## 2 citizens file suit against Coralville

Two Coralville citizens filed a lawsuit Wednesday in an effort to stop the city from borrowing \$33 million for a hotel and conference center, saying it's risky financing that pushes the city past its legal debt limit.

The lawsuit, brought by residents Karen Fults and Wayne Siems, also asks the court to bar Coralville officials from merging two tax increment financing districts for the project, contending that the agreement would rob \$4.8 million in tax revenue from local schools and governments.

The suit aims to stop the \$63 million project that will displace several Coralville business owners, including Fults, when the city purchases land south of Interstate 80 for the projects.

"I just can't see a convention center going down there and everyone losing their business," said Fults, who owns Iowa City Excavating & Grading Inc. in Coralville.

Coralville officials have defended both agreements, which would make the hotel and conference center more affordable.

"They must have just woken up from a coma," one councilor said Wednesday. "This issue has been on the table for years."

The issue has been discussed and publicized in city council meetings since February 1999, said Councilor David Jacoby. The lawsuit is unwarranted and will cost taxpayers more in legal fees than the proposed plan, he added.

Cities in Iowa may only borrow 5 percent of their total assessed value, which is \$44 million this year in Coralville's case. As of last month, the city had piled up nearly 90 percent — or about \$40 million — of possible debt, records show.

The lawsuit alleges borrowing the \$33 million puts Coralville past its debt limit, which would render the city unable to borrow the cash. Coralville officials

## Deadly U.S. assault a 'horrific' mistake

**KHAS URUZGAN, Afghanistan** — Caked blood, charred bedding, and flame-blackened walls serve as testimony to what Afghans say was a horrific mistake. Two weeks later, the Pentagon is investigating the deadly assault.

U.S. Special Forces burst into a small religious school here on Jan. 23, killing 19 people, most of them where they slept, Afghans who survived or witnessed the raid told the Associated Press. Two of the 19 — both government-appointed officials — were handcuffed and shot in the schoolyard, the Afghans contend.

The Pentagon first said the raid was an attack on an Al Qaeda weapons dump and that troops killed approximately 15 people and captured 27 Taliban and Al Qaeda members. But the Afghans say the dead were not Taliban fighters at all but members of a government mission that had

taken the weapons from Taliban holdouts.

Ralph Mills, a spokesman for the U.S. Central Command, acknowledged Wednesday that none of the 27 captured in the raid was a member of Al Qaeda or Taliban, and all have been released. He said the United States is investigating whether any of those killed were also the wrong people.

Mills said U.S. forces were fired on during the raid, and one soldier was shot in the foot. He said the troops had strong intelligence information before moving in.

"Obviously, we had a reason to go into that area. We still stand firmly on that reason," he said.

Interim Afghan leader Hamid Karzai said the United States has acknowledged it killed the wrong people in Khas Uruzgan. He told the *Washington Post* that the killings were "a mistake of sorts," resulting from "an unfortunate movement of people at the wrong time."

## UIHC eyes using bonds for project

A bill introduced in the state Legislature Monday would give the UI Hospitals and Clinics permission to borrow money from patient revenue to help pay for a \$725 million renovation project, which includes an advanced cancer clinic.

House Minority Leader Dick Myers, D-Coralville, introduced the measure, which is now in the House Appropriations Committee.

Under the bill, the UIHC would be able to pursue up to \$100 million in bonding for renovations from the state of Iowa Board of Regents. Normally, regents are not authorized to issue bonds for more than \$9 million.


Bond proceeds will be used to pay for the proposed Center of Excellence in Image-Guided Radiation Therapy, a major project that will provide advanced cancer treatment in the form of image-guided radiation oncology services. The center will be housed in an underground development west of Pomerantz Family Pavilion.

"This is going to significantly help reduce the pain and suffering from cancer treatment," said John Buatti, the head of radiation oncology. "Hopefully, it will reduce the length of stay for cancer patients who live far away and decrease the side-effects of radiation."

Other projects the bonds could pay for include patient-care units in the general hospital, which will be moved to the Pappajohn Pavilion. The

## Popular officer to go to camp

Iowa City police Sgt. Mike Brotherton will be strapping on a backpack instead of a firearm for the next three months.

The spokesman for the Iowa City police will take a three-month hiatus from the force to attend an administrative law-enforcement program at the University of Louisville. Brotherton's many duties will be divided among other officers while he's gone, said Iowa City Police Chief R.J. Winkelhake.

"It's comparable with the FBI National Academy," Brotherton said. "I feel very fortunate to be able to attend."

The training, which is necessary for those seeking police-chief qualifications, will be paid for by department and city funding, Winkelhake said.

"We are certainly going to miss him, but in the long run, this will be beneficial for both him and the department," he said.

Brotherton's interest in police work was sparked after he was introduced by a mutual friend to an Iowa City police officer who gave him insights into the profession.

"I had never really consid-

ered law enforcement as a career," Brotherton said. "But then I saw that police work was actually public service and really fit my interests."

## Two councilors push for increased wages

Although Iowa City city councilors received a \$500 raise last month, two of them say higher salaries would allow councilors to focus more on city matters and attract more people to run for the positions.

Councilor Steven Kanner said raising councilors' annual salaries to \$15,000 would allow more people in the low- to moderate-income bracket to become interested in serving on the council. A majority of the council, he said, is composed of upper-income citizens and business owners.

Kanner also said higher salaries would allow councilors to work less at other jobs. He spends 20 hours a week on council business while working part-time at the UI's Oakdale Campus.

Councilors, who are consid-

ered part-time employees, are allotted a cost-of living raise every two years in accordance with a city ordinance. In January, salaries increased from \$5,512 to \$6,052. Mayor Ernie Lehman's salary also increased \$500 to \$7,052.80. All salaries are paid out of the city's general fund.

Salaries in other cities vary depending on the governmental infrastructure. In Cedar Rapids, where serving on the city council is a full-time job, the mayor makes roughly \$73,000 per year, and the four commissioners make \$68,000 apiece.

Councilor Irvin Pfab said Iowa City's salary "shuts too many people out."

"If people wanted to take the risk of running for City Council and win, they should be able to raise a family [with their

# UI faculty resignations hurting morale

Recent resignations at the UI are weighing heavily on faculty morale, with some school leaders worried that the school's reputation is crumbling.

While there were fewer resignations in fiscal year 2001 than in 2000, nearly 90 percent of UI faculty members who did resign reported leaving to accept higher paying positions at other colleges and in the private sector, according to a report released by the state of Iowa Board of Regents in January.

Faculty Senate President Amitava Bhattacharjee said the turnover, coupled with recent budget cuts, is a reason for worry.

"It has an enormous impact on faculty morale," he said. "What took many years to build could erode quite quickly."

Sixty-seven UI faculty

resigned in fiscal year 2001: 41 accepted positions in other academic institutions, 19 left to go to the private sector, and the remaining seven resigned for personal reasons.

Ellen Millender, an assistant professor in both the history and classics departments, will leave after the spring semester to begin work at Reed College, a private school in Portland, Ore.

Although she will earn a higher salary at Reed than at the UI, Millender, who's been at the UI for four years, said that was not a factor in her resignation.

Rather, she said, a combination of personal and professional reasons — including differences between the UI's and Reed's approaches toward education — resulted in her resignation.

"This university is obsessed with how many students we can teach at a time," Millender said. "It's like McDonald's: How many people can we serve? That's not

how we should look at education."

The chairman of the history department, Ken Cmiel, said he expects class sizes in the department will rise because of budget constraints, but, he said, larger classes come with the territory of a public university.

"When you're teaching at a state institution, that's what you generally expect," he said.

Millender's resignation will have a significant effect on the department because she is the only professor teaching courses in the history of Ancient Greece and Rome.

"It adds another hole in the department," Cmiel said. "We don't have anyone to do ancient history now, and that's a heck of a lot of history."

Millender said although the budget cuts didn't directly affect her decision to leave, she's still concerned about the situation.

"Given the budget con-

straints, I'd be very surprised if my position gets filled in the near future," she said.

UI Provost Jon Whitmore said certain positions in other departments won't be filled immediately because of the tight budget.

"We'll hire fewer new faculty than we have in the last two to three years," he said.

Cmiel remains hopeful that the history department will fill Millender's position in ancient studies and remain strong.

"Faculty are certainly concerned and worried, but I don't see masses of people running for the exit just yet," he said.

Resignations occurred in nine of the university's 11 colleges, with the largest number in the College of Medicine, followed by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

### House approves tighter victim impact effort

DES MOINES (AP) — A convicted criminal would have to be present when victims testify about the impact the crime has had on their lives under a measure given House approval on Wednesday.

"It's an important part of the healing process," said Rep. Patrick Shey, R-Cedar Rapids, the bill's main backer.

The House approved the measure on a 93-0 vote, sending it to the Senate, where approval is likely.

The bill was prompted the gruesome slayings of two women who were visiting Iowa City. They were beaten to death, their bodies left in an apartment that was set on fire to cover the crime.

Jonathan Memmer, a drifter from Marshalltown, was convicted and sentenced to life in prison, but when families of the victims came to offer their victim impact statements during the sentencing hearing, he was allowed to leave the courtroom.

"There is a lot of grief that the whole community feels," said Mary Mascher, D-Iowa City. "There was a lot of outrage that a murderer was allowed to leave the courtroom."

# Blame game on U.S. economic bill begins

WASHINGTON — Republicans sought to blame Senate Democratic leader Tom Daschle for the collapse Wednesday of the economic bill. Democrats said the true culprit was an insatiable GOP appetite for tax cuts that favor businesses and the wealthy.

The two sides traded shots after the Senate failed to muster

the 60 votes necessary to end debate on competing GOP and Democratic proposals. That guaranteed gridlock and led Daschle to remove the issue from consideration.

The Senate approved a straightforward 13-week extension of benefits for the unemployed, a measure that now goes to the House.

Despite bipartisan cooperation that followed the Sept. 11 terror attacks, proposals to

boost the economy were mired in politics from the beginning as the two sides could not agree on the right mix of tax cuts and government spending.

Daschle, the nation's highest-ranking elected Democrat, was portrayed by Republican leaders as unwilling to compromise even after the House twice passed GOP-written economic packages. President Bush has pushed for one for months, asserting that it would be a

tonic to the recession.

Daschle's legislation providing \$69 billion in stimulus this year that got 56 votes Wednesday, which represented a Senate majority but fell short of the 60-vote procedural threshold. That bill included unemployment aid, Medicaid money to help state budgets, a 30 percent depreciation tax break for business investment, and a new round of tax-rebate checks aimed at lower-income people.

# Lindh to remain locked up

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — A federal judge ordered John Walker Lindh held in custody pending trial on Wednesday as prosecutors revealed e-mails he said showed the U.S.-born Taliban felt clear "hostility toward his country."

Magistrate Judge W. Curtis Sewell denied bail after concluding that the 20-year-old Lindh "has every incentive to flee" and posed a danger to society.

Ruling from the bench rather than taking time to deliberate, Sewell rejected Lindh's request to be released into the custody of his parents — who had pleaded in vain for their son to return home from overseas.

The government and defense used the hearing in federal court here to present widely divergent portrayals of the young Californian who left home and turned his life to Islam.

"He is not a dangerous person," lead defense lawyer James Brosnahan said of his client. "He never had anything to do with terrorist activities."

Brosnahan said Lindh fought with Afghanistan's ruling Taliban against the opposition Northern Alliance, not knowing that would eventually put him against fellow Americans.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Randy Bellows countered, "Our view is that John Lindh is a committed terrorist who not only talked the talk but walked the walk."

The government also responded to Brosnahan with a written motion that cited Lindh's e-mails and letters, providing far more details about the prosecution's case.

Lindh, who will be arraigned Feb. 11, was charged this week in a 10-count indictment that accuses him of conspiring to kill Americans and aiding terrorists.

# CIA director: Al Qaeda may target 'high-profile' events

WASHINGTON — The director of the CIA said Wednesday that Osama bin Laden's Al Qaeda terrorist group remains a serious threat, interested in striking "high-profile" American targets including the Olympics that open Friday in Salt Lake City.

George Tenet, facing tough questions about Sept. 11, also acknowledged that the CIA never will be able to foresee all attacks.

"We know they will continue to plan, we know they will hurt us again," Tenet said. "We have to minimize their ability to do

so because there is no perfection in this business."

In his first testimony to Congress since the attacks on the World Trade Center and Pentagon, the head of America's intelligence service outlined a wide range of threats against the United States and said Al Qaeda remains the most immediate.

Its terrorists have considered attacks against high-profile U.S. government or private facilities, famous landmarks, airports, bridges, harbors, and dams, Tenet said.

"High-profile events such as the Olympics or last weekend's Super Bowl also fit the terrorists' interests in striking another blow within the United

States that would command worldwide media attention," Tenet told the Senate Intelligence Committee.

Security officials at the Olympics have said they are not aware of any specific threat to the games.

"Their modus operandi is to continue to have multiple attack plans in the works simultaneously and to have Al Qaeda cells in place to conduct them," Tenet said.

The U.S.-led war on terrorism has brought arrests of nearly 1,000 Al Qaeda operatives in more than 60 countries, and ruined the group's ability to train recruits in Afghan camps, he said.

# Enron execs rode the gravy train

WASHINGTON — Enron's use of partnerships not only hid the company's losses and huge debts, it made a few company insiders very rich, very fast — with almost no financial risk.

The biggest hauls, investigators say, were by those who created and ran the complex web of shell investment entities that were largely financed by Enron and concealed the company's shaky balance sheet.

Two of those men — Andrew Fastow, who created the partnerships, and Michael Kopper — are expected to appear today at a House Energy and Commerce subcommittee hearing. They are considered likely to decline to answer questions, citing the Fifth Amendment protection against self-incrimination.

Over a two-month period, a family foundation run by Fastow turned \$25,000 into \$4.5 million. Kopper saw an investment of \$125,000 become \$10.5 million in less than three years. Lesser players, brought into the network of transactions by Fastow and Kopper, earned \$500,000 to \$1 million from investments of less than \$3,000 to \$5,800.

"Is that even legal?" Rep. Bart Stupak, D-Mich., asked at a hearing into Enron's collapse.

"Not without taking a tremendous amount of risk," replied William Powers, the University of Texas law-school dean and Enron investigator. In these cases, he added, the investors "took very little risk" and often were wheeling and dealing among themselves.

The source of their windfall was a system of investment entities with names such as Jedi and Chewco (from the Star Wars movies), Raptor and Rhythms, and Big Doe, apparently a play on words.

One partnership, called Southampton Place, which is also the name of the uppercrust Houston neighborhood where Fastow lived, proved to be especially lucrative.

Fastow, through a family-owned foundation, cashed in on \$4.5 million from his \$25,000 investment in Southampton Place after holding it only two months.

Other investors in the partnership were Benjamin Glisan, a former Enron treasurer who also was involved in setting up several of the partnerships, Kristin Mordaunt, an attorney

and later general counsel of Enron Communications, and several employees of Fastow's finance department, one of whom said she was told that her ability to invest was viewed as a "bonus" for good work.

Both Glisan and Mordaunt invested \$5,800 and collected approximately \$1 million, according to investigators. The other employees invested less than \$3,000; they are believed to have earned returns of roughly \$500,000 each, according to the internal Enron investigation.

Like Fastow, Kopper invested \$25,000 in Southampton Place but did it through a related entity called Big Doe. How much he gained is not yet determined, Powers said.

Kopper did extremely well on another front.

Fastow had recruited him in late 1997 to manage Chewco Investments, one of the key partnerships. Over three years, Kopper earned \$2 million in management fees although Powers' report concluded that it could not be determined "what, if anything, Kopper did to justify the payments."

In mid-2000, it was decided Enron should purchase Chewco, in which Kopper was the principal investor.

### Two charged with meth-related crimes

Two Fairfield, Iowa, residents were arrested Wednesday after separately purchasing large amounts of precursors to methamphetamine at neighboring Iowa City grocery stores, according to police reports.

Jackie Ollom, 44, and Angel Hill, 20, were both charged with possession of precursors to methamphetamine Wednesday near Wal-Mart and Cub Foods, which are both off of Highway 1 in Iowa City.

While the two were arrested at different locations, police believe they were working together.

Ollom allegedly purchased a large amount of pseudoephedrine from Wal-Mart and immediately afterwards went to Cub Foods to buy more of the drug, police said. When police responded to a report of the large purchase, the defendant allegedly confessed he was planning to trade the pills for methampheta-

mines and that he has a history of trading pills, police said.

Police stopped Hill in her vehicle at Wal-Mart. She was allegedly in possession of a vial of methamphetamine and ephedrine, also a precursor to the highly addictive drug, police said. Hill was later charged with operating while intoxicated after a drug test allegedly revealed she was under the influence of methamphetamine, police said.

Kay is a 6-foot-2 white male, weighing 174 pounds. He has brown hair and blue eyes.

Police say the notification serves only as a means for members of the public to protect themselves. Any action taken against Kay or his family, including vandalism of property and oral or physical assault, can result in arrest and prosecution.

# U.S. trader suspected of defrauding Ireland's largest bank of \$750 million

BALTIMORE — A Baltimore-based foreign-exchange dealer is missing and is suspected of defrauding Allied Irish Banks of \$750 million, officials of Ireland's biggest company said Wednesday.

The loss sent the bank's shares tumbling on world markets.

The suspected fraud at the Baltimore-based subsidiary, Allfirst Bank, would be the biggest connected to a rogue trader since Singapore dealer Nick Leeson destroyed Britain's Barings Bank by piling up \$1.4 billion in concealed losses in the mid-1990s.

Allfirst CEO Susan Keating identified the trader as John Rusnak of Baltimore.

"He was a solid performer," she told reporters in Baltimore. "Clearly, the controls broke down. We don't fully understand how those broke down."

Allied Irish Chief Executive Michael Buckley said the trader is a father of two in his mid-40s with a salary of \$85,000.

"We are hugely disappointed that our Allfirst control procedures failed to uncover this situation at an earlier stage," Buckley said. "The investigation now under way will determine not only how it arose but also how we can guard against any recurrence."

Buckley said he had asked the FBI to help track down the missing trader, who could have been working in collusion with others in the phony options scam.

"We are investigating a matter at All-

first Bank with suspected financial loss," said Barry Maddox of the FBI's Baltimore field office.

Maddox said no arrest warrants have been issued, and he declined to comment further.

A neighbor in Baltimore, Chris O'Neill, 47, said the FBI came to his house Tuesday night to ask about the whereabouts of Rusnak. O'Neill said he didn't know where he was.

FBI spokesman Peter Gulotta Jr., also in Baltimore, confirmed that an investigation was under way but said, "No one has been charged in the matter."

Buckley told journalists and European analysts that mid-level Allfirst managers had confronted the trader by telephone last weekend when the magnitude of the fabricated trading documents was discovered following several weeks of investigation.

Allied Irish's director for finance and risk, Gary Kennedy, said "alarm bells went off" when the trader didn't return calls Sunday night, then didn't arrive for work Monday. He said the bogus trades dated back to early 2001 and included one shortly after Christmas.

But it wasn't until Monday night, they said, that Allfirst executives telephoned their Dublin bosses with the news. Buckley said he sent senior Allied Irish managers on the first plane from Dublin on Tuesday morning and ordered several Allfirst staffers to be suspended.

Allfirst has suspended all foreign-exchange dealings except for over-the-counter and retail transactions, Buckley said.

# Kansas teacher quits after plagiarism fight

PIPER, Kan. — High-school teacher Christine Pelton wasted no time after discovering that nearly a fifth of her biology students had plagiarized their semester projects from the Internet.

She had received her rural Kansas district's backing before when she accused students of cheating, and she expected it again this time after failing the 28 sophomores.

Her principal and superintendent agreed: It was plagiarism, and the students should get a zero for the assignment.

But, after parents complained, the Piper School Board ordered her to go easier on the guilty.

Pelton resigned in protest in an episode that some say reflects a national decline in integrity.

"This kind of thing is happening every day around the country, where people with integrity are not being backed by their organizations," said

Michael Josephson, the founder and president of the Josephson Institute of Ethics in Marina del Rey, Calif.

Josephson pointed to the Enron bankruptcy scandal, in which an executive whistleblower had warned superiors about the potential consequences of energy trader's off-the-books business deals.

Also in recent months, some of the nation's top historians, including Stephen Ambrose, have been accused of borrowing passages from other authors without giving proper credit.

Pulitzer Prize-winning historian Joseph Ellis was suspended without pay for a year from Mount Holyoke College after lying to his students about serving in Vietnam. Notre Dame University football coach George O'Leary resigned after falsifying his athletics and academic achievements on his résumé.

"It's so hard to keep sending the message that character counts when you have officials saying it doesn't count that much," Josephson said.

# 'Pill mill' doctor on trial in deaths

MILTON, Fla. — The parking lot outside the office of Dr. James Graves always seemed to be full of people waiting to see him. Some patients ate lunch as they passed the time, while others worked on their cars.

"Some of them were staggering," recalled Russell Poerner, a physical therapist who worked next door to the practice in suburban Pensacola. "Some of them were holding on to cars for balance."

According to prosecutors, Graves was running an illegal — and deadly — "pill mill" for addicts and dealers, who paid him hundreds of thousands of dollars for prescriptions of the painkiller OxyContin and other drugs.

Graves, 54, is now on trial on manslaughter charges in the OxyContin overdose deaths of four patients.

He is believed to be the first doctor in the country to stand trial on manslaughter or murder charges in the deaths of patients who had been prescribed OxyContin. At least two other doctors are awaiting trial.

"If you came in and said you had pain, you got prescriptions," prosecutor Russell Edgar told the jury. "There was no record of any treatment because there was no treatment."

Graves, who was arrested in June 2000, is offering the same defense as the other doctors: The patients died because they abused the drug.

Under sentencing guidelines, Graves could get 15 to 30 years in prison if convicted on all counts of manslaughter, racketeering, and unlawful delivery of a controlled substance. The prosecution rested Monday, and the defense started its case Tuesday.

OxyContin, introduced six years ago, is a slow-release narcotic that lasts approximately

12 hours. It is prescribed for victims of moderate to severe chronic pain suffering from such problems as arthritis, back trouble, and cancer. But addicts have found they can get a quick, heroin-like high by chewing the pills or crushing them and snorting or injecting the drug.

The Drug Enforcement Administration blames OxyContin for 117 deaths in the past two years and suspects the drug in 179 other deaths.

The drug's maker, Purdue Pharma of Stamford, Conn., says the number of deaths tied to the drug has been exaggerated, but it took the strongest version of OxyContin off the market last year.

Graves is a former Navy doctor who was fired from a Pensacola pain center in 1998 after selling pills to patients in parking lots and failing to record prescriptions in patient records, according to his employer, Dr. Thomas Hutchinson.



# Two residents file lawsuit against city of Coralville

contend that the money will be paid with revenue created by the new facility, which one consultant has estimated will bring in \$2.8 million by its fifth year. Coralville citizens last week sent a letter and petition to the State Auditor's Office requesting a partial re-audit of the city's financial activities. "In general, we are concerned about the amount of debt carried by our city and the reporting and accounting of that debt at all points in time covering our request," the letter stated. In addition, Fuels and Siems accused the city of failing to properly notify citizens of their right to petition to vote on the bond. A notice outlining the city's intentions, however, was printed 10 days prior to the Jan.

22 decision as Iowa law requires. "There's no way people could protest something they knew nothing about," said Bruce Nestor, attorney for the plaintiffs. On Jan. 8, Jacoby and other councilors voted to merge the TIF districts as an effort to make the project more viable. In simple terms, the move shifts to the project \$4.8 million in property taxes that would normally go to schools and local governments. The suit argues that the districts are "non-contiguous and unrelated," according to the documents filed Wednesday in Johnson County District Court. The Coral Ridge Mall TIF district should not be used to fund projects in the "Highway 6 Urban Renewal District," which includes the land along the

Interstate 80 right-of-way, the lawsuit asserts. The merger brought forward much debate during council meetings. Councilors argued that consolidating would make the center more affordable and went forward with the plan despite objections from the county. The 152,000 square-foot conference center will include a 200-room hotel with exhibit and meeting space. Its completion is scheduled for late 2004, and the city has been negotiating with business owners to buy the rest of the land needed. Some business and property owners have said they would like to resist the city's efforts to purchase their land and Nestor said Wednesday others might join the lawsuit. Almost a quarter of a century later, he said, he often thinks about what might have been if he had chosen a different profession. His love for flying made becoming a military pilot a tempting option, he said, but not enough to make him turn in his badge. Throughout his career, Brotherton has held many posts in the department, but his favorite remains his years as detective, from 1989 to 1994. During that time, he was involved in several major cases.

Among these were the Donna Marshall homicide case, which is going into its sixth year of investigation. He also worked with the FBI in busting drug lord Greg Halter, who is serving a 25-year-sentence in a federal prison. "We had wiretaps, airplane surveillance — the whole works," he said of the Halter case. "It's the only time when we were able to bring down a whole drug cartel." For the past year, he has handled media relations for the department, along with producing a series of police information videos about such issues as school bus safety, safe driving, and downtown regulations.

Around the department, Brotherton is described as hard-working, honest, fair, and considerate — traits he said he strives to be in his daily duties. "I've had victims of crime, as well as people I have arrested, come up to me years later and say they appreciated what I did," he said. "I've always tried to do the best job I could." After 23 years on the force, Brotherton said, he wouldn't change anything. "I'd rather look to the future than dwell on the past," he said. "This is the start of a new adventure." # Colombian rebels oppose pipeline plan

BOGOTA, Colombia — The Bush administration's plan to help Colombia protect an oil pipeline from guerrilla attacks proves that Washington wants to intervene militarily in this country's civil war, a rebel leader said Wednesday.

"The mask has been taken off," rebel commander Simon Trinidad said in a telephone interview from a southern stronghold of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, which is known as FARC.

Bush administration officials, who ended a three-day visit to Colombia on Wednesday, announced plans Tuesday to train and arm Colombian troops to protect a key oil pipeline that has been a frequent target of guerrilla attacks.

The move, which faces debate in the U.S. Congress, marks a departure from a policy that had previously limited military aid to Colombia to wiping out drug crops controlled by the rebels and their paramilitary foes.

FARC has long opposed Washington's anti-drug aid, which has provided for the training of counter-narcotics troops by U.S. Special Forces in addition to dozens of combat helicopters and fumigation planes. The aid is part of an anti-drug initiative called Plan Colombia.

"From the beginning, we said that Plan Colombia was a counterinsurgency plan," Trinidad said. "No one believed the story

that it was a plan against drug trafficking. Now, the mask has been taken off."

Instead of increasing aid to the Colombian military, Trinidad insisted that U.S. military personnel be withdrawn from this South American country.

"They are here to pursue a war against our own people, and they have taught the military the doctrine of ... state terrorism," he said over the phone from Los Pozos, inside a safe haven that President Andres Pastrana granted to the rebels three years ago.

The plan outlined Tuesday calls for Washington to provide \$98 million to train and equip Colombian troops to protect the 480-mile Cano-Limon oil pipeline, which ferries oil to the Caribbean coast for Los Angeles-based Occidental Petroleum and other companies.

Colombia's state oil company, Ecopetrol, said rebel sabotage of oil operations cost 24 million barrels in lost crude production last year. Colombia is the 10th-largest supplier of oil to the United States.

"We are committed to helping Colombians create a Colombia that is a peaceful, prosperous, drug-free and terror-free democracy," the leader of the U.S. delegation leader, Undersecretary of State Marc Grossman, said on Tuesday.

Under restrictions set by Congress, up to 400 U.S. military personnel can currently be stationed in Colombia at one time. They have been deployed as part of Washington's

# Avalanche buries key Afghanistan highway

KABUL, Afghanistan — An avalanche roared down the towering Hindu Kush mountains Wednesday, burying approximately 20 vehicles in snow near the world's highest tunnel, a U.N. spokesman said.

There was no immediate word on casualties or how many people might be buried near the Salang Tunnel, a key aid conduit some 80 miles north of Kabul, said U.N. spokesman Yusuf Hassan.

The tunnel, which at nearly two miles in length is a widely admired engineering feat, was extensively damaged in Afghanistan's wars but was reopened in January after Russian-led repairs.

The large number of vehicles trapped in the avalanche raised fears that an aid convoy had been buried, but U.N. and Red Cross officials said there was no immediate indication their vehicles were involved.

A helicopter from the international peacekeeping force went to the scene, but the U.N. has no bulldozers or snowplows in the area, Hassan said.

Substantial snowfalls in recent days in Kabul and some other parts of the country have raised hopes that Afghanistan is seeing the end of a three-year drought that has aggravated the devastation of war.

But the snow has also blocked aid from reaching some remote regions, underlining how the country's severe terrain and primitive infrastructure complicate the interim government's efforts to lead the country toward stability and security.

The government is increasingly trying to exert control over the warlords who took control of regions in the power vacuum that followed the fall of the Taliban last November. Prime Minister Hamid Karzai on Wednesday flew to the western city of Herat for talks with Ismail Khan, the warlord who holds sway in that area.

## Should Congress pass a law letting churches endorse candidates?

### Current non-endorsement rule is completely unenforceable

It is wrong for a church to endorse a political candidate. This has already been established to the left. Churches receive tax relief for agreeing to not give the congregation their two cents worth. However, because such a law is unenforceable by conventional means, a few drastic things will have to be done.

A military figure, for example, should definitely stand in the back of the room to monitor the sermon for any of those sly little priests who think they can slip in a hint on whom to vote for. The monitor should carry a large gun to show that he means business, and perhaps he should have mean-looking dogs. This soldier could then go and inform the police of the offending church. How else would the church be brought to justice?

"sermon police." This would be a group of experts on what endorsement entails and whether the church has in fact done it. The "sermon police" would then be the ones to dole out consequences for the violators. But the line shouldn't really be drawn there.

Extra rules should be enacted. For instance, anyone who holds a church-leadership position should not be allowed to pray in regard to elections. This would indicate that they care an extra amount for their candidate and believe that the congregation should vote for her or him. These rules should apply to all religious groups, yoga classes, and reli-

gious weekend retreats. For safety, no church leader should be allowed to mention politics or political figures for fear of the "sermon police," who will attend the retreats as well. Along the same lines, a priest shouldn't tell people that any certain fast-food restaurant is better than another. That certainly could be considered a form of endorsement.

Short of the stated rules, it isn't possible to stop church endorsement. If that annoying First Amendment could just be eliminated, or the freedom of religion idea trashed, the whole thing would run a lot more smoothly. While endorsing candidates may not be the right thing to do, the resources that would be needed to enforce this rule are far greater than the damage done by a church leader's endorsement.

### Church improper place for political endorsements

What does the separation of church and state mean? In 1954, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D-Texas, pushed an amendment through both houses of Congress that stated "all groups with a nonprofit, or 501(c) 3, tax-exempt status are prohibited from endorsing or opposing candidates." This amendment was to include churches and other places of worship. Because churches obey this law, they receive a tax break.

This seems like a good deal. Not only do these churches remain removed from political matters, but they also receive tax-exempt status. Nevertheless, several people, including Walter B. Jones Jr., R-N.C., are pushing to amend this law "by permitting churches and other houses of worship to engage in political campaigns." Many others who are in support of this change say it is not the job of the IRS to be the "speech police"; allowing these worship centers to speak their

mind is only a matter of free speech. This is not a matter of free speech. This is a matter of politics, which is completely different.

Those in favor of allowing political campaigning inside the church are those in politics, not those who have nothing to lose if the law remains the same. In all actuality, are those running for office really losing or gaining much by having the church rally behind them? No. All they are gaining is an insignificant number of votes. In return for a church leader supporting a candidate, do these churches want to give up their tax-exempt status? Probably not. The church and other worship centers cannot have it both ways. If the church wanted to support a candidate, it would have to give up its tax-exempt status.

Rev. Ed Young has said, "The religious entities of America need to keep their prophetic voice, and you lose

that if you send money to politicians or openly support them during an election." There is a reason that people attend church and other worship centers — to hear the word of their god and to worship, not to be taught that Candidate X is whom you should vote for. This law is not taking away from church leaders' right to free speech. It is just saying that they are not allowed to endorse a candidate inside the church if they want to receive a tax break.

Barry Lynn, the executive director of Americans United for Separation of Church and State, makes another valid point: "If we change it, we're going to see politicians running around seeking support of churches and hoping that they can curry favor with those churches promising them money and favors." There is a time and place for politics. The church is not one of them.

# America — creeping quietly toward socialism

Last week, President Bush proposed the expansion or creation of 39 programs in his State of the Union Address. Proposals ranged from a radically expanded AmeriCorps to new military spending. Earlier this week, Bush followed this proposal of government largesse with a budget totaling \$2.13 trillion. That means each of us will lose an average \$7,500 to the federal government in 2003.

Few would accuse Bush or Republicans in general of supporting socialism. However, the data support a different conclusion. Government is a leading growth industry. Bush's budget is 3.7 percent greater than this year's budget. In low-inflation times such as today (consumer-price and producer-price indices actually showed deflation in December), that represents real growth in government. At this rate, it would take only about 20 years for government to double in size. Even worse, Bush's proposal increases discretionary spending by 33 percent over former President Clinton's projections.

The portion of the economy run by government is the true test of how socialist a country is becoming. Government is

consuming a growing portion of our gross domestic product. GDP is how much our country produces. In the last quarter of 2001, the GDP grew by a mere 0.2 percent. Government led the growth at 9.2 percent. The next-highest contributor to GDP, consumer spending, lagged far behind at 5.4 percent.

Of course, these measurements do not incorporate how much private spending is oriented toward the government. Huge sums are paid to tax lawyers, environmental auditors, compliance experts, lobbyists, and other people who specialize in dealing with government. These sums represent real costs of government, but they are not included in any of the figures above. If the data are biased, their bias

implies that government is smaller than it is in reality.

Whatever your political stripe, this should trouble you. You may have a pet program run by the government. However, the government will do many things that should trouble you if we allow it to grow. Most conservatives and libertarians should not need to be convinced that socialism is bad. The information above should be scary enough.

If you tend to be liberal or Green, government growth probably does not scare you as much. Those among you should realize that big government serves ideals not involving welfare, labor, and environmental concerns.

Bush's budget increases defense spending a whopping 14.5 percent. In his State of the Union Address, he mentioned intervening in North Korea, Iraq, and Iran. Earlier this week, the White House announced plans to step up eradication efforts in the War on Drugs in Colombia. U.S. foreign aid supports a plethora of governments whose human-rights abuses far exceed our own.

At home, government power is also increasing. More money will go to religious charities, corporate wel-

fare is on the rise, and the Fourth Amendment is under attack by Attorney General John Ashcroft. Although military tribunals will not be held in the United States, they mirror a similar attack on domestic civil liberties.

These things would not be possible if government were not growing at such an astounding rate. Big government is just as large a threat to civil liberty as it is to economic liberty. That is why socialism is a real threat to liberals. When the government takes your money, it does with your money as it chooses. If you don't like it, then too bad for you. You cannot claim a rebate on your tax form just because you believe financing foreign wars is immoral. Try it, and an armed IRS agent will come to your door.

Whether socialism is from the left or the right, it is evil. Look at Stalinist Russia or Nazi Germany. Which one would you choose? Some will say this is unfair. But these countries are just extreme examples of the reality of socialism.

The reality is that economic freedom provides freedom in other areas. Would you prefer freer Chile or less-free Colombia? Freer Switzerland,

or less-free France? Freer Israel or less-free Egypt? The choice is simple. Socialism is a loser worldwide.

The question before us today, is not whether we want to be socialist or capitalist. It is whether we want more economic freedom or more govern-

ment. Bush talked about "limits on the power of the state," and "private property," in his State of the Union Address. However, Bush is slowly leading us down the path towards bigger government. Is that really where we want to go?



## Hawkeyes haul in 21 recruits

The days of missing connecting flights and living out of hotel rooms are over for Kirk Ferentz. Now all the Iowa football coach can do is wait and see if his efforts on the recruiting trail make a difference on the football field.

A total of 21 players signed on the dotted line for Ferentz and the Hawkeyes Wednesday, the first day recruits could officially sign national letters of intent, and schools could publicly discuss their newest additions.

While Ferentz faced many obstacles on the recruiting trail this season, such as having to juggle his time between traveling and preparing for the Alamo Bowl, losing assistant coach Brett Bielema, and having his name erroneously linked with the Indianapolis Colts' search for a new coach, he is more than happy with the final product.

"We're very, very pleased with the results of this class," he said. "I think things have really pulled together well, and I think we've put a good, solid class together."

Ferentz and his staff missed out on several highly recruited preps, but he feels Iowa has more than its share of talented football players among the 2002 recruitment class.

"We wanted to run the race and see how things fell," he said.

While many of the names on Iowa's list of official commitments don't initially turn many heads, they do fill needs at several key positions — chief among them are quarterback, receiver, and defensive line.

Quarterbacks Nathan Chandler, Cy Phillips, and Jason Manson all made good on their word to Ferentz. Chandler, who began his career at Texas Tech before transferring to Pasadena Community College, has

already enrolled in classes and is on campus. Ferentz said he expects Chandler to battle Brad Banks for the starting job during spring drills.

"We think he throws the ball well, and that he's a great leader," Ferentz said of Chandler.

Clinton Solomon, a prep signal caller from Ft. Worth, Tex., is a fourth quarterback, though Ferentz said Solomon was recruited as an athlete and will most likely not be a quarterback at Iowa.

Three receivers, including Calvin Davis of Iowa City, give Ferentz depth at a position depleted by graduation. The highly regarded David Vickers of Akron, Ohio, and Miguel Merrick of Union City, N.J., complete the troika of wide-outs. While Ferentz did not say anything specific about his plans for next season, he did say there is a possibility that one or more of the freshmen receivers could make their way on to Iowa's two-deep. Iowa City's Warren McDuffie, a teammate of Davis' at City High, is a tight end and gives Iowa another player with a strong set of hands.

On the defensive line, which suffered losses due to the graduations of Derrick Pickens and Jerry Montgomery, Iowa gained two strong players in Wesley Thibeaux and Steve Burch. Thibeaux, a junior college-transfer from Blinn Community College in Texas,

Iowa coach Steve Alford said he didn't think his team had lost any games due to a lack of effort at a Jan. 31 press conference.

That was before the Tuesday Night Massacre.

Perhaps the cohesion on this team has been shaky since the outset of the season, but when the Hawkeyes started off 11-3, we didn't notice it.

Remember when Luke Recker and Reggie Evans were the conquering heroes, basking in the accolades of the fans, media, and even the coaching staff? Well, so does the rest of the team, because they were the ones who sat back in the shadows as Luke and Reggie gobbled up the laurels.

While the January transfer of reserve Cortney Scott got brushed under the rug, it's hard to imagine that his departure to Oakland University wasn't at least a little indicative of the type of dynamics going on within the team.

After all, the Hawkeyes are 4-6 since the giant necktie stopped showing up on the sidelines.

In the midst of his rocky departure, Scott, a hard-working spark off the bench, waged that Alford plays favorites with this team. He accused Alford of allowing Evans to get away with overly rough play in practice. Scott was just one of 15 members of the team; if he was thinking these things, chances are that other players were sharing his sentiments. Sounds like a team in dissent to me.

## Moore than expected

Iowa sophomore Cliff Moore is adequately filling some big shoes at 133 pounds

As he talks with his head down, Cliff Moore appears to be diminutive in both his stature and discourse.

The Iowa sophomore is soft-spoken, almost to the point where it's hard to hear him.


Standing at a mere 5-5, the 133-pounder looks as imposing as a mouse.

This is all before Moore steps on a wrestling mat — there he has piled up a 18-4 record, along with a title at the 2002 Midlands Championships.

Replacing two-time NCAA champion Eric Juergens has been a daunting task for Moore, who had wrestled only one Big Ten match a year ago. While he seems well on his way to replace the former Hawkeye, one thing has got in his way: a severe knee injury.

From his growing list of accomplishments this season, few would believe that Moore underwent surgery and intense physical rehabilitation following a tear in his anterior cruciate ligament in May 2001 when he was training for the Junior Fila World Trials.

Moore was wrestling Iowa's 149-pound Mike Zadick when the injury occurred. Zadick said that he put him in a move called "The Raider" when

Moore's ankle got caught on the mat.

"He made a little yelp, fell over, and grabbed his knee," Zadick said. "But then he just got up and kept wrestling."

Moore's mental strength was key in a recovery period that forced him to be on crutches for five weeks as he slowly built-up flexibility and strength.

"It was really painful, but all the pain was focused on my

knee," he said. "I felt there were times I regressed when I pushed too hard."

Moore's eagerness to return to the mat reflected an intensity that he has possessed since his high-school days at Dubuque Hempstead, where he was a three-time state champion, with his only pair of losses coming his freshman year.

Moore redshirted his first season at Iowa and posted a

17-3 record in the 2000-01 season. Moore's only losses of this season have come from the four wrestlers ranked ahead of his fifth-place NCAA ranking.

Moore entered Midlands seeded 10th, only to knock-off top-seeded Matt Azevedo of the Cyclone Wrestling Club for the title. His losses include a 6-0 decision to top-ranked

## WTC flag to be carried at ceremony

SALT LAKE CITY — The tattered American flag recovered from the rubble at ground zero will be carried at the Winter Olympics' opening ceremony Friday night in a compromise of patriotism and protocol.

A group of U.S. athletes, New York City firefighters and Port Authority police will be allowed to take the flag into the ceremony in a "solemn, dignified entrance," the International Olympic Committee said

Wednesday, reversing an earlier decision.

Barring bad weather, the delicate banner will then be raised beside the Olympic flame at Rice-Eccles Stadium while "The Star Spangled Banner" is played.

The flag will not be part of the main parade of athletes during the opening ceremony and instead will be carried in after all teams have entered the stadium.

Still, it will be the official U.S. flag of the Winter Games, at the center of an event with an estimated 3 billion people watching

worldwide.

"We had a great deal of discussion as to how to honor the flag as a symbol of the heroes of Sept. 11," said Mitt Romney, president of the Salt Lake Organizing Committee, who criticized the IOC's original decision.

"This is a way to honor the flag and honor the Olympians as a world event. We feel very connected with the athletes of the world."

The International Olympic Committee originally said American athletes would not be allowed to carry the flag, but

that it could be raised as the official U.S. flag at the opening ceremony. The IOC said the plan proposed by the U.S. Olympic Committee violated rules barring political acts during the ceremony.

The decision brought quick criticism. Talk shows nationwide were filled with the topic. The USOC received 75-100 e-mails and dozens of telephone calls at its Colorado Springs, Colo., headquarters. And Romney issued a statement that he "respectfully disagreed" with the IOC's decision.


# Patriots continue whirlwind

"I called and told him to send some stuff," said Milloy, a strong safety. "All the good stuff is going. Instead of getting a helmet, now I'm going to get socks with an emblem on it."

For this game, swapping helmets and jerseys is as much a custom as lounging on the beach following a relaxed workout. Players don't mess around — if you don't deal early in the week, it could mean missing out.

Pittsburgh quarterback Kordell Stewart was out of everything Wednesday before the AFC squad took the field at Aloha Stadium on the second day of workouts for Saturday's game.

"There were a lot of 'IOUs' promised by the Patriots players, who though tired said they would find the energy for one final week of football.

"I'm sure I can get up for one more game," Law said. "I just need a little rest. I'm still coming down off it."

Brady's only concern was wearing a red mesh practice jersey a couple sizes too big. He was smiling despite having had minimal sleep since Sunday's win over the St. Louis Rams in New Orleans.

The Super Bowl MVP said his arm feels "like it's been on a plane for three days."

"I'm a little rusty," he said. "My body is feeling like it's about 50 years old."

Brown had the same struggles. "The soreness today, well it's worth it," he said.

Stewart and AFC starter Rich Gannon of the Oakland Raiders have lockers on each side of Brady. Both offered congratulations, along with almost everyone on the AFC squad.

"I envy him a little bit," Stewart said. "He got it."

AFC coach Bill Cowher of the Steelers said he hasn't decided how much Gannon will play before using Brady and Stewart, both making their first-time Pro Bowl appearance.

"Probably not very long," said Gannon, 36. "Let those young guys do the damage."

New York Jets center Kevin Mawae walked by Milloy and Law to offer congratulations while the two players knelt on the sideline in the Hawaii heat, taking a break during a drill.

"The last thing I want to do is pick up a football helmet," admitted Milloy. "But this is what I get paid to do. And I want to show my appreciation to the fans."

Longtime Patriots fan Robert Raposa and his two sons arrived at the stadium at 4:20 a.m. to wait in line to secure a front-row seat for the hourlong practice.

**Texas nails top recruiting class**

Texas hooked in the nation's top football recruiting class.

Longhorns coach Mack Brown got commitments from almost every player he pursued on national signing day Wednesday, keeping the best players from talent-rich Texas at home and picking up a few key out-of-staters.

"They just dominated everything," said Tom Lemming of Schaumburg, Ill.-based *Prep Football Report*. "They are head and shoulders ahead of everyone else. They helped themselves at every single position."

Elsewhere, Notre Dame closed well under new coach Tyrone Willingham, getting a commitment from talented receiver Rhema McKnight (La Palma, Calif.) Wednesday. But the Irish lost out on All-American running back Lorenzo Booker, who decided at the last minute to sign with Florida State.

New Florida coach Ron Zook struggled in his first year, finishing around 20th in most of the major rankings.

There was no doubt among most experts about the Longhorns being No. 1.

Texas signed *USA Today* All-Americans Justin Blalock (OL, Plano, Texas), Rodrique Wright (DL, Alief, Texas), and Larry Dibbles (DL, Lancaster, Texas), as well as quarterback Vincent Young of Houston, picked by some as the best player in the country.

"The Longhorns are rolling,"

Bobby Burton of the Austin, Texas-based National Recruiting Advisor said. "The talent is as good as it gets anywhere in the country right now."

In all, the Longhorns got commitments from 27 of the 32 players they brought to Austin for official visits. Texas also had the consensus top class in 1999.

"It means that people who try to follow recruits for a living have decided that this is a good group," Brown said. "There's no doubt about that. Does it mean they'll be great college and pro prospects? Absolutely not."

Zook, the Gators' third choice to replace Steve Spurrier, struggled to attract out-of-state talent to Gainesville and even lost in-state receiver Devin Aromashodu to Auburn at the end.

"He's had a tough go. He's had to really scramble," Allen Wallace of Laguna Beach, Calif.-based *SuperPrep* Magazine said. "Florida lost numerous prospects that were out of state that decided not to visit or seriously consider Florida once Steve Spurrier left."

Notre Dame fared better with Willingham, who took over when George O'Leary was forced to resign for lying on his resume.

"Notre Dame's class top to bottom is excellent. What it lacks a bit in skill positions, it makes up in big players," Lemming said.

Willingham, helped by former coach Bob Davie's early recruiting efforts, got McKnight, *USA Today* All-American receiver Maurice Stovall (Rad-

nor, Pa.), and defensive linemen Derek Landri (Concord, Calif.), Chris Frome (Newhall Hart, Calif.) and Travis Leitko (The Woodlands, Texas).

"Our recruiting base will be a national base," said Willingham, who spent seven years at Stanford. "Hopefully that will include California."

Miami capitalized on its national title to bring in a top class in Larry Coker's first full recruiting season, finishing second in *SuperPrep's* ratings and the top five of the other three services.

The Hurricanes got two *USA Today* All-Americans — tight end Eric Winston (Midland, Texas) and wide receiver Ryan Moore (Orlando) — and two other players in *SuperPrep's* top 50 — defensive back/wide receiver Devin Hester (Riviera Beach, Fla.) and tight end Curtis Justus (Perry, Okla.)

**Outfielder agrees to one-year deal**

PHOENIX (AP) — The Arizona Diamondbacks and outfielder David Dellucci reached agreement Wednesday on a one-year contract.

The deal leaves catcher Damian Miller as the only player facing arbitration on the World Series champions' roster.

Miller was the only Arizona player

to go to arbitration last year, too. He won his case and earned \$1.25 million last season.

Dellucci, who bats left-handed, was one of the best pinch-hitters in the majors last season. As a pinch-hitter, he batted .321 with five home runs, both club records. He had two pinch-hits in four postseason appearances.

Overall, Dellucci, 28, batted .276 in 115 games with a career-best 10 home runs. He and right-handed hit-

ter Danny Bautista figure to split time in right field for the Diamondbacks this season.

Dellucci is one of four players selected by Arizona in the 1997 expansion draft still on the 40-man roster. He was the ninth choice in the second round. The others are Miller, Brian Anderson, and Danny Klassen. Last week, pitcher Miguel Batista avoided arbitration by agreeing to a two-year, \$5.8 million contract.

will be expected to help Iowa immediately. Ferentz likened the 6-foot-2, 294-pounder to Montgomery because of his skill at playing inside the line and his physical play.

Iowa also received commitments from linebackers Mike Elgin, Ryan Majerus, Edmond Miles, and Eric Zilisch, defensive backs Jovon Johnson, Mar-

cus Paschal, and Richie Williams, offensive linemen Chris Felder and Chris Thomas, and kicker Kyle Schlicher.

While Ferentz is optimistic about his class, others do not hold such a high opinion. Recruiting analysts have put Iowa's class in the bottom tier of the Big Ten with the classes of Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Purdue.

Alford's tactics in practice, no matter how ethical, were probably under the team's

microscope after Scott's departure, and those sleuths in black and gold shorts may not have liked what they found.

That said, Alford probably isn't the Nazi that Scott made him out to be. He made a classy move by taking the blame for the turn the season has taken after Tuesday's loss. We have to remember he's a young coach and he's learning the ways of "big-time" college basketball along with the rest of the team.

But just shouldering the blame isn't going to do a thing; Stevie Hawkeye has lost the golden boy image and is start-

ing to see the ugly side of Iowa fans. Alford has got to summon some type of healing powers — perhaps in the form of an offense with movement and spacing — to give the fans something they took for granted such a short time ago: an NCAA Tournament birth.

Luckily, he appears to be headed in the right direction after making himself a scapegoat.

### Early commitments boost ISU recruiting

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Iowa State is trying to follow the lead of the traditional powers in recruiting football players.

Get 'em in the fold early. In announcing the signing of 26 players on Wednesday, Iowa State coach Dan McCarney noted that most had been committed to the program for some time. Iowa State had nearly a dozen commitments when it left for the Independence Bowl in December and all of the recruiting was finished nearly two weeks ago.

"That's a first for this program,"

McCarney said. "Many times you go right up until a couple of days prior to signing."

McCarney felt his staff got off to a good start by getting some commitments last summer and it continued from there. There are 17 high school players in the class, including six from Iowa, and nine junior-college transfers.

Iowa State, coming off two straight bowl appearances, was able to exceed

the limit of 25 because it could use the scholarships of seniors from last year's team who graduated in December.

"The programs that are winning every year, they go through this every year," McCarney said. "You get the ball rolling, you get momentum going, you get those kids recruiting other good players and you don't have to wait around for a lot of kids the last week of recruiting."

## Davis stirs up U.S. speedskating

KEARNS, Utah — Shani Davis grew up to be 6-foot-2 and lean. While the other kids in his Chicago neighborhood played basketball, Davis wanted something else.

"I decided when I was very young, if I was going to do a sport, I wanted to be different," he said.

He succeeded. He got into short-track speedskating and became the first black to make the U.S. team in a predominantly white sport.

The 19-year-old Davis will be a long shot to medal at the Salt Lake City Olympics, which begin Friday. His best friend and teammate, Apolo Ohno, is favored to win four golds.

"There's a lot of love between me and Apolo," said Davis, who lets Ohno borrow his shirts when they go out to clubs.

The two were involved in a pre-Olympic controversy, when 1998 Olympian Tommy O'Hare claimed Ohno helped fix a 1,000-meter race at the Olympic trials in December.

Davis won the race, earning enough points to grab the final Olympic berth and knock O'Hare off the team. An arbitrator found there wasn't enough evidence to support O'Hare's claim that Ohno and Rusty Smith conspired to fix the race so Davis could make the team.

O'Hare withdrew his demand for arbitration, clearing the way for Ohno, Davis and Smith to compete in Salt Lake City.

"I'm just happy I can make the team and get a lot of experience. Maybe next time I can skate individually," said Davis, who only qualified for a relay.

Fred Benjamin, president of U.S. Speedskating and a former employer of Davis' mother, Cherie, said Davis deserved to make the team.

"If you talk to the other athletes who train with him, they'll say he's the first one there and the last one to finish training," Benjamin said.

Davis' height makes him the tallest American speedskater in a sport where gravity favors those who are built low to the ice, like the 5-7 Ohno.

"We talked about the fact that right here, in the center of the largest development opportunity around, is a clear site that is ready to go," Rybak said after meeting with Donald Watkins. "For an entrepreneur who wants to keep baseball in Minnesota, this is an unparalleled opportunity."

Rybak stressed the site's easy access to freeways and abundant parking.

"I think most prudent business people want to have options and I like options, but this is an impressive site," said Watkins, who wants to buy the team from Carl Pohlad.

Scheduling conflicts prevented Watkins from hearing a proposal from Kelly.

"I would like to see what's available in both cities, but ultimately I have to get to a decision on site selection. And I want to try to get there as quickly as I can," Watkins said. "If time does not permit me to look personally at the potential sites in St. Paul, then I'll just have to make the best decision I can with the information that I have."

# Hard house hits Iowa City harder

It's time. It's time to stop playing the kiddie games. It's time to put the toys away and get down to the skull-cleaving sound of hard house.

Once the clock strikes 9 p.m. Friday, the Planet X silence will be broken. The florescent overhead lighting will be cut, and multiple laser streams will spray the beige carpet with a sheet of fluorescent green luminosity. "It's a huge first event for us," Full said. "We've been double, triple, and quadruple checking everything so that everything runs as smooth as possible."

## Plying the narrow beams that we walk each day

At a glance, Kate Hanson's first book can be misleading.

The title, *Narrow Beams*, coupled with the cover picture of a house, evokes an idea that this is a collection of short stories about houses or architecture.

While much of the narrative does take place within the houses of various families, after reading a few of Hanson's stories, the overlying theme of loss quickly emerges as the tie that binds each story.

The title symbolizes the idea that dealing with loss is synonymous with walking a narrow path, she said. In the short story from which the book derived its name, the main character observed a cat as it walked along a narrow roof beam of a farmhouse.

"It wasn't until the cat stopped and looked down on both sides that it realized how much danger surrounded it," she said. "This situation is the same for each story's characters, who are dealing

with loss and recovery."

Each of the narratives in Hanson's book reflects a different kind of loss. Wives become widowed, an elderly woman loses her independence after entering a nursing home, a family loses its beloved horse.

While the magnitude of the loss varies from story to story, what remains consistent is the skillful manner in which she uses description to paint a vivid picture of each narrative.

With a single sentence, Hanson captures the pain and uncertainty of a woman about to learn if her cancer has returned and the helplessness of a sister whose brother is injured in Vietnam.

Being a child in the 1960s and 1970s became a driving force in her focusing her stories on loss.

"That was a pivotal time," she said. "Growing up during the Vietnam War caused me and everyone else to lose our sense of naïveté. We all had friends or relatives who died because of that war."

Hanson, a 1998 graduate of the Writers' Workshop, said her writing benefited




greatly from her experience at the workshop.

In fact, many of the stories that make up *Narrow Beams* in one way or another resulted from the workshop experience, she said. The first story in *Narrow Beams* reflects the life of an everyday Iowan. Others were honed within the workshop.

"Being an older student, I was able to accept criticism of my work a lot easier than the younger students," Hanson said. "I learned more about writing from teachers like [workshop director] Frank Conroy than I thought was possible."

# Revolutionizing the bossa nova sound

Bebel Gilberto, the daughter of bossa nova royalty João Gilberto and melodic queen Miucha — both of "The Girl From Ipanema" fame — has created a modern classic with her debut recording, *Tanto Tempo Remixes*, a remix of her bossa nova hit *Tanto Tempo*. Bebel continues the Gilberto legacy by traversing synthetic beats through the vibrant language of bossa nova.

Bossa nova, without a doubt, revolutionized the musical world in Brazil as well as the rest of the world, mixing guitar-strummed samba with jazz-influenced rhythms. João Gilberto and Antonio Carlos Jobim are the revered godfathers who produced the bossa-nova sound, and now Bebel Gilberto carries on the legacy.

*Tanto Tempo* was an update to the melodically enriched bossa nova, and now *Tanto Tempo Remixes* invites listeners who would have otherwise ignored the movement into the mix. With 13 of electronica's most creative producers, representing North America, Brazil, Japan, the U.K., and several other European countries, the *Tanto Tempo Remixes* brings the bossa-nova movement into the 21st century.

The Manchester-based Rae and Christian remix "Bananeira" blends the tropical-infused rhythm with a soft drum&bass groove. The sly horn arrangements and nimble beats offer a soulful mix to the track.

"Sem Contenção" remixes are served up by Trüby Trio from Munich and Sin Plomo from Ibiza, Spain. The Trüby Trio remix keeps true to the African-influenced beats inherent in bossa nova while still offering lounge-like breakbeats. Sin Plomo's remix adapts a more funk-induced rhythm to the mellow tune while keeping true to the jazz mood of the original.

"Mais Feliz" offers an infectious drum&bass texture reminiscent of Aphex Twin, but it never strays too far from the original jazz formula.

"August Day Song" is thrice remixed by Parisian, Brazilian, and U.S. producers, each contributing invigorating arrangements. Chateau Flight, the Parisian-based producers, offer

smooth electronic strokes through the percussion-rich tune making for a funkified composition. Da Lata illustrates the Brazilian acid-jazz form in a strongly synthetic arrangement of atmospheric resonance with recurring beats and a refreshing Arabesque interlude midway through the piece. The third cut from the City of Brotherly Love, Philadelphia, King Britt serves up a placid funk-version of "August Day Song" intertwined with acoustic guitar-strumming.

"So Nice," an easy-going samba originally produced on an earlier Gilberto album by Mario Caldato Jr., undergoes a cosmic transformation. Caldato remixes the piece, interlacing the original beats with retro space-age elements.

"Alguém" remix, by Ananda Project (out of the United States), is an uptempo arrangement with funk-induced bass rhythms and African percussion combinations.

Faze Action brings to "Close Your Eyes" the spirit of *Carnaval* coupled with Latin-jazz horns and short keyboard riffs, making for a festive remix of the original.

Chari Chari, the serene breakmaster from Tokyo, serves up trance-infected samba rhythms on "Tanto Tempo" while 4hero takes the listener to his break-beat world of bossa nova on "Samba de Benção."

Through all the remixes, varying in character, Gilberto's sultry voice empowers and complements the productions into a 21st century bossa-nova sound. Hailed by *Rolling Stone* as a "tripped-out blend of sexy South American rhythms and tropical trance grooves," *Tanto Tempo Remixes* offers many the opportunity to discover bossa nova who would of otherwise missed the opportunity.

## When Hollywood won't cut you some slack

The plan backfires when the trio's charming leader, Dave (Dewon Sawa), ends up falling for Angela in the process. She, in turn, falls for him and ... well, you can probably guess where it goes from here, although it's really not worth your time to ponder.

What is worth pondering is why Schwartzman, who made *Rushmore*'s eccentric Max J. Fisher such an endearing character, would choose this loathsome mess for his next big project. His

character goes by the name "Cool Ethan" — one of the few funny jokes in the movie — but he is so creepy, annoying and one-dimensional that it's hard to believe any actor, much less someone with Schwartzman's comedic talent, would ever agree to play him.

But hey, at least now we all know what happened to Max Fisher when he grew up: He sold out.
