## Up a tree, and loving every minute

Andy Dahl has been cursed at, flipped off, and called a butcher by UI students more times than he can remember just for doing his job.

However, the insults have not stopped the man solely responsible for the upkeep of the UI's 10,000 trees from grinning his way to work every day. With temperatures steadily climbing,

Dahl's schedule for manicuring trees is filling up quickly.

"Trees are like children — you have to correct the bad habits when they are young," the Washington, Iowa, native said. "We have a lot of juvenile delinquents on campus."

Dahl's love affair for trees and the outdoors began when, as a little boy, he would stare intently for hours at the "human quality" he found in the oaks planted in front of his

parents' house. Planting strawberries and potatoes with his grandmother soon translated into a passion for the outdoors.

Dahl's bronze skin is testament to the 365 days a year he works outside, mulching, pruning, and chipping, in addition to removing and adding trees on campus. However, he said, there is a lot more than a physical challenge to the job.

"I'd like to think of myself as a tree preservationist," the UI

tree-trimmer of three years said. "Trees' combination of strength and beauty are values people like to think of themselves."

Last year alone, the certified arborist added 334 new trees and removed 74 "delinquent" trees that were either hollow, unstable, or posed a hazard to passers-by.

The self-proclaimed "tree nerd" received a landscape-design

## Fire at Etc. hospitalizes UI student

An underage UI junior suffered third-degree burns at a local bar around midnight Wednesday — and at least two others were hospitalized — after she spit a shot of hard liquor into a fire that had been started by a bartender, witnesses and police say.

The fire at Etc., 118 S. Dubuque St., started when liquor was poured onto the bar and lit, witnesses and police

said. But it flared when Deanne Busche, who is 20 but had been consuming alcohol, attempted to "breathe fire" by spitting alcohol into the open flame, witnesses said.

"Her face was white from being burnt, her arm was on fire, and her hair was singed," said UI freshman Sarah Christeson, who added that she saw Busche run to the bathroom before authorities arrived.

## U.N. envoy sees vast suffering

JENIN, West Bank — Israel completed its pullback from Jenin early today, Israel Radio reported, posting forces on the outskirts of the West Bank town and allowing residents to search for relatives in a devastated refugee camp. A U.N. envoy said the invasion had caused "colossal suffering."

The withdrawal winds up a three-week operation that included a bloody battle in the

camp. The Israeli military had no immediate comment, but military commanders had said earlier the withdrawal would be completed today.

Brig. Gen. Eyal Schlein, the Israeli army's Jenin division commander, said Thursday that his forces had destroyed the "infrastructure — explosive labs, organization heads, and also terrorists." But he told Israel TV, "The attacks will continue — we haven't achieved

## Ex-City High player loses lawsuit

After nearly three hours of deliberation, an eight-person jury ruled that the Iowa City School District was not negligent in the handling of an injured City High football player.

The jury released its verdict to Johnson County District Judge David Good at approximately 10 a.m. Thursday.

Shawn Roberts, now residing in North Liberty, sued the School District in 1999, alleging that City High football coaches

allowed him to re-enter a 1997 game despite intense neck and back pain.

Football trainer Brian Murphy testified Wednesday that he repeatedly questioned Roberts on his condition and initially diagnosed him with

muscle spasms. As discoloration around the neck appeared, Murphy pulled Roberts from the game. X-rays later revealed that Roberts fractured his neck in three places.

Most of the jurors declined to comment. But one juror, Patrick Hogan of Iowa City, said the decision was not difficult for him.

"[Roberts] didn't prove his case at all," Hogan said.

Roberts' attorney, Jim Weston, said he talked with Roberts shortly after he received the verdict at his Iowa City office.

"While he's disappointed in the verdict, he's grateful that he's recovered from the injury and grateful for putting his case in front of the jury," he said.

Weston said he hasn't had yet discussed a possible appeal with Roberts, and he declined to comment on Roberts' legal fees. Terry Abernathy, who represented the School District, said his bill had not yet been prepared.

Roberts was unavailable for comment Thursday night.

## County's mental-health department to hire auditor

The county's Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Services will hire an auditor to ensure that the department is spending its funds appropriately in the wake of losing more than half a million dollars from its budget this fiscal year because of miscalculations.

The Johnson County Board of Supervisors approved the move Thursday; it expects an auditor will be hired by next week to look at the agency's \$7 million annual budget.

The auditor will receive a 10 percent commission on the medical expenses of every patient found that does not qualify for county assistance. Elaine Sweet, the agency's director, proposed the audit after a three-year billing oversight caused the agency to lose \$568,000 in funding — the fault, she said, of a hard-copy filing system.

contract [with the auditor]," said Supervisor Sally Stutsman.

The supervisors also granted Sweet permission to install a \$300,000 computer-software program in her department by the end of June that will record the number of county residents receiving treatment from the agency as well as its costs.

The move, Sweet said, will ensure future confusion in keeping records does not occur.

Representatives from the Polk County mental-health department, which uses the program, have been working with Sweet for nearly two years to customize the software for Johnson County. The expense has

already been figured into the agency's budget.

The county mental-health agency provides patients with such services as therapy, nursing-home care, and vocational education.

In other county business, Supervisor Mike Sullivan was appointed to serve on a committee that will evaluate the need and placement of cellular towers throughout the county. The committee was formed after Iowa City residents voiced concerns to the county regarding the location of various cellular towers, said committee member Rick Dvorak.

Supervisor Carol Thompson said the new technology provided by cell phones demands more towers, which some residents consider an eyesore.

The committee was formed to make recommendations about where towers should be placed to ensure optimal use by county residents.

# Panel accepts Southgate plan

The Iowa City Planning and Zoning Commission voted to accept a preliminary proposal from Southgate Development Co. that would pursue a \$6.7 million West Side commercial and residential development project.

The land considered for development is located between Walnut Ridge Road and Highway 218 in Iowa City, Coralville, and rural county land, which will likely raise issues concerning re-annexation between the two cities, city officials said. The 462-acre proposal extends Camp Cardinal Road from Melrose Avenue in Iowa City to U.S. Highway 6 in Coralville.

"At this point, we have no real timeline for the plan," said Bob Mikklo, Iowa City's senior planner. "The plan is very preliminary at this point, and there are still hurdles we must pass before moving forward with it."

Any re-annexation will be

considered following research on the topography, runoff, and drainage of the proposed land, city officials said.

The plan must be presented to the Iowa City City Council and the Coralville Planning and Zoning Commission. No date has yet been set.

"Our proposal has generated from how we feel this land should be developed," said Glen Siders, the Southgate construction manager.


The development company, describing the proposal as "conservation development," has hired Shive Hattery to conduct environmental research on the land and construction planning. No plans for commercial or residential structures have yet been drafted.

"There is a whole lot of trees, slopes, and other natural areas that will remain intact on the proposed lot of land," Siders said. "Conservation and being a good neighbor are one of our main priorities."

Southgate representatives said they will attempt to con-

serve land through a process called cluster development, which requires residential or commercial complexes to be

closely situated to preserve the green area, officials said.

# 2nd District Dems gather for convention

The Iowa Democratic Party's 2nd District will meet in Iowa City to approve this election year's platform, which opposes President Bush's tax cuts and calls for aggressive candidate recruitment.

Gov. Tom Vilsack and Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, will join Iowa Democratic Party Chairwoman Sheila McGuire Riggs at the convention at City High School, 1900 Morningside Drive.

The convention will run from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The event is one of five Iowa Democratic Party district conventions. Members meet every election year to approve the party platform.

"This convention is an important function of the Iowa Democratic Party," said 2nd District Chairman Alan Bohanan of West Branch. "It keeps the party fresh and renewed each election year."

The platform supports higher education, with increased student aid through grants and scholarships, low-interest loans based on family income, and more emphasis on undergraduate instruction, Bohanan said. The convention has always encouraged student involvement, and there are likely to be some college students in attendance, Bohanan said.

Delegates will elect six central committee members, who are liaisons to the state party to ensure that Democratic leaders

are addressing the issues of public concern, Bohanan said. The members will include three men and three women who will serve on the overall board of directors for the Iowa Democratic Party.

Other important issues will include health care, economic security, and education, said Dr. Julie Thomas of Cedar Rapids, a candidate for the 2nd District congressional seat.

"As a pediatrician, I understand that we need to place a greater emphasis on education and implementing a patients' bill of rights," Thomas said, who will speak at 11 a.m.

The platform also includes eliminating biological and chemical warfare and implementing a progressive income tax without loopholes for the wealthy, while opposing the use of tax money to promote gambling. It advocates for full funding of gifted and talented programs at schools.

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# Vilsack says elderly department has failed

DES MOINES — Gov. Tom Vilsack said Thursday that the Iowa Department of Elder Affairs failed to protect residents of assisted living centers and investigations would be turned over to another agency.

"I am angered and saddened that the state did not live up to its responsibility to these residents and their families, and I am taking action, on both policy and personnel, to see that it doesn't happen again," the governor said in a statement.

Vilsack said he had ordered the Department of Inspections and Appeals to investigate com-

plaints about assisted living centers, which provide limited health care services, as well as room and board.

Elder Affairs will be left to focus on its mission of advocacy for the elderly, he said.

The switch comes in the wake of recent reports of serious neglect at Amelia House in Council Bluffs, and the disclosure that the Department of Elder Affairs had made a practice of keeping two sets of records.

The records released to the public were sanitized versions, concealing information about specific complaints and subsequent investigations.

"This administration is com-

mitted to providing full, fair, and complete information to ensure the safety and dignity of Iowa's senior citizens," Vilsack said. "That is why we have placed, on the Internet, information about the record and performance of nursing homes across our state."

"The spirit of that commitment was violated by the Iowa Department of Elder Affairs, which made a practice of keeping two sets of records, one private and one public. I have asked for and received the resignation of the employee directly responsible for that practice," he said.

The governor last week fired Beth Bahnsen, the Elder Affairs

administrator in charge of assisted-living regulation.

Elder Affairs Director Judy Conlin said she learned only last week that two sets of records had been kept and read the file about the "horrific events that went on at Amelia House."

In response, she had proposed better training for investigators, increased monitoring of homes where complaints had been filed, and fines for assisted-living centers caught violating standards.

The Iowa Health Care Association, an industry group, balked.

"I'm not sure that's the avenue we should go," spokeswoman Cindy Haverkamp said, calling for additional study of the issue.

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# Activists say whites must fight racism

Anti-racist activists bringing their message to the UI this week-end are calling on whites to recognize and challenge the system that benefits them over others.

The group of national and local activists are touring the United States to attack racism in areas that, they say, it has been ignored for too long — predominantly white rural and suburban areas.

"We have been taught to think of white privilege first and foremost, that our perspective is right and not to be questioned," said keynote speaker Tim Wise, a member of the Nashville, Tenn.-based Fisk University Race Relations Institute.

Presenters from the UI, Southern Poverty Law Center, and College of Education at University of Washington, Seattle, will present the Third Annual Conference on White Privilege on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the Pappajohn Business Building.

Wise has spoken to more than 75,000 people in 45 states and at more than 200 colleges.

"The ultimate goal of this conference is to get whites and people of color to engage in work that has the potential to dismantle personal and institutional racism," said speaker Jennifer Holladay, the acting director of Tolerance.org, a project of the Southern Poverty Law Center.

The group made its most recent stop at Central College in Pella, Iowa, Thursday where one-third of the 1,500 students turned out for the conference. A group of approximately 15 UI students also attended.

The conference was founded by Eddie Moore Jr., a doctoral candidate at the UI and the director of intercultural life at Central College.

"If Iowa wants to grow and not die, then it is necessary for us to encourage understandings of people from diverse backgrounds to come here so we can grow in population and attract better quality jobs," said Bonnie O'Brien, an associate director of research and consulting at America & MOORE, a team that promotes cultural diversity throughout Iowa.

Conference registration fees are \$25 for the general public and \$10 for students. Small-group discussion sessions will follow lectures by keynote speakers. Light refreshments will be served.

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# Ground Zero workers face changes

NEW YORK — With the debris nearly gone and the cleanup just a month from completion, the workers who have spent nearly every day at the World Trade Center ruins since Sept. 11 face what could be a wrenching change in their lives.

Some have yet to begin grieving for the friends they lost. Many fear losing the bonds of friendship forged through the emotionally and physically exhausting labor. Others are nervous about returning to the lives they had before the terrorist attack. And some of those who lost their firefighter sons do not want to face the day when they have to stop searching.

The sun now shines as warmly as it did more than seven months ago, when workers began picking through rubble that stood 10 stories high. Now, Ground Zero is reduced to a seven-story pit, and buds are sprouting on a tiny tree nearby.

"The other day, I brushed into the tree, and I did a double take," said Mark Winslow, a Port Authority police lieutenant. "I look at it, and the tree leaves are starting to bud. I say, 'Oh my God. We have been here a long time. We went through three seasons.'"

As the scenery changed around them, rescue workers stifled their grief and ignored the symptoms of stress.

"The task that you have at hand is so important that your attention and concentration is on that — it's not like you have time to sit down and think about what happens," said Port Authority police Lt. John Ryan, who oversees the recovery of remains.

Sgt. John Flynn, whose best friend and partner, Gregg J. Froehner, was killed in the attack, said he has not begun to grieve for that loss or the many others. Thirty-seven Port Authority police officers were among the more than 2,800 people killed.

"I know it's going to come. I know there's going to be a point in time where I hit a wall," said Flynn, 47.

The Port Authority police and the city police and fire departments have already offered extensive counseling to all their members, but they are still grappling with how to provide therapy to the Ground Zero workers. Port Authority police are considering a weekend retreat for the officers.

"People have become attached to the site — it's become a mission and an obsession to try to recover all those people who lost their lives," said Richard Sheirer, the former director of the city emergency-management office. "When that's over, it's going to be difficult for everyone, whether it's the grappler operator or a firefighter looking for a friend."

Some retired firefighters dread that the end will come before they find their sons'

remains. They have spent nearly every day there, yet remains have been identified for only 182 of the 343 firefighters killed.

"All these months down here, you figure eventually you'd get to them, but that may not be the case," said Bill Butler, 62, whose firefighter son Tom was killed. "It's very hard, walking away."

Firefighter Dennis O'Berg, 55, retired earlier than he had planned after losing his son on Sept. 11. He has sought relief by working at the site, forming relationships with others looking for their lost sons.

"I wish it would go on, I do," O'Berg said. "As long as we're still looking, we still have hope that I'm going to find my son and everyone else who's left."

The last remaining heaps of debris are expected to be cleared by May. Approximately 800 laborers toil there during a 24-hour period, 150 of them firefighters or police officers. Work-

ers have removed more than 1.5 million tons of rubble and found more than 19,000 body parts.

When the task is done and they return to work, they are likely to find their jobs have changed. Protecting the city is different now, and new faces will replace the lost co-workers.

# Gov. Vilsack offers budget compromise

DES MOINES — Gov. Tom Vilsack offered a compromise \$60 million budget plan Thursday, but majority Republicans said they had no interest in additional spending.

At competing news conferences, the two sides were at gridlock over a special legislative session set for April 22.

"I don't want to give up on this process," Vilsack said.

House Majority Leader Chris Rants, R-Sioux City, said lawmakers had no intention of reopening the budget debate, accusing Vilsack of "flat-out irresponsibility" for calling Monday's special session.

"I'm planning on coming in, going to caucus, and then adjourning," Rants said.

The two sides planned bargaining sessions Thursday and today in anticipation of the session, but there was little sign of an agreement.

The Legislature ended this year's session in a noisy fight last week after approving a budget of just over \$4.5 billion, roughly \$135 million less than the governor wanted.

As lawmakers were leaving, the governor issued a state-

ment calling the budget inadequate and warning it would force teacher layoffs, enrollment caps, and higher tuition at state colleges. It would also, he said, push 1,400 children of the working poor out of health-care coverage.

The plan the governor unveiled Thursday calls for spending an extra \$60 million on education and health programs, taking the money out of a fund that pays for highway construction.

"I believe my proposal will meet their original objection and still allow Iowa to protect and strengthen Iowa's future," Vilsack said.

Senate Majority Leader Stewart Iverson, R-Dows, said he's surveyed GOP lawmakers, and they aren't interested in reopening the budget fight.

"They are very adamant," he said. "They firmly believe that we should not come into special session to spend more money."

Backing up their argument, GOP legislative leaders released new projections from the nonpartisan Legislative Service Bureau warning that spending increase already built into the state's budget could bring deficits as high as \$280 million within two years.

# Senate rejects arctic-drilling plan

WASHINGTON — The Senate rejected by a wide margin President Bush's plans for oil drilling in an Arctic wildlife refuge Thursday, turning aside arguments that the oil was needed for the nation's security. The vote was a blow to the administration, which repeatedly has cited development of the Alaska refuge's oil as a centerpiece of its energy policy. Environmentalists waged an intense campaign to protect the refuge, calling it a unique ecological treasure. Drilling supporters said their proposal contained environmental safeguards. While the House already has

approved legislation to allow development of the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, the size of the anti-drilling vote in the Senate may doom any prospect for a drilling measure in Congress this year. Senate Republicans fell 14 votes short, 54-46, of the 60 needed to break a Democratic filibuster and allow a vote on putting the refuge provision into a broader energy bill. Democrats rejected national-security arguments for the drilling and maintained that had drilling proponents wanted to dampen oil imports, they should have approved increases in automobile fuel economy. Last month the Senate, by a 38-33 vote, stripped from the energy

bill a requirement for automakers to boost fuel economy. The fuel economy increase "would have saved as much oil in three years as is likely to be economically developed in the refuge," said Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev. How much oil is in the refuge is unclear since only one exploratory well has been drilled, on private land within the coastal plain, and its results have been kept secret. Federal geologists believe from seismic studies in the 1980s that the area, just east of the Prudhoe Bay oil field, could yield from 5.7 billion to 11.6 billion barrels of oil. Ten years of preliminary work would be required before production could begin. The Prudhoe Bay field has pro-

duced approximately 13 billion barrels. The United States consumes roughly 19 million barrels a day, 57 percent of it imported. Alaska's two senators, who had led the fight for drilling, expressed disappointment but did not formally withdraw their amendment. "It's not over yet," insisted Sen. Frank Murkowski, R-Alaska. He and Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, told reporters they planned still other amendments involving the refuge but gave no details. Democrats said the vote settles the drilling issue, and Republican leader Trent Lott of Mississippi said he expects the amendment to be withdrawn so the Senate can go ahead and pass an energy bill.

# Bush approves of besieging Arafat

WASHINGTON — President Bush, weighing his next moves in the Middle East crisis, approved the slow pace of Israel's withdrawal from Palestinian cities and said he understood why Prime Minister Ariel Sharon had laid siege to Yasser Arafat's headquarters. Saving his most pointed remarks for the Palestinian leader, Bush said Arafat's condemnation of terrorism must be followed by concrete action. "We will hold him to account," the president said. Bush summoned his foreign-policy team to the White House for a report from Secretary of State Colin Powell, who had returned nine hours earlier from a Middle East mission without securing a cease-fire. Aides said there was no decision

on what to do next, though CIA Director George Tenet is expected to return to the region soon. As the president sought to fine-tune his strategy, a senior State Department official conceded in testimony to Congress that the Middle East crisis has cost America support in the Arab world. Bush needs Arab leaders to go along with his efforts to oust Iraq's Saddam Hussein, and the Middle East crisis has put those plans on hold. "We are clearly, at least temporarily, losing some support," Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage told the House Appropriations' foreign-operations subcommittee. "We've got a problem." Despite complications with the Arab world and the refusal of Arafat and Sharon to fully comply with his demands, Bush declared Powell's mission a success.

# Abercrombie pulls T-shirts after protests

SAN FRANCISCO — Clothier Abercrombie & Fitch is pulling a line of T-shirts that triggered protests from Asian groups who said they reinforced negative stereotypes. The T-shirts, some of which show smiling men with slanted eyes and conical hats, will be pulled from all of the company's 311 stores in 50 states, company spokesman Hampton Carney said Thursday. "We're very, very, very sorry," he said. "It's never been our intention to offend anyone." Carney could not say how many of the T-shirts were already in stores, or how much the recall would cost the New Albany, Ohio-based casual sportswear company. The T-shirts, which went on sale in some stores April 12 for \$24.50, also will be removed from sale on the company's Web site, Carney said. "These graphic T-shirts were designed with the sole purpose of adding humor and levity to our fashion line," he said. "Because some of our customers have been offended by their content, we are pulling these shirts

from our stores." One of the company's T-shirts reads "Wong Brothers Laundry Service — Two Wongs Can Make It White." The T-shirts prompted a late-night meeting of Stanford University students Wednesday. The Asian American Students' Association encouraged calls to the company and said Abercrombie & Fitch should apologize. "It's really misleading as to what Asian people are," Michael Chang, the vice chairman of the student organization, told the *San Jose Mercury News*. "The stereotypes they depict are more than a century old. You're seeing laundry service. You're seeing basically an entire religion and philosophy being trivialized." One shirt features a smiling Buddha figure with the slogan "Abercrombie & Fitch Buddha Bash — Get Your Buddha on the Floor." Another reads "Wok-N-Bowl — Let the Good Times Roll — Chinese Food & Bowling." Carney said the company received approximately 60 phone calls Wednesday about the shirts. The company makes fun of everyone, Carney said, noting its previous clothing designs have included foreign waitresses,

taxi drivers, and Britons. Abercrombie & Fitch's advertising campaigns have come under fire before. Last year, women's organizations and conservative politicians rallied against the company for its ads featuring young, barely clad models in sexually suggestive poses.

# Government, Andersen break off talks

WASHINGTON — Negotiations abruptly collapsed Thursday between the Justice Department and Arthur Andersen LLP over settling criminal obstruction charges related to the destruction of documents in the financial collapse of Enron Corp. The lawyer for the Andersen accounting firm, Rusty Hardin, notified government attorneys that the company was not in position to make a decision on any criminal settlement. "We just agreed that we're just not there right now," he said. "We rejected certain proposals by the government and agreed

to continue to review other proposals of the government, but we could not complete that review within the time frame the government was demanding." The government, which had set a deadline for an agreement from Andersen, indicated that it would begin looking to the May 6 trial date. "We are continuing to prepare for trial," Justice spokesman Bryan Sierra said. Both Hardin and company spokesman Patrick Dorton left open the possibility that negotiations could resume. The collapse of secret negotiations occurred after the outlines of a deal had been struck, and the sides had expected to announce a settlement this week.

In recent days, Andersen's lawyers could not agree with government lawyers on specific language admitting guilt in illegally destroying Enron documents, a person familiar with the negotiations said, speaking on the condition of anonymity. Andersen also had balked at the length of time the Justice Department had proposed for deferring possible prosecution of the accounting firm, arguing that three years was too long, this person said. Securities and Exchange Commission spokeswoman Christi Harlan declined comment on the breakdown of talks. Thursday's end to talks came after weeks of negotiations

between the Justice Department and Andersen in the wake of the firm's criminal indictment, which was unsealed March 14. Talks intensified after the government accepted a plea agreement from David Duncan, the former senior Andersen auditor on the Enron account. In the indictment, the grand jury accused Andersen of destroying "tons of paper" at its offices worldwide and deleting enormous numbers of computer files on its Enron audits. Duncan pleaded guilty April 9 to destroying documents related to Enron's collapse. He agreed to cooperate with federal prosecutors; he is to be sentenced in August.

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# Plane hits Milan skyscraper; 3 dead

MILAN, Italy — A small plane, in flames and sending a distress signal, smashed into the tallest skyscraper in Italy's financial capital Thursday, killing at least three people and injuring 60. The crash initially raised fears of a Sept. 11-type terror attack, but the Italian government said it was probably an accident.

The aircraft punched through the 25th floor of the slim Pirelli building, gutting two floors and starting a fire that sent smoke pouring out into the clear blue sky over downtown Milan. Emergency workers helped bloodied men in business suits while firefighters worked to put out the blaze.

"I heard something like the engine of a plane dying out, and then I heard a terrible explosion," said Raffaele Taccogna, who was tending bar at the nearby Atlantic Hotel. "I certainly thought of the September attacks in the United States," he said. "It really looked like the same thing."

The pilot — who was on a 20-minute flight from Locarno, Switzerland, to Milan — reported problems with the plane's landing gear moments before plowing into the 30-story building at 5:50 p.m., Milan police officer Celerissimo De Simone said.

The pilot reported "a little problem with the landing gear," and the control tower instructed him to move to the west of the airport until it was fixed, a statement from the association said. It also said the pilot didn't issue a distress signal, as officials had previously reported. The control tower contacted the pilot again after seeing he was drifting to the north, in the wrong direction.

The pilot said he was fixing the problem, and the tower instructed him to move back into position to land. But the pilot again didn't get into the right position, it said. The control tower then lost contact.

One witness, Fabio Sunik,

said the plane was on fire before it crashed. The plane did not try to change course "but just went straight in," said Sunik, a sports journalist. "Then I saw rubble falling from the building."

Some 1,300 people work in the building, which houses local government offices, but it was not known how many were still there when the crash took place — not long after working hours ended.

Milan's main train station, approximately 200 yards away from the skyscraper, was evacuated for security reasons, and no trains were running from there. After-hours trading was suspended on the Milan stock market, which was already closed for the day.

The U.S. Consulate in Milan, about a half-mile, from the scene, evacuated the few staffers still in the office as a safety precaution, said Tom Skipper, a consulate spokesman.

President Bush was quickly notified of the collision, spokesman Ari Fleischer said. The FBI was assisting in the investigation.

In Washington, a senior Bush administration official, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Italian officials had told the United States that a mechanical problem not related to terrorism caused the crash.

Interior Minister Claudio Scajola told reporters in Rome that "initial reports point to an accident."

"We believe it isn't a terrorist attack," said police Sgt. Vincenzo Curto, reached at Carabinieri headquarters.

There was a discrepancy over the death toll. Earlier, a civil-defense official, Carlo Leo, reported five dead: the pilot, two office workers, and two passers-by. However, the vice president of the Lombardy region, Vivian Becalossi, reported only three dead later in the day: the pilot, a cleaning woman, and a government lawyer. The Milan prefect's office, which had previously

ly reported four dead, also revised the toll to three dead.

Rescue workers found a survivor, three hours after the crash, on the 25th floor, where one of the dead was found.

The pilot, believed to be the only one in the plane, was identified by police as Luigi Fasulo, a resident of Pregassona, Switzerland, who was thought to be in his 60s.

Swiss television news reported that the pilot had dual Swiss-Italian nationality. He often flew the Locarno-Milan route to keep his flying license up to date, it said.

Interviewed by Swiss television, Sandro Balestra, the director of Locarno airfield, said the pilot was known in the area for at least 30 years. The plane belonged to him.

# Chavez calls for unity in Venezuela

CARACAS, Venezuela — A week after protests set off bloodshed and toppled governments, Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez opened "a great national debate" Thursday to bring this bitterly divided nation together.

Gathering governors and mayors, Chavez called for a discussion of the country's future "with great respect for our differences, which are valid and furthermore necessary."

After demonstrations that toppled and restored Chavez while killing at least 49 people, Chavez called on Venezuelans "to finally, by God, leave behind bloodshed."

But he leavened his plea with digs at his foes. Chavez called

the turmoil that toppled him a "planned ambush."

"There will be no taboo subjects, nor should there be," Chavez said. But he said Venezuelans must accept the 1999 Constitution that he promoted and Venezuelans approved in a referendum.

Businessman Pedro Carmona, the man who dissolved Venezuela's Congress and other democratic institutions during his one-day rule, insisted he's not a "Pinochet Lite" and acted only to fill the vacuum of power.

In newspaper interviews published Thursday, Carmona dismissed comparisons with Augusto Pinochet's 1973 CIA-backed coup in Chile. But he admitted he made errors, including not receiving a con-

firmed resignation letter from Chavez before he swore himself in as president on April 13.

In Washington, President Bush called on Chavez to respect democratic values such as freedom of the press. "If there are lessons to be learned,

it's important that he learn them," Bush said.

Foreign ministers of the Organization of American States were to hear a report from the secretary-general, Cesar Gaviria, on his fact-finding mission in Venezuela.

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## Bin Laden calls 9/11 hijackers holy warriors

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — The Arab satellite channel Al-Jazeera aired additional excerpts Thursday from a videotape in which Osama bin Laden praises the Sept. 11 hijackers.

Excerpts from the undated videotape were first broadcast Monday. On Wednesday, clips from a similar tape were aired on another Arab satellite station across the Middle East.

Neither tape appears to offer any leads to bin Laden's whereabouts or condition, and there is no way to tell how recent the clips are.

Both of the tapes aired this week are compilations of old material, news footage from Sept. 11, narration, and graphics. The one aired on Thursday by Al-Jazeera also included a farewell message from an apparent hijacker and attempted to portray the 19 men who commandeered four planes on Sept. 11 as holy warriors.

"These men who went out, they truly believe that what God offers is better than what is in this life," bin Laden said in a clip, parts of which have been broadcast previously.

## Ex-king returns as Afghans rejoice

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Afghanistan's former king stepped off a plane Thursday and into his homeland 29 years after being overthrown in a palace coup. The bitter rivalries that have marred modern Afghan history were suspended as people took to the streets in jubilation.


Smiling and waving, Mohammad Zahir Shah walked onto a red carpet, where an honor guard saluted him and dignitaries applauded. Women and children in brightly colored costumes held up his photograph. The frail ex-king shook hands with tribal elders, diplomats, and even a few warlords before boarding a black Mercedes-Benz.

Dancers swirled to the beat of drums as thousands of Afghans lined the route where the 87-year-old former monarch was taken in a heavily guarded motorcade from the airport to his new residence — a two-story house on a quiet Kabul street.

"I want to serve the people of Afghanistan," Zahir Shah told his countrymen on Kabul television Thursday.

# Using our resources and focusing on our children

Recently, the Iowa City School Board voted, 5-2, to present a property-tax bond over a 1-cent sales tax to the public. The property-tax bond would be used to help fund a multi-million dollar school-improvement plan. The plan proposes building a new elementary and junior-high school, expanding the alternative-education center, and adding capacity to City High and West High to address overcrowding.

Unfortunately however, the issue decided on the issue of property bond over sales tax, instead of the issue of children.

There are schools in Iowa City that are not overcrowded. For instance, the *DI* reported that Hills Elementary has 258 students in a 200-capacity facility, while Twain Elementary is under capacity by 69 students. A recent forum demonstrated that Hills parents are against redistricting between

the two schools. One Hills parent was even quoted as saying, "The issue is the kids who go there [Twain]."

Exactly. The issue should always be the kids. And even in times of parent opposition, all present resources — regardless of assumptions, feelings, and conceptions — should be used to their fullest intents. In this case, the highest priority should be educating the children, not alienating them.

The problem is not money or how to get it. Nor should it be, because the education of young minds is priceless. The problem is that public education now seems to sit within a "privatized aura" because parents want and get to choose which school their child attends and with whom instead of what their child can achieve by attending "other" schools.

No reports have been issued stating that Iowa City's

under-capacity schools are producing under-educated students. There is also nothing else to date that even insinuates that the education is better at the overcrowded schools. Granted, it is a significant challenge to redistrict children and remove them and their families from daily routines and common elements, but challenges always exist — especially in education.

When the public gets the chance to vote on whether to pay more in property taxes for the notion of space improvement, hopefully, there will be some space allotted to vote on the notion of efficiency. If all resources are not being used and if children are being detrimentally categorized and separated, the students at Hill, Twain, and all the other schools will end up back at square one, anyway. This time however, square one will just happen to cost an additional \$38 million.

## Hybrids and BioDiesel

A recent letter to the editor (*DI*, April 3) perpetuates the myth that increased automobile mileage comes at the expense of safety. This is simply not true.

While the cutting edge hybrid-electrics are smallish, there is another class of existing vehicles that easily double mileage compared with gasoline vehicles while being just as safe. Modern diesel vehicles are roughly twice as efficient as their gasoline counterparts; that's half the fuel used and half the CO<sub>2</sub> released into the atmosphere.

So why aren't Americans buying modern diesel cars and trucks at the same rates as environmentally savvy Europeans (50 percent of new cars in some countries)? Unfortunately, the fuel in the United States is so poorly (read: cheaply) refined, it prevents the use of modern emission-reducing technologies. So if you want to buy a 35 mpg Jeep or Tahoe, you'll need to move; American firms only sell them in Europe.

The EPA has mandated cleaner diesel fuel by 2006. But the powerful trucking lobby has fought this screaming and kicking, fearing the penny increase in fuel cost. Seeing how the Senate recently nixed proposed higher mpg requirements, and Big Oil runs the White House, this mandate will probably not last long.

But there is hope, and it's growing on the outskirts of town. BioDiesel,

made from soy, canola, and other vegetable oils, is a much cleaner, home-grown alternative that can be run in almost any diesel engine. Many bus fleets are now supplementing their regular fuel with BioDiesel to reduce emissions.

Unless a major breakthrough in hybrids appears soon, we are stuck with fossil fuels for a while. Switching from gasoline to BioDiesel reduces emissions, reduces global warming, and reduces the need to destroy national parks or fight wars to secure oil reserves. ## A tall lighthouse of rock

Alto Heceta has never been afraid of mixing things up.

Not in the bar-fight kind of way, but with methodical and fluid rock songs with plummeting and rising time signatures, intrinsically laced dueling guitars, and the vocals of guitarists Adam Penly and Dino Balocchi, which are traded, shared, and shouted back and forth.

Alto Heceta has been rocking Iowa City for longer than most of my goldfish have lived. Combined. After ubiquitous shows around Iowa City over the last three years, the interactions of the members of Alto Heceta are now more of a reflexive dialogue. This has been captured on plastic on both *Safe in Stereo EP* and a split with the now-defunct *Speed of Sauce*.

After a six-month absence from public view, Alto Heceta ended a period of seclusion at Gabe's in February. After the show, Balocchi cradled a 20-pack of burned CDs — a three-song giveaway for the upcoming album — and a postcard from where they stand musically.

Skills have also been honed as Alto Heceta and Burn Disco Burn have formed a loose co-op of rockers in Iowa City over the past year and a half. Band members, gear, and spots on bills are shared as Iowa City has watched a proliferation of side bands, solo projects, and collaborative efforts.

Fronted by Burn Disco Burn's Nick Burd and Alto Heceta's Dino Balochi, offshoots such as Racecar Radar have further entangled the lineups by enlisting ex-Speed of Sauce drummer JP Mohan to shore up the rhythm section. Matt Heideman, a founding drummer of Alto Heceta, is also lending his talents to Racecar Radar (where he plays bass) and Burn Disco Burn.

During a recent Racecar Radar show, and a visit to recording sessions of Burn Disco Burn,

I tried to sort out the split personalities of the city's rockers.

**DI: How many different bits of bands make up side bands such as Racecar Radar?**

**Burd:** There's about six bands total, I think. Alto Heceta, Burn Disco Burn, Kathryn Musilek [Burn Disco Burn's bassist], Books on Tape [fronted by Musilek], and Speed of Sauce. Dino also does solo stuff [Brave Firefighter].

**DI: Does that ever feel really incestuous to you guys?**

**Heideman:** Everyone is so supportive of everyone else's bands, whether they are playing with them or not.

**Burd:** I think also, it's a lot more about being friends than bandmates. Even if there isn't anything going on, I'm always hanging out with someone I'm in a band with.

**Heideman:** The last few months, when I look back at them on my schedule, it's like I work during the day, and at night I either have practice with Alto Heceta, Burn Disco Burn, or Racecar Radar, and then I have studio with either Alto Heceta or Burn Disco Burn, or I have a show with either of the three bands.

**DI: Are there issues with scheduling conflicts?**

**Burd:** Um, if one of our other bands isn't doing a lot of shows or something, we always have Racecar Radar to do it.

**Balocchi:** I think it will happen, but right now, there is not a chance that we can start recording. If we're not playing shows, then we are mixing for one of the two bands.

**DI: What about albums from Alto Heceta and Burn Disco Burn? When can we expect to see those?**

**Balocchi:** We're still finishing stuff as we speak ... hopefully, it will come out pretty soon.

**Burd:** [Burn Disco Burn] will probably be done at the end of the month. There is going to be like 11 songs on it, and we're really happy with how it turned out ... Matt joined the band like two or three weeks before we went into the studio and learned all the songs, and there are some songs on there that we played like four times in the studio and then recorded. It turned out and sounded really great.

**DI: Many of your songs in Alto Heceta, Burn Disco Burn, and Racecar Radar are about emotions. Do you get frustrated with always being given the genre tag of "Emo"?**

**Heideman:** You know what, we don't even think about what we are trying to do. We don't think of genre or something and go for that and go, "OK, we are going to be an indie band. We are going to be an Emo band." What it comes down to is that we just get together, write songs, and make music and have a great time doing it. People can call it whatever they want ...

**Balocchi:** No, we are all Emo. E M O — I live by those three letters. That's all there is to it. I fuckin' live and die for Emo. I think this word is ridiculous, by the way.

**Burd:** It's just so hard to give tags to music ... Sometimes people will ask me what kind of band I'm in, and I tell 'em, I'm in a rock band.

Alto Heceta will be joined by Little Joe Gould, North to Alaska, and Volta do Mar at the Green Room, 509 S. Gilbert St.; it will play material from its forthcoming release, set to hit shelves this summer.

City High assistant varsity football coach Greg Brown said he was pleased with the verdict, adding that the case probably would not hurt the school's reputation. Brown was Roberts' head coach in 1997, when the injury occurred.

"I was extremely disappointed that it had to go to court," Brown said. "I've always had a good relationship with my players, and to think I would put an injured player in a game is very disappointing ... If parents are concerned with

the goings on at City High ... they would not let their kids play football, and that hasn't been the case," he said.

Roberts also contended that his football and wrestling coaches neglected him when he returned to play sports the following year, causing him to lose out on college scholarships.

School District representatives asserted that Roberts quit football and wrestling despite encouragement from athletics officials to stay on board.

launched a joint investigation on Thursday to determine who was responsible for the fire.

Authorities arrived at the bar at 12:12 a.m. Thursday after a call for emergency services. Authorities found several persons suffering from burns, many of whom were treated on site and sent home. Three people, including Busche, were transported to UI Hospitals and Clinics.

Don Busche, Deanine Busche's father, said she suffered third-degree burns to her face and sec-

ond-degree burns to one of her arms. She will be transferred today to Chicago's Loyola Hospital to be closer to the family's Schaumburg, Ill., home.

"She's in good spirits," her father said from the emergency room as his daughter spoke softly in the background. UIHC doctors estimate that Deanine Busche will remain hospitalized for at least two weeks.

Don Busche said he doesn't know if the family will file a lawsuit against Etc.; he has not contacted a lawyer.

Iowa City police Sgt. Bill Campbell would not comment directly on the investigation,

but, he said, "it won't be done tomorrow." Investigators say they are interested in speaking to anyone who witnessed the incident, especially those who were burned.

Iowa Code prohibits any person from igniting or maintaining an open fire in a business.

Bar manager Troy Kline routinely lights the bar on fire with Bacardi 151, Christeson said. Wednesday's fire, though, was "much higher and lasted longer than usual," she said. People interviewed by the *DI* said bartenders at The Summit, 10 S. Clinton St., have also lit liquor on fire. Summit owner Mike Porter did not return

calls Wednesday night.

Onlookers said bartender Ross Smith served the shot that led to the incident and repeatedly apologized to Busche while she was placed on a stretcher. Smith declined to comment.

Owner Kip Pohl and Etc. employees declined to comment about Wednesday's events.

Christeson said the bar remained open after authorities left and continued to play music and sell alcohol.

"They just kept going like nothing happened," she said.

# Israel withdraws from Jenin

any cease-fire."

Touring the Jenin camp Thursday, U.N. Mideast envoy Terje Larsen was harshly critical of the Israelis, though he would not take sides on the hottest disagreement — Palestinian charges that Israeli soldiers massacred hundreds of civilians in the camp, while Israel maintained that most of the dead were gunmen or bombers.

He said approximately 300 buildings were destroyed and 2,000 people were left homeless

in the Israeli operation.

"Not any objective can justify such action, with colossal suffering" to civilians, said Roed Larsen, wearing a blue flak jacket and walking over a broad swathe of pulverized concrete where hundreds of people once lived.

In Gaza early today, Israeli troops moved briefly into Palestinian-controlled territory near the border with Egypt, scene of frequent clashes and incursions. Palestinian doctors said two people were killed by Israeli gunfire. Israeli military sources said that during a routine operation, Palestinians

shot at soldiers, who returned the fire.

Near Nablus, the Israeli military said it captured Husam Ataf Ali Badran, a leader of the Hamas militant organization who the army said was responsible for the deaths of more than 100 Israelis in some of the worst suicide bombings in the last year.

He reportedly had a hand in the March 27 Passover suicide bombing in Netanya that triggered the Israeli drive into Palestinian cities and towns. An army statement said his capture "is a significant blow" to Hamas.

### Actor Robert Blake arrested in death

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Robert Blake and his bodyguard were arrested Thursday in the shooting death of the actor's wife nearly a year ago, police said.

Police officers took Blake into custody at a relative's home in Hidden Hills, a gated suburban community where the actor moved after the killing. He was arrested for investigation of murder, said Sgt. John Pasquariello, a police spokesman.

Bonny Lee Bakley, 44, was shot to death last May, a block from a Studio City restaurant where she and her husband had dined.

Sandi Gibbons, a spokeswoman for the district attorney, said prosecutors will review the case submitted by police and announce April 22 whether they intend to file charges.

Blake's bodyguard and chauffeur, Earle Caldwell, was arrested earlier Thursday for conspiracy, Pasquariello said.

Blake has said that after dinner, he walked his wife to the car and then remembered that he left behind a gun he carried to protect her. He went back for it, he said, and when he returned to the car, he found his wife shot.

His attorney, Harland Braun, said Thursday he did not know what evidence police had. Braun said everyone "who ever came in contact with her had a motive" to kill her.

Cary Goldstein, attorney for Bakley's family, said they were pleased with the arrests. He warned against any attempt by Blake's lawyer to raise questions about Bakley's behavior.

# U.S. 'friendly' fire kills four

WASHINGTON — An American F-16 pilot in Afghanistan apparently mistook Canadian soldiers for enemy forces and thought he was acting in self-defense when he dropped a 500-pound bomb, killing four and wounding eight, U.S. officials said Thursday.

As an investigation began, a key question was why the Americans didn't know the Canadians were training in the area.

President Bush conveyed his nation's regret to Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chrétien, and Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld said U.S. and Canadian officers at Central Command headquarters in Tampa, Fla., would work together to piece together what happened and why.

The soldiers were the first Canadians killed in a combat zone since the Vietnam War. Their unit is the 3rd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based near Edmonton, Alberta.

In a brief announcement, Central Command said an Air National Guard F-16 aircraft dropped one or two laser-guided bombs on the Canadians, but it offered no other details. Pentagon officials said the Canadians were conducting a nighttime, live-fire training exercise near the southern Afghan city of Kandahar.

The F-16 was from the 183rd Fighter Wing, whose home base is Springfield, Ill., but it could not immediately be confirmed that the pilot was a member of that unit. The pilot's name was not released, in accordance with usual U.S. military procedure in the course of an

accident investigation.

The jet, flying in tandem with another American F-16, had been sent out on patrol. It was unclear whether they had given any other mission.

It appeared the pilots did not know they were flying over an area restricted to training — and so fire from the training exercise made them believe they were under attack, officials at the Pentagon said. All forces operating in the Kandahar area are supposed to be aware of friendly forces.

One of the pilots sought permission to bomb; he was told to mark the target but not fire, a senior Pentagon official said. On a second fly-around, after reporting he was taking ground fire, he dropped the bomb in what he thought was self-defense, the official said.

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

## Bluder receives extension

Loyalty? Iowa women's basketball coach Lisa Bluder has it. After two winning seasons with the Hawkeyes, and approximately two weeks after Iowa State coach Bill Fennelly and Drake coach Lisa Stone completed contract negotiations, Bluder extended her devotion to the UI. Iowa Athletics Director Bob Bowsby announced on Thursday afternoon that Bluder will get a five-year contract extension that will run through the 2009 basketball season.

"Lisa has done an exceptional job in her first two years at the UI," Bowsby said. "All phases of the women's basketball operation are moving forward, and we have sought to express our excitement about the continued success of the program. Lisa has produced two excellent teams since her arrival, and she and her staff have been outstanding additions to our athletics family." Bluder's contract increases her salary to \$293,530, with opportunities to receive extra income through academic and athletics incentives. "I am extremely thrilled to sign this contract extension that will enable me the opportunity to coach at the UI for an extended period of time," Bluder said. "I am grateful to Iowa and our

administration for their commitment to me and to the Iowa women's basketball team. I cannot imagine a better place for my family to live and university in which to be associated." In her two-year tenure at Iowa, Bluder recorded a 39-21 record, and led the Hawkeyes to a Big Ten Tournament title and two NCAA Tournament second round appearances. Bluder was named Big Ten Coach of the Year, Women's Basketball Coaches Association's District 6 Coach of the Year, and Women's Basketball News Service's College Coach of the Year in 2001.

## Heim's health improves

It takes grit, sweat, and perseverance to survive as a Division I athlete.

Ryan Heim's dedication to becoming a successful collegiate wrestler may be the sole factor in his surviving a near-fatal crash Jan. 21 as he drove home with his teammates and father from the National Duals in Ohio.

Heim, who sustained a severe head injury after the van he was driving collided with a semi on Interstate 80 near Tipton, is making more headway every day, said his mother, Bridget, and his doctor, Joseph Nora. "He's definitely showing progress," Bridget Heim said. "His days are busy, but every day, there's a little more improvement."

The wrestler stayed at the UI Hospitals and Clinics for the first month and a half following the accident, before being transferred to Covenant Medical Center in Waterloo on Feb. 21. Nora, the medical director of Rehabilitation Services there, now oversees his treatment.

Doctors first said it was questionable if the two-time state champion for Dubuque Hempstead would even survive the accident. Now, the 20-year-old college sophomore is talking, reading, and writing.

He can also now feed himself

### Alamo Bowl champs end spring drills

He is in the process of finishing his last semester while also student teaching fifth- and sixth-grade students at Longfellow Elementary School.

"In a way, the biggest thing that has changed is my role as an athlete and a student," he said. "Most people think your last season is easier, but it has been a challenge to schedule training around everything else."

He also happens to be juggling a marriage. He and his wife, Linde, have been married for nearly two years, and the prospect of uprooting their

## Iowa focuses intently on weekend

Like a horse with blinders on, the Iowa softball team trots in to what may be the most important weekend of the season with its focus directed squarely where it should be — on Michigan State.

Yes, the Spartans, whom Iowa meets in single games at Pearl Field today and Saturday. Not, as one may expect, on Iowa's co-leader atop the Big Ten, Michigan, which travels to Iowa City for a April 21 double-header that could prove decisive in determining the winner of the conference title.

Iowa coach Gayle Blevins has more than 900 career victories to her name, and she earned none of them by looking past an opponent to another contest. That's why it's really not surprising to see Blevins has her squad completely zeroed in on the Spartans.

"In this game, you have to respect

and understand the importance of every opponent in each game and every opportunity," she said.

But what about Michigan? The Hawkeyes and Wolverines have combined to win the last eight Big Ten regular-season titles. Both teams stand at 8-2 in the conference. If those records are still identical after Iowa meets the Spartans and Michigan has played Northwestern, a sweep by either team April 21 would all but surely seal up another conference crown.


"Our focus is completely on Michigan State right now, as it should be," Blevins said.

And so the focus returns to the Spartans, who venture to Iowa City with a sub-.500 record of 21-25, including a 3-7 conference ledger. The two teams have met once outside the confines of conference play, at the Louisville Slugger Classic in Tempe, Ariz., during the season's first week of play, with Iowa walking away with a 13-0 victory.

Still, for Blevins, records and past meetings get tossed out the window. Every conference game presents its own set of challenges, and the two contests with the Spartans will be no different. Today, the focus will be on Michigan State. Saturday, the focus will be on Michigan State. Only on April 21 will focus shift to the No. 12 Wolverines.

Like Blevins, Michigan coach Carol Hutchins is long on experience in the Big Ten, and she undoubtedly has her team focused on first taking care of the 17-12 Wildcats. But both coaches know the games this weekend have the opportunity to be yet another significant meeting in a rather lengthy rivalry, which Iowa leads 50-36-1. Blevins said she doesn't see a budding rivalry between the two teams; one has always existed in her eyes. She also knows it's easier said than done to keep attention



# Hawkeye rowers host Big Ten foes

The waters of the Coralville Reservoir will host a strong batch of Big Ten competition as the Iowa rowers host Michigan State, Minnesota, and Wisconsin Saturday at the Sugar Bottom race course.

The regatta will be raced in a double-dual format, with the Hawkeyes facing squads from Michigan State and Minnesota. Iowa coach Mandi Kowal said this is the first year that a Big Ten schedule has been agreed upon, and that the double-dual format will provide ample competition for each contesting team.

Iowa's staunchest competition will likely come from the Spar-

tans, who recently won eight of 12 races at the highly competitive Buckeye Invitational. The regatta showcased talent from No. 3 Ohio State and No. 14 Texas. Michigan State's varsity 8+ is currently ranked No. 12, and it will provide a vigorous race for the No. 18 Hawkeyes.

The return to home waters will be beneficial for the Hawkeyes, who have made trips to Wisconsin and University of Southern California the previous two weekends.

Tiffany Tiberi, a rower on Iowa's second varsity 8+, said the team is experienced in one challenging aspect of this weekend's competition: mastering the windy waters.

"We've had some good experi-

ence rowing in the wind," she said. "I think this is one thing we have an advantage in, and we should be confident going into the weekend."

In addition to the tough competition and battling the ever-changing Iowa weather, the Hawkeyes will strive to unify their teams in the boats.

"We're still trying to figure out how to be one, not just with rowing but as a mental force," Kowal said. "But we're making some good progress, and we're learning some things, and that's important."

Iowa's varsity 4+ returned home with a come-from-behind win over USC last weekend, edging the Trojans with a time of 7:45.3 to 7:47.6. Anneke

Diem, a rower on the varsity 4+, said the victory was important because the team was unified for the win.

"We've had some tough races in the past, and they haven't quite turned out the way wanted them to," Diem said. "But we really pulled together and had a great race."

The Hawkeyes will take to the water beginning at 9 a.m. against Michigan State, while Wisconsin and Minnesota will dual simultaneously. The next set of races will begin at 2 p.m. as Iowa takes on Minnesota. The competition will begin with the novice races and continue through the varsity sprints.

## Men's track team aims to qualify for NCAA

This weekend: The Iowa men's track and field team will split up the squad again this weekend, sending athletes to the Mt. SAC Relays in Walnut, Calif., and the UNI Open in Cedar Falls.

**Big Bill:** At the Sea Ray Relays in Knoxville, Tenn., Hawkeye sophomore Bill Neumann's javelin throw of 244-5 set a school record, surpassing Dan Ralph's old mark of 227-10 set in 2000. The throw automatically qualified Neumann for the NCAA championships on April 29 and ranks the native of Comox, British Columbia, first in the Big Ten and second nationally.

**Provisional qualifiers:** Iowa has four other provisional qualifiers for the NCAA meet — Jim Costello's hammer throw of 212-5, Ken Kemeny's shot put of 59-7 1/2, Nick Nordheim's 29:44.71 showing in the 10,000-meter run, and the 1,600-meter relay team of Tim Dodge, Juan Coleman, Scott Williamson, and Zach Digney, which provisionally qualified in 3:07.21.

**On Iowa:** The Hawkeyes will send eight athletes to Mt. SAC to compete with some very elite competitors in hopes of garnering more provisional qualifications this weekend. Iowa coach Larry Wiecek will focus on

lowering Coleman's time in the 400-meter dash, Mike Cunningham's in the 800-meter run, and the 1,600-meter relay's time at Mt. SAC. "She's a pretty incredible woman, I'll tell you that," he said. "She's as excited about the possibility as I am."


After helping lead Iowa to a 19-16 victory over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl on Dec. 29, 2001, his college playing days ended. He sought out an agent with the advice of several Hawkeyes currently in the NFL, and had one in place by early February. He then turned his attention to training and conditioning.

One of the reasons Kampman is a favorite to wind up playing in the NFL has been his performances at various draft camps and timing days, in which scouts from the 32 pro teams meticulously gather data on players' speed and strength. Kampman readily admits he has been surprised by many of the stories that have surfaced about him.

"My agent e-mails me some of the stuff, but with the draft, it's mostly hype," he said. "The journalists have to fill the pages with something, and that's really what it is, hype."

Visiting cities that may be his future home has also been on Kampman's agenda. He likened the process to the college-recruiting process with one major exception: This time, he has no control over where he ends up if he is drafted.

Kampman claims not to have a favorite NFL team but says he enjoyed his visit to the frozen tundra of Green Bay the most. Former Iowa defensive back Matt Bowen plays for the Packers, and he described the atmosphere to Kampman in

only terms a Hawkeye could understand.

solid foods — he ate a bratwurst Thursday evening for dinner.

He also does six hours of therapy a day. You name the exercise, and Heim does it, along with his physical, occupational, and speech therapies segmented into 30-minute intervals for six hours a day.

Pretty miraculous for a patient who had a question-mark next to his name for the first few weeks following the accident.

"When he was first in the accident, it was so terrible — nobody should've survived," Bridget Heim said. "It was hardest for the first six weeks when he was in the coma. When he woke up, opened his eyes, and responded, several miracles took place."

Each one of the leaps have been greeted with bountiful enthusiasm from the Heims' support team of Iowa wrestlers and coaches, and their support has spread to concerned Hawkeye fans across Iowa.

Iowa coaches Jim Zalesky and Tom Brands have made multiple visits to see the 141-pounder, while former Iowa coach Dan Gable quizzed Heim on wrestling when he visited. Heim answered each question correctly. His mother said that

her son solidly recollects all happenings before Thanksgiving, but the past three and a half months aren't so clear.

Nora said the young wrestler has met or exceeded the goals set for him each week, and he credits his success largely to the determination and perseverance learned as a wrestler.

"[His progress] is absolutely terrific — this poor young fellow was in a coma," Nora said. "There was initially severe damage to the brain, so, sure, he has trouble. But he's got a great sense of humor, and everything looks promising."

Bridget Heim said that her son has had few setbacks, aside from minor infections during his stay in the hospital.

Covenant Medical Center has let her stay in her son's room, providing her with a fold-out bed. She rarely leaves her son's side, seeing her husband and other children only on the weekends, when they make the 90-minute commute.

Despite the minor inconveniences, she said she was encouraged by her son's progress.

"We've set no deadlines on time [when he'll be recovered]," Bridget Heim said. "The doctors referred to him as an old Cadillac — he just needs a little fine tuning. We're not in any hurry. The most important thing is his recovery."

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A benefit dinner for Ryan Heim is scheduled Sunday at the Clarion Hotel and Conference Center.

Dinner will be served from 6-9 p.m., followed by a silent auction. Cost is \$8 for adults, \$3 for children 4-12, and free for children under 4. Tickets will be available at the door.

Bridget Heim, Ryan's mother, said nearly \$30,000 of donations have been made so far.

Hawkeyes on the confidence level, the same can't be said about injuries. Fans expecting to see Alamo Bowl offensive MVP Aaron Greving on Saturday will be disappointed to observe him on the sidelines with a fracture. Injuries may also sideline offensive lineman Ben Sobieski, defensive line-men Jared Clauss and Colin Cole, tight end Erik Jensen, and wide-out Marqueas McLaurin.

The injury to Greving will allow talented tailbacks Fred Russell and Jermelle Lewis the opportunity to vie for the spot vacated by the graduated Ladell Betts. Ferentz said he sees Greving and Russell as equals rather than competitors for the position.

"We feel like we have a great 1-2 punch with Aaron and Fred," he said.

New faces at quarterback and receiver, as well as the defensive line, will also be noticeable at the scrimmage.

With the graduation of starter Kyle McCann, Brad Banks will look to solidify his grasp on the No. 1 signal caller post. David

Raih and junior-college transfer Nathan Chandler will see more than their fair share of reps as well, and conceivably fit in the mix as well, though Ferentz feels Banks is his top choice.

"Things have gone pretty much how we thought they would," Ferentz said of the quarterback situation. "[Brad] is aware of the things he needs to work on and is working hard to get better."

The other two positions were hit hard by graduation. The Hawkeyes lost receivers Kahlil Hill, Chris Oliver, and Tim Dodge to graduation as well as defensive linemen Aaron Kampman, Jerry Montgomery, and Derrick Pickens.

Ferentz said several players have taken a step forward at receiver, most notably Ramon Ochoa. Warren Holloway and promising redshirt freshmen Darius Butler and Ed Hinkel have also caught Ferentz's eye, and they will likely see plenty of time in the fall.

On the defensive line, Jonathan Babineaux, Howard Hodges, and Clauss will fill the roles vacated by the three veterans. Filling the void left by graduation is something Ferentz knows is key to continuing to build the program back to the

level it reached in the '80s and early '90s.

"This is a process," he said. "Any time you graduate fine players and fine leaders, it's tough, but I've liked what I've seen out of our [incoming] senior class."

Spring games are also an excellent opportunity for players to make names for themselves. Last year, unheralded tight end Dallas Clark opened several eyes with a strong showing in April. Clark went on to finish second on the team in catches, and he became somewhat of a fan favorite at Kinnick Stadium.

Several of the young wide receivers appear to be good candidates for such an occurrence, as well as linebacker Chad Greenway and fullbacks Edgar Cervantes and Aaron Mickens. Ferentz had several complimentary things to say about each young player as practices wound down.

Following the scrimmage, Ferentz and his staff will have until the opening of practice in August to ponder adjustments to the lineup and any weaknesses they foresee.

Hoch remains unranked on the year. Cassie Haas, who is ranked 106, also helps pilot the team from No. 3.

Coach's comment: "The importance of the matches this weekend are fairly obvious; they will affect our seeding at the Big Ten Tournament," said Paul Wardlaw. "We're playing Minnesota indoors because it doesn't have outdoor facilities, and Wisconsin lost to Northwestern last week, but anytime you're on the road, it will be tough. **Men play host in regular season finale**

The Iowa men's tennis team is on the hunt this weekend, hosting its final weekend of Big Ten regular season play and searching to improve on its record of 3-5 in the conference.

The Hawkeyes will host Wisconsin today and No. 23 Minnesota on Saturday, looking for a pair of victories to avenge last weekend's road losses to Michigan and Michigan State. Iowa was upset by the Spartans, 4-3, and fell to the Wolverines, 5-2.

"The guys should be ready to play this weekend," Iowa coach Steve Houghton said. "The two teams we play both look good — Minnesota is on paper better than we are. They're ranked nationally, but Wisconsin is good, too."

"There are some big challenges here teamwise. The guys are over last weekend for sure. They'll get back up on their feet and go again."

The Badgers are 8-10 overall, 2-6 in the Big Ten. Wisconsin is led in singles by Danny Westerman, who is ranked No. 28 in the Omni Hotels Collegiate Tennis ranking system. Scott Rutherford and Scott Green lead the Badgers in doubles.

No. 23 Minnesota is 12-6 overall and 5-3 in the conference. Junior Harsh Mankad is the top singles player in the country. Mankad and Thomas Haug are the Gophers' top doubles team.

Iowa's No. 1 singles player, Stuart Waters, will face Mankad on Saturday with a chance for him to tie for fifth among winning seasons in

school history. Waters currently holds a 14-5 overall record, 6-2 in the conference. If he reaches 15 wins this weekend, he will tie with Klas Bergstrom (1992), Mats Malmberg (1986), and Tyler Cleveland (1998). Waters is currently 6-2 against ranked opponents this season.

"Stuart has taken a terrific path, responded well to the pressure of playing No. 1, and his confidence is at an all-time high. A big part of it is that he's having a great season," Houghton said.

Also faring well for Iowa is junior Hunter Skogman, who teamed up with Jake Wilson to defeat Michigan State's Mike Jonckheere and Goran Topalo, 8-3. He went on to defeat the Spartans' Camerson Marshall (6-1, 6-3). Skogman also recorded a singles win over Michigan's Anthony Jackson (6-4, 1-

6, 6-3). Pete Rose has a 5-3 conference record and 12-5 overall, but his status this weekend is questionable because of an injury last weekend.

Because of last weekend's consecutive pair of losses, Iowa will need both wins this weekend to ensure a top-five bid in the Big Ten Tournament, which will be held April 27-28.

"Obviously, every match makes a difference," Houghton said. "It's hard to tell because the Big Ten is such a logjam. It depends on what happens with other teams; we want to be in the top five, but it depends on other matches. Teams are so close in some senses; in some ways, we don't worry about seedings. Anything you win is in the bank."

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**Maday out of All-Around contention**

Alexis Maday's championship hopes came crashing down with her when she fell off the balance beam during NCAA nationals.

Maday's miss earned her a 9.15 on the event and dropped her down to 16th place in the evening session with a 38.75. Iowa's Annie Rue also fell on the beam and floor and finished well behind the pack at 37.825 Thursday in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

In a more cheery note, Maday's 9.9 on vault tied her for second in the evening session and fourth overall. It could be enough to place her in the event finals for vault on Saturday, but she won't find out until after team finals today. She has an outside shot to make the uneven bars finals as well.

The stage was set for Maday to possibly claim the all-around title and earn the honor of best college gymnast. Her arch-rival, Michigan's Elise Ray, turned in a strong but not spectacular 39.525 for second place following the afternoon session. Utah's Theresa Kulikowski led with a 39.6.

Maday career high was 39.65, and she had a 39.625 score last month at Iowa State. Thus, her best routine might have been enough to take first.

She started out decently with a 9.85 on the uneven bars, but then came the downfall on beam. After a break, she bounced back for a 9.85 on floor and then ended with a sparkling 9.9 on vault.

While the beam cost her All-American status, it didn't dim all the accomplishments made this season. She won 27 individual

event or all-around titles and joined Rue as the first Iowa gymnasts to make nationals.

"[Alexis] rocked three events," Iowa coach Mike Lorenzen said. "She couldn't have done any better on uneven bars, floor, or vault, and handled her miss on beam well. For her first trip to NCAA nationals, it's hard to describe how hard it is to get out on the floor alone. To do what she did was a phenomenal accomplishment."

The meet was a learning experience for Rue as she struggled mightily by falling on balance

beam and floor.

She started out with a 9.650 on beam and finished solidly with a 9.625 on vault. Rue expected her season to be finished long before nationals. Despite her struggles Thursday, it can't be too much of a downer in an otherwise spectacular freshman campaign. Plus, now she's had a taste of the championship competition, which could be beneficial should she or the whole team qualify in the coming years.

Montreal returns to playoffs

BOSTON (AP) — Donald Audette scored three goals, and Saku Koivu, sidelined most of the season by cancer, assisted on all of them as the Montreal Canadiens returned to the playoffs with a 5-2 victory over the Boston Bruins on Thursday night.

Like Koivu, Audette missed much of the season. He was sidelined for 49 games with a lacerated left forearm before returning March 30. Koivu resumed playing April 10 after being diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma in September 2001.

Blackhawks 2, Blues 1



No juice; panel ends bowl partnership

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Citrus Commission has ended its 19-year-partnership with its namesake New Year's Day bowl game.

The Citrus Commission's public-relations committee voted, 9-3, to sever ties with the game, formerly known as the Florida Citrus Bowl.

"The message that we used to have was a health-related message, and we were targeting orange juice as a health-related drink," said Jim Naff, the Florida Citrus Commission deputy executive director. "Now, we're going after moms 25 to 44 years old with children."

"It's a marketing decision based on the fact that our target audience probably isn't the audience that's watching the Citrus Bowl."

The game pits a team from the Southeastern Conference against one from the Big Ten. The game offers the fifth-highest payout of all bowls, \$4.25 million per team.

Woman dies 2 days after Boston Marathon

BOSTON — A 28-year-old woman who ran in the Boston Marathon to raise money for cancer patients died Wednesday, two days after collapsing near the end of the race.

Cynthia Lucero was one of 150 runners raising money for the state chapter of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society among the 17,000 marathoners on Monday. She is the second fatality in the marathon's 106-year history.

According to a friend, Carole Slipowitz, Lucero stopped near Cleveland Circle, not far from the finish line, saying she felt dehydrated. She grew wobbly and fainted.

By the time she was transported to Brigham and Women's Hospital, Lucero was nearly in a coma. Her life-support systems were removed Wednesday night.

Horry's status uncertain for playoff opener

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. — Robert Horry's status for the Los Angeles Lakers' playoff opener against Portland was uncertain Thursday following the discovery of a hematoma — a pooling of blood — under his abdominal muscle.

The Lakers said recommended treatment consists of rest, medication, and therapeutic exercises.

The teams will begin their best-of-five series April 21 at Staples Center.

Horry left Wednesday night's regular-season finale after playing three minutes because of what was called a strained stomach muscle.

He was examined Thursday by team

doctors and underwent an MRI examination that showed the abdominal muscle itself is normal.

Horry averaged 6.8 points, 5.9 rebounds, and 2.9 assists in 81 games this season — mostly as a reserve.

The 31-year-old Horry has played on four championship teams, two with the Lakers and two with Houston.

"And I believe that's the message that we send to the fans, as well. We are committed to winning, regardless of the economic circumstance that's out there."


