## I.C. police have high hopes for alert plan

Iowa City police hope a new program will more effectively warn local residents about crime in their neighborhoods by sending alerts through e-mail.

The program will eventually divide Iowa City into 165 neighborhood-watch groups that will each cover three to four blocks. Volunteers at the Police Department will collect the e-mail addresses of all residents in those areas.

Mass e-mails will warn specific neighborhoods of crimes in the area. Sometimes, posting news releases on the city's Web site and sending them to local media outlets are not beneficial because the information doesn't target specific audiences, police officials said.

The police are dubbing the initiative the Homeland Security program, although officers say it has nothing to do with thwarting terrorism. Rather, the goal is to increase contacts between local residents and the police while renewing communication within existing neighborhood-watch groups.

"We want to establish a network between the Police Department and individual neighborhoods," said police Sgt. Mike Brotherton. "It's a way for people to not have to solely rely on newspapers and television."

## Pipe rupture kills 2

### Hydrogen sulfide gas apparently causes deaths at D.M. construction site

DES MOINES — A sewer pipe ruptured Monday at a construction site, killing two workers who were overcome by gas and injuring 10 others, fire officials said.

Fire officials said hydrogen sulfide gas apparently cut off oxygen to the workers.

"It appears that the two workers had been working in an area of the sewer line that had water in its base," Assistant Chief James Mason said. "This water had been stirred, which emitted hydrogen sulfide gas."

Hydrogen sulfide is a naturally occurring gas that is produced by the decomposition of organic materials such as sewage, he said.

"Hydrogen sulfide gas is heavier than air and displaces oxygen from the air," Mason said. "These workers were likely not overcome by the gas; however, a lack of oxygen caused them to go unconscious. Both victims were found lying in the water at the bottom of the pit."

Fire officials said five additional employees attempted to rescue their downed co-workers and were overcome.

Firefighters were able to rescue the five employees who attempted to

help their fellow co-workers. They were taken to area hospitals where their conditions were unknown Monday night.

During what weather forecasters described as the hottest day of the year, with a heat index of 104 degrees, emergency crews swarmed the Nesbit Distributing Co., a beverage distributor, on the city's East Side.

Workers at the site were working on a city sewer line that runs between the distribution plant and a railroad line.

Emergency responders descended the 15-foot ladder into the dark sewer pipe to find the dead and the injured. Five firefighters, who officials say were wearing response gear, became overcome by the heat and the chemical during the rescue and were taken to area hospitals.

Four of those firefighters were evaluated for exposure and were treated and released. The fifth firefighter was being treated for a heat-related injury.

HazMat teams and emergency responders roped off the area at least 200 feet from the entrance to the sewer pipe and pumped oxygen into the tunnel.

"This is a heavy gas that hangs in the air — it doesn't dissipate," said David Keenan, the Emergency Man-

agement Service district chief. "It dissolves the oxygen."

Authorities don't believe the gas will pose a threat to the public, said Linda Frangenberg, a spokeswoman for the Des Moines Fire Department.

Approximately two hours after firefighters were called at 2:15 p.m., HazMat teams had secured the area.

Acting Fire Chief Doug Rubin said the smell was "very pungent" close to the hole.

"It was basically just dark and water and ... the smell of gas on the scene," he said.

"When they went down in the hole, they go down with hardhats and lights, not necessarily any breathing equipment," Rubin said of the workers. "This is something they do all the time. This is obviously an oddity, what happened today."

The crew had used air-monitoring equipment to test the atmosphere before entering the tunnel, he said, but the environment changed.

He said the workers climbed down a ladder to get on a platform, where they were overcome by the fumes and a few fell into the sewer water.

City officials said the workers were employed by St. Louis-based



## Mum's the word for ex-WorldCom execs

WASHINGTON — Two top former WorldCom Inc. executives refused to testify before Congress Monday about the company's \$3.9 billion accounting scandal, infuriating several panel members, who derided a culture of financial gamesmanship that continues to roil the nation's markets, hurt employees, and erode trust in corporate America's books. (President Bush angrily defends his corporate practices. See story, page 3.)

Bernard Ebbers, the founder and former chief executive of the long-distance and data-services giant, and Scott Sullivan, its recently fired chief financial officer, both invoked their constitutional right against self-incrimination before the House Financial Services Committee.

Other witnesses, including the company's current chief executive, its chairman, a former audit manager for Arthur Andersen LLP who supervised the former WorldCom account, and a top Wall Street telecom-

munications-investment analyst answered questions but shed little light on who is responsible for the impropriety.

But committee members succeeded in putting on a dramatic display of the cozy relationships among companies, their investment bankers, and auditors that marked the investment bubble of the mid- to late-1990s. The relationships are now the focus of congressional-reform efforts in the wake of scandals at Enron Corp., Tyco International Ltd., and several other companies.

Committee members expressed outrage at comments by investment analyst Jack Grubman of Salomon Smith Barney Inc., who testified he felt comfortable dispensing investment advice despite a close relationship with WorldCom that included socializing with Ebbers and attending three closed meetings of the company's board of directors. They seemed dubious of assertions by Melvin Dick, a former manager for Arthur Andersen, which approved WorldCom's books, that auditors must depend on the numbers provided by com-

panies they audit. They were angered when Ebbers, in invoking the Fifth Amendment, added several statements denying complicity in the scandal. Several members argued that in so doing Ebbers waived his right against self-incrimination and should be

held in contempt of Congress. Committee Chairman Michael Oxley, R-Ohio, with support from ranking Democrats, delayed putting the issue to a vote pending advice from the committee's legal staff.

## UIHC turns to Web to improve service

In an effort to improve the quality of patient care and resource management, doctors at UI Hospitals and Clinics have begun using a new Web-based technology they say will transform modern medicine.

The computer program, known as Zynx, uses a database list of clinical guidelines for treating patients with frequently occurring medical ailments, such as lower back pain and heart attacks. Physicians and hospital staff can see up-to-the-minute information about medical problems patients may experience.

The electronic tool will reduce the number of medical errors made when diagnosing ailments, doctors said.

"We are always looking for ways to improve our [medical] process," said Michael Kienzle, the UIHC chief technology officer. "It is our hope that this will be a widely used tool that everybody from medical students to senior managers can use."

Through a series of links, health officials are able to specifically identify the best possible treatment plan for patients who share similar disorders by plugging the ailment's general data into the program. Zynx then generates several resources and studies associated with the illness while outlining a full patient-care plan on how to best remedy the affliction. These modules include forecasting how an infirmity will develop, patient safety, and pain control.

Kienzle, the first to suggest UIHC use the program, said he learned of the technology while attending a medical conference a few months ago. Other hospitals and medical centers using Zynx have increased their ability to pinpoint an illness. For example, doctors diagnosing back pains could use the program to determine how best to treat patients.

# Alternative-school plans up in air

With less than a month to go, Iowa City School Board members have yet to determine where they should put a proposed new alternative high school.

Several board members and Coralville city officials don't agree on a location, and they must decide by the end of July so that a bond referendum steering committee can start seeking support for the project.

The three front-running locations under consideration include the current alternative high school at 509 S. Dubuque St., a proposed Coralville site located on the northwest corner of 12th Avenue and Fifth Street, and an older building in down-

town Iowa City, whose exact location has not been disclosed.

The downtown location, the most recent proposal, threatens to nullify plans the School District and Coralville had to build a joint facility in Coralville. And with the \$38.7 million bond referendum coming up for vote Dec. 10, time is running short to determine a site and set the project in motion, said School Board member Matt Goodlaxson.

Board President Lauren Reece said she approves of the downtown site because owning the building and the land would bring autonomy to the decision-making process.

On the other hand, board member Dale Shultz said, he would like to take a closer look at renovating the existing location. In addition to the current

alternative school, the building houses the district's administrative offices. The offices would have to move if the school were expanded.

Goodlaxson believes putting more money into the existing location would be a waste.

"I think it's kind of silly to renovate the current location and spend even more money to move the offices out of there," he said.

The Coralville site offers a number of advantages, including location and added capacity. The current alternative school has 64 students; the new one could hold 250.

Some Coralville officials are against the joint project because the land could be used for other purposes. A new library taking up part of the

plot has been featured in preliminary discussions.

"I am against the partnership and believe that Coralville should retain ownership and development rights to the land," said Coralville City Councilor Tom Gill, adding there are "too many uncertainties at this point, and it's shortsighted to jump into partnerships before Coralville's own needs are met."

In its plans for the jointly operated school, the School District would construct and own the building, while Coralville would own the land.

"Basically, Coralville doesn't have the money to build its own building," Goodlaxson said. "Not owning the land would be a big drawback for us."

# State will not push sales-tax holiday

DES MOINES — The Iowa Department of Revenue and Finance said budget cuts means it will rely on local businesses and groups to advertise this year's sales-tax holiday.

Last year, the department sent out a notification to retailers who were likely to be affected by the holiday.

But this year, it won't notify retailers directly. The department is contacting chambers of commerce, the Iowa Retail Federation, and other organizations to ask for assistance,

said Renee Mulvey of the revenue department.

This will be the third year for the two-day sales-tax holiday on clothing and footwear. It's scheduled for Aug. 2-3.

In 2000, shoppers saved approximately \$1.6 million in state and local-option sales taxes on items less than \$100. The department didn't estimate taxpayer savings from the 2001 holiday, Mulvey said.

Dennis Lauver, the president of the Clinton Area Chamber of Commerce, was surprised to hear the revenue

agency wouldn't alert retailers about the holiday.

"In light of this, we'll certainly have to do our job, and communicate with the retail community, and let them know what's going on."

Lauver also said that several retailers in Clinton are aware of the holiday and that, in the past, area businesses have responded positively to it.

"Most folks the last couple of years felt like they received good traffic coming in from the event and that it has drawn people in from Illinois," he said. "And they've

# Vilsack, Gross quarrel over services

DES MOINES — Gov. Tom Vilsack and Republican challenger Doug Gross were squabbling again Monday, this time over how much to spend on private social-service agencies that contract with the state.

Gross launched the exchange when he charged that Vilsack had allowed the state to begin a new budget year last week without having in place contracts with those agencies specifying how much they'll be paid.

"There is no excuse for the delay in executing these contracts," said Gross, who warned that the agencies could face cash-flow problems and paychecks could be delayed.

Many of the agencies con-

tract with the giant Department of Human Services to provide a broad array for services, ranging from nutritional programs for the elderly to counseling youngsters. Many also provide group foster care and community-based services for troubled youngsters.

"Once again, we've got another example of how when Doug Gross stumbles across the truth, it's purely accidental," said Vilsack campaign spokesman Joe Householder. "He's misrepresenting the facts and telling half-truths at best."

Householder said a new state budget wasn't approved until June, and it featured spending cuts for social programs far deeper than Vilsack supported.

The governor has been scrambling to fit the pieces of

the budget puzzle together in just a few weeks, Householder said.

"There will be no disruption in funding for these agencies," he said. "There will be no disruption in services provided by those agencies."

But Gross said the issue underscores yet another failing by a state agency that's been under fire virtually from the time Vilsack took office, including allegations that it bungled the case of 2-year-old Shelby Duis, a Spirit Lake toddler who was beaten to death in January 2000.

"Iowans have grown weary of this department's failure to meet its obligations," Gross said. "It's not for lack of trying on the frontline."

Householder said the biggest hurdle to providing needed

services was the Republican majority in the Legislature.

"If Doug Gross has any criticism of that, he should level it at his Republican allies in the Legislature," Householder said. "They talk a good game, but they continue to put special interests ahead of the interests of the most vulnerable Iowans."

Polls have shown the governor's race competitive.

The two were attacking each other even before the June 4 primary.

Gross has accused Vilsack of mismanaging state government, aggravating budget problems caused by the weak economy. Vilsack has accused Gross, the managing partner of a large law and lobbying firm, of being a pawn of wealthy special interests.

### Cops in Shops program completed

A program in which Iowa City police officers posed as store clerks in various local businesses to enforce underage tobacco purchases has ended.

The police officers, in conjunction with the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division, sent officers into three Kum & Go stores, 323 E. Burlington, 955 Mormon Trek Blvd., and 513 S. Riverside Drive, in addition to the Tobacco Outlet, 923 S. Riverside Drive, during "strategic business hours." Police would not disclose on which day they had conducted the operation.

The initiative's focus was to enforce laws against the purchase of tobacco products by minors. There were no violations, charges, or arrests noted during the entire 16-hour operation.

### North Corridor gets panel's attention

Members of the Johnson County Planning and Zoning Commission mulled over the progress of the North Corridor Plan Monday during an hour-long work session attended by few people.

A recent proposal by R.J. Moore, the county's assistant planning and zoning administrator, would reduce the corridor's eastern boundary by drawing a line north of Iowa City and northwest of Solon, diminishing the area by 25 percent.

The proposal would allow the county to reject landowners outside the zone seeking to develop farm land for commercial, residential, or other uses.

The North Corridor is defined as the Big Grove, Jefferson, Newport, and Penn townships. It was singled out in 1979 as needing a specialized

set of zoning policies because of rapid population growth, the presence of large recreational areas, and its location between the metropolitan areas of Cedar Rapids and Iowa City.

The commission has yet to decide on a plan to reduce the area; it voted to further discuss the plan at a session in August.

### Two men arrested on burglary charges

Two Iowa City men were arrested Monday and charged with second-degree theft and possession of burglars' tools after they allegedly tried to break into a car.

Police allege that they saw Neil Paul Kollasch, 20, 110 Hampton Court, and Shaun Robert Sweeting, 19, 1102 Village Farm Court, break-

ing into a parked vehicle at 4:41 a.m. Sunday near the Glendale Court area. Both men had flashlights, and police allegedly found tools and rubber gloves inside the vehicle.

Police confronted and then arrested the men, whom a resident had allegedly seen earlier that night looking into vehicles. The officers found stereo equipment and compact discs that were later reported stolen from a vehicle parked in the 600 block of Sandusky Street. Sweeting was also charged with possession of marijuana.

Possession of burglars' tools is an aggravated misdemeanor, and possession of stolen property is a Class D felony punishable by a maximum of five years in prison and/or a fine of at least \$500 but no more than \$7,500.



# Accounting not black and white, Bush says

WASHINGTON — President Bush said Monday that he is worried that corporate scandals could cause the country to lose confidence in the free-enterprise system, and he vigorously defended his actions as president and his ethics as an oil executive.

Bush said he and his advisers are working with alacrity to restore market "confidence" — mentioning the word nine times in his 36-minute appearance. On the eve of his speech today on Wall Street detailing further remedies to corporate accounting scandals, Bush suggested that Democrats in the Senate were raising questions about his corporate past to "divert attention" from their inaction on the subject of corporate governance.

Facing repeated questions about his role as a director of Texas-based Harken Energy Corp. a decade ago, at a time when the company faced an inquiry by the Securities and Exchange Commission, Bush argued that the matter was an "honest disagreement about accounting procedures" rather than corporate wrongdoing.

"All I can tell you is that in the corporate world, sometimes things aren't exactly black and white when it comes to accounting procedures," Bush said in defending Harken. The company announced larger losses after the SEC determined it had counted future income prematurely; Harken had sold a subsidiary, Aloha Petroleum, in 1989 through a seller-financed loan that it declared as a cash gain, masking huge losses.

Bush, who appeared irritated by the questioning, glared at reporters in the White House

briefing room when he heard titters after that answer. "There was an honest difference of opinion as to how to account for a complicated transaction," he said. "And you're going to find that in different corporations. Sometimes the rules aren't as specific as — as one would expect, and therefore the accountants and the auditors make a decision."

Bush said some of the corporations suspected of wrongdoing could be merely victims of honest disagreements. "It could be," he said. "It's not my role to judge or the Congress' role to judge. It is the SEC's role to judge." He said prosecutors and a "strong SEC" would be able to draw the distinction between fraud and "just a difference of opinion."

Democrats in Congress, including Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, S.D., have called for the release of records of the SEC's 1992 investigation of Bush's trading in Harken shares. In addition to the Aloha investigation, the SEC probed Bush for insider trading when he sold shares in Harken before the company reported large losses. The SEC concluded he did not have access to the inside information. The president said the revival of questions about Harken is "old-style politics" and argued: "There's no there there."

Asked whether he would authorize the release of the full SEC report into his trading, Bush replied: "You've seen the relevant documents." The president, who disclosed the transaction to the SEC 32 weeks late, did not resolve the question of why he said during his Texas campaign that the agency had lost the form, while the White House last week said it was a mix-up involving his lawyers. "I still haven't figured it out completely," he said.

Following the close of another day of heavy trading losses in

stock markets, Bush amplified his concern about investor confidence. "I'm very worried about a country that has — could conceivably lose confidence in the free enterprise system," he said. Later, he added: "I also understand how tender the free-enterprise system can be. If people lose confidence in the system, it'd be hard to attract capital into markets, and that's one reason I've reacted so steadily against what I have seen."

Bush credited Harvey Pitt, his embattled SEC chairman, for being "fast to act" to address the corporate scandals. Some conservative editorialists and GOP Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., have joined many Democrats in calling for Pitt's resignation. "I support Harvey Pitt," Bush said. Noting that he has only been on the job a year, Bush later added: "I'm going to give him a chance to continue to perform."

In advance of today's speech on corporate governance, the president listed several of the specifics of his proposal, including what he called "a stronger SEC, more investigators, and more budget." He promised to propose "tough new laws and actions to punish abuses, restore investor confidence, and protect the pensions of American workers." Aides said Bush will propose criminal sanctions, including prison time, for corporate executives and directors who sign intentionally misleading or fraudulent financial statements.

"We have a duty to every worker, shareholder, and investor in America to punish the guilty, to close loopholes and protect employee pensions, and we will," he said. "We'll vigorously pursue people who break the law ... I think that'll help restore confidence to the American people."

## Billion in damages for Texas

SAN ANTONIO — With flood warnings out and more rain looming, Gov. Rick Perry said Monday that he expected losses from the deadly flooding across Texas to be near \$1 billion.

"Once all these floodwaters recede, we'll see the impact," he said after touring a flood-damaged home in downtown San Antonio. "It's going to be substantial. This is another major, major blow to the state of Texas."

More than 30 inches of rain have fallen in the past week, sending streams and rivers pouring out of their banks from the Hill Country surrounding San Antonio to rural west Texas, more than 150 miles away.

Homes have been ripped off their foundations by the dirty brown water, and floodwaters have surged toward communities between here and the Gulf of Mexico.

The death toll Monday reached nine, and at least one

other person was missing. The American Red Cross said some 48,000 houses have been affected in the San Antonio and Abilene regions alone.

Meanwhile, forecasters said a storm gathering in the Gulf could dump heavy rain on central and southern parts of the state already overwhelmed by too much water.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency declared 11 more counties disaster areas Monday, adding them to the list of 13 in which residents and businesses can qualify for federal aid. FEMA said six counties were still under consideration.

Earlier Monday, the governor walked through the home of Roman and Hilda Mendoza, who were flooded out last week when rain and runoff pushed Woodlawn Lake in San Antonio over its shores and into their neighborhood. More than 100 houses were damaged in the area.

As workmen labored on the cleanup, Perry felt for moisture on the Mendozas' plaster-board walls and commiserated

with them about the water-induced buckling in their hardwood floors.

Roman Mendoza said he didn't know why his house was selected, but he was happy to show the governor what happened.

"It brings a little scope on how it hurt not only us but how the rest of our neighbors were affected," he said.

While San Antonio and points north cleaned up, the flooding continued along the coastal plain leading to the Gulf. Flood warnings were in effect in 15 counties.

### Dangers for teens on the job

About 4 million 15- to 17-year-olds work during the summer. In 2000, 73 workers were killed on the job. More than 200,000 are injured every year.



## Workplace can be dangerous for teens

WASHINGTON — Brad Hurtig's first day on the job was his last.

A few hours into the night shift at an Ohio metal-stamping company last month, the 17-year-old football star got his hands caught in a power press and both had to be amputated. He was one of more than 500 teenagers who are injured at work every day on average.

The Labor Department says about 4 million 15- to 17-year-olds earn paychecks during summer vacation. Eight in 10 teens will work at some point during high school.

Some employers don't do all they could to keep teens safe. And many young people are unprepared, too focused on getting paid to grasp that they could be hurt or killed.

"We're finding that they're not entering the workplace with an understanding of the law that's there to protect them," said Darlene Adkins, who runs the National Consumers League's Child Labor Coalition.

At a fast-food restaurant near Youngstown, Ohio, a teen was burned after the boss insisted he dump the contents of a deep fryer into a plastic bucket, a state official said. The bucket melted, releasing hot grease that melted the boy's shoes and caused him to fall into it.

Judy Elliott, who runs the New Hampshire Coalition for Occupational Safety and Health, said many teens are too inexperienced or poorly trained to recognize dangers in such places as restaurant kitchens where doing multiple tasks is common.

# Bush, Cheney wrong men to lead U.S. corporate reform

Today, President Bush will address business leaders on Wall Street. From WorldCom to Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia, corporations and their scandals have shaken consumer confidence recently, and the stock market has suffered as a result. In his speech, the president will praise corporate responsibility and excoriate business executives who misreport earnings and mislead investors. What Bush will not mention, however, are the allegations of business-related misconduct that he and Vice President Cheney face.

Anyone who has been watching the news is probably familiar with the charges against WorldCom. Basically, WorldCom took corporate expenses and said they were "capital investments." Using this technique, WorldCom was able to make its short-term losses look much smaller than they actually were.

The accusations against WorldCom parallel those leveled at Halliburton, an oil-services company of which Cheney was CEO from 1995-00. Halliburton is currently under SEC investigation for implementing ques-

tionable accounting practices during Cheney's tenure. So far, the White House has kept quiet about Halliburton. Many people already think of the vice president as a corporate insider, and any discussion of wrongdoing at Halliburton under Cheney's watch will likely hurt his image.

Martha Stewart, who has been a popular news item lately, is suspected of insider trading. The allegations are that Stewart sold approximately \$225,000 of ImClone stock at the behest of her friend Sam Waskal, who happened to be the CEO of ImClone. Stewart claims that she had a pre-arranged agreement with her broker to sell the stock, but neither party retained any record of such an agreement.

Stewart has a kindred spirit in Bush, who has faced accusations of insider trading since his 1994 race for Texas governor. Bush, who failed to disclose the sale, in the timely manner required by law, of approximately \$850,000 worth of stock in his company, Harken Energy, in 1990, has since given varying explanations for his error.

In 1994, Bush said that he had, in fact, filed the appropriate

disclosure form, but SEC had misplaced it. Last week, however, White House spokesman Ari Fleischer said that Bush thought that his attorneys had filed the form, and Bush's attorneys thought that he had filed the form. It turned out that no one had actually filed the form, and no one bothered to check until nine months later.

While Cheney's role in the allegedly illicit activities at Halliburton has yet to be established, it seems that Bush, Stewart, and WorldCom are all either guilty of the actions of a financial criminal or an idiot. Major paperwork mistakes? Basic accounting blunders? It's no wonder that consumer confidence is low and investors are worried about the United States — American business is clearly suffering from a lack of intelligence as well as a lack of ethics.

In order to help the economy, we need to make business in America smarter and more honest. Unfortunately, Bush and Cheney might not be capable of leading the charge.



# Corruption? We ain't got no stinking corruption

King George, our fearless leader, respected all around the globe for his ability to nickname Russian President Vladimir Putin "Pootie-Poot," is all set to deliver a major speech on corporate corruption. Apparently, it's come to the attention of the White House that there's been a bit of that going around.

So let's see. On the surface, it sounds like insider trading and corporate welfare. Sounds like King George is exactly the man to give a major speech on corporate corruption.

## Return of the men in dull gray

## Awash in the history of TV

The labeling of a movie as a "summer movie" has absolutely nothing to do with its release date in the calendar year and everything to do with its possession of four very basic elements: action, humor, star power, and heart.

These "popcorn flicks" all follow similar formulas and allow movie audiences an escape from the lazy and humid summer days. What differentiates the good summer film from the bad is the movie's ability to bring freshness to the formulaic plot. A good summer movie allows audiences to forget where they are, if only for two hours, and once again fall in love with the movies. 1997's *Men in Black* was just this kind of movie; 2002's *Men in Black II* is definitely not.

It wasn't as if Columbia Pictures didn't try to harness the same comet that propelled *Men in Black* to take in more than \$250 million domestically. Will Smith, Tommy Lee Jones, and director Barry Sonnenfeld are all "back in black." Add to the mix the beautiful Lara Flynn Boyle, the wacky Johnny Knoxville, and even (gasp) the king of pop, Michael Jackson, and this movie should be the one of the highest-grossing films of all time. But "should" is definitely a loaded word.

The movie begins in the late 1970s, when warring alien worlds have come to earth in order to fight over "the light of Xartha," which spells the doom for one of the two warring worlds. The MIB decide to remain neutral in the matter and (supposedly) send the light off Earth and into the galaxy.

Twenty-five years later, the

alien Sarleena returns to Earth, taking the form of a Victoria's Secret model (Flynn Boyle), and decrees that unless the MIB give her the light of Xartha, she will destroy the planet.

The only MIB agent who was on the "light of Xartha" case was Agent Kay (Jones), who had his memory erased at the end of the first film and for the past five years has been working as a postman in a small Massachusetts town. Agent Jay (Smith), now a very important player in the Men in Black institution, must track down Agent Kay, recover his memory, and save the planet once more.

But where the original film was filled with sharp comebacks, witty conversations, and special effects that boggled the mind,

nothing in the new *Men in Black* seems, well, new. The special effects are at times atrociously juvenile, the dialogue is embarrassingly contrite, and the jokes are obvious and humorless. Knoxville's two-headed alien character is so underdeveloped that one leaves the theater attempting to understand why he was in the movie at all.

He works as neither a henchman nor a comic sidekick, and he should have been left on the editing floor, where his acting prowess belongs.

The chemistry between Smith and Jones that made *Men in Black* a romping joy is still there, but as in many sequels, the script's budget was drastically cut in order to make way for the overblown special effects. The funniest part, and most interesting part, of the film has

to do with a locker full of creatures who believe Jones and Smith to be their deities. These Ewok-looking creatures give the movie its only semblance of a soul. These creatures are fresh and interesting (especially their list of commandments), and for brief moments one might believe that they are watching the original *Men in Black*.

*Men in Black II* works on absolutely no level. It is not a comedy or an action film, and it certainly does not deserve to be labeled a mere "summer movie." Although *Men in Black II* may do very well at the box office during its opening weekend, it will have no staying power at any megaplexes this summer. We can only hope that Columbia Pictures will shoot this hapless franchise in its tracks and bury it quickly before it contaminates any other wonderful "popcorn flick" from my youth.

## Both hilarious and informative

For me, an entertaining documentary film can be either informational or funny. It's rare to find one that is both. *Scratch* is that film.

Mining the fertile valley of hip-hop culture and music as a subject, director Doug Pray has created a film that gives a history lesson as well as belly laughs. For those who don't know much about scratching or big name DJs, like myself, it was exhilarating to be given a backstage pass into this

world. The term scratch refers to a style that used to keep one section of a song (a break) running continuously while other songs play simultaneously.

*Scratch* is by no means a mockumentary, although the filmmakers surely knew what they were including is quite humorous. I have read that the film has plenty of inside jokes for those familiar with the culture, but it was even hilarious for an outsider such as myself. In subtle ways, *Scratch* is even funnier than *This is Spinal Tap*. Rob Reiner's dead-on satire of early '80s rock 'n' roll, because it is not so over the top. The DJs, the language, the culture — they don't even need actors.

The white guys in this movie are undoubtedly the height of comic relief. One mixer is named Steinski, and really, his name says it all. Another DJ is called Cut Chemist, and there is a decent chance he and Mike

Schank (*American Movie*) were separated at birth. A third subject in the movie is someone named Naut Humon who doesn't appear to have any scratching skills at all but can wax poetic about how these DJs are from another planet.

How did all these white guys get into hip-hop? The seminal moment for several of the DJs was watching Grand Mixer DXT perform Herbie Hancock's "Rockit" during the 1984 Grammys. I remember watching that performance, but I was more into the breakdancing than the scratching. The old school DJs in the movie remember the original start of scratching — Afrika Bambaataa gathering several Bronx musicians in the '70s for dance parties.

Scratching is an equipment-intensive activity, and it reminded me of playing video games as a teenager, an allusion the movie nods to as well. Most DJs get into it in their teens (many are "retired" by their 20s); they sit in their rooms for hours practicing it.

If young filmmakers were thinking about making a documentary, they should definitely view Pray's work. This is actually Pray's second movie — he made a similar documentary about grunge music in 1995 called *Hype!* Part of the magic of these two movies must be credited to how ripe for ridicule the music industry has become. In *Scratch*, Pray has shown that you can treat your subject seriously, yet honestly, and come away with some laughs.

## A whale of a bad time

Three years after the release of the phenomenal album *Play*, Moby tries his best to recreate the magic in the eagerly anticipated *18*. Richard Melville Hall's great-granduncle was Herman Melville, the esteemed author of the high-seas tale *Moby Dick*. So proud was Richard Hall of his bloodline that he dubbed himself "Moby" as he gained fame in the East Coast club scene in the '80s.

In his decades spent dabbling with techno and electronic music, Moby has become the mixer of an array of curious concoctions, consisting of pounding techno beats, mystic ambient sounds, and scratchy gospel samples.

The 1999 release of *Play* first caught the mainstream's attention. *Play*'s first single, "Porcelain," received rave reviews, and the subsequent releases of "My Weakness" and especially his collaboration with Gwen Stefani on "South Side" elevated Moby to star status.

Airplay on MTV and clever marketing quickly whisked the struggling electronica artist from the placid, murky waters of underground anonymity into the tumultuously churning current of the mainstream. Prompted by *Play*'s overwhelming success, Moby later put out a B-side of the album, featuring songs that previously hadn't made the cut.

After two years of relentless touring, Moby has settled down in his posh Lower Manhattan studio/loft and cranked out another album to be dropped into the outstretched arms of the yearning masses. The album, consisting of 18 shiny new tracks, has appropriately been titled *18*.

Moby, apparently abiding by the "Don't fix it if it ain't broken" school of thought, has produced an album that bears a striking resemblance to *Play*. The same winning combination of electronica, ambient, and blues are still there, but this time around, Moby has

definitely overdone it. The techno beats sound stale, the ambient soundscapes seem forced, and the blues/gospel samples have gotten tediously tiresome. What's more, in some instances it seems that Moby has actually sampled himself. "In this World" contains a familiar-sounding female gospel singer crying over and over, "Lordy, don't leave me..." The song's ambient backdrop also rings a bell, and the listener is quickly reminded of *Play*'s moodier tracks, which feature the same tired gospel singer, carrying on in the same melodramatic tone.

Another disappointing aspect of *18* is Moby's personal essays, or lack thereof. In previous albums, Moby lined the inner cover sleeves with several passionate and convincing missives dedicated to veganism, Christianity, Marxism, and the like. However, this time, when Moby now has the undivided attention of millions of fans, he writes only about how much he loves *18* and about how we are slaves to subjectivity. Perhaps Moby should have considered the latter statement when personally assessing *18*.

Overall a large and cumbersome effort, the album is not unlike the thick, blubbery creature from which Moby took his name, *18*, like the whale, simply blows.

LOS ANGELES — James Comisar is whistling a happy tune as he scrounges through a rack of clothing. From the thousands of items in his TV memorabilia collection, Comisar plucks out the sheriff's costumes used in "The Andy Griffith Show" as he evokes a few bars of the show's theme song.

"I didn't realize I was whistling," Comisar says, lost in admiration of duds worn by Griffith and co-star Don Knotts. "I take great pride in knowing that these still exist, that Andy and Barney are back together, at least in this warehouse, and safe."

The secure, climate-controlled facility is crammed with TV nostalgia: Lt. Columbo's shabby overcoat, Capt. Stubing's "The Love Boat" uniform, Cher's gowns, the shoe phone used by bumbling agent Maxwell Smart ("Florsheim 9D, left, for you trivia pigs," offers Comisar), and the curtain from Johnny Carson's "Tonight" show set.

There are pieces as old as Buffalo Bob's outfit from "Howdy Doody," the children's show that debuted in 1947, and as new as the shirt James Gandolfini wears in the opening shots of "The Sopranos."

The warehouse represents just a slice of Comisar's goodies. Larger pieces, such as the spaceship from "Mork & Mindy," much of the set from "All in the Family" (the Smithsonian has Archie Bunker's

easy chair), and the rest of the old "Tonight" set, donated by Carson himself, are stored elsewhere.

"I have everything from 'The Honeymooners' to 'Green Acres' to 'Gomer Pyle' to whatever," Comisar said. "I'm not here to judge. If it was important programming, if it was laughed at, sneered at, it didn't matter to me."

A one-time comedy writer, Comisar's respect for television as a cultural institution led him to assemble what seems a shoe-in as the largest collection of privately held TV artifacts.

Plans are in the works to send 500 or so choice items on an extended tour of North American museums.

"This is a total calling," said Comisar, 37. "I was raised on TV. I grew up a fat kid, and there wasn't much Little League for me. I came home, grabbed the Pop-Tarts, and there I was, watching television."

His weight helped him develop a sense of humor "just to stay alive," says the now-trim Comisar, and he pursued a career as a writer for such comedians as Howie Mandel and Joan Rivers and for sitcoms and talk shows.

Strolling studio backlots for exercise, Comisar found himself drawn to the remnants of old shows that often ended up recycled for new productions or just carelessly stored.

He began buying costumes intended for rental. Classified ads were his next move, and Comisar began finding out how many sources existed for TV history.

Insituform Technologies Inc., a company specializing in the repair of city sewers.

Names of the victims were not immediately released. All of the Insituform employees were from the St. Louis area.

"This is a tragedy for all of us," said Tony Hooper, the board chairman, president, and chief executive of Insituform, based in the St. Louis suburb of Chesterfield. "We have to figure out what went wrong at the job site to make sure this doesn't happen again."

Bill Stowe, the city public-works manager, said the workers were placing a plastic resin into the sewer pipe. The resin solidifies and becomes a new pipe inside the old pipe.

The company, considered international experts in sewer and water line repair, has worked for the city for several years.

Warm temperatures can accelerate gas production, according to information from the National Ag Safety database. Undisturbed, the gas can accumulate.

Mary Bryant, the director of Iowa Occupational Safety and Health enforcement, said her agency will investigate.

The Rev. Randy Richmond, who acts as chaplain for the city's police and fire departments, said he counseled two family members of the injured and one co-worker at the scene Monday and described them as "very distraught and in shock."

He said he also expects residents of the designated areas to organize meetings, maintain better contact, and continue discussion about how to improve their neighborhoods.

"This program has a lot of potential," said Jose Hernandez, an Iowa City resident working closely with the police to launch the program. Hernandez was traveling in Kashmir for business on Sept. 11 and found himself unable to contact his friends and family — which, he said, prompted him to work for tighter security in Iowa City.

Volunteers will make calls, compile newsletters, and gather information to send out mass e-mails to the individual groups. Eight people have volunteered since Brotherton conceived the idea in February, and more are expected once the department begins to formally advertise, police said.

"The only thing stopping this from taking off faster is time and volunteers," Hernandez said. The force is still seeking help to fully implement the program in one year, he said.

Joan Cook, the director of Retired and Senior Volunteer

Program, said she applied for a grant to fund the police program but is still waiting to hear its about status. Several of the police volunteers came from her program.

Cook declined to disclose the dollar amount, but she said she expects a decision from the federal government within the next month.

The funds will cover the cost of T-shirts, which police hope to distribute to recognize participants, and other anticipated expenses, Brotherton said.

"We're trying to make a small community appear to be even smaller," he said.

Zynx provides more data and a wider range of information, from routine births to heart attacks, than many of its computer-based counterparts at UIHC. The technology also includes hospital-accreditation tests for staff, allowing officials to compare hospital compliance

tests with national regulations.

The new trend in health care is now "evidence-based medicine," Kienzle said, which gives access to the best solutions for treating maladies. It "concentrates on conditions that are most frequent and important in terms of having ways of making sure the quality is there" for patients, he said.

Hospital officials have not been able to determine how

much the program will cost to maintain because it is so new, but they contend that it has proven a valuable resource thus far.

The electronic tool was developed by faculty at Cedar Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles to address effective patient-care planning and boost quality control in the facility, Kienzle said.

## Merck to continue IPO despite murky revenue

Despite recent revelations that it recorded revenue it never collected, drug giant Merck & Co. will proceed this week with an initial public offering for its pharmacy benefits unit, sources said Monday.

The IPO for Medco Health Solutions Inc. may be priced as soon as today.

Merck recorded \$14.1 billion in never-received revenue from its Medco unit from 1999 through the first quarter of 2002, according to a filing it issued July 5 with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Already-skittish investors reacted harshly to the filing and a related front-page *Wall Street Journal* article Monday, sending Merck stock down more than 2 percent, or \$1.05, to \$47.81.

Despite that drop, stock analysts generally shrugged off the news, saying it did not amount to an accounting scandal or illegality requiring significant concern. Several called the public reports of Merck's actions part of a "witch-hunt."

"I think it's a little blown out of proportion," said Rita Freedman, a vice president of PNC Advisors in Philadelphia, which has Merck as one of its top-10 holdings. "It raises your eyebrows, but it doesn't mean you're ready to sell the stock."

Freedman said she would only be worried if she learned that any problematic accounting practices trickled into Merck's primary business.

Until February, Merck was audited by Arthur Andersen, Enron's accountant. It was replaced by PricewaterhouseCoopers.

Medco manages pharmacy benefit plans for employers and health insurers, and the revenue under scrutiny came from co-payments paid by consumers. Those co-payments go to the pharmacies — but Merck recorded the funds as Medco revenue.

Because the drugmaker also recorded the same amount of money in its costs, the accounting method did not affect Merck's earnings per share or net income.

# WorldCom execs refuse to testify

"I think the theme has become clear," Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., said outside the hearing room. "All the people who are supposed to be checking each other are in fact collaborating with each other."

Under questioning from Oxley, Grubman acknowledged that analysts attending company board meetings was a rare privilege. Indeed, such meetings provided Grubman with inside information he was legally barred from divulging, which put him in an awkward position of withholding information from investors until the company disclosed the information.

"I was there to provide market color," Grubman said of the board meetings, explaining the merely gave advice on how the markets might react upon learning of particular transactions that were being considered.

"Reaction you helped to shape," snapped Frank.

Grubman was an early and vocal cheerleader of WorldCom's stock as it grew from a tiny, Mississippi-based company into a global communications powerhouse by acquiring long-distance provider MCI Communications Corp. and several networking businesses.

Grubman's firm did much of the investment banking for such deals, collecting roughly \$80 million in fees from WorldCom between 1998 and 2001. During that period, he consistently recommended the stock, even as it began a steep decline from a high of \$65 a share in late 1999. It closed Monday at 23 cents a share, costing investors, pension funds, and debt holders millions.

Other questions focused on whether Salomon Smith Barney gave WorldCom executives early shares in initial public offerings of other firms, a perk that made millionaires out of many technology executives and money managers during the boom. Grubman said he did not know.

"I am saddened that people lost money," he told the committee in an opening statement. "I am saddened that people lost jobs ... In hindsight, I regret that I was wrong in rating WorldCom highly for too long."

Grubman said he began downgrading WorldCom in April 2001 and that many investment banks maintained equally high ratings on the stock.

He heatedly denied that he had any advance warning of WorldCom's June 25 announcement that it would have to restate earnings. He downgraded the stock on June 21.

E-mails released by the committee show a Salomon bond analyst, Robert Waldman, tried to contact Sullivan on the morn-

ing of June 24 because there were rumors of a major accounting problem. Nonetheless, Waldman issued a report to bondholders that day telling them that they should not be concerned by Grubman's downgrade of the stock three days earlier.

# Russian pilot ignored alert

A Russian airline pilot flying high over Germany last week got just a few seconds to make a life-or-death decision: Follow instructions from his on-board collision-avoidance system to climb away from an approaching plane or follow a Swiss air-traffic controller's instructions to descend.

Information released Monday by the German aviation investigation agency BFU indicates he made the wrong choice, taking his Bashkirian Airlines Tu-154 jet down into a collision with a DHL Boeing 757 cargo plane. Seventy-one people were killed in the July 1 accident, 45 of them children headed for a beach vacation in Spain.

Under international safety standards, pilots are supposed to obey the on-board system's instructions, even in the face of contradictory instructions from a controller on the ground, aviation experts said Monday. The system can be ignored only in

extreme circumstances, such as the pilot being able to see that obeying it will lead to a collision.

Monday's German statement indicates that the Traffic Alert and Collision Avoidance System on both planes operated exactly as intended, but only the DHL pilot followed its instructions. The system told the DHL crew to descend, which they did, while it told the Russian crew to climb, which would have moved the two planes safely apart.

In U.S. aviation jargon, what happened to the Russian plane is called a "TCAS fakeout" — a controller's instruction fakes the pilot into doing something wrong. A fakeout was recognized early in the development of collision-avoidance technology as a horrendous possibility, but no technological way has been found to prevent it.

Instead, the aviation industry has relied on a human fix, training pilots that a system warning, deemed more accurate than a human warning, almost always takes precedence over

an instruction from a controller on the ground. It is one of the few times that a pilot can legitimately disobey a controller's navigation instruction.

The International Civil Aviation Organization, of which the United States and Russia are both members, has issued advisories saying that the collision-avoidance system takes precedence over controller instructions. The U.S. Federal Aviation Administration has issued similar advisories and has made it clear that no action would be taken against a pilot for disobeying a controller's instruction in favor of the system.

The organizations say that controllers should be informed of any collision-avoidance deviation "as soon as practicable."

"This is a very fundamental issue about shared control," said Anthony Broderick, who was FAA associate administrator for regulation and certification when the issue was being considered in the 1990s.

# Wife: LAX shooter 'innocent'

CAIRO, Egypt — The wife of an Egyptian who gunned down two people at the Los Angeles airport said Monday that her husband is innocent and that he gave no hint of violence in a phone call hours before the shooting.

"My husband didn't do such a thing. This is nonsense," 41-year-old Hala Mohammed Sadeq El-Awadly told the Associated Press on Monday in Cairo.

"Hesham called on July 4; it was his birthday. His voice was very beautiful," she said. "He asked about the boys, asked me to take them out a lot and to review their lessons with them in order to be ready for next year."

According to the FBI, Hesham Mohamed Hadayet went to the airport ticket counter of El Al, Israel's national airline carrying two handguns and a hunting knife and opened fire. He killed two people and wounded three before he was killed by an El Al security guard.

El-Awadly said she did not believe her husband was responsible for the July 4 shooting. She offered no explanation for how he could be innocent when so many people saw him open fire but said he was being blamed because he was Arab and Muslim.

"He is a victim of injustice,"

she said three times. "In America, they hate Islam and Arabs after Sept. 11."

El-Awadly said she can't wear black, mourn, or cry because she had not yet told her sons — Omar 12, and Adam, 7 — any of what had happened. She said she was thankful that their Arabic was so poor they could not understand media reports or the conversations of the adults around them — though the older boy has been asking why his father's name keeps coming up.

Hadayet's motive remains unknown. The FBI said it could not rule out terrorism, but it was also investigating the possibility it was a hate crime. Authorities also were investigating whether Hadayet was dependent over his personal or business affairs.

His wife said he was not a violent man and had never expressed anger at Israel or at the recent Israeli-Palestinian violence that has sparked anti-Israeli protests across the Arab world.

"No, this wasn't an issue," El-Awadly said without elaborating.

Hadayet, 41, emigrated to California from Egypt 10 years ago with his family. His wife said the family had been happy in the United States, had good relations with their American neighbors, and planned to settle there permanently. But she said the atmosphere had been

tense since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, which were carried by 19 Arabs.

"We became very cautious, and sometimes scared. Every Muslim became a suspect," El-Awadly said.

A spokesman for the U.S. immigration service had said July 6 that Hadayet's first petition for permanent residency, in 1996, had been denied for reasons that were unclear. The INS began deportation procedures, but in 1997 Hadayet was granted permanent residency through his wife, who received an immigration visa through the Department of States' Diversity Lottery Program.

El-Awadly said she, Omar, and Adam came to Cairo on June 15 to be near her mother, who was to have an open-heart operation. Her husband, who owned a limousine business, had not planned to join them because of his work.

El-Awadly and her sons have reservations to fly back to California on Aug. 20 and an appointment later that month to be interviewed by immigration authorities considering their citizenship request.

"I don't know now whether I am going back or not. Our lives are upside down," El-Awadly said.

For days, she has spent hours being questioned by Egyptian government security agents and expected "more days of interrogation to come."

# Pakistan nabs 3 in bombing

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Pakistani authorities Monday announced the arrest of three members of a banned Pakistani militant group for setting off a car bomb outside the U.S. Consulate in Karachi last month.

The authorities said they had also seized large quantities of explosives and weapons, which were displayed at a news conference in Karachi Monday evening along with two of the accused men, who publicly admitted their guilt. Pakistani officials offered few details about the evidence implicating the three suspects, and U.S. officials said Monday night that they had not received any briefings on the arrests.

There has been so little sharing of information, in fact, that the consulate's security officer, Randall Bennett, attended the news conference so he could join reporters in asking questions of Maj. Gen. Salahuddin Satti, the director-general of the Pakistan Army Rangers, the paramilitary force investigating the bombing.

Previously, Pakistani officials had said that Al Qaeda had a hand in the attempted bombing of the consulate, which killed at least 12 people and injured 50 on June 14. At the news conference, however, they offered no

evidence of Al Qaeda's involvement, and U.S. officials said they have not reached any conclusions on the matter.

Satti expressed confidence that the three men were behind the car bombing as well as attacks on other Western targets such as fast-food outlets. "We were able to nab three main culprits," he told reporters.

Satti identified the men as members of the Harkat-ul-Mujahideen al-Almi organization, which has links to Islamic militants fighting to end Indian rule in Kashmir as well as

to Afghanistan's Taliban.

The two suspects who appeared at the news conference matter-of-factly admitted their involvement and said the car bomb used outside the consulate last month had originally been prepared for Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf.

The men — identified as Mohammed Imran, the group's head, and Mohammed Hanif, its deputy — said they tried to detonate the bomb near Musharraf's motorcade in Karachi in April, but the remote control malfunctioned.

# Iran busts dancer for corruption

TEHRAN, Iran — Ruling that teaching traditional Iranian dance corrupts the nation's youth, a court banned an Iranian-American dancer from leaving Iran for 10 years and from giving dance classes for life, his lawyer said Monday.

Mohammad Khordadian, Iran's best-known male dancer, was also given a 10-year suspended jail term for promoting moral corruption by holding dance classes in the United States, according to the ruling, handed down Sunday. It also barred him from attending public celebrations or weddings of people who are not his relatives for three years, lawyer Abdolrahman Rasouli said.

"Khordadian is innocent. He has done nothing wrong to deserve punishment," Rasouli told the Associated Press.

Khordadian, 46, could not be reached for comment. During his trial, he told the court he never intended to corrupt anyone.

The dancer was jailed in May as he was making his first visit to Iran in 20 years.

He was released from Tehran's Evin prison on Sunday. The 10-year suspended jail term will be implemented if he is convicted again on the same charge.

Rasouli said the dancer will appeal the verdict.

"Khordadian's release from jail is an important step forward. He loves to live in Iran, but it would have been great if

he had been allowed to sell his house in the States first," Rasouli said.

The lawyer quoted Khordadian as testifying, "Dancing is my job, and I had no intention of promoting corruption among the youth."

Khordadian was a taxi driver in Tehran before he left in 1980. His graceful body movements and aptitude for dance encouraged him to pursue dance as a career.

He is best known for a belly dance called "Arabic Dance." In it, Khordadian wears traditional clothes and takes the stage with one group of women dancers on his right and another group on his left.

Men and women dancing together in public is not permitted under Iran's strict interpretation of Islamic behavior.

Khordadian's dance programs are widely watched by Iranian expatriates and many inside Iran on Los Angeles-based, Persian-language satellite TV channels.

A Web site promoting his

classes in the United States is now dedicated to helping him overturn the ruling.

Rasouli said the court's ban on Khordadian's leaving Iran was intended to "keep him away from an atmosphere that may provoke him to repeat his offenses."

Khordadian was traveling on an American passport and obtained his visa in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, before traveling to Iran to visit his ailing father and relatives, Rasouli said.

The ruling coincides with a new crackdown on what Iranian officials call "acts of social immorality." Young Iranians driving around with music blaring out of their car radios have been charged under the social-immorality rules.

The reformists have protested that "acts of social immorality" have not been clearly defined.

"Social virtues and discipline will never be established by the use of police force," the reform newspaper *Aftab-e-Yazd* wrote last week.





uncertain position, it was wise to "prepare for the worst."  
 "From the players' standpoint, a strike is a last resort," union head Donald Fehr said. "It would not be entered into unless the players feel they had no other viable option, and it is our hope over the next few weeks we will be able to have the kinds of serious and substantive discussions with major-league owners we have heretofore been unable to have and will resolve these issues."

Talks are scheduled to resume Thursday in New York. Boston shortstop Nomar Garciaparra was one of the few to bring up Williams, the Hall of Famer who died July 5.

"I lost a friend," he said. "I feel a part of him every time I step on the field."

Baseball will pay tribute to Williams tonight. The All-Star MVP award will be named in his honor, and there will be a pregame ceremony in which his son, John Henry, and one of his daughters are expected to be on the field.

There also will be remembrances for St. Louis pitcher Darryl Kile and Cardinals broadcaster Jack Buck.

Pitcher Matt Morris, the only

St. Louis player picked for this All-Star game, backed out during the weekend. He's struggled mentally and physically since Kile's death June 22.

"Not having him here or not having him watch me on TV — you know, after the game, I was going to go to his house in San Diego that they just bought and stay with him and we were going to have a party for a couple of days — but plans have changed," Morris said. "This game is insignificant in the scheme of things."

## Giambi tops Sosa in Home Run Derby

MILWAUKEE — Jason Giambi overcame Sammy Sosa's dazzling display of longballs early in the All-Star Home Run Derby and easily beat Sosa, 7-1, in the final Monday night.

After Sosa hit seven 500-foot homers in the first two rounds, including three that left Miller Park on the fly, the Chicago Cubs slugger could only go deep once in the final. Giambi, hitting off Yankees coach Willie Randolph, had seven longballs before making out on his final four swings.

Sosa, the runner-up in the NL homer race three of the past four years, finished second in the Derby for the second-straight year. He lost to Arizona's Luis Gonzalez last year in Seattle.

## Judge will decide Teddy Ballgame's fate

HERNANDO, Fla. — Ted Williams' estate will ask a judge to decide if the baseball great's body should be cremated or frozen, a move to try to resolve a family feud over the remains.

Al Cassidy, the executor of the estate, will file Williams' will in state court today or Wednesday and ask the judge to rule on the issue, John Heer, a lawyer for Williams' oldest daughter, said Monday. Heer says Williams wanted to be cremated.

The daughter, Bobby-Jo Ferrell, has accused her half brother, John

Henry Williams, of moving their father's body from a Florida funeral home to Alcor Life Extension Foundation, where bodies are frozen.

She says John Henry Williams wants to preserve their father's DNA, perhaps to sell it in the future. The brother has not returned repeated calls seeking comment.

Ferrell plans to "rescue" her father's body from the cryonics company in Scottsdale, Ariz. She says the body already is frozen.

"My dad's in a metal tube, on his head, so frozen that if I touched him it would crack him because of the warmth from my fingertips," Ferrell told Boston's WBZ-TV. "It makes me so sick."

four hours and then spend two hours doing a general workout. After that, I have an intense 45-minute workout with Jeff [Horner], and then we have a shootaround with the other players," he said.

Brunner also added that some of his older Iowa teammates have been helping him with conditioning and practice. He said he has a lot of respect for them and hopes they can help him improve.

However, he does acknowledge some of the problems that existed for the Hawks last season.

"Everyone wants to forget about last season, but I still think they played well. They had 19 wins, and that's still respectable. Everyone is working as hard as

he can to make this season as good as possible," he said.

# Armstrong slips to fourth at end of second stage

SAARBRÜCKEN, Germany — Lance Armstrong enjoyed a relaxed ride in Monday's stage of the Tour de France, while some struggled to get to the finish.

"It was nervous today but quite easy," the three-time defending champion said.

Armstrong finished the second stage in 61st place and slipped to fourth in the overall standings. He isn't expected to bid for the lead until the race reaches the mountains next week.

Oscar Freire of Spain won the 112.2-mile trek, sprinting over the line just ahead of the main pack that included Armstrong. Swiss rider Rubens Bertogliati retained the leader's yellow jersey he won on Sunday.

The Texan is taking the early, flat stages easy. But for some, even Monday's ride was nearly too much.

Norway's Thor Hushovd shared the lead for much of the day but finished last after stopping several times with cramps. At one point, he hunched over his handlebars and had to have his thigh massaged by a trainer. He was cheered on by fans as he struggled to the finish line.

"I was surprised by the huge crowds — I was impressed," said Armstrong, favored to win a fourth straight title.

Thousands lined the stage route between Luxembourg and this west German city to cheer him and other riders, particularly Erik Zabel. One woman had "Zabel" written on her belly in the pink colors of his Telekom team.

But Freire, the world road champion, spoiled the party by outflanking the German in the final few yards to win in 4 hours, 19 minutes, 51 seconds. Australia's Robbie McEwen placed second, and Zabel finished third, in the same time as Freire. The main pack also had the same time.

Zabel, who turned 32 on Sunday, was wearing the green jersey awarded to the Tour's fastest sprinter as he entered Saarbrücken.

"To return to my country in the green jersey, it's still not too bad," he told France-2 Television.

Freire said riders can't always win on their home turf.

"In cycling, when you arrive in your home country, you indeed have more desire to win," he said.

"But the other rivals also want to win — we're all racing out there to win."

There were four crashes in Monday's stage. One of them involved Armstrong's U.S. Postal Service teammate Benoit Joachim, who wasn't seriously hurt.

## Price, Horner red-hot in win

### Scoring outbursts lead Imprinted Sportswear

Ex-Hawkeye Jason Price scored 24 second-half points to lead Goodfellow Printing/Imprinted Sportswear 113-110 over Lebeda Mattress Factory in Prime Time League play Monday night.

The two teams traded baskets most of the first half. UNI's Michael Miller went a perfect 7-7 in the first half for Lebeda, leading the team with 24 points overall. But Miller's performance was no match for the combination of Jeff Horner and Jason Price, who poured in 20 and 11 first-half points respectively.

After a hard-fought first half, Goodfellow led, 57-53. Horner's first-half performance came despite intense defensive pressure from ex-Nichols State player Sean Hughley. "I tried to take it to the basket when I wasn't shooting well," Horner said.

Goodfellow coach Nate Frese said he designed his offense to favor his guard-packed team. "Our plan was to have four guards on the perimeter and have Jon [Godfread] work the post. I wanted the guards to be able to create their own offense," Frese said.

He also said he emphasized rebounding to his team: "I wanted them to box out and get after the glass. They [Lebeda] weren't tall, but they were strong, so it was important to rebound well."

## Clouds loom over All-Stars

MILWAUKEE — John Smoltz, A-Rod, and all the All-Star players, it seems, are talking about No. 9. Too bad they don't mean Ted Williams.

The next baseball work stoppage would be its ninth, and that was main topic — along with steroids — going into tonight's showcase.

"You can't come into the All-Star break and not expect to deal with it and have everything be hunky-dory," Houston outfielder Lance Berkman said Monday. "Obviously, steroids and labor issues are the two dominant stories of the first half of the season."

Arizona outfielder Luis Gonzalez had to agree, reluctantly.

"The thing that's frustrating is that we're not talking about the All-Star game. We're talking about all the

issues that take away from the luster coming from the All-Star game."

Suffice to say, there was hardly any buzz about Luis Castillo's 35-game hitting streak, Curt Schilling's 14 wins, or Berkman's 29 home runs during workout day — and all three players were present at Miller Park.

Barry Bonds and the usually popular home-run derby wasn't a big subject. Neither were the recent trades by the New York Yankees, or the brewing Florida-Montreal deal involving Cliff Floyd and Ryan Dempster, or the AL's five-game winning streak.

"The guys know in the back of their minds that a strike is a possibility," Smoltz said. "But you can't let it take away from these three days. You can't stop playing baseball because of the doom or gloom."

Like it or not, almost everyone else found himself talking about labor


trouble in Major League Baseball. "There's never been a negotiation in MLB that's ever gone smoothly," Gonzalez said.

Schilling, who will pitch against Boston's Derek Lowe, tried to make light of the problems.

"I'm hoping to start the game with a strike," the Arizona ace said.

Meanwhile, down the road in Rosemont, Ill., the executive board of the baseball players' union failed to set a strike date, but it will ask major leaguers for the authority to call the sport's ninth work stoppage since 1972.

Members of the union's executive board, meeting on the day before the All-Star game, left a hotel saying they will go back to their teammates. Philadelphia outfielder Doug Glanville said that because of the
