

UI fires back at Register's headline

David Skorton responds to a Sunday article on UI research, saying its headline and placement were inaccurate.

UI officials issued a formal response Monday to an article that ran the Sunday *Des Moines Register*, saying parts of the article were both misleading and untrue.

According to the response issued by David Skorton, the university's vice president for Research, the university calls into question both the headline — "UI faces probe over research" — and its placement as Sunday's leading story. The UI viewed the article itself, written by reporter Colleen Krantz, as mostly accurate if read in its entirety.

The article explains that the university is the subject of a government investigation into whether the university is mishandling procedures regarding research on human subjects. The newspaper stands by the story and the wording of the headline, said *Register* News Editor Gage Church.

"The story's headline and placement telegraph the newspaper's sense of the story's

importance," Skorton said. "We are deeply concerned that the *Register's* [headline and placement] imply that this story is 'breaking news' of a grave and serious nature. That is simply not true, and we wish to assure the citizens of Iowa and all enrolled in our clinical trials here that that is not the case."

Skorton said the headline is false because it implies there is an ongoing investigation of the university. The case is still technically classified as open simply because no official closure letter has been written by the Office of Human Research Protection because of a "large backlog in the federal agency," he said.

"As far as we can ascertain, closure is imminent, and there is no action pending in Washington, D.C., against the UI," Skorton said.

The *Register* is skeptical about the university's claim that the only reason the case remains open is because it has not received a letter of closure, Church said.

"That's what the UI says, but we don't know for a fact that that's the actual case," he said.

The violations that sparked citations by the Food and Drug Administration and the Office of Human Research Protections were the result of technicalities

Police arrest 2nd suspect

A second man accused of taking part in a July 20 homicide and robbery in Coralville was arrested in Keokuk, Iowa, Monday afternoon after a four-hour standoff with police.

Daniel Joseph Coop, 43, was

taken into custody at his Keokuk home. Law-enforcement officials believe Coop fled the Iowa City/Coralville area after the robbery and slaying of Iowa City resident Donald James Hebert, 76.

Coop is accused of stealing Hebert's credit card along with Bradley Joseph Hylton, 26, 2747 Second St. Apt. 6, and using the card to make purchases and ATM withdrawals totaling \$1,367.12 at Coral Ridge Mall and the Iowa City Wal-Mart. Coop has been arrested for seven counts of aiding

and abetting forgery; authorities do not know about any involvement in the homicide.

Security videos from various stores the men visited revealed their identities, police said.

Coop has been wanted since June for charges of second-degree sexual abuse and lascivious acts with a child, police said.

Keokuk police received word of Coop's whereabouts from Johnson County law-enforcement agencies

UI works to make bus use 'passable'

More than 700 UI employees are taking advantage of discounted bus-pass programs.

A \$13 million parking ramp just opened this spring in downtown Iowa City. Meanwhile, the university is moving forward with plans for a \$10 million parking addition near the UI Hospitals and Clinics.

But transportation officials hope that new programs that encourage university employees to use public transportation will deal with the "definite shortage in parking" and alleviate the need to build more very expensive parking ramps and additions.

Under a new program launched jointly by the university and Coralville last month, university employees can ride the bus to work at a discounted rate.

Commuter options

If you are a UI employee, you can purchase a bus pass for Iowa City and Coralville public transit at one of two UI Parking & Transportation offices:

- The IMU ramp is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. 335-1475.
- Hospital Ramp 2 is open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Friday. 335-8924.

So far, 115 have used the program, which mirrors what has been offered to university employees living in Iowa City since January 2000. Approximately 600 employees are taking advantage of the service in Iowa City.

"These programs are to try to encourage people to not use a car to get to work," said Michelle Ribble, the coordinator of the university's Commuter Transportation Programs. "If we get more people into alternative commuting modes, we wouldn't need as many parking lots or lots as big."

The bus programs make

From commune to Iowa City

An ISU sociology professor helped lure Dongwang Liu to Iowa from China.

Dongwang Liu left the farmland of his native China seven years ago in order to continue his studies in America. He traveled halfway around the world, far away from the soybean and peanut fields of his youth, and today finds himself in Iowa City.

"I grew up in a village in Baoding, China, about an hour south of Beijing," said Liu, the assistant director of the UI Center for Asian and Pacific Studies. "We were surrounded by flatlands. We grew corn and wheat. It was a farming community."

Liu grew up in Baoding, where he attended Hebei Province University and remained as an English instructor after graduating. At the school, he met Charles Mulford, an Iowa State University professor of sociology. Mulford encouraged Liu to

look into ISU's International Studies Program.

"I was teaching English, and I was interested in the language and the culture," Liu said. "I thought that it would be a great experience to travel and live in an English-speaking country. Plus, I wasn't that crazy about what I wanted to study in the first place."

Liu was awarded an assistantship at ISU, and arrived in Iowa in August 1994 accompanied by his wife, Yonghong Zhu. After six years at ISU, where he completed a master's degree in sociology as well as a master's in business administration, Liu was hired by the UI.

Kill stem-cell funds, pope tells Bush

The president says he'll take the pontiff's views into consideration.

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy — Pope John Paul II urged President Bush on Monday to reject research on human embryos, as Bush weighs government funding for the burgeoning science. Respectful but

noncommittal, the president said, "I'll take that point of view into consideration."

Bush said after his first face-to-face meeting with the pontiff that stem-cell research offers the prospect of huge medical advances but is fraught with "serious moral implications."

The frail 81-year-old Roman Catholic leader welcomed Bush to his summer retreat in the foothills southeast of Rome

to add his voice to the debate over one of the most momentous issues of Bush's young presidency.

The president must soon decide whether to permit federal funds for medical research on stem cells pulled from human embryos.

"A free and virtuous society, which America aspires to be, must reject practices that devalue and violate human life



In Washington, Grassley takes aim at Ecstasy

■ A bill sponsored by the Iowa Republican would provide additional funding for Ecstasy prevention.

One of Iowa's senators has introduced a bill that would help police crack down on the sale and distribution of Ecstasy, which, local officials say, more and more high-school students are using.

The Ecstasy and Club Drug Prevention Act of 2001, sponsored by Republican Sen. Charles Grassley, would fund programs to educate law-enforcement officials and young people and community-

based anti-drug efforts.

The bill will amend Section 506B(c) of Title V of the Public Health Service Act by adding the stipulation that funding priority should be given to communities that have already taken steps toward club-drug prevention. Additional funding for ecstasy research and workplace screening are also included in the bill.

Ecstasy, clinically referred to as MDMA, is a synthetic drug with hallucinogenic and stimulant properties. Research done on the effects of MDMA on the human brain have revealed that it causes significant brain damage.

"We have held detailed hearings, both this year and last year, on this very disturbing

and damaging illegal drug," Grassley said in a prepared statement. "Although there has been some good news on overall reduced youth use of illegal drugs in the United States, data ... show a notable increase in youth Ecstasy use."

Iowa City has seen some Ecstasy-related arrests, yet the severity of the situation is difficult to determine, police said. The Iowa City police drug task force does not target Ecstasy or other club drugs, such as LSD or Rohypnol, as the focal point of their efforts.

"It's hard to gauge the extent of it," said police Lt. Rick Wyss. "I do know there has been a significant increase in Ecstasy overdoses reported to the UI Hospitals and Clinics. We

know that it's prevalent in the high schools, and we have seen it downtown.

"It's not as significant a problem as methamphetamines or cocaine, but it's a problem that we are trying to address."

Some believe that the problem is reaching its apex and that the signs of such an increase have been around for some time.

"The high-school students are really talking about it," said Tonita Rios, the director of Area Substance Abuse Program of Iowa City. "They have been talking about it for some time ... It's a designer drug. I see it used in conjunction with alcohol, marijuana, and cocaine."

The program, located at

626 E. Bloomington St., provides substance-abuse counseling for adolescents, and Rios has worked with many 16-, 17-, and 18-year-old clients. The majority of individuals who claim ecstasy as their drug of choice come from the high school and collegiate communities, she said. It seems, at least to Rios' clients, that Ecstasy use is completely out of control.

"The kids who come here for treatment, they say it's a big problem," she said. "It just started getting that way this year. It's doing what a drug is supposed to do, it's getting these kids hooked. Any legislation that will help in prevention and treatment would be excellent."

3% of drivers use cell phones

■ The rate for SUV drivers is higher, says a government report.

WASHINGTON — Approximately 3 percent of Americans behind the wheel at any given daytime moment are also talking on hand-held cell phones, the government says in its first on-the-street survey of phone use in vehicles.

Rates nearly doubled outside of rush hour; they were higher among women, whites, and drivers of vans and SUVs, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said.

The survey estimates that approximately 500,000 drivers are using hand-held cell phones at any point during the day. That number excludes "hands free" headsets that some drivers use.

"We knew how many people carried phones, but we really didn't have any idea how many were using cell phones at any given time," said safety agency spokesman Rae Tyson. Similar surveys will be conducted to determine if use increases in future years, she said.

The safety-agency data collectors observed more than 12,000 vehicles at 640 intersec-

tions around the country last fall. The survey had a margin of error of 1 percentage point.

Researchers found that:

- 4.8 percent of people driving vans and SUVs used cell phones on the road.

- 1.9 percent of pickup drivers used the mobile devices.

- Women use their cell phones more than men, 3.4 percent to 2.7 percent.

- At any given time, 3.7 percent of white drivers are using cell phones, compared with 2.3 percent of black drivers and 1.7 percent of people of other races.

- Rates of cellular phone use are slightly higher in suburban areas than in rural areas, 3.4 percent compared with 3 percent respectively.

"It's an interesting observation, except it doesn't tell us if the cell phone is a contributor to crashes, and that's what's important," said AAA spokesman Mantill Williams. AAA runs a public-service campaign to encourage drivers to pull over when using their phones, but it does not support cell phone bans.

There is no reliable source of information on the role of cell phones in crashes because most accident reports do not document such use. Assessments of how dangerous cell phones are vary.

The safety agency estimates that some form of driver distraction — including talking, eating, reading, or even changing radio stations — is involved in 20 to 30 percent of all crashes.

A much-cited 1997 study in the *New England Journal of Medicine* suggested that using hand-held cell phones quadruples the chances of accidents, roughly the same as drunken driving.

But a AAA-funded study by the University of North Carolina showed driver distraction was a factor in 8 percent of 32,303 traffic accidents analyzed from 1995-99. Only 1.5 percent of drivers reported that they were using a cell phone.

Last month, New York became the first state to pass a ban on using cell phones while driving. At least a dozen localities and 23 foreign countries have established bans, and at least 39 states are considering similar laws.

The Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association estimates 119 million Americans use cell phones. A phone survey conducted by safety agency from November to January estimated that 54 percent of drivers usually have a phone in their vehicle. Seventy-three percent of those drivers said they use the phone while driving.

Labor agency may have to cut jobs

■ The state department that aids laid-off workers is struggling with budget cuts.

DES MOINES — The state's agency that helps unemployed workers find jobs is struggling with budget cuts that could force officials to reduce the agency's work force.

Like other state departments, Iowa Workforce Development must trim its budget to balance a budget shortfall. Officials are still analyzing the cuts, and they have not decided how they will make a 6 percent cut, said Jane Barkot, the agency's deputy director.

"We're still reviewing the budget, trying to maximize our resources, and redirect our staff," Barkot said. "We realize that now, with all the recent news of layoffs within state government, we are mobilizing to ensure that we have enough staff to provide the needed job staff assistance."

The agency reported last week that the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in June was 2.8 percent, compared with 2.7 percent in June 2000. The unchanging rate may come as a surprise when considering several Iowa companies and state agencies have laid off workers, said Ann Wagner, a spokeswoman for Iowa Workforce Development.

"We're definitely in a slowdown, and we've noticed that in Iowa since September 2000," she said, citing a drop-off in construction and building permits.

Such state agencies as the Department of Human Ser-

vices have laid off workers to deal with across-the-board state budget cuts.

According to the labor report, the largest job cuts made last month were in government. The number of state employees dropped from 65,400 to 59,400, a drop of 9.2 percent. Those figures were not seasonally adjusted.

Meanwhile, companies including Cedar Rapids-based road-construction equipment manufacturer Cedarapids Inc. and truck-trailer manufacturer Wabash National in Fort Dodge have announced they are laying off workers because of the sluggish economy. Despite all the layoffs in manufacturing and government, the rate remained steady.

"You have to have quite a few layoffs to budge the state unemployment rate," Wagner said.

The state economy has been able to absorb the layoffs. Wagner said most of the people left unemployed by those job cuts have found work in other sectors, including retail and transportation.

House moves to toughen FBI oversight

■ The measure would create the position of deputy inspector general to keep tabs on the agency.

WASHINGTON — The House on Monday approved the creation of a new position within the Justice Department to oversee the activities of the FBI. The action was in response to a spate of recent incidents involving the FBI, including the arrest of FBI agent Robert Hanssen on spying charges.

The position of deputy inspector general, responsible for checking up on the FBI, is established as part of a \$17.6 billion bill to authorize Justice Department programs in the fiscal year starting Oct. 1.

The FBI has come under fire because of the Hanssen spying case, its failure to turn over to lawyers all documents relating to the case of Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh, its inability to account for all its firearms and computers, and problems in the handling of the case of Los Alamos scientist Wen Ho Lee.

"These problems cry out for attention, and I believe there needs to be one person in the inspector-general's office whose sole purpose is to review FBI operations," said House Judiciary Committee Chairman James Sensenbrenner, R-Wis.

The House bill, which passed by voice vote and now goes to the Senate, adds \$10 million to the president's budget request to expand the inspector-general's office.

In the Senate, Sens. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., and Arlen Specter, R-Pa., have introduced separate legislation to create an independent FBI inspector general who would report directly to the attorney general.

The bill also establishes within the Justice Department a permanent Violence Against Women Office aimed at strengthening the government's commitment to fighting domestic violence, sexual attacks, and stalking.

In addition, it requires the Justice Department to report to Congress on use of the controversial "Carnivore" e-mail surveillance system.

Authorities would have to disclose what laws officials relied on to get the e-mail tap and show how often Carnivore

was used in espionage cases as opposed to domestic criminal activity.

Civil-liberties groups contend that Carnivore — now called DCS 1000 — can collect too much information and violate the privacy of ordinary citizens.

The portion of the bill pertaining to Carnivore was added by Rep. Bob Barr, R-Ga., a longtime Carnivore critic. House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas said it would bring more accountability to the FBI.

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

Raising the wrong bar

In an unprecedented move, on July 19, the state of Iowa Board of Regents allotted the presidents of the University of Northern Iowa and the University of Iowa, Robert Koob and Mary Sue Coleman, 16.8 percent pay increases for the 2002 fiscal year. Board members justified the move by noting that Martin Jischke had resigned from Iowa State University to take a higher paying job at Purdue University. With the increase, Koob and Coleman's salaries now fall in line with that of the new ISU president, Greg Geoffrey.

However, no made-up logic can justify such a dramatic increase in salaries for Koob and Coleman. Faced with an all-around 6 percent budget cut in the state government, the regents should consider conservation as a top priority. Rather, they have concerned themselves with remaining competitive in a very narrow market. The retention of two easily replaceable university


presidents is not nearly as important as the retention of thousands of state university graduates in the coming years. Earlier this summer, the regents eliminated all state funding for the work-study program, an arrangement that allows students to work off school-loan debt through a university department. With this eradication, many students in Iowa may not be able to afford their education and may be forced to seek the completion of their education in a state that offers its students financial assistance. Thus, Iowa's college-graduate retention rate will plummet, all in an effort to keep two lofty leaders in state.

However, the finger cannot be pointed towards just one party. While the regents con-

tinued to make senseless decisions, other state leaders, including our own Mary Sue Coleman, never offered to follow Gov. Tom Vilsack's lead and take a 6 percent pay cut; indeed, Coleman declined such action after members of the university community suggested it. While knocking on the regents' door and professing a plea for the students who will suffer at their hands, Coleman never offered her true support by bearing a small portion of the burden — 6 percent of her pre-raise salary of \$235,410, or a meager \$14,124.60.

The regents may have stifled Coleman's hypocritical cries with \$40,000, but the voice of UI students, discontented with their apparent insignificance, will perhaps — and hopefully — find unity apart from its supposed leaders and send out a cry to the regents that will drown out the sound of the checks being cashed in 101 Jessup Hall.

2nd suspect in Coralville homicide arrested

Monday morning, Keokuk Police Chief George Morgan said. Morgan did not know how police discovered information concerning Coop's location, he said. Johnson County officials could not be reached for comment Monday. When Keokuk police arrived at Coop's residence at 9 a.m., he was on the upper level of what Morgan described as a three-story, single family home. As officers secured the building, Coop made his way up to the roof.

"He wasn't armed as far as we could tell," Morgan said. "He made no aggressive acts toward our officers."

Officers eventually "established a dialogue" with Coop, who paced back and forth upon the rooftop, Morgan said. It took four hours of negotiating for Coop to finally surrender, just after 1 p.m.

"It was a long, hot day," Morgan said. "I think the heat and the weather worked toward our advantage."

Meanwhile, Hylton made his initial appearance on a first-degree murder charge at the Johnson County Courthouse Monday morning

via closed circuit television.

With arms crossed, Hylton listened as District Judge Patrick Grady set his bond at \$500,000 cash, which is in addition to a \$500,000 bond for seven counts of forgery. Grady also set his preliminary hearing for Aug. 2 and determined he was eligible to have a public defender represent him.

Hylton was arrested the day following the robbery and homicide. He allegedly admitted his role in the homicide to authorities, and he was charged with first-degree murder and seven counts of forgery, police said Sunday.

Joseph Code discovered his business partner's body at 3:18 p.m. on the afternoon of July 20 in their River Realty business office, 2747 Second Street Apt. 2, just west of Coral Ridge Mall. The office is located across from Hylton's residence.

Hylton allegedly entered the office July 20 with intent to commit a robbery, according to court reports. He allegedly bound Hebert's hands and feet with rope and tape, covered his nose and mouth with tape, and strangled him with a rope, according to court reports.

Hebert's 2000 Toyota Camry

was missing from River Realty on July 20; it was located on the morning of July 21 in a UI Hospitals and Clinics ramp by a maintenance worker. Officials have learned that at least one unidentified-by-stander may have approached a second vehicle — a gray 1990 Pontiac Grand Am — that was allegedly involved in the theft of the Camry.

An autopsy on July 21 concluded that Hebert died of suffocation and strangulation, State Medical Examiner Julia Goodin said.

in the recording of minutes from Institutional Review Board meetings, not actual research policies, said David Wynes, the university's assistant vice president for Research.

Wynes said there were three

main violations found by investigators. One referred to the omission of the first initials of two staff members with the same last name, while another accused the university of not recording the votes of everyone at the meetings (to which the university responded that some members chose not to vote, which is their right). The third

violation accused the school's review board of expediting the inclusion of a statement regarding the FDA's right to observe research subjects' records in subject-consent forms.

The article was appropriate because of the recent tragedy at Johns Hopkins University, in which a medical student

died during a research experiment, and because the university's human-research program has come into question in the past, Church said. He cited a controversial project that took place six decades ago in which orphaned children were taught to stutter. That research recently made headlines.

"I'd have to respectfully dis-

agree with the UI's claim that the headline is inaccurate," Church said. "It was a very timely topic ... the UI definitely had the spotlight on it."

The Register does not plan to issue a retraction or correction of any kind for Sunday's article, he said.

University promotes riding the bus using discounts

discounted passes available to university employees, with even greater discounts given to those who opt not to purchase parking permits.

For those with university parking permits, a monthly bus pass costs \$23, the same price that cities sell the passes to the UI. Those opting not to buy a parking permit can purchase a pass for \$10. The university picks up the cost of the \$13 discount.

The response has been about what officials expected.

"I would say that the program is working pretty well," said Iowa City Transit Manager Ron Logsdon. "It's definitely a good incentive [to use public transit]."

The initiative is still expanding, as the city plans to try to persuade local businesses to take part, Logsdon said.

Coralville is "a little behind" Iowa City in terms of the program, said Coralville Transit Manager Roger Fisher. For instance, Coralville hopes to install machines that will

read the bus passes, equipment that is already in Iowa City buses.

The machinery is expensive, costing about \$3,000 for each of the nine Coralville buses, Fisher said. A grant the city has applied for from the state would cover the cost, he said.

University students can purchase a five-month, \$80 discounted bus pass from the city regardless of whether they purchase a university parking permit. At the end of the spring term, there were 538 student bus passes in use. Officials have sold 81 bus

passes, which can be charged directly to student's U-bills, this summer.

The bus-pass programs are just some of the alternative methods of transportation encouraged by the university commuter services. Other programs include the UI Van Pool and a carpool matching program.

The Van Pool provides 740 people with transportation to and from work, using 56 vans in 27 communities. Those numbers are "not too bad," Ribble said, considering that they reflect summer use.

Under the program, the university leases vans to groups of employees to get back and forth from work. One employee drives and is accountable for the van, while the riders pitch in for gas and other costs.

Commuter services always tries to market its programs and expand its enrollment by advertising with new employees.

"Hopefully, we can spruce up alternatives by enticing people," Ribble said.

Liu administers programs and special events and works with incoming international scholars, said Diana Davies, the director of International Programs.

"He's put together all the knowledge he's gotten from his studies and experiences and is able to apply that toward helping not only international scholars, but local ones as well," she said.

Liu's experiences include spending the first 29 years of his life living under communist rule. He was born and raised on a commune, where

both of his parents were peasant farmers. Communist Party politics were an unavoidable aspect of daily life. In Baoding, everyone had to attend party meetings to examine the issues.

"I'm not politically oriented; I try to be an observer," Liu said. "In China, whether you like it or not, you have to be politically involved."

"Here, politics is much less involved. People can talk about it but not get involved. Back home, you have to show your orientation. The party makes its own decisions then spends a lot of time justifying those decisions and educating the people about those decisions.

"Sometimes it is against your will or against what you believe, but, whether you like it or not, tough. You can disagree and complain, but it doesn't mean much to argue," he said. "Here, if you have enough voices, then maybe you can make a difference, but in China, it is very difficult."

Liu was struck not only by the political freedom that the United States allows but also by the economic prosperity that he says is evident everywhere.

"When you land in this country, you have a strong feeling that this is a country of wealth," he said. "There are cars everywhere, vast farmlands, intricate irrigation sys-

tems. You can't be political without having a high economic standing. It is possible here."

Liu is the father of two small children, and he will complete his doctorate in family studies in December. His plans for the future remain open.

"The mentality of many people from China is that some-

day they might return," he said. "I'd like to see what opportunities I have. [Returning] is a possibility, but I'd like to work here for a couple of years. I will never regret living here or being educated here. In terms of the language and culture, it's been great."

at any stage from conception to natural death," the pope said with Bush sitting at his side.

The pontiff was stooped, his head tilted to one side, as he read from a script.

"Experience is already showing how a tragic coarsening of consciences accompanies the assault on innocent human life in the world," John Paul said. He pointed to euthanasia, infanticide, and "proposals for the creation for research purposes of human embryos destined to destruction in the process."

His admonition raised the political stakes for Bush, who aides say is likely to announce his decision next month.

Allowing the funding could alienate some of America's 44 million Catholics, who make up an important political bloc. If Bush cuts or restricts the funding, he risks being accused of bowing to the pope and other religious and conservative leaders.

Praising the pontiff as a spiritual and political leader, Bush promised to take his views into consideration as he

tries to "balance value and respect for life with the promise of science and the hope of saving life."

The pope's decision to lobby Bush may have been an unwelcome surprise. White

House officials had said in advance that they didn't think the issue would come up, and Bush said the pope did not bring it up during the private meeting before their public remarks.



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

led the main pack for most of the day when, at the foot of the last climb, Armstrong moved in front. He looked behind, staring into Ullrich's sunglasses, then sped off into the distance.

A familiar pattern emerged in two other mountain stages: the stretch from Perpignan to Plateau de Bonascre and the leg between Foix and Pla d'Adet, which Armstrong won.

He also triumphed in the uphill time-trial from Grenoble to Chamrousse, taking the start after Ullrich and slashing one minute off the German's blistering time.

"Lance Armstrong once said that Jan Ullrich is the greatest talent in cycling. This doesn't seem to be the case," Ullrich said afterward. "But I am not giving up, despite everything, and I'll try everything. I've never been in such good shape."

He did beat Armstrong once — in Sunday's Tarbes-to-Luz-Ardiden stage — but that was because the Texan let him.

"At this point, it's not worth being any more aggressive than we need to be," Armstrong said of his fourth-place finish behind Ullrich.

By the time Armstrong reached Luz-Ardiden he was in the overall lead, ahead of Ullrich by 5 minutes and 5 seconds — an almost unbeatable advantage with only six flat stages remaining before the race finish in Paris on July 29.

"This year, we worked even harder than we did in 1999 and 2000," said the U.S. Postal Service rider, explaining his performance. He won the first title after an extraordinary comeback from life-threatening testicular cancer that required brain surgery after it had spread.

The dedication hasn't escaped the attention of his rivals.

"Armstrong is someone who lives 12 months a year, 24 hours a day, for his job. That's the difference with Jan," said Ullrich's team manager, Walter Godefroot. "Armstrong is an exceptional champion, who takes his place among the all-time greats."

Bonds' homer binge stalls, but history is still in reach
 SAN FRANCISCO — Barry Bonds' race against history has become a grind.

With 10 weeks left in the regular season, Bonds no longer is on the breakneck home-run pace that grabbed the nation's attention this spring. He still leads the majors with 42 homers, but he has just three since the All-Star break — which he entered in a 13-game homerless drought.

In fact, for the first time since mid-April, the San Francisco Giants' slugger has fallen behind the pace set by Mark McGwire during his record-breaking 70-homer season in 1998.

But Bonds' early season power display was so prolific that the record remains within reach. Bonds proved earlier this year that he's capable of hitting homers in huge bunches.

"It's a long season, and I know for a fact that we haven't heard the last of Barry Bonds," Arizona manager Bob Brenly said Sunday after his Diamondbacks held Bonds hitless in nine at-bats with two walks in a three-game series.

Mariners continue hot streak with 3-2 win over Twins

MINNEAPOLIS — Jamie Moyer got his 10th win, and the Seattle Mariners completed a four-game sweep of the Minnesota Twins with a 3-2 victory Monday.

The Mariners never trailed during the series, outscoring the Twins, 19-8, in the matchup of division leaders.

Minnesota, which led the AL Central by five games at the All-Star break, lost for the ninth time in 12 games since the break. The Twins, also swept in a four-game series by Boston from July 3-6 last year, began the day with just a one-game lead over second-place Cleveland.

Moyer (10-5) allowed both runs and seven hits in 6 2/3 innings with seven strikeouts. Kazuhiro Sasaki got four-straight outs for his major

league-leading 33rd save in 37 chances, completing the Mariners' 5-1 road trip.

Brad Radke (10-7) lost his third-consecutive start, giving up all three runs — one was unearned — and nine hits in eight innings and struck out seven.

Angels 9, Orioles 4

BALTIMORE (AP) — Troy Glaus had three RBIs and the Anaheim Angels scored all their runs with two outs Monday in a 9-4 rout of the reeling Baltimore Orioles.

Scott Spiezio had two hits and two RBIs for the Angels, who have won seven of eight overall and nine of 10 on the road.

Jerry Hairston drove in two runs for the Orioles, losers of seven of eight and 14 of 17.

Anaheim, which came in with a

.212 batting average with two outs and runners in scoring position, went 8-for-11 in those situations. The Angels used five-straight two-out hits to score four runs in the third inning and take a 6-2 lead.

Indians 2, White Sox 0

CLEVELAND — Rookie C.C. Sabathia took a shutout into the seventh inning, and Juan Gonzalez homered Monday night, lifting the Cleveland Indians to a 2-0 win over the Chicago White Sox and into first place in the AL Central.

Sabathia (10-3), who turned 21 July 21, allowed two hits in one of his most impressive starts as the Indians won for the sixth time in seven games and finally overtook the slumping Minnesota Twins, moving ahead by two percentage points.

The Indians trailed by five games as recently as July 16, but made up


the difference by going 8-4 since the All-Star break. Cleveland had not been in first place since June 26.

Larson said both teams should be given credit.


"I thought what you saw was both teams really trying to play good basketball," he said. "The level of play went up."

Armstrong going stronger

Rivals agree: He seems unbeatable in this Tour de France.

PAU, France — Stronger, faster, leaner than ever before, Lance Armstrong is turning this year's Tour de France into a Tour de Force.

A rare third-consecutive title in the world's toughest cycling event is within easy reach six days from the finish, thanks to his stunning performance in the Alps and the Pyrenees.

But more impressive is the Texan's complete domination of the field that has rivals and observers in awe.

"Simply unbeatable," is how Armstrong's main challenger, Jan Ullrich of Germany, described the two-time champion and cancer survivor. "This year, he is stronger than ever."

Ullrich, the 1997 champion, is widely regarded as in his best form ever. Yet, in almost every mountain stage, he has pulled ahead of Armstrong only to be overtaken and left stranded in the final stretch.

"I don't know what I should do," Ullrich said after Armstrong won the grueling first mountain stage between Aix-les-Bains and L'Alpe d'Huez. "I did everything well — except for Lance."

The Team Telekom rider had

Will the Iowa football team do better than expected?

It's a given that Iowa will exceed the expectations that the national media have for them. No pre-season magazine in the nation (or at least ones I've seen) said the Hawks would finish any higher than ninth in the Big Ten. The majority had them as 10th.
