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## Cultural center may face loss of its 30-year home

■ The UI is considering moving the Latino Native American Cultural Center into a new dorm.

The Latino Native American Cultural Center has stood at 308 Melrose Ave. since 1971.

But with the 30th anniversary of the center just a few weeks away, the Latino and American Indian communities are confronting the notion that their house might not be around much longer.

"It's very hard to imagine that we might lose the building," said Adele Rodriguez, who coordinates activities at the center. "This has been a homey, comfortable place for students."

The UI is exploring the option of relocating the center into a proposed new residence hall on the West Side of campus.

"There is no firm plan yet," said Phillip Jones, the university's vice president for Student Services. "[But] the house, at some point, will outlive its usefulness."

OPN Architects Inc., a Cedar Rapids firm, is considering designs for the \$20 million dorm that would house 300-500 students and four separate cultural centers.

A proposed plan would allot 1,500 square feet for each of the three cultural centers, as well as an extra 1,500 square feet for a proposed Asian-American Cultural Center. The space

would include room for gathering, dining, and a display area for arts and artifacts.

"Nobody wanted to take this on or approach this issue," Jones said. "Moving the house gives minority students the impression that you're against them. That's nonsense."

The major issues surrounding the relocation of the center are space, staff, and funding.

"A physical building doesn't do any good if you have no money for a staff or a director for programming," Rodriguez said.

The house has not been physically maintained, she said. In the past, the house had a live-in manager with a complete staff, a necessity if it is to remain open all the time, she said.

Over the years, Jones said, the funding for the center has become sparse, and today, it is without on-site supervision. Instead, one roaming house manager oversees the Latino Native American center as well as the Afro-American Cultural Center.

Financing for the individual programming of each center is based on funding from the UI Student Government, because the cultural centers are considered to be student organizations.

The Latino Native American center is allotted a small budget for basic general expenses. This could be used for some small-scale,

## Despite high bids, county to repair jail

■ Officials say that delaying renovation will cost more in the long run.

The Johnson County Board of Supervisors is set to approve spending nearly \$700,000 for repairs to the overcrowded county jail.

The board was "blown away" last week when repair bids came in from contractors at \$200,000 over budget, Supervisor Sally Stutsman said.

"But we're ready to move ahead without compromising our original plan," she said during a brief discussion at the supervisors' meeting Thursday.

The plans call for a new roof, a new heating and cooling system, an upgraded air system, and the removal of broken solar panels. Some of these repairs would have to be delayed in order to reduce the price of the bids, said Mark Bulechek, the county facilities manager.

Bulechek presented two options to the board. Delaying the new roof could possibly remove \$75,000 from cost estimates, but waiting a year will increase the price tag to \$125,000, he said. If the heat pumps are not replaced, \$25,000 would be saved. However, the jail's air quality, which is below state health requirements because of overcrowding, would not be improved.

In addition, deleting part of the project would require a

## Panel indicts 14 in Khobar bombing

WASHINGTON — Thirteen Saudis and a Lebanese alleged to be members of a terrorist group supported by Iranian officials were indicted Thursday, nearly five years after the Khobar Towers bombing that killed 19 American servicemen in Saudi Arabia.

A 46-count indictment handed up by a federal grand jury in Alexandria, Va., said the Iranian government supervised and supported the suspects, but no Iranian govern-

ment officials were charged.

President Bush promised to continue searching for those responsible for the bombing; he said more people might be charged.

In a statement to victims' families and survivors, Bush said, "Your government will not forget your loss and will continue working, based on the evidence, to make sure that justice is done."

The Iranian government has denied any involvement in the bombing.

Bush spoke by phone Thursday with Saudi Crown Prince Abdullah to thank him for Saudi Arabia's cooperation in the investigation, said White House spokeswoman Mary Ellen Countryman.

## Board OKs East Side annexation

■ The City Council and a state board must approve the plan before any development begins.

Despite complaints and concerns of some residents, the Iowa City Planning and Zoning Commission voted to annex land on the East Side.

The commission unanimously approved applications from Plum Grove Acres Inc. and the Southgate Development Co. to annex and develop 138 acres east of Scott Boulevard and north of Court Street.

Included in the plan is a 16-acre strip along Hummingbird Lane that, if not annexed, would be surrounded by city land, creating an irregular boundary.

Both companies have plans to develop the land with single-family homes, duplexes, and townhouses. Before any construction can begin, the Iowa City City Council and a state board must approve the annexation.

"It is a lot of information to dig through," said commission Chairwoman Ann Bovbjerg.

Residents on Hummingbird Lane expressed concerns about the development because they

would have to abandon their wells and septic systems and connect to the city water and sewer system.

Commission Vice Chairman Ben Chait said the residents would only be required to connect to city water and sewer after 20 years; they would be able to use their current systems in the meantime.

Commission member Pam Ehrhardt, while expressing her sympathy for Hummingbird residents, said the commission is concerned with the total development of the city, adding that the land would be annexed sometime in the future.

The commission also discussed plans to approve an

## City eyes building park at Hunters Run

A new public park could

replace an existing area of undeveloped grassland in the West Side housing development to buffer the neighborhood from Highway 218. Community members have recently met with Iowa City officials to discuss the project.


"It's going to be a fun project," said Iowa City City Manager Steve Atkins. "It's one of those projects that grows right out of the ground."

Development of the park could begin as early as this fall, pending a City Council vote next week that would establish a July 10 public hearing on the project.

The new park would include bicycle and pedestrian trails, a natural woodland area, a pond, park shelter, and playground facilities, Atkins said. The city has considered the project,

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

#### Officer injured in attempting arrest

An Iowa City police officer was allegedly assaulted Wednesday evening by a local man he was attempting to arrest.

Officer Darin Zacharias was allegedly attacked by Scott McWane, 32, at McWane's residence at 7:49 p.m., police reports said. McWane, 60 Regal Lane, is charged with interference with official acts causing injury, domestic abuse with a dangerous weapon, and public intoxication.

Zacharias suffered lacerations to his hand and wrist, said police Sgt. Brian Krei. The injuries were not serious, and McWane was unarmed at the time of the incident. Zacharias was treated and released.

Zacharias and other officers were responding to a 911 call reporting domestic abuse with a dangerous weapon when the incident occurred, police records said.

The call was placed by the individual McWane was trying to abuse, Krei said, adding that no weapons were found at the scene.

#### Jostens signs Code of Conduct

Another company has joined the ranks of those who have signed the UI licensee Code of Conduct, and it will be able to continue making products bearing Hawkeye logos.

Minneapolis-based Jostens Inc., which manufactures UI diplomas and class rings, announced that it signed the code Thursday. The goal of the code, which sets standards on how university licensees treat their employees, is to improve working conditions in the apparel industry.

"We did sign and are in the process of faxing the documentation to the university," said Mark Cassutt, a spokesman for the company, which earned the university \$2,095 in royalty revenues during fiscal year 2000.

"That's good news," said the university's licensing director, Mark Abbott, after learning of the signing Thursday.

Jostens also provides the university with caps and gowns, which are not covered by the Code of Conduct because the Hawkeye logo does not appear on them.

Abbott said he has heard VF Imagewear plans to sign the code, but he has not received the contract. Russell Athletic said earlier this week that it will also sign the code, while Vision Embroidery signed on Tuesday.

The big question is whether Nike — the most prominent and controversial of the five companies given an extension to agree to the code through the end of the month — will sign.

A spokeswoman for Nike, which brought approximately \$15,000 into the university in fiscal year 2000, said this week that new clarifications clear up the issues that have kept Nike from signing the code. But, she added, it is too early to say whether the corporation will sign.

#### Scott County loses Leach

DAVENPORT (AP) — Friends and supporters of Rep. Jim Leach, R-Iowa, in the Quad Cities area are lamenting his move from Davenport to Iowa City.

Leach has announced he will move as a result of the new redistricting plan, which was approved by the Iowa Legislature Tuesday.

By moving, Leach will avoid a possible 2002 primary race for the Republican nomination. GOP Rep. Jim Nussle of Manchester lives in the district that now includes Davenport.

Most of the people Leach has represented live in the district that will include Iowa City.

The new district does not include Davenport, the place where he was born in 1942, the place he represented when he won a state high-school wrestling title, and the place where he has lived for much of his 58 years.

"The decision to move has been particularly difficult because of the strong attachment my family has to Scott County, where I was born and raised," Leach said in a prepared statement. "My wife and I could not be more appreciative of the support friends in the county have given us over the years. If re-elected from Iowa City, I will always consider myself a surrogate supporter of Scott, Clinton, and Jackson counties, which will no longer be in my congressional district."

It is unclear whether the Leaches will sell their home in Davenport, said Bill Tate, the congressman's chief of staff. They have started looking for a home in Iowa City, but it is unclear exactly when the move will take place.

The Leaches chose Iowa City for many reasons, Tate said.

Leach met his wife, Deba, there more than 25 years ago. He was starting his first campaign at the time, and she was one of three people who attended a meeting.

The couple's son, Gallagher, will attend the UI this fall. Their daughter, Jenny, is a teenager.

## City to limit power of police board

Some residents fear that proposed changes will render the citizen board inefficient.

The Iowa City City Council will officially vote June 26 on an ordinance that could limit the power of the Police Citizens Review Board, some board members say.

A memo released Thursday outlines an amendment that would prohibit the board, a watchdog for local police conduct, from reviewing official police policies, procedures, and practices on its own initiative. Rather, the board would only be able to review those policies at the discretion of the council, the city manager, or the police chief.

Board members said not having the ability to review policies on their own is a bad idea. Some said reviews are necessary to understand the actions of the officers they oversee and to deal with residents' complaints about police conduct, even when police are acting according to routine procedure.

"For the board to review in a fair and accurate manner, it is essential that the board be able to review [complaints about police procedures]," board member Leah Cohen said Thursday. "It would make the board's job very difficult if we are not able to review all allegations."

City Councilor Connie Champion said the amendments will not significantly alter the powers of the review board. "We really left it the way it was," she said.

The council should retain the authority to determine what may or may not be reviewed by the board because it is the ultimate decision-maker, she said. She added that she is concerned about public forums the board holds on police policy, saying they wind up being "police-bashing forums."

Other amendments that are part of the ordinance include:

- Putting into writing the board's current practice of only reviewing complaints

filed with it, not those filed with the police department. However, Police Chief R.J. Winklehake will continue to be required to issue descriptions quarterly of the nature of allegations made in formal written complaints filed with his department.

Deleting the "sunset clause," which would have discontinued the board's existence Aug. 1, and adding language that requires the council to review the board every two years.

Local activist Carol deProse has been part of an effort to put an amendment on the ballot in November to give the police board the authority to review every allegation made against local police.

She said the new policy will "provide reason for people to go out and vote 'yes'" on the proposed amendment to the Home Rule Charter.

While the proposed changes must pass three votes by the council to become law, it appears that they will likely not be modified.

That's because the three votes must be taken by Aug. 1, or the board will cease to exist, according to current law. Consequently, the revised ordinance must reach the city clerk's desk by July 26, City Attorney Eleanor Dilkes stated in a Thursday memo.

"Please remember that any ordinance revisions require three readings," she wrote to the councilors. "Any substantive changes to the ordinance will require that we begin the process anew."

A lawyer for the police board was not able to review the revisions as a consequence of the tight deadline.

# At UCSB, the party never stops

A university and a California town look to combat binge drinking.

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — The partying is extreme — and sometimes deadly — in Isla Vista, a community packed with Santa Barbara college students. And both the law and university officials are trying to bring things under control, beginning in the classroom with “stealth education.”

Among the strategies being used to discourage drunken misbehavior: Professors at the University of California, Santa Barbara, are being given grants from the school to work anti-alcohol and anti-drug messages into their classroom assignments.

In separate accidents this spring, two partygoers from Santa Barbara City College plunged to their deaths from the ocean bluffs along Del Playa Drive, the road that is often the scene of raucous beer bashes with students hanging from the balconies.

Last week, five young men were arraigned on charges that

included kidnapping and sexual assault. They are suspected in a September 2000 incident in which a UCSB freshman was allegedly force-fed liquor, stripped, sexually assaulted with a crutch and a laundry hose, then left unconscious and covered with food, beer, and garbage on a couch in the street.

The incident was videotaped, and officials said the tape was widely shown before someone turned it over to police June 4.

The deadliest episode happened in February, when a UCSB freshman mowed down a group of pedestrians with his car on a bustling Friday night in Isla Vista, killing four people. A drug test on the 18-year-old showed recent marijuana use and the painkiller lidocaine in his bloodstream.

“This has been a bad year,” said Michael Young, the UCSB vice chancellor of student affairs.

Isla Vista’s 20,000 residents are crowded into an unincorporated, off-campus area of less than a square mile.

More than half are students — the vast majority of them from UCSB, the others from Santa Barbara City College — and high rents lead them to live two, three, and four to a

room in block after block of apartment houses. The average age is 23.

“There’s a Lord of the Flies element,” said the Rev. Norm Freeman, an Episcopal clergyman.

The partying would horrify many parents: students throwing beer bottles, dashing naked across rooftops, vandalizing cars, starting fights, burning

couches in the street, and drinking until they are too drunk to stand.

In recent years, Isla Vista has recorded more than two dozen rapes and sexual assaults annually.

“You could see anything down here, and you get a thicker skin,” said Scott Mitchell, 19, who just finished his freshman year.

## Bush threatens to veto patients’ rights bill

Supporters of the measure say the president is ignoring patients and siding with the HMOs.

WASHINGTON — President Bush issued a formal veto threat Thursday against a Democratic-backed patients’ bill of rights, saying the measure would encourage unnecessary lawsuits and drive up the cost of health insurance.

“The president believes that patients should be given care first — litigation should be the last resort,” the administration said in a written statement that also iterated Bush’s desire to sign legislation this year that provides “strong patient protections.”

Bush’s threat drew a tart rebuttal from Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and other supporters of the measure that Democrats have made their first order of business since gaining a Senate majority a few weeks ago.

Kennedy, D-Mass., accused the president of taking “exactly the HMO line” and said it was disappointing he had vowed to “veto comprehensive patient

protections supported by virtually every group of doctors, nurses, and patients. The president should stand with them and not with HMOs and insurance companies.”

Republicans privately expressed relief over the president’s actions, saying it would make it easier for them to build support for less expansive proposals in both the House and Senate. One senior GOP aide, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said the White House had been lobbied by congressional Republicans who feared the president might not state his position forcefully and thus undercut their own efforts.

The legislation would strengthen the hand of patients dealing with HMOs by guaranteeing them access to emergency treatment, medical specialists, and other types of care.

It also would give patients the right to sue HMOs for denial of care in federal or state courts and to seek punitive damages — an issue sparking much of the controversy surrounding the legislation. One provision strongly opposed by Republicans would permit patients to sue before completion of an appeal of an HMO decision on medical

treatment.

The Senate debated its legislation as House Republicans signaled a delay in drafting their own measure. In a concession, GOP leaders agreed earlier this week to accept a new right to sue HMOs in state court in cases in which the insurance companies refuse to abide by the results of an outside appeal of a denial for service. GOP sources said earlier in the week the White House was aware of the proposal and had not objected.

“This is a slow process. I expect we’ll have it out sometime in July,” Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., said of the emerging bill. He had earlier said a vote by the full House might be possible by the end of next week.

The Bush’s statement overshadowed the day’s debate on the Senate floor, where Republicans advanced an amendment to make the cost of health insurance fully tax-deductible for the self-employed beginning Jan. 1, 2002. Current law provides for full deductibility on Jan. 1, 2003.

Even that move underscored the political stakes involved in the patients’ rights debate. Sen. Tim Hutchinson, R-Ark.,

who faces a difficult re-election contest next year, was the principal sponsor of the politically popular amendment.

“This amendment addresses specifically how we can decrease the number of uninsured,” he said. He added that roughly 25 percent of the nation’s self-employed are without health insurance — more than 3 million people — in part because coverage is too costly. Corporations already are permitted to fully deduct the cost of insurance they provide their workers.

## Poll finds increasing economic gap

A majority of Americans are not content with the nation’s direction.

WASHINGTON — Americans increasingly see an economic divide between the haves and have-nots, according to a new poll that also finds that a majority of people are dissatisfied with the country’s direction.

The poll, released Thursday, indicated that the economic boom of the 1990s helped the upper middle-class and wealthy but had little impact on the outlook or financial condition of those who make less money.

“The boom has passed these people by,” said pollster Andrew Kohut, the director of the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press.

Overall satisfaction with the country’s direction has fallen in the past six months, with 43 percent now saying they’re satisfied and 52 percent saying they’re dissatisfied. That dropoff from a 55-41 positive split in January was led by a decline among women and minorities.

The number of people who think the country is divided between those who have enough and those who don’t has grown steadily and now is at 44 percent — up from 26 percent in 1988.

Just over four in 10 in the new poll thought President

Bush was mostly concerned with helping those who have enough, while one in 20 said he was interested in helping those who don’t. Four in 10 said he was treating both groups about the same.

The president has pitched his recently passed tax cut as a way to help all Americans. But just over a third said they were looking forward to getting their income tax rebates, while almost six in 10 said they hadn’t thought about it.

Less than half, 44 percent, now say they are in good or excellent financial shape personally, a drop of 8 percentage points from a year ago.

“The economic gains the middle class have made seem to be very much threatened by the credit crunch and by energy costs,” said Kohut.

The people who say they have more debt than they can afford to owe have grown from a fifth of Americans in 1992 to almost three in 10 in 2001. More than a third of those who have family incomes of less than \$50,000 said they have credit-card and loan debts that are more than they can afford.

A fourth of people in the survey said not having enough money to make ends meet was the biggest problem facing them and their families. High prices were right behind that. The poll of 1,200 people was taken June 13 through Sunday and had an error margin of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points.

Those at the lower end of the economy saw few signs of eco-

nomics progress.

“The survey gives a lot of evidence that poor people remain about as poor as they were in the early 1990s,” Kohut said.

The numbers who said they didn’t have enough money for food, clothes, and health care were all up slightly from other polls taken over the past two decades.

However, middle-income and wealthy people said it is now easier for them to afford housing, appliances, and vacations.

Some other findings from the poll:

- Women were more concerned about rising prices than men.
- Four in 10 Americans now say there are plenty of jobs available, up from one in 10 who felt that way eight years ago. Those from wealthy households were twice as likely to feel that way as those with low incomes.
- Blacks, Latinos, and other minorities were more likely than whites to struggle with economic issues, even when compared with whites in the same economic ranges.

Despite stark differences in perceptions between those with money and those without, the public still had a generally upbeat view of the economy.

“The only measure in this poll that is less positive overall is the question of how much debt do you have,” said Kohut. “It’s not high-income people, but lower-income and middle-income people — that’s where the credit crunch comes in.”

### John Lee Hooker, blues legend, dies at 83

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Bluesman John Lee Hooker, whose foot stompin’ and gravelly voice on such songs as “Boom Boom” and “Boogie Chillen” electrified audiences and inspired generations of musicians, died Thursday. He was 83.

Hooker died of natural causes as he slept at his home in Los Altos, south of San Francisco, said agent Mike Kappus and manager Rick Bates.

The veteran blues singer from the Mississippi Delta estimated he recorded more than 100 albums over nearly seven decades. He won a Grammy Award for a version of “I’m In The Mood,” was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1991, and received a Lifetime Achievement Award at last year’s Grammys.

Through it all, Hooker’s music remained hypnotic and unchanged — his rich and sonorous voice, full of ancient hurt, coupled with a brooding, rhythmic guitar. He sang of loneliness and confusion. Neither polished nor urbane, his music was raw, primal emotion.

“There are no superlatives to describe the profound impact John Lee left in our hearts,” musician Carlos Santana said in a statement Thursday. “When I was a child, he was the first circus I wanted to run away with.”

### Carroll O’Connor, TV’s indelible Archie Bunker, dies at 76

CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP) — Carroll O’Connor, whose portrayal of irascible bigot Archie Bunker on “All in the Family” helped make the groundbreaking TV comedy part of the American dialogue on race and politics, died of a heart attack Thursday. He was 76.

O’Connor collapsed at his home and was taken to Brotman Medical Center, publicist Frank Tobin said. He said O’Connor died with his wife of nearly 50 years, Nancy, by his side.

The actor had diabetes and had undergone coronary artery bypass surgery in 1989.

Personal tragedy darkened O’Connor’s later years. His only child, Hugh, a co-star with his father on the TV series “In The Heat of The Night,” shot himself in a drug-related suicide in 1995.

Actress Bonnie Hunt, who directed him in his last film role, the 2000 romantic comedy “Return to Me,” said she “loved him dearly.”

“As an actor, he gave every role he played instant credibility,” Hunt said. “I feel honored to have worked with him and more importantly, to have known him as a friend.”

Norman Lear, the producer of “All in the Family,” told KABC-TV that O’Connor was one of the funniest actors he ever worked with.

### ENDING HATE CRIMES REQUIRES PATIENCE ...

## Move cautiously on hate crimes

With the sentencing of Tarsha Claiborne this week, many people at the UI probably would like to quietly put the whole episode in the closet and forget about it. However, this case raises some very interesting questions regarding racially motivated crimes and hate crimes in general. Did Tarsha Claiborne commit a hate crime? Is it possible for a black woman to commit a racist crime against other blacks? Up until Claiborne was arrested, these questions were largely academic. However, now that she has been sentenced, some answers are needed.

For sending threatening e-mails to minority students and leaving a bowl of dyed noodles titled "Dead Black Man's Brains" on a fellow student's doorstep, Claiborne received a sentence of four years' probation and was ordered to pay \$17,000 in restitution. Considering that Claiborne was suffering from intense depression and proba-

bly was not in total control of herself, this sounds like a fair sentence.

However, lurking in the background is one unanswered question: Would the sentence have been the same if Claiborne were a white male between the ages of 25 and 55, like most had assumed?

If the perpetrator had been white, then the crime would have been much easier to define and understand. There would have been no public outpouring of support. There would have been no calls for understanding and forgiveness. Instead, the perpetrator would have been demonized, and everyone would have

called for the maximum punishment. This translates to harsher punishment for whites than for blacks, which is discrimination based on skin color. In our frenzy to stamp out hate and evil intentions, we have created the possibility of a new form of discrimination.

Hate crimes are a major problem in this nation, and steps need to be taken to curb the rise of crime against minority groups. However, we must step carefully in order to maintain our freedom of thought. When punishing criminals, we need to punish their crimes, not their thoughts. When we begin taking into account the thoughts and biases of a criminal, we are crossing a fine line from a freethinking society into a thought-control society in which thoughts deemed evil are illegal.

Without the freedom to think whatever we want, all other freedoms are meaningless.

## Settlement smells of GOP sell-out

On Tuesday, two federal government officials, on the premise of anonymity, said the U.S. Justice Department may settle its civil lawsuit against tobacco-industry conglomerates, a suit seeking compensation for taxpayer funds spent on smokers' health care. The officials also hinted at what appears to be an effort to dodge the risk of losing the suit. The situation reeks more than the ashtray of someone with a two-pack-a-day habit.

The original suit was filed in 1999 by former Attorney General Janet Reno. The Clinton administration stood strongly behind the suit, claiming governmental health-care plans shell out more than \$20 billion a year treating smoking-related illnesses. They believed the government needed to be reimbursed for this gargantuan expenditure.

And now the Bush administration appears to be backing out on pursuing a once-adamantly pursued lawsuit.

Ashcroft has supposedly recruited lawyers to work on the settlement. Moreover, as a senator, Ashcroft opposed this particular civil suit.

The tobacco companies claim to have had no discussion of a settlement with the department. Martin Feldman, a tobacco analyst for Salomon Smith-Barney, says the tobacco industry has a very good chance of winning the case brought against the companies.

Apparently, the U.S. government would rather save face than attempt to force corporate giants who have committed the equivalent of fraud to face the consequences of their actions.


Many Americans will view this as a good deal for the tobacco giants, and if the government does indeed offer to

settle, Big Tobacco will draw a similar conclusion. It may be kosher to save the money on the possibly incurred legal fees; however, Americans will certainly not condone tobacco conglomerates virtually getting off scot-free on the charge of seducing customers and holding them for life — and then leaving taxpayers to foot the bill.

And don't forget the political contributions of tobacco companies. In the past three elections, tobacco has been the No. 1 contributor to the Republican Party. According to Matthew Myers, the president of Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, big tobacco contributed more than \$8 million to campaigns last year. Of that, 83 percent went to Republicans.

Perhaps "contributed" isn't the right word. "Bought their way out of lawsuits and of further detrimental legislation?" That's a bit more accurate.

I've long adored major- and minor-league baseball; I read *Shoeless Joe* and *The Iowa Baseball Confederacy* before *Field of Dreams* became a hit and many years before I chose to live in Iowa. And I'll watch any kind of basketball, even though my first basketball love arrives only at the start of autumn in Carver-Hawkeye, when the women play their exhibition games.

Why? To quote

*Shakespeare in Love*, I don't know. It's a mystery.

A friend I'd gotten to know on the Internet recently met me in person. Later, she told me she'd expected me to be a hippie environmentalist who didn't even know what the letters NBA meant.

True, I do eat organic vegetarian food. Oh, and Nacho Cheese Doritos. True, I own no television, and I spend a lot of time reading — but my girlfriend has a TV, and I'm not afraid to use it.

## Tomb Raider dead on arrival

Welcome to the dog days of summer. But wait, you say, it's only June. Granted, the temperature gauge might not show it, but if the sludge currently being served up at the multiplex is the best entertainment we can expect, then we're all in for one long, unpleasant season.

The latest, and easily the worst, entry in Hollywood's parade of summer blockbusters is the over-hyped *Lara Croft: Tomb Raider*, starring Angelina Jolie as the buxom, gun-toting title character. Based on the enormously popular computer game, *Tomb Raider* wants to be a sleeker, modern version of *Raiders of the Lost Ark* — the plots are almost identical — but it fails to produce even one genuine moment of wonder or adventure.

*The General's Daughter* has assembled the movie with all the passion and tenderness of a fast-food employee processing an order of Chicken McNuggets. *Tomb Raider* isn't art, but it's not really entertainment, either. It's a widget, languidly mass-produced to fill seats in a theater.

The problem isn't that West is lacking the technical ability or the resources to match a filmmaker such as Steven Spielberg, who directed the Indiana Jones trilogy. He's just lazy. Almost all of *Tomb Raider's* effects-laden action sequences are disorienting by design, composed with countless close-ups, then edited together so quickly that the audience never really gets a chance to see the whole battle. Imagine watching a football game on television with only one camera that is always focused on the ball or the quarterback; without a few

wide shots of the field to contextualize the action, the game would be pointless.

Despite the efforts of a staggering number of screenwriters — the recent issue of *Premiere* reports 11 different writers were brought in to try to salvage the script — West's hyper-active visual style can't cover up *Tomb Raider's* laughable dialogue.

At one point early in the film, a pensive Lara asks her butler if he knows what day it is. When he replies that it is the 15th, Lara sadly says, "And you know that can never be a good day." The camera then pans over to a picture of Lara with her father, played by real-life father Jon Voight. You see, Lara's father is dead, and, uh, I guess he died on the 15th. This is one of just many embarrassing moments in the film that seem better suited for daytime TV than for a big-budget adventure flick.

Based solely on appearance, the freaky, feisty Jolie was the perfect choice to portray cyber-babe Lara Croft. Unfortunately, the recent Academy-Award winner's acting is as uninspired as West's direction. She

uses the same facial expression to convey every emotion — an odd mixture of surprise and sensuality — like a confused deer caught in the headlights trying to decide whether to move out of the way or mate with the oncoming vehicle.

For all you guys out there planning to watch *Tomb Raider* just to see Jolie's voluptuous body — and you know who you are — don't waste your money. Remember, this is PG-13. Save for a brief, unrevealing profile of her breasts as she strolls out of the shower, you're likely to see more skin at a Miss Amish pageant.

Likewise, for all you women hoping to find a new role model in this smart, sexy, ass-kicking archaeologist, you'll probably be disappointed — unless, perhaps, you're a card-carrying member of the NRA. Unlike Indiana Jones, who uses his intellect and his trusty lasso to escape from sticky situations, Lady Lara Croft just shoots her way out. Talk about "girl power."

For those of you who just want some good summer fun, stick to the beach.

## Reconstructing John Henry

Colson Whitehead will read at from his second novel tonight.

Author Colson Whitehead was in elementary school the first time he heard the story of John Henry. Whitehead's teacher showed the class a cartoon that relayed the extraordinary events of Henry's life, how he was born into slavery with a hammer in his hand, how he came to work for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, and how he became a legend by winning a contest against a steam drill only to die minutes later.

"The story always stuck with me," said Whitehead, who will read from his new novel *John Henry Days* at Prairie Lights Books, 15 S. Dubuque St., today at 8 p.m. "John Henry was an incredibly dynamic figure. I knew that one day I'd have to write about him."

Whitehead's first novel, *The Intuitionist*, earned him a tremendous amount of critical praise as well as the QPB New Voices Award and an Ernest Hemingway/PEN Award for First Fiction finalist in 1999.

"I was halfway finished with *John Henry Days* when *The Intuitionist* was released," he said. "It helped that I was not starting from scratch. I was very proud of the half I had written, and I just wanted to get back to work, to concentrate on the second half."

Whitehead has once again struck a chord with *John Henry Days* — his prose has

been compared with that of such esteemed writers as Thomas Pynchon, Don DeLillo, and Toni Morrison. Despite the newest round of praise, he remains unfazed.

"It is flattering and strange, because those are all people I like to read," he said. "But I like to focus on what I am doing. Critics must make comparisons between authors to get the idea of the book across."

*John Henry Days* tells the story of a black journalist named J. Sutter who has been sent to Talcott, W.Va., where Henry supposedly worked, to cover the John Henry Days festival. The highlight of the festival is the unveiling of a stamp to commemorate the folk hero's life. The narrative intertwines the lives of the two men, one destroyed by the Industrial Age and the other, Sutter, being deconstructed by the Information Age.

Self-proclaimed "Web junkie" Whitehead used the novel to help work out his obsession with the media and Internet.

"Web hysteria has peaked; it has become a daily feature of our lives," he said. "The inclusion of technology in this book was a way for me to purge and to deal with media saturation and the Information Age, the way it has become overwhelming in the day-to-day activities of life."

Whitehead said some of the inspiration for Sutter came from his own career in journalism.

"It comes from the experience of being a critic for a couple of years, seeing how the whole pop [culture] machine works," he said.



To write Henry's story, his research moved beyond his childhood memories of the folk tale.

"I needed to get the basic history. I'd heard conflicting reports about whether he was even a real person. Mostly, I went to the library to do research," Whitehead said. "I also went to Talcott. There was a John Henry Day festival, but smaller than the one I wrote in the book."

With the history he unearthed, he was able to weave many philosophical questions into his prose.

"John Henry is usually identified as an American hero, as opposed to a black hero. Is he one or the other? Is it possible to be both? When he races the steam drill and wins but dies immediately after, is that a victory or defeat?" Whitehead said.

He leaves the answers to these questions up to the reader, partially because writing the book did not move him closer to any resolutions.

"There are different answers that are reflected in different characters," he said. "I like that — that there are different answers."

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

## Serb police uncover mass gravesite

Support grows in Serbia for extraditing Slobodan Milosevic as more atrocities are discovered.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — After years of hearing the glories of Slobodan Milosevic's rule, Serbs are now being told of atrocity victims in Kosovo being dumped into mass graves, as the media prepare them for what seems inevitable: the former leader's extradition to the U.N. war-crimes tribunal.

The police, now under the control of pro-democracy authorities, have discovered at least two mass graves containing approximately 1,000 bodies of Kosovar Albanians, apparent victims of Milosevic's crackdown in Serbia's southern province. "This shows that Milosevic and his gang were not patriots but plain murderers," said Dusan Mihajlovic, Serbia's minister in charge of the police. "This will help the Serb public realize the monstrosity of the former regime."

The recent discovery of the mass graves — one near Belgrade containing mostly corpses of women and children, as well as three heads without bodies — coincided with the efforts by Serbia's new rulers to pass a law that would allow Milosevic's extradition to the war crimes court in The Hague, Netherlands.

More than 3,000 ethnic Albanians are still missing after Milosevic's crackdown in

Kosovo prompted a 78-day NATO air war in 1999. Mass graves located far from the province and inside Serbia proper may be a clue to what happened to those victims.

Police have said Milosevic personally ordered his security commanders to remove the bodies from Kosovo, fearing they could be used as evidence in any future war-crimes prosecution.

The latest in a series of media revelations against Milosevic came Thursday, as the respected *Vreme* weekly carried a story by a Yugoslav army reservist who claimed to have driven 10 freezer truckloads of bodies from Kosovo to a copper smelter in Bor, eastern Serbia.

## Corporate AIDS \$ draws questions

Many activists believe companies produce AIDS programs for the PR value.

UNITED NATIONS — Moves by corporations outside the pharmaceutical industry to get involved in the AIDS fight have been welcomed at the United Nations. But some activists wonder if the initiatives constitute good will — or just good public relations.

This week, Coca-Cola and DaimlerChrysler announced AIDS-related programs. The auto manufacturer will pay for AIDS drugs for employees in South Africa. The soft-drink giant offered the same for its African employees, and it will lend its trucks to distribute condoms and educational pamphlets to hard-to-reach areas there.

Other companies are also involved. MTV airs free public-service announcements on AIDS, and a division of Estee

Lauder donates the proceeds from a \$13.50 lipstick line to AIDS programs in the countries where the product is sold.

But as next week's U.N. summit on AIDS approaches, there have been few corporate contributions to a global war chest that U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan says is key to fighting the pandemic. Annan has said \$7 billion to \$10 billion is needed to combat AIDS, but the fund has taken in just \$528 million so

far. Sharonann Lynch of Global Treatment Access, an AIDS advocacy organization, said serious corporations and nations should focus on contributing to the fund.

"What we've seen from industry, be it pharmaceuticals or soda companies, is that they take opportunities like this to announce positive public-relations campaigns, often without even consulting with governments and organizations on the ground," she said.

## Andes nations try to band together

Andean countries will meet to try to find common ground on drugs and trade.

CARACAS, Venezuela — Andean nations are seeking a common approach to free trade and illegal drugs — issues some leaders in the turbulent region view as too often dominated by U.S. policy.

Leaders of Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and Venezuela will meet this weekend to discuss ways to combat narcotics trafficking in the world's largest cocaine-producing region.

One goal is to prevent having the eradication of drug crops in one country drive growers into neighboring states, said Victor Rico, the head of the Community of Andean Nations, a sub-regional organization.

Some Andean leaders say successful coca eradication efforts in Bolivia and Peru have increased production in Colombia.

Similar concerns emerged when Colombia launched Plan Colombia, a U.S.-backed offensive to eradicate coca crops in rebel-held areas. Venezuela and other nations increased their troop presence along Colombia's borders — fearing an influx of drug growers and leftist rebels who protect them.

The United States, which pledged \$1.3 billion to the plan,

has offered to help Colombia's neighbors prepare for any spillover from the offensive.

Andean unity remains an elusive goal amid economic turmoil in Bolivia and Ecuador, guerrilla warfare in Colombia, and political upheaval in Peru and Venezuela.

But Andean leaders say they want to adopt a unified stand

when negotiating counter-narcotics cooperation with other countries, especially the United States.

"The Andean anti-drug plan will draw from experiences in the last 10 years," said the Colombian ambassador to Venezuela, German Bula, noting that it has taken time to understand all the facets of the illegal drug trade.

Leaders also increasingly view regional integration as key to getting their views across during U.S.-led negotiations to create a hemispheric free trade zone by 2005.

"It's imperative that Andean countries deepen integration. If we don't, the integration process will become absorbed by the Free Trade Agreement of the Americas," Rico warned.



# County to go ahead with jail repairs

new series of bids from contractors, pushing back any repairs until October, Bulechek said. Construction during the winter months would also increase the cost, he said.

"There doesn't seem to be any way to make it cost-effective [to delay repairs]," Bulechek said.

"It's a lot of dollars being spent, but it has to be done. It's a health and safety issue," Supervisor Pat Harney said. "We'll have to shuffle the money around, but it will be there."

The board will vote next week to accept the lowest bid of \$683,700 from Hildebrandt Construction. Funding for the repairs will come from capital-projects money set aside to build a new jail, said Jeff Horne, the county budget coordinator.

In November 2000, Johnson County voters overwhelmingly rejected building a new \$20.3 million jail.

"We've heard from the voters, and they're not interested in building a new building," Stutsman said. "It looks like we don't have a choice [but to proceed with the repairs]."

# 14 indicted in '96 Saudi bomb attack

Attorney General John Ashcroft said, "The indictment explains that elements of the Iranian government inspired, supported, and supervised members of Saudi Hezbollah."

"In particular, the indictment alleges that the charged defendants reported their surveillance activities to Iranian officials and were supported and directed in those activities by Iranian officials," he said.

Ashcroft noted that the indictment did not name any members of the Iranian government. He said at a news conference at FBI headquarters, "The only limitation on this case, as in any criminal case, is what we believe we can prove in a court of law."

The indictment accused the suspects of murder, attempted murder, and conspiracy to use weapons of mass destruction. Approximately 40 of the charges are punishable by death.

None of the suspects, all members of the shadowy Saudi Hezbollah that had long been thought to be behind the bombing, are in custody in the United States.

FBI Director Louis Freeh, whose term ends this week, said the United States is in discussions to gain access to suspects being held in Saudi Arabia and elsewhere and is searching for others whose whereabouts are not known.

He said various treaties and extradition agreements could be used to bring the suspects to the United States for trial. Other mechanisms exist for prosecuting suspects where they are held, he said.

"I am very confident that they will be brought to justice, and hopefully in the United States, some of them, at some point," said Freeh.

The United States does not have an extradition treaty with Saudi Arabia.

One of the suspects, Hani Al-Sayegh, accused of driving the vehicle used to scout the bombing site, had been in the United States as part of a deal under which he would plead guilty to participating in an unrelated plot against Americans for an attack in Saudi Arabia that was never carried out.

But he reneged on the deal, asserting that he knew nothing about the bombing; he was then deported. Freeh said

there wasn't sufficient evidence to charge him at the time.

The indictment charges that as early as 1993, members of Saudi Hezbollah began extensive surveillance in search of a U.S. target, settling two years later on the American military housing high-rise near Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

Most of the Saudis indicted are young male members of the Shiite branch of Islam who lived in the eastern province of Saudi Arabia near the Persian Gulf.

The indictment said they were trained in Lebanon and also in Iran.

The suspects include the head of the Saudi Hezbollah, the chief of the group's military wing, who is believed to have fled to Iran, and several other prominent members of the group, the indictment said.

Two of the suspects are said to have driven the truck bomb that exploded in front of the dormitory complex; two others were in a scout vehicle that gave an all clear signal.

Ashcroft said he was gratified that the Justice Department and FBI were able to obtain the indictment.

"For the victims and for their families, the indictment filed today means that next week's five-year anniversary of this tragedy will come with some assurance to victim family members and to the wounded that they are not and will not be forgotten," Ashcroft said.

Those with loved ones among the dead welcomed the latest development in the case.

"It's five years of pure hell; with or without indictments, that part doesn't change," said Fran Heiser, of Palm Coast, Fla., who lost her only child, Michael, a 35-year-old Air Force master sergeant, in the bombing. "It's nice to see this coming to a head."

In response to the Khobar Towers attack, the United States moved its Air Force contingent in Saudi Arabia to Prince Sultan Air Base, a vast compound in a remote stretch of desert south of Riyadh that provides much stricter security. The U.S. forces who are still there fly missions over southern Iraq to enforce a "no-fly" zone.

The FBI said the investigation into the blast moved slowly, in part because the Saudi government restricted the agency's access to witnesses and other evidence.

general events, Jones said, but the prerogative of the center has been to hire and pay student workers.

"You can't expect students to come up with all the money for program funding," Rodriguez said. "It's just not conceivable."

The registrar's office reports that Latino students make up 2.4 percent of UI students. Many of them have used the center throughout their college careers.

"The center has a familiar feeling about it," said Tim

Wightman, the assistant national director of the Sigma Lambda Beta Fraternity, the nation's largest Latino fraternity. "Our national fraternity was planned and founded in this house. It will be sad to see it go."

The 30th anniversary of the center will fall on July 8. During the festivities, which will last three days and include music and events, organizers will hold a workshop regarding the future of the center.

"Hopefully, something concrete will come of it," Rodriguez said. "Maybe a

coalition will be formed; maybe the students will ask the alumni to start an endowment. If people are ready to take action, then we want to hear about it."

amendment that would alter the downtown zoning plan to accommodate the conversion of the old Public Library into apartments.

The change would allow developer Jim Clark to construct four or five apartments within the old library without reserving space for businesses, said city planner Bob Miklo.

Currently, the downtown zoning plan requires that the first floor of buildings be reserved for commercial space. The amend-

ment would only affect buildings that are nominated as local landmarks.

Clark originally planned to raze the building and replace it with a four-story apartment complex; he decided to save the building after it was nominated to be a local landmark. Clark is now proposing to restore the library to its original design, removing a 1962 brick addition on its eastern side to expose a full rotunda with 31 windows. A three-story, 15-unit apartment building will be built 10 feet east of the building.

# City looks at building new West Side park

estimated to cost about \$300,000, for two to three years, he said.

Funding for the project will come from the city's general-obligation bonds, said Terry Trueblood, the city Parks and Recreation director.

Some residents are worried that the new park would be filled with noise pollution from traffic on Highway 218. In an effort to address their concerns, Atkins and Trueblood redrafted plans to include a large buffer zone of trees along the park's edge near the highway.

"We went into the discussions asking what the residents wanted to be done," Trueblood said. "They asked for trees and trails, and that's what we proposed. We haven't met with any resistance so far."

A popular sledding spot on the grounds will remain after construction is completed, but the city does plan to initially landscape 16 acres of the park to make room for facilities, Trueblood said, adding that street parking for the park will be available and future additions could include a restroom.

The council recently viewed design plans for the project, and some councilors have expressed interest in pursuing the project.

"They need a park up there," said Councilor Connie Champion. "We have small,

residential parks and then those types of larger parks with bigger facilities and more room for activities."

The new park will help the city to look prosperous, said Councilor Steven Kanner, adding that it will encourage residents to visit that part of the city.

Hunters Run Park is one of many recent proposed modifications to local parks. The Parks and Recreational Division has been drafting proposals for modifications to Terrill Mill and City Park. Improvements include a new skateboard facility, tennis court and bicycle trail resurfacing, and new permanent seating for the outdoor Riverside Shakespeare Theatre.

Craig Gustaverson, a parks and recreation official, said he is excited about the improvements to the park facilities. "Anything we can do to improve the parks is a plus," he said. "The Parks and Recreational Division is committed to improving and expanding the neighborhood parks."

Gustaverson also said the city plans to create cross-county bicycle trails to connect Iowa City with North Liberty, Coralville, and other locations.

"We'll have one of the better trail systems around in the next few years," he said. "This will all be very beneficial."



**Penn State football coach receives state award**  
 HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — A teary Joe Paterno said Thursday he thought his father would be proud of what he's accomplished at Penn State University.

"He made so many sacrifices," the renowned Nittany Lions football coach said after a ceremony at which Gov. Tom Ridge honored his accomplishments both on and off the field. "I'm more proud I haven't let him down than anything else."

Approximately 200 people gathered at the Governor's Residence on Thursday to see Paterno receive the Pennsylvania Founder's Award.

"For a broken-down old football coach to get (this award) — I'm proud," Paterno said after Ridge presented him with the award and a football signed by previous winners of the award.

Ridge praised the coach as a leader in the national movement for academic standards for student athletes and a generous financial contributor to Penn State academic programs.

**NBA's early entry list has been finalized**  
 NEW YORK — The NBA completed its list of early entry candidates for the June 27 draft on Thursday, with 21 players who had previously declared deciding to withdraw their names.

That left 47 high-school and college players and seven international prospects remaining in the draft as early entry candidates.

Among those who pulled their names back were Kentucky teammates Keith Bogans and Tayshaun Prince, Sam Clancy of Southern California, and Tito Maddox of Fresno State. All the withdrawals were announced prior to Wednesday's deadline.

Jason Gardner of Arizona pulled out but three of his teammates — Gilbert Arenas, Richard Jefferson and Michael Wright — remained in the draft.

Others who will be eligible to be drafted are the six high school players who originally filed — Kwame Brown, Tyson Chandler, Osmane Cisse, Eddy Curry, DeSagana Diop, and Tony Key — as well nine players

who declared after their freshman years in college. Included in that group were Omar Cook of St. John's University, Eddie Griffin of Seton Hall and Zach Randolph of Michigan State.

**Former Dallas Cowboy indicted in drug case**  
 DENTON, Texas — Former Dallas Cowboys receiver Michael Irvin was indicted Thursday on a felony charge of possessing less than a gram of cocaine, stemming from an arrest last summer.

The indictment was returned by a Denton County grand jury. The charge carries a maximum penalty of two years in jail and a \$10,000 fine.

Irvin was arrested Aug. 9 at a North Dallas apartment where law officers said they found marijuana and other drugs. The ex-Cowboys star, who played on three Super Bowl champion teams, had completed probation on a no-contest plea to cocaine possession less than two months earlier.

Irvin's attorney, Howard Shapiro, said his client planned to plead not guilty and ask for a jury trial.

**Clarke: Lindros won't be traded to Toronto**  
 PHILADELPHIA — Eric Lindros won't be traded to the Toronto Maple Leafs, Philadelphia Flyers general manager Bob Clarke said Thursday.

Clarke, in Florida for this weekend's NHL draft, told Maple Leafs general manager Pat Quinn he's out of the running for the star center.

"We just couldn't get together on it," Clarke said. "We've been trying for eight months. It wasn't going anywhere. We won't be trading him to Toronto."

Lindros has been seeking a trade since rejecting an \$8.5 million qualifying offer from the Flyers last summer because of a contentious relationship with Clarke.

Neither Carl Lindros, Eric's father and agent, nor Gord Kirke, his attorney, could immediately be reached for comment.

Clarke wants to deal Lindros before July 1, when the NHL's free agency period begins. With Toronto out of the mix, Detroit appears to be the front-runner to get Lindros.

## Oliver puts up 51 at PTL

Thursday night might have been the last chance Hawkeye fans will ever have to watch Dean Oliver play ball in Iowa City — and he left them with a pleasant performance.

As the former Hawkeye point guard awaits next week's NBA draft, he pulled out a big win for Merrill Lynch/Nike in the 6 p.m. Prime Time League game, exploding for 51 points for the defending league champs. Oliver, who started for four years at Iowa, said he was pleased with the big numbers he put up but credited them to more attempts, not better ball-handling.

"I shot a lot more than I usually do," said Oliver, who shot only 28 percent from downtown. "I was working on my 3-pointers out there, and I'm not quite happy with how I did."

The former Hawkeye said he could attend some NBA camps this weekend, but he doesn't have an inkling as to what his future holds.

"My future is pretty much undecided right now," he said. "I could be gone for a


day and be back. So I may play again next week. I just live day-to-day."

At half-time, Merrill Lynch/Nike trailed, 59-47, a Sean Sonderleiter-less Fitzpatrick's team, which remained ahead until eight minutes into the second-half, when Oliver sunk a 3-point shot that gave Merrill Lynch/Nike its first lead at 80-79. Merrill Lynch/Nike hung on to pull out a 116-101 win, increasing its record to 2-0.

Hawkeye forward Reggie Evans said Sonderleiter hurt his ankle in the weight room earlier this week, but he's confident the sophomore will return to Prime Time action June 25. Ex-Clinton Community College player Steven Harris scored 27 points and had 11 boards for Fitzpatrick's. Josh Kimm finished with 15 points, and Iowa newcomer Pierre Pierce and ex-Hawkeye Jason Price both scored 16 points. No. 1 draft pick Dave Kruse, a Swedish professional player, and Monte Jenkins were the only other players for Merrill Lynch/Nike to score in double figures. Jenkins poured in 20 points and 13 rebounds, and Kruse finished with 11 points and 5 boards.

## Woods' rebound halted

■ Rain suspended play at the Buick Classic.

HARRISON, N.Y. — Rain got the best of Tiger Woods on Thursday in the Buick Classic, limiting him to only two shots on the waterlogged Westchester Country Club course.

Woods, coming off a disappointing 12th-place finish in the U.S. Open, came up short on the par-3 first hole, chipped within a few feet of the cup, and marked his ball as the first of a series of downpours halted play.

Despite several false starts, Woods and the other players on the course Thursday afternoon did not play again. One last heavy shower at 6:30 p.m. persuaded tour officials to finish the first round this morning. More rain is forecast for today and Saturday.

Scott Hoch, who finished 16 holes, was the leader at 4 under. Gabriel Hjertstedt, who also finished 16 holes, was at 3 under with Mark Wiebe, who played 15 holes, and Brian Watts, who played 14.

Six players were at 2 under, including three — Brad Faxon, Justin Leonard, and Corey Pavin — who were among the 37 golfers who finished their rounds.

Fifty-seven players didn't get on the course. They included David Duval, the runner-up to Dennis Paulson in last year's tournament, Vijay Singh, Paul Azinger, Fred Couples, Nick Faldo, and Ben Crenshaw.

Hoch said he made some good early saves in a five-birdie round. His lone bogey came on No. 4, his 13th hole of the day, when he three-putted from the fringe. He was on the eighth green in regulation and had only the easy par-5 ninth hole to play to complete his round.

"I was hoping we'd finish up," he said.

The start-and-stop nature of play during rainy weather can tax golfers, Hoch said.

"Mentally, you've got to be prepared to play, and that might be tougher than the part about loosening up," Hoch said. "The way this tournament is going to be, there's probably going to be a number of stoppages during this week."

## Dingers just keep coming for Barry Bonds

■ The slugger hit his 38th homer of the year Wednesday night.

SAN FRANCISCO — Each time Barry Bonds steps to the plate, the crowd rumbles and roars to life. With every powerful swing of his bat, stadiums sparkle with camera flashes and echo with shouts of anticipation.

It's only June, but baseball fans already sense history in the making. Bonds, the San Francisco Giants' veteran slugger, is hitting home runs at the fastest pace ever.

Just three years after Mark McGwire hit 70 homers to break Roger Maris' hallowed 37-year-old record in a summer that captivated the nation, Bonds' incredible start to the season has fans thinking that the moody but supremely talented star can become the new home-run king.

On Wednesday night in San Diego, Bonds hit his 38th homer of the season, breaking the major league record for homers before the midseason All-Star break. Bonds has 532 homers in his career, but he

has never had such a power surge — and even he doesn't know what's got into him in his 16th season.

"I can't explain what's happening out there," Bonds said. "I can understand the public's fascination with this, but I can't understand it. I've never seen anything like this."

Bonds, who got a well-earned day off Thursday, needs 33 homers in the Giants' final 90 games to beat McGwire.

Bonds has been cautious about his quest, saying he can't imagine beating McGwire's mark.

"Not a chance," he told the *San Francisco Chronicle* after slugging No. 38. "I'm not Mark McGwire. I'm just not that powerful a hitter."

McGwire says it's premature to talk unless Bonds reaches 60 homers in September.

Such caution doesn't diminish the amazing feats Bonds

already has accomplished this season, however.

Bonds hit five homers in two games earlier this season in Atlanta. Last week, he hit the longest homer ever at the Giants' Pacific Bell Park, which is regularly packed with sellout crowds cheering his every move. His surge has fans across the country rushing outside for their morning newspaper or logging on to the Internet to see whether Bonds homered last night.

"I've been to five games this year, and Barry hit a homer at three of them," Jason Riggings, a stockbroker from Pleasanton who commandeered his firm's tickets twice during San Francisco's last homestand. "It's almost weird, the way he's hitting so many. Every night, you wonder what his next trick is going to be."

Bonds practically grew up in major league clubhouses while his father, Bobby, hit 332 home runs as a speedy outfielder with several clubs. The elder Bonds doesn't want to speculate whether his son can do it.

But there's a growing opinion that Barry Bonds has what it takes to surpass one of baseball's most celebrated records.

### Roth named Trib's top athlete

IOWA CITY (AP) — Iowa football recruit Matt Roth, a linebacker from suburban Chicago, has been named the *Chicago Tribune's* athlete of the year.

Roth, a 6-foot-4, 250-pounder from Willowbrook High School, earned a reputation as a ferocious tackler who hit one ball carrier so hard he knocked the guy's helmet sideways.

He was a first-team all-state selection in football, making 148 tackles, and went 31-0 as a heavyweight wrestler en route to a state championship.

"A lot of people saw him as the top recruit in the Midwest," Iowa football coach Kirk Ferentz told the *Tribune*. "Then what he did in wrestling only boosted that ranking."

"The day he said he was coming to Iowa, I was tickled pink to get him. He is the only middle linebacker we recruited."

Coaches from 56 Division I schools visited Willowbrook to see Roth. Tennessee and Georgia thought so much of his blocking that they recruited him as a fullback.

Roth moved to Iowa City right after graduation. He's spending the summer working in a construction job and lifting weights.
