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## UI tests online plagiarism police

Cheaters beware. Twenty UI professors are testing out a new online tool this semester that detects plagiarism in papers. Turnitin.com evaluates each paper, highlighting and underlining material that is found in its extensive database. The site will send a report back to the instructor with a

list of links, each leading directly to the material in question, which is color-coded to indicate the severity of the problem.

Lola Lopes, the university's associate provost for undergraduate education, said observations among professors suggest that the availability and popularity of the Internet has made plagiarism easier and more prevalent. "We are using it on an experi-

mental basis," Lopes said about the Web site. "There has been a lot of concern about plagiarism, and this is a tool we want to take a look at."

University officials say that if they are impressed with the program, they will sign up the entire university, which would cost approximately \$12,000 per year.

Political science Professor Alfonso Damico, one of the instructors participating in the

pilot test of the system, noted that the temptations inherent in the Internet increase the need for such programs as Turnitin.com.

"With the increasing use of the Internet, students are perhaps innocently or perhaps deliberately using material found on the Internet and presenting it as their own," he said.

## Gunmen kill U.S. Marine

DOHA, Qatar — Gunmen opened fire Tuesday on U.S. Marines conducting an urban-warfare exercise on a Kuwaiti island, killing one American and wounding another in an attack highlighting growing tensions in the Arab world as the United States prepares for a possible attack on Iraq.

The Marines, based at Camp Pendleton, Calif., returned fire with their M-16s and killed the two gunmen. Kuwait declared the attackers to be terrorists but did not immediately tie them to any specific group.

Pentagon officials said security would be increased at all U.S. bases in the region but did not say whether they regarded the shooting as a terrorist attack.

Gen. Richard Myers, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, met with other senior military officials and spoke by phone with commanders of

U.S. forces in the region to discuss other possible responses, a Pentagon spokesman said.

The attack was highly unusual in Kuwait, a close Washington ally since the 1991 Persian Gulf War. More than a decade later, most Kuwaitis remain supportive of the close relationship. However, analysts said that even in Kuwait, moderate Muslims feel caught in the middle between their more radical brethren and the United States.

The Kuwait government identified the two gunmen as Kuwaiti citizens Anas Kari, born in 1981, and Jassan Hajiri, born in 1976, and described them as Islamic extremists. The Interior Ministry declared that it "will not allow anyone to undermine the country's security." Friends and associates of the pair were being rounded up for questioning.

## Housing tight for visiting scholars, UI says

UI officials say they need more places to house visiting scholars, but they do not have the money to purchase them.

The result is that some researchers and instructors who work at the UI for a few months or a semester are forced to find their own housing. Others sit on a waiting list for the school's 18 temporary-housing units. Short-termers often stay in the Iowa House.

Offering university housing is seen as a key recruiting tool for

these visitors, who are typically key additions to departments because the scholars offer expertise in areas in which the UI may be lacking.

Visiting scholars must be planning to stay in Iowa City for two months to one semester to reside in university housing, where they pay \$550 to \$700 per month in rent for the furnished one- and two-bedroom duplexes and apartments.

"As an outsider, I was obviously concerned with where I would be living," said James Hatch, who came to Iowa City in August from

New York to help the theater department perform a play. He rents one of the UI's properties.

Hatch said he found the housing a relief while he was preparing to uproot himself from New York and that he would recommend the UI's housing program to any traveling faculty member.

But instead of purchasing more properties, university officials are relying on an online clearinghouse that tries to set up the visitors with potential domiciles.

"Through the Web site, we try to facilitate communication

between renters and property owners," said Jane Holland, the university's family services coordinator.

Her department created the Web site two years ago to provide listings of private homes, in-home apartments, guest houses, and short-term leases for potential renters. It is a place where visiting faculty turned away by the university can go.

The university sees approximately five applications per

## City delays vacating road near new UI building

The UI will have to wait another six months for the Iowa City Council to reconsider surrendering a small road that plays a significant role in the development of the university's Athletics Learning Center.

The council put off deciding whether to abandon Grand Avenue Court to a line 295 feet north of Melrose Avenue for the learning center's construction, allowing the city and university time to conduct a road study. The postponement passed 4-3, with councilors Steven Kanner,

Ross Wilburn, Dee Vanderhoef, and Irvin Pfab voting to wait.

"I don't really have a firm answer as to how this could affect us," Wilburn said at Tuesday's formal meeting, echoing the sentiments of those who voted with him. Councilors will not determine the content or scope they want for the study until a future meeting. The study would examine

different possible effects of re-routing traffic with various road expansions and changes in the area and how they will affect both the surrounding area and city. Deferring the decision will not affect construction on the Athletics Learning Center, but if the council backs out of vacating the road at its next consideration, the university will need to

decide how to channel pedestrians through the area, said campus planner Larry Wilson.

"I think we'll be OK," he said, adding that a traffic study could be completed in the six-month period. "We have every intention of cooperating with the city."

The council's decision came as university officials consented to sign a binding agreement that would require it to preserve a nearby historic house by the city's historic-preservation standards.



# 1st finalist for medical dean visits

A commitment to excellence in research and a host of highly talented faculty are the reasons why Richard Walsh said he has his sights set on becoming the next dean of the UI Carver College of Medicine.

If selected, he said he will bring his personality along with him — "warm, fuzzy, and approachable."

The avid runner, big-game fisher, and father of two remained poised during an open forum Tuesday, fielding a series of questions from university community members that ranged from the recently proposed 19 percent tuition/fee hike to women's health-care initiatives.

"Tuition is a national problem on both the graduate and undergraduate levels," Walsh said. "Setting up an educational endowment to offer students scholarships is one way to address rising fees."

In a laid-back posture, he said the university is in a unique position having the only medical school in the state and accounting for nearly half the state's physicians. This gives the UI an opportunity to address issues of

research funding and economic development with state legislators, he said.

"It is important to constantly remind the government and the state what the university is doing," Walsh said.

He said he likes the training medical-school students receive, such as ambulatory teaching and video conferencing, making them life-learners rather than "robots of repository."


Walsh is the first of four finalists vying for the post — a position that drew in more than 100 applicants since the search began nearly nine months ago.

"He combines very solid basic research background in molecular cardiology," said Robert Daroff, the chief of staff at University Hospitals of Cleveland and Walsh's longtime colleague. "We'd hate to see him go..."

Walsh would bring more than 25 years of experience in medicine to the UI. He would replace Robert Kelch, who has served as the medical-school dean and the vice president for Statewide Health Services since December 2001.

"He's a very well-qualified candidate," Kelch said.

Walsh serves as a professor of

cardiology and the chairman of the Department of Medicine at Case Western Reserve University. He has been physician-in-chief at University Hospitals in Cleveland since February 1999. He is also the editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Molecular Cell Cardiology*, the

official journal of the International Society for Heart Research.

He received his bachelor's and medical degrees from Georgetown University and completed postdoctoral work as a cardiology fellow.

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# Finding comfort in coming out

The UI Counseling Service will host an informational program on issues facing gay men tonight to support those who are coming out.

In concert with National Coming Out Week, Paula Keeton, a counseling-service senior staff psychologist, and Scott Shiebler, a psychology intern, will lead the discussion at 7 p.m. in the IMU Hoover Room. The event, where audience members will share personal experiences and advice, is open to the public.

Coming out for gay and bisexual men is a difficult process, Keeton said, adding that tonight's discussion will help those in attendance to find a safe and supportive community.

"The first level is coming out to yourself," she said. "After that you say, 'OK, now what?' That 'Now what?' is what this meeting is all about."

The main points will address reactions from family and friends, she said, noting that a lot of men are unsure whether it is safe to confide in those close to them.

"A lot of people don't have any guidance or have examples of what to do," Shiebler said. "It's a risk if they aren't accepted because they have to recreate everything."

UI senior Patrick Erdley said it was hard to tell friends and family he is gay because he did not know how they would react. He recently came out to his parents.

"Even if you know somebody really well, he or she can do a total 180 on you," he said.

Rachel Tell, a member of the UI Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender Allied Union, said the worst issue to face when first coming out is the feeling of isolation. Getting over that is a big step, she said.

"I think this [meeting] is a really great idea. Something like this can really be empowering," she said.

Tell said men have historically been more passive about establishing resources and often deal with issues on their own.

The meeting will focus largely on men because there are not as many groups and organizations for gay men locally as there are for women, Keeton said. Because the issues experienced are somewhat similar for both sexes, the counseling service would be open to discussing women's issues, she said.

Keeton and Shiebler will also discuss social opportunities for gay men. Shiebler, who has just joined the counseling staff, said there are a lot of gay men who use the counseling service and say they find it difficult to fit into the gay community.

"Being gay has always been hush-hush," Erdley said. "This is great that they are going to be talking about it."

### Couple charged with domestic assault

Two North Liberty residents who were in a relationship within the past year were arrested and charged early Tuesday with domestic assault causing injury after a fight in their residence.

Johnson County sheriff's deputies responded to an alleged fight between Christine Marie Richter, 39, and Larry Dean Hillier, 55, shortly after midnight. Richter and Hillier were arguing but had stopped "wrestling on the floor" when deputies arrived, court records show. Each claimed the other was the main aggressor, records show.

Richter had redness and numerous scratches around her neck, and both had cuts, scrapes, and abrasions, records show.

Richter was released on her own recognizance with travel restricted to Iowa and given a no-contact order with Hillier. Her preliminary hearing is set for Sept. 28 in Johnson County District Court.

Hillier was being held in the Johnson County Jail Tuesday evening on a \$2,500 cash-only bond. He also was issued a no-contact order.

### Man charged with 2nd-degree robbery

An Iowa City man was arrested and charged Monday with second-degree robbery and a probation violation for his alleged part in a violent mugging.

Ryan David Ramirez, 23, 2450 Aster Ave., allegedly attacked one of his friends with two unidentified accomplices on Sept. 24. He allegedly punched the man on the

left side of his face, knocking him to the ground at the intersection of Lakeside Drive and Aster Street, court records show. He and his accomplices then allegedly continued to hit the man when he was on the ground before stealing around \$120 from his wallet, records show.

The man, whom court records did not identify, went to a hospital and reported multiple concussions and a fractured jaw, police said.

Ramirez's preliminary hearing is set for Oct. 18 in Johnson County District Court. He was being held in the Johnson County Jail on Tuesday evening on a \$25,000 cash-only bond.

Second-degree robbery is a Class C felony punishable by a maximum of 10 years in prison and a fine between \$500 and \$10,000.

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## Proposed center to follow stages of students' careers

Proposed designs for a UI facility that could potentially guide students from their first campus visits to their first employers will be presented to the state Board of Regents next week.

The Pomerantz Center's proposed lay-out would reflect the different stages students move through at the university, said Beverly Robalino, a senior architect in the Facilities Services Group. The center's first floor would hold the admissions/visitors center, the second would comprise the Academic Advising Center, the third the Career Center, and the fourth the executive M.B.A. program.

The Pomerantz Center would also feature a four-story atrium space, a 400-seat auditorium in the lower level to replace one in the Chemistry Building, and a tunnel to the Blank Honors Center.

Construction of the four-story, 69,855-square-foot building, to be located west of Old Brick and east of the Chemistry Building, is slated to start May 2003.

The center's concept began with university officials' requests for a better location for the Career Center, now housed in Phillips Hall. The new site will allow for several related programs, currently spread across campus, to be under the same roof.

The purpose of the Career Center is to recruit potential employers for liberal-arts undergraduates and graduate business students and to help students search for jobs, said Gary Fethke, the dean of the Tippie College of Business.

"Can you think of a better

thing to tell parents?" he said. "We're going to help their children get into the labor market."

Marvin Pomerantz, a 1952 graduate of the business school who donated \$10 million to the \$13 million project, supported the notion that the university would benefit from a career center, Fethke said.

Although the university already has scores of companies coming to campus to recruit, they hope that number will increase because of the convenient location of the Pomerantz Center and the university's efforts to help students find employment, Fethke said.

"We're doing a lot to make Iowa an attractive place to employers," he said.

The regents, who first approved the building last year, will see the design proposal Oct. 17. Construction is expected to take a year and a half, culminating in late 2004. Work on the Blank Honors Center, in the same block as the future site for the Pomerantz Center, will end in September 2004.

## Domestic-violence program 'shocked' by state funds cut

Counseling programs for victims of domestic violence may be in danger after the Iowa Attorney General's office took \$2.5 million of their funds to help cover an unstable state budget.

The Legislature made the 100 percent cut for domestic-violence counseling programs, which use the funding for rent and supplies, said Kris Kinkead, the executive director of the Domestic Violence Intervention Program in Iowa City. That compares with cuts of nearly 25 percent made to all other state services this year.

"We were shocked, because we felt singled out," Kinkead said. "We were the only program that lost all of its funding."

The domestic-violence program is the only one of its kind in Johnson County; it also serves Cedar, Jones, and Washington counties. However, a lack of staff has forced a decrease in the program's availability in the other counties from seven-day, 24-hour assistance to three-days-a-week emergency care.

The service provides shelter and counseling for more than 1,200 victims of domestic abuse each year. Among other services are a 24-hour confidential hotline for victims and people who want to report cases of domestic violence and a response team that helps work on domestic-violence court cases.

Because the program's funding was removed from the state budget, the organization has collected \$70,808 from a separate state compensation fund, which normally is only used for court fees and other legal needs for domestic-violence victims, said Marty

Anderson, the director of Crime Victim Assistance in the Attorney General's office. She said that the money for this fund comes from criminal penalties and restitution.

The attorney general's office allotted \$2.5 million from the compensation fund to disperse among approximately 70 domestic-violence and rape victims' groups statewide. The groups received equal shares between \$50,000 and \$70,000. In the past, the fund has contributed no more than \$250,000 total to the groups.

The local domestic-violence program is relying entirely on its share, which is 15 percent less than the more than \$80,000 it usually receives from the state.

"The funding we received ... definitely saved us this year," Kinkead said. "The bad part is, if we can't get the money from the budget next year, we can't collect from this fund again."

The Rape Crisis Hotline of

Iowa City received approximately \$60,000, which is similar to programs in Sioux City and Waterloo, Anderson said.

Kinkead said the domestic-violence program has scheduled a meeting to discuss the possibility of layoffs, a decision to be made by the end of the fiscal year. In the meantime, she said, the program is planning to increase fund raising, which now includes a Super Bowl function and a golf tournament. Fund-raisers make up 10 percent of agency's budget.

The program's volunteers said they also plan on doing some aggressive political work, including sending a letter to the Legislature asking to get the money back, she said.

"[The domestic-violence program] could be in trouble if it doesn't get this money back from the Legislature," Anderson said.

## Junk-food ads in schools raises ire

Local students say junk-food commercials broadcast during daily TV programming in Iowa City schools teach bad eating habits and directly conflict with the district's nutrition policy.

Four City High students expressed their concerns about the Channel One advertisements to the Iowa City School Board during its meeting Tuesday night. The board deferred discussion on the use of the student news program, which is intended to teach current events to junior-high schoolers, until a retreat scheduled for Oct. 19-20.

"This is a particularly difficult issue because teachers who use Channel One say the news portion is very valuable," said board President Lauren Reece.

The high schoolers said forcing students to watch the 12-minute program makes them a captive audience for two minutes of commercials advertising junk food and video games.

"The hypocrisy of forcing kids to watch commercials for Snickers and Skittles and then teaching them how to make nutritious choices is almost hilarious but very disturbing," said City High junior David Heckman.

Students said there are commercial-free alternatives available to Channel One news — a show they deemed "laughable" and not intellectually stimulating.

"The difference between CNN Student News, a 30-minute program provided free to schools, and Channel One is CNN does not provide free TVs to schools," said City High senior Dave Allen.

The district uses approximately 70 TVs it obtained for free from the initial contract with Channel One in Southeast and Northwest Junior Highs. Students said an estimate from

Hawkeye Audio & Video puts the cost of replacing the TVs at approximately \$16,000.

"For \$16,000, we have sold our kids as an effective marketing tool for Channel One, and that bothers me," said board member Matt Goodlaxson.

Students addressed the School Board after being denied the chance to speak at four meetings of the nutrition task force, a 15-member group convened to improve student health. Task-force members, however, have said they were told by school administrators not to address Channel One because the issue is commercial, not nutritional.

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The School Board had twice referred the students to the task force to express their concerns.

"The chairwoman of the committee said that she would not allow anyone else to speak," said City High senior Ben Solow.

#### Councilor Kanner removed from panel

The Iowa City City Council removed Councilor Steven Kanner from a county board Tuesday, saying he had violated a city voting policy.

While serving on Johnson County Council of Government on Aug. 8, Kanner voted against a street arterial plan that the council had already approved. He said he does not yet know whether he will appeal his dismissal.

The resolution passed 5-2, with Kanner and Councilor Irvin Pfab voting against the decision. Pfab proposed postponing the vote until Dec. 10 to give the "charged atmosphere" time to cool, but the idea was defeated 5-2.

The action is not meant to stifle minority opinions, councilors said. "I think it's important that he voices his ideas," said Councilor Connie Champion. "He can state he doesn't like it in the meeting, but he still has to vote in accordance with the council's decisions."

# UI panel notes complaints with facilities services, tries solutions

The committee released 24 recommendations in its May 2001 report to address issues ranging from understaffing to "shoddy" contract work that led to poor construction jobs, including a 1999 incident in which improperly constructed pipes at Mayflower Residence Hall pumped sewage into the Iowa River.

"Within [Facilities Services Group], over the past few years, reorganization of building-maintenance operations has resulted in a perception that workers are overloaded and buildings are insufficiently

maintained [e.g., more than 20 minutes for evacuation notification in response to an emergency leak of gas]," the report states. "Work by outside contractors is sometimes perceived as 'shoddy,' and their supervision by [facilities services] personnel as variable to a disturbing degree."

The report notes that the facilities services, a division of Finance, sometimes seems to side with contractors against building users to save face, failing to consider what's best for the university.

The group's practice of almost always accepting the lowest bid for construction work leads to construction periods that take longer than expected, the report

shows. Final costs reportedly exceeded expectations in some cases.

Facilities services also came under fire for poorly communicating with faculty, staff, students, and residents about construction jobs, at times not informing people when "substantially" changing the environment around their homes. The group was called on to "redouble" its efforts to work with the community and monitor problem contractors.

Recently, members of the Iowa City City Council expressed frustration with the university's request for the city to vacate Grand Avenue Court during construction of a new Athletics Learning Center.

True and facilities-services representatives declined to comment for this story, saying they did not want to discuss anything until after the meeting.

The committee suggested that Finance publicize its goals to more effectively let the public know its intentions. The department now publishes such information on its Web site, [www.bo.uiowa.edu](http://www.bo.uiowa.edu).

The committee interviewed 100 members of the university community, including the president, provost, vice presidents, deans, Finance personnel, and student representatives.

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# U.S. Marine killed by 2 Kuwaiti gunmen

Thirty-one unarmed Kuwaiti civilians in the area of the exercise on Failaka Island, 10 miles east of Kuwait City, were taken into custody by the Marines as witnesses and turned over to local authorities for questioning, said a Navy spokesman in Bahrain, the military's regional hub for Persian Gulf operations.

"The two gunmen were in a vehicle that got close to the training," said the spokesman, Lt. Christopher Davis. "They got close, jumped out, and opened fire without any warning or provocation."

Davis said the Marines were using dummy rounds when they were attacked, and they shifted to live rounds to defend themselves. Three AK-47 assault rifles and a cache of ammunition were found in the attackers' pickup truck, officials said.

The wounded Marines were taken by helicopter to a military hospital used by U.S. personnel on the Kuwait mainland, where one died during surgery. The dead Marine's name was withheld pending notification of family. The injured Marine suffered an arm wound that is not considered to be life-threatening, Davis said.

The 150 Marines in the training exercise were withdrawn from the island after the shootings and sent to an encampment in the desert.

The Marines were among 1,000 combat Marines from the 11th Marine Expeditionary Unit from Camp Pendleton who are in Kuwait for a month-long training exercise called Eager Mace.

anticipation of a possible land offensive in Iraq.

Among the equipment being positioned are tanks and Bradley fighting vehicles, the kind of gear used by Army combat troops.

In recent months, the Pentagon has moved or announced plans to move another 10,000 troops to the region, officially to conduct routine training exercises. But military officials acknowledge that the additional troops may remain in the area for longer than their exercise schedules call for.

The shootings followed by less than two weeks an incident in which two men in a jeep, carrying a machine gun and many rounds of ammunition, tried to position their vehicle amid a convoy of American military vehicles along a Kuwait freeway.

The two were arrested by local authorities but released after saying that they were on their way to a bird hunt in the desert. Local authorities described them as being drunk.

There have been other recent incidents targeting Americans in neighboring countries, including a violent demonstration outside the U.S. Embassy in Bahrain. Gunmen also opened fire outside a U.S. air base under construction in Qatar. No one was hurt in either of those incidents.

**The two gunmen were in a vehicle that got close to the training. They got close, jumped out, and opened fire without any warning or provocation.**

The exercise, including live-fire training in the desert frontier between Iraq and Kuwait, had been scheduled for months. But it has taken on added significance and received added media attention in light of President Bush's threat to use military force against Saddam Hussein.

The Marine exercise is the latest show of U.S. military muscle in the region. As tensions with Iraq have mounted, the U.S. has shifted weaponry and munitions from bases in Qatar and Saudi Arabia to bases in Kuwait in

In addition, senior Defense officials say elite Special Operations troops last month began training alongside CIA units that could be used in covert counterterrorism operations within Iraq.

For much of the past decade, the Pentagon has based more than 20,000 American military personnel within close striking distance of Iraq, along with heavy equipment for at least four armored brigades and Patriot antimissile batteries to protect them.

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

# Bush invokes Taft-Hartley to end ports' labor dispute



WASHINGTON — President Bush asked a federal court Tuesday to reopen West Coast ports and impose a cease-fire that would end a caustic 10-day labor lockout, which has cost the fragile economy \$1 billion to \$2 billion a day.

"This dispute between management and labor cannot be allowed to further harm the economy and force thousands of working Americans from their jobs," Bush said in a hastily arranged announcement outside the Oval Office.

Bush's politically charged decision made him the first president in a quarter-century to intervene in a labor dispute under the Taft-Hartley Act. His speech, which was moved up 15 minutes, coincided with an announcement by the dockworkers' union agreeing to an eleventh-hour truce proposed by Labor Department officials to return to work for 30 days under terms of the expired contract.

But the Pacific Maritime Association, which represents shipping companies and terminal operators, has not agreed to reopen the docks after locking out workers 10 days ago, accusing the union of a work slowdown. The association's refusal forced the Bush administration to seek the court's help.

"[The shippers] wanted to Taft-Hartley the union all along," said union spokesman Steve Stallone. "All along, they wanted the government to come in and solve the problem for them."

Administration officials denied that the White House has taken sides and insisted that the timing of Bush's announcement was not changed to scuttle an agreement.

"We needed to reopen the ports, and we needed both parties to agree," said a White House official close to negotiations, who

spoke on the condition of anonymity. "We only had one side agreeing."

Shipping officials said they preferred a 90-day extension of the current contract. "I'm sorry it has come to this," shipping association President Joseph Miniac said of Bush's move. "But we have got to get this behind us."

The petition asked for an 80-day "cooling-off period"; it was signed by five of Bush's Cabinet secretaries. Bush wants the court to require work at the ports to "resume at a normal pace."

Abortion rate dips

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. abortion rate dropped significantly during the second half of the 1990s, and particularly among teenagers, and experts attribute the decline to AIDS fears and better awareness of contraception.

The rate fell 11 percent between 1994 and 2000, from about 24 abortions for every 1,000 women of childbearing age to 21, the non-profit Alan Guttmacher Institute reported Tuesday. The rate among girls ages 15 to 18 declined a dramatic 39 percent, from 24 abortions per 1,000 girls to 15.

At the same time, researchers were surprised by a sharp increase in abortions among poorer women, or those who earn less than twice the federal poverty level of about \$17,000 for a family of four.

"Their abortion rates were increasing while they were going down for everyone else," said Rachel K. Jones, who led the study, which was based on questionnaires completed by more than 10,000 women who had abortions.

Sarah Brown, the director of the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, noted that the drop in

abortions was accompanied by a decline in teen sex, teen pregnancies, and teen births during the late 1990s.

"This signals a deep and profound and robust change in adolescent sexual behavior in this country," she said. "I think it's cause for — I don't know if 'celebration' is the right word — but certainly our full attention."

Analysts have credited a broad set of factors for those trends, including fear of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases and more open discussion with youngsters about sex.

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## 2 from U.S., 1 Japanese share Nobel

A Japanese scientist and two Americans won the 2002 Nobel Prize in physics on Tuesday for snatching elusive cosmic particles and bits of radiation that constantly pelt the Earth and using them to understand the basic workings of the sun and stars and to unveil the previously hidden but incredibly violent nature of our universe.

University of Pennsylvania chemist Raymond Davis Jr., 87, and retired University of Tokyo physicist Masatoshi Koshiba, 76, shared half of the \$1.1 million prize for their pioneering work on detecting solar neutrinos — ghostly particles that stream out of the heart of the sun by the thousands of billions, change "flavors" as they bombard Earth and pass easily through solid rock, making them almost impossible to snare.

The two men created underground chambers — one in a South Dakota gold mine, the other in a Tokyo copper mine — to trap and study the particles. The work resolved a centuries-old controversy by proving that it was indeed nuclear fusion that made the sun shine. The work also suggested that each neutrino seemed to contain a sliver of mass, meaning the universe was not as lopsided as once believed.

The other half of the prize went to Riccardo Giacconi, 71, the astronomer who was the first to detect X-rays coming from outside our Solar System and first to prove that the universe is bathed in a background glow of X-ray light. The work proved the existence of black holes and established an entirely new field of astrophysics, X-ray astronomy, that has gone on to illuminate many surprisingly violent aspects of the night skies.

"It's not just that the winners have written new sentences in the history of science, they've written whole new chapters," said John Bahcall, an astrophysicist at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, N.J., who worked closely with Davis on solar neutrinos and called Giacconi "a giant."

The Nobel committee said X-ray astronomy had provided "completely new — and sharp — images of the universe" and described neutrino detection as "considerably more difficult than finding a particular grain of sand in the whole of the Sahara desert." They credited the work with changing "the way we look upon the universe."

**What is DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection is a form of birth control that is given as an intramuscular injection (a shot) in the buttock or upper arm once every 3 months (13 weeks). To continue your contraceptive protection, you must return for your next injection promptly at the end of 3 months (13 weeks). DEPO-PROVERA contains medroxyprogesterone acetate, a chemical similar to (but not the same as) the natural hormone progesterone, which is produced by your ovaries during the second half of your menstrual cycle. DEPO-PROVERA acts by preventing your egg cells from ripening. If an egg is not released from the ovaries during your menstrual cycle, it cannot become fertilized by sperm and result in pregnancy. DEPO-PROVERA also causes changes in the lining of your uterus that make it less likely for pregnancy to occur.

**How effective is DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
The efficacy of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection depends on following the recommended dosage schedule exactly (see "How often do I get my shot of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?"). To make sure you are not pregnant when you first get DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection, your first injection must be given ONLY during the first 5 days of a normal menstrual period ONLY within the first 5 days after childbirth if not breast-feeding and, if exclusively breast-feeding, ONLY at the sixth week after childbirth. It is a long-term, injectable contraceptive when administered at 3-month (13-week) intervals. DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection is over 99% effective, making it one of the most reliable methods of birth control available. This means that the average annual pregnancy rate is less than one for every 100 women who use DEPO-PROVERA. The effectiveness of most contraceptive methods depends in part on how reliably each woman uses the method. The effectiveness of DEPO-PROVERA depends only on the patient returning every 3 months (13 weeks) for her next injection. Your health-care provider will help you compare DEPO-PROVERA with other contraceptive methods and give you the information you need in order to decide which contraceptive method is the right choice for you.

The following table shows the percent of women who got pregnant while using different kinds of contraceptive methods. It gives both the lowest expected rate of pregnancy (the rate expected in women who use each method exactly as it should be used) and the typical rate of pregnancy (which includes women who became pregnant because they forgot to use their birth control or because they did not follow the directions exactly).

**Who should not use DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
Not all women should use DEPO-PROVERA. You should not use DEPO-PROVERA if you have any of the following conditions:  
• if you think you may be pregnant  
• if you have any vaginal bleeding without a known reason

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• if you have problems with your liver or liver disease  
• if you are allergic to DEPO-PROVERA (medroxyprogesterone acetate or any of its other ingredients)

**What other things should I consider before using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
You will have a physical examination before your doctor prescribes DEPO-PROVERA. It is important to tell your health-care provider if you have any of the following:  
• a family history of breast cancer  
• an abnormal mammogram (breast x-ray), fibrocystic breast disease, breast nodules or lumps, or bleeding from your nipples  
• kidney disease  
• irregular or scanty menstrual periods  
• high blood pressure  
• migraine headaches  
• asthma  
• epilepsy (convulsions or seizures)  
• diabetes or a family history of diabetes  
• a history of depression  
• if you are taking any prescription or over-the-counter medications

This product is intended to prevent pregnancy. It does not protect against transmission of HIV (AIDS) and other sexually transmitted diseases such as chlamydia, genital herpes, genital warts, gonorrhea, hepatitis B, and syphilis.

**What if I want to become pregnant after using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
Because DEPO-PROVERA is a long-acting birth control method, it takes some time after your last injection for its effect to wear off. Based on the results from a large study done in the United States, for women who stop using DEPO-PROVERA in order to become pregnant, it is expected that about half of those who become pregnant will do so in about 10 months after their last injection; about two thirds of those who become pregnant will do so in about 12 months; about 83% of those who become pregnant will do so in about 15 months; and about 93% of those who become pregnant will do so in about 18 months after their last injection. The length of time you use DEPO-PROVERA has no effect on how long it takes you to become pregnant after you stop using it.

**What are the risks of using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
1. Irregular Menstrual Bleeding  
The side effect reported most frequently by women who use DEPO-PROVERA for contraception is a change in their normal menstrual cycle. During the first year of using DEPO-PROVERA, you might have one or more of the following changes: irregular or unpredictable bleeding or spotting, an increase or decrease in menstrual bleeding, or no bleeding at all. Unusually heavy or continuous bleeding, however, is not a usual effect of DEPO-PROVERA, and if this happens, you should see your health-care provider right away. With continued use of DEPO-PROVERA, bleeding usually decreases, and many women stop having periods completely. In clinical studies of DEPO-PROVERA, 55% of the women studied reported no menstrual bleeding (amenorrhea) after 1 year of use, and 66% of the women studied reported no menstrual bleeding after 2 years of use. The reason that your periods stop is because DEPO-PROVERA causes a resting state in your ovaries. When your ovaries do not release an egg monthly, the regular monthly growth of the lining of your uterus does not occur and, therefore, the bleeding of DEPO-PROVERA your menstrual period will usually, in time, return to its normal cycle.

2. Bone Mineral Changes  
Use of DEPO-PROVERA may be associated with a decrease in the amount of mineral stored in your bones. This could increase your risk of developing bone fractures. The rate of bone mineral loss is greatest in the early years of DEPO-PROVERA use, but after that, it begins to resemble the normal rate of age-related bone mineral loss.

3. Cancer  
Studies of women who have used different forms of contraception found that women who used DEPO-PROVERA for contraception had no increased overall risk of developing cancer of the breast, ovary, uterus, cervix, or liver. However, women under 35 years of age whose first exposure to DEPO-PROVERA was within the previous 4 to 5 years may have a slightly increased risk of developing breast cancer similar to that seen with oral contraceptives. You should discuss this with your health-care provider.

4. Unexpected Pregnancy  
Because DEPO-PROVERA is such an effective contraceptive method, the risk of accidental pregnancy for women who get their shots regularly (every 3 months [13 weeks]) is very low. While there have been reports of an increased risk of low birth weight and neonatal infant death or other health problems in infants conceived close to the time of injection, such pregnancies are uncommon. If you think you may have become pregnant while using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception, see your health-care provider as soon as possible.

5. Allergic Reactions  
Some women using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection have reported severe and potentially life-threatening allergic reactions known as anaphylaxis and anaphylactoid reactions. Symptoms include the sudden onset of hives or swelling and itching of the skin, breathing difficulties, and a drop in blood pressure.

6. Other Risks  
Women who use hormone-based contraceptives may have an increased risk of blood clots or stroke. Also, if a contraceptive method fails, there is a possibility that the fertilized egg will begin to develop outside of the uterus (ectopic pregnancy). While these events are rare, you should tell your health-care provider if you have any of the problems listed in the next section.

**What symptoms may signal problems while using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
Call your health-care provider immediately if any of these problems occur following an injection of DEPO-PROVERA:  
• sharp chest pain, coughing up of blood, or sudden shortness of breath (indicating a possible clot in the lung)  
• sudden severe headache or vomiting, dizziness or lightheadedness with your eyesight or speech, weakness, or numbness in an arm or leg (indicating a possible stroke)  
• severe pain or swelling in the calf (indicating a possible clot in the leg)  
• unusually heavy vaginal bleeding  
• severe pain or tenderness in the lower abdominal area

**What are the possible side effects of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
1. Weight Gain  
You may experience a weight gain while you are using DEPO-PROVERA. About two thirds of the women who used DEPO-PROVERA in clinical trials reported a weight gain of about 5 pounds during the first year of use. You may continue to gain weight after the first year. Women in one large study who used DEPO-PROVERA for 2 years gained an average total of 8.1 pounds over those 2 years, or approximately 4 pounds per year. Women who continued for 4 years gained an average total of 13.8 pounds over those 4 years, or approximately 3.5 pounds per year. Women who continued for 6 years gained an average total of 16.5 pounds over those 6 years, or approximately 2.75 pounds per year.

2. Other Side Effects  
In a clinical study of over 3,900 women who used DEPO-PROVERA for up to 7 years, some women reported the following effects that may or may not have been related to their use of DEPO-PROVERA: irregular menstrual bleeding, amenorrhea, headache, nervousness, abdominal cramps, dizziness, weakness or fatigue, decreased sexual desire, leg cramps, nausea, vaginal discharge or irritation, breast swelling and tenderness, bloating, swelling of the hands or feet, backache, depression, insomnia, acne, pelvic pain, no hair growth or excessive hair loss, rash, hot flashes, and joint pain. Other problems were reported by very few of the women in the clinical trial, but some of these could be serious. These include convulsions, seizures, urinary tract infections, allergic reactions, fainting, paralysis, osteoporosis, lack of return to fertility, deep vein thrombosis, pulmonary embolism, breast cancer, or cervical cancer. If these or any other problems occur during your use of DEPO-PROVERA, discuss them with your health-care provider.

**Should any precautions be followed during use of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
1. Missed Periods  
During the time you are using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception, you may skip a period, or your periods may stop completely. If you have been receiving your DEPO-PROVERA injections regularly every 3 months (13 weeks), then you are probably not pregnant. However, if you think that you may be pregnant, see your health-care provider.

If you are scheduled for your laboratory tests, tell your health-care provider that you are using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception. Certain blood tests are affected by hormones such as DEPO-PROVERA.

2. Drug Interactions  
Cytadren (aminoglutethimide) is an anticancer drug that may significantly decrease the effectiveness of DEPO-PROVERA if the two drugs are given during the same time.

3. Nursing Mothers  
Although DEPO-PROVERA can be passed to the nursing infant in the breast milk, so harmful effects have been found in these children. DEPO-PROVERA does not prevent the breast from producing milk, so it can be used by nursing mothers. However, to minimize the amount of DEPO-PROVERA that is passed to the infant in the first weeks after birth, you should wait until 6 weeks after childbirth before you start using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception.

**How often do I get my shot of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?**  
The recommended dose of DEPO-PROVERA is 150 mg every 3 months (13 weeks) given as a single intramuscular injection in the buttock or upper arm. To make sure that you are not pregnant at the time of the first injection, it is essential that the injection be given ONLY during the first 5 days of a normal menstrual period. If used following the delivery of a child, the first injection of DEPO-PROVERA MUST be given within 5 days after childbirth if you are not breast-feeding or 6 weeks after childbirth if you are exclusively breast-feeding. If you wait longer than 3 months (13 weeks) between injections, or longer than 6 weeks after delivery your health-care provider should determine that you are not pregnant before giving you your injection of DEPO-PROVERA.

"The Internet is a wonderful tool, and I don't want my students to stay away from it. I just don't want them to plagiarize, either."

According to a study released by the Office of the Ombudsman in August, 26 cases of plagiarism were reported in one UI course alone. It said plagiarism is a major concern, concluding that faculty must continue to "discuss plagiarism at the beginning of each semester in every class, making clear their expectations regarding academic misconduct."

"Students must be advised of the broad meaning of plagiarism and the consequences of cheating at the university," the report said.

Plagiarism at the university hit national news last year when a former law student was forced to write a letter of apology for publishing material lifted from the *Fordham Urban Law Journal*.

month from departments requesting that their visiting faculty members be placed in one of the school's 18 temporary-housing units, said Larry Rettig, the special assistant to the vice president for Research.

The university has owned six apartment units on the Oakdale campus since the 1980s; it added 12 more units in Iowa City two years ago.

Last month, the university signed an 18-month lease on an

upscale home at 720 McLean St. At that time, officials say it could be used for temporary faculty housing or for housing the new president if renovations are needed on the president's mansion. Steve Parrott, the director of University Relations, said there was an "insatiable need" for temporary faculty housing.

"We do absolutely everything we can to accommodate our visitors," said Linda Annis, an administrative associate in the Business Office, adding the housing program is important because it is used to entice visi-

tors to come to the UI.

If the city decided to move the 118-year-old Cannon-Gay-McCloskey house, 320 Melrose Ave., a city ordinance would require the National Register of Historic Places and the State Historical Society to approve a historically compatible location.

"I think that shows really good faith," Councilor Connie Champion said. She was "very excited" about the letter that Andrew Ives, the university's interim associate vice president for the Facilities Services Group, sent promising to sign the agreement.

At least one councilor remains skeptical about moving

the house, however.

"I think a good gesture from the university is to say, 'Yes, we will leave that house there,'" Pfab said.

The \$4.6 million, 200,000-square-foot Athletics Learning Center is slated for completion next fall.

# Suspension of Pierre Pierce is justified, doesn't presume guilt

In a move that undermines the authority of the UI Athletics Department to follow its own policies, Pierre Pierce's attorneys have appealed to have his suspension from the basketball team overturned.

**To maintain the integrity of the program, the basketball team cannot play with one of its players under investigation for sexual assault.**

"We still feel that the suspension is not the proper avenue," said Maggi Moss, one of Pierce's attorneys. "In our system of justice, he should be presumed innocent, and if he's innocent, why is he being suspended?"

This, indeed, would all be true if, in fact Pierce had been suspended by the justice system. However, he was suspended by the Athletics Department, an entity that has no obligation to even consider whether Pierce is guilty. Of course Pierce has certain inalienable civil rights, and to violate those would be unconstitutional; however, no one has the unalienable civil right to dribble a basketball up and down Carver-Hawkeye Arena. This is a privilege granted by the Athletics Department, and it can be revoked at any time for any cause.

Not only is Athletics Director Bob Bowsby justified in making this decision, he would actually be doing a disservice to his position and department if he didn't suspend a student-athlete under investigation for third-degree sexual assault. It is Bowsby's job to make sure that the Athletics Department is run in an orderly fashion; this includes avoiding the potential media circus that could haunt any basketball team whose point guard was under investigation for such a serious crime.

In the past, the Athletics Department has suspended any student-athlete who was involved in a case in which a third party was injured; the suspensions were lifted only after a "not guilty" verdict. In this case, the injured third party happened to be a UI women's athlete, further giving the department cause to distance itself from the incident by suspending the suspect.

Furthermore, while Bowsby is certainly under no legal obligation to regard Pierce as innocent, this suspension should not be regarded as a presumption of guilt. Rather, it should be recognized as a way in which the basketball team can maintain its image and avoid the trauma that would inevitably follow a team playing with serious criminal charges lingering over it.

A parallel example can be found in the world of law enforcement; frequently, police officers who have been accused of using excessive force are routinely suspended with pay until the case has been resolved. This is not a presumption of guilt; rather a police force simply cannot function effectively with its integrity in question; the same is true for a basketball program. While Pierce cannot play on the team, he does remain on scholarship. The UI has, and should continue to, treat Pierce the same way a police department would treat a suspended officer; to do otherwise would be to place a big-name college basketball player above the law.

# He said, he said: Fleischer and Ramadan's war of words

Late last week, Iraqi Vice President Taha Yassin Ramadan made an unprecedented move among modern politicians — he challenged the Bush administration to a duel.

"Bush wants to attack the whole Iraq," he said. "If such a call is genuine, then let the American president and a select group with him face a selected group of us ... and both groups use the same weapon."

While the White House has dismissed this offer as archaic and irresponsible, it doesn't really seem that far-fetched, considering the rhetoric on our own side. After all, White House spokesman Ari Fleischer has condoned assassination as an appropriate method to avoid full-scale war, and President Bush himself has justified his suspicions about Saddam Hussein by reminding us that "this is the guy who tried to kill my dad."

Some might argue that using the world's largest military to avenge the attempted murder of one's father is even more archaic than a duel. But that wouldn't be "America speaking with one voice," now would it?

Really, we dissenters should quit protesting a conflict with Iraq and focus instead on turning that conflict into an administrative duel, rather than a full-scale war. If Bush really wants Saddam that bad, he can get him himself. That way, we won't get ourselves into a prolonged conflict, and I won't have to dodge the draft (which could be difficult, since I'm neither fond of men nor of Canada).

Furthermore, ticket sales and advertising revenues from such a duel (as well as the subsequent merchandising of Ari Fleischer action figures) could be just the thing to stimulate the stagnant economy that the administration has been ignoring for the past year; whereas a war is bad for America but good for Bush, a duel is bad for Bush but good for America.

Ramadan also claims to have the well-being of the American people in mind with his offer. "A president against a president, and a vice president against a vice president, if they are serious," he said. "And in this way we are saving the Iraqi and American people."

Awwww, how sweet. Of course, Ramadan doesn't have our well-being in mind any more than Bush does the thousands of civilians he is bound to kill if we do indeed launch an attack on Iraq. If the Iraqi government really wants to avoid the deaths of its civilians, it really should play a little nicer with the big dog. Fleischer's response failed to address this point, however. You can't really blame him, though; after all, he was too busy making faces at Iraq and chanting, "I'm rubber, you're glue."

Said Fleischer: "I just want to point out that in the past when Iraq has had disputes, it invaded its neighbors." So basically, we're justifying our planned invasion by saying that if Iraq can invade people, so can we.

I'm confused. Isn't Saddam supposed to be a "murderous tyrant"? So why are we modeling our foreign policy after his? Perhaps we should follow the example set by the rest of the world, rather than that set by our enemy.

Fleischer, however, has stated that "it's very clear to everybody what the United States is doing, it's doing with the support of many nations around the world." Yes, I suppose that's true, if by "many nations around the world" he means Bulgaria and Romania.





# Sharon defends deadly Israeli raid

JERUSALEM — Israeli armored vehicles rolled into the Palestinian parts of the divided West Bank city of Hebron Tuesday, after Prime Minister Ariel Sharon defended an Israeli raid in Gaza that resulted in the deaths of 16 Palestinians.

The White House criticized Israel over the civilian casualties, saying President Bush was deeply concerned. "The president urges Israel to minimize the risk to civilian populations," said spokesman Ari Fleischer.

At the Gaza-Egypt border on Tuesday, a 10-year-old Palestinian girl was shot and killed by Israeli soldiers, residents and doctors said. They said soldiers fired at youths who were throwing rocks at tanks and bulldozers, and the girl was hit near her house. The Israeli military said two soldiers were wounded by Palestinian gunfire but had no information about Palestinian casualties.

Palestinian gunmen fired at an Israeli vehicle near Hebron, wounding four Israelis, one critically. Other attackers shot at one of the Israeli enclaves in the tense city from a Palestinian neighborhood, just before Israeli armored personnel carriers moved in and imposed a curfew, the military and witnesses said.

Hebron is the only West Bank city split into Israeli and Palestinian-controlled zones. Approximately 450 Jewish settlers live in three enclaves in the center of the city. Israeli soldiers patrol

the area, which includes about 30,000 of the 130,000 Palestinians in Hebron.

After the shooting, Jewish settlers scuffled with Palestinians in downtown Hebron and smashed the windows of four Palestinian-owned cars, witnesses said. Such clashes are common in Hebron.

"Settlers are taking any chance to attack Palestinians and take the law into their own hands," said Arif Jaabri, the Palestinian governor of Hebron.

Sharon said Israel would not stop sending its forces into Palestinian areas to confront militants.

He dismissed American and other criticism of a raid Monday in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis, in which 16 Palestinians were killed and more than 100 wounded. Sharon expressed regret at civilian deaths, but declared, "There is a need to be certain that terrorist organizations will not have the freedom to carry out intentional murder."

"The operation was a successful operation... There will be more operations in Gaza," Sharon said.

The death toll rose to 16 in the raid when two Palestinians, ages 16 and 35, died Tuesday in a Khan Younis hospital, doctors said. Most of the casualties came when an Israeli helicopter fired a missile into a crowded street. Palestinians said most or all of the casualties were civilians. Israel said most were armed fighters who were shooting at the departing soldiers.


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

## Theirs is but to sing, Why?

Post 9/11, the only politically charged sentiments from the visible art world seemed to be limited to the swiping of Stars 'n' Stripes MasterCard. Despite all the talk, not much has actually been said.

That is, until Olympia's Sleater-Kinney released its sixth album, *One Beat* (Kill Rock Stars).

The band is on tour supporting the album with a stop tonight in Grinnell.

Compared with what the Hat Acts on CMT have to say, *One Beat* is rock 'n' roll sedition. The trio of vocalists/guitarists Corin Tucker and Carrie Brownstein and vocals/drumming of Janet Weiss has never been afraid to be critical of the uneven playing field of rock 'n' roll, the indie-elitists, or even the gearing up of the war machine.

*One Beat* is an expansion of what the band is capable of musically and thematically.

Formed in era of early '90s Riot Grrrl bands such as Bratmobile and Bikini Kill, Sleater-Kinney was originally a side project for Tucker's Heavens to Betsy and Brownstein's Excuse 17. Backed by Lora Macfarlane on the band's self-titled debut and later replaced by permanent drummer Weiss, anthemic albums such as 1997's *Dig Me Out* and 2000's *All Hands On The Bad One* made it clear the angular and Wire-y music of the side project was greater than the components.

With this outing, Sleater-Kinney has pulled out all the stops

that previous albums have only hinted at. Replete with three-part harmonies, an occasional light shellac of keyboards (courtesy of *Hedwig and the Angry*

*Inch* mastermind Stephan Trask and Quasi's Sam Coomes), and the band's best written songs to date, *One Beat* steams ahead at full potential.

There are the requisite number of songs about staying out all night around the "bookstores and punk rock clubs" ("Light Rail Coyote") and even some comparatively lighthearted songs with surf-beats and a definite sense of empowerment ("Oh!", "Remainder," and "02").

At the core of *One Beat* is the question asked by Tucker in "Combat Rock": "Since When is Skepticism Un-American?"

Sidestepping the trite trappings of being earnest is the solid core of "Combat Rock" and "Far Away" —

ticking rockers exploring the largely untalked about aspects of the New York events. Mourning and panic are only offset by the fear attached to nationalism and blind flag waving. "Break[ing] out our old machines now ... and we know where we get the oil from," sings Tucker in "Combat Rock" as national policy is wrung-out by a sideswipe of guitars and the unwavering purpose of the lyrics.

Moreover, the political protest explicit in the two pillar songs seeps into the rest of *One Beat*, lacing the entire album with nervous energy — all vigor, conviction, loud, smart guitars, and backbeat careening.

While the soda and popcorn that go along with any free show at Grinnell might play to the bounce of the music, the sobriety and underlying issues of *One Beat* almost warrant a buffet of pamphlets, cold coffee, and hardtack.

Sleater-Kinney will play at the Harris Center with the Quails (former Circus Lupus/Cha Cha Cabaret/Electroettes), free of charge and open to the public.



## Recruit makes oral commitment to Hawkeyes

The Iowa basketball team finally got the good news it so desperately longed for.

Junior-college power forward Nick DeWitz gave Iowa coach Steve Alford an oral commitment for the 2003-04 season on Tuesday, choosing the Hawkeyes over Indiana and Florida State.

Because oral commitments are unofficial, no one from the Iowa basketball team could comment on DeWitz's decision at this time, but he confirmed his decision Tuesday evening.

DeWitz said Iowa's motion


offense and need for his presence were the two major reasons for his making his decision. He visited Iowa City last weekend and participated in a shoot-around at Carver-Hawkeye Arena, watched Iowa's football game against Purdue, and spent an evening with current team members.

"I wasn't sure what to expect, I know they've gone through some problems lately, but I went in there with an open mind, and it felt like the best fit when I left," DeWitz said.

DeWitz will sit out this season at Mesa Junior College, where he needs just 16 credits to graduate, allowing him to

enroll at Iowa in January. While he will be unable to play this season, he will have three years of eligibility remaining because of his decision to not play this year.

"I know there's a huge need for me there next year," he said. "I feel like I could proba-

bly help the team this year, too, except I won't be able to because I can't play."

The 6-7, 215-pound DeWitz earned a three-star rating out of five on the Rivals.com recruiting network's Web site, and he is considered by several recruiting experts to be one of the top junior-college players in the nation at his position.

DeWitz was a McDonald's All-America nominee at Dobson High School of Chandler, Ariz., after averaging 17 points, five rebounds, three blocks, and two steals his senior year. His team finished the year 28-3 and reached the state semifinals for the first time in school history.

He spent the 2001 season at Utah Valley State College where he averaged nine points, 4.7 rebounds, and 1.6 assists per game.

DeWitz is the third player to give an oral commitment to the Iowa program for next season, joining Ben Rand and Matt Henderson. Redshirt freshman center Erik Hansen, who failed to qualify for this season academically and will play at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids this winter, is expected to return to the Hawkeyes next year as well.



Arens doesn't think Angel's expectations were too high. She said the meets were scheduled for a good reason.

## Ferentz happy at mid-season mark

As the football season reaches its halfway point, Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz can't help but be pleased at what he has seen so far from the No. 17 Hawkeyes.

"I didn't know where we'd be, quite honestly," he said. "That's part of the fun of this."

After praising the entire squad for its spirit and work ethic, Ferentz ran through a long list of players he feels have taken great strides since the beginning of the season, at times sounding as if he were

accepting an Oscar.

"I'm probably leaving somebody out," he said before rattling off a few more names.

Topping the list, at least on Tuesday, was tight end Dallas Clark, who earned Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors for his two-touchdown performance in Iowa's 31-28 victory over Purdue last weekend. It was the first time Iowa has had back-to-back Players of the Week since Tim Dwight and Tavian Banks in 1996. Brad Banks shared the honor with Penn State's Zack Mills two weeks ago.

"We definitely took a big step

[last weekend]," Clark said, who caught the winning touchdown pass from Brad Banks with just over one minute to go in the game. "To see our team make the plays we need ... to win is a big positive."

Ferentz and the Hawkeyes know the team will once again have to execute its game plan when Michigan State comes to Iowa City this weekend. Iowa's suspect pass defense will face wide receiver Charles Rogers, whom Ferentz said is the best player in the Big Ten.

"He's going to make his catches and get his yards," Ferentz said.

# Baker remains true to Iowa City roots

Many college athletes dream of making it to the professional level, but only a select few have that opportunity. Former Hawkeyes punter Jason Baker is one of these few.

Baker started as punter for Iowa from 1997-2000, where he played under both Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. He holds the all-time Iowa school records in both career punts (272) and career punting yards (11,304). He also recorded four of the 11 longest punts in school history, including a career long of 79 yards.

DI reporter Brian Triplett talked to Baker about life in the NFL, memories of Iowa City, and his opinion about sportswriters' athleticism.

DI: You grew up in Indiana. Why did you choose Iowa?

Baker: Have you ever met Hayden Fry? He's a personable guy. Also I wanted to play baseball, and Duane Banks gave me the opportunity to.

DI: When was the first time you actually thought you had a strong chance of becoming an NFL punter?

Baker: Probably somewhere in the middle of my college career, I started looking at it. I started thinking, I'm as good as that guy. I started to say, "Hey, I think I could do that."

DI: What is the main difference between being a college athlete and a professional athlete?

Baker: If you're a college player on a scholarship, they're not going to take away your scholarship because of a bad performance. Obviously in the

NFL, you can easily lose your job based on performance. I appreciated them for different reasons. I loved college football because it was fun. It was pure enjoyment. As a professional, there's a lot more pressure.

DI: What goes through your head when you are the last hope to make the tackle on a punt?

Baker: Normally things are happening so fast. But you're a football player like everybody else. You have a football helmet and shoulder pads, so you might as well use them.

DI: How do you like San Francisco?

Baker: It's OK. I'm a Midwesterner at heart. People might think I-80 is busy, but they have no idea.

DI: Do you miss Iowa City?

Baker: Every time I see a game, I think I'd love to get back there. I stay in touch with a lot of my close friends there. You start missing little things. I forgot to appreciate a lot of the things that I wish I could experience again.

MINNEAPOLIS — The Minnesota Twins just won't go away. The team that wasn't supposed to make it to opening day isn't a surprise anymore.



# Charlotte edges closer to NBA team

NEW YORK — The NBA moved a step closer Tuesday to putting a team back in Charlotte, appointing an expansion committee to look at ownership groups willing to pay the expected price of at least \$300 million.

The league's Board of Governors ended a two-day meeting at which the members were briefed on the prospects of adding a new franchise. One prospective ownership group includes Larry Bird and M.L. Carr, but the league said there is no front-runner for the new team, which could begin play in 2004-05.

Charlotte lost its NBA franchise when the Hornets moved to New Orleans after last season. Since then, at least three groups have said they would

like to bring a team back to Charlotte, and Deputy Commissioner Russ Granik said the league is near agreement with city officials on a deal to build a new arena with an NBA team as the primary tenant.

"It's a very positive step, but I don't think we can say yet that it's a done deal," Granik said.

The Board of Governors, composed of a representative from each of the 29 teams, also approved a change in the bylaws for the WNBA, allowing for non-NBA ownership groups to pursue WNBA franchises in non-NBA cities. Currently, the league owns all the teams, and with the exception of the Charlotte Sting, all WNBA teams are operated by the NBA teams in their cities.

In another development, the owners approved the opening of a league-wide credit operation, to

be run by JP Morgan Chase, from which each team would be entitled to borrow up to \$100 million.

Commissioner David Stern said he did not sense opposition from any of the 29 owners to putting another team in Charlotte. Two or three prospective ownership groups are expected to meet with the expansion committee, which will comprise Jerry Colangelo of Phoenix, Larry Tanenbaum of Toronto, Joe Maloof of Sacramento, Lewis Katz of New Jersey, Stan Kroenke of Denver, and George Shinn of New Orleans.

"There is no front-runner," Granik said.

While a new arena is built, a new team could play one season in the Charlotte Coliseum, which lacks the luxury and club suites the Hornets needed to make money, Granik said.

In the nine year span, Iowa teams garnered Big Ten accolades with three all-American runners and five women who went to the USA Cross Country championships.

Still in the growing stages, Angel said he could still look at the progress so far and smile.

"I have no regrets."

Running back Fred Russell, offensive lineman Robert Gallery, wide receiver Mo Brown, tight end Dallas Clark, and even kicker Nate Kaeding have all been mentioned as possible NFL prospects if they have big seasons.

"It's just like having your name in the paper," Gallery said about the speculation. "It's cool

to see, but I'm here for a reason."

### McDuffie cited for OWI

Redshirt freshman defensive end Warren McDuffie was charged with OWI on Oct. 5 after a single-vehicle accident on Interstate 80. He is the 10th member of the football team to be charged with an alcohol- or drug-related offense since last fall.

According to the Associated Press, court records show McDuffie's blood-alcohol level was .103 when he took a breathalyzer, slightly over the legal limit of .10 in Iowa.

Because McDuffie is red-shirting this season, Ferentz said he will have to adjust the team's new disciplinary policy, implemented after the series of recent citations, to adjust to the situation.

"Obviously, he didn't get the message [about the team's new expectations], so we'll try to ram it home," Ferentz said.

### Fleury suspended for program violation

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicago Blackhawks forward Theo Fleury was suspended indefinitely by the NHL on Tuesday for violation of his substance abuse aftercare program.

The 34-year-old Fleury, who has struggled with substance-abuse and anger-management problems, signed a two-year, \$8.5 million contract with the Blackhawks on Aug. 15.

He said he missed two practices

last week because his father had surgery to remove a tumor.

Drs. Dave Lewis and Brian Shaw of the National Hockey League/National Hockey League Players' Association Substance Abuse and Behavioral Health Program are administering Fleury's care.

"Theoren will continue to be assessed, an appropriate treatment program will be put into effect, and his progress will be monitored regularly," Shaw said. "Our primary objective is for Theo to restore appropriate balance to his life and thereafter to be

able to resume his career."

"This course of action is best-suited to Theoren's situation," Lewis said. "He needs time away from the game in order to work on his issues."

Under the terms of the program, Fleury will not be eligible for reinstatement until cleared by the supervising doctors.

Fleury voluntarily entered the Substance Abuse and Behavioral Health Program on Feb. 28, 2001, while a member of the New York Rangers. He was cleared to resume playing on Sept. 4, 2001.

The 5-foot-6 Fleury was one of the top players in the NHL the first 10½ years of his career in Calgary. He scored 40 or more goals three times and had a career-high 104 points in 1990-91.

He left Calgary for New York in 1999 and struggled immediately. He had only 15 goals and 49 assists his first season with the Rangers.

Fleury appeared to be turning things around the following season, leading New York with 30 goals and 44 assists.

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

## Sorenstam aims for LPGA record

What should be a victory lap for Annika Sorenstam has turned into a sprint to the finish. The Swede wants to win all five tournaments left on the LPGA Tour schedule to break Mickey Wright's record of 13 victories, set in 1963.

Impossible? "I wouldn't have thought she could win nine," said Judy Rankin, a member of the LPGA Hall of Fame and a golf analyst for ABC Sports. "I'm surprised, with the quality of players on the LPGA, that anyone can be this dominant. And she absolutely has been. It's astounding."

The numbers speak for themselves. Sorenstam already has won half of the 18 tour events she's played, the same pace Wright set 39 years ago.

Take away the Women's British Open, the only cut she missed this year, and Sorenstam hasn't finished lower than third since May. Her scoring average is 68.55, nearly a full stroke lower than the record she set last year.

"I'm very happy with my season so far," she said. "But I have the chance to make it spectacular."

By winning at least three of the final five tournaments, Sorenstam could become golf's first \$3 million woman. And if she wins them all, the record described as one "that may never be touched" on page 346 of the LPGA Tour media guide will belong to her.

"When you say, 'It may never be broken,' then you might start to believe it," Sorenstam said. "I don't believe in those things. It's possible, and that's what keeps me going forward."

She quickly is advancing into a realm of her own.

The notion of a "Big Three" in women's golf was still around as recently as July after Karrie Webb won the British Open, and Se Ri Pak won the LPGA Championship.

Sorenstam has separated herself so quickly, and by such a vast margin, that her biggest rival now appears to be Wright, perhaps the greatest female golfer ever, with a swing that Ben Hogan once said was the best he had ever seen.

Rankin has a good perspective on both players. She was an 18-year-old in her second season on the LPGA Tour when Wright set the record. As a broadcaster, Rankin now sees plenty of Sorenstam.

"I don't think Mickey thrived on competition or got wrapped up in competition. Mickey was wrapped up in excellence," Rankin said. "Annika can get wrapped up in both."

Sorenstam does not have the classic swing of Wright, but hers is sweet and simple and deadly accurate. She turns her head toward the fairway before making contact and is rarely surprised by the flight of the ball.

Sorenstam is fourth in driving accuracy, fifth in driving distance and leads the LPGA Tour in greens in regulation with an astounding 80 percent.




