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

## 1 apparel firm signs conduct code

■ Vision Embroidery signs the code, while Russell Athletic says it will soon.

One apparel company signed the UI licensee Code of Conduct Tuesday, and another said it plans to, both explaining that recent clarifications to the code cleared up their major concerns.

"We just signed on," said Dale Davidson, a spokesman for Cincinnati-based Vision Embroidery in a phone interview. "We had a nice conversation with [UI licensing director] Mark Abbott and are comfortable with the new wording."

A spokesman for Russell Athletic said Tuesday his company will also sign the code, but it has yet to fax the docu-

ment to the university.

Vision Embroidery, the UI jacket and windsuit maker, brought in \$3,691 to the university in royalty revenues in fiscal year 2000. Russell Athletic brought in more than \$1,900.

After Tuesday's developments, it is still unclear whether three remaining companies will sign the code, which is aimed at improving conditions for the workers who make products that bear the UI's logo. Representatives from the three — Nike, Jostens, and VF Imagewear — did not return phone calls seeking comment.

During fiscal year 2000, they made up approximately \$25,000 in UI revenue, with Nike accounting for more than half of that.

Abbott said he has answered

questions and heard comments from each of the remaining companies by phone since last week, when the university announced that the firms would have 10 more days to sign the code or face termination of their contracts. That's when the university sent several clarifications of the code in areas the companies had concerns with in an effort to get them to sign.

Vision Embroidery's major concern was with a provision that requires each company to pay its workers a living wage. A clarification made last week allows the company to work towards that goal, without fully complying.


Another concern the company had was a provision that limits work weeks to 48 hours, but the university agreed to

## Pentacrest lawn suffers 'brown out'

■ Snow mold apparently caused a large patch of grass on the Pentacrest to wither and die.

A large piece of the Pentacrest lawn remains lifelessly brown after UI maintenance workers sprayed the area with chemicals in order to eliminate weeds.

"We noticed in April, when we started mowing, that the area was slow to green up," UI grounds supervisor Shawn Fitzpatrick said. "I'm guessing snow mold had caused the bluegrass to dry out and only weeds remained ... so we sprayed them with Roundup and reseeded on June 8."

Snow mold is a fungus that sets up under snow; it tends to result from failing to cut grass short enough in the fall, said Rob Brenneman, an Iowa City landscaper.

It is not likely the mold will spread to other areas because of the warm weather, Brenneman said.

The area, which stretches approximately 20 feet by 40 feet and is located in front of Schaeffer Hall, was seeded

with a blend of perennial ryegrass and Kentucky bluegrass. Healthy, new blades should start to sprout within two to three weeks, Fitzpatrick said.

Roundup, a "non-selective herbicide," kills all vegetation with which it comes in contact and is generally reserved for weeds and mulch, such as dandelions and clovers in sidewalk cracks.


However, maintenance workers decided it was needed on the Pentacrest to get rid of the weed bed and start over, Fitzpatrick said. Trimec, the controversial pesticide containing 2, 4-D, a possible carcinogen, is normally used on campus to kill weeds.

The brown spot seems to be drawing attention, said Fitzpatrick, who received an inquiring e-mail from the office of Doug True, the vice president of Finance. The office is in Jessup Hall.

"I feel bad that it's been brown for this long, but the weather's working against us," Fitzpatrick said. "It's an eyesore, and we're trying to look at this as a short-term pain for long-term gain."

The herbicide and reseeding procedures are fairly inexpen-

## U.S. executes Garza on McVeigh's gurney

■ After a 38-year hiatus, the federal government kills a second man in a matter of eight days.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. — Strapped to the same padded gurney on which Timothy McVeigh died, drug kingpin Juan Raul Garza received a

chemical injection Tuesday and became the second inmate in eight days put to death by the U.S. government.

While the Oklahoma City bomber died stoic and remorseless, Garza was fidgety as he awaited execution, apologizing for the murders for which he was condemned to die.

"I just want to say that I'm sorry, and I apologize for all the pain and grief that I have

caused," the 44-year-old Garza said. "I ask your forgiveness, and God bless."

Garza's pleas for clemency were rebuffed the night before by the Bush administration, which ended 38 years of no federal executions by having two in just over a week. On June 11, McVeigh became the first federal inmate put to death since 1963. Garza, the second, was pronounced dead at 7:09 CDT.

"With this administration, there's no doubt whether they are more clearly in favor of supporting the death penalty at all costs than doing anything of substance to correct the system," Garza attorney Gregory Wiercioch said.

It could be months or even years before there is another execution at the Terre Haute prison, the home of the only federal death row. No execu-

## 'Special' librarian retires after 31 years

■ Bob McCown will leave the UI with a lifetime achievement award.

In an office almost completely lined with books, Bob McCown is surrounded by what he loves and has worked diligently to preserve.

McCown, who will retire in November from his position as the UI manuscripts librarian, has worked in the the system's special-collections department for 31 years, supervising the collection, organization, and preservation of Iowa historical records.

"It's important for Iowans to know about their heritage, to know about politicians who influenced their lives, and to document the organizations in Iowa," said McCown, 61.

The Sioux Falls, S.D., native, who hikes in the Western mountains annually, sports a thin, fit frame, gentle eyes, and a passion for helping and informing others.

"I've learned a great deal from him and with him," said

David Schoonover, the UI curator of rare books, who has been a friend and colleague of McCown for 15 years. "We have a complementary work environment. I wish him the best in his retirement."

In the last three decades, McCown has collected hundreds of novels written by native Iowans, secured personal papers and records of historical Iowans, and acquired a vast collection of historical railroad data. McCown worked to obtain and preserve more than 250,000 photos, 27,000

## With liquor license in hand, Etc. opens its doors

■ The City Council chooses not to appeal the approval of a local bar's liquor license.

A local bar opened its doors last week for the first time despite controversy surrounding the approval of its liquor license.

After careful consideration, city officials said, the Iowa City City Council decided not to appeal a May 8 ruling by a state judge that granted Kip Pohl, the owner of Etc., 118 S. Dubuque St., a liquor license.

The 21-and-over bar features zebra-print chairs and blue

lights. By using a modern interior design, the Etc. management is aiming for a "hip" atmosphere, said Ryan Rooney, the bar's general manager.

Etc. opened later than expected after the council voted May 3 to deny Pohl a liquor license because of what some councilors termed his and Rooney's "questionable moral character." An administrative-law judge then overturned the decision, and Lynn Walding, the administrator of the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division, said the bar is now in the clear to do business.

James Adrian, a co-owner of the Atlas World Grill, 127 Iowa

# Scouts/gays issue sizzles over once again

■ One school board member says the district is not willing to lose money to uphold its equity statement.

The Iowa City Boy Scouts and Iowa City School District are at odds in the wake of a recent Senate measure that would cut federal funding to school districts that discriminate against some groups.

Jesse Helms, R-N.C., wrote the education-bill amendment, which would cut federal funding to any school district that discriminates against the scouts because of their policy of prohibiting homosexuals from joining the organization.

The Iowa City School District had planned to start charging the scouts a fee for utilizing school facilities this fall as a result of a proposal adopted early last month in reaction to the scout's policy regarding gays.

"The amendment to the education bill would make this whole thing moot," said School Board member Lauren Reece. "We're not going to lose over a million dollars in federal funding to keep the scouts out."

If Helms' amendment becomes law after the education bill goes through a House-Senate conference committee, then the district won't charge the scouts, she said. From there, the district will encourage Parent Teacher Organizations to discontinue their charters of the troops, she said. Troops must be chartered by law, Reece said.

However, the scouts may find willing supporters elsewhere.

"If the PTOs cut the charters, that would be fine," said John Gross, the scoutmaster of Iowa City Troop 204. "We have people coming out of the woodwork to charter us."

But whether a fee would constitute discrimination is yet to be determined.

"We have an administra-

tive policy, an equity policy," said School Board member Jan Leff. "It's stamped on everything we ever put out."

The policy states that the School District does not "... discriminate against anyone based on race, creed, color, religion, gender, age, sexual orientation, veteran status, or disability."

The scouts previously used the School District's facilities at no expense until the School Board decided May 8 to charge \$150 a week for one two-hour meeting in a school's gymnasium.

"The fee is prohibitive," Gross said. "To my knowledge, none of the nonprofit groups can afford the fee schedule as planned. Those fees will turn all those nonprofit and youth groups into rich-kid clubs. That's hardly being a good member of the community or the School District."

A cost-basis fee instead of

the \$150 fee would be acceptable, he said.

"What does it cost to burn six lights in a gym for two hours, a couple of bucks?" he said, adding that few groups are politically perfect and that the fair thing to do is to drop the fee across the board.

The School Board has a three-tiered system for determining fee assessment for building use. The first tier allows people or groups that comply with the equity policy and share common qualities with the district's mission statement to use the facilities free of charge.

The second tier is reserved for groups that are not in compliance with the equity statement but whose goals are redemptive, such as nonprofit organizations. Such groups, including the scouts, pay a modest fee.

The third tier is generally for-profit organizations,

which are charged the highest possible fee.

"We believe that to charge a fee is saying that we don't condone or subsidize what [the scouts] are doing," Reece said. "Their discrimination of homosexuals is in conflict with our equity statement."

The equity statement, originally adopted to guide hiring policies, shows that the district is progressive, open minded, and fair, she said.

Regardless of the tactics employed, the Iowa City Boy Scouts seem less than likely to budge. The Boy Scouts of America national council says the scouts do not want people who are openly gay leading their boys, said Linda Groepper, an assistant to Iowa City Troop 204.

"People are singling out the gay issue," she said. "We want good role models, and living a wholesome sexual life is part of that. To be a part of the scouts, we accept the rules and regulations of the Boy Scouts of America."

# Wherefore art thou, comfortable Bard seating?

■ The Riverside Theatre will install permanent seating at the festival stage in lower City Park.

Audiences attending next year's Riverside Theatre Shakespeare Festival can look forward to permanent, more comfortable chairs for the performances.

This comes as the result of a collaboration between Riverside Theatre and the city of Iowa City. The two have joined forces in an effort to provide better facilities at the Riverside Festival Stage in lower City Park.

The project will include

construction of a concrete bowl that will improve drainage, paving the way for installation of the seats.

"Hopefully, installation of the seats will provide a more pleasant experience in general," said Amy Estes, the managing director of Riverside Theatre. "Many people feel the folding chairs are too uncomfortable. This may keep them coming back."

The total cost of the project will be \$212,000, said Terry Trublood, the director of Parks and Recreation.

"This is a 50/50 collaborative effort between the city and the theater," he said.

The city's contribution of \$106,000 will come from the City Capital Funds; the City Council gave tentative

approval to the project several months ago, said City Manager Steve Atkins.

In order to

raise its portion of the money needed, the theater has launched a fund-raising campaign targeting individuals and businesses, encouraging them to donate. People donating \$400 or more will get their names engraved on seats as a reminder of their support.

In the first two years of production of the festival, the Riverside Theatre has

rented folding chairs at a cost of \$2,500 to \$3,000 each year.

Work on the drainage and concrete project will begin in September. Trublood estimates that it should take four to six weeks to complete.

"We felt it would be easier for the theater to research, order, and install the seats while the city takes care of contracting for the concrete work," he said.

The seats, which will be water-resistant marine-grade vinyl, the same type as

those used at the American Players Theatre in Wisconsin, will be installed in April and May 2002 and finished in time for the opening of the Riverside Shakespeare Festival in June 2002.

The seats will serve many needs in addition to audience comfort, providing more options for the wheelchair bound and others with special accommodation needs, Estes said.

Trublood said he expects maintenance costs of the stage and surrounding area to stay the same.

"Eventually, we will have replacement costs, but not for 10 or more years," he said.

**Coralville man arrested on abuse allegations**

A Coralville man accused of physically abusing his wife was arrested early June 16, said Coralville Police Chief Barry Bedford.

Laffite Pierre, 28, was charged Monday with domestic abuse causing injury, false imprisonment, and obstructing emergency communication after allegedly beating his wife, Dora Pierre.

Dora Pierre allegedly let Laffite Pierre, who had been residing with a friend for the past week, into her apartment, according to Johnson County District Court records. Laffite Pierre started an argument that soon became phys-

ical, the records said.

Laffite Pierre used several expletives, the reports said, then grabbed Dora Pierre's face and smashed it into a wall, creating a large lump. He also bit her ear, leaving marks, and clutched both of her arms, bruising her, the reports said.

Dora Pierre broke from his grasp and tried to flee, the reports said. When she ran from the apartment, Laffite Pierre allegedly caught her, dragged her back into the apartment, and refused to let her leave.

When Dora Pierre tried to call police, the report said, Laffite Pierre jerked the phone cord out of the wall. She finally escaped and ran to the police.

Laffite Pierre posted a \$4,225

surety bond and was released from the Johnson County Jail Monday. His preliminary hearing is set for June 27.

**I.C. woman accused of child endangerment arrested**

A woman accused of leaving her two sons in the care of a sexually abusive older brother was arrested June 16.

Martina Poole, of 1946 Broadway, was formally charged with two counts of child endangerment Sunday, according to Johnson County District Court records.

The reports assert that Poole left two of her sons in the care of

her eldest son, who had allegedly been sexually assaulting the second-oldest since December 2000. The ages of the children were not released.

Poole, 32, knew of the abuse but failed to alert Department of Health and Safety officials in a March 25 interview, the reports said. Despite department orders, she also left all three children alone at home on several occasions when she went to work or to the store, they said. During these times, the eldest allegedly sexually assaulted the second-oldest.

Poole was released on her own recognizance. Her preliminary hearing is set for July 9 at the Johnson County District Courthouse.

# Pay first, get ticketed later

■ A new Ames program lets motorists prepay for parking tickets they're sure they'll get.

AMES — So you get a lot of parking tickets? The city's new prepay program, starting July 1, might be just right for you.

An unpaid parking ticket could mean extra fees, a summons to appear in court, or even an arrest warrant, said Donna Scherr, a legal services administrative assistant in the city attorney's office.

"Some citizens kept asking, 'If we give you money, will you pay my tickets as they come?'" she said. "We laughed at first. Then we decided to pursue it."

Approximately a dozen people have signed up for the service, which began as an experiment in September 2000.

To join the program, participants must deposit at least \$50 in an account at City Hall. After an agreement is signed, all tickets issued to a specific license number will be paid as soon as they are issued.

That beats the \$3 ticket

that, overlooked, can end up costing \$30.

"We know everyone's money is tight, but you did illegally park, and you owe the fine," Scherr said. "We want to make it as easy as we can, so it can be paid in a timely manner."

Scherr said the program may be helpful to Iowa State University parents, who often find out later that their sons or daughters got a ticket while driving their car.

The new program will run

July 1 through June 31, and any money remaining will be given back to participants who choose not to re-enroll.

"We're doing this to help," Scherr said. "We're not making any money on it because we're taking the time to do it. In the long run, more tickets will be paid, and they won't have to come to our office."

Scherr said Ames issued approximately 63,570 parking tickets last year. The city has issued roughly 30,000 so far this year.

# Debate opens on patients' rights

■ Senate Republicans try to slow the measure, while House Republicans seem to be split.

WASHINGTON — The Senate debated long-delayed legislation Tuesday to combat HMO horror stories and plunged instantly into partisan struggle. Republicans sought to slow action, and Majority Leader Tom Daschle vowed to "stay on this bill for whatever length it takes."

The maneuvering unfolded as House Republicans, struggling to gain control over a politically popular issue, weighed a concession in the critical area of patient lawsuits. GOP officials said discussions were under way on a proposal that would include a limited new right to sue in state court.

Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., called key lawmakers to his office for an evening meeting on the subject. Rep. Ernest Fletcher, R-Ky., said that under the proposal, HMOs would be open to state court suits — and punitive damages — if they refused to honor pro-patient decisions made by outside experts.

The discussions underscored the potential for a GOP split on the issue of lawsuits. Most Senate Republicans oppose any new right to sue in state court, and they spent much of the day attacking Democrats on the issue.

Additionally, several Senate GOP sources said Republican campaign consultants cautioned the rank and file at a closed-door meeting that passage of a patients' bill of rights and prescription-drug coverage for Medicare recipients were imperative before the next election.

Daschle, D-S.D., who catapulted the patients' bill of rights measure to the top of the Senate calendar after Democrats gained a mid-session majority, opened debate. "We've talked enough" in the past five years, he said. "We need to pass a real, enforceable patients' bill of rights. Now."

"I don't think we should be railroaded into passing bad legislation," countered Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., adding that the measure could raise insurance costs, open the floodgates to lawsuits, and ultimately cause employers to discontinue coverage for their workers. "And we won't, frankly."

Ironically, after several years of debate in the House and the Senate, many of the issues are beyond dispute. The legislation, backed by Sens. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.,

John Edwards, D-N.C., and John McCain, R-Ariz., would guarantee patients access to emergency care and direct access to obstetricians, gynecologists, and other specialists, allow overnight hospital stays for mastectomies, and guarantee the payment of costs associated with clinical trials.

Much of the dispute centered on the question of lawsuits — when, where, and whether patients could sue for

damages, and how much money they should be permitted to recover.

That's the issue that House Republicans were struggling with, as well. Several sources, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Hastert has spoken favorably of the proposal for lawsuits in state courts, part of an attempt to fashion a bill that could serve as an alternative for the Democratic-supported measure.

# U.S. may settle tobacco suit

■ Administration sources say the federal case may be shaky.

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department wants to settle its drawn-out civil lawsuit seeking damages from tobacco companies, government officials said Tuesday, in a move that appeared to take the industry by surprise.

Two Bush administration sources said there has been concern about the government's case. These officials, discussing the matter only on the grounds of anonymity, said the department would prefer to go for a settlement now rather than risk losing.

The department suffered a major setback last year when the judge hearing the case —

U.S. District Judge Gladys Kessler — dismissed two counts that would have allowed the government to recover some expenses related to sick smokers.

The suit was filed in September 1999. Under the leadership of then-Attorney General Janet Reno, the Justice Department said at the time that federal health-care plans spend more than \$20 billion a year treating smoking-related illnesses. It said those costs should be recovered.

President Clinton applauded the suit, saying Americans deserved a day in court.

Officials said Attorney General John Ashcroft has assembled a team of three lawyers, all career attorneys in the department's Civil Division, to work on the settlement. The lawyers met Tuesday for the first time with the depart-

ment's tobacco-litigation team to begin talking about a potential settlement, sources said.

These officials stressed that the department was not giving up the suit, saying instead that it would continue the litigation even as it seeks a settlement.

The recommendation was made to Ashcroft by Stuart Schiffer, the head of the department's Civil Division.

As a senator, Ashcroft opposed the suit.

Philip Morris Inc., based in New York, issued a statement saying: "Philip Morris has not been approached about settlement of the Department of Justice lawsuit, nor have we approached anyone else about settlement of this lawsuit. We are not aware of any settlement discussions. We continue to believe the case is without merit."

# Legislature passes redistricting

■ Even critics of the new maps vote for the plan.

DES MOINES — The Legislature overwhelmingly approved new congressional and legislative districts Tuesday.

Even critics said it was time the issue was settled.

"It's been on all of our minds since some time in April," said Sen. Steve King, R-Iron.

Even those critical of the new maps said they had decided to approve the second

set of proposed districts to avoid dealing with a third plan, which could be altered and lead to charges of gerrymandering.

"I don't want to see us put our political fingerprints on it," said Rep. Rebecca Reynolds, D-Bonaparte.

The House was the first to take up the plan in a special legislative session, approving it on a 78-18 vote. Senators then approved it on a 37-13 vote and sent it to Gov. Tom Vilsack, who has said he will sign it into law.

The plan is the second set of maps prepared by nonpartisan

legislative staffers; it cannot be altered but must be accepted or rejected outright. If two plans are rejected, the third plan could be altered.

"I do not want to get to an amendable plan," said Rep. Teresa Garman, R-Ames, who believes the new congressional districts are unwieldy but voted for them anyway.

If lawmakers began tinkering with the maps, "we could find ourselves in a court battle that wouldn't be resolved until December," King said.

He plans to seek the GOP nomination in the new 5th Congressional District.

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

## Cell-phone bans not needed

Vast public support is pushing bills in 40 states to restrict drivers' use of hand-held cell phones, one of which looks to be passed in New York shortly. But before our governments rush to ban them, an important question must be addressed: Does the use of hand-held cell phones while driving really cause accidents?

An often-cited 1997 study in the *New England Journal of Medicine* reported that the use of hand-held cell phones while driving made accidents four times more likely to occur — the same effect as driving drunk. However, an American Association of Automobiles-funded study at the University of North Carolina showed driver distraction was a factor in 8 percent of the 32,303 traffic accidents studied from 1995-99. Only 1.5 percent of the drivers were using hand-held cell phones.

*Does the use of hand-held cell phones while driving really cause accidents? No conclusive evidence exists, and until it does, restrictions should not be implemented*

The "solution" to the "problem" would be dash-mounted devices that the driver's cell phone could slip into. So, instead of the driver holding the phone and dialing it, the dash will hold the phone while the driver dials it. How much safer that is! Don't most people dial and hold with one hand anyway?

Forget dialing logistics for a moment — and forget whether you think driving while talking is safe. If hand-held cell phones should be banned, then many other dangerous in-car activities should be as well. First to go should be the stereo systems. These electronics, by design, take one's attention away from driving. Forget open containers of alcohol;


open wrappers of Big Macs and Whoppers pose a special threat.

Studies have also shown that adding more riders to one's car increases the risk for an accident, so there should be a limit of two passengers per vehicle. And, all women should be frisked for lipstick, and men for electric shavers, before entering a vehicle.

Perhaps these bans are too harsh. Maybe there should be mixed restrictions that still allow drivers some freedom in their cars. For instance, the driver may consume a Big Mac only if one of the following conditions is met: There are no other passengers present, all console music-producing devices have been removed from the car, or a Big Mac dash-mount is installed to free the driver's hands.

Sounds excessive and moronic, doesn't it? But no more so than the idea of outlawing the use of hand-held cell phones while driving.

It will come sooner if people like me who know the truth about executions do our work well and educate the public. It will come slowly if we do not. Because, finally, I know that it is not a question of malice or ill will or meanness of spirit that prompts our citizens to support executions. It is, quite simply, that people don't know the truth of what is going on. That is not by accident. The secrecy surrounding executions makes it possible for executions to continue."

It will be a grand day when we deal justly with error-prone capital cases by abolishing the death penalty.

## Moving toward a more sensible drug policy

Canada is just finishing a round of radically liberalizing its marijuana laws. For many UI students, this is good news: more marijuana, more legal, and closer to home.

Particularly novel is that Canada will soon legalize marijuana farming for the medicinal market.

This is a step unseen throughout the world. Hash use is widely permitted in many European countries. Several states have attempted to legalize pot for pharmaceutical use. However, none but Canada has gone so far as to permit private marijuana production.

Canada has only recently acted because an Ontario appeals court ruled that marijuana laws would be lifted unless Canada reworked its law to allow medicinal use of marijuana. Although this move was recent, it has led to broad liberalization of marijuana laws, and some are talking about going further. Joe Clark, the head of Canada's Tory party, has suggested full decriminalization.

Unfortunately, we in America are too benighted to move forward in liberalizing our drug laws. Our federal laws contain no medical-use exception. And, as the Supreme Court recently pointed out, state medical-marijuana laws do not make such an exception suddenly exist. Indeed, the tack of federal drug law in America is frightening enough that it should force even die-hard government-loving liberals to reconsider their support for the behemoth state.

Consider that under former President Clinton, a federal offender was incarcerated twice as long for drugs as for manslaughter. The federal government spends more than \$17,000 per mile of border and coastline to stop drugs from entering, and then the vast majority still get in. Consider that marijuana has become the fourth-largest cash crop in America, with marijuana production

being valued at five times tobacco production. At the same time, we are eroding our Constitution with a failed War on Drugs that more resembles a War on the Bill of Rights.

It is mind-boggling that Americans can look at these facts and support the failed War on Drugs in general, let alone the prohibition of marijuana.

Indeed, in light of what should be done, Canada looks as though it is taking mere baby steps that the United States should take immediately. In fact, U.S. drug policy is not only having deleterious effects at home, it is also making huge impacts abroad. U.S. demand for illicit drugs funds criminal organizations worldwide. Both Mexican President Vicente Fox and Uruguayan President Jorge Batlle have suggested that little can be done in their countries until the United States moves towards legalization. Batlle even went so far as to point out that Colombian rebels would lose their source of funds and the civil war there would be over if the United States legalized drugs.

Although the situation looks grim, it appears the United States could have a shift of its own on drug policy. Support for legalization of drug laws is no longer limited to a few pot-heads from NORML. According to an ACLU study, 79 percent of Americans responded favorably when asked if a doctor should be able to prescribe marijuana. The number rises to 85 percent for prescriptions where marijuana has

been proven effective. However, support does not end there. A rising number of conservatives have made libertarian statements supporting liberalization. Among them are Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ventura, Rep. Ron Paul, R-Texas, former Republican Vice President Dan Quayle, and former Reagan Secretary of State George Schultz.

One of the biggest reformers is Republican Gov. Gary Johnson of New Mexico. If you go to his Web site ([www.governor.state.nm.us](http://www.governor.state.nm.us)), the first thing you see is his plan to decriminalize marijuana, among other things.

Johnson is so outspoken about it that when the media asked if he had "experimented" with marijuana, he replied, "No, I smoked marijuana. This is something that I did. I did it along with a lot of other people. But me and my buddies, you know ... we enjoyed what we were doing."

But, you don't have to be a pot smoker like Johnson to support a move towards drug-law liberalization. I've never tried illicit drugs; I don't even drink alcohol, a drug far worse than marijuana, in my opinion.

The facts speak for themselves. Canada has done what is minimally necessary to have a sane approach to drugs; full legalization would be an even better approach.

Even if you think drugs are bad and people shouldn't use them, that does not mean that imprisoning hundreds of thousands of people for drug crimes is the solution. Nobel laureate Milton Friedman pointed out, "Legalizing drugs would simultaneously reduce the amount of crime and raise the quality of law enforcement. Can you conceive of any other measure that would accomplish so much to promote law and order?"

I cannot.

## Electronic Charge

As electronic music intertwines into a series of sub-genres upon sub-genres, Iowa City has become a hot bed for the progressive electronic-music scene. ### Spinning dreams you can dance to

Profile of one of the finest local DJs.

The DJs' craft is an intriguing one: playing other musicians' compositions, yet tweaking and weaving particular components of the music in creating a single body of music of their very own. While aspiring DJs are as rare as ants at a picnic, only a select number of DJs can say they have mixed records in front of more than 1,000 dancing bodies.

Tim Tebbe, a.k.a. DJ Alert, has been mixing house music at venues all over North America. He has performed in front of more than 2,000 people and has opened for superstar DJs Frankie Bones and T-1000. Apart from mixing at parties throughout the Midwest, Alert has played at venues in San Francisco, St. Louis, and Hawaii.

"Hawaii was totally cool. We had to carry our records for 20 minutes through a dark jungle. We kept tripping over tree stumps," Tebbe said. "When we finally got there, it was more like a party atmosphere than a club or bar like it is here. We were right on the beach. They

had disco lights and torches set up. It was like a '60s beach movie with decks."

Tebbe was born and raised in Cedar Rapids and moved to Iowa City in 1996. He was only 14 years old when he bought his first turntables. As a teenager in Cedar Rapids, Tebbe was promoting underground parties featuring renowned Chicago DJs.

"I was really into the rap scene and break-dancing when I was a kid," he said. "The first tables I had weren't even real turntables. Over the years, I've been able to round up a few dollars for some new equipment."

Following the move to Iowa City at age 16, Tebbe attained a residency DJ slot at the Union Bar on Wednesday nights.

"A friend introduced me to Tristen Watkins, a kid who had organized the weekly DJ night at the Union," he said. "I'd get carded everytime I'd show up for my set, and someone would have to come save me because I wasn't of age. It was a different crowd back then. Almost no one would dance all night."

Tebbe's audience eventually matured. As a member of the Savage Seven at a now-defunct bar called Gunnerz, which was located at 123 E. Washington

St., Tebbe and a group of six other DJs divided up the time available and mixed from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m. every Sunday.

"People started getting into it," he said. "Every week, I was playing for more and more people. I would move the crossfader just a little bit one way or the other, and the crowd would go crazy. I quickly felt a greater desire to turn the crowd out."

When Gunnerz closed, Gabe's, 330 E. Washington St., adopted Tebbe's disco-house sound.

"I prefer a smaller crowd where there is not too much going on except for the music and the audience's appreciation for the music," he said. "It's more intimate that way."

While some DJs generate a public following, other DJs are condemned to mixing alone in the basement of their two-bedroom residence.

"There is a lot of politics involved in the DJ scene," Tebbe said. "There are a lot of kids who are really good that can't buy a gig. Like any business, you have to sell yourself. You can't wait for a phone call. You have to go out and take it."

Three years ago, Tebbe started a production company called Zodiac Productions. He has released three albums that



have sold more than 100 copies each, and he recently co-produced a house track titled "Saturday Night Love" along with partner-in-crime Richie Heller. The two are currently working on a song to be released in vinyl record format.

"DJ Alert is no doubt the best DJ to come out of Iowa City," said DJ Watkins. "He has such a passion for the music. He has inspired many younger DJs to pick up house music."

Yet like most things in life, the life of a DJ is not always like a night on a Hawaiian beach.

"The difficult part about being a DJ is keeping a job," Tebbe said. "DJing consumes you. You get lost in it."

## Vinyl gets its groove back Bringin' down the house

Iowa City is the state capital for vinyl records.

In existence long before 8-tracks, audio tapes, CDs, and MP3s, vinyl has still been able to survive the test of time in the music business.

The black, shiny saucers continue their triumph against time, as they have for more than 50 years, even as the vinyl consumer has undergone a metamorphosis. Many years ago, grandpa and grandma were sitting on the deck, sipping iced tea, and listening to their favorite Nat King Cole record. Today, it's kids mixing on decks (turntables), sipping Red Bull, while listening to whatever will keep them dancing. Times have changed.

The vinyl community isn't merely playing the records anymore, its members are manipulating the sounds that are produced from the vinyl and constructing new songs.

The people who engage in this activity are called DJs. The supplier that supports their undying addiction is local record store Record Collector.

Record Collector, 115 E. Washington St., opened its doors in 1982. Kirk Walther has owned and managed the store for 19 years.

Walther said his store has more than 4,000 vinyl records, and 30 percent of the store's sales come from vinyl purchases.

"In the last couple of years, there has been an increase in vinyl purchasing," he said. "It's mostly the DJ stuff that kids are asking for."

Located in the back of Record Collector, a couple of hundred records snugly rest on four bookshelves in the customer-reserve section.

"We have about 30 DJs who reserve records on a weekly basis," said DJ and Record Collector sales clerk Scott Stone. "There is nowhere else in Iowa

that has as much knowledge as we do when it comes to what records DJs are looking for."

The Record Collector has a vinyl collage of dance sub-genres. Hip-hop, trance, electro-funk, house, techno, jungle, and breakbeat are the bulk of the records in the store.

"In Iowa City, vinyl is dance and dance is vinyl — there is no way around it if you are a DJ," Stone said. "This is what kids are listening to now. If there are any stores that sell vinyl in Iowa, there aren't any that can come close to matching our stock size."

Stone has been DJing for five years. In that time, he has accumulated more than 11,000 records.

"Realistically, the closest place you're going to find [DJ] records is either in Chicago or online," he said.

DJs have found a variety of record sources on the information superhighway.

Techno and house record distributors Sonic Groove, Groove Tech, and Satellite allow users to search, listen to, and purchase vinyl online.

"Most kids will go on these sites to see what's out there," Stone said. "They will listen to the songs and then come to our

store and put in an order."

Record Collector's selection of vinyl ranges from hip-hop to jazz to indie-rock.

Aside from new records, the store also sells used vinyl.

"Used vinyl is a big part of our market," Walther said. "Unlike CDs, vinyl records can be scratched, and they are still usable. This is where CDs are at a disadvantage. Records have an undisputed appreciable essence about them."

Sal Leanhart of Sal's Music Emporium, 624 S. Dubuque St., guesses he has approximately 500 vinyl records in his store.

"Every store has a cult following," he said. "We focus more on the punk-rock crowd."

Northside Book Market, 203 N. Linn St., has more than 2,000 used vinyl records. But again, the store sells to a particular interest group, those looking for classical, blues, and jazz.

Owner Rock Williams can well appreciate the lure of vinyl. "Although vinyl audiences vary, they will forever share the renaissance of appreciation for the records they own," he said.

How It All Started: The Evolution of Iowa City DJs.

The distance between Chicago and Iowa City is 222.49 miles. And the distance between Detroit and Iowa City is 486.73 miles, placing Iowa City within 500 miles of the two most influential electronic-music capitals in the world.

When Detroit gave birth to techno music and Chicago generated house music, Iowa City was in a position to benefit from either of the founding cities.

Despite proximity, it would take nearly seven years for Eurobeat baselines and heavy synthesized string beats, produced with the help of two turntables, a mixer, speakers, and often times a drum machine, to nest in Iowa City.

There wasn't even a venue that played electronic music until the 620 Club realized the electronic possibilities in 1982.

"You can't underestimate the importance of the 620 Club to the Iowa City electronic-music scene," said DJ and Record Collector employee Vince Woolums. "It would have been more difficult and evolved much slower without 620."

Michelle Higley started DJing at the club in 1993, spinning mostly house, trance, and disco. After two years as the solo resident DJ, she decided to take some time off and contacted Woolums, who accepted a residency at 620 in 1995.

"Michelle had a lot to do with the birth of electronic music in Iowa City," said former Iowa City resident and DJ Tristen Watkins. "Everywhere else, there were raves but no legitimate venues to showcase DJ talent on a regular basis."

Meanwhile, the Union Bar had been hosting a weekly Wednesday night set appealing to a trance and ambient crowd since 1993. Watkins flew solo until Woolums and 16-year-old Tim Tebbe later attained residencies at the bar.

#### Electronica guide

**Ambient** music is often without a beat and usually lacks any type of uniformity. It is frequently referred to as chilled trance or downtempo.

**Breakbeat** is music with breaks. Instead of "boom-boom-boom-boom," it sounds like "boom-click-boom-pause-boom-click-boom."

**Drum 'n' bass** music or **jungle** is often accompanied by a snare drum and ricocheting bass drops. The beat is often in breaks or insanely sporadic.

**House** music resembles '70s disco. A house DJ would be identified by utilizing sexy R & B vocals, a repeating beat, and a feel-good synthesizer harmony.

**Techno** music is more difficult to pinpoint as a genre. A techno DJ often dabs into more than one of the dance music sub-genres.

**Trance** music differs from other dance sub-genres with its high-pitched melodies, wavy white sounds, euphoric breakdowns, and driving climaxes.

"Tristen was probably the greatest influence on myself wanting to be a DJ," said Woolums. "I remember he was listening to a lot of Euro-disco like Depeche Mode or even Duran Duran, which I thought was pretty cool."

Watkins arrived in Iowa City in 1992 and began running a local techno show on KRUI radio called Extatic Radio. In the summer of 1993, Watkins teamed up with Woolums to form KRUI Noize Radio, a techno show that exists to this day.

"Tristen was probably the most influential and up-and-coming DJ in Iowa City," Higley said. "Kids here really had no idea what they wanted until Tristen arrived."

In mid-August 1997, a confrontation between a gay student and a Union bouncer put an end to more than two years of Wednesday night electronic noise at the bar, Higley said.

Woolums, Watkins, and Higley, along with four others, formed the Savage Seven, and began showcasing their talents at a local bar called Gunnerz, which was located at 123 E. Washington St. Every Sunday, the group set up two turntables and mixed from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m.

After a year, the Gunnerz show was running strong. The DJ scene was blowing up, and more rookie DJs were pleading for a Sunday-night spot.

"It was supply versus demand matter," Tebbe said. "There were too many of us and not enough venues wanted our music."

However, within a year, Gunnerz had lost its liquor license.

Three months after the closing of Gunnerz, in August 1998, Rotation DJs was born. "When Vince and Richie [Heller] got Rotation, that's when everything really took off," Watkins said. "If it wasn't for Vince, there wouldn't be techno in Iowa City."

Rotation was held at Gabe's every Sunday night. Finally, local DJs had a sizable venue to showcase their talent.

"In just nine months, we went from 40 kids at Gunnerz to over 400 kids at Gabe's," he said. "It was an incredible sight. I remember it was so hot, the floors were leaking condensation that was dripping off everybody."

Following a Feb. 7, 1999, performance from superstar DJ and Detroit house extraordinaire Terence Parker, the stage was set for a house-music explosion.

"You were either listening to it or mixing it," Tebbe said. "Everybody had his CD, but not everybody had the vinyl records he played that night."

As other well-known DJs began come to the area, Iowa City witnessed a techno blast.

"I have never been in a town with so many DJs," said Record Collector assistant manager Matt Seeman. "I bet we have the highest number of DJs per capita in the nation. The scene is old enough that there is a lot of branching happening. First, it was house. Now, it's techno. Tomorrow, it may be trance, drum 'n' bass or even back to house."

# Holocaust checks mailed

■ The first reparations to Holocaust slave laborers were sent to 20,000 survivors.


NEW YORK — After years of litigation, checks were sent out Tuesday to thousands of Holocaust survivors around the world in the first reparations paid to those forced into slave labor by the Nazis.

The New York-based Jewish Claims Conference sent payments of approximately \$4,400 each to some 10,000 Jewish survivors in 25 countries. At the same time, checks were sent to 10,000 non-Jewish survivors in the Czech Republic. Payments to survivors in Poland were expected to be made June 28.

"About this topic, there is no justice," said Greg Schneider, an assistant director of the Claims Conference. "Despite the talk of billions of dollars in settlement funds and raised expectations, no survivors will get rich, and no amount of money can ever compensate."

Up to 1.5 million surviving slave and forced laborers — most in Central and Eastern Europe — are believed to be eligible for compensation.

Claims and payments are handled by seven partner organizations: five based in Eastern Europe for victims living in those countries; the Jewish Claims Conference, which handles Jewish claims; and the Geneva-

based International Organization for Migration, responsible for claims from the rest of the world.

The Claims Conference estimates that up to 160,000 Jewish Holocaust survivors worldwide will eventually be eligible for payments from a \$4.37 billion fund authorized

by the German government to settle a series of U.S. lawsuits seeking compensation from German companies. The fund is actually 10 billion German marks; the amount in U.S. dollars fluctuates with currency values.

Tens of thousands of non-Jews also have applied.

WASHINGTON — Amid a faltering cease-fire, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon assured the Bush administration Tuesday that he would maintain a policy of restraint in the face of Palestinian attacks.

The message was delivered to Secretary of State Colin Powell by Avraham Burg, the speaker of the Israeli Parliament, during a 40-minute meeting.

But Burg told reporters afterward that the cease-fire was "very difficult to uphold."

While the Israeli government's policy is to be restrained in using force, "everyone understands there are limits, especially when the Palestinians are not doing their best," Burg said.

Earlier, he said Israeli intelligence had concluded that the cease-fire was not holding and that the Cabinet would meet to review it.

In Jerusalem, Israeli Cabinet ministers said Israel must review its policy of restraint following repeated attacks by Palestinians, reflecting Israeli exasperation with a shaky six-day-old cease-fire.

Five mortar shells landed near the Jewish settlement of Katif in the Gaza Strip on Tuesday, the military said. No one was hurt in the attack, which came one day after two Israeli drivers were killed in the West Bank.

"There should be no doubt whether, if the Palestinians don't act to prevent terror attacks, we will reconsider the situation and the actions Israel will take to protect its citizens," Israeli Cabinet Minister Danny Naveh told Israel radio.

Sharon is due in Washington June 26, diplomatic sources said, and he expects to meet with President Bush and Powell. The prime minister was the first Middle East leader to meet with Bush. Arafat has not been invited to the White House and is drawing considerably less attention than he did from former President Bill Clinton.

The main item on the agenda is violence in the region and the timing of steps toward resuming negotiations with the Palestinians.

Burg, who also met Monday with Condoleezza Rice, Bush's national-security adviser, urged the administration to keep high-level American diplomats in the region at least until the cease-fire takes hold.

CIA Director George Tenet and William Burns, the senior U.S. mediator, returned to Washington last week after Tenet gained Yasser Arafat's approval of a cease-fire that Sharon had accepted earlier.

While Bush and Powell have backed Sharon in his demand that the Palestinian leader call a halt to attacks on Israel, there is an element of disagreement on the conditions for moving forward.

Sharon is insisting on a complete halt; the Bush administration wants a sharp and lasting decline in attacks before taking other steps.

Also on the agenda is Sharon's willingness to severely restrict construction of homes for Jews on the West Bank and in Gaza — and the possibility that he has not gone far enough to suit Arafat.

Sharon has said construction will stop within the confines of existing settlements. Arafat wants a total freeze, and he has the backing of a fact-finding commission headed by former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, whose recommendations have been embraced without qualification by the State Department.

Egyptian Foreign Minister Ahmed Maher el-Sayed will pay a call on Powell at the State Department on Thursday.

Three weeks ago, during a visit here by Israeli President Moshe Katsav, Bush told Israeli officials and American Jewish leaders at a dinner that he was not inviting Arafat so long as violence persisted, a participant told the Associated Press Tuesday.

Bush called an invitation to Arafat a "trump card" that he was not ready to play, said the participant, who spoke on the condition of anonymity.

Powell said Sunday that despite a reduction in Middle East violence, "we need a lot more progress."

"The violence has gone down. It hasn't stopped," he said.

"We will reach a point where we'll have to make a judgment whether or not we have seen enough to move forward. Right now we're not there yet, but I hope we're getting closer," he said.

# GOP wins first bellwether vote

■ A Republican edges a Democrat in tight race marked by money and racial tension.

RICHMOND, Va. — Republicans on Tuesday expanded their narrow majority in the U.S. House of Representatives, as Randy Forbes edged Democrat Louise Lucas by 4 percentage points in a Virginia congressional race.

With 97 percent of precincts reporting unofficial returns, Forbes had 69,719 votes — 52 percent — to 63,199 votes — 48 percent — for Lucas.

The closely watched special election was marked by negative advertising, racial tension, and heavy spending by the national parties.

The contest between the two state senators to succeed Rep. Norman Sisisky, a Democrat who died in March, was widely viewed as an early referendum on the Bush administration and as a bellwether for next year's midterm elections.

Forbes' victory gives Republicans a 12-seat advantage over Democrats in the House. The Democrats hold 210 seats, the

Republicans now have 222. Independents have two seats, and one seat is vacant.

It also was a boost for Republican National Committee Chairman Jim Gilmore, the Virginia governor, who could not afford to lose a high-profile race in his own back yard. The RNC pledged \$500,000 to Forbes' campaign as the party sought to rebound from Vermont Sen. James Jeffords' defection, which cost the GOP control of the Senate.

Forbes' victory in the highly competitive 4th District, which stretches from far southeastern Virginia to areas just west and south of Richmond, deprived Lucas of the distinction of becoming the state's first black female member of Congress.

Each side accused the other of injecting race into the campaign in a district that is 39 percent black.

Forbes' campaign criticized a Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee mailing that pictured a black child on the cover and declared that "12 million of us will be left behind" by President Bush's budget.

During the campaign, a Forbes supporter was quoted as telling a white reporter that Lucas was "working to get the people out to vote. Her people.

Not Randy's people, not my people, not your people, but her people." Lucas' campaign chastised Forbes for not disavowing the remark.

On the final Sunday of the campaign, Lucas and her representatives visited 74 black churches.

The campaign's hottest issue was Social Security. Forbes, 49, supported allowing younger workers to invest a small percentage of their Social Security taxes in stocks. Lucas, 57, portrayed the proposal as a reckless gamble that could lead to reduced benefits or a higher retirement age.

Forbes is a Chesapeake lawyer and former state GOP chairman.

Lucas, who is from Portsmouth, owns several homes for mentally retarded adults but has emphasized her previous 18-year career at the Norfolk Naval Shipyard, where she was the first female shipfitter.

The high stakes brought a stream of national politicians to the district. Vice President Dick Cheney and Rep. J.C. Watts of Oklahoma were among those who campaigned for Forbes.

Lucas got a hand from Reps. John Murtha of Pennsylvania and Ike Skelton of Missouri.

# O'Neill sells controversial stocks

■ The Treasury secretary has been criticized for possible conflicts of interest.

WASHINGTON — Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill completed the sale Tuesday of nearly \$100 million worth of stock in aluminum giant Alcoa, along with other holdings, after being criticized about potential conflicts of interest.

O'Neill, the former chief executive officer of Alcoa Inc., had pledged in March to sell his holdings in the company; he had until June 22 to do so. O'Neill also unloaded stock options in Alcoa as well as financial holdings in other companies, including Microsoft Corp.

"Today, Secretary O'Neill's financial advisers completed the sale of all his shareholdings, including his Alcoa stock and options," the Treasury Department said in a brief statement Tuesday.

"The secretary's assets will be invested in diversified investment funds," the statement added.

O'Neill, who headed Alcoa for 13 years, owned 2.37 million shares of Alcoa stock at the end of last year and 3.77 million stock options, which give the holder the right to buy stock at specified price within a stated period, according to filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

O'Neill's stock in Alcoa is worth \$95.5 million, based on the company's average closing share price of \$40.28 from March 23 — the last trading session before O'Neill made his announcement to divest — to Tuesday. The figure does not reflect the value of his stock options.

In January, O'Neill touched off a furor when he said he would keep his Alcoa holdings but would not participate in decision-making that might affect his personal finances.

Critics suggested the decision posed a conflict of interest, or at the least the appearance of a conflict.

As Treasury secretary, O'Neill is among the Bush

administration's top economic policy-makers. Through his decisions, he exerts influence on many businesses, particularly those in banking and finance.

Another Bush administration official, Karl Rove, also has come under criticism over stock holdings.

Rove, the president's top political adviser, owned at least \$100,000 in Intel stock when he met with company executives at the White House on March 12. He has said he merely referred them to others in the administration and does not recall raising their concerns about a proposed merger and other matters with Bush.

In addition his Alcoa and Microsoft holdings, the sale of O'Neill's other financial holdings was completed as well. They include stock of General Motors, Dell Computer, Pfizer, and International Paper.

Treasury officials wouldn't disclose the total value of O'Neill's holdings or provide further details.

# Man guilty in road-rage dog killing

■ Dog lovers had raised \$120,000 in reward money to find the killer — more than in many missing-child cases.

SAN JOSE, Calif. — A man was convicted Tuesday of tossing a little dog to its death on a busy highway in a bout of road rage. He could get up to three years in prison.

A jury took less than an hour to convict Andrew Burnett, 27, of San Jose, of animal cruelty for killing Leo, a fluffy white bichon frise, in an episode that outraged dog lovers. Dog lovers and others had donated \$120,000 to find Leo's killer — more than the reward in many local missing-child cases.

"It doesn't bring Leo back, of course, but at least Leo had his day," Leo's owner, Sara McBurnett, of Incline Village, Nev., said after the verdict. "One cruel person has been held accountable for his cruelty."

Burnett, a former telephone repairman, sat motionless as the verdict was read.

His attorney, Marc Garcia, said the furor surrounding the case made it difficult for his client. "The deck was so stacked against him in this case from day one," Garcia said.

Sentencing is scheduled for July 13.

McBurnett and other witnesses testified that after a minor traffic accident in February 2000, Burnett yelled at her, reached through her open car window, grabbed the dog, and hurled it into oncoming traffic. The 10-year-old pet was struck seconds later.

"It wasn't just a dog to me," McBurnett said. "For me, it was my child. He killed my baby right in front of me."

Police said an anonymous e-

mail tipped them to Burnett. He had been jailed in December on unrelated charges of stealing thousands of dollars worth of tools from his employer, Pacific Bell, and of lying to get out of a speeding ticket. Police matched Burnett to a sketch of the road-rage suspect.

Burnett never took the stand. But his lawyer said he instinctively grabbed the dog because it bit him on the hand.

"Andrew Burnett is the only person in the whole world who would think this was reasonable," prosecutor Troy Benson said.

Last week, the jury also heard taped telephone conversations that Burnett had from jail with his mother and fiancée. In one tape, Burnett and his fiancée discussed selling his story to the media for \$250,000 and going on a talk show to have a "dog-kicking contest."

## Line starts here to run against Jeb Bush

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Daryl Jones, a black state lawmaker whose nomination to be Air Force secretary under President Clinton was rejected in a bitter fight in the Senate, said Tuesday he will run for governor.

The state senator and Miami lawyer becomes the first Democrat to enter the race to unseat Gov. Jeb Bush next year.

"I looked at where Florida was going and asked myself whether or not that was a good direction. The answer was no," Jones said.

Several other Democrats, including former Attorney General Janet Reno and Douglas "Pete" Peterson, the ambassador to Vietnam, are also considering runs.

Jones, 46, was nominated in 1998 for the Air Force post but was rejected after the Senate heard testimony that Jones was grounded as a reserve fighter pilot and then lied about it. Jones denied the allegations.



post cards, and various other train-related items, such as old schedules.

Last month, McCown was awarded the Petersen/Harlan Award, recognizing lifetime achievement in the preservation of Iowa history.

"It's a great way to honor someone who has given so much to historical society as Bob has," said Melvin Shaw, the associate editor of UI News. McCown describes his job as his "way of being involved in making history" — a life-long interest of his and his best subject in high school.

McCown takes great care in preserving items, storing them in boxes made of acid-free paper, which are then carefully placed onto shelves in a room where the humidity and temperature are monitored.

Some of the well-known collections he has helped to obtain include documents written by former Vice President Henry Wallace and former Gov. and U.S. Sen. Harold Hughes, papers belonging to UI alumna Mary

Louise Smith, the first woman to chair the Republican Party, and 36 boxes containing sketches, screenplays, and handwritten rewrites by Rich Maibaum, a UI graduate and writer of such James Bond films as *The Man with the Golden Gun*.

Before retiring, McCown said, he needs to arrange a new collection and make it available for research. McCown said a replacement for his position is not being sought because of a \$18.7 million cut to the UI budget. His responsibilities will be divided among members of the library staff, he said.

McCown and his wife of 21 years, Judy, plan to visit their eight children and eight grandchildren and continue living in Iowa City after his retirement. Reading and writing are also on McCown's list of things to do, he said.

"He's been very patient with all of us," said Jerome Gust, his stepson. "He's a joy to have around because of all of his experiences."

treat the practice of 60-hour work weeks as "substantial compliance."

"We didn't feel confident signing a document that we knew there's no way we could comply with," Davidson said of why the company didn't sign earlier. "I don't know how any company could comply with some of the things on there."

"We don't have any way to dictate [some of the provisions] to anyone because we don't own those factories overseas. We're a small company. With the way they've worded it now — we're not in full compliance, but we're striving toward that. That's what we're trying to do."

Meanwhile, Russell Athletic seemed pleased with a clarification allowing monitoring groups to conduct factory checks only after giving enough notice so that the regional manager is "on site to facilitate access and to debrief the monitoring team."

The university belongs to two labor-monitoring groups — the Worker Rights Consortium and the Fair Labor Association.

Russell has always agreed

with the university in principle, said spokesman John McMeekin, and after the clarification, it plans to sign on.

"We as a company are committed to stamping out sleeze-bag operators who make everyone look bad," he said. "We have a stringent code of conduct."

The UI brought in approximately \$550,000 from 560 licensees during fiscal year 2000, but revenue brought in from each company can vary relatively significantly from year to year, Abbott said. The university takes in 7.5 percent of a licensee's total sales of Hawkeye apparel.

The university has canceled 176 contracts with companies that either did not disclose their factory locations or sign the code. It has 384 remaining licensees.

Abbott said none of the companies have asked for another extension. The deadline appears to be about July 1, he said, but it depends on when the company received the letter from the university.

"I really liked the industrial design. It felt very 'city,'" he said.

In addition to its unique interior, Etc. is a no-smoking bar, a rarity in the city. The policy might be changed if Iowa City residents react negatively, Rooney said.

Rooney hopes the no-smoking atmosphere will attract a wider range of people, including professionals who are finishing up the work day.

Rumors that dozens of patrons who didn't meet Etc.'s dress code were denied entrance to the bar when it opened June 15 are ridiculous, Rooney said.

"There is no real dress code," he said, adding that people who wish to enter the bar are expected to dress in appropriate bar attire. "Most bars don't allow sleeveless shirts, tank tops, bandanas ... You wouldn't want to come dressed like you were going to spend a day at the beach."

Etc.'s future was in jeopardy after bikini contests held at the Union Bar, 121 E. College St., resulted in charges of indecent exposure against that club.

However, Walding obtained information regarding Pohl, the former owner of the Union, and his son Jim Pohl, current owner of the Union, that was not available to the council when it made its initial decision.

Re-evaluation of the files showed no record that either Kip nor Jim Pohl were involved with alleged incidents of indecent exposure stemming from the contests, Walding said.

tion dates have been set for any of the 18 other men there under death sentences.

Death-penalty opponents and some former Justice Department officials have complained of racial and geographic bias in the way capital punishment is imposed, questioning whether Garza — a Mexican-American born in the United States — would have been sentenced to death if he had been white or had committed his crimes somewhere other than Texas.

Six of the 18 men under federal death sentences were convicted in Texas; 16 are minorities.

Garza was a ruthless killer who operated a smuggling ring from his Texas home of

Brownsville, bringing tons of marijuana across the Mexican border into the United States.

He shot one suspected informant in the head, dragged him from a car into a field, and shot the corpse four more times. He also ordered the deaths of two men, one killed in an auto body shop, the other in a Brownsville nightclub.

One witness testified that Garza arranged for the death of his own son-in-law because he suspected he was a snitch, and he had a woman beaten to death for the same reason. Garza was not charged with those two killings.

The prison grounds, which were filled with hundreds of reporters last week during McVeigh's execution, were nearly empty by comparison Tuesday.

# Putin gets image makeover

■ The Russian leader crafts the image of a self-assured, political globetrotter.

MOSCOW — In 18 months, Russian President Vladimir Putin has transformed his international image from a dour ex-spy into a self-assured political globetrotter comfortable enough to play host at a summit in German and charm the U.S. president — in English.

It's not that the black marks on his record as Russian president have gone away. But Putin has grown more confident and deft at deflecting foreign criticism of the war in Chechnya and his view of what it means to have a free press, to name just two issues of concern in Europe and the United States.

During an interview with U.S. journalists in the Kremlin library, Putin answered a question on Chechnya with an air of studied weariness, saying he was "getting tired" of repeating his position on Russia's efforts to end the war in the breakaway republic.

It was the first time since he took over for Boris Yeltsin, who resigned Dec. 31, 1999, that Putin had invited a group of American reporters to the Kremlin. The meeting reflected an improvement in U.S.-Russian relations and also a growing willingness by Putin to engage the foreign media.

Although the setting was

official — the black walnut-paneled Kremlin library once used by the czars — Putin was at ease, fielding questions for 2½ hours, with occasional sips of tea or a bite of traditional Russian pastries.

The Russian leader, who has been studying English, at one point corrected his interpreter during the interview and even made light of his own progress in the language, which he demonstrated at the June 16 summit while on a stroll with President Bush.

Putin, 48, told U.S. reporters that Bush put up with his efforts to speak English: "He was extremely nice about it. He pretended to understand what I was talking about."

With the German he learned

as a Soviet intelligence agent in the former East Germany, Putin also has a powerful — if not always sympathetic — ear for German Chancellor Gerhard Schröder, who is a frequent visitor to Russia. They held a summit in St. Petersburg in April.

Putin's travels in the past week have revealed a leader with stamina and determination to reverse Russia's decline in international prestige and power.

Before his meeting with Bush, Putin attended a security and economic summit in Shanghai, China, and played the role of diplomatic fixer, bringing the U.S. leader a conciliatory message from Chinese President Jiang Zemin.

# Irish leader: IRA must disarm

■ Bertie Ahern says the Northern Ireland coalition government may collapse this summer.

DUBLIN, Ireland — The Irish Republican Army must start to disarm or watch Northern Ireland's peace deal unravel, Ireland's prime minister warned Tuesday.

Bertie Ahern gave the unusually gloomy assessment to a briefing of Irish lawmakers a day after he and British Prime Minister Tony Blair led talks among Northern Ireland parties designed to salvage their joint

Catholic-Protestant government.

Ahern, normally upbeat about the peace process, said it looked increasingly likely the power-sharing government would face suspension or collapse. He appealed to the outlawed IRA to prevent this by fulfilling its year-old pledge to disarm.

A visibly frustrated Ahern said the IRA's willingness to show some of its secret weapons depots to diplomats and to hold occasional talks with disarmament officials was "not enough."

The Protestant leader of the Northern Ireland government, David Trimble, has vowed to resign July 1 if the IRA hasn't begun to scrap weapons. Under terms of a 1998 peace accord,

Trimble's departure would halt the administration and, potentially, lead to its destruction.

But the IRA-linked Sinn Féin party, a junior member of the Trimble-led coalition, has dismissed talk of IRA moves unless Britain commits to more military cutbacks and toughens its plans for reforming Northern Ireland's mostly Protestant police.

# Video links bin Laden to Cole

■ The Saudi millionaire's group boasts of destroying the U.S. Navy ship in Aden.

KUWAIT — Islamic militant Osama bin Laden's Afghanistan-based group boasts in a recruitment videotape that its followers bombed the USS Cole in Yemen's Aden harbor last year.

The video, circulating among Muslim militants and viewed here Tuesday, would represent the clearest link yet between Osama bin Laden and the Oct. 12 attack that killed 17 Americans sailors and wounded 39. But bin Laden himself does not specifically make that claim on the tape, and he has not accepted responsibility in the past.

Yemeni officials have said they have no evidence personally linking bin Laden, an exiled Saudi millionaire, to the bombing of the U.S. Navy destroyer. But the U.S. government considers him a prime suspect, and it has sought evidence to tie him to the suicide bombers who detonated an explosives-packed boat alongside the Cole.

"We thank God for granting us victory the day we destroyed Cole in the sea," says a rallying song that runs with footage of bin Laden's masked men training in al-Farouq desert camp in Afghanistan.

The Associated Press viewed the tape at the offices of *Al-Rai Al-Amm*, a Kuwaiti daily newspaper that published a story about the video Tuesday. The newspaper would not say how or where it acquired the video.

The video begins with a line saying it is presented by "Al-Sahab Productions." There is no indication of where Al-Sahab — which means "the clouds" in Arabic — is located.

The video does not say that it was made or financed on bin Laden's orders. But it contains lengthy footage of bin Laden that could not have been shot without the reclusive leader's knowledge.

At the start of the 100-minute tape, bin Laden, wearing a traditional Yemeni dagger on a belt around his waist, recites a poem that includes these lines:

"And in Aden, they charged and destroyed a destroyer that fearsome people fear, one that evokes horror when it docks and when it sails."

Although the poem does not

name the Cole, it is followed by the image of a fiery explosion. Superimposed on the picture in red script are the words, in Arabic, "the destruction of the American destroyer Cole." Footage of the bombed vessel follows.

The tape describes its purpose as "diagnosing" the illnesses of Muslims today and "prescribing the medicine." It shows footage of injured and dead Muslims in the Palestinian territories, Chechnya, Iraq, Lebanon, Indonesia, and Kashmir, as well as American troops in Saudi Arabia during and after the 1991 Gulf War that ended the seven-month Iraqi occupation of Kuwait.

The bearded bin Laden, who appears repeatedly preaching from the pulpit of a mosque and talking to his men in the field, says Muslims have to leave countries that are ruled by "allies of Jews and Christians," and come to his camp to be "prepared" for holy war.

In an address to Palestinians at the end of the tape, bin Laden calls for "blood, blood and destruction, destruction."

"We give you the good news that the forces of Islam are coming and the forces of Yemen will continue in the name of God," he says.

# Cleveland announces hiring of John Lucas

■ The 47-year-old will replace a fired Randy Wittman.



CLEVELAND — John Lucas' career and life have been about second chances, and on Tuesday he got another shot at being an NBA head coach — this time in Cleveland.

Lucas, who also coached in San Antonio and Philadelphia before spending the past three seasons as an assistant in Denver, was hired by the Cavaliers exactly two months after the team fired Randy Wittman.

"I believe John is the right coach for our team right now," said general manager Jim Paxson. "During my conversations with him over the past few weeks, it became clear that Cleveland is where he wants to be. He was very enthusiastic about our players, and knows we need to add to this, but feels we can get better along the way."

The 47-year-old Lucas, a point guard for 13 NBA seasons who had to overcome drug addiction, was signed to a

reported three-year deal worth between \$8 million and \$9 million.

The hiring of the 13th coach in the club's history ended a drawn-out search by the Cavs. They were criticized for their secrecy and failure to pursue big-name candidates to replace Wittman, who went 62-102 the

past two seasons.

Lucas has a combined 136-171 record in two previous coaching stops with San Antonio (1992-94) and Philadelphia (1994-96) where he also was the general manager and director of basketball operations for the 76ers.

But all he'll have to do in

Cleveland is fix the Cavs, who won just 32 games last season — their fewest since 1986-87 — and fell apart after a strong start when center Zydrunas Ilgauskas sustained a season-ending foot injury.

"I want to try to win now," Lucas said. "This is a second chance for all of us. I want to work with what we have to find a way to win. I feel like we can win together, and there are some very good pieces already in place."

During his previous head coaching stints and as an assistant, Lucas has earned a reputation for being both a workaholic and an excellent communicator who relates to his players and brings out the best in them.

Lucas, who overcame cocaine addiction and has been sober since 1986, draws from his life experiences to teach his players and connects with them on a more personal level.

"He's perfect for Cleveland," said forward Chris Gatling, a free agent who played for the Cavs last season and for Lucas in Denver. "John is not afraid of anyone or doing things that some people might find out of the norm. He motivates guys, and he knows how to deal with them."

entire career.

"There's always been a little boy in Cal. This year he's not having much fun. ... That's the part I miss in Cal this year."

Ripken agonized over the decision, which he initially arrived at weeks ago. But he delayed an announcement, just in case he changed his mind.

A few more weeks of bench time, in addition to his failure to lift his average over .220, helped him make up his mind.

"Going into the season, I didn't know. I had to play it out and see where it would end up," Ripken said. "The last couple of weeks it just dawned on me."

Ripken broke Gehrig's long-standing record on Sept. 6,

1995, and the celebration surrounding his feat became a national event. Ripken spoke this spring about his disdain for a possible farewell tour, but that now appears inevitable.

Ripken's final home game would be Sept. 23 against the New York Yankees. Coincidentally, the Orioles finish the season Sept. 30 in Gehrig's home — Yankee Stadium.

By 9 a.m., 75 people were in line at Camden Yards hoping to buy tickets for Ripken's final home game. At 9:30 a.m., an announcement over the public address system alerted those in line that tickets for the final two games at Camden Yards were sold out. Only standing-room tickets remained.

Fans, meanwhile, expressed gratitude for Ripken's longevity.

"I guess it was not unexpected," said Bob Hahm of Westminster. "What he did for baseball is truly amazing. This is one of those things in life. Life goes on."

Ripken has said he wants to run a major league organization, similar to the way Michael Jordan has become the president and part owner of the Washington Wizards.

In his hometown of Aberdeen, Ripken has financed a complex that includes a 5,500-seat minor league stadium, a baseball academy, dormitories, dining halls and six baseball fields modeled after past and present major league stadiums.

"I have a big interest in teaching baseball," Ripken said. "Baseball's in my blood. I see this as a beginning, an opportunity."

Ripken was American League rookie of the year in 1982 and was selected league MVP in 1983 and 1991. He won a World Series championship with the Orioles in 1983.

In 1990, Ripken set a record for shortstops with a .996 fielding percentage, making just three errors in 161 games. He moved to third base in 1997.

In 1999, Ripken and Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs were selected as the shortstops for baseball's "All-Century" team.

Ripken, who regularly signs autographs before games at home and on the road, has often spoken about his love for fans of the game.

They love him back. Despite his poor batting average and part-time status, Ripken leads all AL third basemen in voting for the All-Star game.

## Pacers sign 2000 first-round pick

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Indiana Pacers, who do not have a first-round pick in this year's NBA draft, have signed 7-foot-1 center Primož Brezec to a multi-year contract.

Brezec was Indiana's top pick, 27th overall, in the draft last year, but played with Slovenia's B.C. Olimpija Ljubljana in the top European league.

In 44 games with Olimpija Ljubljana, he averaged 10.4 points, 4.3 rebounds, 19.9 minutes, and shot 72.9 percent from the field. He averaged 10.4 points and 7.4 rebounds in the EuroLeague playoffs, when Olimpija reached the quarterfinals before being eliminat-

ed by eventual champion Kinder Bologna of Italy.

"We're extremely happy to have Primož Brezec sign and grateful to Olimpija Ljubljana for letting him out of the remaining year of his contract," Pacers President Donnie Walsh said Monday.

Terms of the deal were not disclosed.

Brezec, 21, was a member of the Slovenian 22-and-under silver medal team at the 1998 European Championships, where he was also selected to the All-Star team. He has also played in the Slovenian All-Star Game each of the past three years.

"I'm very happy," Brezec said. "I've been looking forward to this. Last year was a good experience for me because I was able to play a lot. I'm ready to get started."

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Knuckleballer Tim Wakefield came within three outs of pitching Boston's second no-hitter this season, losing his bid on Randy Winn's ninth-inning single as the Red Sox beat Tampa Bay, 5-4, Tuesday night.

Wakefield, who twice took no-hitters into the eighth inning in 1995 for Boston, was trying to duplicate the feat of Hideo Nomo, who held Baltimore hitless on April 4.


Wakefield (5-1) retired 17 straight batters before walking Andy Sheets with two outs in the eighth. Left fielder Troy O'Leary then made a sliding catch on Damian Rolls' bloop to end the inning.

In the ninth, speedy Jason Tyner led off with a slow bouncer that second baseman Jose Offerman charged. Offerman's hurried toss was high and pulled first baseman Brian Daubach off the bag.

Official scorer Jim Ferguson reviewed it on the replay and ruled it an error on Offerman. The crowd of 12,950 cheered when the ruling was posted on the scoreboard.

"As I saw it, the throw clearly beat the runner and the umpire ruled that the throw pulled the first baseman off the bag," Ferguson said. "That makes it an error, not a hit. The replay showed the ball clearly got there before Tyner."

But Winn broke it up for

But relievers Guillermo Mota, Graeme Lloyd and Ugueth Urbina — hurt by three errors in the eighth — allowed the Mets to come back for their third straight victory.

The Reds have the majors' worst home record at 7-26 and have lost eight in a row overall, their longest slump in three years.

**ATLANTA** — Cliff Floyd hit a grand slam and Kevin Millar had three RBIs as the Florida Marlins beat the Atlanta Braves, 12-2, Tuesday night for their season-high fifth straight victory.

Florida, winning for the 10th time in 13 games, moved into a second-place tie with Atlanta in the NL East — 3½ games behind of first-place Philadelphia.

The Braves, after going 18-7 from May 15-June 12, have lost five of six.

## Sale of Canadiens approved

NEW YORK (AP) — The sale of the Montreal Canadiens to a Colorado businessman was unanimously approved Tuesday by the NHL's Board of Governors, with the condition that the team not be moved.

George Gillett Jr., bought an 80 percent controlling interest in the Canadiens and 100 percent of the Molson Centre for \$178.3 million. Molson retains a 20 percent interest in the Canadiens.

A Wisconsin native who does not speak French, Gillett has said repeatedly that he has no plans to shift the franchise elsewhere.

Gillett, 62, is a former minority owner of the Miami Dolphins and the Harlem Globetrotters. He failed in a bid last year to purchase another NHL team, the Colorado Avalanche.

Gillett struck the deal in late January, but it wasn't until Tuesday's 30-0 vote that the sale became official.

"It was a six-month process, and we move on," Canadiens President Pierre Boivin said. "There's nothing like closure in any transaction. It

takes away any uncertainty or any doubt that may have remained."

Added NHL commissioner Gary Bettman: "It was a complicated transaction, but we worked our way through it and everyone is comfortable. Sometimes these transactions take awhile."

**NBA playoffs sets attendance record**

The league said Tuesday that the 71 playoff games drew a total of 1,460,086 fans, an average of 20,565. The numbers were up more than 8 percent over last year's playoffs, the league said.

**ST. LOUIS** — Chicago Cubs catcher Todd Hundley was placed on the 15-day disabled list Tuesday with a strained lower back.

"This really hurts because he's a big part of our offense," Cubs outfielder

Rondell White said. "We depend on him to put up big numbers, and now he's out."

Hundley is in a 4-for-45 slump and struck out all three at-bats in Monday night's 6-2 loss to the St. Louis Cardinals. He's batting .179 with four homers and 19 RBIs, and has thrown out six of 39 basestealers.

**Ted Williams moved to Florida**  
**SAN DIEGO** — Ted Williams left San Diego Tuesday for a hospital close to his Florida home to continue his recovery and rehabilitation from open-heart surgery in January.

The baseball great, who was born and raised in San Diego, was discharged from Sharp Hospital, and his air ambulance flight left Lindbergh Field shortly before 3 p.m. EDT for the 4½-hour flight to Gainesville, Fla.

The 82-year-old Hall of Famer was headed for Shands Hospital at the University of Florida. In early November, Williams was admitted to

Shands and a pacemaker was placed in his chest to regulate his heartbeat.

**Utah Jazz charged with rape**  
**FRESNO, Calif.** — Utah Jazz rookie DeShawn Stevenson has been charged with statutory rape for having sex with a 14-year-old girl, a prosecutor said Tuesday.

Stevenson, a 6-foot-5 guard who went from high school directly to the NBA last year, was charged last week in Fresno Superior Court, chief deputy district attorney Liz Mitchell said.

The 20-year-old Stevenson, a Fresno native who went to Washington Union H.S., faces up to three years in state prison if convicted. His whereabouts Tuesday were not immediately known.

Stevenson is accused of having sex with the girl during a visit to Fresno in the past six weeks, Mitchell said. She didn't have any other details.

The Jazz would not comment, and Stevenson's lawyer, Richard Berman, did not immediately return a message from the Associated Press seeking comment.

**No deal for Tyson-Lewis**

NEW YORK — A fight between Mike Tyson and Lennox Lewis is in the works, although TV and boxing executives warned the deal wasn't done.

Rival cable networks holding rights for Tyson and Lewis' bouts are negotiating, and Jay Larkin of Showtime said Tuesday that chances for an agreement by the end of the year were 50-50. He refused to characterize the two sides as "close" to a deal.

"You're not close until you're done," said Larkin, the senior vice president and executive producer of Showtime, which televises Tyson's fights. "Unless papers are signed, it doesn't matter how close you

are." Shelly Finkel, who manages Tyson, agreed with Larkin's assessment about a fight between the two former heavyweight champions.

"There's nothing until we have a deal, and right now we don't have a deal," Finkel said. "We're talking seriously, and we're looking for something before the end of the year, but there are so many contingencies. I thought we were close a month ago, and it didn't happen."

Late Monday, Lewis' camp distributed a news release from London announcing that Showtime and HBO, which holds Lewis' rights, had agreed to two fights, the first on Dec. 8.



Yes, the Hawkeyes got punked by the preseason prognosticators. The best predicted Iowa finish in the conference is tenth, a collective selection throughout all the magazines. That's fair, considering they placed better than that last year.

No Hawkeye garnered any real national attention except for senior running back Ladell Betts. *The Sporting News* calls Betts one of the 20 best backs in the nation. He should be; he ran for more than 1,000 yards last year behind a makeshift offensive line. They're right on that one. They also gave senior defensive end Aaron Kampman the honor of being tabbed a preseason All-Big Ten pick. Other than that, no other publication had any Iowa player on its first team All-Big Ten picks.

Everybody is calling Kahlil Hill one of the best specialists in the conference, which is also a correct assessment. Hill led the nation in kick returns for the early part of last season. However, I think there may be a couple of other Hawkeyes who should be getting that kind of attention.

Iowa was not the only school to get shafted in the preseason picks; Iowa State was ranked 76th by *Lindy's*, and the Cyclones went 9-3 last year. That's all right with me though, I suppose. I hope they're that bad next year.

But don't be worried, Hawkeye faithful, these magazines are usually about as correct as Mike Tyson on an ACT test. I remember a few years back *The Sporting News* picked Colorado to win the national title. The Buffaloes went 5-6 that year and didn't even make a bowl game.

These same magazines also said Nebraska was going to win the national title last year; the Cornhuskers ended up playing in the coveted Alamo Bowl.


It's a good thing these guys aren't picking the Hawks to be any good this year because I remember lots of years that Iowa was supposed to be good and wasn't. Remember 1997? Everybody thought the Iowa team could have won the Big Ten title. Tim Dwight, Jared Devries, and Tavian Banks were getting major national hype.

Iowa went 7-5 that year and got smoked in the Sun Bowl by a less-than-spectacular Arizona State team.

# Cal hanging 'em up

## Baseball's Iron Man to retire at end of season

BALTIMORE — Nothing lasts forever — not even Cal Ripken Jr.

Baseball's Iron Man, who broke Lou Gehrig's record of 2,130 consecutive games, will retire after his 21st season with the Baltimore Orioles — the only team he ever played for.

"I don't see this as an ending so much. I'm not stopping something. I'm just moving on," the 40-year-old third baseman said at a news conference Tuesday, which would have been Gehrig's 98th birthday.

Injuries were not a factor, said Ripken, who has been plagued by back problems in recent seasons. Time away from his family was.

"I'm as healthy now as at any time," he said. "The last couple of years I've been noticing that I miss being

away from home. I miss my kids' activities and it seems like the passion ... I was getting into other things."

Ripken, a two-time Most Valuable Player, said it was the start of another phase in his career, one that will include more time with 11-year-old Rachel and 7-year-old Ryan. "The reality is that players can't play forever," he said.

Ripken played in 2,632 straight games, from May 30, 1982, to Sept. 20, 1998, when he voluntarily ended the streak. At the time, Ripken said he chose to sit down because he feared his Iron Man run was a distraction to the Orioles.

Though he is defined by his consecutive-games streak,

Ripken is also one of seven players in major league history with 3,000 hits (3,107) and 400 home runs (421).

He is a rarity in baseball — a player who has spent his entire career with the same team. Baltimore also happens to be the team he grew up rooting for, and the one his father once managed and coached.

"The Orioles have been my whole life," he said.

An 18-time All Star whose 345 home runs as a shortstop are a major league record, Ripken has been a part-time player this year. He is hitting .210 with four homers and 25 runs batted in.

Ripken recalled hearing some players talk about their

regrets. Some wished they took better care of themselves, others said they wanted to play more and a few lamented not taking the game more seriously.

"I didn't want to be in position at the end of my career and regret not going about it a certain way," Ripken said. "So when I look back, I don't have those regrets. I accomplished what my skills, ability and determination allowed me to."

Ripken has always played the game with a certain childlike exuberance. But this season, reduced to a part-time player on a team geared toward youth, his approach became more businesslike.

"The one thing I noticed missing this year is that little boy," said Orioles bullpen coach Elrod Hendricks, who has been with the Orioles throughout the player's

HawksNestOnline.com coach Kay Dileo said that it wasn't the lack of defense on the Goodfellows/Imprinted's part that allowed her team to score 110 points — it was her team's quality defense.
