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## Council approves towers in 4-3 vote

A split City Council gave the green light Tuesday to a \$22.3 million luxury-condominium project on the city's last piece of undeveloped downtown land, despite public requests for the council "not to rush."

"I believe this project is, in fact, visionary," said Mayor Ernie Lehman, one of four councilors who voted in favor of the project. "I think it's a statement of how we feel about economic development."

Since the council's decision to sell the lot in February 2001, debate has been heated among the councilors and the public over what should happen to the 1.02-acre parcel of land known as 64-1a, located directly south of Iowa City Public Library, 123 S. Linn St.

With no competing bids received by Monday's deadline, Tuesday's vote endorsed the Moen Group's project, the Plaza Towers. The 13- and 14-story towers are expected to house 57 hotel-room suites, 55 two-bedroom apartments, luxury-condominium units, office space, and a grocery store.

Under the agreement, the Moen Group will purchase the land from the city for \$250,000, with proceeds going to the city's community development grant block fund. The city will also issue the Moen Group \$6 million in tax-increment financing to offset construction costs.

The land's low purchase price and the tax credit, coupled with a parking shortage

## Hunt for president gears up

### UI names search firm, search-panel members

To select the next president, the UI will turn to the same head-hunting firm that both attracted UI President Mary Sue Coleman here and lured her away, university officials announced Tuesday.

The selection of the executive-search firm Korn/Ferry International coincided with the announcement of the members of the university's 25-person search committee. The state of Iowa Board of Regents is expected to officially appoint the search firm and committee members at its meeting Thursday in Cedar Falls.

The Dallas-based company is widely considered one of the top firms in its industry, and it has performed nine of the last 12 presidential searches in the Big Ten. It helped nab Coleman for the UI in 1995 — and for Michigan, where she will become president Aug. 1 — and last year helped select Iowa

State University President Greg Geoffrey. Now, the UI will again hire the search firm after officials reviewed several proposals from interested companies and interviewed the top three candidates.

Regents President Owen Newlin selected the search-panel members after consultation with UI Faculty Senate President Jeffrey Cox and Jonathan Carlson, the chairman of the Presidential Search and Advisory Committee.

"I believe this group represents an excellent blend of the wide and diverse community of interests at the university," Newlin said in a statement. "We have faculty members from many different fields of academic study, as well as professional staff, students, and alumni representing the diversity of roles and viewpoints within the university."

The search team includes one dean, two alumni, three staff members, three students, 10 faculty members, and four special appointments by the regents.

One of the three students is an undergraduate, while the other two are doctoral candidates. That drew criticism from UI Student Government President Nick Herbold, who said he recommended several

possible candidates to the regents.

"Undergrads should have more say in the matter because one thing Mary Sue Coleman failed to do was pay attention to them," Herbold said.

Elizabeth Altmaier, a committee member and UI psychology professor, said the group will meet to develop the criteria for what skills a new president should possess, which will be forwarded to Korn/Ferry. The firm will recruit candidates who meet those standards.

The search committee will sort the candidates through discussion and, later, off-campus interviews.

If the search continues on schedule, the committee will recommend four or five finalists by December or January to come to campus for interviews. After that, the regents will announce a replacement for Coleman upon interviewing the four candidates.

Altmaier said it won't be an easy task. "I'm looking forward to the challenge," she said. "But it will be impossible to replace Mary Sue Coleman."

## UI hit external funding record in 2002

Despite a year of state budget cuts and a slumping economy, UI faculty, staff, and students generated a record \$341 million in grants, gifts, and contracts for research, education, and service during the fiscal year that ended June 30.



"The results reflect the hard work of UI researchers, faculty, staff, and students who earned highly competitive grants and contracts during a difficult economic period," said David Skorton, the university's vice president for Research, in announcing the 23 percent increase in external funding.

Skorton attributed the \$63.1 million increase from last year to students, faculty, and staff sending a record 3,000 applications for research projects. He said the total funding received shows that the university's research enterprise is more competitive than ever before.

Officials said the increase was fueled by federal research grants secured from the Department of Health and Human Services, which includes the National Institutes of Health.

## Aficionado helps to coin an Iowa image

Growing up in the '50s, Tom Robertson drove bankers in Ottumwa crazy with his habit of searching coin bags for rare Jefferson nickels.

Now, at 62, Robertson's fascination with money has paid off. The Iowa City resident, UI alumnus, and retired university employee was appointed by Gov. Tom Vilsack to serve as a member of the Iowa Commemorative Quarter Committee.

As president of the Iowa Numismatic Association, Robert-

son campaigned for over a year to have his coin club represented on the quarter committee.

"It's a fun assignment," he said.

Bill Bagwell, a coin dealer at Dean Oakes Numismatist Office, 103 E. College St., said the quarter committee will benefit from Robertson's expertise.

"[Coin collectors] probably have a better idea what is coinable, what will fit on a quarter," Bagwell said. "Sometimes what looks nice in a design ... it may not strike up as nice."

The U.S. Mint puts five new state quarters into circulation annually; Iowa's 25-cent piece, due for release in 2004, will be the 29th state quarter, said Robertson, one of two coin experts on the committee. The committee reviews and can revise public submissions before proposing recommendations to

## Gabe's hit for serving after hours

Yet another downtown bar is in trouble with the law for serving alcohol to patrons after hours.

Gabe's, 330 E. Washington St., was charged Tuesday with selling alcohol past the legal hour after Officers Kevin Heick and Troy Kelsey allegedly saw nine people in the rear of the bar with open bottles of beer at 2:13 a.m., police reports said.

The bartender, Zachary Westerdahl, 805 E. Washington St., was charged with providing alcohol while prohibited. Police records allege that the 27-year-old admitted "he knew it was late." Westerdahl was unavailable for comment.

Gabe's must now decide if it wants to set up a hearing regarding the incident. The bar can choose to take a \$500 civil penalty or a seven-day suspension, said Lynn Walding, the executive director of the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division.

# Board mulls three sites for school

**Alternative school could be built on land on Mall Drive**

Iowa City School Board members Tuesday learned of a third potential site for the proposed alternative high school, but they said they wanted to gather more information before deciding on one.

"We have identified the needs and developed an appropriate program to meet those needs," said board member Matt Goodlaxson. "Now, all we need to do is find a location."

The newest site would put the school near Sycamore Mall on Mall Drive. Superintendent Lane Plugge outlined that 3.5 acres of land as a site, in addition to the previously disclosed

site in Coralville and the option of renovating the existing facility on South Dubuque Street. Plugge did not endorse any of the sites.

Improvements to the existing Senior High Alternative Center are a part of an approximate \$38.5 million bond issue designed to update area schools. The district has set aside \$3.5 million for the alternative high school.

While the bond issue is scheduled to be put to a public vote on Dec. 10, School Board members declined Tuesday to rush to a judgment on which site would be best.

If built in Coralville, the school would occupy 22,000 square feet of an 88,000-square-foot education center, scheduled to be built at the intersection of 12th Avenue and Fifth Street.

ior citizens as well as utilize resources that would not be available to them in a separate school," Plugge said.

Board members expressed concerns over contributing \$3.5 million to a building that would be owned by Coralville, and they also questioned the level of community acceptance for a downtown location of the school.

Building the school on Mall Drive would allow students to utilize resources offered by nearby Kirkwood Community

College and would allow the School District to own the property, School Board members agreed.

After considerable discussion, the board asked Plugge to present additional information about the sites at a special meeting on July 23.

"We have spent three years researching this project," said board member Peter Wallace. "We have invested too much to just jump into something."

**Armed robber hits Kohl's**

A lone robber flashed a gun at a cashier in Kohl's Department Store in Coralville Tuesday and made away with an undetermined amount of cash.

According to Coralville police reports, at approximately 2:07 p.m., the suspect handed the cashier a note demanding money and displayed what appeared to be the grips of a handgun sticking out of the waistband of his pants.

Following the robbery, the suspect was seen fleeing the store east on foot. No injuries were reported, reports said.

Witnesses described the suspect as a white male in his mid 20s with a darker, or tan, complexion, with very dark hair and several days' growth of beard. He was wearing sunglasses, a light blue "Gilligan" style hat, a dark green long-sleeved T-shirt, and light blue, baggy jeans.

A subject closely matching the subject's description was detained by the Coralville police shortly after the robbery. He was released after police determined that he was not the suspect.

The robbery occurred during normal business hours, and several customers were present in the store, located at 2795 Commercial Drive. Anyone who observed the suspect or has further information should contact Coralville police at 319-354-1100.

**Ashcroft urges vigilance in visit to Cedar Rapids**

CEDAR RAPIDS (AP) — U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft urged members of the anti-terrorism task force in Iowa's Northern District on Tuesday to remain vigilant and to be open to sharing information and ideas.

Ashcroft met with the task force, assembled by U.S. Attorney Charles Larson, during a short visit to Cedar Rapids.


The nation's top law-enforcement officer said the best tool for preventing a repeat of the Sept. 11 tragedy is for law-enforcement officials at every level to work together.

"The best friend of prevention, when it comes to assaults against the public interest, is information," Ashcroft said.

"Our effort through the anti-terrorism task force is to create that environment of cooperation and information exchange that will help us do the best job in preventing terrorist activities in the United States."

Ashcroft also awarded \$2 million to the Iowa Department of Corrections for a program to prevent convicted offenders from returning to crime after prison.

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# Vilsack unveils economic plan

DES MOINES — Gov. Tom Vilsack will propose a \$40 million economic-development plan today, letting local officials shape innovative new strategies to help businesses expand and improve the economy.

At the same time, the governor will call for diverting \$30 million from the state's share of the multistate tobacco settlement to aid existing businesses.

The governor will spell out his proposals in news conferences in Cedar Rapids and Davenport, but he outlined his idea Tuesday in an interview with the Associated Press.

Vilsack said his goal is increasing the per capita income by \$1,250 per person.

"Iowa families deserve better wages and income," he said. "Now it's time to empower folks at the local level."

Under his proposal, money currently used for many economic-development grants would be distributed to local

officials in new districts that will be divided according to the state's community college boundaries.

Special boards led by businessmen and promoters in those new districts would make proposals to stimulate the economy through advanced manufacturing, life sciences, and technology.

The money would be distributed according to a formula based partially on population, though all of the districts would get some funding.

Programs would have to be approved by the state Department of Economic Development Board, and then local officials would report each year on how successful they've been.

"The key is productivity," Vilsack said. "There would be some accountability."

The money from the tobacco fund would be shifted to aid existing businesses that would submit applications to the new regional boards, describing how they could improve productivity and efficiency.

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# Critics leery of executive power in homeland bill

WASHINGTON — As Congress rushes to complete work on President Bush's homeland-security plan by Sept. 11, many lawmakers are questioning the administration's demand for an unusual level of flexibility to implement the proposed massive government reorganization.

In a break with congressional tradition, the administration wants total control over key decisions such as installing senior officials and buying and selling government property. The push has alarmed some legislators, who say the White House must make concessions if it wants a bill to be enacted this fall.

Several key lawmakers, however, say Congress doesn't have enough time to spell out how the administration should set up the new department.

"We are trusting it to implement it, and we need to give it that flexibility," said Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Texas, a proponent of the president's proposal. "But the bottom line is, we're at war, we're badly organized to fight this war, and we need to give [the administration] flexibility to fight this war. Every day we delay is one more day we give the terrorists to attack us."

Other lawmakers have resisted such reasoning, however, and the debate threatens to complicate passage of the bill. House and Senate leaders said they intend to put their versions of the plan to a vote before adjourning for the

August recess, so they can reconcile the two measures before the anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on New York and Washington. But members of both parties, particularly in the Senate, have begun to question the ambitious timetable.

Tennessee Sen. Fred Thomp-

son, the top Republican on the Governmental Affairs Committee, described the legislative rush as "a very unwise thing to do."

"I think we need to get away from this notion of getting it done by 9/11," he said Tuesday.

# Allies break sharply with U.S. on Arafat's position

WASHINGTON — Breaking with the United States, leaders of Europe, Russia, and the United Nations said Tuesday that they would continue to deal with Yasser Arafat as the legitimate Palestinian leader, refusing to endorse President Bush's demand that he be replaced.

After meeting with Secretary of State Colin Powell in New York, U.N. and European leaders also prodded the United States to inject new momentum toward a Middle East peace accord, saying improved security for Israelis won't last without progress in negotiations.

"Even if the security track gains some traction, unless we show some progress on the [political and humanitarian] tracks, that will not work," U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan said.

The comments underscored profound disagreements that persist between the United States and some of its closest allies since Bush spelled out a new Middle East policy on June 24.

In that speech, Bush told the Palestinian people that the United States would not support an independent Palestinian state until they replaced Arafat and elected new leadership not tainted by terrorism or corruption. He also insisted on major reforms in the Palestinian Authority's security, financial, and judicial apparatus.

Once those changes are made, Bush said, the United States will be ready to recognize a Palestinian state provisionally, and he held out hope

for a final Israeli-Palestinian settlement within three years. But Bush did not suggest the outlines of any final agreement or lay out plans for how peace talks should resume.

Bush's speech was widely viewed as tilted sharply toward Israel, and it drew negative reactions in the Arab world. Although Arafat is despised by many leaders in the region and Palestinians themselves have pushed for reforms, Bush's demand for Arafat's ouster was seen as an affront to Arab dignity. Russia and Europe have closer ties to the Palestinians than does the United States.

Alluding to the absence of a negotiating program, Annan said Tuesday: "What we have to do is work out how to get there. What is the operational pathway that gets us to that goal in three years' time?"

He and the other leaders rejected the administration's tactic of avoiding any dealings with Arafat, whom no U.S. official has met since the president's June 24 speech. And none echoed Bush's call to replace him.

"He is the legitimately elected leader of Palestine, and while he is in this capacity, we'll continue to maintain our relations with him," Annan said, in comments echoed by Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov of Russia. "Whoever is leader is the person that the European Union will be talking to," said Danish Foreign Minister Per Stig Moeller, whose country holds the rotating EU presidency.

Tuesday's meeting marked an effort to energize Middle East diplomacy, which has stalled since Bush's speech. It

brought together the so-called quartet of foreign ministers from the United States, Europe, and Russia, in addition to Annan, all of whom have agreed to work to try to halt Israeli-Palestinian bloodshed.

The leaders also met last night with the foreign ministers of Egypt and Jordan, who will meet with Bush at the White House today. The Saudi foreign minister will also be there.

But like many previous diplomatic efforts, this one was overshadowed by violence after Palestinian militants, disguised as Israeli soldiers, ambushed an armored bus in the West Bank and killed seven Israeli civilians with sprays of gunfire. The members of the quartet joined Bush in condemning the attack.

While Powell stressed that improved security for Israelis was most urgent, others said renewed negotiations and humanitarian aid to Palestinians had to proceed at the same time.

"Everything, really ... begins with creating a better sense of security," Powell said. "And so that's the one we'll be moving more aggressively on in the days and the coming weeks."

The administration, he said, is ready to introduce a plan to restructure the Palestinians' security forces, parts of which have joined in anti-Israeli violence.

# GOP leaders vow to fight for softer scandal measure

WASHINGTON — House GOP leaders, risking a backlash from a disgruntled public and even some of their own members, will fight several of the Senate's proposed restrictions on fraudulent accounting practices that have rocked Wall Street and frightened investors, key legislators said Tuesday.

One day after the Senate unanimously passed a broad overhaul of corporate and securities laws, top House Republicans said they will try to delay, and likely dilute, some of the proposed changes.

"The Senate bill is not a good bill and has major flaws," said Financial Services Committee Chairman Michael Oxley, R-Ohio, who will represent House Republicans in final negotiations over the legislation. "Everything is going to be on the table."

As the stock market dipped lower Tuesday, hopes for swift enactment of new accounting laws appeared jeopardized by House Speaker Dennis Hastert's decision to reject the Senate bill. It also gave accounting-industry lobbyists more time to press their congressional allies for leniency.

Lobbyists representing the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and accounting firms already were roaming the congressional halls, looking for help.

Several rank-and-file Republicans pleaded with Hastert, R-Ill., to adopt the Senate legislation immediately, which would allow Congress to turn its attention to other matters, such as creating a new Department of Homeland Defense. President Bush has called on Congress to send him a package of corporate-accounting reforms before August, although several GOP aides said the White House did not lobby Republicans to embrace the Senate bill.

Starting today, a small group of House and Senate conferees will meet behind closed doors to hammer out a compromise between those who back the

Senate's more-stringent proposals and those Republicans who want to modify them.

The Senate bill, authored by Sen. Paul Sarbanes, D-Md., would create an independent board with new enforcement powers to oversee the accounting industry. It would prohibit most firms from providing consulting services to companies they audit — a practice that landed Arthur Andersen at the center of the latest financial scandals.

The Senate bill would give federal prosecutors new tools to track down and punish corporate criminals. It would require top executives to certify their financial statements, which would be more closely scrutinized than before.

Several House Republicans said Tuesday they opposed the creation of an independent oversight agency.

"There's major concern with an independent body with government power that would be in competition with the SEC," Oxley said.

Under the Senate plan, the SEC would appoint five members, including no more than two certified public accountants, to a nonprofit corporation to oversee auditors of publicly traded companies. This corporation would essentially have many enforcement powers the SEC now wields.

Rep. Richard Baker, R-La., called the plan "ill-advised."

Some key Republicans want to clarify — and in some cases, water down — Senate provisions that would subject corporations and their executives to new lawsuits, including one measure that would give shareholders more time to sue corporations. Baker said there's more than a half-dozen new "actionable items" in the Senate bill that "are not in the interest of taxpayers or shareholders."

House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., predicted it will take two months to reach a compromise — which, he warned, will be "watered-down" by pro-business Republicans.

**IRA apologizes for deaths it caused**

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The Irish Republican Army issued an unprecedented apology Tuesday for the deaths of "noncombatants" over 30 years of violence in Northern Ireland.

The British government quickly welcomed the statement from the outlawed organization, noting the strength of the apology, which comes at a time when the peace process forged in 1998 is under severe strain from continuing sectarian violence.

Observers said the IRA gesture was designed to assuage Protestant anger over the continued involvement of the IRA linked-Sinn Fein Party in Northern Ireland's joint Protestant-Catholic government. Government leader David Trimble, a Protestant, warned that the power-sharing arrangement would unravel if British Prime Minister Tony Blair doesn't set a tougher policy as expected next week on alleged violations of the IRA cease-fire.

The IRA made the apology in a statement marking the anniversary

of Bloody Friday, when it set off more than 20 bombs within an hour in Belfast on July 21, 1972, killing seven civilians and two soldiers.

**Palestinians kill 7 on West Bank**

EMMANUEL, West Bank — Palestinian gunmen dressed as Israeli soldiers ambushed an armored bus near the entrance to this Jewish settlement Tuesday, disabling the vehicle with a roadside bomb before climbing on the roof and shooting to death seven people, including an infant.

Among the dead, hospital officials said, were three members of the same family: a woman, her son-in-law, and his 11-month-old daughter. The dead man's wife, their 2-year-old son, and the dead infant's twin were among at least 17 people injured in the ambush, the first fatal attack on Israeli civilians since June 20.

Doctors reportedly were fighting Tuesday night to save the lives of a gravely injured woman and her baby, whom they were forced to deliver prematurely by Caesarean section.

Israeli troops descended on the scene within minutes, but the gunmen escaped across the rocky, terraced hilltops that surround this ultra-Orthodox settlement in the northern West Bank. Three Palestinian organizations, including a militia of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat's own Fatah movement, claimed responsibility for the killings, although his Palestinian Authority condemned the attack. The Israeli government blamed Arafat.

**Spain seizes 3 Al Qaeda suspects**

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Three Al Qaeda suspects were taken into custody Tuesday, among them one who had videotaped several American landmarks, including the Golden Gate Bridge, the Sears Tower, the Statue of Liberty, and the World Trade Center.

Police said they were convinced the footage, taken during a 1997 visit to the United States by one of the detainees, was much more than "tourist curiosity."

At least one suspect was recruited by a man who, Spanish authorities say, helped to prepare the Sept. 11 attacks and was linked to the Al Qaeda cell that included hijacker Mohamed Atta.

It was a further indication that Spain, with a growing Arab immigrant population, may have been used by Al Qaeda as the setting for crucial logistic support in the Sept. 11 attacks.

**Greenspan: Scandals hurt recovery**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy is poised to return to healthy growth, but the startling stream of accounting scandals that has rocked Americans' faith in corporate leaders could weaken the recovery, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan told Congress on Tuesday.

Those accounting problems already have contributed to a slide in the stock market that threatens to cause consumers to spend less and businesses, whose profits took a hit during the slump, to become even more reluctant to make big commit-

ments in capital investment, a necessary ingredient to the economy's full recovery, he said.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which had been off 232 points earlier in the day, trimmed losses to close down 166.08 points at 8,473.11. It was the Dow's seventh-consecutive losing session.

"Considerable uncertainties — about the progress of the adjustment of capital spending and the rebound in profitability, about the potential for additional revelations of corporate malfeasance, and about possible risks from global political events and terrorism still confront us," Greenspan said in testimony to the Senate Banking Committee.

**Battle brews over Ground Zero plan**

NEW YORK (AP) — Six proposals to redevelop the World Trade Center site were released Tuesday to a decidedly mixed reaction, with critics saying they included too much office space on hallowed ground and had too little imagination.

Others, however, said the plans included the two most important needs: a strong transportation hub and a powerful memorial to the 2,813 people who died in the rubble.

"They represent not initial ideas or wild visions but how much has been done and that we are very close to consensus," said Kathryn Wylde, the head of the New York City Partnership, an organization of local business leaders.

However, Monica Iken, whose husband died in the attacks, said she was disappointed the plans called for so much office and retail space and were not definitive about the acreage for a memorial.

"If we build a beautiful memorial, I guarantee they will come. If we build office and retail space, I just don't know," said Iken, the founder of the survivors' group September's Mission.

She also said that building on the footprints of the twin towers is unacceptable to many victims' families.

"The footprints are non-negotiable. They are sacred and hallowed space," she said.



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

## A presidential family history

George Santayana's caveat "Those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it" seems to be a cliché, but only because wisdom bears repeating. The public has been shielded from the past history of one of America's prominent political families. Knowledge of that past can help us understand where we are headed.

As Webster Tarpley explains in his 1992 biography, the ancestors of the Bush family were prominent Tories, conservative colonialists who sided with the British during the American Revolution. Over the years the Bushes sided with America's worst enemies. Prescott Bush, grandfather of George W. Bush, spent more than a decade helping his father-in-law, George Herbert Walker, finance Nazi Germany, funneling \$50 million through the Union Bank on Wall Street. (*Fortunate Son*, Omega Publishing, 2001) Well after Pearl Harbor and U.S. entry into World War II, Bush was supplying the Nazi war machine with steel, chemicals, etc. The U.S. government

repeatedly charged Bush under the Trading with the Enemy Act. On Nov. 6, 1942, Vesting Order No. 248 (Federal Register Document No. 42-11568) was filed, seizing the assets of the Union Bank, whose director was Prescott Bush, as a Nazi front. (*Secret War Against the Jews*, St. Martins, 1994).

According to John Loftus, a former U.S. Justice Department Nazi war-crimes prosecutor who is today the director of the Florida Holocaust museum, "The Bush family fortune came from the Third Reich" (*Sarasota Herald-Tribune*, Nov. 11, 2000). Prescott Bush managed the Consolidated Silesian Steel Corp. within the Auschwitz concentration camp complex where he profited off slave labor producing steel for Nazi tanks, artillery, and other weapons used to maim and kill American soldiers all across Europe.

Past ghosts repeatedly re-emerge in the Bush camp. In 1988, six fascist war criminals were found working for the

elder George Bush's election campaign, including former SS officer Nicholas Nazarenko and Bohdan Fedorak, who headed a Nazi group involved in anti-Jewish pogroms. (*Philadelphia Enquirer*, Sept. 10, 1988).

George W. Bush continues the family tradition, maintaining membership in shadowy groups such as the Order of Skull and Bones and providing funds for foreign tyrants. In May 2001, just weeks before the Sept. 11 attacks, his administration sent \$43 million in U.S. tax funds to the Taliban in Afghanistan. Judging from the past, the future with Bush in power will include U.S. aid to repressive regimes, continuing attacks on constitutional liberties, election irregularities, business corruption, and international usurpations of democracy, such as the recent Venezuelan coup. All shrouded of course behind torrents of flags and other jingoistic trappings.

## Time for Bush and Cheney to come clean on dealings

In the ongoing swarm of corporate scandal, it is troubling when the two figures repeatedly named are President Bush and Vice President Cheney. However, perhaps more unsettling than their dubious business dealings in the past are their present attempts to keep them secret.

Bush continues to stonewall efforts to learn more about the profits he gained while a member of the board of directors and the three-person audit committee of Harken Energy. During his tenure there, Harken, in a move Enron would copy on a much larger scale, sold a portion of the company to Harken officials and reported this as profits. In June 1990, just two months before the truth of its accounting surfaced and the company declared massive losses, Bush sold his shares and earned a 200 percent profit.

In addition, the required SEC forms for the sale were filed some 34 weeks late. Bush's infamous comment that "sometimes things aren't exactly black and white when it comes to accounting procedures" is typical of his unwillingness to own up to his past.

He avoids the issue when confronted, instead skirting around it with vague language such as "black and white."

Another tactic of Bush's has been to create a wild-goose chase for SEC documentation of his Harken dealings. First, Bush will not authorize the release of the full SEC report, insisting that the "relevant documents" are available. These "relevant documents," incidentally, do not include the minutes of a crucial meeting in which Harken officials met to discuss the internal sale that it used to boost profits.

Further, his explanation for the late filing of the SEC forms regarding his sale of stock has changed since the incident. When the forms were filed (March 1991), Bush initially claimed the SEC had misplaced them; he has only recently shifted the blame to his own lawyers. "I still haven't figured it out completely," Bush said last week, even as he chastised the news media for bringing up what he called "old-style politics."

While Bush avoids his past using vagueness and misdirection, Cheney has remained silent with regard to his

business scandals. Between 1995 and 2000, Cheney was the CEO of Halliburton Energy. In 1998, Halliburton began using "aggressive" accounting practices, which counted uncollected payments on uncertain future contracts in order to swell profits.

The SEC reportedly began investigating Halliburton in May 2002, and a lawsuit filed last week accuses Cheney of fraudulent accounting practices during his tenure there.

Cheney has yet to explain himself. Unless, of course, one counts his quotes from a 1996 Arthur Andersen promotional video. On the tape, which surfaced last week, Cheney says he likes the now-embattled auditing giant because it goes "over and above the, just sort of the normal by-the-books audit arrangement."

The president and vice president are not only leading a hypocritical crusade to clean up corporations, they are perpetuating distrust. To be able to effectively lead the United States out of its economic difficulties, the two must first end their secrecy about their own pasts and present them in "black and white."

## Blasé doesn't cut it

Over the weekend, Iowa City played host to political celebrity Tipper Gore as she campaigned on behalf of Sen. Tom Harkin. They attended a forum Sunday on adult daycare at the Pathways Adult Day Health Center.

Harkin, a Democrat, is running against Republican Rep. Greg Ganske, a physician from Des Moines, for his fourth term in the Senate.

And unlike the Iowa governor's race, it seems that the mudslinging is minimal between these two candidates, while talking about issues takes the foreground for now.

The topic of the forum over the weekend was health care — specifically, the areas of prescription-drug relief and adult daycare. Hopefully, this will become one of the main issues that these two gentlemen focus on and debate as the election approaches.

Both are quite knowledgeable about the topic, which, one hopes, will allow people in Iowa to become increasingly aware and educated about this important issue.

Ganske is a sponsor in the House of the Bipartisan Patient Protection Act of 2001, which makes bold attempts to protect patients and eliminate many of the problems that face the managed care of HMOs.

Harkin, on the other hand, played a role in 2001 in helping to create the National Caregiver Program. It provides support for those caring for adult loved ones with debilitating mental and physical conditions. Also, Harkin has been working towards reliable Medicare prescription-drug benefits for seniors in Iowa.

Regardless of which candidate you support or your position on health care, the issue is an important one



## Tour-weary & still wistful

Somewhere in a Neko Case song, a farmhouse is burning down, a heart has been broken, or a lover is about to be murdered.

As the crowd at Gabe's on Sunday should know, Case is not some CMT hat-act, and her music is far from your average crying-in-your-beer country standards.

As she demonstrates with the country-noir of acclaimed Bloodshot Records discs *The Virginian* (1997), *Furnace Room Lullaby* (2000), and the forthcoming *Blacklisted*, her music, like Case herself, shouldn't be taken at face value.

Growing up on or near Air Force bases all over the country (finally settling in Tacoma, Wash., now residing in Chicago), Case's career has always been eclectic. Starting with a rusty drum-kit given to her by a friend, by age 18 Neko became the drummer for Vancouver post-punker band Maow.

In addition to the old-time country of her collaborations with Carolyn Mark as the Corn Sisters, Case has been busy opening shows for Nick Cave. As a member of Canadian jangle-pop outfit the New Pornographers, Case also won a Juno Award for the 2000's *Mass Romantic*.

A tour-weary Neko found time to talk to the *DI* before her show.

**DI:** Can I ask how you became involved in music? I know it's kind of a general question.

**Neko:** Sure.

**DI:** Um, how did you become involved in music?

**Neko:** I just wanted something to do, and there wasn't a lot to do in my hometown, but people that I knew and hung out with were all very interested in music, and I was interested in music. That's how I met all of them. Kind of an organic beginning.

**DI:** So there were a lot of punk influences in bands that you were in, like Maow?

**Neko:** Country music, too. I didn't like just one thing.

**DI:** I read somewhere that you were born on the same day, Sept. 8, as Patsy Cline. Do you think about that a lot? Is she a big influence?

**Neko:** She's definitely an influence. The birthday thing is just a coincidence. It's also Harlan Howard's, Jimmy Rogers', and Peter Sellers' birthday, too.

**DI:** I think I have Michael Jackson's.

**Neko:** Are you influenced by Michael Jackson?

**DI:** Not that much.

**Neko:** Oh come on, we all were.

**DI:** How do you feel about your new album's direction? Is *Blacklisted* a progression or a spin in any sort of new direction for you as an artist?

**Neko:** I guess I just know more what I'm doing this time. And I played instruments on this record, which I haven't done before. It was nice. It was a really fun time.

**DI:** You've been teaching yourself to play guitar, I've read?

**Neko:** Guitar and banjo. I played some saw, some piano, and some drums on this record. It was big free-for-all, really.

**DI:** Your previous albums have quite a bit of dark imagery in them. The new album has some songs such as

"Ladypilot" that have this dark imagery in the context of crashing planes and cities burning. Is this at all influenced by current events?

**Neko:** No, these were written before that, and have nothing to do with current events. [They have] to do with feeling superstitious about flying on airplanes, and how weird the world looks when you are way above it.

**DI:** What was it like winning a Juno award for the New Pornographers album *Mass Romantic*?

**Neko:** We didn't even go [to the awards ceremony] 'cause we always heard that if you won an award they call you before hand to make sure that you would go. Nobody called, so we figured we didn't win. I was in London, and the guys called me. I was pretty shocked. It is a Canadian Grammy award and was kind of touching. I felt honored that Canada would do that.

**DI:** Do you primarily tour Canada?

**Neko:** We tour Canada extensively. We have three days [break], and then we go to the Yukon. That should be interesting. You have to take a plane to White Horse and then a plane to Dawson, and it's a big production.

**DI:** Do you feel there is a lot of difference in Canadian and American crowds?

**Neko:** It's more the Canadian medium that is different. Arts are government funded in Canada and not just grants going to rich people who don't need the money. The Canadian government is willing to help Canadian bands and Canadian artists a lot more than around here. [There is] a lot less competition, and the media are a lot more accessible. It feels very friendly.

### Oscar strikes back

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Hundreds of fake Oscar statuettes were destroyed by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, part of a continuing crackdown on copyright infringement.

A document-destruction company on July 12 chopped up 12 pallets of phony Oscars and key chains, shot glasses, snow globes, and picture frames that made unauthorized use of the Oscar symbol, said John Pavlik, a spokesman for the academy.

The items were turned over to the academy in recent weeks by wholesalers who were selling them to souvenir shops on Hollywood Boulevard.

"These were plastic, real cheap knockoffs," Pavlik said. "Only from a distance would you really be fooled into thinking it was an actual Oscar."

The academy has an in-house lawyer who tracks down fake Oscar suppliers and sends wholesalers "cease-and-desist" letters.

heavily promoting his "Late Show" and scheduling what it hopes will be stronger lead-ins to the program.

And the network clearly is trying, Moonves said, recounting a joke comedian Jon Stewart made about how often Letterman was mentioned during the network's recent broadcast of the NCAA basketball championships.

"There was so much promotion I thought Letterman was playing Duke in the semifinals," Stewart cracked.

## Getting the Emmys to color outside the lines

LOS ANGELES — Emmy voters have the chance this week to align with breakthrough shows such as "24" or retreat to the dull safety of old standbys.

While the Big Three networks have essentially owned the leading drama and comedy series categories, there are more worthy outsiders than ever before.

The Fox drama "24," for instance, which played out one hyper-intense day of political intrigue over an entire season, made the most of its daring concept. It's clearly earned a best-drama bid.

And star Kiefer Sutherland, revealing newly mature talent, should have a lock on a best-actor bid when the nominations are announced Thursday.

Likewise Michael Chiklis, whose firecracker work as a ruthless detective in FX's "The Shield" is fearless and mesmerizing. So is the series and its supporting cast, including CCH Pounder.

On the comedy side, the astringent "Bernie Mac" on Fox deserves Emmy respect, as does one of the best comic sidemen on TV, Jed Rees of Showtime's "The Chris Isaak Show."

And the charming "Gilmore Girls" on WB shouldn't have to ask twice for Emmy kisses.

But awards history may be against them and other should-be contenders — such as worthy "niche" cable series, including black family drama "Soul Food" and "Queer As Folk," about a circle of gay and lesbian friends.

To make room for newcomers, Academy of Television Arts & Sci-

ences voters need to shove aside perennial favorites, which they've been loath to do. Even in years when "ER" flatlined, there was a bed reserved for it in the best-drama ward.

Voters need to look outside ABC, CBS, and NBC as a widening TV circle invests in ambitious series. They must appreciate and reward risk-taking shows at the outset, when support can mean the difference between renewal and cancellation.

Consider the police drama "Hill Street Blues," which barely survived its first year but swept the 1981 Emmys and went on to a six-year run on NBC, changing the shape of contemporary TV drama.

Fox's "24" could use such affirmation now, as could "The Shield." Both warrant it.

Granted, there have been winners among non-Big Three shows, including Fox's "Ally McBeal," HBO's "The Sopranos" broke through with best-drama and lead-actor nominations in its first season (although it has yet to capture the top series award), and HBO's "Sex and the City" was named best comedy last year.

But the growing impact of cable and smaller broadcast networks, while eroding the ABC, NBC, and CBS audience share, has yet to be seriously manifested at the Emmys.

HBO's stellar awards performance, likely to be extended this year by the acclaimed "Six Feet Under," could serve as an icebreaker for alternative shows. ("The Sopranos" will be MIA at the Emmys because of a delayed fourth-season debut, now set for September).

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

# Local coin expert helps choose Iowa design for quarter

the governor, who in turn will send three to five designs to the U.S. Mint. Approved designs return for the governor's final selection.

Robertson has no fixed ideas for an image, but he's established a criteria for choosing the design that will appear on anywhere from 600 million to 1.6 billion Iowa quarters. Popular ideas to date are the Sullivan Brothers, American Gothic, an agricultural scene, and the UI's Old Capitol dome.

The quarter should be "a good positive image, something that represents Iowa, and something that everyone outside the state of Iowa will recognize," Robertson said.

An active collector for 52 years, Robertson said he can't guess how many coins he's stored in bank safety-deposit boxes, only that he "can't pick them up."

Robertson began avidly collecting coins following his Air Force days. While stationed in Crete, Robertson visited the

Airmen's Club biweekly to weed out rare coins from slot machine change.

"Certain mint errors, because of the small number [of coins] produced, are more valuable and more desirable," Robertson said. "Economics rule coins, the law of supply and demand."

One of Robertson's most treasured possessions is a 1918 buffalo nickel he found as a kid sorting through cash-register change at his father's general store. Unique because the mint used a set of 1917 dies to punch a 1918 nickel, the rare coin's "8" overlaps its "7." Historical and sentimental value make this \$1,000 oddity a keeper for Robertson.

As a business administrator in charge of extensive government contracts with the UI Department of Physics and Astronomy, Robertson worked with UI Professor Emeritus James Van Allen during his 30-year tenure.

"I think he's very well-qualified to serve on this governor's committee because of his long-time professional interest in coins," Van Allen said.

# Divided councilors OK Moen project

and the feasibility of a grocery store and hotel next to the Sheraton, has sparked debate among councilors and the public.

With an open-market value of \$1.7 million, the lot should be sold for much more than \$250,000, some councilors and area residents said.

"Why are we giving [the Moen Group] those breaks?" Iowa City resident Kevin Perez asked the council. "Why are we giving it \$6 million?"

But the majority of the councilors said they had faith in the project and its ability to prosper in downtown Iowa City.

"This isn't something that came up suddenly," Councilor Connie Champion said. "This has been going on for a long time. They're building what we're asking them to build."

Iowa City resident Colin Gordon questioned the legality of using tax-increment

money to finance the project. Under Iowa law, one of tax-increment funds' uses is to rehabilitate a "blighted area." The lot was originally designated a blighted area in 1969; it was re-affirmed as such in December 2001.

Councilor Steven Kanner, who voted against the project, said he doesn't view that part of downtown as neglected or unsightly despite its designation.

"It's a very economically healthy area of downtown," he said.

Marc Moen of the Moen Group said that according to the agreement between his group and the city, the project must be completed by November 2005, with construction beginning sometime in 2003.

"We're prepared to move forward," he said, adding that additional work is required from the project's architects and engineers before construction can begin.

# UI breaks its record for external \$

Funding from that agency made up \$183.7 million — more than half of the total external funding — a 33.5 percent increase over last year.

The grants fund a variety of projects on campus spanning various interests and disciplines, from Associate Professor Johannes Hell's study of the molecular basis of neurological changes during aging to Associate Professor James Hall's study on how to properly treat drug abuse by rural youths.

Professor Jeffrey Murray is using the funds to study the causes of birth defects and how to prevent them. Murray brought in more than \$5.6 million last year, making him the UI employee who secured the most external funding.

He said his lab of 20 staff members are funded mainly through the NIH, but they also received grants from the Center for Disease Control and the Bill Gates Foundation. The grants the university receives are valuable for recruiting students as well as faculty and staff, Murray said.

"The more dollars that come in, the more opportunities students have," he said.

Contracts with industry amounted to the second-largest source of external funding, increasing by 5 percent to \$32.7 million. A hodgepodge of other sources, ranging from the Department of Education to NASA to private organizations, accounted for the rest. Grants from the Defense Department shot up 59 percent to \$5.1 million, but Skorton said the university had applied for most of its grants before Sept. 11.

Nicholas Colangelo, the director of the Belin-Blank Center, was the fourth-highest grant recipient. The center, which serves gifted and talented K-12 students, will use most of the \$4 million it received to develop the Iowa Online Advanced Placement Academy, Colangelo said. The six-year program provides every high-school student in Iowa with the opportunity to take college-level courses and receive credit free of charge, Colangelo said. After its first year in existence, the number of Iowa students taking the courses has tripled.

While university officials celebrated such successes Tuesday, they were at the same time wary to set a monetary goal for next fiscal year. Brian Harvey, an assistant vice president for Research, said he expects grant applications to increase by 12 percent, but he cautioned that years in which external funds increased are often followed with a drop.

Another uncertain is the amount of federal funding for the Health and Human Services. Last year, the department

received a 15 percent budget increase, which officials said helped UI researchers secure more grants.

Facing an erosion in state support of higher education, it will be difficult to sustain quality, said Derek Willard, a UI associate vice president for Research. The university has eliminated 315 positions, and that could translate into fewer employees going after grants.

"It would certainly weaken our hand," he said. "Without these people, we can't get funds."

Skorton said 1,000 university employees receive their salaries solely from research funding.

In the last 25 years that the records have been kept, the university has received \$4.09 billion in external revenue, with the last decrease occurring in 2000. The school ranks 18th among all public universities in federal support, according to statistics reported by the National Science Foundation in 2000.

Walding said after-hours alcohol violations are common statewide. There are now four pending cases of these infractions in Iowa, he said.

"If the incident occurs one or two minutes after 2 o'clock, we will probably not look at it," Walding said.

Robert Willert, the owner of Gabe's, said his establishment has not yet decided what action, if any, it will take. He said he still need to speak with lawyers.

Should the bar choose to schedule a hearing with the state regarding the after-hour sales, an administrative-law judge would rule on the matter.

Vito's, 118 E. College St., also faces a possible \$500 fine and 14-

day suspension of its liquor license following two alleged after-hours incidents April 2001. The club has appealed the decision, and it has until July 29 to file a brief so Walding can re-examine the incident.

Likewise, George's Buffet, 312 E. Market St., was charged with selling alcohol after 2 a.m. on April 20, 2001. The bar chose to pay a civil fine of \$500.

# Jury convicts officer of perjury

**Panel deadlocked on more serious civil-rights charge**

NEW YORK — A federal jury convicted a former policeman of perjury Tuesday but deadlocked on more serious civil-rights charges stemming from the 1997 police torture of Haitian immigrant Abner Louima in a stationhouse bathroom.

Charles Schwarz, 36, was found guilty of lying under oath

by denying that he escorted Louima toward the bathroom after the man's arrest in a street brawl. He faces up to five years in prison at his sentencing Sept. 20.

Jurors deliberated for six days before telling U.S. District Judge Reena Raggi they were deadlocked on the two civil-rights charges and a second perjury count.

Reached at his home in Miami Lakes, Fla., a disappointed Louima said of Schwarz: "I know he's guilty, and he should be found guilty on all counts."

Outside court, U.S. Attorney Alan Vinegrad said the government was prepared to retry Schwarz on the three charges,

which alleged Schwarz held down Louima as another officer sodomized him with a broken broomstick and then lied by saying he wasn't there.

"We are as confident today of his guilt on these charges as we were years ago," Vinegrad said.

Defense attorney Ronald Fischetti said the verdict should persuade the government to drop the case. Said Schwarz: "The truth is on my side. I was never in that bathroom. I'll fight this as long as I have to."

An attorney for Louima, Peter Neufeld, said his client would testify against Schwarz again if necessary.

She feels that Game Time is a great warm up for the Big Ten season.


"I think it's a good opportunity for our players to learn to play together, stay in shape, and work on our skills," she said.

## Iverson finally arrested, arraigned

PHILADELPHIA — Allen Iverson was arraigned Tuesday on charges he stormed into a cousin's apartment with a gun and threatened two men while looking for his wife. He was released on \$10,000 bond after 11 hours in custody.

Wearing a white T-shirt, a haggard-looking Iverson appeared in court via closed-circuit TV as he sat in a detention block at police headquarters.

No plea was entered for the 76ers' star guard, although Iverson's lawyer told the court his client would plead not guilty.

The brief hearing came after a long day behind bars for Iverson, who surrendered about 5:30 a.m. to face charges of assault, making threats and carrying a gun without a license.

Though the charges against the 27-year-old, three-time All-Star carry a maximum sentence of more than 50 years, lawyers not involved in the case said Iverson is unlikely to serve jail time even if convicted.

He appeared on screen for about three minutes and did not speak, except to answer "yes" to acknowledge his presence when called on by bail commissioner Abraham Polokoff.

Iverson was whisked away from police headquarters minutes after Polokoff ordered him released on unsecured bond pending a July 22 court appearance. He wasn't required to post any money, but he would be liable for the cash if he failed to appear in court.

The court set no restrictions on his movements while he awaits trial.

"The plea Mr. Iverson [will enter] is a very strong and definite 'not guilty.' I want everybody to hear that loud and clear," said his attorney, Richard Sprague.

Iverson left his \$2.4 million home in suburban Philadelphia before dawn in a convoy of SUVs and a minivan. The tempestuous guard had been confined there since July 11.

His arrest created a circus atmosphere outside headquarters. Hordes of reporters and photographers awaited news, fans gathered to show support, children sold lemonade, and an outlandish group of radio-station listeners chanted "Free A.I. Free A.I." through a bullhorn.

Iverson was fingerprinted and photographed, and he took his place in a long line to appear before the bail commissioner. Police said he was separated from other prisoners but got no special attention.

"He's known nationally. He's known globally. So obviously, there is a safety factor if you put him in a room with another prisoner," said William Colarulo, a police inspector.

No matter the outcome in

## Tiger faces all but Open questions

GULLANE, Scotland — Tiger Woods was vague, his answers repetitive. For the first time at a major championship, he seemed unprepared and uncomfortable when handling a topic that was bound to come up at Muirfield.

His pursuit of the Grand Slam?

Nope.

What he thinks about Augusta National not having any women as members — and the fact the British Open is held at a course where women aren't even allowed in the clubhouse.

"It's one of those things where

everyone has ... they're entitled to set up their own rules the way they want them," Woods said Tuesday.

"It would be nice to see everyone have an equal chance to participate if they wanted to, but there's nothing you can do about it."

Woods said he would feel the same way if such golf clubs had no blacks or Asians.

"It's unfortunate," he said. "But it's just the way it is."

A controversy over Augusta National's male-only membership unfurled last week when club chairman Hootie Johnson angrily responded to a national women's group that demanded

female members by next year's Masters.

"There may well come a day when women will be invited to join our membership, but that timetable will be ours and not at the point of a bayonet," he said.

While Johnson says Augusta does not have exclusionary membership policies, the club did not have a black member until 1990 and has never had a female member in its 70 years.

Muirfield has a wee bit more history. The Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers has been around since 1744 — making it 32 years older than the

court, Iverson faces possible action from NBA Commissioner David Stern, who has suspended him in the past. Under the NBA's collective-bargaining agreement, Iverson would be automatically suspended for a minimum of 10 games if convicted of a "violent felony." Stern could also take more drastic action. Stern also has the authority to fine or suspend the star even if the charges are dropped, based on a standard conduct clause in players' contracts. "If he finds that Allen or any player engaged in conduct detrimental to the league, he can do that," Frank said. "It's too premature to speculate." New York Knicks guard Latrell Sprewell was suspended for the final 68 games of the

1997-98 season for choking coach P.J. Carlesimo during an altercation at practice when both were with the Golden State Warriors. Iverson was suspended for the first game of the 1997-98 season after pleading no contest to a gun charge after police near Richmond, Va., that summer stopped a car in which he was a passenger and found a gun belonging to Iverson and two marijuana cigarettes. The Sixers have been in contact with the league office to discuss Iverson, but the club won't comment further until the matter is resolved. "We stand by our statement that we support Allen," spokeswoman Karen Frasca said. "We don't condone his actions if they are true, but we have to let the judicial system make the decision." General manager Billy King

didn't return messages Tuesday, and coach Larry Brown was vacationing in California. Vice President Dave Coskey said Iverson's situation hasn't affected ticket sales, but it is too early to make a determination. The Sixers were fifth in attendance last season, setting a franchise record with 25 sellouts. "Allen is a big part of it, but he is a part of it," Coskey said. Iverson has three years remaining on his contract and is due to make \$40.5 million. His contract could be voided by the Sixers in the unlikely event they waived him. Sprague, a former Philadelphia prosecutor who has represented F. # Els, field wary of Woods

**GULLANE, Scotland** — Nothing is wrong with admitting the obvious.

Tiger Woods is tough to beat. Ernie Els is considered one of his top challengers, a big man with a graceful swing and two U.S. Open titles.

He has beaten Woods three times and lost twice as often when both of them were in the hunt.

But to hear the Big Easy describe his chances at Muirfield this week in the British Open, some might have thought he was rehearsing his concession speech.

"When I've played well, Tiger still has beaten me," Els said. "What do you do? I work hard at everything in my game. When I've had it going, I still got beat. Maybe I'm not good enough, then. Who knows?"

This is not resignation, this is realization.

Two years ago in Hawaii was a rarity in these times — two world-class players on top of their games, slugging it out over the final 36 holes. Els erased a four-stroke deficit against Woods in the third round, and Sunday was a classic.

The lead changed seven times. Neither player led by more than one stroke. Both made eagle on the 18th hole to force a playoff. Both made birdie on the first extra hole.

It finally ended when Woods holed a birdie putt on No. 1 at Kapalua's Plantation course that the locals have never seen anyone make — a 40-footer

from above the hole, downhill, into the grain, with approximately 3 feet of break.

Woods then won the Memorial by five strokes. He won the U.S. Open by 12 strokes. He won the British Open by eight strokes.

Els was the runner-up in all three of them, king of the B-flight.

"You can beat the field," Els said. "But it doesn't mean you're going to beat Tiger."

Davis Love III has won twice with Woods in the field — the PGA Championship at Winged Foot and the Pebble Beach National Pro-Am last year — but not when Woods has been breathing down his neck.

He lost 5 and 4 to Woods in the semifinals of the Match Play Championship two years ago. A month later, he was

two strokes behind going into the final round of the Bay Hill Invitational when he offered a blunt assessment of his chances.

"He's No. 1. There's no getting around that," Love said. "And he's tough to beat. There's no getting around that."

"[Jack] Nicklaus was a lot like Tiger today," Lee Trevino said Monday night. "He set the bar so high, we went into a golf tournament thinking if we could beat Jack, we'd have a great chance to win."

That's what Trevino did at Muirfield in 1972 — barely.

He had a one-stroke lead over Tony Jacklin going into the last round of the British Open and was six strokes clear of Nicklaus, who was going for

the third leg of the Grand Slam.

Trevino knew Nicklaus was capable of a Sunday charge and said to Jacklin on the first tee, "He can catch one of us, but not both of us."

Trevino chipped in for par on the 17th hole for a one-stroke victory over Nicklaus, denying him a shot at the slam.

Els knows what Woods is capable of this week at Muirfield.

"He's going for the Grand Slam," he said. "You know he's going to be in contention this week. You can beat the field by a couple of shots, but you might not beat Tiger at the end of the day. It seems like he's there every time."

"Even if he's not playing very well, he's still going to be there. If he's only five behind, there's always the feeling he can get something going."

That's why Woods already has won eight major championships and why Els is stuck on two, none since the '97 U.S. Open at Congressional.

Els had hopes of winning them all back then. Sure, Woods had won the Masters that year by 12 strokes in his first major as a pro, but no one was sure what to expect.


"I felt very comfortable I would win all four [majors] at least once," Els said. "It's still a goal of mine, but it's changed a little bit now. Before '97, it was looking pretty good because Tiger wasn't around then."

"It's going to be a lot more difficult than I thought."

At least he has his two.

"This guy is just a totally different talent than the world has ever seen. In a way, I'm kind of glad I'm playing in this era. And in another way," Els said with an easy grin, "I'm unhappy I'm playing in this era."

The truth can hurt.

United States and a decade older than the Royal & Ancient Golf Club, which runs the British Open. Women can play Muirfield as guests, just as they can at Augusta National.

One difference is that Augusta National owns the Masters, while the R&A only conducts the British Open at a rotation of courses in Scotland and England.

Asked whether he was concerned that Muirfield excluded women as members, R&A secretary Peter Dawson said, "We take the Open to the best links in the British Isles."

"We don't regard social engineering as part of our remit," he said.

When Woods was asked whether he could use his stature as the biggest star in golf to influence change, he said he has done his part through the Tiger Woods Foundation to involve more kids in golf who did not have access.

"It would be nice to see every golf course open to everyone who wanted to participate, but that's just not where society is," Woods said. "If you just pigeonholed this single issue, I think you're not doing justice in the bigger scope, and I think there are a lot of other things that go into it. It's just not that simple."

Woods felt much more comfortable inside the ropes at Muirfield, where he turned in another sharp practice round on a surprisingly still, misty day along the Firth of Forth.

For now, Woods is far more

interested in denying equal rights to players who want to win a major championship this year.

He has owned the majors lately. Not only is he the first player since Jack Nicklaus in 1972 to win the Masters and the U.S. Open in the same year, Woods has won seven of the last 11 majors.

However, this is his longest break from competitive golf before a major, brought on by flu-like symptoms that caused him to skip the Western Open in Chicago.

Woods isn't worried. "It wasn't like I was playing poorly," he said. "My practice rounds have gone very well, and I'm pleased with the way I'm hitting the golf ball right now. I don't foresee a problem."

#### Estate executor says Williams changed mind

INVERNESS, Fla. (AP) — The family feud over Ted Williams' body deepened Tuesday when his will showed he wanted to be cremated, while the executor of his estate said the slugger later decided to be frozen.

In the will that was filed and made public Tuesday, Williams said he wanted his ashes "sprinkled at sea off the coast of Florida where the water is very deep."

But after he wrote his will on Dec. 20, 1996, the Hall of Famer expressed a desire to have his body frozen, said the executor, Albert Cassidy.

"After the time of his will, Ted chose to have his body cryonically preserved," Cassidy said. He presented no documents to support his statement and refused to say how he knew of Williams' wish to be frozen.

Along with the will, Cassidy filed a petition asking a judge that Williams' body remain in a cryonics lab in Arizona. Cassidy wrote he "is in doubt as to whether any change in the disposition of this decedent's body is required."

Richard Fitzpatrick, an attorney for Williams' oldest daughter, Bobby-Jo Williams Ferrell, said Cassidy offered nothing to back his claim that Williams wanted to be frozen indefinitely.

"I know the will is clear, even

though the personal representative says something else," Fitzpatrick said.

The conflict between Williams' will and his later wishes came hours after his three children admitted they failed to resolve a stalemate over their father's remains, perhaps setting the stage for a contentious court battle over the will.

Bobby-Jo Williams Ferrell "remains convinced that her father's last wishes were to be cremated and to have his ashes spread over the deep waters off the coast of Florida," Fitzpatrick said.

#### Kile autopsy confirms blocked arteries

CHICAGO — St. Louis Cardinals pitcher Darryl Kile died from a blockage of the arteries supplying the heart; there was no evidence that drugs contributed to his death, Cook County's coroner said Tuesday.

"This is a natural cause of death," Edmund Donoghue, the county's chief medical examiner, said in a statement.

Toxicology tests did show evidence of marijuana use, although it was probably weeks before and was not a factor in Kile's death, Donoghue said. Tests were negative on steroids, alcohol, cocaine, and ephedrine, a substance commonly found in dietary supplements banned by some sports.

Kile, 33, had a 90 percent block-

age in two of three coronary arteries, Donoghue said, confirming his preliminary analysis shortly after the death. He also had an enlarged heart and a blood clot in one of the coronary arteries. Donoghue said the artery blockage likely triggered a fatal irregular heartbeat.

#### Purdue wide receiver fractures skull in fall

INDIANAPOLIS — Purdue wide receiver Taylor Stubblefield is recovering from a fractured skull suffered when he fell from a fence on July 4.

Stubblefield did not see a doctor until suffering headaches later that day and speaking with his older brother, his father Mel Stubblefield told the *Indianapolis Star* for a story Tuesday.

Taylor Stubblefield led Purdue with 73 catches for 910 yards last season as a redshirt freshman.

"He's going to need some people's prayers and some luck," Mel Stubblefield said from his home in Yakima, Wash. "If his body heals, he's got a good chance to return to his previous form. But if he had to play tomorrow, he couldn't do it."

#### Armstrong still favored in mountain stage

BORDEAUX, France — Is Lance Armstrong losing speed, or is he preparing another spectacular assault on the Tour de France?

The three-time champion used Tuesday's rest day to recover from his first loss in a major individual time trial on the Tour since 1999, the year he first won the event.

But if his form in this week's mountain stages compares with that of recent years, Armstrong should cruise to a fourth-straight title.

"I have mixed feelings heading to the mountains," Armstrong said. "The time trial was a disappointment, even though I'm satisfied to have gained time on the real climbers."

The opening mountain stage is a trek from Pau to La Mongie, high in the Pyrenees, on Thursday.

Armstrong was careful in 2001 not to fall behind his big rival, Germany's Jan Ullrich, before the mountains. Ullrich is missing from this edition because of injury, leaving Gonzalez Galdeano one of the few riders able to challenge Armstrong.

#### Cubs, Cards schedule game for Aug. 31

CHICAGO — The St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs will play a day-night double-header Aug. 31 to make up the game canceled when Darryl Kile died.

It will be the first day-night double-header at Wrigley Field.

The park will be emptied after the first game, which will start at 12:05 p.m. CDT, and the second game will begin at 7:05 p.m.

# Selig accused of wire, mail fraud

NEW YORK — Baseball's contraction plan sparked another lawsuit Tuesday, with former minority partners of the Expos accusing Commissioner Bud Selig with mail and wire fraud.

In a 45-page federal complaint filed in Miami under the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, the 14 minority owners accused Selig and former Expos owner Jeffrey Loria of conspiring for more than two years to eliminate Montreal.

They asked that the Expos be placed in trust and said if baseball officials try to move or fold the team, they would seek an injunction.

"From the beginning of Mr. Loria's involvement with the Expos, he and his co-conspirators engaged in a scheme that had as its object the destruction of baseball in Montreal, so Mr. Loria and his co-conspirators could justify relocating the franchise to the United States," the owners said in the complaint.

They accused Loria and his staff of conduct "that effectively destroyed the economic viability of baseball in Montreal [that] included removing the Expos from local television, subverting well-developed plans for a new baseball stadium in downtown Montreal, purposefully alienating Expos' sponsors and investors, abandoning agreed-upon financial plans for the

franchise, and undermining a planned recapitalization of the franchise that would have added new partners."

Bob DuPuy, baseball's chief operating officer, called the suit "frivolous" and "a shameless attempt to obtain through publicity what they know they are not entitled to legally."

DuPuy said the commissioner's office "will seek sanctions against those responsible for bringing these baseless claims." "They told us that they did not oppose the contraction of the Montreal Expos, as long as they got paid out, but that they did not want public blame for the team's relocation or contraction," DuPuy said.

The suit contends that Loria and Marlins President David Samson conspired with baseball officials to dilute minority partners' share of the team from 76 percent to 6-7 percent and never intended to keep the franchise in Montreal.

Baseball says the partners' share was decreased because they refused to put up additional money Loria asked for in "cash calls" permitted by the partnership agreement.

"It is ironic that these partners are now claiming to be so committed to baseball in Montreal when they were unwilling to fund a penny of operating losses since 1991 and instead directed 'fire sales' of players during the 1990s," said Loria, who called the claims "completely without merit."
