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## Bush freezes alleged terrorists' assets

WASHINGTON — President Bush ordered a freeze Monday on the assets of 27 people and organizations with suspected links to terrorism, including Islamic militant Osama bin Laden, and he urged other nations to do likewise. Foreign banks that don't cooperate could have their own transactions blocked in the United States.

"Money is the lifeblood of terrorist operations," Bush said. "Today, we're asking the world to stop payment."

The move was an effort to choke off financial support for bin Laden, whom the United States considers to be the prime suspect in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks against the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

The list names 12 individuals, including bin Laden and an Egyptian militant suspected to be his top deputy, 11 organizations, including bin Laden's al-Qaida network, three charities, and one business.

Missing from the list are Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and Hezbollah, militant groups that are on the State Department's roster of terrorists but that some Arab nations see as legitimate fighters against Israel.

Bush acknowledged that the terrorists' assets in the United States were small. But his order also gives the Treasury Department wider authority to go after transactions of foreign banks that refuse to cooperate in the campaign against terrorism.

"It puts the financial world on notice," he said in a Rose Garden appearance. "If you do business with terrorists, if you support or sponsor them, you will not do business with the United States of America."

The president said he recognized that some European countries would probably need to rewrite their own laws to meet America's conditions. Switzerland, for one, is well known for banking secrecy.

Asked about possible action if that country doesn't comply with U.S. requests, White House spokesman Ari Fleischer said: "The United States is prepared to take action against nations that don't help in this cause."

Bush said the administration would respond on a "case-by-case basis" in determining compliance.

He also said a foreign terrorist-asset tracking center at the Treasury Department would try to "follow the money as a trail to the terrorists." The center will bring together representatives of the intelligence, law-enforcement, and financial regulatory agencies, he said.

Previous efforts to cut bin Laden off from funds have been unsuccessful, including steps by the United States and the United Nations in 1998 to freeze his assets after the U.S. Embassy bombings in Africa. Bin Laden, an exile from Saudi Arabia, has a personal fortune estimated at \$300 million.

Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill said the order should send a message to anyone who does business with terrorists: "Cooperate in this fight, or we will freeze your U.S. assets."

Administration officials acknowledged that the immediate effect of Bush's executive order is hard to gauge.

"It may be an imperfect solution ... but it is necessary to start with the documented, recorded international banking system," said David Aufhauser, the Treasury Department's general counsel.

One of the big challenges is tracking money that moves through an underground banking system in the Middle East and parts of Asia, where large amounts of cash change hands in a paperless network based on personal trust.



## Bin Laden calls for new jihad against U.S.

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Osama bin Laden on Monday called for Muslims to join a holy war against "the American crusade," and the United Nations said Afghanistan's ruling Taliban militia has virtually shut down its humanitarian operations by threatening to kill its remaining staff.

In a statement provided to Qatar's Al-Jazeera satellite channel, bin Laden — the suspected mastermind of the Sept. 11 attacks in Washington and New York — said: "We are steadfast on the path of jihad with the heroic, faithful Afghan people."

Bin Laden also expressed sorrow for the deaths of pro-Taliban Pakistanis killed for protesting "the aggression of the American crusade forces and their allies on Muslim lands in Pakistan and Afghanistan."

He called them martyrs in the statement, which the TV station said was signed by bin Laden and dated Sunday.

In other developments, the Taliban's leader said Monday that the United States should withdraw its forces from the Persian Gulf and end its "bias" against Palestinians if it wants to eliminate the threat of global terrorism.

The United States is gearing up for military strikes on Afghanistan because of the Taliban's refusal to hand over bin Laden and his lieutenants. Bin Laden has used Afghanistan as headquarters of his al Qaida terrorist network since 1996.

Faced with the prospect of attack, the Taliban said it was dispatching 300,000 fighters to defend Afghanistan's borders — even as fighting stepped up in the north of the country with a coalition of opposition forces.

Despite the threat, the Taliban was defiant. In a statement faxed to news agencies here, Taliban leader Mullah Mohammed Omar said eliminating bin Laden would do little to remove the threat of more terrorism against the

## UI program to monitor attacks' effect on safety

### Study-abroad programs could be canceled if hostilities continue to escalate

UI officials said they are waiting on possible U.S. military action before taking added measures to ensure the safety of students studying abroad.

A total of 163 UI students are enrolled in the study-abroad program, and popularity for academic travel has not decreased since the recent terrorist attacks, school officials said.

The university is closely monitoring actions of domestic and foreign governments to determine the most appropriate response to the possibility of war, said Janis Perkins, the director of the Office for Study Abroad.

Bringing the students home now might not be the best option, she said. Staying in a small town that is an unlikely target of terrorist attacks could be safer than sending students through major cities and international airports, where the risk of an attack is higher, she said.

On the day of the attacks, the UI Web site posted guidelines addressing safety concerns for students who are studying abroad. The memo advised students to stay away from areas predominately visited by Americans and avoid carrying packages or luggage for others.

The university would consider postponing or canceling study-abroad programs next semester if the country went to war, Perkins said. Right now, though, that option seems fairly unlikely, she added.

Students have not canceled plans to study in other countries, she said, and officials do not expect a drop in those who study abroad next semester despite some apprehension about air travel.

One UI student is currently studying at Ben-Gurion University in Israel, located approximately one hour south of Jerusalem.

## Once-banished frat gains 32 recruits

### Lambda Chi Alpha makes a return to the UI campus six years after pledge dies

Thirty-two UI students have joined Lambda Chi Alpha despite knowing that the fraternity was banished from the university six years ago because of an alcohol-related death.

Fraternity President Cameron Full said he is hopeful that the chapter will quickly make a new name for itself on campus and distance itself from the 1995 death of 19-year-old pledge Matthew Garofalo.

"We feel we can overcome that, and I feel already we have overcome it with the guys we have now," said Full, a UI junior.

Lambda Chi Alpha officials left campus Sept. 21 after three weeks of recruiting. One recruiter, Stephane Schafteitel, said more than 150 men were interested in joining the fraternity despite its past and that current members were told up front about Garofalo's death.

"There was no silence or hiding about it," he said of the death. "It's a brand-new colony, as if the old one weren't there."

Recruiters aim to gain 25 to 30 new members from all grade levels when starting new chapters, Schafteitel said, adding that the UI recruitment period was successful. Potential associate members were admitted on the basis of two interviews.

Full said he wants to gain 45 to 50 members by the time the fraternity moves into its house, 222 N. Clinton St., in May 2002. The residence is now home to Alpha Tau Omega.

Lambda Chi Alpha's policy of making new recruits associate members will allow them to have all the privileges of full members immediately upon being pinned — which, Full said, will cut down on alcohol games and other hazing rituals.

# Discussion urges caution on attacks

More than half the tables remained empty in the IMU Main Lounge Monday night, as approximately 50 students attended a discussion about the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Fifty UI faculty members who facilitated the discussion said they were disappointed with the small turnout. They had prepared for 500 participants.

UI senior Leslie Burkholder said she enjoyed the dialogue, but was disappointed with the attendance.

"I think we like to pretend that nothing's happening," she said. "It's kind of sad because we're the people that are going to be affected by this."

Many participants expressed concern about the nation's approach in finding those responsible for the attacks on the World Trade Center and Pentagon.

"America should proceed with caution," said UI senior Becky Rose in light of vows by President Bush to use whatever means necessary to win the "war" on terrorism.

Featured speaker Reza Aslan, a

UI visiting religion instructor, said retaliation with no future long-term considerations would be dangerous for the United States.

"If the attack on our country was a symbolic act, as many of our leaders say it was, then it will require a symbolic response. And a symbolic response will never be an effective one," said Aslan, a native of Iran.

A military strike may be the response fringe Islamic fundamentalists are looking for to keep waging suicide terrorist acts, he added.

"[The use of force] will further exacerbate the very grievances that helped launch this attack in the first place," Aslan said.

A change of regimes in Afghanistan or the hand-over of suspect Osama bin Laden won't appease the United States, said speaker Christopher Rossi, the former director at the National Security Council. However, the Sept. 11 attacks may help bring the United States, China, and Russia together, he said.

"Nothing focuses the minds of global superpowers like the threat of international anarchy," Rossi said.

Several participants ques-

tioned America's relationship with Israel.

"As a nation, we're fiercely pro-Israel," Aslan said. "This is a principal problem because we think of ourselves as the human rights police, but we ignore the violence waged against Palestinians every day."

Aslan said future terrorist attacks could be prevented if the

United States removed troops from Saudi Arabia.

Rose said she fears the Bush administration's rush to declare war will escalate a conflict without resolving it.

"I'm scared," she said. "We could really be putting ourselves in a dangerous position in the rest of the world."

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# Judge to decide amendments' fate by Oct. 4

A Johnson County judge said Monday he will decide by Oct. 4 whether to direct the city to place three charter amendments before voters — which would be one day before they must be submitted to the county auditor to be placed on the Nov. 6 ballot.

The latest date Judge Thomas Horan can issue a ruling to place the amendments on the ballot is Oct. 5 — 32 days before the Nov. 6 election, said Johnson County Auditor Tom Slockett.

If Horan rules in favor of petitioners, the Iowa City City Council may forward the charter-amendment petition to Slockett for inclusion on the Nov. 6 ballot. Depending on how Horan interprets Iowa law, there could be a separate election to vote on charter amendments.

Horan heard arguments on Monday from citizen groups arguing in favor of placing the amendments on the ballot, as well as from city officials who said a committee followed proper code in determining the amendments are not "legally sufficient" for inclusion on the ballot.

The amendments would require the police chief and city manager to be retained by vot-

ers every four years starting in 2003, establish the Police Citizens Review Board as a permanent entity with broader powers than the current version of the board has, and allow police to issue fines in lieu of arrest for nonviolent crimes.

Bruce Nestor, representing 21 people from various citizen groups, urged a broader interpretation of the state Constitution, which gives citizens increased power to change city policies. City officials said they support a narrower approach to the law that more closely examines the process for filing objections to the charter.

"Most of the people who attended were on the side of the petitioners," said Iowa City resident Carol deProse, following the afternoon hearing. She said it was important to note the citizen interest in the charter amendments.

During the hearing, Nestor also said the decision of city staff and councilors to exclude the charter amendments from the ballot was unlawful and a conflict of interest.

Eleanor Dilkes, representing the city, said the committee did not break the law by excluding the amendments on Aug. 30. The committee comprised Mayor Ernie Lehman, Councilor Ross Wilburn, and City Clerk Marian Karr.

## Reasons for and against the Home Rule Charter Amendments

### PRO- citizen groups

✓ Banning the amendments is a conflict of interest issue because Mayor Ernie Lehman is running for re-election and voted to keep them off the ballot.

✓ 1,600 citizens signed the petition in support of adding them to the ballot.

✓ A committee composed of City Council and city staff exceeded its authority when it excluded amendments from the ballot.

✓ The amendments were written clearly expressing the intention of holding retention elections for police chief and city manager.

### CON- committee

✓ The character of the election may change with the inclusion of the amendments; the change may be favorable or unfavorable.

✓ According to the Iowa Code, the committee followed the law in its decision and did not exceed its authority.

✓ The committee argued that errors were made in expressing the petitioners' intent.

✓ Representatives of the city disputed that the objectives of the committee were clear in its description of the process.

Lehman's presence on the committee was a conflict of interest, some plaintiffs testified in an affidavit. Including the amendments on the ballot should create higher voter turnout, which could threaten any advantage incumbent Lehman would have in a low-turnout election because of his name recognition, they testified.

Dilkes said ballot amendments might change the character of the election, but she was unsure how.

Sara Epstein, the chairwoman of the Citizens for

Accountable Local Government, said her group is attempting to raise awareness about issues involved in the police shooting of Iowa City artist Eric Shaw in 1996.

"Are the policies, practices, and procedures of the Iowa City Police Department in tune with how the residents of Iowa City wish to be policed?" she wrote in an affidavit. "There is no logical reason why Nov. 6 should not be the day citizens vote 'yes' or 'no' on the proposed amendments."

# Council considers nuisance law

A committee will form within the next month to discuss the possibility of expanding Iowa City's nuisance ordinance to escalate fines and make landlords accountable for tenant disturbances, a move the Iowa City City Council favors.

During the council's work session Monday night, the Iowa City director of Housing and Inspection Services, Doug Boothroy, said he will report back to the council following an Oct. 4 housing-authority meeting that will address nuisance problems local neighborhoods are experiencing. The council unofficially decided Monday night to create a committee of neighborhood representatives, landlords, and city officials to examine the issue.

"We need to identify the problems a little more accurately and closely," said Mayor Ernie Lehman.

The Iowa City Neighborhood Council proposed expanding the nuisance ordinance to the council last week. It used the Davenport Nuisance Code as an example of an ordinance it believes the city should adopt.

The group proposed raising fines for code violations and such violations as noise, over-occupancy, and parking on the grass.

"The landlords, who are responsible for the upkeep of the

properties and whose judgment in tenants has so much impact on the life of the neighborhoods, are the sole people who should bear the costs of their decisions," said the Neighborhood Council in a report to the council.

In other action, the council decided to wait until its Oct. 8 meeting to hear additional information regarding two downtown building proposals before making a final decision.

A majority of councilors preferred plans from the Moen Group and Executive Hotel Group LLC, because they include space for hotel rooms.

A selection committee for the development of Lot 64-1a, directly south of the Iowa City Public Library, 123 S. Linn St., recommended last week that the council adopt the Moen proposal. But councilors were not eager to narrow their options Monday night.

"There are some questions I'd like answered before we name a preferred developer," Lehman said. "Delaying our decision a week or two won't make a significant difference in the construction."

Councilors said they want more details, primarily from Moen and Southgate, about the developers' plans for the hotel conference rooms, energy conservation, and projected tax revenues.

# Maytag's Amana workers strike

MIDDLE AMANA — Appliance workers in Iowa County went on strike Sunday after unanimously rejecting Maytag Corp.'s first contract offer to them since it acquired the plant in August.

More than 1,800 members of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers Local 1526 voted Sept. 22 on the offer, according to a story in the *Cedar Rapids Gazette*. The contract would have covered 2,000 production workers.

Workers at the Middle Amana plant officially began the strike Sunday at 12:01 a.m.

"The contract in general was not acceptable to the entire bargaining unit at Amana," said union representative Kay Trimpe.

Trimpe declined to discuss specific details about the offer.

A plant official, Russ Maheras, said he would not comment about the strike but said Maytag officials would issue a statement about the strike.

In Newton, Maytag spokesman Jim Powell said he expects the company will begin contract negotiations again soon.

The appliance company bought rival Amana Appliances for \$325 million from Goodman Global Holding Co. of Houston in July.

One worker, Karen Cohrt, said the benefits and wages offer was the "worst contract we've ever had."

Cohrt, who has been an assembler at the plant for almost 25 years, said she wasn't sure whether the weak economy and national crisis were factors in their offer.

"Maybe they thought we'd buy anything," she said. "But it was just awful."

She said she and her co-workers were upset about such issues as med-

ical benefits, mandatory overtime, and lower pay for new workers.

The last time workers went on strike at the Middle Amana plant was in 1995, when employees picketed for four days amid threats of company relocation. In 1992, workers were on the picket lines for 16 days before getting a 3.5 percent pay increase and a cap on health-insurance premiums.

Maytag Corp., the third-largest appliance manufacturer in the world, is predicting third-quarter earnings to be up 15 percent from last year, despite the sputtering economy.

A Sept. 20 company statement says operating earnings are expected to meet or exceed analysts' predictions. Officials cite the acquisition of Amana Appliances as a reason for the strong performance.

The third-quarter earnings report will be released Oct. 16.

### Hill enters not-guilty plea in rape case

A former City High football star accused of sexually assaulting a 15-year-old girl last spring filed a written plea of not guilty Monday.

Hakim Hill, 18, filed the plea in Johnson County District Court.

The case will not be prosecuted any differently from others — despite Hill's high profile locally, said Anne Lahey, an assistant Johnson County attorney.

Hill's attorneys refused to comment about the upcoming trial.

Hill is charged with third-degree sexual abuse after allegedly fondling a high-school female and forcing her to perform oral sex on him in an unoccupied City High classroom.

Hill allegedly began to have intercourse with the girl, according to records. When she struggled and screamed for him to stop, he told her to be quiet, court records allege. The girl allegedly continued screaming until Hill released her.

Formerly of 1147 Hampton Court, Hill graduated from City High last year and now plays football for Arizona State University. He has been suspended indefinitely from competition because of the charges, but he is permitted to practice with the team. Hill is the brother of Iowa football player Kahlil Hill.

### Third I.C. arrest in alleged gang activity

Iowa City police arrested an alleged Cedar Rapids gang member last weekend for allegedly intending to use an assault rifle in Iowa City earlier this month.

Officers arrested Robert Jones, 23, at 12:20 p.m. on Sept. 22 on charges of going armed with intent (joint criminal conduct), carrying a concealed weapon (joint criminal conduct), and criminal gang participation, according to police records.

The charges stem from a Sept. 9 incident in Iowa City, in which police allegedly observed Jones in the company of Iowa City resident Darvell Miller, 21, and Cedar Rapids resident Michelle Pernicka, 32. The three were allegedly transporting a concealed SKS

assault rifle, police records say. Officers arrested Miller and Pernicka that day, but Jones escaped on foot, said Lt. Dan Sellers.

Miller admitted he was a member of the Chicago-based "Black P Stone Rangers" street gang and said he intended to use the assault rifle in retaliation for a gang-related assault in the IMU, according to police records.

Officers observed Jones, Miller, and Pernicka transporting the rifle wrapped in a blanket to Pernicka's car, police records said.

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

# Crop-dusters a no-go amid fears

BELLE GLADE, Fla. — The government grounded thousands of crop-dusters across the country for the second-straight day Monday amid fears the planes could be used in an airborne chemical or biological attack.

The move came after it was learned that one of the suspected hijackers in the attack on the World Trade Center, Mohamad Atta, had shown interest in crop-dusters and that another person now in federal custody had downloaded information about the planes from the Internet, Attorney General John Ashcroft said.

The "intelligence community came to us and encouraged us to shut down the crop-dusters," Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Scott Brenner said. The FAA said the ban was in effect through 12:05 a.m. today local time.

Ashcroft told lawmakers on Capitol Hill that the FBI had gathered information that raised fears the small farm planes could be used in a biological or chemical attack. But he said there was "no clear indication of the time or place of these attacks."

It was the second time the planes have been grounded since the FAA cleared the way for most flights to resume Sept. 14, three days after terrorists slammed planes into the twin towers and the Pentagon.

James Callan, the executive director of the National Agricultural Aviation Association, said the ban covered approximately 3,500 agricultural aviators.

The association posted a message from the FBI on its Web site, urging members to "continue to be vigilant to any suspicious activity relative to the use, training in, or acquisition of dangerous chemicals or airborne application" of the chemicals.

The FBI is believed to be

investigating a group of Middle Eastern men — including Atta — who repeatedly visited a Florida fertilizer company before the Sept. 11 attacks.

J.D. "Will" Lee, the general manager of South Florida Crop Care in Belle Glade, said Monday he told FBI agents that the men, in groups of two or three, visited nearly every weekend for six or eight weeks before the attacks. The visits included the weekend before the assaults.

Co-worker James Lester told the FBI that one of the men was Atta, who is believed to be one of the suicide hijackers aboard the first airliner to hit the trade center. He said Atta was persistent with questions about a crop-duster during a visit in February.


"I recognized him because he stayed on my feet all the time. I just about had to push him away from me," Lester said.

Lee said the men pestered employees with "odd questions" about his 502 Air Tractor crop-duster. He said they asked about the range of the airplane, how much it could haul in chemicals, how difficult it was to fly, and how much fuel it could carry.

During one visit, they followed Lester around, asking questions while he was working on one of the planes. Another time, they carried video equipment and asked to photograph the inside of the cockpit.

Lee said he declined their repeated requests. "I wouldn't spend any time talking to them or telling them anything because I didn't think it was any of their business," he said.

In Belle Glade, a small community in the Florida Everglades surrounded by sugarcane fields, police closed one entrance to the airport where Lee's business is based and allowed only employees to enter the second entrance. The airport is approximately an hour's drive from the beachfront com-

munities where some of the suspected hijackers stayed before the attacks.

The *Washington Post* has also reported that investigators found a crop-duster manual among the possessions of Zacarias Moussaoui, who was detained after he sought flight training in Minnesota and the school grew suspicious.

Ray Dyson, the chief pilot of Southeastern Aerial Crop Service in Fort Pierce, said crop-dusting aircraft — typically carrying 200 gallons of fuel and 500 to 600 gallons of fertilizer and liquid spray — require extensive training and are extremely difficult for a novice pilot to fly.

"When they're heavily loaded, they take a very deft hand to fly," he said. "One false move, and you fall out of the sky and crash."

Florida officials have checked with all registered aerial applicators about their security measures, said Terence McElroy, a spokesman for the state Agriculture Department.

When flights resume, pilots will be required to notify state officials

of their flight times and aircraft tail numbers, McElroy said.

"It's damn sure going to ruin our industry and us, but it's a small price to pay for the security of our nation," said Jerry White, an aerial applicator based in Orlando.

The ban affected the state's spraying for mosquitoes as part of its effort to battle the West Nile and Eastern equine encephalitis viruses.

In New Jersey, helicopters used for spraying against mosquitoes have been grounded indefinitely because of the attacks. In Georgia, the ban will affect cotton growers who need to defoliate plants before harvest.

Kelly Wingate, the owner of Wingate Flying Service of Camilla, Ga., said the groundings were inconvenient but that pilots and growers understood the need.

"The aerial applicators and the farmers — you won't find bigger patriots," he said. "We know what this country is going through, and we're in 100 percent support of what they're doing."

# Wall Street comes surging back up

NEW YORK — Stocks surged Monday, carrying the Dow industrials up more than 360 points, as bargain hunters returned to help Wall Street rebound from one of its worst weeks ever. But market-watchers remained extremely nervous.

The Dow's advance was its fifth-biggest daily gain in history.

Monday's gainers were spread across nearly all market sectors, an indication that cheaper prices lured buyers to the market rather than lessening fears about how the United States will retaliate for the Sept. 11 terror attacks and how long the economy will suffer. Even airline stocks were up.

The Dow closed up 368.05, or 4.5 percent, at 8,603.86, recovering more than a quarter of the 1,369.70 it lost last week in its biggest-ever weekly decline. The Dow was up as much as 413.51 in the last hour Monday.

Its biggest daily point rise happened on March 16, 2000, when the Dow advanced 499.19 to 10,630.60, or 4.9 percent.

The market's broader indicators also bounced back. The NASDAQ rose 76.22, or 5.4 percent, to 1,499.41, while the Standard & Poor's 500 index advanced 37.65, or 3.9 percent, to 1,003.45. The indexes, like the Dow, fell to their lowest levels in three years last week, the first week of trading following the attacks.

Monday's rebound didn't mean the market has overcome its uncertainty.

"The downtrend isn't over yet. We are rallying in a wider range because of the collapse," said Bob Stovall, a market strategist at Prudential Securities.

Analysts also said technical factors were likely influencing trading.

"Last week, there was kind of a panicky aspect, a throwing in of the towel. I think there is a realization that the lower prices have

taken into account a lot of the bad stuff," said Charles Pradilla, the chief investment strategist at SG Cowen. "That is not to say that there won't be more pain. We will continue to vacillate."

Among the Wall Street's winners, 3M soared \$4.69 to \$91.67. Citigroup climbed \$2.64 to \$39.82 and Wal-Mart advanced \$2.62 to \$47.28. Insurer American International Group, which expects its pretax losses from the attack to total \$500 million, rose \$3.96 to \$71, recouping some heavy losses from last week.

Airline stocks, which fell sharply because hijacked commercial planes were used in the attacks, rose on a \$1.5 billion government aid package announced over the weekend. The sector was one of the weakest last week as major U.S. airlines reduced flight schedules and laid off thousands of workers.

AMR, the parent of American Airlines, rose 40 cents to \$18.30, while Delta gained \$1.52 to \$23.99.

Wall Street also drew some support from overseas markets. London's FT-SE 100 index finished up 4.1 percent, France's CAC-40 closed with a gain of 5.7 percent, and Frankfurt's DAX index rose 6.6 percent. Japanese markets were closed for a holiday.

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# FBI charges man with aiding hijackers

WASHINGTON — Federal authorities have charged the first person with aiding the terrorist hijackers, according to court documents released Monday. Airports and airlines were asked to redo background checks for all workers with access to sensitive areas.

Herbert Villalobos was charged in federal court in suburban Virginia with helping one of the suspected hijackers to fraudulently obtain a Virginia identification card a month before the Sept. 11 attacks.

A second man who aided with the IDs is cooperating with law-enforcement agents; he was not charged, prosecutors said. The court records disclosed as many as five of the hijackers got Virginia cards in the month before the attacks.

Meanwhile, the terrorism investigation proceeded on several fronts.

Attorney General John Ashcroft disclosed that 352 people have been arrested or detained in the investigation and an additional 392 people were being sought for questioning about the attacks in New York and Washington.

"We think they have information that could be helpful to the investigation," the attorney general told lawmakers.

The Federal Aviation Administration grounded farm crop-dusters and asked airports and airlines to take new precautions with their own workers.

The FAA ordered that workers' identifications immediately be verified, followed by new checks of employment histories and possible criminal backgrounds.

The order affects tens of thousands of airport workers who have access to secure locations in airports, people such as baggage handlers, food-service workers, and mechanics.

"We are requiring revalidation of all airport IDs to make sure that they are genuine, current, and belong with the person they are with," FAA spokeswoman Rebecca Trexler said.

In Florida, court records in Broward County showed one of the 19 hijack suspects was wanted on an arrest warrant at the time of the attacks.

A bench warrant was issued June 4 for Mohamed Atta for failing to appear in court on a charge of driving without a license. Atta's Florida driver's license was revoked on Aug. 23.

"There are more than 200,000

warrants in the system," county sheriff's spokeswoman Veda Coleman-Wright said. "So naturally, you're going to make sure you're going out and getting those wanted for murder. This is not one that's going to jump out at you."

In Virginia, an FBI affidavit filed in federal court alleged that as many as five hijackers — Hani Hanjour, Salem Alhamzi, Majed Moqed, Ahmed Saleh Alghamdi, and Abdulaziz Alomari — went to the Department of Motor Vehicles in Arlington, Va., on Aug. 2.

All five were at the office that day to "conduct transactions relating to Virginia identification cards," the affidavit said.

The affidavit alleges that Villalobos and a second man — his identity not revealed because he is a confidential witness — signed identity papers for the hijackers.

The affidavit said Villalobos, using the alias Oscar Diaz, signed papers certifying that Alomari lived in Virginia. Alomari has been identified as a hijacker of a Boston flight that crashed into the World Trade Center.

The second man, a confidential witness, signed both a residency certification and an identity affidavit that was used by

Alghamdi to obtain an identification card, the affidavit said.

Alghamdi has been identified as a hijacker of the second plane that struck the Trade Center.

The affidavit said the unidentified local man was standing in a parking lot near the motor-vehicles office along with several other men, including Villalobos, when three men approached in a van and asked for help in getting Virginia identification cards.

Villalobos and his acquaintances then drove together to an attorney's office nearby with the others following. The papers, which can be used as identification for getting driver's licenses and state identification cards, require the signature of a notary public.

In other developments:

• The Coast Guard is requiring that incoming vessels supply local port officials with the identities of crew members and passengers. "We want to identify individuals and cargos that should not get into the United States," Capt. Mike Lapinski said.

• Nabil Al-Marabh, 32, a convenience-store clerk arrested in Chicago last week by an FBI-led terrorism task force, was transferred to New York following four days of questioning, FBI spokeswoman Virginia Wright said.

## Mine blast kills 4

BROOKWOOD, Ala. — An explosion in the nation's deepest coal mine killed four miners and left nine others missing and feared dead.

If the deaths of all 13 miners are confirmed, it would be the worst mining accident in the United States since 1984. Some of the victims were volunteer rescue-team members who went into the mine after a cave-in Sunday.

"These great acts of unselfishness are eerily reminiscent of the heroes of our Sept. 11 national tragedy," said Don DeFossett, the chief executive officer of Walter Industries, which owns the mine and its operator, Jim Walter Resources Inc. "These men gave their lives to help others, just as the firefighters and police of New York did nearly two weeks ago."

Three of the dead and the nine missing remained more than 2,000 feet underground at Blue Creek No. 5 mine, company officials said. One

miner who was brought out died at a hospital, and three others were hospitalized in stable condition.

DeFossett said there was an explosion about 5:15 p.m. Sunday after a cave-in hit electrical equipment and ignited methane gas. At the time, 32 people were in the mine, six of them in the area of the explosion. Three were able to get out, but the other three were left more than three miles from the main elevator and approximately 2,000 feet from a ventilation shaft, DeFossett said.

Ten miners went to rescue them, but something sparked a second, larger explosion roughly 45 minutes after the first, DeFossett said.

A second wave of rescue workers went into the mine and worked through the night but were unable to reach the area because of fires and methane gas, which is common in coal seams. Company officials said fires still burned Monday, and it was uncertain when a team would search again.



### Force unites with precision

The last time the police kicked in my front door, I remember marveling at the force and precision they used to reduce my door to a pile of tindersticks and a door-knob paperweight. That same force and precision is used on Rival Schools' debut album, *United by Fate*, and it will be demonstrated live at Gabe's tonight when the band plays with Burning Airlines.

While precise and forceful, *United by Fate* is also a mature album, neither bludgeoning anyone over the head with guitar distortion or resorting to stale, refrigerator emo. The kinetic and charged guitar sound doesn't obscure or muddy the songs, and it complements the hoarse, vul-

nerable voice of Walter Shreifel. The band also knows when to ease up. Such sonically charged songs as "High Acetate" and "Holding Sand" find themselves interposed with more low-key tracks, such as "Undercovers On" and "Good Things."

The maturity of *United by Fate* seems to come from experience. The lyrical prowess and aesthetic sense is a culmination of 15 years of rock 'n' roll nomadism and sweating it out in the dim and crowded clubs of New York. Rival Schools uses the time-tested Pixies loud chorus/soft verse structure, a healthy dose of stop-start Fugazism, and even a touch of heavy atmospheric avant-guitarism à la Hum; but for the most part, comparing these guys with anyone else is unfair.



Rival Schools has grown artistically from its own musical lineage of former bands. The list is daunting, including late-80s NYC hard-core trend-setters the Gorilla Biscuits as well as Youth of Today, Burn, CIV, and Quicksand.

This is an indie-rock album with teeth. The dynamism, along with the exultant and shimmering sound, make this an album to enjoy and an even harder show to miss.

### More oatmeal than cornflake

Doing a cover album is a common thing. Everyone from David Bowie to Duran Duran has released one, but the real trick is making it work. To play someone else's song without any interpretation or artistic inflection reduces you to a level no higher than a bar band. Tori Amos is painfully self-conscious of the risks involved on her new album *Strange Little Girls*.

The title track, originally by the Stranglers, is one of the few standout tracks. All of these songs involve enormous amounts of artistic interpretation. This can be both a good or bad thing, as we see with her bland and pretentious rendition of Depeche Mode's "Enjoy the Silence" and also on the sparse voice and piano version of "Raining Blood" by Slayer. Yes,

Amos covers Slayer, and it is boring to the point of irritation.

She has also managed to completely destroy a classic and timeless Beatles song when she turns "Happiness is a Warm Gun" into an extended exercise in self-aggrandizement and pseudo-jam band piano improvisation. She uses her sensual and beautiful siren-like voice to completely mar the lyrical content of the song in a mess of vocal noodling. All this only takes an agonizing 10 minutes.

There are some bright points to this otherwise bleak album. The tender and acoustic Neil Young song "Heart of Gold" is raved up around a steady foundation of thudding drums, electric guitar, and vocal layering to great effect.

The standout track is her version of Eminem's murder narrative "97 Bonnie and Clyde." The tale of disposing a murdered wife's body and rationalizing it to



the woman's child is now told from the murdered woman's point of view instead of the murderer's. She uses a plaintive, nursery-rhyme voice with sing-song cadence that turns the misogynistic rap into an eerie and disturbing bedtime story that is beautiful and unerving.

While much of this album is like eating flour, there is some worthwhile material. Amos has made great albums that are enjoyable to listen to. *Strange* just isn't one of them.

## Higher-ed budget cuts unfair

"Democrats still have a responsibility to higher education." One would expect these words from a true champion of higher education, someone who understands that in order to be a responsible, productive citizen, one needs a good education. In reality, these were the words of Gov. Tom Vilsack, who, with his recent extreme budget cuts, has made his position on higher education crystal clear. Speaking during a fundraiser held in Iowa City in July, Vilsack emphasized his commitment to affordable higher education. However, during the intervening two months, he has apparently changed his mind and decided that when times are tough, state funding for universities should be the first thing to get slashed.

While a slowing economy surely means that Vilsack had to cut something, his single-minded attack on higher education seems excessive. Of the \$108 million mid-year budget cut, nearly half of it is borne by the universities, with more than \$20 million in cuts for the UI alone. More than half of the state's \$5 bil-

lion budget was left untouched. Notably, neither K-12 education nor public safety received any cuts. Such devotion to elementary education and public safety is admirable, but at what cost to the universities? It would have been easier if everyone had to bear a small portion of the shortfall, rather than gouge the universities in order to spare other areas.

The most infuriating aspect, however, is that Vilsack has pulled a bait-and-switch on university students across the state. When students agreed to go to Iowa universities, they were promised a certain level of quality, at least for the next school year. This was because the state budget had been set and the universities' funding had been calculated. Each university had decided where to spend the money and what level of quality it would offer. Prospective students had weighed their various options and decided that the cost-to-quality ratio provided by Iowa's public universities met with their approval. Now, after locking themselves into

going to such a school, they are told that the quality will actually be less than promised. If we were dealing with a used-car dealership instead of a state agency, we could report it to the Better Business Bureau. As it is, we have to wait until the next election to show our displeasure at being deceived.

President Mary Sue Coleman has declared her commitment to maintaining the quality of education at the UI. With these new budget cuts, she had better be prepared to eat her words. In order to compensate for the shortfall, many "nonessential" university personnel will surely be laid off, resulting in an overall loss of quality. Worse, in the long run, the quality may have to degrade further in order to maintain affordability. With tuition increases accelerating every year, the cost of Coleman's commitment to quality is reaching a critical affordability threshold. What good is quality that no one can afford? Worse still, if Iowans cannot afford to go to a state university, then they surely cannot afford to go anywhere else.

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# Taliban threatens U.S. with jihad

United States. "If Americans want to eliminate terrorism, then they should withdraw their forces from the Gulf and they should put an end to the biased attitude on the issue of Palestine," Omar said from his headquarters in the southern Afghan city of Kandahar.

"America wants to eliminate Islam, and it is spreading lawlessness to install a pro-American government in Afghanistan," Omar said. "This effort will not

solve the problem, and the Americans will burn themselves if they indulge in this kind of activity."

The Taliban has also cracked down on the remaining U.N. relief workers in Afghanistan, threatening to kill staff members who use computers or other communications equipment, U.N. officials in Islamabad said Monday.

The militia began raiding U.N. offices in Afghan cities over the weekend and sealing their satellite telephones, walkie-talkies, computers, and vehicles to bar them from further use, said Stephanie Bunker, the chief U.N.

spokeswoman in Islamabad.

"They warned our staff that if they use these things, they will face execution," said Gordon Weiss, a spokesman for UNICEF.

The threats have nearly shut down the relief work being done by Afghan staffers who were left behind when all foreign U.N. workers were withdrawn from Afghanistan.

"The U.N. has ordered its staff to obey the Taliban directive to avoid risking their lives," Bunker said in an interview Monday. "This will have a very serious impact on our operations."

With tensions mounting, Pak-

istan pulled its 12 diplomats from its embassy in Kabul, the Afghan capital. Foreign Ministry spokesman Mohammed Riaz Khan said. However, relations between Pakistan and the Taliban have not been severed, and the Taliban Embassy remained in operation in Islamabad.

Over the weekend, the United Arab Emirates broke diplomatic relations with the Taliban, leaving Saudi Arabia and Pakistan as the only countries maintaining formal ties. Pakistan has agreed to support the U.S. military campaign against bin Laden and his Taliban allies.

# U.S. freezes assets of 27 people, groups

In addition to bin Laden, the administration's list names Ayman al-Zawahiri, a Cairo surgeon believed by terrorism experts to be bin Laden's top deputy. Al-Zawahiri, a suspect in the 1981 assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, is believed to be operating in Afghanistan, as is bin Laden.

Also listed are the Egyptian Islamic Jihad, the Libyan Islamic Fighting group, the Armed Islamic Group, and the Islamic Movement of Uzbek-

istan, a little-known group that Bush mentioned in his address to Congress and the nation last week.

The United States is seeking permission to deploy U.S. forces in Uzbekistan, which borders Afghanistan to the north. Its president, Islam Karimov, has been fighting the group.

Bush's order listed three charitable organizations that the government said are funding terrorist acts: Mukhtab al-Khidamat/Al Kifah, Wafa Humanitarian Organization, and Al Rashid Trust.

"They can very well have received money from Americans or from others abroad who

thought they were doing good for people who need relief," said White House spokesman Fleischer.

The Mamoun Darkazanli Import-Export Co. is the business on the list.

The absence of Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and Hezbollah — better known than most of those groups on the list — showed the delicate path Bush must walk in trying to enlist support from Arab and Islamic states.

Some Arab nations, including Saudi Arabia and the Gulf emirates, have indicated that they will not help the United States if any of these three groups become a target. The Arab

nations worry their citizens will become outraged if they help America go after groups that resist Israel.

Raanan Gissin, Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon's spokesman, said Israel has its "own list of terrorists."

Separately, Attorney General John Ashcroft told the House Judiciary Committee that the administration would like authority to seize — rather than just freeze — assets linked to terrorist activities and organizations.

Study-abroad officials also are

attempting to ensure the safety of the Muslim and Arab students who travel from the Middle East to attend the UI. Approximately 60 Arabic and 140 Muslim students currently study at the university, said Gary Althen, the director of the Office of International Students

and Scholars. Law Professor Adrien Wing, who last week during panels and group discussions addressed some of the issues associated with the attacks, believes that they may have an effect on study abroad.

"Unfortunately, I think [the

attacks] will scare students from flying," she said. "They'll fear, perhaps rightly, that Americans will be increasingly seen as the target of more terrorist attacks."

## Iowa volleyball team falls to UNI

**The Hawkeyes are encouraged about their performance against the No. 23 Panthers**

CEDAR FALLS — The Iowa volleyball team played its hearts out against in-state rival Northern Iowa, but the Hawkeyes couldn't come up with the win.

No. 21 UNI extended its home winning streak to 39 games, defeating the Hawkeyes, 3-1, Monday night in front of a sellout crowd of

2,051. The Panthers remained undefeated, improving their record to 11-0, while Iowa dropped to 2-6 overall.

Although they lost the game, the Hawkeyes came away with confidence after a strong showing.

"The fact that we did take a game from them gives us confidence for the next two Big Ten games," junior Jamie Lansing said after the game. Lansing, along with junior Kelli Chesnut, started the game for the first time this season, giving the Hawkeyes a new look.

Iowa had a more balanced attack against the Panthers than in previous matches, with Sara Meyermann leading the way with 13 kills and 13

digs. Lansing chipped in nine kills, and Renee Hill and Carolyn Giese added eight apiece. Hill led the Hawkeyes with 26 assists.

Iowa had a tough time getting started — it fell behind 5-0 to the Panthers and had to play catch-up the rest of the game. UNI capitalized on six

Hawkeye serving errors in game one and won, 20-30.

Iowa came out focused and played the Panthers to a 14-14 standstill through the first half of the second game. From there, UNI turned up the heat and took 16 of the final 23 points, ending the game with a 30-21 win and going into the intermission up two games to none.

The third game was another story. A rejuvenated Hawkeye squad came out motivated after the break with strong intensity in their eyes. Iowa fell behind early, 8-4, but battled back and took control of the game, 18-15. The Hawkeyes never lost the lead and came out with a 30-24 victory.

Iowa held momentum at the beginning of the fourth game, taking an early 4-0 lead, but the Panthers put the hammer down after that. UNI scored seven unanswered and never looked back, eventually overpowering the Hawkeyes, 30-18, and winning the match, 3-1.

Despite the loss, the Hawkeyes, including coach Rita Buck-Crockett, held their heads high after the game.

"That's the way we look in practice," Buck-Crockett said of her confident, aggressive team. "That's the team that should be out there all the time."

Iowa changed its warm-up tonight, which gave the

## Jordan decision delayed

WASHINGTON — Michael Jordan kept his mouth shut and fax machine off, and the sports world spent another day awaiting official word of his return.

Jordan already has completed the paperwork to sell his share of the Washington Wizards, but the comeback announcement was delayed for at least one more day because of a licensing issue with one of his sponsors.

"Michael has not finalized his decision," said Estee Portnoy, the vice president of marketing and client services for SFX, Jordan's management agency.

A statement from Jordan outlining the reasons for his comeback was being completed, and he is expected to make his first appearance in a Wizards uniform at a media day in Washington on Oct. 1 — the day before training camp begins in Wilmington, N.C.

But before he can end his three-year retirement, shoot his first free throw, or run his first wind sprints, Jordan and legions of lawyers must fine-tune the fine print.

Because owners can't play, Jordan had to sell his share in Lincoln Holdings, which owns a portion of the Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals and the MCI Center. Jordan's stake, about 10 percent, goes to Lincoln Holdings majority owner Ted Leonsis.

"My understanding is that

## Should Joe Paterno hang 'em up?

The 74-year-old legend has started off the 2001 season 0-2



Is it really so important for this man to get Bear Bryant's all-time win record? Important enough to set back a once-mighty program such as Penn State's for years to come? I think not.

At the not-so-tender age of 74, Paterno is a recruiting liability. If a player were to redshirt and expect to play five years under Paterno, the coach would nearly be 80. The chances that he'll be around that long are slim-to-none, regardless of how healthy he is.

When a coach reaches a certain age, players take it into account. Imagine this scenario: A player commits to an aging coach. His first year or two are spent languishing in mediocrity before the coach retires. Count on another year or two for the new coaches to regain recruiting clout and implement their system. At most, a player would have one to two years when the team may be successful. Sound familiar, Iowa fans?

No one will remember Joe Paterno as a legend who set a record; they'll remember him as a hanger-on who destroyed a program in the process of gaining a spot in the history books. Besides, Florida State's Bobby Bowden has 317 career victories to Paterno's 322. Anyone who saw "highlights" of post-game interviews with both coaches last weekend will be able to tell you Bowden appears lucid enough to outlast Paterno by several years.

Joe — do the program you love a favor and pick a successor, just like Rip Engle did for you back in 1966.

Joe Paterno is a college-football coaching legend, and legends leave on their own terms — not those of university donors, ticked-off fans, or a guy named Todd.

Penn State is in intensive-care with weak vital signs, and a coach who has been with the program longer than my parents have been alive isn't a great tool to turn it around.

But just last season, fielding weaker talent than their competition, the Nittany Lions pulled out wins against Purdue, Illinois, and Michigan State.

They went 5-7, prompting the belief that the game may have passed Paterno by, but I defend his coaching ability, and more importantly, I stand behind what he means to the game.

Off the field, he uses his name — and his salary — to build libraries and promote education. On the field, he turns teenage boys into disciplined men. He wears a tie, magnifying glasses on his eyes, a Brooklyn-tough grimace on his face.

Losing kills him more than anyone else. Yet, Paterno perseveres. He is healthy and willing to continue on because, he has a new challenge ahead. Gone are the blue-chip recruits along with the fading Penn State mystique. The wins have become harder and fewer but more precious and earned.



## Auto dealers and NFL to discuss Super Bowl

The game could be postponed a week

NEW ORLEANS — NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and organizers of an auto dealers convention blocking a change in the date of the Super Bowl scheduled talks for today to resolve the problem.

Tagliabue and National Automobile Dealers Association President Phillip Brady met Monday in the Washington, D.C., area — where the group is based — and agreed to assign negotiators who will begin meeting Tuesday.

The talks will cover complicated issues ranging from financial compensation to resolving scheduling conflicts for the auto convention's nearly 30,000 participants and 600 vendors.

"We would certainly have to be indemnified by the league" for the cost of changing convention dates, said David Hyatt, spokesman for the auto dealers. "There are also some major logistical problems. It's not just dollars and cents."

The convention currently is scheduled for Feb. 2-5, the weekend after the original Super Bowl date of Jan. 27. But with NFL games pushed back a week in the wake of Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, the NFL wants to

hold the Super Bowl in New Orleans on Feb. 3.

Mayor Marc Morial has said the city cannot handle both events simultaneously, and NADA earlier told Tagliabue that it was too late to move its convention. But Tagliabue said Sunday that New Orleans remains the top choice as Super Bowl host, even on Feb. 3.

Hyatt said dealers have not put a precise dollar figure on what it would cost to change dates. The cost of the convention is between \$10 million and \$15 million, but he said there are other issues, including contracts signed with vendors.

"If there is a way to make it happen, we are going to make it

happen," he said. "The fact remains, we're looking at a logistical nightmare, and who knows what kind of liabilities will be incurred? We still have to see what the league can do about those."

It was not clear Monday how much it would cost the NFL to change the location of the Super Bowl.

In case no deal can be reached with the auto dealers, the NFL has contacted other cities — Miami, Tampa Bay and Los Angeles — to see if they could play host to this year's championship game. If the game were moved, NFL officials would consider holding the conference finals in New Orleans on Jan. 27.

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# No joy in Ohio for Iowa field hockey

The Iowa field-hockey team found nothing but distress in its third set of weekend road games.  
 Following a 4-1 loss against Big Ten Conference rival Ohio State on Sunday, Ohio University handed Iowa more dissatisfaction Monday in the form of a 4-0 shutout.  
 The Hawkeyes had held a 6-0 record, including four shutouts and one overtime victory, prior to last weekend's games.  
 Coach Tracey Griesbaum said she, as well as her players, were disappointed with both games.  
 "Right now, we're in the stages of figuring out why," she said. "In the first day, you can't spend too much time on a loss when you're only halfway through the weekend. I think there will be a lot of soul-searching and individual gut-checks this week."  
 The Bobcats (5-1) took a first-half lead when Elizabeth Holzman scored in the opening four minutes. Ali Johnstone added another goal to up the Ohio advantage to 2-0 at halftime.

Griesbaum linked a flat start from her team and early penalty corner opportunities in a failed attempt to rebound from Iowa's initial loss.  
 "In both offense and defense, we seemed like a step behind where we were," Griesbaum said. "Our confidence was shaken with an early goal, and our communication started to subside. Everything compounded, and we can't afford that in our sport."  
 In the second half, Johnstone picked up a second goal for the Bobcats before Kristin Auge topped the scoring off at 19:19.  
 Griesbaum said poor goal-keeping also contributed to Iowa's struggle, but she said she felt the team was prepared to play.  
 "The goalkeeping was weak this weekend," she said. "It doesn't help when we're struggling to get shots in and letting easy shots get by."  
 "I don't think we underestimated them [the Bobcats]; they beat us in a spring game. They have a strong center midfielder and back, but we made it easy for Ohio State and Ohio University to make us look like we

were standing still."  
 Iowa may encounter more difficulties this week, with only one practice before Friday's meeting against No. 4 Michigan. The Hawkeyes do not practice today, but Griesbaum said she had Wednesday's practice already planned.  
 The Wolverines (6-2) pounded Indiana 10-1 on Sunday, and they are currently undefeated in the conference. Griesbaum said the game will require all components of the Hawkeyes' attack to be intact.  
 "We will need to be physically and mentally intense, and I think we will be ready," she said. "I am looking to the bright side, thinking positively, and by no means taking anything for granted."

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# Upsets considered normal in NFL

San Diego and Cincinnati, a combined 5-27 last season, each are 2-0, and the Bengals shocked the Super Bowl-champion Baltimore Ravens. Tennessee, supposed to be one of the NFL's top teams, is 0-2.

What's going on is just more of the same — five of the last six teams to make the Super Bowl were .500 or worse the previous year.

Few people expected Cincinnati to beat Baltimore. But San Diego was almost everyone's pick to be the league's most-improved team — it's 2-0 after going 1-15 last season and could be 5-0 before it has to start playing games within the NFL's toughest division.

Even the Ravens have looked far from Super Bowl level in splitting their first two games.

"We've got to go back to the drawing board and look at what we did wrong, which was everything, and look at what we did right, which was nothing, and somehow get this thing fixed," Shannon Sharpe said after the Ravens were shocked, 21-10, at Cincinnati.

Baltimore is the perfect example of how quickly injuries can turn things around, the injury in question being the one to running back Jamal Lewis.

When your strength is defense, it's easy to play field position. The Ravens did that last season with Tony Banks and Trent Dilfer at quarterback, and even then they went five games — the entire month of October — without a touchdown.

But when you can't run — Lewis is out for the season — it's harder to do it passing. The

Ravens ran just 20 times for 64 yards after running 30 times for 54 in the opener, an ugly 17-6 win over Chicago.


So Elvis Grbac, a step up from Banks and Dilfer, threw a team-record 63 passes in Cincinnati. Three of them were picked off, one of them returned for a touchdown, and the Bengals won.

"Them not having a running game really hurt them," Cincinnati safety Cory Hall said. "When they were in the red zone, we were like, 'If you try to run it, you might get a yard or two, if that, so come on and beat us throwing.' And they couldn't do that."

Other surprises:  
• **Chargers (2-0).** Yes, they were 1-15 last season, but six of the losses were by three points or less. Doug Flutie has energized the team and LaDainian Tomlinson has been the heavy-duty running back they needed. The wins are over the Redskins and Cowboys, no big deal. The next three weeks are winnable — Cincinnati at home and at Cleveland and New England. Anyone for 5-0?

• **Bengals (2-0).** If you draft high enough long enough, you're bound to find some talent, such as Takeo Spikes, one of the NFL's better young linebackers, who had a 66-yard interception return for a TD on Sunday. Jon Kitna's been a solid QB for two games, which helps Corey Dillon; Darnay Scott is back with Peter Warrick and the brash young Chad Johnson to support him. Next week's game at San Diego is a big one.

• **Miami (2-0).** And those wins were over Tennessee and Oakland. The victory over the Raiders was at home, where Miami almost never loses in September. Jay Fiedler isn't

always pretty, but he's a winner — a younger Rich Gannon. And the defense remains solid, although it tends to wear down late in the season.

• **Jaguars (2-0).** Everyone looks at them as a team on the decline. Maybe they still are — they're awfully thin and if Fred Taylor is out for a while, they could slide. But they did finish 5-3 last season, Tom Coughlin remains a good coach, and they

still have a lot of big-time players — Taylor, Tony Boselli, Jimmy Smith, Mark Brunell, Kevin Hardy, Aaron Beasley, Tony Brackens, and more.

• **Titans (0-2).** The loss at home to Miami was a surprise. The loss in Jacksonville on Sunday, without Steve McNair, wasn't. And Eddie George is still recovering from foot surgery, making 20 carries for 79 yards on Sunday.

# No. 1 Miami appears rested for return

CORAL GABLES, Fla. — With a second consecutive Saturday off, Miami Hurricanes quarterback Ken Dorsey decided to play golf for the first time since last spring.

"I was rusty — downright pathetic," he said.

He hopes the top-ranked Hurricanes (2-0, 1-0 Big East) are much sharper Thursday night as they return from a bye week and a 19-day layoff against Pittsburgh (1-1, 0-0).

"It's so rare during the season to get time to do stuff you like to do off the field," Dorsey said Monday. "We've had time to relax and reflect on where we've been and where we want to go."

The Hurricanes opened the season with lopsided victories at Penn State and against Rutgers, outscoring them, 94-7,

then had their game against No. 13 Washington postponed until Nov. 24 because of the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, D.C.

Miami was idle Saturday, giving the Hurricanes almost three weeks between games. First-year Hurricanes coach Larry Coker tried to keep the layoff from becoming a distraction.

He mixed tough — and sometimes fun — practices with extra downtime for his players. He expects the results to show against the Panthers.

"Are we concerned about being rusty with a 19-day layoff? There's no doubt about it," Coker said. "We were in a pretty good rhythm, playing pretty well, and we were healthy. With the layoff, we'll see. We're not going to let that be an excuse."

"Our players have practiced well, practiced hard, and we expect to play very well Thursday night."

In the week following the attacks, Coker gave his players three days off. They returned to practice Sept. 18, and Coker matched the first-team offense against the first-team defense — a move rarely seen outside preseason drills.

"The best way to stay sharp is to play against the best," linebacker Jonathan Vilma said.

Coker also provided some entertainment. He held a scrimmage between the team's young offensive and defensive players, mostly freshmen. The players called it the "Toilet Bowl." They even made a trophy, taping a shoe to the top of an empty water-cooler bottle, for the most valuable player.

"We've tried to have some fun with it instead of making it a long, long grind," Coker said. "We did not want it to be August two-a-days."

Coker capped the long layoff — which was three days shy of being the same length as fall practice — with a second Saturday away from the football field.

Running back Clinton Portis spent the extra day sleeping and watching football, defensive tackle Matt Walters used the downtime to study, and linebacker Howard Clark went shopping.

And Dorsey played golf. Feeling refreshed, the Hurricanes say they are ready to continue their quest for a national title against the Panthers.

"We're a lot more focused this week than we were last week," Dorsey said. "We're so much more into what we want to do this season that a lack of preparation isn't even in the deck of cards. We're ready to go."

### Griffith to miss six weeks or more with broken leg

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP) — Minnesota Vikings strong safety Robert Griffith will miss at least six weeks with a broken leg, ending his streak of 70-straight starts.

Griffith, a Pro Bowl selection for the first time last season, was hurt on the opening kickoff of the Vikings' 17-10 loss to the Chicago Bears on Sunday.

Filling in on the kickoff team, his cleats got stuck in the grass when he tried to go to his right toward the ball. He wasn't touched.

Griffith, who wore a cast and used crutches Monday, broke his right fibula, near his ankle.

"When he comes back, there will

be a lot of football left to be played," coach Dennis Green said.

In the meantime, Griffith's absence is sure to hurt the 0-2 Vikings. He had 122 tackles for a defense that ranked 28th in the NFL last year.

Minnesota has showed some signs of improvement, but on Sunday it allowed 204 yards passing to Chicago's Jim Miller — who replaced the injured Shane Matthews — and allowed two fourth-quarter touchdown passes.

Don Morgan did a decent job replacing Griffith, but Green said the Vikings also were pursuing another player for that position.

Griffith, who joined the Vikings as an undrafted free agent in 1994 and blossomed into a starter two seasons later, hadn't missed a game since he sat out two weeks in November 1996 with a dislocated shoulder.

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

PITTSBURGH — Gary Matthews Jr., waived by Chicago last month, hit a tiebreaking homer in the eighth inning, and Pittsburgh rallied from five runs down for a 7-6 victory Monday night that seriously damaged the Cubs' playoff hopes.

It was the second tough loss for the Cubs in as many games, and it came

after Kerry Wood squandered a 5-0 lead in the sixth inning. The day before, the Cubs wasted Sammy Sosa's three homers in a 7-6 loss at Houston.

The Cubs stayed 3½ games behind St. Louis with 12 games to play in the NL wild-card race but missed a big opportunity to pick up a game on the Cardinals, who lost, 9-3, at Houston.

**Tigers 4, Royals 2**

**Bonds swings with a Canadian maple**

OTTAWA — In the Mayflower Pub and Restaurant five years ago, an idea emerged that changed a life and that might help Barry Bonds break the home-run record.

It was over a beer there that carpenter Sam Holman first got the challenge to build a better bat.

Today, Bonds is one of more than 300 major leaguers using those bats — a 34-inch Rideau Crusher made of maple, which is harder and more durable than the northern ash of Louisville Slugger fame.

After hitting two home runs Sunday, the San Francisco Giants' outfielder needs five more in the team's final 12 games of the regular season to break Mark McGwire's record of 70. His 66 so far are the most ever by a left-hander.

All have come off the red-handled, black-barreled bats crafted by Holman in the workshop of his Ottawa home.

A stocky man with a beer belly under his white denim overalls, the 56-year-old Holman turned the challenge from drinking buddy Bill MacKenzie — a former baseball scout with Montreal and Colorado — into a company that has sold 14,000 bats at \$50 each this year. Bonds gets a dozen a week.

Holman soon will open a new factory — at the site of a former

bar and brothel — that will make more than 300 bats a day. By comparison, industry giant Hillerich & Bradsby Co. turns out up to 1,500 daily, including Louisville Sluggers.

"Building factories at 56 is not exactly a wisdom sort of thing to do," Holman said amid the dust and clatter of construction.

His Midwest upbringing, in Kansas City and then rural South Dakota, contributes to his easygoing manner. The son of a veterinarian, Holman's baseball days ended with Little League.

# Farve, Green Bay blow out Redskins 37-0

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Brett Favre threw touchdown passes of 41 yards to Billy Schroeder and 12 yards to Antonio Freeman as the Green Bay Packers took a 20-0 lead over the Washington Redskins after three quarters Monday night.

Ahman Green, the NFL's leading rusher, had 102 yards on 21 carries as the third quarter ended with Green Bay again threatening deep in Redskins' territory.

The Redskins were outgained 217 yards to 70 in the first half but remained in striking distance at 10-0 thanks to rookie Fred Smoot's second interception of the season, an end zone pickoff of Favre with 23 seconds left in the second quarter.

But Washington's Jeff George, who has struggled to adapt to new coach Marty Schottenheimer's ball-control passing game and was benched in the opener, had another miserable performance.

He was sacked on four-straight third-down plays with an interception on second down in the run.

After going 6-of-10 for 37 yards in the first half, George was intercepted by Nate Wayne at his own 16 on the first series of the second half.

Wayne, who had strained a tendon in his left knee in the second quarter, nearly scored on the pickoff, the first of his career.

Washington's defense held and Ryan Longwell's 32-yarder made it 13-0.

Then, Schroeder, who hadn't caught a pass all night, caught a bullet from Favre in stride as he sliced through the coverage of Champ Bailey and Sam Shade on a quick slant for a 41-yard score.

The game capped the NFL's first weekend of play since it postponed all of Week 2 following the terrorist attacks on Washington, D.C., and New

York on Sept. 11.

It was 46 degrees at kickoff with a wind chill of 33.


In the first quarter, Freeman came up big after the Packers got the ball on the Redskins' 42 when Washington's Bryan Barker shanked a punt that went just 12 yards.

On fourth-and-2 from the 34, Favre executed a perfect play fake and hit a wide-open Corey Bradford for a gain of 22 yards. After an incompletion, Favre found Freeman with a touchdown strike over Sam Shade for a 7-0 lead with 6:23 left in the first quarter.

On that drive, Favre became the 12th quarterback in NFL history to surpass 35,000 yards passing.

Longwell's 28-yard field goal — which made him the sixth player in team history to score 500 points — made it 10-0 with 3:10 left in the first half.

Favre was 15-of-22 for 164 yards in the first half.

## Miami's defense shutting some down big-name players

DAVIE, Fla. (AP) — The Miami Dolphins shut down Eddie George, sent Steve McNair to the bench, and blanketed Jerry Rice and Tim Brown. Next comes the defense's toughest challenge yet.

Kurt Warner, Marshall Faulk and company are next for the Dolphins (2-0), who face a Super Bowl contender for the third-straight game Sunday at St. Louis.

In victories over Tennessee and Oakland, the Dolphins played the kind of defense that helped them win the AFC East last season. And the Rams possess the NFC's most explosive offense.

"The Rams are a big-play team," Miami coach Dave Wannstedt said Monday. "They're fast break. They want to play basketball and bring the ball down the court in a hurry. We've got to be able to keep up with that."

**Taylor out at least three weeks**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Jacksonville Jaguars running back Fred Taylor will be out at least three weeks with a groin injury.

Tests revealed a tendon had partially detached from the bone in the

groin area. Taylor said, "It felt like my body split in half" when he fell to the ground untouched in Sunday's 13-6 victory over Tennessee.

Coach Tom Coughlin said Taylor's status would be re-evaluated the week of Oct. 14. Jacksonville plays Cleveland Sept. 30, at Seattle on Oct. 7, then has a bye, followed by a game against Buffalo on Thursday, Oct. 18.

Taylor has missed games in all four of his NFL seasons due to injuries. He rushed for 1,399 yards last season despite missing three games with a knee injury.

"Sure, he's frustrated. We're all frustrated," Coughlin said. "He's got to rehab and get back as fast as he can."

**Biakabutuka having fumble problems**

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — The Carolina Panthers are wondering what to do with fumbling running back Tshimanga Biakabutuka.

Biakabutuka fumbled on his fifth carry in Sunday's 24-16 loss to the Atlanta Falcons and didn't touch the ball the rest of the game. In two games, he's lost two fumbles on just 10 carries.

His difficulty hanging onto the ball has already cost him his starting job. Rookie Nick Goings was the first running back in the loss to Atlanta.

"You can just say, 'Hey, the man's going to fight his way through it,' or you can make a change to where he just doesn't get his hands on the ball," coach George Seifert said. "It's going to be a day or two before I make a decision as to what we're going to do."

**Niners' Clark will undergo surgery**

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Tight end Greg Clark will undergo surgery on his right hamstring today, further delaying his first game with the San Francisco 49ers this season.

Clark, a starter for most of the past three seasons, hasn't practiced yet this season while recovering from offseason surgery on both hamstrings. The 49ers don't know when he'll return.

"We were hoping to have him back by now," coach Steve Mariucci said.

Last season, Clark caught a career-best 38 passes for 342 yards and two TDs.

Rookie Eric Johnson was the 49ers' starting tight end in their 30-26 loss to St. Louis on Sunday. Johnson, a seventh-round draft pick from Yale, has seven catches for 48 yards this season, but he dropped two passes against the Rams, including a potential TD reception.

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## Return could bring life to Wizards

the ownership documents are finished," NBA deputy commissioner Russ Granik said. "It just requires Michael's decision as to whether he's going to play."

Jordan not only must sell his shares in the team, he will have to relinquish his job as Wizards president of basketball operations. Those responsibilities will probably be turned over to general manager Wes Unseld and assistant general manager Rod Higgins.

Unseld and Higgins would be free to consult with Jordan, but NBA tampering rules would prohibit Jordan from talking with officials from other teams.

The question of "whether" Jordan will return has essentially been replaced by "when," and this latest dispute over licensing — if it drags on — could conceivably delay the announcement for several days.

Rather than be included in the group licensing agreement between the players' union and the league, Jordan reached his own licensing agreement with the NBA in 1992 — a side deal that would remain in effect for the upcoming season and beyond when Jordan returns.

The quarrel that led to Monday's holdup apparently involved amending that agreement.

Many Wizards fans no longer doubt whether the five-time

league MVP will be in uniform: Season-ticket sales have surpassed the 12,000 mark, up more than 2,000 from the end of last season, and are approaching a franchise record.

"Our phones were busy all day," Wizards spokesman Matt Williams said.

Jordan's comeback will bring

life, if not victories, to a moribund team that hasn't won a playoff game in 13 years. The Wizards will steal the spotlight the Capitals seized when they signed Jaromir Jagr and could even command more local attention than the Redskins — a rarity during football season in the nation's capital.
