

## In year of cuts, Coleman gets raise

■ The regents approve a record \$40,000 salary increase for the UI president.

CEDAR FALLS — UI President Mary Sue Coleman received a record \$40,000 raise on Thursday, bringing her salary in line with Iowa State University's new president.

The 16.8 percent raise,

unanimously approved without hesitation or discussion by the state of Iowa Board of Regents, increases Coleman's salary to \$275,000 for the fiscal year that began July 1. Coleman made \$235,410 last year.

The raise is the largest since she assumed the UI presidency at a \$190,000 salary in 1995. The figure has gradually increased by 4-6 percent every year.

Coleman's salary was set to

equal that of ISU President Greg Geoffrey, who officially assumed that job July 1. The presidents of UI and ISU have historically made the same salary.

University of Northern Iowa President Robert Koob's salary was also boosted by 16.8 percent — from \$185,470 to \$216,660.

Regents President Owen Newlin attributed the dramatic increase to the board's efforts in keeping up with the

competitive marketplace, because the regents want to avoid losing another public-university president.

Former ISU President Martin Jischke resigned from the post last summer to accept

a better-paying position as the president of Purdue University, estimated by Newlin as a \$100,000 raise.

"We can't let that happen,"

## Police bust 6 for meth

■ With the help of Cub Foods, Iowa City police made an arrest Thursday, the most recent in a string of meth-related busts.

Another tip from a local business has helped police bust an alleged methamphetamine lab, as law-enforcement officers arrested six area residents early Thursday morning for allegedly producing the drug in a Coralville hotel.

All are charged with manufacturing a Schedule II controlled substance while in possession of a firearm, a Class B Felony that carries a punishment of up to 25 years in prison. Officials say additional charges are pending in connection with what they contend they found at the Coralville Ramada Westfield Inn.

Iowa City police arrested Kenneth Emerson, 27, of Riverside, Casey Toomer, 18, of 3006 Lakeside Manor, Justin Dashner, 26, address unknown, Malanda Netser, 18, of 3006 Lakeside Manor, Joshua Bartruff, 18, of 1914 Hollywood Blvd., and Joshua Kelley, 18, of 3620 Highway 1 S.W.

At approximately 11 p.m. Wednesday, Iowa City police received a report from Cub Foods, 855 Highway 1 W., describing the purchase of what Sgt. Mike Brotherton called "a suspiciously large" amount of cold medicine.

The cold medicine purchased contains pseudoephedrine, a necessary ingredient in meth, said a statement released by the police.

"Normally, people buying cold medicine show symptoms of a cold, and they buy additional medicine with it," Brotherton said. "The store reported the incident to us because they found [Netser's] actions suspicious."

Once the report was made, police officers and narcotic investigators located the suspects involved and established surveillance as their vehicle left the grocery store, Brotherton said. Iowa City officers had help from the Johnson County Sheriff's Office and Coralville police.

Police followed the suspects' vehicle to the hotel, where the subjects allegedly entered Room 261. The subjects allegedly checked into the hotel at 11:49 p.m. Tuesday, police said. Police maintained surveillance around the area until 4:30 a.m., when three of

## Ped Mall kiosks finally set

■ ADA violations and concerns about newspapers' rights delayed the kiosks' use.

Plans to fill the Pedestrian Mall kiosks with newspapers are now underway more than a year after the kiosks were installed.

A pilot program to use the four kiosks for their one of intended purposes — newspaper-vending machines — is scheduled to be implemented by Sept. 1.

The kiosks were left unused for a year-and-a-half after the city discovered that they were not in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Some newspapers also had First Amendment questions about the vending machines.

The kiosks, which cost \$53,000 each, were initially found to be non-compliant with standards set by the ADA in January 2000; they were lowered eight

inches at no cost to the city.

In addition, some newspaper publishers were concerned that requiring their publications be distributed from a specific location would violate certain First Amendment rights, said Karin Franklin, the city director of planning. The issue was looked at before the proposal was initially made. After consideration, the city decided not to make use of the kiosks by newspapers mandatory.

Newspaper-vending space in the kiosks will be tentatively rented at an 18-month fee of \$25.

Mayor Ernie Lehman said he is glad that the original plan for the kiosks is moving forward.

"They haven't been used for what they were intended since the beginning," he said. "The current newspaper-vending machines are very unsightly and ugly. If we can provide the same service in a more attractive vending machine, I think that's good."

## County cool to Tiffin's annexation

■ The state will decide in September if the town can annex 814 acres of land west of Coralville.

Some members of the Johnson County Board of Supervisors say they oppose an 814-acre annexation proposed by the city of Tiffin that will likely gain state approval.

Supervisors also expressed dissatisfaction at their Thursday meeting with the state's lack of support in reducing urban sprawl.

The county's primary concern with the proposal is that it is not in keeping with the board's goal of maintaining agricultural land and quelling urban sprawl. Some of the land included in the annexation is not part of the county's fringe-area agreement with Tiffin. Tiffin plans to develop

low-density housing in a large portion of the area.

"It's an area that will eventually be annexed," said Supervisor Pat Harney. "It's just a matter of who gets it."

The state, which will ultimately decide whether to proceed with the annexation, does not have an established stance on urban sprawl.

"[The county zoning department doesn't] have the tools on

## House passes charity measure

■ The bill is approved despite critics' contention that it would allow discrimination.

WASHINGTON — In a victory for President Bush, the Republican-controlled House approved legislation Thursday expanding the role of religious charities in federal social programs. Opponents complained vociferously the bill would preempt state and local anti-discrimination laws.

The 233-198 vote represented a down payment on Bush's campaign pledge to "rally the armies of compassion" to attack the nation's societal ills. The bill faces an uncertain future in the Democratic-controlled Senate, although supporters pledged to press for a vote this fall.

House passage was largely along party lines after a debate punctuated by an unusual moment in which one Democrat gently upbraided members of his own party for pushing away people of faith. "Sometimes, we almost ... put out a sign that says, 'You're not welcome in our party,'" said Rep. Tony Hall, D-Ohio.

"Faith heals, faith renews, faith gives the hope that this country needs," said Rep. Charles Pickering, R-Miss., before passage, which came after a one-day delay prompted by objections from GOP rebels. "Our president has called on us to remove the hindrances ... to the faith-based approach."

But Rep. Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., said her Catholic education "has taught me to oppose discrimination in every form ... The problem is that today this House will vote to legalize discrimination as we minister to



# Harkin wants probe of troubled clinic

■ The U.S. senator responds to accusations of mismanagement in an Ottumwa health center.

OTTUMWA, Iowa — Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, said Thursday he has asked the Department of Health and Human Services to investigate allegations of safety problems at the River Hills Community Health Center.

"I'm very concerned about this," he said. "As you know, I've been a strong supporter of community health centers and worked very hard to get the River Hills one in Ottumwa up and running."

The health center, subsidized with federal funds, opened in November 2000 to

serve uninsured and underinsured patients. Its nurses see approximately 25 patients a day; patients who require a doctor's care are referred to a local physician.

Staff members complained to Harkin's office earlier this year that the clinic had no procedure for cardiac arrest, that the staff was not certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and that there were no regulations to prevent the spread of blood-borne pathogens. The complaints were forwarded in April to the Iowa-Nebraska Primary Care Association, Harkin aides said.

Dan Brachman, the clinic's executive director, said such safety programs are currently in place. He believes the complaints were made just after the clinic opened in November, when procedures were

being implemented.

"That's what you find in the start-up of any new business, and that's what we were," he said Thursday.

Paul Mackey, a nurse practitioner who serves as clinical director, said administrators were making decisions that affected medical care.

"They're the ones that are making all the decisions that affect what we do back here," he said. "It would range from things like, they did scheduling of the patients, which is a nightmare ... For a long time, they had me on a 10-minute cycle. Six [patients] an hour."

Mackey said he asked a local group for a donation to buy an EKG machine. When the money came, administrators put it in a passbook savings account.

"No one listens to a nurse," he said. "It doesn't matter what I say, what I do, what documentation I present."

Mackey is suing the clinic and Brachman, alleging breach of contract. His lawsuit, filed last month, contends that the center failed to pay wages, production incentives, and health insurance.

"I can't comment on that," Brachman said.

Last week, the rest of the nursing staff resigned.

"We've been lied to and constantly treated poorly by the executive director and the financial director," said Lisa Ridge, a registered nurse who resigned.

She and the others said they had been denied promised evaluations and raises and that management frequently circulated "nasty and

blaming" memos.

"We've asked the board to help resolve these issues and received no response," she told the *Ottumwa Courier*.

Brachman said replacements — a registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, and a medical assistant — already have been hired.

He said he really doesn't know what led to resignations.

"I really don't know. I still don't have an answer myself. There have been allegations made, and I am not going to comment on the allegations, but the staff has not been forthcoming on what led to this," Brachman said.

Mackey said he was unaware of any replacements, but he said the nurses had been straightforward about their complaints.

# Coalition pushes to restore wetlands fund

■ Environmentalists and farmers band together in an ad campaign to stop a spending plan proposed by President Bush.

DES MOINES — A coalition of environmental and farm groups are trying to persuade the U.S. Senate to restore funding for a program giving farmers incentives to restore wetlands.

"There is a huge backlog on this," said Chris Petersen of the Iowa Farmers Union. "This is common-sense funding."

The groups announced a new television campaign Thursday at a Statehouse news conference in which they previewed a television commercial that will begin airing in key Midwestern states this weekend.

"America's farmers have been protecting wildlife by protecting wildlife habitat," the commercial says, warning that a spending plan proposed by President Bush and approved by the House eliminates funding for wetlands protection.

The commercials will air in Iowa, Wisconsin, Florida, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Illinois. Florida was included with the other farm states because wetlands preservation has been a huge issue in the state, supporters said.

"It is incredibly short-

sighted for the administration and House appropriators to ignore the thousands of farmers waiting at the gates to make room for wildlife on their land," said Brett Hulsey of the Sierra Club's Midwest Office.

There are a series of programs involved in the dispute, but all call for payments to farmers who agree to take fragile land out of production, allowing them to return it to natural wetlands condition.

Sierra Club official Charlie Winterwood said the issue is particularly important in Iowa because 89 percent of the state's original wetlands areas have been lost.

He noted that much of north central Iowa is wetland, with farming made possible only by drilling agricultural drainage wells, which open a direct path for pollution to flow into the groundwater supplies.

He said farmers have a strong conservation ethic and are willing to participate if granted incentives.

"There are many more farmers who are willing to participate," Winterwood said.

There are a backlog of proposals that would allow 1 million acres to be restored as wetlands, he said.

The wetlands also could save money that goes out for disaster assistance, because they are a natural form of flood control, Winterwood said.

# Pedestrian struck on Highway 6

A local man was in critical condition at the UI Hospitals and Clinics after he was struck by a car in Iowa City early Thursday morning.

David A. Parisien, 48, of Iowa City was walking northbound on Highway 6 near the CRANDIC railroad tracks when Iowa City resident Heidi Smith, 25, allegedly struck him.

Smith was traveling westbound on the outside lane when the accident occurred. The victim had probably already crossed three lanes of traffic before being struck, said Sgt. Mike Brotherton.

Neither police nor the hospital could specify the injuries Parisien sustained.

Preliminary police reports alleged that Parisien had been drinking before the accident occurred and that the driver could not have avoided hitting him, Brotherton said. Police did not perform a blood-alcohol test on Parisien because of his condition, Brotherton said, adding that officers simply smelled alcohol on his breath.

According to the police reports, Smith was not speeding and is not at fault for the accident. Parisien was wearing dark clothing when he was struck.

Smith was cited for not having a current insurance card in the vehicle, but no other charges were filed, Brotherton said.

# Man accused of sexual assaults missing

The man accused of sneaking into the women's locker room at the UI Field House on several occasions is once again missing, according to court documents released Thursday.

The Johnson County District Court issued a warrant for Antonio Foster's arrest Tuesday in connection to his disappearance.

In a letter to Assistant Johnson County Attorney Anne Lahey, the Department of Correctional Services stated that Foster, who was under pretrial supervision, left his Coralville residence Monday; he had not responded to work since June 14.

Foster, 29, had initially turned himself in late May to face charges of assault with intent to commit sexual abuse, assault causing injury, second-degree burglary, indecent exposure, criminal trespass, and failure to appear on a drunken-driving charge.

According to police records, Foster hid behind some lockers near the women's shower at the Field House on April 10. Foster is also accused of pushing a woman near her buttocks April 11. On April 12, Foster allegedly sexually assaulted a female housekeeper at the Coralville Motel 6.

Foster is described as a 6-foot, 175-pound black male. Anyone with information regarding his whereabouts should contact Coralville police at 354-1100.

# Commission approves land for subdivisions

The Iowa City Planning and Zoning Commission approved the rezoning and development of two plots of land totaling approximately 50 acres.

Dean Oakes of Oakes Construction submitted an application for the rezoning of 30 acres from rural-residential to low-density single-family residential. Oakes plans on developing the area into an 18-lot residential subdivision.

Southgate Development Co. was given the green light to develop nearly 21 acres into an 18-lot subdivision located at the north end of Kennedy Parkway.

The commission deferred an application submitted by Saltzman Enterprises LTD for the redevelopment of three acres of land located east of Riverside Drive and south of Benton Street. The land includes Payless Shoes and the Ground Round. Commission members said they were concerned about the Ground Round's existing driveway. The area has been the site of numerous accidents because it is close to the mouth of Sturgis Corner Drive, commission members said.

Bob Miklo, the city's senior planner, said that the city would like to see a new entry for the parking lot built north of the existing driveway and closer to Payless.

"We strongly believe that action was taken in utter disregard of patients' health and potentially of life," Hopkins Medical School spokesman Joann Rodgers said. The school said the effect could be devastating for ongoing clinical

# UC opens up admissions

■ The University of California approves new standards to increase minority enrollment.

SAN FRANCISCO — Six years after doing away with affirmative action, the University of California approved a new admissions policy Thursday that could open the door wider for blacks and Latinos and give a boost to good students from bad high schools.

Starting in 2003, California students who graduate in the top 12.5 percent of their high school class can be sure of a place at the University of California — though some may have to go to community college first.

Currently, UC guarantees admission to the top 4 percent of each of the state's high schools.

Under the new policy, students who fall between the top 4 percent and 12.5 percent of

their class will have to go to community college for their first two years.

The UC Board of Regents approved the new standard in a 14-3 vote, effective for the fall of 2003.

Among those voting for the change, though with reservations because of "too many unknowns," was Ward Connerly, the regent who led the fight to drop affirmative action.

UC has 135,000 undergraduates at eight campuses.

The new program, known as "dual admissions," could increase enrollment of blacks, Latinos, and American Indians, whose numbers have declined at the top campuses — particularly prestigious Berkeley and UCLA — since UC dropped affirmative action in 1995.

"There are still students in this state who need someone to believe in them," said Tracy Davis, the student representative to the Board of Regents.

"What we are, hopefully, doing with this proposal is creating

an opportunity, a glimmer of hope."

Dual admissions is the latest in a series of changes to UC admissions policy. At the same time, UC President Richard Atkinson is proposing eliminating the SAT I as an admissions requirement, a test that Latino and black students tend to score lower on than whites and Asian Americans.

UC is keeping its overall admissions policy, which is to take the top 12.5 percent of all students statewide.

What is different about the new eligibility guarantee is that it applies to individual schools — a change meant to help students who go to schools that are ill-equipped, overcrowded, or have no college prep courses.

Earlier this year, UC extended eligibility to the top 4 percent of students in individual high schools.

UC has a long-standing commitment to accept all eligible students at one of its eight undergraduate campuses,

though students may not necessarily get into the campus of their choice.

The regents made it a condition of approval that UC officials review several issues, including raising the required grade-point average in community college from the current minimum of 2.4.

UC officials estimate that up to 36 percent of the students eligible under dual admissions would be black, Latino, or American Indian. Those groups made up 18.6 percent of the fall 2001 freshman class; recent census figures show they represent approximately 40 percent of the state population.

At the American Association of Community Colleges in Washington, President George Boggs enthusiastically endorsed the plan.

"It gives students the assurance that they can get into UC by coming into the community college and doing well in the community college, and that's exactly what we need," he said.

# France extradites longtime fugitive

■ Ira Einhorn will be tried again for the 1977 slaying of his then-girlfriend.

CHAMPAGNE-MOUTON, France — French police took convicted murderer Ira Einhorn from his home in this southwestern village Thursday, speeding him away to waiting American officials for the trip home to the United States.

The extradition was an end to two decades of flight for the 61-year-old former antiwar activist and counter-culture figure, who was convicted in absentia of the bludgeoning death of his girlfriend, Holly Maddux, in 1977. He faces a new trial in Pennsylvania.

Einhorn was led outside, an officer holding each arm, and bundled into an unmarked gray Peugeot. Seated in the back, he waved through the window to his wife, Annika, who leaned on a defense lawyer for support. The convoy then left, and Einhorn's lawyer said he would be taken to Charles de Gaulle airport just outside Paris.

The developments came after the European Court of Human Rights, based in Strasbourg, France, dropped its request that France postpone the extradition. The court ruled that Einhorn's medical condition was satisfactory — he had slit his throat in protest last week — and that U.S. officials had provided assurances he would not face the death penalty.

It took only a few hours for France to decide to go ahead with the extradition.

"He gathered together his belongings," said lawyer Dominique Delteil, standing

outside Einhorn's converted windmill home. "I think in some way he expected it. On the other hand, I think he still had hope."

After the court's ruling, Einhorn had emerged briefly with his wife, her arm draped around his shoulder. "I'm innocent," he declared. "I will be happy to go to the U.S. if the court gives me a new trial."

A 1998 Pennsylvania law provided for a retrial, and U.S. officials promised that Einhorn would not be eligible for the death penalty because capital punishment was not legal in that state at the time of the crime. EU countries generally refuse to extradite suspects who face the death penalty.

In a move that confused lawyers, the European court also said it would still consider Einhorn's case in September, and it asked France for more details on the guarantees of a new trial. However, a court spokeswoman, Emma Hellyer, told the Associated Press: "That has nothing to do with the extradition."

France had been preparing to extradite Einhorn last week but agreed to wait a week until the European court examined the case.

Earlier Thursday, Einhorn told AP that if he lost the appeal, he would go peacefully.

"If there is to be any transfer, we want it to be totally peaceful," he said by telephone. "Nobody is going to be hurt."

Asked if he might repeat the self-inflicted violence of last week, when he slit his throat after losing his last French appeal, he laughed. "Oh, I really do doubt that," he said. He suffered no serious injury, though his throat remains bandaged.

# Missile plan a tough sell, Bush says

■ The president concedes that his missile proposal is a "vague notion."

HALTON, England — President Bush said Thursday he is having a hard time selling a missile-defense plan to skeptical allies in Europe because he has only "vague notions" about what it would entail. Bush also bristled at criticism of his climate-change policy.

"Our strategy must make sure working people in America are not thrown out of work," Bush said at a joint news conference with British Prime Minister Tony Blair. Their meeting, the second of Bush's presidency, underscored how much divides the United States and its closest allies.

Though the two leaders papered over their differences, the session at the prime minister's 436-year-old retreat served as a preview of thorny issues awaiting Bush when he travels today to Genoa, Italy, for a

three-day summit of the world's wealthiest nations, plus Russia.

His fellow leaders plan to challenge Bush's positions on missile defense, global warming, genetically produced food, and other topics.

With Blair at his side, Bush said the landmark 1972 Antiballistic Missile Treaty forbids the United States from even testing a potential system — let alone settling on a shield and deploying it.

"Therein lies part of the dilemma for the prime minister. He said, 'What do you want me to support? What are you proposing?'" Bush said, offering an unusually candid assessment of one ally's doubts about his missile-system plans.

"It's hard for any country to commit to vague notions," Bush said.

Tens of thousands of protesters were expected in the Italian port city for the latest international gathering of demonstrators loosely grouped under the banner of the antiglobalization movement.

In a direct challenge to pro-

testers, who White House aides fear will overshadow the summit, Bush said, "For those who want to shut down trade, I say to them as clearly as I can: You're hurting poor countries. For those who want to use this opportunity to say the world should become isolationist, they're condemning those who are poor to poverty."

Bush himself was accused of fostering U.S. isolationism; Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., told USA Today that the president was driving a wedge between the United States and its allies. The president fired back.

"We're not retreating within our borders," he said during a tour of the British Museum. "I happen to believe missile defenses is (sic) important to keep the world more peaceful, and I believe we need to work together to reduce greenhouse gases. But I refuse to accept a treaty that will harm our country's economy."

White House spokesman Ari Fleischer called Daschle's remarks "unseemly," a break from the traditional foreign-

policy truce while the U.S. president is overseas. Senate Republican leader Trent Lott complained, "Politics stop at our nation's borders. And certainly politics stop when the president is abroad." Daschle later said he could have picked a better time to make his point.

As sightseer in chief, Bush toured the musty warren where Winston Churchill directed Britain's defenses against Nazi Germany and had lunch with Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace.

Aides said they hoped the photographs would soften media coverage of the president's contentious dealings

# Hopkins cut off after research death

■ The leading medical school in federal research funds loses its money.

BALTIMORE — The government has suspended federally funded research on human subjects at Johns Hopkins University following the death of a healthy volunteer during an asthma experiment, the school said Thursday.

The move comes just three days after the university suspended human research by the doctor whose experiment went awry in June, causing the death of 24-year-old Ellen Roche.

Officials with the federal Office of Human Research Protection did not immediately return a call seeking comment. Hopkins called the agency's decision "unwarranted, unnecessary, paralyzing, and precipitous."

"We strongly believe that this action was taken in utter disregard of patients' health and potentially of life," Hopkins Medical School spokeswoman Joann Rodgers said. The school said the effect could be devastating for ongoing clinical trials.

Hopkins receives more federal research dollars than any other medical school — \$301 million last year, making it No. 1 for the ninth-straight year.

The university has acknowledged full responsibility for Roche's death June 2 and suspended 10 projects led by Dr. Alkis Togias. Togias remains on staff and faces no other disciplinary action.

Medical-school officials said Roche likely died from inhaling the drug hexamethonium, which restricts airways.

Hexamethonium was used widely as a tablet in the 1940s and '50s to treat hypertension, but the Food and Drug Administration later withdrew its approval. It never was approved as an inhalant, which was the way it was used in the Hopkins study, the FDA said.

Earlier this month, a preliminary federal report said researchers should have sought FDA approval for experimental use of hexamethonium.

Togias' study was funded by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, a division of the National Institutes of Health. It was intended to help doctors

learn how the body fights asthma by inducing asthmatic symptoms in healthy lungs.

Roche, a lab technician in the Johns Hopkins Asthma and Allergy Center, was one of three subjects who inhaled hexamethonium. The first developed a cough lasting a week. The third had no symptoms.

Roche also began coughing and died a month later while hospitalized.

An internal review was mixed on whether Togias should have stopped the experiment after the first subject developed symptoms.

The panel noted that existing information about the danger of the drug wasn't published in the research subject-consent forms, but it said disclosing the information may have had little effect on the outcome.

The report stopped short of blaming Togias for Roche's death and said the experiment was well-supervised.

On Monday, the university said it is imposing additional supervision on the hundreds of studies it conducts each year. An external investigation of the fatal research is expected to begin later this month.

## NATION BRIEF

### Train fire paralyzes central Baltimore

BALTIMORE (AP) — A fire raging for a second day Thursday in a train tunnel under central Baltimore cast smoke over downtown offices, shut down the Orioles' ballpark, and burned fiber-optic cables, slowing Internet traffic across the mid-Atlantic.

Several city blocks were closed above the tunnel where a train carrying hazardous materials derailed Wednesday afternoon. Extreme heat

kept firefighters from vacuuming up spilled hydrochloric acid, and just six of the train's 60 cars had been removed from the tunnel by Thursday afternoon.

"We're told some of the boxcars are actually glowing," Fire Department spokesman Hector Torres said. "You're talking about glowing metal. I'm guessing 1,000 or 1,500 degrees."

More than 100 firefighters battled the blaze. Two were hospitalized for chest pains Wednesday.

The train was carrying wood as


well as hydrochloric acid and at least five other hazardous chemicals. But Torres said air-quality tests showed that the smoke was coming mostly from burning wood.

"Right now, there don't appear to be any toxins in the smoke, so that's a good sign," he said.

The fire caused major Internet slowdowns in the mid-Atlantic states. Fiber-optic cable running through the tunnel was damaged by the blaze, but authorities said they had not yet assessed the extent of the damage.

### FLAG-BURNING AMENDMENT RISES FROM THE ASHES ...

## To burn or not to burn?

For the fourth time in slightly less than six years, the House of Representatives has passed a constitutional amendment to protect the American flag from any form of desecration.

With a 298-125 vote, the House has paved the way for the one-sentence addition to the Constitution saying, "The Congress shall have power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States."

However, critics of the bill claim that the amendment will be shot down on this, its 19th journey through the Senate since the Bill of Rights was ratified.

America can only hope for such an outcome.

If the amendment were to win a two-thirds majority in the Senate and be approved by three-fourths of state legislatures, it would set in motion the ousting of two prior Supreme Court rulings, which have recognized flag desecration as an outlet of freedom of speech.

Free speech is condoned in this country so long as it does not harm another's existence and/or infringe on her or his respective rights. So, unless by

some freak accident in which the protester would ignite a passerby while incinerating the flag, it is unfathomable how the action of flag desecration is a violation of free speech, much less a hindrance to American society.

Patriots claim that the flag is the symbol of "freedom" and abuse of this icon is far much larger than a free-speech question.

According to the Associated Press, Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., said, "Burning a flag is a hate crime ... an expression of contempt for the moral unity of the American people."

There's a trip: Moral and unity in the same sentence in reference to the U.S. of A. Where in the world would one find a more diverse, more eclectic center of individuals,

both morally and socially?

The freedom to dissent to authority is crucial in the United States; it's part of why our forefathers fought a revolution in the first place. This country was founded on the premise of freedom — religious, speech-related, and the right to live as one chooses.

And the House wants to cast aside 225 years of being one of the most liberated nations in the world?

Because of the First Amendment, individuals are permitted to burn animals for religious purposes, as symbols of their devotion to their belief system. People burn live creatures, and Congress is concerned about the incineration of cloth?

Symbol or not, the flag represents an ideal — an ideal of freedom, which becomes further distant from society as government aims to protect mere objects. Senators: May you vote, instead, to protect the freedoms represented by Old Glory rather than the flag as a mass-produced, material entity.

## Oh, once upon a time you dressed so fine

If there's one thing we need, it's a Good Depression. Not necessarily a Great Depression, but just a little something to kick us in the pants.

An Average Depression would be sufficient.

Today, as America's 43rd president ventures into the former Yugoslav Republic of Genoa, Italy, to meet with the other big dogs on the block (it's been rumored that the Elite Eight — the United States, Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Canada, and Russia — have actually toyed with the idea of kicking two or three members out of the club in order to implement catchier team nicknames such as "the Fab Five" or "the Stupendous Six"), he would be wise to heed the common-sense words of a man who was a leader before titles such as "president" became hereditary.

Thomas Paine once said, "The more men have to lose, the less willing are they to venture. The rich are in general slaves to fear and submit to courtly power with the trembling duplicity of a spaniel." Paine was arguing at the time that the sooner the colonies separated themselves from Britain, the better, because nothing eroded a people's vitality and bravery quicker than a little financial success.

Strange as it initially sounds, I find that dialogues with fellow affluent Chicagoland suburbanites, nine times out of 10, support Paine's observations. Take one recent "political" conversation.

Me: "No, that's cool. I hang out with people who voted for Bush, too. In fact, I think it's great to talk with them, you know, to find out how people make the decisions they make."

Her: "Oh, well, I didn't actually vote for him. I just, like, supported my parents when they did."

"Whom did you vote for?"

"I didn't."

"Oh?"

"Yeah, I don't know. It takes a lot of time to follow stuff like that, and I work sometimes like 30 hours a week during the summer."

"That's a lot."

"There are other people who follow it better, too, who know whom to vote for."

"Yeah, they're called CEOs."

"What?"

"Nothing."

"Yeah, I don't know. It's just that it's not fair, I don't think, for me to get involved in things that don't really affect me, that affect other people, you know?"

No. I don't.

That is what I wanted to say. But being an affluent Chicagoland suburbanite who had just sunk all kinds of time and money into

loaf of bread and an overripe peach, the two items of food he had left in his rucksack. And he didn't ask me for reimbursement, he didn't say that I could get the next round of eats, he didn't flinch, he didn't do any of the affluent Chicagoland suburbanite things I was used to. He didn't even pause in his speech or pay attention to his own gesture, and I suspect this was because it was an automatic one.

Another fact Paine must have known: The less men have to lose, the more willing are they to share. The poor are in general servants to openness and relate to fellow citizens with the humbling intimacy of a southern Italian.

I try to refrain from romanticizing hardship too much, and, really, even a Good Depression would never have the positive effect of reminding a few key people that money and industrial nations and oil are not everything. Because it would never hit the folks it could teach the most;

depression seems to be the only truly trickle-down economic phenomenon. Or it would be if it ever touched the top.

And perhaps a few folks at the top are already getting the message, if you believe and would hold George to his promise to deliver "billions of the world's citizens from disease and hunger and want." It may be the folks like you and me at the upper-middle that the international political scene needs to worry about.

In the words of another even older and much wiser geezer than George himself, "People'd call, say, 'Beware doll, you're bound to fall,' you thought they were all kiddin' you."

The film stars Sam Neill, a veteran of the original, as Dr. Alan Grant, the überpaleontologist whose experience and savvy make him the class of his field and the unwitting subject of a convoluted plot to get him back on the dino-island that he left behind. Laura Dern, also from the first *Jurassic Park*, is back as Ellie in a minimal role. Jeff Goldblum's Malcolm is nowhere to be seen, however, leading one to theorize that he either moved on to other endeavors or was consumed by dinosaurs. It is difficult to tell.

Filling in is William H. Macy as Paul Kirby, just an ordinary

guy whose son was lost on a dinosaur-ridden island while sightseeing. To track him down, Kirby teams up with his ex-wife, Amanda (Téa Leoni), and poses as a wealthy businessman in order to bribe Dr. Grant and lure him back to the islands and assist in the search-and-rescue of the kid, Eric (Trevor Morgan). To their detriment, the plane crashes on Isla Sorna (that's Spanish for "island that you really don't want to crash on"), and the crew is left to fend off blood-thirsty beasts for the rest of the film. Yes, it's a stretch. But they had to get the dinosaurs in there somehow, because they're kind of essential to the plot. Predictably, the minor characters become dinosaur food before the viewer can even remember their names. One of the plane's crewmen was apparently known as Cooper, and he was the first to go. Cooper, we hardly knew ya. The script then stays true to Hollywood form by quickly eliminating its token black character, this time via the bonecrushing jaws of a carnivorous monster. Unfortunately, he happened to be their pilot, so the rest are left to play hide-and-seek with flesh-eating creatures without him or the plane.

The group of dinosaurs that the stranded cast confronts is a stripped-down version of the original *Jurassic Park* assortment — the friendly plant-eaters are basically gone, while the pesky human-eaters are in disturbing abundance. What a nuisance. As usual, there are the raptors (blessed with enough cranial capacity to make them smarter than dolphins and primates, according to Dr. Grant). The T-Rex is gone, meanwhile, replaced by the Spinosaurus, which is larger and even more ferocious. Uh-oh ... that spells trouble (insert ominous music here). Like the *Jurassic* series itself, this behemoth continually reappears, each time hungrier than the last.

The cast in this one displays some pleasantly non-bad acting. Macy is solid like always as a quirky Oklahoman, while Neill and Leoni show appropriate ranges of emotion for people being chased down by thunder lizards. The kid's lines, fortunately, hover safely below the corniness threshold.

The acting on the part of the dinosaurs, however, is nothing impressive — just a lot of grunting, roaring, swagging, and baring of teeth. These dinos seemingly learned their trade from the Sylvester Stallone school of acting.

The plot flatlines about halfway through, as the "hey-look-out-for-that-dinosaur"

scenes are followed by more "hey-look-out-for-that-dinosaur" scenes. In the meantime, the estranged Kirbys grow close once again, as evidenced by the pauses in which they give each other, you know, that look. It is clear that fleeing from ravenous packs of deranged velociraptors has a way of bringing couples back together. If American marriage counselors were to bring more dinosaurs to the office, the divorce rate would be reduced to nil.

As the third installment of the series, a natural concern arises that *Jurassic Park III* could and should be worse than the previous two. Traditionally, even the best trilogies start to unravel on the third effort (see *Star Wars*, *The Godfather*, and the *Look Who's Talking* saga). This one, though, holds the pace and is actually more memorable than *The Lost World* (which is

really hard to remember for some reason, even if viewed while sober). *Jurassic III* isn't bad, it isn't great, and it gives viewers what they're looking for if, in fact, blood-crazed dinosaurs are what they're looking for.

#### NBC says airing racial epithet was a 'mistake'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A racial epithet that a comedian used on "Late Night with Conan O'Brien" should have been removed from the broadcast, NBC said after an Asian-American watchdog group complained.

The joke "was clearly inappropriate, and that it was not edited by our standards and practices department was a mistake," the network said in a statement Wednesday.

"We have reviewed our procedures to ensure such an incident does not recur, and we will edit the joke out of any future repeats of the show."

On July 11, while bantering with

host O'Brien, comedian Sarah Silverman used an epithet for people of Chinese descent.

Guy Aoki, the president of the Media Action Network for Asian Americans, called the network's statement "a nice start" but inadequate.

"It's one thing for NBC to apologize on behalf of one of its shows and another for the show to address it ... I think Conan should say something happened last week that was inappropriate, and we apologize if we hurt anybody."

In asking NBC to apologize Tuesday, Aoki contended that the network would have removed a similarly offensive reference to any other ethnic group.

While UI cuts back, Coleman gets raise

Newlin said. "When we hired Geoffrey, we hired him for \$275,000."

The average UI employee will receive a 3.5 percent raise for this fiscal year.

Meanwhile, approval of Coleman's raise came the same day she sent a mass e-mail to UI students and employees, explaining the budget-cutting measures the university took in response to an \$18.7 million cut in state funds.

Regents had approved the budget-reducing plans, which include cutting 107 jobs and offering fewer courses, on Wednesday.

It is unfair for students to pay more in tuition for a lesser quality education while the university administrators continue receiving benefits, such as salary increases, UI Student Government President Nick Klenske said.

"I was pretty upset about [Coleman's salary increase], and I would think students would be upset, too," said Klenske, who attended the meeting.

Additionally, regents approved a \$22,000 renovation project at Coleman's 102 E. Church St. residence. The project involves the installation of a service elevator to transport catering carts for events and the reconstruction of a back porch.

Regents kill off early retirement

A new plan will eventually replace the Early Retirement Incentives Program.

CEDAR FALLS — Approximately 50 University of Northern Iowa faculty and staff members exited one of the school's banquet halls in displeasure Thursday, after an early retirement program they supported was effortlessly tossed out.

With little discussion, the state of Iowa Board of Regents voted to discontinue the 15-year-old Early Retirement Incentives Program.

The staff and faculty members from UNI were the only employees to address the regents. Employees from the UI spoke in support of the program during a meeting last month.

The board gave each university until February 2002 to come up with a new plan. UI Staff Council President Pat Arkema said the new plan would be similar to the current one but will have fewer benefits and more challenging requirements for eligibility.

"I think a lot of them thought it was gone forever," UNI Campus Voices Chairwoman Doreen Hayek said of her angered fellow-employees. Campus Voices labored to retain the early retirement program, she said, which the regents concluded costs the state's three public universities too much money to replace employees.

"We thought [the regents would discuss it more]," Hayek said.

Arkema said she wasn't surprised about the regents' decision. She was present for the meeting, but she chose not to take the platform because she "had nothing else to say that I hadn't already said."

Under the program, eligible faculty and staff members had to be employed by one of the state institutions for at least 15 years, and they had to be at least 57 years old.

Benefits included a paid life-insurance policy of up to \$4,000 and health and dental insurance coverage until the employee was eligible for Medicare.

"We recognize the institution's point of view," Arkema said. "It is more than just 'how does this affect us personally?'"

In other action:

The regents gave the UI permission to proceed with \$10 million plans to expand the Melrose Avenue Parking Facility, located between the Field House and the Pomerantz Pavilion.

The regents approved the purchase of property at 430 N. Clinton St. to house the Shambaugh House, currently located south of Daum Residence Hall.

Survey says teen drug use up

A study finds that children in single-dad homes are most likely to be drug users.

Sixth to 12th graders who live in single-father homes are more likely than others to use drugs, according to a survey released Thursday.

The survey, done by a division of an Atlanta-based anti-drug organization, also found that high schoolers' use of such drugs as heroin, Ecstasy, and marijuana increased — reversing a three-year decline in overall drug use.

Meanwhile, cigarette and alcohol use dropped to a 13-year low. The survey was conducted at schools that contracted with PRIDE Surveys — an arm of the Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education — to question students during the 2000-01 academic year.

More than 75,000 students nationwide answered questionnaires anonymously, using pencils to fill in circles on a double-sided answer sheet.

This was the 14th annual survey, but officials said it was the first time their group broke down the numbers to look at children who live with their mothers only, fathers

only, and stepparents.

The survey found that 38.4 percent of students who lived only with their fathers said they used drugs. The percentages for other family structures were: father and stepmother, 31.9 percent, mother and stepfather, 29.8 percent, mother only, 28.3 percent, and both parents, 20.4 percent.

Thomas Gleaton, the president of PRIDE Surveys and head of the study, said the results aren't meant to bash fathers. "I don't want people to think, 'Oh, that means these are bad fathers,'" he said.

Rather, Gleaton believes the results are a comment on the importance of a mother's role. "The further the mother gets away, the more difficult it becomes for the child," he said.

A spokesman for a group that lobbies for fathers' rights said he had no problem with the survey's findings.

"This is just one more argument why — absent of abuse, neglect, or abandonment — there should be mandatory joint custody. Children need both parents," said Stuart Miller, the senior legislative analyst for the American Fathers Coalition.

A survey of teens released in February by the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University found that the risk

of drug abuse was slightly higher for children living with single moms than with single dads. It also found drug use was greatly reduced in both types of homes when the parents were "hands-on," or supervised their teen-agers and imposed rules.

In terms of drug use, the new survey found that 35.3 percent of ninth- to 12th-graders said they had used an illicit drug in the last year, compared with 34.3 percent in 1999-00.

Gleaton said the increase was statistically significant but added that he was not alarmed because a one-year increase does not necessarily point to a trend.

He did, however, note that drug use among junior-high students increased only slightly, from 13.6 percent to 13.7 percent — something he credited to focusing anti-drug campaigns on that age group.

Calling for stepped-up anti-drug campaigns at the high school level, he noted that similar efforts against drinking and cigarettes also have been successful. The survey found that 52.1 percent of all students said they had used alcohol in the last year, a low not seen since 1987-88. Cigarette use dropped to 30.5 percent, continuing a downward trend that began in 1997-98.

the needs of the poor."

In the waning moments of debate, the bill's supporters turned back a final attempt by Democrats to ban employment discrimination under federal, state, or local laws for any organization receiving government funds under the law. The vote was 234-195.

That issue led the conservative Family Research Council to claim that the bill was "in danger of being hijacked by homosexual groups." The council said it would abandon its support for the bill if it were changed to defer to state and local laws.

In the Senate, Majority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., has not pledged to schedule debate before next year. In a reference to the dispute over discrimination, he told reporters during the day, "I can't imagine that we could pass any bill that would tolerate slipping back into a level of tolerance that would be unacceptable in today's society."

Religious charities are permitted to receive grants in a small number of federal programs under current law. The legislation would expand the list significantly to areas such as housing, domestic violence, and hunger relief.

Aid recipients would not be required to attend worship services or religious instruction, and individuals would be offered access to assistance from nonreligious organizations if they desired. The organizations themselves would be permitted to retain religious names, charters, and symbols on building walls.

In addition, the bill includes a series of tax breaks — worth \$13 billion over the next decade — to encourage charitable giving by individuals and corporations.

Taxpayers who do not itemize would be permitted to deduct \$25 in donations annually, rising to \$100 by the end of the decade.

Constitutional and financial pressures forced supporters of

the bill to water it down on its way to the House floor.

Concerns about separation of church and state led to changes that would likely prevent funds from reaching some of the religious groups that Bush often cites as examples.

Also, the tax breaks shrank from more than \$80 billion in Bush's original budget — so much so that Democrats sniped that most taxpayers would shave less than \$4 off their income taxes if they took advantage of the deduction.

Some critics complained the bill would violate the Constitution's requirement for separation of church and state.

But most of the controversy surrounded claims the bill would erode federal protections against discrimination in hiring, and more prominently, pre-empt state and local laws on the subject.

Supporters said religious organizations needed to retain their essential character and should be permitted to take religious views into account in hiring. They noted that Congress granted them an exemption from anti-discrimination provisions in the land-

mark 1964 civil-rights law.

Critics said the introduction of federal funds dramatically changed the situation. "This bill would allow them [churches] to discriminate with federal funds," said Rep. Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y.

Several Republicans expressed concern about the pre-emption, causing a decision by the leadership on Wednesday to delay a vote on the bill. In a scripted exchange on the House floor, Rep. J.C. Watts of Oklahoma, a leading supporter of the bill and a member of the GOP leadership, pledged to address the issue during House-Senate negotiations on a final compromise.

Rep. Mark Foley, R-Fla., and others who had raised the issue, voted in favor of the bill, although Foley was one of four GOP lawmakers to support the Democratic bid to restore the supremacy of state and local anti-bias laws.

The bill had the support of 217 Republicans, 15 Democrats — many of them Southern conservatives — and one independent. There were 193 Democrats, four Republicans, and one independent in opposition.

the six subjects returned to their vehicle.

They allegedly left their room because "they ran out of anhydrous ammonia and went to get more nearby," Brotherton said, adding that he did not know where the group was planning to obtain it.

After the subjects left, police entered the room and discovered trace amounts of methamphetamine with pipes from a lab in the bathtub and a handgun in a consent search. Police stopped the vehicle and turned up other meth ingredients and several more handguns, Brotherton said.

A similar incident at Cub Foods occurred June 22, when two Iowa City men purchased

six boxes of medicine allegedly for a meth operation. In March, Iowa City residents Tammy Koehn and Michael Dooley were charged for reportedly making a similar purchase at the Wal-Mart Supercenter in Coralville.

All six subjects allegedly involved in yesterday's incident are in the Johnson County Jail, each on \$130,000 bond.

Kiosks set to go after long wait

Lehman also said he is concerned that disputes over available space in the kiosks may become an issue between newspapers.

"I think there are certain [locations] of the kiosks that may not be as accessible as others ... [for instance] the kiosk located at the library may be less desirable, because not as much traffic goes through there."

A recent memorandum issued by the city manager

states that any newspaper interested in placing its publication in a kiosk should submit a proposal for the use of a specific location. A lottery would be used in the event that there is competition among newspapers for a certain location, the memorandum said.

Although some city councilors said they are satisfied with the kiosks, others say the \$212,000 total that was spent on the four vending/payphone stations may have been too much.

Councilor Mike O'Donnell said he hopes the kiosks will be widely used by publications

and readers. "I hope its [effect is] positive," he said. "If not, it seems like an incredible waste of money."

Putting the kiosks to public use is long overdue, he said.

"We decided to build a Ped Mall 25 years ago, and I think it's unreasonable to think that we would never have to put any money into it to improve it," O'Donnell said. "I can't really say I was a big proponent of the kiosks ... but they're there. Let's just hope that everybody enjoys them."

County unhappy with annexation

the state level to continue pursuing its goals for planned community development and growth," said Supervisor Sally Stutsman.

It is likely that the state board will approve the annexation because Tiffin has "dotted all the i's and crossed all the t's" as far as Iowa Code is concerned, said R.J. Moore, the assistant administrator of the county Planning and Zoning Department.

Tiffin's proposal will be reviewed by the state board at a public hearing on Sept. 13. In the meantime, supervisors will meet with Tiffin, North Liberty, Iowa City, and Coralville city officials to work on a unified

plan of development that will address the needs of each municipality.

The annexation would limit the expansion of Coralville to the west. With Iowa City located to the south and east of the city and North Liberty to the north, Coralville may become boxed in with little room to grow.

Coralville city officials have previously voiced opposition to the annexation. However, Tiffin presented new material to the state board last week that Coralville officials had not seen, said Kevin Olson, a Coralville assistant city attorney. Coralville is therefore waiting to review the new material before taking a public stance either for or against the annexation, he said.

"The city is just looking at

options right now," Olson said. "[Coralville administrators] will make a decision as time for the hearing approaches."

Tiffin's population is projected to reach 1,500. The annexation would give the city room to expand, creating a larger tax base that would increase revenues for such public services as fire protection and water treatment. Residents of the area to be annexed would become citizens of Tiffin and would pay the city's property taxes.

However, residents may not receive amenities such as sewer and water service for quite some time, although they would be paying taxes for such services, a concern raised by some supervisors.







# Armstrong happy as he heads to Pyrenees

■ He will soon be the father of twin girls.

PERPIGNAN, France — Heading into the Pyrenees for what should be the decisive final mountain stages of the Tour de France, Lance Armstrong had three reasons to be a very happy man.

First, he was on course for title No. 3, after a stunning performance in the Alps that left his rivals in awe and in despair.

Second and third, he will soon be the father of twin girls.

Armstrong found out the twins' sex after his triumph in the mountain time-trial at Chamrousse. His wife, Kristin, brought him an envelope containing ultrasound test results, and they opened it together.

"I didn't expect two girls," Armstrong said. "The easy

expectation is one boy, one girl. My second expectation was two boys.

"It's a beautiful surprise. Perfect."

Armstrong already is the father of toddler Luke. A survivor of advanced testicular cancer, he underwent treatments that made him sterile but banked his sperm beforehand. His wife, who is due to give birth in December, became pregnant through in vitro fertilization.

Armstrong had a day to dwell on the good news before the next stage of his title campaign.

On Thursday, the first of two rest days during the three-week Tour, riders were flown from Grenoble, at the foot of the Alps, to this southwestern city close to the Pyrenees.

Armstrong was photographed and filmed by TV cameras for much of the flight,

but smiled and looked relaxed in the company of rival teams and reporters.

Stepping off the plane, he briefed journalists on his plans for the rest of the day: "Ride, eat, and sleep."

The race resumes today with a 103.4-mile stretch from Perpignan to Ax-les-Thermes, 4,538 feet high in the Pyrenees. The next two stages, ending at Pla d'Adet and Luz-Ardiden, are similarly difficult mountain legs.

"Pla d'Adet is the hardest of the three," Armstrong said. "The hardest, the longest, with the most climbs. But Luz-Ardiden is also a dangerous day."

The principal danger for Armstrong is possible fatigue left over from the Alps, where he won at L'Alpe d'Huez and Chamrousse. He claimed similar mountain wins to spark his two title charges.

"You can only do efforts like that so many times in a three-

week race," he said. "The last two Tours, there's been a pattern: Sestrieres, Hautacam. But at some point in those Tours, I paid the price."

"This year, having done big efforts, I have to be very aware that there's a chance that I could pay the price again."

For now, he has a margin of error. He is third overall, but François Simon — who holds the leader's yellow jersey — and second-place Andrei Kivilev are not expected to do well in the remaining mountain stages.

He leads his main rival, Germany's Jan Ullrich, by 3 minutes, 34 seconds, a big advantage.

If Armstrong can extend his lead in the mountains, he is almost certain to win the Tour for the third time in a row. The six stages after the Pyrenees are unlikely to see much change in the standings, barring sickness or accidents.

## Majerle returns to team that drafted him

PHOENIX (AP) — Dan Majerle never made a secret of his desire to return to Phoenix, his first NBA team. He accomplished his goal Thursday when he signed a one-year contract with the Suns.

The 13-year veteran accepted the \$1 million salary the Suns were able to offer a player with 10 or more years of tenure. The contract counts \$590,000 against the salary cap.

"I'm not the same player that was six or seven years ago, but I believe that I can go out there and still compete, and play well, and enough to help teams win," Majerle said. "We'll see how this year goes and hopefully, it'll be a good return for me."

Sun Woo Kim replaced Arrojo in the third.

The Red Sox are already without injured starters Pedro Martinez and Frank Castillo. Shortstop Nomar Garciaparra, center fielder Carl Everett, and catcher Jason Varitek are also on the disabled list.

## Smoltz coming back to Braves as reliever

GREENVILLE, S.C. — With just two innings under his belt in the minor leagues, John Smoltz is

ready to rejoin the Atlanta Braves.

Only this time, he's coming back as a reliever.

Smoltz felt so good after back-to-back appearances in Greenville that he scuttled plans to pitch again today for the Double-A team.

The Braves are hoping to activate him for Sunday's game against the Montreal Expos, assuming the elbow feels OK over the next two days.

Manager Bobby Cox, speaking after the first-place Braves defeated Cincinnati, 2-1, on Thursday, said Smoltz is ready to pitch again in the majors.

"Right now," Cox said. "He's fine."

one point, Mickelson was 3 under through 13 holes and had only three pars.

Two guys who nearly had to withdraw with bad backs — Ernie Els and Bernhard Langer — joined Woods with 71s.

Still, the deep rough and 196 bunkers at Royal Lytham inflicted their share of damage.

Fred Couples, playing with Montgomerie, was at 3 under until his approach plugged against the side of a bunker on No. 14. It took him four shots to get out — one left-handed, one backward, and two more after that. He took triple bogey and finished at 71.

After taking an unplayable lie from the rough on No. 11, Jim Furyk wound up in the sand. His next shot bounced off the face of the bunker and came back to hit him, a two-stroke penalty. He made 10, and wound up with a 77.

U.S. Open champion Retief Goosen played the last five holes in 5 over for a 74. Nick Faldo went from 3 under to 2 over in a span of four holes and had 75.

"It's difficult to keep smiling," Ian Woosnam said after a 72. "It's just hard work."

The biggest smile belonged to Montgomerie.

He always thought his best chance to win a major would be the U.S. Open or PGA Championship because of the premium on accuracy, and the

38-year-old Scot has lost a playoff in each of them.

The British Open never came to mind.

Montgomerie has missed the cut in five of his last nine Opens, and had he gone 11-straight rounds without breaking 70. His best position after the first round was a tie for 11th at Carnoustie in 1999, when he shot 74.

"I can't believe he hasn't done this earlier," Jesper Parnevik said. "This should be the perfect tournament for him. But he definitely has the ability. Everyone knows that."

Montgomerie's previous best round was a 5-under 65 in the third round at Turnberry in 1994, but all that did was let him sneak off with his only

top-10 finish in golf's oldest championship.

"To score this is a real bonus for me," he said. "I will be a lot more confident standing on the first tee tomorrow than I was today, knowing that I can do it."

Woods got off to a great start, making an 18-foot birdie putt on the opening hole and giving himself a 12-foot chance on the second hole that just missed.

That was as good as it got.

He failed to birdie any of the par 5s — one of them could have been reached with a 3-wood and a wedge had he not gone into the rough. He missed six fairways and found five bunkers, which is five more than he played from last year when winning at St. Andrews by eight strokes to complete the Grand Slam.


"No doubt — I'll be 100 percent ready," he said. "I'm just not taking any risks."

# Lights, camera, Hansen

Once America's sexiest athlete and a UI defensive back, Ryan Hansen's modeling career is taking off — but only until law school.

This time last summer, Ryan Hansen was preparing to run sprints in two-a-day practices for the Iowa football team.

This summer, he does his running in the foothills of Hollywood.

Hansen, a former defensive back for the Hawkeyes who graduated in May, is in Los Angeles looking for a little extra cash to pay for law school. That money, he hopes, will come through acting and modeling jobs he may land while he's there.

The modeling scene isn't new for the Iowa City native, however.

He and teammate Matt Stockdale posed for *Esquire* magazine last year. Hansen modeled for Abercrombie & Fitch in its 2001 summer catalogue. Also, Hansen was chosen by *People* magazine as the Sexiest Athlete in America in the fall of 2000.

After those stints in the modeling profession, he began to think that he could make some serious money doing it, so he "decided to come out to L.A. and explore what kinds of things I could do out here," he said.

Hansen thought this route up the corporate ladder would be a bit more fun than an internship at a law firm.

"At first I planned to drive across the country," he said. "But then I realized I could come out [to L.A.], make some money, and do something I may not ever get the chance to do

again. He signed with Click Modeling Agency, which also has a commercial agency appropriately called Flick.

Because he has some modeling under his belt, he decided to work on acting as well.

"I've always been interested in the arts," Hansen said. "And because I can't draw, I don't play instruments, and I can't write well, acting has been the thing I've liked to do. I took some acting classes in school and loved it."

He is now attending acting classes everyday. On some days, he spends up to seven hours at lessons on everything from memorization to script reading to workshoping and acting out scenes.

He had one "decent" job though, modeling for Young and Modern L.A. clothing for an upcoming catalogue. And a few more jobs may be coming his way. A big one is an offer from Maybelline Cosmetics for a commercial.

"I'll play the love-interest of the model wearing the cosmetics," he said.

He has also done auditions for other products, such as Wilson's Leather and for the TV show "Roswell."

He said that although he has only been called back by Maybelline, he felt good about the feedback he got during other castings. "For the Roswell one, the casting director told me he liked me a lot," he said. "I just didn't fit the part of the character."

# Montgomerie takes first round of British Open

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, England — The scowl and slumped shoulders that Colin Montgomerie usually brings to the British Open disappeared Thursday, replaced by a confident smile and legitimate hopes.

All it took was a 6-under 65 at Royal Lytham & St. Annes, capped by a 40-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole that set off a thunderous ovation he seldom hears at this major.

"It has always been catchup in the past. Now, I

seem to be in the lead," Montgomerie said. "The whole psyche of the championship changes for me."

The dynamics are different, for sure.

Montgomerie's best round and best start in 11 years of tournament at the British Open left him three strokes ahead Brad Faxon, Chris DiMarco, and former British Amateur champion Mikko Ilonen of Finland.

Better yet, he was six strokes ahead of Tiger Woods.

Woods failed to break par in the opening round at his fourth-straight tournament,

spending much of the day slashing out of the rough, getting reacquainted with bunkers, and dropping his clubs in disgust.

He signed for a 71 and figured it could have been worse.

"At least I got it around where I was at even par," Woods said. "I did not put myself out of the tournament."

Hardly anyone was a lost cause.

On a cool, breezy day that wasn't nearly as vicious as it started out, 33 players broke par and more than 80 players were no worse than 2 over.

"Tiger is only three off sec-

ond place," Montgomerie noted. "There's nothing wrong with that score at all."

David Duval, a contender in the first two majors, was in a large group at 69 that included Jesper Parnevik and two-time Masters champion Jose Maria Olazabal.

Another stroke back were Sergio Garcia, Vijay Singh and Phil Mickelson, who checked in with another wild round — back-to-back eagles, three birdies and the mistakes that have hounded him in the majors this year. At


