in the Park festival first debuted in Iowa City in June 2000, with nine performances of *The Twelfth Night*, it sold out every performance in its two-week run.

This year, the Riverside Theatre Company of Iowa City, the producer of the festival, will perform *As You Like It*, and has extended the event to 14 shows.

JoAnn Goerd, the marketing director for Riverside Theatre, said this is a direct response to last year's "amazing" ticket sales.

"Last year, we didn't anticipate all of the excitement gathered by the festival," she said.

Amy Estes, the managing director of the Riverside Theatre, said that, as of Wednesday afternoon, tickets were still available for all 14 of the festival's shows.

Some shows had originally sold out, but with the installation of folding chairs in the theater, 20 additional seats became available for each show, Estes said.

A lot of work went into the event for its debut run, including the building of a stage in Lower City Park. The Riverside Festival Stage is the result of the city of Iowa City and the Riverside Theatre Company's collaboration to build a publicly owned facility replicating Shakespeare's Globe Theatre in London.

The city built, owns, and maintains the facility, which can be reserved by the public through the city Parks and Recreation Department. Weddings, classes, and concerts have been held there, but the Shakespeare festival continues to be the venue's largest event.

Ron Clark, co-artistic director for *As You Like It*, and co-founder of the Riverside Theatre Company, said he and others at the theater had wanted to produce an outdoor Shakespeare festival for a

long time.

"We've always loved outdoor Shakespeare and think it's a really exciting way for audiences to see classics," he said. He said he hopes people who have not experienced outdoor drama take this opportunity.

"I think that this production is highly successful in

telling the story and drawing in the audience," Clark said, adding that he thinks younger audience members and people who are less familiar with Shakespeare will get a lot out of the performance.

One of the main goals for this year's festival is to build an audience base, said Clark. While last year's production was a very classically rendered, *As You Like It* is being produced a little differently, said Clark.

"This year we're throwing something new at our audiences," he said.

"It's a very updated look and feel to the play," he added, in reference to the unique approach that includes modern music and what Clark calls "fantastical costuming."

"The play has great contemporary resonance," Mark Hunter, the play's director. He added that he felt some of the themes it touched on, like love and identity, resonate with modern life.

As You Like It is a romantic comedy about mistaken identities and marriage.

Rehearsals for *As You Like It* began in early May, but the search for the perfect cast has been ongoing since January, said Clark. The production's 19 actors hail from all over the country.

"We have a wonderful, wonderful cast assembled from all over the place," Hunter said. Hunter is from Austin, Texas, and while the cast includes local and regional actors, there are members from Chicago, Cincinnati, Los Angeles, and New York, to name a few.

While the Riverside players are concentrating their efforts on this year's festival, they are already setting goals for next year, when the festival will run for five weeks and will showcase two plays, *Romeo and Juliet*, and the *Comedy of Errors*, running alternately, said Clark.

Clark foresees the festival continuing to gain in popularity in the coming years.

He said, "I think the audience is just going to grow."

New look for Miss America Pageant

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The Miss America Pageant is replacing its longtime producer to create a telecast with more substance and fewer beauty pageant trappings, said CEO Robert Renneisen Jr.

Bob Bain, a former Fox Broadcasting executive who has produced the Billboard Music Awards and other awards shows, succeeds Jeff Margolis, who had produced the telecast since 1993.

Margolis said Tuesday he didn't understand why he was ousted. He said the move surprised him and network sponsor ABC-TV.

"I was given no explanation. I was just told he wanted to make a change and that was the end of the conversation," Margolis said.

The move continues a management shake-up by Renneisen, a former casino executive who was hired 15 months ago and has restructured the Miss America Organization, adding a marketing specialist, an executive vice president and a public relations manager to the staff, among other changes.

"We want to move it away from the beauty pageant kind of show and focus a little more on the deeper aspects of the competition, like the platform issue, the interview, the scholastic part of it," Renneisen said.

The swimsuit competition will remain for the Sept. 22 telecast.

The pageant, which has lost viewers steadily for years, was watched by 12.6 million people last year.

Margolis, 52, a veteran producer and director of TV specials and awards shows, was hired in 1993 to modernize the Miss America telecast. He oversaw its use of call-in polls, more up-tempo production numbers and MTV-style camera work and staging to woo younger viewers.

Bain, owner of Bob Bain Productions Inc., has produced awards shows and specials, including Nickelodeon's "Kids' Choice Awards."

make up his mind in the next two to three weeks after educating himself about what a campaign would entail and weighing a variety of factors.

The UI's assistant athletics director said he has not thoroughly considered a possible platform. He said he did not remember registering as a Democrat 25 years ago, which Johnson County records show.

"I thought I was an independent," he said. "That's how I've always voted. I never look at the parties they're in but what type of candidate they are."

Gable, who guided the Hawkeyes to 15 national titles

in 21 years, acknowledged his widespread popularity and name recognition would be beneficial.

"Initially, I think it's an advantage," Gable said. "You don't have to go out as much to drum up support."

In fact, Gable already has the support of two of the state's U.S. Representatives, Greg Ganske and Jim Leach. The two moderate Republicans have offered to provide advice and possible campaign support.

Meanwhile, local Republicans said Wednesday they were surprised when they heard the news. Johnson County's top Republican did not find out

until she picked up the newspaper Wednesday.

In fact, Cathy Grawe said she still had no idea whether the story would materialize.

"That was the first I've heard of it," the chairwoman of the Johnson County

Republican Party said. "That might be one of those things that is a good one-day story, and then that's the end of it. But I have no idea. Who is to say?"

She called Gable a "wonderful coach and a wonderful man" whom she has met at various functions.

"He does know how to get

things done," she said.

UI Professor of political science Tim Hagle said he heard no mention of a possible Gable candidacy at a Tuesday meeting of Linn County Republican Party officials. Members were even discussing the governor's race and one of the other possible candidates was in attendance rallying support.

"It was kind of a 'Wow,'" Hagle said of his response to newspaper reports Wednesday. "It was partly from surprise, and partly because it was Dan Gable."

Execution schedule stays course

McVeigh's defense, perhaps by pointing to the involvement of others in the crime.

Matsch said if the FBI had the duty to disclose what it knew to prosecutors, McVeigh had the same duty to tell his lawyers if others were involved in the bombing.

Attorney General John Ashcroft was pleased with Matsch's decision. "We've never had a doubt about the guilt of Timothy McVeigh," he said.

McVeigh's appeal will be filed with the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver, which has never overturned Matsch in the bombing case. Further appeals would go to the Supreme Court.

McVeigh will be moved as early as Friday from his cell to the holding cell in the death chamber.

In Oklahoma City, Martha Ridley, whose daughter Kathy died in the 1995 bombing, said, "Mr. McVeigh is an admitted and convicted murderer. I just want to get this thing over with and be done with it. It's time for him to go."

But Jannie Coverdale, who lost two grandsons in the explosion, had hoped for a delay. She believes McVeigh and co-conspirator Terry Nichols did not plan the bombing alone.

"I'm wondering now that if Tim is executed, will we ever know?" she asked. "We have been fighting so long for the truth. I have no confidence in the government now."

In Pendleton, N.Y., McVeigh's father said he was disappointed but not surprised.

"He's going to get executed sooner or later. Most people know he did it, so ..." Bill McVeigh said, his voice trail-

ing away. "I think the longer he lives, the better. It's easiest on me but, like I said, it's going to happen eventually."

During the hearing, Matsch recalled recently getting a letter from prosecutor Sean Connelly advising him that documents had been withheld.

"It's a good thing I was in quiet chambers and not in court because my judicial temperament escaped me when I read it. It was shocking," the judge said.

But Connelly argued Wednesday that information in the documents was contained in FBI interview reports that had been given to the defense before trial.

The prosecutor has also pointed out that McVeigh confessed to the April 19, 1995, bombing in a recent book and said that he alone carried out the attack that killed 168 people.

Defense attorneys said the

4,400 pages and 11 CDs of FBI material may contain information about others who may have been involved in the deadliest act of terrorism on U.S. soil.

McVeigh attorney Rob Nigh said one of the documents included information on a potential witness who was unknown to the defense. "If Mr. McVeigh is allowed to be executed five days from now, the integrity of the process will have been destroyed," he said.

the fiscal year that begins in July.

It places the predictions that university officials have been making since March — which include a decrease in the number of courses offered to students, the reduction of funding for some research projects, and employee layoffs as deemed necessary — in writing.

Coleman and her counterparts from Iowa's two other public universities will present these plans to the state of Iowa Board of Regents at the board meeting in Ames June 12-13.

According to the report, the UI still faces impending downsizing of classes offered, counseling services, and research opportunities offered to stu-

dents in light of an approximately \$16 million cut to the UI's operating budget. It may also face increased maintenance deferrals in building repairs across campus, the report states.

The College of Liberal Arts is working with the Provost's Office to retain the same number of seats in each class as it did last fall, Maxson said. The university's largest college will not be hit as hard in an effort to soften the blow on students, but it will still offer less courses than it has in the past, she said.

Financial aid will not be affected by the budget cuts, which are the largest the university has ever seen, Parrott said. He also asserted the UI will do everything it can to ensure that students working toward a four-year graduation date will be able to accomplish

their goal. During last month's regents meetings, officials from the three universities discussed ways the budget cuts will affect the schools' students, faculties, and facilities, but the UI has not introduced any new concerns since then.

It is waiting for Gov. Tom Vilsack to sign a salary bill — designating the amount of money Vilsack and the Legislature will approve for funding faculty salaries — before it may assign the remaining funds, Parrott said. "The signature is the missing piece of the puzzle," he said, adding there is a possibility Vilsack may sign the bill before next week's meetings.

it's really not that appealing when it comes to space."

The UI has not determined a new location for the house but officials said the university wants to keep it close to its current setting.

"We really want to respect the house for its context," said John Amend, UI associate vice president and director of Facility Services group. "Most people won't even notice that the house was moved."

Originally the home of Benjamin Shambaugh and his wife, Bertha Horack, the house served as the center for UI social life for students, faculty, alumni, and distinguished visitors. The house has welcomed more world-famous guests than any other home in the state. Among those who stayed with the Shambaughs were Grand Duke Alexander of Russia, Amelia Earhart, and Baroness von Hindenburg.

The house has served as

the home of the UI Honors Program since 1982 and is on the National Registry of Historic Places.

The UI expects that the Shambaugh site will be used as a materials storage area during the construction of the Honors Center and will subsequently be developed as a 23-car parking facility at an undetermined date.

The UI has yet to hire a contractor for the job but estimates that relocating the house could cost upwards of \$25,000, Amend said. He also added that the UI has to build a new foundation for the house and may replace the boiler. The total cost of the project could cost between \$75,000 and \$100,000, Amend said.

Until the expected 2003 completion of its new home, the Honors Program will have to make do with its temporary location on the second floor of the Jefferson Building, located on Washington Street and the Pedestrian Mall.

Fulton said she is looking forward to the program's

short-term home, adding that the location is more spacious and convenient for students.

However, as much as she anticipates the impact of the program's temporary location, Fulton said she can't wait until it moves into its new building.

"The new Honors Center will give us a lot more flexible study space," she said.

The new building will give the Honors Program six floors and 58,700 square feet and will also house the Belin-Blank Gifted and Talented Education Program.

"It's really exciting for the Honors Program," said Steve Parrott, the director of university communications. "The Gifted and Talented Program will allow them to work with young kids from all over the state."

The building will feature five 25-seat multimedia classrooms, a 20-seat ICN classroom, a research library, and a 25-seat computer center.

Capriati preparing for semis

■ She was 14 the last time she advanced this far in the French Open.

PARIS — The last time Jennifer Capriati walked onto court for a French Open semifinal, she made tennis history.

The year was 1990. Capriati was 14 years old, the youngest player ever to reach a Grand Slam semi.

"I just remember that it came very easy back then," said Capriati, now 25. "It's not that I didn't work for it back then, but I really had to work for it this time."

Eleven years later, the competition is fierce. The fourth-seeded Capriati faces top-seeded Martina Hingis in

today's semifinal, and both players have high emotional stakes.

Capriati lost that 1990 semifinal match to Monica Seles and for the next decade was unable to advance past the quarterfinals in Paris.

After her well-documented brush with drugs and a break from tennis, Capriati has come back a champion.

In January, she won the Australian Open, beating Hingis in the final, and has mounted her strongest bid at Roland Garros since her adolescence.

"Now she knows what to do," said her father and coach, Stefano. "She has experience. She is a stronger player now."

Hingis, like Capriati, has never won at Roland Garros. But the Swiss player has

tasted defeat several times: She has been a semifinalist or finalist in Paris every year since 1997.

The French Open remains the only Grand Slam title that Hingis has never won.

The world's top-ranked player reached her first French Open final in 1997 when only 16, and is looking to avenge her emotional 1999 loss to Steffi Graf. She was three points from victory when Graf came back to clinch the title, and Hingis stormed off the court in tears.

Going into her fifth French Open semifinal, Hingis says she's never been in better shape.

"I never felt this good in the previous years because I always was a little bit tired toward the end of the tournament," Hingis said.

mer Iowa State player Stacey Freese challenging her for the backup position, Consuegra's position was uncertain.

"When I first got drafted I thought, why did Utah draft me? They already have so many guards," she said. "It didn't seem like a good situation. But then one of the point guards didn't come back, and that really opened it up for me."

Consuegra may have been nervous, but she always thought she could make the team if she only got the chance.

"I had my share of doubts, but at the same time I felt that if I could just get a tryout I would make it. I was most scared that I wouldn't get the chance to try."

Consuegra made her presence official when the Starzz announced they were waiving Stacey Freese and keeping

her career — a spot on the bench.

She is slotted behind Azzi, the former Stanford standout who averages 35.5 minutes per game and was second in the league in assists last year.

Consuegra is currently averaging approximately 3 minutes per game, and zeros in all the other categories, but she feels that every player on a team is vital.

"I am a role player, I get Jennifer Azzi ready for games," she said. "When she needs breaks, I do the best I can. It's hard, but every player's been through it, and I take pride in it."

The Utah Starzz are currently 1-2 after losing 72-68 to the defending national champions, the Houston Comets, on Tuesday. With Azzi in early foul trouble, Consuegra played 7 minutes. Next up is Orlando tonight at 8 p.m.

"For me it was very good, because from then on I played very well."

The 10th-seeded Grosjean's opponent in the semifinals will be No. 13 Alex Corretja, who advanced by beating unseeded 19-year-old Roger Federer, 7-5, 6-4, 7-5. The other match Friday pits top-seeded two-time champion Gustavo Kuerten against No. 4 Juan Carlos Ferrero.

Today, No. 4 Jennifer Capriati will play in her first French Open semifinal since 1990 when she faces top-seeded Martina Hingis. The other match will be a showdown between two Belgian teenagers — No. 12 Kim Clijsters and No. 14 Justine Henin.

Last year, Agassi snubbed reporters after losing to Karol

Kucera in the second round at Roland Garros. This time he showed for the mandatory postmatch news conference but shed little light on his implausible performance.

Before Clinton arrived, Agassi breezed through the first set in 22 minutes.

"He's a friend of mine, I like him," the former president said on his way into the stadium.

Faster than you can say "Hail to the Chief," the momentum turned. Agassi lost the next five points and 10 of the next 12 as the crowd began to chant Grosjean's name.

With a mustache, goatee and cap worn backward, the 23-year-old Marseille native looks like he should be working at a record shop in the Latin Quarter, rather than upsetting one of tennis' golden oldies.

But the 5-foot-9 Grosjean

ranks among the quickest players on the tour and seemed to reach every ball. On one key point he dashed from the backhand corner to chase down a drop volley and flip a forehand winner as he went skidding off the court, fist raised in jubilation.

"His speed puts a lot of pressure on you," Agassi said, "because you have to hit not just quality shots, but you have to hit a number of them."

While rushing Agassi into errors, Grosjean smacked winners from both sides, repeatedly dusting the lines. Once he hit two lines at once, ripping a backhand winner that skipped off the corner of the court.

He threw a lot of junk at Agassi, too.

"I tried to vary the pace because I know he doesn't like that," Grosjean said. "I tried to mix up my shots — long shots, short shots, slice shots."

Eleven-year-old girl playing a man's game

Michelle Wie aspires to play on the PGA tour — not the LPGA — when she grows up.

HONOLULU — Michelle Wie is having trouble finding competition on the golf course, and she's only 11 years old.

Wie, who says some of her sixth-grade classmates call her a "golfing geek," already has defeated the top female golfers in the state and is now taking on the male golfers.

Her goal next year is to supplant 13-year-old Morgan Pressel as the youngest U.S. Women's Open qualifier. She missed this year, shooting a 76 in qualifying.

Wie made history Tuesday when she teed off in the Manoa Cup at the Oahu Country Club. She is the first female — and the youngest player ever — to qualify for the 94-year-old tournament, the oldest in Hawaii.

She joined the match-play field with 63 of Hawaii's top male golfers after shooting a 5-over round off the men's tees.

Last month, Wie won Hawaii's premier women's amateur tournament, the 54-

hole Jennie K. Wilson Invitational, where she finished 4-over 220, beating runner-up and defending champion Bobbi Kokx by nine strokes.

When the 5-foot-9 Punahou School sixth-grader "grows up," her goal is to "play in the PGA and win lots of tournaments."

That's PGA, not the LPGA. "A friend of mine told Michelle, 'You're the next Se Ri Pak,'" said her father, Byung

Wook Wie, referring to the LPGA star from South Korea. "She was kind of frustrated. She wants to be the next Tiger Woods."

Wie spends four hours every weekday at Olomana Golf Links on Oahu, where she once shot a 64 on the par-73 course. "I don't like going to the mall," Wie said. "I'm not really like the other girls. I just like to go out on the golf course and play."

Her routine includes 45 minutes of putting, 30 minutes on the short game, 45 minutes on the range, and nine holes of play.

During practice, she dropped 20-foot putts like an NBA player sinks free throws and consistently drove the ball way past the 200-yard marker.

Wie spends seven to eight hours practicing on the weekends, but she still maintains straight A's.

"She really enjoys golf," said her father, a University of Hawaii professor and her caddy. "We never force her to come to practice, we would never do that."

Wie has been playing since she was 4 and said golf is simply "fun." Like all golfers, she loves to see her shots soaring toward a faraway target.

"The best part about golf is when you hit the ball long, it feels really good," Wie said. She knows about length off the tee. When Gov. Ben Cayetano signed a proclamation honoring Wie, he noted that her 270-yard drives are about 50 yards longer than his.

"She was born with instincts," her father said. "I think she understands the theory of golf and the swing. She's a quick visual learner."

Begay is back on tour after two-month hiatus

Zito, of course, thinks A P Valentine can give him his first Belmont victory Saturday, but second-place finishes in the final race of Triple Crown have to be on his mind.

In nine previous Belmonts, Zito has seen four of his starters finish second, including Kentucky Derby winners Strike the Gold, by a head in 1991, and Go For Gin, by two lengths in 1994.

While A P Valentine has won only an allowance race this year, he did finish second in the Preakness, and he won both of his starts at Belmont Park last year, including a 1 3/4-length score over Point Given in the Champagne.

Baffert will try for his first Belmont victory with Preakness winner Point Given, who finished fifth in the Kentucky Derby.

It will be the third Belmont favorite for Baffert, but the other two both finished second — Silver Charm by three-quarters of a length in 1997 and Real Quiet by a nose in 1998. Both colts had been bidding to become a Triple Crown champion.

Devils could enter elite NHL group

■ If New Jersey wins, it will be the fourth team to claim three titles since 1960.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The New Jersey Devils are one victory — one more game if all goes right — from doing something special.

Something that would make a handful of engraved names on a silver chalice stand out all the more, perhaps glitter a little brighter. Something that separates the great teams from merely the good ones.

They would be Stanley Cup champions, perhaps as soon as Thursday night.

For only the fourth time since expansion in the 1960s, the NHL would have a three-time champion. The others already hold a special place in the game: the Montreal Canadiens of Ken Dryden, the Edmonton Oilers of a guy named Gretzky, the New York Islanders of Bryan Trottier.

Still, there are two significant challenges to the Devils as they take a 3-2 lead into Game 6 of the Stanley Cup finals against the Colorado Avalanche on Thursday, when they could win their third cup since 1995.

The first, of course, is Colorado, which only a week ago seemed on the verge of winning this very cup. The second is the Devils' sporadic history on home ice.

To avoid a Game 7 in unfriendly Denver on Saturday night, when they would be favorites no more, the

Devils must win in an arena that hasn't been supplied much of a home-ice advantage during the last two postseasons. They are 13-10 at the Meadowlands, 1-1 in this series, compared to 18-5 on the road.

"There are more distractions at home than on the road," Devils coach Larry Robinson said Wednesday. "You have family here, you have friends. People calling you, wanting tickets, wanting you to do this and go here. On the road, you only have to think about what time to go to bed and what time to get up. You only have to think about hockey."

Still, it is who the Devils are playing rather than where they are playing that worries them more.

The Avalanche, who have allowed six of the last seven goals in the series, are promising to play with all the desperation required of a team in their situation, one that may be behind but is not yet beaten.

Colorado is trying to become the fourth team, but only the second in 37 seasons, to rally from a 3-2 deficit in the finals. The last to do it was Montreal against the Chicago Blackhawks in 1971.

"We know we can win there, and we've won some big games all year on the road," said Ray Bourque, still trying to win the cup for the first time in his 22 seasons. "This is the biggest one. We're going to go out there and win the hockey game and come back to Denver for the seventh game."

There is speculation the end of

the series will be the end of the line for the 40-year-old Bourque, one of the game's best defencemen ever. However, several teammates expect him to return for another season, and Bourque is convinced Thursday won't be his last game.

"No, not at all," he said. "We're going to go out and play a great game and bring it back (to Denver) and make sure it's not."

To do that, the Avalanche must find a way to get the puck past goaltender Martin Brodeur, who has played consecutive strong games. They also must slow the Devils' A-Line, with or without center Jason Arnott, who sat out Monday's 4-1 victory at Colorado with a possible concussion.

Arnott, who didn't sound very optimistic Tuesday about playing, skated Wednesday, and Robinson said, "All indications are he'll be ready to perform."

Arnott's linemates — Patrik Elias (2 goals, 1 assist in the last two games) and Petr Sykora (1 goal, 2 assists) — already are performing superbly. They have picked it up offensively since Bobby Holik moved onto their line to defend against the Joe Sakic line, allowing Elias and Sykora to save more of their energy for scoring.

Sakic had three goals in the first two games, but none since Holik began opposing him on nearly every shift. Another shutout of Sakic and Holik could be holding up the cup for the third time in seven seasons.

Philly takes Game 1

■ The Sixers end L.A.'s playoff winning streak with a 107-101 upset.

LOS ANGELES — There won't be a sweep in the NBA Finals unless the 76ers — not the Lakers — can pull one off.

In a thrilling opener to the championship round, Allen Iverson had a mesmerizing first half, a poor second half and a clutch overtime, scoring 48 points to lead Philadelphia to a 107-101 victory Wednesday night.

Iverson scored seven straight points after the clock ticked inside two minutes to give Philadelphia a lead it never relinquished. The 76ers ended the Lakers' 19-game winning streak, giving them their first loss in 67 days.

"We knew we could win before we came here, with everybody counting us out," Iverson said. "They thought we would get swept and that is like a slap in the face."

Iverson and Shaquille O'Neal both had 41 points at the end of the fourth quarter, but Iverson scored only three in the final 19 minutes of regulation as he was hounded defensively by speedy Lakers' reserve Tyrone Lue.


O'Neal hit a jump hook for the first points of the overtime, Kobe Bryant spun around Eric Snow for a layup and O'Neal hit one of two from the line for a five-point lead with three minutes left.

Raja Bell flung up an underhanded shot with his left hand that fell through, and Iverson hit two foul shots to get the 76ers within 99-98 with 1:46 left.

Lue then missed a drive and Iverson beat him downcourt and hit a wide-open 3-pointer. After a turnover by Rick Fox, Iverson buried a corner jumper over Lue for a 103-99 lead.

Bryant answered with a jumper, but Snow hit a runner from the lane with 10.5 seconds left for a four-point lead that all but ended the game — along with all the talk about how the Lakers would sweep the 76ers and become the first team to go undefeated through the postseason.

"That's the way we are. We play hard," Iverson said. "We came in here expecting to win. We know we can win."

Everybody's been counting us out."

O'Neal finished with 44 points and 20 rebounds, but Bryant scored just 15 points on 7-for-22 shooting.

"I don't think Kobe Bryant had a Kobe kind of day and he will play better Friday," Snow said. "In OT, we came out slow but gathered the troops, Allen hit a big shot and we got some stops."

Game 2 is Friday night. Iverson had his third consecutive 40-point game, and

Snow and Dikembe Mutombo added 13 points each.

Fifteen minutes before tipoff, the crowd at Staples Center began chanting, "SWEEP! SWEEP!"

But when Iverson started hitting from all over, the chorus turned to "OOH" and "AAH."

Iverson scored 30 points in the first half as the 76ers came back from an early 13-point deficit, and he opened the second half with a jumper that

hit nothing but net and brought more howls of astonishment from the celebrity-studded crowd.

Midway through the third quarter, Iverson came up with a steal, raced ahead of O'Neal and braced himself for a 350-pound impact as he went up for a layup. O'Neal, however, barely even swiped at the ball. The layup gave Philadelphia a 68-56 lead, and a three-point play by Snow put the Sixers ahead 73-58 with 5:23 left in the third.

Her leadership skills, determination, and enthusiasm for the game played almost as large a role as her basketball skills when it came to Cara Consuegra's newest accomplishment — a spot on the official roster of the WNBA's Utah Starzz.

Consuegra has aspired to play professional basketball since the WNBA started in 1997. Now her far-off dream is a reality.

The 5-foot-8 point guard graduated from the UI in May and was picked up in the fourth round of WNBA Draft as the No. 56 pick. She packed up her four years of black-and-gold memories and set out for Salt Lake City, Utah — again.

The last time the Mount Airy, Md., native stepped foot

on the Utah mountains was for the second round of the NCAA tournament, when the Utah Utes abruptly ended the Hawkeyes' impressive late-season run.

"Yeah, it is really weird," Consuegra said about returning to Salt Lake City. "When I first got here, I had bad memories. Every time I would drive near the University of Utah, there's a bad vibe I felt around there."

However, Consuegra admits that the longer she spends in the city, the less she thinks of the stinging NCAA experience.

When Consuegra was drafted by the Starzz, she had quite a challenge ahead of her. With starting Utah point guard Jennifer Azzi healthy and for-

Woods, Cubs stick it to St. Louis again, 4-1

CHICAGO (AP) — Kerry Wood took a no-hit bid into the sixth inning and Sammy Sosa homered to lead Chicago over the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-1, Wednesday, the Cubs' 14th win in 15 games.

Rondell White and Matt Stairs also homered for the Cubs, who have won nine straight at Wrigley Field, their longest home winning streak since May 29-June 15, 1998.

At 35-21, the Cubs are a season-best 14 games over .500 and increased their NL Central lead to four games over second-place St. Louis.

Wood (5-4), who won his fourth consecutive start, didn't allow a hit until Kerry Robinson singled to left leading off the sixth.

Wood, who has won four consecutive decisions for the first time since 1998, gave up one run and two hits in seven innings, struck out six and walked five.

In his last four starts, he has allowed five runs and 13 hits in 28 1/3 innings, compiling a 1.58 ERA and lowering his season ERA to 3.80.

Tom Gordon pitched the ninth for his eighth save in 10 chances.

Darryl Kile (7-5) allowed three runs and seven hits in six innings. St. Louis, which is 19-11 at home, dropped to 13-15 on the road.

Chicago went ahead in the third when Ricky Gutierrez tripled, Sosa hit a sacrifice fly,

and White hit his 10th homer — his fifth during an 11-game hitting streak.

Clinton watches as Agassi falls in France

PARIS — Former President Clinton showed up at the French Open to root for Andre Agassi, stayed for most of three sets, and saw him win three games.

While Clinton had little to cheer about, Frenchman Sebastien Grosjean delighted the partisan Parisians in the capacity crowd with the match of his life Wednesday to win, 1-6, 6-1, 6-3, and reach the semifinals.

The shocker ended Agassi's quest for a second successive Grand Slam championship and a second title at Roland Garros. He won the Australian Open in January and the French in 1999.

"It's pretty disappointing at the moment," said a terse, sullen Agassi. "I played well. He played a lot better."

In truth, the third-seeded Agassi played poorly, particularly after Clinton arrived at the start of the second set. At times, Grosjean said, it appeared as if Agassi wasn't

even trying — perhaps because he was so frustrated.

"It was strange because sometimes he hit the ball really hard, you know, like tanking," Grosjean said. "Maybe he was not really happy that the game wasn't like the first set."


And maybe — bizarre though it sounds — the seven-time Grand Slam champion was unnerved by Clinton's presence.

When the former president left briefly after the third set, Agassi won two of the next three games. Then Clinton returned, and Agassi double-faulted on the next point, double-faulted again on break point and struggled the rest of the way.

Agassi tried to dismiss the notion that Clinton distracted him.

"I didn't know he was there," said Agassi — a curious claim because the former president received a rousing ovation when he arrived and sat in the first row behind the baseline on Agassi's side. Even Grosjean took notice.

"I didn't realize that Bill Clinton was coming," the Frenchman said with a grin.
