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Statement details Pierce assault

The UI female athlete whom basketball player Pierre Pierce assaulted repeatedly pushed him away while he "aggressively" forced vaginal and anal intercourse on her, the woman told police after the Sept. 6 incident. The statement, in which the victim's name has been blotted out to protect her identity, was released Monday morning in District Court after being sealed for 60 days. It is the first time the woman's detailed account of the story has been made public.

UI students were in an uproar Monday after learning of the graphic details in the report, and university officials are poised to take disciplinary action against Pierce. "The Code of Student Life is applicable to him, and we are not foreclosed to moving on anything relating to this case," UI interim President Sandy Boyd said Monday.

According to the victim's sworn statement:

The woman had been downtown at the bars with several friends, where she drank three to four shots of rum and two

mixed drinks. After being unable to find someone to drive her car home, she was dropped off at Pierce's 725 Orchard St. residence with others. Basketball players Chauncey Leslie and Sean Sonderleiter also live there, and former Iowa basketball player Reggie Evans was staying there. She asked Evans for a ride home, but he said he was too

intoxicated to drive and told her she could stay there.

Later, Leslie directed her to Pierce's bedroom, where, he said, she could sleep. Moments later, Pierce entered the room and lay down with the woman, who got up to use the bathroom. After failing to find toilet paper, she returned to Pierce's room, where he took her arm and pulled her onto his bed.

He then made sexual advances toward the victim, who believed he wanted to have intercourse with her.

When Pierce attempted to remove all of the woman's clothing, she repeatedly said, "I can't,"

and tried to push him away.

He then asked the woman if he could "get some head," to which she agreed because she thought it would prevent him from having intercourse with her. Pierce then began pushing her head toward him.

After a short time, the victim told him she couldn't do that any longer and began looking for her clothing. But Pierce pulled her back onto the bed, put on a condom, and began trying to insert his penis into her.

When she tried to push him away, he held one of her arms over her head and continued try-

ing to penetrate her. As she struggled, Pierce flipped her onto her stomach and penetrated her anally. When she tried to scream, Pierce covered her mouth and said, "You can't be doing that."

After she rolled onto her side in an attempt to escape, Pierce flipped her onto her back and penetrated her vagina.

She continued to struggle with him during the intercourse and said, "I can't believe you did that to me," before Pierce let her up and made her leave his residence

Friends recall 'outgoing' UI sophomore

Officials say death of student, 19, was caused by diabetes

Friends remember UI sophomore Karen Brock as friendly and easy-going.

Monday they mourned the loss of the 19-year-old nursing student, gathering for a somber memorial to the Lake Bluff, Ill., resident, who was found dead in her top bunk Sunday night, apparently due to complications from diabetes.

"Everyone on the floor is pretty deeply affected by it," said UI freshman Erin Lemanski, who lived next door to Brock on the second floor of Hillcrest Residence Hall. "She was generally an outgoing, happy person."

Lemanski placed a cross above Brock's door while other residents on the freshman and sophomore floor placed roses by her door and posted a poem in remembrance of her life.

Brock's unresponsive body was found by her roommate at 8:27 p.m., said Cindy Funk, a Johnson County medical-examiner investigator. UI police and Johnson County ambulance personnel responded to the dorm room and pronounced Brock dead at the scene.

Johnson County Medical Examiner David White said

Brock had diabetes and confirmed that she died from complications of the disease.

Doctors were still trying to determine the time of death Mon-

day night, though all other tests were completed earlier in the day.

"It can happen to anyone who's a diabetic if they've been ill and have not been able to treat

themselves properly, and her roommate said she wasn't feeling well for a couple days," Funk said. "It's common if diabetics don't seek medical attention."

Friends of Brock, who suffered from type I juvenile diabetes,

No radical changes, Boyd says

More than 100 days into what he calls his "brief sprint" as interim president, Sandy Boyd says he has rejected any radical changes but rather has done what was necessary to move the UI forward.

While he said over the summer that an interim president should "stay quiet and lie low," some of his moves as the top university administrator have forced him into the spotlight. And some of his actions have contradicted those of his predecessor, Mary Sue Coleman, whom he replaced on Aug. 1.

He publicly said the Athletics Department should be self-supporting, a position Coleman vehemently opposed. He reinstated the position of outreach coordinator, which Coleman had eliminated, and delayed a proposal to create research-only professors after calling for more discussion.

He has saved library hours from the chopping block, increased financial aid, and intervened in the sexual-assault case of basketball player Pierre Pierce to ensure university policies are applied equally to all students.

Boyd sees these actions and others, although somewhat controversial, as day-to-day tasks that must be addressed to maintain the progress of the school.

"A university either goes forward or backward. You can't stand still," he said. "I don't think an interim president should stand still because that means falling back."

Boyd's approach has clearly impressed students and faculty members with his sense of humor, often introducing himself as "déjà vu," a reference to his stint as university president from 1969-81.

UI Student Government President Nick Herbold said Boyd has been effective because he is so highly respected and because he is willing to sit down and talk to students. Herbold also said Boyd seems more receptive to change than the previous president.

Family fingers suicide in death

Family members suspect suicide was the cause of death of a UI junior whose remains were found in a wooded area of northeast Des Moines on Nov. 13.

Dental records identified a partially decomposed body as Quyen Chau, ending a two-month search for the 21-year-old pre-med major who will be remembered by friends for her dedication to helping others.

"She told me she wanted to help out as many people as she could," said Chau's younger sister Tram Chau, a UI sophomore. "She had been saying that ever since she was little."

Quyen Chau was diagnosed with depression in 1998 after an incident in which she attempted

to kill herself by overdosing and slitting her wrists.

Tram Chau became concerned for her sister after she stopped speaking to family and friends toward the end of this summer, often times isolating herself in her room. Tram Chau drove her older sister from Iowa City to Des Moines on Sept. 19 to see a family doctor after she began talking about attempting suicide again.

"She told me she wanted to go somewhere far, but didn't have the courage to do it," Tram Chau said.

After family members discovered that Quyen Chau failed to attend the Sept. 19 appointment, they searched for approximately 10 hours before notifying police

of the disappearance.

An investigation turned up nothing, but Quyen Chau's parents and two younger sisters remained hopeful she was alive and with friends.

"We thought that if anything bad would have happened, they would have found her by now," Tram Chau said.

Polk County Medical Examiner Francis Garrity said an autopsy conducted last week suggests Chau may have died of hypothermia and dehydration. No evidence of foul play was found.

Des Moines police Lt. Michael Shay, who is expecting the results of a toxicology report in two weeks, said an investigation is trying to determine how Quyen Chau got to the wooded area in northeastern

U.N. inspectors arrive as U.S. warns Saddam

BAGHDAD — An advance team of U.N. inspectors arrived here Monday afternoon to resume the search for weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, a politically sensitive and logistically challenging mission that could determine whether the United States launches a war against President Saddam Hussein's government.

After arriving at Saddam International Airport aboard a civilian version of a C-130 Hercules cargo plane, Hans Blix, the chief U.N. inspector, said comprehensive and credible inspections are "in the interest of Iraq and the interest of the world."

Perhaps mindful of his surroundings and his desire for Iraqi cooperation, Blix struck a more conciliatory tone than he did on leaving U.N. headquarters in New York on Nov. 15, when he warned Iraq that he would not tolerate "cat and mouse" games. In brief comments to journalists gathered at the airport here, he reiterated that his team would be fair to Iraq, adding: "We will report objectively. We will do our job professionally."

U.N. officials said Blix's comments were intended to win the confidence of Iraqi officials. But his strategy to seek cooperation over confrontation has been criticized by some officials in the Bush



2 possible suicide tries reported

Local authorities have responded to two possible suicide attempts since Sunday evening, following reports from UI psychologists that stress is at its highest level in recent years.

At 11 p.m. Sunday, a man whom witnesses described as approximately 20 years old entered an apartment and jumped off a second-story balcony after announcing, "This is the end." Residents of 325 E. College St. Apt. 1612 said the roughly 6-2, 260-pound man

they had never seen before entered the apartment, headed straight for the balcony, and jumped into the courtyard below.

"Within two seconds of getting into the apartment, he walked off the edge," said UI junior Ben Jones, a tenant of the apartment. "Within 20 seconds, we were calling an ambulance."

Police were unable to provide more information on the case, the man's name, or his condition. Reports show there was a lot of blood at the scene.

Around 2:30 p.m. Monday, police responded to an attempted suicide at Mayflower Residence Hall, according to dispatch over police scanner. Ambulances were

sent to the scene, and two minutes later, police dispatch said that a resident slit her or his wrists. Residence hall staff would only say that someone was hurt, refusing to comment further.

UI police said only that they responded to a medical call and would not release more information.

The events occurred during a fall semester that has been notable for its high levels of student stress, with University Counseling Service seeing 673 students for a litany of mental-health issues ranging from alcohol abuse to suicide. Last fall, 698 students were served by the center.

Mark Harris, an assistant director of the service, said he could not draw a correlation between the two suicide attempts and the increased use of student counseling. Counselors have attributed the campus and nationwide trend to the terrorist attacks, the rise in unemployment, the sniper shootings, and rising tuition.

"I would predict heavy use of our services to continue this fall," Harris said. "It hasn't shown signs of letting up."

UI begins week of thinking globally

Students and staff on Monday kicked off the first-ever UI International Education Week.

Events will run throughout the week centering on the theme "Securing the Future Through Study and Exchange." They will culminate with a Peace Corps presentation on Thursday and a visit from Christie Vilsack on Friday.

"We must recognize how vital it is to thrive in a global and economic world," said Lois Gray, the International Programs director of media relations.

The State Department and the Education Department collaborated in initiating the program three years ago. The departments' intention was to promote programs that prepare Americans for a global environment and to attract future leaders from abroad to study, learn, and exchange experiences in the United States.

According to the event's official Web site, 70 countries and 40 U.S. states are taking part in International Education Week 2002.

One goal of the event is to recognize those who educate the public about cross-cultural and international exchanges.

Study-abroad and international students will travel to surrounding schools to present information about different countries, including languages, cultures, and heritages.

Diana Davies, the International Programs director, said she wants the campus and community to real-

ize the effect study-abroad and international students have at the UI. This fall, 2,142 international students from more than 100 countries are studying at the university; 860 UI students studied abroad last year.

"I would like to inform the surrounding communities about the international programs available to them," she said. "We're more than just a foreign-exchange program."

Vilsack is scheduled to speak on "International Education: A Must for All Iowans" Friday at Congregational United Church of Christ, 30 N. Clinton St. Vilsack, who has traveled to such countries as Japan and Poland, is a logical candidate to speak because of her background on the issue, Davies said.

All of the events are open to the general community.

New books help Iowa immigrants

DES MOINES (AP) — A program designed by the University of Northern Iowa to help immigrants unveiled two new books Monday designed to help churches and employers work effectively with the newcomers.

Mark Grey, the director of the New Iowans program and co-author of the books, said immigrants are essential to economic development in Iowa.

Bishop Gregory Palmer of the Iowa Conference of the United Methodist Church said Christians should welcome immigrants "because it is the right thing to do."

He hopes *Welcoming New Iowans: A Guide for Christians and Churches* is widely distributed in Iowa.

The other book, *Welcoming New Iowans: A Guide for Managers and*

Supervisors, is aimed at businesses.

The Rev. Sarai Beck, the director of Ecumenical Ministries of Iowa, which funded the book for churches, said the Bible is full of examples of people "welcoming the stranger."

The 80-page book includes a brief history of immigration, a guide to the religious customs of various immigrants, suggestions on how to integrate newcomers into existing congregations, a Bible study guide, and a list of resources.

Secret court broadens wiretapping

A secretive appeals court ruled today that antiterrorism legislation approved last year gives the Justice Department broad authority to conduct wiretaps and other surveillance on terrorism suspects within the United States.

The order by the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court of Review represents a legal triumph for Attorney General John Ashcroft, who had pushed for the broader powers, and a clear setback for civil libertarians, who said the new measures would jeopardize the constitutional rights of U.S. citizens.

The 56-page ruling overturned a unanimous decision earlier this year by another secretive body, the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court, which oversees the system by which the FBI obtains

surveillance warrants in espionage and terrorism cases.

The lower court had rebuffed Ashcroft's requests for many new powers under the USA Patriot Act, arguing that the government had misused surveillance law in the past and had misled the court dozens of times.

But the three-judge appellate panel — hearing its first case in nearly a quarter century — found that the Justice Department's proposed use of the Patriot Act "is constitutional because the surveillances it authorizes are reasonable."

What's more, the appellate court found, Justice lawyers appear to have been misinterpreting secret wiretap law since the 1980s by construing limitations that did not exist within federal statutes. Many lawmakers and other critics have argued since the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks on New

York and the Pentagon that Justice and the FBI had grown too timid in its pursuit of secret warrants, including the case of alleged terrorist conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui.

Government lawyers wrote in court papers that the lower spy court had "wholly exceeded" its authority in refusing Ashcroft's requests for new powers, arguing that Congress had clearly approved broader surveillance authority in the wake of Sept. 11.

The American Civil Liberties Union and other groups maintained that Ashcroft's proposed reforms would impinge on First Amendment and due-process rights by giving the government a greater ability to monitor telephone conversations, read private e-mails, and conduct other surveillance.

Ashcroft hailed the ruling at a press conference this afternoon, saying it "revolutionizes our

ability to investigate terrorists and investigate terrorist acts."

The attorney general also announced a raft of changes now in the works to more aggressively pursue intelligence surveillance, including the creation of a new unit within the FBI to coordinate the use of such warrants.

The foreign intelligence court was created in 1978 to oversee intelligence surveillance by the FBI and other domestic agencies, and it is required to sign off on any clandestine monitoring within the United States. The May 17 ruling against Ashcroft was the only time the secretive court has ever publicly issued a joint ruling, and the government's appeal activated a special appeals court for the first time.

The spy court's unusual rules only give the government a right to appeal, but the ACLU and other groups are exploring other options, officials said.

City considers raising fines for housing

The Iowa City City Council will consider an ordinance tonight raising fines for offenders that violate codes, the second of three votes needed to pass the measure.

The first vote passed, 5-1, Monday, with Councilor Steven Kanner voting against the measure and Councilor Dee Vanderhoef absent. Kanner said he was against the ordinance because he didn't think it offered any solution.

The ordinance, which will take effect if passed at the council's Dec. 10 meeting, changes city law to increase civil penalties for nuisance, building, and fire-code violations.

The new ordinance would hike fines to \$250 for the first offense, \$500 for the second, and \$750 for the third, up from the \$100, \$250, and \$500 respectively.

The ordinance enacts one of the recommendations of the Neighborhood Relations Task Force, a now-defunct

group created to address the problems some area residents had with loud parties and cluttered yards.

Iowa women work more, earn less

DES MOINES (AP) — Women in Iowa work in higher numbers than almost any state in the nation, but their annual pay ranks near the bottom, according to a new study.

The study also found Iowa to be one of only three states in the nation to not have elected a woman to Congress or as governor. That's particularly disappointing because the state ranks high in voter registration and turnout.

"Our state's glass ceiling hangs lower than most states," said Peggy Huppert, the executive director of the Chrysalis Foundation, which funds programs of benefit to women and girls in Iowa. The group helped underwrite the report by the Institute for Women's Policy Research, a Washington-based public policy research group.

Recent bin Laden tape is authentic, U.S. intelligence says

The deep, unshaken voice calling for more attacks against the United States and its allies broadcast on the Al-Jazeera television network last week is a genuine, unedited audiotape made by Osama bin Laden in the past several weeks, U.S. intelligence officials said Monday.

Linguists at the National Security Agency who have been assigned for many years to study bin Laden's voice and analyze tape recordings and intercepts of his suspected conversations have no doubt it is the voice of Al Qaeda's leader. But the quality of the tape, in which bin Laden is believed to be speaking into a telephone that is near a tape recorder's microphone, is not good enough to allow a 100 percent certainty that it is him, a U.S. intelligence official said.

Still, the CIA and NSA assessment is the next best thing to definitive. "Our intelligence experts do believe that the tape is genuine," said White House spokesman Scott McClellan. "It cannot be stated with 100 percent certainty. It is clear that the tape was made in the last several weeks."

Some Democrats in Congress have used the tape as evidence that the administration has not done enough in the war on terrorism and should not be diverted from terrorism by launching a war in Iraq.

A number of high-ranking U.S. officials, among them National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice, responded last week by saying they had made significant

progress in capturing terrorists and disrupting terrorist plans. Monday, McClellan called bin Laden's audiotape "a reminder that we are at war on terrorism. It's a reminder that we need to continue doing everything we can to go after these terrorist networks and their leaders wherever they are, and we will."

The last firm evidence that bin Laden was alive came more than one year ago in a videotape, dated Nov. 9, 2001, showing bin Laden at a dinner with his chief deputy, Ayman Zawahiri. He appeared gaunt and weak, and some analysts believed he might have been wounded during U.S. air strikes in Afghanistan.

The recent audiotape was delivered to the Qatar-based Al-Jazeera Arabic language network last week. Intelligence experts believe the tape was made in the last several weeks because bin Laden praises the terrorist attack in Bali, the Chechen takeover of a theater in Moscow, and the recent shooting death of a U.S. diplomat in Jordan.

Kuwaiti authorities, meanwhile, are interrogating an alleged Al Qaeda member suspected of plotting to blow up a hotel frequented by U.S. officials in San'a, the capital of Yemen, said U.S. intelligence officials.

The man, Mohsen al-Fadhli, 21, was arrested with two other men Nov. 4. U.S. intelligence officials said he is believed to have been involved in an Al Qaeda plan to launch a car bomb attack against the hotel, where approximately 20 Americans — most of them government and military officials — are staying.

Al-Fadhli also is being investigated for possible involvement

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Coming softly with the change up

The mention of a dismemberment plan will usually bring to mind farm accidents, steel-mill mishaps, and shop-class fear. For the Dismemberment Plan of Washington, D.C., though, it's not digits being lost but the notion of genre that's been smashed up and reconfigured.

Since Travis Morrison (vocals, guitar), Jason Caddell (guitar, keyboards), Eric Axelson (bass, keyboards) and Joe Easle (drums) formed the D-Plan on New Year's Day 1993, the band has been cranking out a unique rock 'n' roll sound. *Change* (Desoto) continues to explore the bizarre possibilities for what a band would be

if Prince, the Talking Heads, and Modest Mouse were herded into a small room and zapped with an amalgamatic ray gun.

This mix 'n' match abandon resulted in some raw and danceable punk-funk on *I*, the band's debut, and manifested as manic acal freak outs on *The Dismemberment Plan is Terrified*.

Change, however, follows the trend of 1999's *Emergency and I* with a more relaxed feel and a subdued batch of creations.

Even though *Change* might be more of a grown-up sound for the D-Plan, the familiar funk-bass lines and rhythmic skitter are still there beneath all the restraint. "Automatic," for instance, places its trust in a sparse melody with Morrison accompanied only by the strumming of an acoustic gui-

tar. Similarly, "Come Home" is an almost jazzy exercise that sets up the adrenalized beats and dense synths of "Secret Curse," "Pay for the Piano," and "Time Bomb" — the tracks that would have been most at home on any of the band's earlier releases.

However, despite the album title, don't expect a Promise Ring, *Wood/ Water* debacle, or anything radically divergent. The growth registered in *Change* is both genuine and also a truly distinct and funky step in the D-Plan's evolutionary process.

Dismemberment Plan will appear tonight at Gabe's with New York's French Kicks.

Jackson's lottery

SANTA MARIA, Calif. (AP) — Michael Jackson, arriving at the courthouse to testify in a \$21 million lawsuit claiming he backed out on concerts, smiled as he offered his one-word assessment of the litigation process so far: "Interesting."

Jackson showed up early on Nov. 15 to greet fans before the third day of testimony. Carrying an umbrella to shadow himself from the sun and sporting a black leather jacket and sunglasses, he waved to admirers and flashed a "peace" symbol.

Court officials hosted a lottery to dole out a handful of courtroom seats to spectators.

The trial is expected to last into December, with a weeklong break for Thanksgiving. Jackson planned to be absent next week while he travels to Germany, where he says he is receiving a humanitarian award for helping children.

Jackson is being sued by his longtime promoter, Marcel Avram, for allegedly backing out of two concerts scheduled for New Year's Eve 1999. Jackson maintains that it was Avram, not he, who canceled the shows over concerns they would not be profitable.



Court probes bad death penalty lawyers

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court opened a fresh inquiry Monday into bad lawyering and the death penalty, accepting a case that could give justices a chance to spell out when inmates can claim that poor representation led to conviction.

The court already sided with prosecutors twice this year in ineffective-counsel cases. The latest appeal is less procedural and gives the justices a better opportunity to deal with the legal rights of people who face execution.

Defendants in capital cases often cannot afford to hire lawyers, so government-paid attorneys are appointed for them. The quality of those lawyers has troubled some Supreme Court members in recent years, and two justices have publicly criticized the quality of death-penalty attorneys.

The court's announcement that it would review the case of a man put on Maryland's death row for drowning an elderly woman gave opponents of capital punishment hope that worry about ineffective counsel will be reflected in the court's rule-making.

"I think it signals there are enough people on the court who are aware how terrible the representation is around the country and are willing to hear a case to address it," said Steven Hawkins, the executive director of the National Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty.

Kent Scheidegger, the legal director of the pro-death penalty Criminal Justice Legal Foundation, said nearly every death-row inmate claims ineffective counsel, and justices can use this case to clarify how the appeals should be reviewed.

In the past year, justices declared unconstitutional the execution of mentally retarded murderers and said juries, not judges, must decide issues that determine if a particular case warrants the death penalty.

Kevin Eugene Wiggins' appeal becomes the fifth death-penalty case that the Supreme Court will consider this term, an indication of the court's intense interest in the subject. The other four involve mechanics of imposing capital punishment; the Wiggins' case could be the most far-reaching of the five.

The Supreme Court refused to overturn Wiggins' conviction, but justices will consider whether his

appointed lawyers did enough investigating into his background to collect sympathetic evidence for jurors considering his fate.

At issue are Wiggins' rights under the Constitution's Sixth Amendment, which guarantees defendants a lawyer.

Public defenders did not tell the jury that Wiggins was beaten and raped as a child after being put in foster care when his abusive and alcoholic mother abandoned him. He was homeless at times and may be mentally retarded, his new lawyers contend.

Maryland Gov. Parris Glendening suspended executions in

that state this year while a study is conducted into whether capital punishment is used in a racially discriminatory way. Gov.-elect Robert Ehrlich has said he will lift the moratorium after he takes office in January.

A federal judge threw out Wiggins' conviction and death sentence, but an appeals court reinstated them.

The victim, a 77-year-old woman, was drowned in the tub of her Baltimore County apartment. There was no evidence linking Wiggins to the crime, but he was found driving her car.

Wiggins' new attorney, Donald Verrilli Jr., said in court filings the lawyers assigned to defend Wiggins, who is now 41, were inexperienced and overworked.

Richard Garnett, a law professor at the University of Notre Dame, said the case is a challenging one for the court.

"It's tricky to lay down any clear bright-line rule governing how capital-defense lawyers should behave," Garnett said.

The case is *Wiggins v. Corcoran*, 02-311.

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California may face Terminator for gov.

LOS ANGELES — He has been a genetically engineered twin and a pregnant man, a barbarian and a spy, a kindergarten cop and a killer. Now, some Republicans are casting Arnold Schwarzenegger as the next governor of California.

Fresh from the Election Day success of a \$550 million education measure that he sponsored, the actor has become perhaps California's most promising GOP candidate — even though he is not yet running for anything.

"Arnold Schwarzenegger would do a tremendous amount to reinvigorate the party itself and the image of the party to most Californians," said Brian Todd of Bakersfield, a delegate to state party conventions.

The body-builder-turned-action-hero deflects questions about his political ambitions, but many Republicans expect — and hope — he will run for governor in four years.

The Austrian-born actor considered seeking the nomination against Democratic Gov. Gray Davis this past year. Supporters launched a "T2 in '02" movement, and T-shirts with the slogan were snapped up at the party convention in February. But Schwarzenegger decided not to run, citing his contract to film *Terminator 3*, set for release next summer.

Instead, he drafted, funded, and starred in TV commercials for Proposition 49, which dedicates as much as \$550 million annually to before- and after-school programs. The measure passed by a wide margin earlier this month.

America's most successful actor-turned-politician, Ronald Reagan, blazed the trail a generation ago. Before becoming governor of California and then president, Reagan made the transition into politics as president of the Screen Actors' Guild and spokesman for General Electric. Other celebrities who have switched to politics include former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood and Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ventura.

Schwarzenegger's name, wealth, and potential to appeal to Democrats and moderates make him an attractive candidate in a state in which Democrats outnumber Republicans 45 percent to 35 percent.

"It's pretty clear that right now Schwarzenegger is a strong early front-runner for the nomination," said GOP consultant Dan Schnur. "Proposition 49 was the first primary of the 2006 governor's race if Arnold Schwarzenegger wants it to be."

Schwarzenegger, 55, told the Associated Press: "To me it's a great honor to be considered for those kind of things. I think it's great people say, 'He's the ideal candidate' or 'He can win.'"

Obviously, it's much better if people say that than if they say the opposite. But I don't have a plan like that."

Republican state Sen. Tom McClintock could be a potential rival in 2006, though he conceded defeat Monday in the state controller's race. The move gave Democrats rare control of all statewide offices.

If Schwarzenegger runs, he could have the advantage of a Democratic field divided among four or five of the Democrats' statewide officeholders.

Another Democrat mentioned as a contender has been actor-director Rob Reiner of "All in the Family" fame, raising the prospect of a Terminator vs. Meathead matchup. But Reiner associates say he has no plans to run.

There are obstacles between the Terminator and the Republican nomination. GOP primaries in California tend to favor conservative candidates, and Schwarzenegger describes himself as "very liberal" on social issues. He favors legalized abortion, some gun-control measures, and gay adoption. His wife, Kennedy cousin Maria Shriver, is a Democrat.

Republican insiders differ on whether the nomination is his for the taking.

"At this point for the Republican nomination, it would be a coronation," said GOP consultant Kevin Spillane, who helped run former Los Angeles Mayor Richard Riordan's losing campaign for governor. Riordan, a GOP moderate, lost the nomination to a conservative, Bill Simon.

"It's not going to be a coronation," said veteran GOP strategist Ken Khachigian. But he added: "If he makes the rounds and raises money, participates in the debate, lets us know where he is on issues over the next year and a half, obviously, he has a great deal of name ID, and everything being equal, I think people would be interested in his running."

Schwarzenegger got a taste of the rough and tumble of politics last year, when a Davis strategist responded to his potential candidacy by bombarding newsroom fax machines with tabloid stories of alleged groping and womanizing by the actor.

Schwarzenegger is also responsible for hundreds of on-screen deaths and is shown smoking pot in *Pumping Iron*, the 1977 documentary about his bodybuilding days.

"None of those things have been an obstacle to me, and I don't think any of the things will be an obstacle to me," he said. "I'm extremely proud of my background."

Creative and considerate — the writing on the wall

People tend to notice Yasser Arafat donning a Hawkeye football uniform. Likewise, when Ariel Sharon executes a handstand in a tutu, George Bush dresses as a hippie, and Saddam Hussein does his best Michael Jackson impression, the passerby stops to look.

The four caricatures stand together as one of many murals now covering the makeshift wall surrounding the Old Capitol. Together, the murals have enlivened trips through the Pentacrest and won praise from many students.

A select few, however, have criticized the project for being offensive and overly political. Neither criticism has much merit and should not take away from the success of the project.

Iowans for Peace painted the portion of the wall in question as part of interim President Sandy Boyd's experiment to beautify the Old Capitol area by putting paintbrushes into the hands of students. Under the broad theme of "Common Experiences, Diverse Stories," the peace group transformed its assigned panel into a unique and tactful representation of its message.

Given the loaded nature of Middle Eastern politics, Iowans for Peace could easily have fashioned a mural with more radical imagery. To their great credit, the group's members did just the opposite: By using imagination and humor, their finished product encourages inclusiveness and de-emphasizes routine ways of thinking about the subject.

Even so, criticism arose last week that the depiction of Arafat in Hawkeye attire might

offend those who see him as a terrorist. Arafat's arbitrary garments aside (he could just as well have been the ballerina or Michael Jackson), the critics have apparently not given thought to other perspectives of "terrorism." Just as particular groups perceive Arafat as terrorist, others might levy the same charge against Sharon, Bush, and/or Saddam.

Obviously aware of multiple perspectives, Iowans for Peace places them all in equally colorful and interesting lights.

Another complaint made about the project is that publicly funded property should not display such highly political messages and imagery. In theory, this argument makes sense, but any student knows that people of all lifestyles regularly use the Pentacrest as an ideological message board. Whether by graffiti that formerly layered the wall or through the constant rallying and distribution of fliers that occur there, the Pentacrest has always been a political place.

At least this way, a greater variety of voices were encouraged to participate at the same time, thereby celebrating the simultaneous unity and diversity of the UI.

These few weak criticisms aside, the Old Capitol art reflects the myriad passions of the students and should be thought of as quite an accomplishment. Great praise belongs to both Boyd for founding the project and to groups such as Iowans for Peace, which meshed their worldview with their creativity so deftly.

If Shawn Showers (*DI*, Nov. 13) wants to do something other than attack Ms. Eggleston, here are a few things he and all Democrats can apologize for:


1) Being generous with everyone's money except their own.



Victim's statement causes uproar

through a patio door. After she got home and found blood on her underwear, the victim and her roommate went to Mercy Hospital, where it was determined that she suffered from tearing and bruising to her vaginal and rectal areas. Police recovered five pieces of evidence from the apartment: a condom, bar wrist bands, a pillow case, and two bed sheets. Assistant Johnson County Attorney Anne Lahey said she believed the state had a strong case with the evidence, medical records, and the woman's potential testimony, which is why she "did not necessarily agree" with Pierce's plea bargain.

With the victim's consent, prosecutors dropped the original third-degree sexual assault charge, a class C felony. Pierce instead pleaded guilty to assault causing injury, a serious misdemeanor, that was deferred — netting him probation and 200 hours of community service. Some university students say that Pierce "got off too easy" and should not have been permitted back on the basketball team. "It sounds like he raped her, and the university has been too lenient because he is an athlete," said senior Bryan Shepherd, noting the university's contact with lawyers in criminal case. Following the case's conclusion, the sophomore guard was allowed to continue his basketball scholarship — but he will red-

shirt and watch the Hawkeyes from the bench. Some members of the university community will protest tonight before the men's exhibition game at Carver-Hawkeye Arena to support Boyd's call for equal treatment of all UI students, including athletes, regarding violence and sexual harassment. Boyd, unhappy with the way administrators handled Pierce's criminal case, demanded on Nov. 6 that the Board in Control of Athletics review and change its policies. Board Chairman Nicholas Colangelo, a professor of education, has assembled a committee and will organize its first meeting within 10 days, using Boyd's request as a guide to reshape the policies. "The two things that matter

are to do it a very thorough fashion and in a timely manner so the president has our report as soon as possible," he said. Two petitions circulating the campus are also calling for a university review of the situation, asserting that Pierce received preferential treatment because of his stature on campus. The petitions — one geared toward students and one for faculty and staff — have garnered more than 1,000 signatures; they will be submitted to university officials later this week. "The case is most assuredly under active consideration," Boyd said. "We want to be sure that justice is done."

Des Moines, where her body was found by land surveyors. "There are a lot of questions about the death that we are trying to answer for the family," Shay said. Quyen Chau, who was on antidepressant medication intermittently and was not receiving counseling immediately prior to her death, had returned to UI this fall after attending Des Moines Area Community College for a year and a half. A 2000 honors graduate from Hoover High School in Des Moines, she cultivated a deep

admiration for children while working at a day-care center as a teenager, her sister said. "She loved kids. Whenever she saw kids, even if she didn't know them, she would talk to them," Tram Chau said. Quyen Chau studied diligently to achieve her dream of becoming a pediatrician, maintaining a grade point above a 3.0 and obtaining her Certified Nursing Assistant's Certificate in July. "She was always helping, always taking care of other people. She just wanted everything to be perfect," Tram Chau said.

and open for change, whereas President Coleman seemed to delegate all her authority out to people below her and seemed to want to maintain the status quo," Herbold said. Jane Van Voorhis, who was hired as the outreach coordinator, works to create a network of state connections and speaking opportunities for faculty and administrators to laud the university. "I believe that President Boyd is a conscientious steward of the UI," she said. "He's adding value and continuing to move the UI in a positive direction." Boyd, who was chosen by administrators as the interim president from a pool of five candidates and confirmed by the state Board of Regents, said that although some changes need to be implemented, he is reluctant to make any "radical" changes. When some officials called for shifts in administration, Boyd objected.

"I'm not changing any of the administration," he said. "That would be inappropriate. Those decisions are to be for the next president." He says he determines whether to get involved and make a decision based on necessity. "I would say that what we're doing is absolutely necessary," he said. "We're not doing anything that could be considered radical. What we're doing reflects the inherent direction of the university at this time." Boyd, a law professor, replaced Coleman in August, when she left to take the helm of the University of Michigan. His stay in Jessup Hall will come to an end as soon as the next university president takes the post. A search committee is expected to make that selection in January; the next president will likely take over sometime next summer. A nonprofit activist who first started at the university as a law professor in 1954, Boyd left his position as president for a 15-year

stint as president of Chicago's world-renowned Field Museum before returning to the university in 1996 to teach law classes on nonprofit organizations in the building that bears his name. The key to leading the UI is staying in touch with students, faculty, and administration, Boyd said. "I've always said that people, not structures, make great universities," Boyd said. "It's important to hear them and work with them."

said she was battling the flu around the time of her death. Any type of illness, including the flu, can complicate diabetes by causing increased blood sugar, which health officials suspect caused Brock's death. Ryan Gaspar, a UI senior and the president of the student group Diabetes Awareness Reachout Team, said the life of a diabetic is difficult. "When living with type I diabetes, you're constantly monitoring

your blood sugar and taking insulin every time you eat," he said. Gaspar, who suffers from type I diabetes, said friends and roommates should be aware of a diabetic's condition but should exercise caution before trying to aid someone suffering from diabetes-related problems. If a diabetic passes out from low blood sugar, informed individuals should place sugary foods in the victim's mouth, Gaspar said, adding that uneducated persons should simply call 911 immediately and wait for paramedics to arrive. "If their [blood sugar is] high,

sugar is the last thing you want to give them. They need insulin," he said. The Hillcrest community, along with professionals from the University Counseling Service, Student Health Service, resident assistants, and Residence Services held a discussion Monday night to allow students to express their feelings about the tragedy and to talk about Brock. Approximately 20 students gathered in the Riverview lounge for the discussion. Counselors have been made available to students. "It makes us all step back and

question," said counseling service Director Sam Cochran, who was in attendance. "This is a difficult situation for all of us. Everyone handles this differently." Students should not to feel guilty about Brock's death, he said, adding that there's little someone unacquainted with diabetes can do in such a situation. "It's always tough to lose a young person like that," said Maggie Van Oel, the director of Residence Services. "It seems like such a waste."

U.S. waits for clear pattern of Iraqi violations

administration, which wants Blix to swiftly embark on intrusive inspections and impose strict reporting requirements on the Iraqi government to test Saddam's willingness to comply with a new U.N. Security Council resolution. Should Iraq fail to comply, President Bush has said, "the United States will lead a coalition and disarm him." The Bush administration is waiting for a clear pattern of violations by Iraq before pursuing a showdown in the United Nations, even as allied warplanes come under repeated attack recently. Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld called Iraq's no-fly-zone firing unacceptable. But he also said Monday, "It's up to the president and the U.N. Security Council on their view of Iraq's behavior over a period of time, and those discussions have just begun." White House deputy spokesman Scott McClellan condemned the Iraqi attacks — at least four in the past few days — as "a violation that would constitute a material breach" of the resolution adopted unanimously by the council Nov. 8 to force Iraq to disarm. But McClellan, like Rumsfeld, indicated the administration was not taking its complaint to the council, which threatened Iraq with consequences in the event of

breaches of U.N. resolutions. "We have that option," the spokesman said, indicating that a decision had not been made by President Bush. The president repeatedly has threatened President Saddam Hussein with war if he reneges on his assurance that he will comply with U.N. orders to get rid of weapons of mass destruction. By holding off, the administration defers a potential confrontation with U.S. allies. They were reluctant in the first place to threaten Iraq with force if it did not admit international inspectors and disarm, and they are still disinclined to attack Baghdad. It also gives the United States and Britain new opportunities to respond to attacks on patrolling aircraft by bombing Iraqi installations. In Baghdad, before mentioning the danger of war, Blix empha-

sized that Iraqi compliance with the inspections would result in the lifting of economically debilitating U.N. sanctions imposed on Iraq after its August 1990 invasion of Kuwait. He also asserted that the cooperation of Saddam's government could help set in motion a political process to eliminate weapons of mass destruction in other Middle Eastern nations.

Bulger throws 347 yards against battered Bears

ST. LOUIS — Marc Bulger carried the St. Louis Rams closer in their improbable run toward the playoffs although Kurt Warner made a cameo appearance a week earlier than scheduled.

Bulger threw for 347 yards and two touchdowns Monday night as the Rams beat the Chicago Bears, 21-16, to win their fifth-straight after opening the season with five losses. That pulls them to within two games of San Fran-

cisco in the NFC West.

It wasn't easy, even against the battered Bears (2-8), who trailed by a point into the fourth quarter and cut it to 21-16 on Paul Edinger's 50-yard field goal with 3:42 left. But Bulger completed a clutch 10-yard pass on third-and-9 to Torry Holt with 2:30 remaining that forced the Bears to use their last timeouts.

Isaac Bruce had six receptions for 141 yards, and Adam Archuleta led a Rams defense that sacked Chris Chandler seven times. Chandler was playing with a sore neck in place of Jim Miller, who had a sore elbow.

Warner, who missed five games with a broken pinkie and is scheduled to return next week in Washington, made his first appearance since Sept. 29 in the second quarter, when Bulger was taken to the locker room for X-rays on an injured index finger on his throwing hand.

Warner was sacked by Keith

Taylor and was 1-2 for 13 yards. Bulger, now 5-0 as a starter, returned after X-rays were negative.

With Marshall Faulk out with ankle and foot injuries, the Rams had almost no running game. Lamar Gordon, Faulk's replacement, caught a 22-yard touchdown pass late in the first half, but St. Louis was limited to just 62 yards on the ground by Brian Urlacher and the Chicago defense.

The Rams scored on the first and last drives of the first half to take a 14-6 halftime lead.

The first drive was 65 yards on 10 plays and was capped on a 1-yard run on an inside reverse to tight end Ernie Conwell. It featured consecutive completions of 21 and 22 yards to Bruce from Bulger, who completed 21-35 passes.

The second covered 81 yards in four plays and just 46 seconds, and the score came on the pass to Gordon.

In between, the Bears got field goals of 37 and 48 yards from Edinger. They also stopped what looked like a scoring drive on the Rams' second possession.

Kaeding named as finalist for award

Iowa place kicker Nate Kaeding has been named as one of three finalists for the prestigious Lou Groza Award, given annually to the nation's best collegiate kicker.

The junior made 20 field goals in 22 attempts this season and set the single-season Iowa scoring record with 115 points. He also set school records for consecutive field goals and consecutive extra points.

Kaeding made his first 19 attempts of the season, including a career-long 55 yard try at Penn State on Sept. 28, and he needs just eight more field goals to tie the Iowa career mark of 54 set by Rob Houghtlin in 1987.

Ohio State's Mike Nugent and Oregon's Jared Siegel join Kaeding as a finalist for the award, named after the former Cleveland Browns kicker. It will be presented during a ceremony on Dec. 10.



BCS's No. 7 Hawkeyes wait for bowl assignment

Now that the regular season is essentially over for the Iowa football team as it enjoys its only week off this season, head coach Kirk Ferentz is looking forward to taking things on in a new perspective.

"I'm a fan now for the next couple of weeks," he said Monday. And that means Ferentz will

attempt to do what just about every college football fan has tried since 1998.

"I'm gonna try to figure out the BCS," he said, only half-jokingly.

The Bowl Championship Series, established in the hope of crowning a clear national champion each season, is a complicated array of rankings and numbers crunched by a computer that generates a list of the top teams in the country each week. Ferentz and the Hawkeyes

are currently No. 7 in the BCS rankings, with Miami and Big Ten rival Ohio State occupying the top two spots this week.

There remains a slim possibility that the BCS rankings could somehow keep the Hawkeyes from making their first trip to the Rose Bowl since 1991, and that's all the more reason for Ferentz and his team to keep their eyes on television sets in the coming weeks.

"Certainly, we'll be watching

with great curiosity," Ferentz said. "We'll know more about the landscape within the next three weeks."

They'll know a lot more this coming weekend, when the Buckeyes, 11-0 overall and 7-0 in conference play, host Michigan. If Ohio State wins, it will be co-champions of the Big Ten along with Iowa and would most

Is the BCS a fair way to determine bowl games?

Emotion and bias can corrupt the most honorably intentioned human. Capt. James T. Kirk of "Star Trek" often flies into the face of trouble only to be saved by the cool computer logic of Spock. And like their current day counterparts, the BCS is rallying to the rescue of the AP and coaches' polls.

The BCS takes into account three numbers: strength of schedule, losses, and wins over quality teams.

A computer crunches these numbers as easily as Arnold Schwarzenegger crushes beer cans against his head — without the propensity to brag about it later. The computer isn't trying to impress anyone.

What do the other polls do? Basically the same thing without assigning numerical values. What's the difference then? The other polls are held under the sway of human opinion.

Because we are ruled by our emotions, we can't make unbiased choices. I'm prejudiced. I want to see Wallcut to win the Heisman. I'm going to vote for him even though he may not be the best candidate. I also like peanuts in the shell, even though logic dictates that shelled peanuts deliver the same amount of salty euphoria with less effort.

The BCS can't become much more fair. An antiquated belief in the traditional bowl ranking system is destroying a perfectly reasonable approach to deciding who is the best in the country. It's too bad the BCS doesn't decide all the bowl games — matching up No. 1 and 2, 3, and 4, and so on.

Instead, we get the privilege of watching newcomer, the San Francisco Bowl. The No. 3 in the Mountain West conference plays Big East's No. 4 or 5. If I have my choice, I'll take a Vulcan Nerve Pinch, please.

As long as the Earth is spinning on its axis, college football fans have a breath in their body, and the Bowl Championship Series poll is used to determine the college football national champion, people will debate its merits. The debate is justified: The BCS needs to go.

Too many facets of the BCS are either unfair, unjustified, or both. Miami scheduled a brutally tough slate this year in hopes of vanquishing any possible argument by pollsters. Florida State, Tennessee, and Florida all took the place of possible cupcakes on the 'Canes docket, but because of uncharacteristically poor seasons by those squads, Miami must sweat out the poll's release each week.

The BCS committee made another mistake by taking out one component that was warranted. Margin of victory is no longer used to determine a team's total in the poll. This unfairly rewards teams, such as Ohio State, that repeatedly squeak out victories over such mediocre opponents as Purdue and Illinois. Meanwhile, teams such as the Hawkeyes gain little by dominating, say, Northwestern.

The institution of the BCS also has taken away much of the tradition of such games as the Rose Bowl. Last year, Illinois and its fans were robbed of a visit to Pasadena because the national championship rotates its sites.

The BCS was instituted to eliminate the possibility of split national champions, as in 1997, when Michigan and Nebraska had to share the crown. Although that reasoning was justified, now instead of having sportswriters making the decision, computers also have a say in who's the best in the land.

The solution of how to remedy college football's current quandary is simple — a playoff is needed. The fairest way to determine a champion is on the field.

Tonight's game is last chance to tinker

The Iowa men's basketball team will get one last tune-up tonight before wins and losses begin to count.

The Hawkeyes host the Nike Elite squad today at 7:05 p.m. at Carver-Hawkeye Arena for one last exhibition contest before preparing for the nonconference portion of the schedule, which begins with Florida Atlantic on Nov. 24.

Iowa's first exhibition game against the EA Sports All-Stars on Nov. 13 offered head coach Steve Alford plenty of ideas about what areas the team needs to fine tune.

First and foremost, that means figuring out who will play and when.

"In years past, it has been more like the NFL, where you play your stars the first half," Alford said via teleconference Monday. "But this year is different. We've really got to work on getting those guys minutes."

Alford said he views tonight's meeting with the Nike team as another opportunity to do that while continuing to tinker with the rotations he and his staff will use during the regular season.

It will also help to see how the different rotations fare against stiffer competition than the EA Sports team, which tired in the second half of Iowa's 68-55 victory.

"It's a better team than EA Sports," said Alford of the Nike team, which has already played four other Big Ten opponents this month. "I'm just anxious to see if we've improved."

Alford will also keep an eye on Iowa's two true freshmen, Jeff Horner and Greg Brunner, both of whom had impressive Iowa debuts last week. Horner scored eight points and doled out six assists against the All-Stars, and Brunner impressed observers with 11 points and four rebounds.

Tonight's game will be another step in the learning process for both players, who will be counted on to keep growing during the upcoming season — especially Horner, who along with Chauncey Leslie and Brody Boyd, will likely make up Alford's three-guard triumvirate when he uses only two post players.

"We're not really big, and that's a concern," Alford said. "We need those three guys to run the floor and push it, and so far they've done a real nice job."

Because Iowa isn't very big, Brunner will also be relied on to play a lot of minutes this season alongside Glen Worley, Sean Sonderleiter, and Jared Reiner. Alford said he has been impressed by Brunner's work ethic.

"He's gonna make some freshman mistakes, but they're mistakes we can live with," Alford said.

NFL's drug policy under fire

It's not like the kid is short on walking-around money. Earlier this year, Julius Peppers became the No. 2 pick in the draft and the highest-paid player in Carolina Panthers' history — as much as \$62 million over seven years.

His chances of cashing in on a \$1 million bonus took a major hit Sunday — but not because of any sins the rookie defender committed in a 23-10 loss at Tampa Bay. Peppers' line in the scoring summary read: two tackles, zero assists, and a sack — his league-leading 11th of the season and one of just two registered by the Panthers. All in all, not a bad day's work.

Not good enough.

Not for a guy about to begin a four-game suspension.

Peppers has been charged with violating the NFL's substance-abuse policy and only played Sunday because his appeal is pending. He probably will meet with the league's disciplinarians today in New York, and chances he'll leave town with his sentence overturned are about the same as striking oil downstairs from the league's Park Avenue offices.

Besides costing Peppers at least \$235,000 in lost wages, missing those four games could also steal his chances of making the Pro Bowl, being named defensive rookie of the year, and pocketing the aforementioned \$1 million bonus.

In his last public statement on the matter, Peppers sounded resigned.

"While I would like to provide the fans with more information, due to the legal ramifications I cannot comment on the situation, and I will not be able to until the appeal process is complete," he said.

Peppers' agent, Marvin Demoff, said the league told him his client tested positive for a banned substance in a dietary supplement. A source close to Peppers, speaking on the condi-

tion of anonymity, said the substance was not steroids.

Substances banned by the NFL are available over all kinds of counters, from the fruit-smoothie stand at the mall to any corner pharmacy with a variety of cold medications. Now for the weird part: All things considered, Peppers might have been better off getting busted for steroids, marijuana, or cocaine.


The NFL substance-abuse policy is set up so a player testing positive the first time for anabolic steroids or a stimulant is treated the same: a four-game suspension. If the same player gets caught using illegal drugs, a first-time offense results in mandatory counseling, treatment, and continued testing but no loss of playing time.

"If the whole defensive line was getting high, nothing would happen to them," agent George Mavrikes said. "But because they took a diet pill or something of that nature, they get suspended, and the team gets killed."

Mavrikes' client is Panthers defensive tackle Brentson Buckner, who didn't play in Tampa Bay because he's serving a four-game suspension of his own, after testing positive for a stimulant Mavrikes says was contained in a weight-loss product.

The NFL has its rationale, and the truth is it holds together well. League spokesman Greg Aiello explained, "Athletes who use steroids get a competitive advantage on the field. It forces their competitors to decide whether to use the same illegal substances. That's not the case when somebody uses street drugs or recreational drugs."

Some agents balked when the NFL Players Association backed the league's decision on ephedrine, a stimulant that often is found in food supplements and can cause seizures, strokes, or even death. Some implied that the NFL rushed the ban into effect only after Minnesota lineman Corey Stringer died in the training camp heat the summer before last.

The union, wisely, was less concerned with cause than effect. The association was willing to let first-time offenders get punished severely if that was what it took to get the message across.

"How we first started this policy," Stacy Robinson, the union's director of player development, told the *Charlotte Observer*, "is players stepped up and said, 'Look, I don't want to take this stuff. If this guy takes it, I have to take it, or he'll have an unfair advantage on me.'"

As part of a continuing campaign, the league sent all 32 teams a memo this weekend warning they can be fined if

they supply players with banned supplements.

There is at least one other area where more leveling is needed.

The NFL's personal-conduct policy, of which the drug rules are part, currently covers "all full-time employees of the National Football League, its clubs, and related entities" but not the owners. They answer only to Commissioner Paul Tagliabue.

Indianapolis Colts owner Jim Irsay recently admitted he struggled with prescription-drug abuse for years. NFL spokesman Aiello acknowledged the commissioner and Irsay spoke on "several recent occasions."

Duke ranked No.1 Penguins fall short in OT

An impressive victory in its opener lifted Louisiana Tech six spots Monday in the AP women's basketball poll, which still had Duke, Tennessee, and LSU as the top three teams.

Louisiana Tech beat then-No. 7 Texas Tech, 85-76, in the Tip-Off Classic and jumped to 10th in the voting by a national media panel.

It was a solid start for new coach Kurt Budke, who replaced Leon Barmore, the career leader in winning percentage among women's coaches.

Duke, which earned its first No. 1 ranking in the preseason poll, received 37 of 42 first-place votes and had 1,043 points. The Blue Devils open the season Friday against East Carolina.

Tennessee, which beat Oklahoma, 94-68, in the other game at the Tip-Off Classic, had four first-place votes and 1,010 points. LSU received one first-place vote and 929 points. The Lady Tigers start their season Friday in Arizona.

Only eight ranked teams have played so far, but that was enough to produce some movement in the Top 25.

Kansas State moved up one spot to fourth after winning twice in the preseason WNIT. Texas Tech tumbled from seventh to 13th, and Colorado State went from 19th to 24th after losing to Southern Cal in the second round of the WNIT.

Mississippi State won twice in the WNIT to move from 24th to 20th. Penn State, the other WNIT semifinalist, remained at No. 14.

Oklahoma, which lost four starters from the team that was the NCAA Tournament runner-up last season, slipped one spot to 23rd after the loss to Tennessee.

Stanford climbed one place to fifth, and defending national champion Connecticut fell two spots to sixth, the lowest ranking for the Huskies since they were No. 6 the week of March 2, 1999. Connecticut will open against Wright State on Friday night.

Purdue, Georgia, Notre Dame, and Louisiana Tech completed the Top 10.

Vanderbilt was 11th, and Texas 12th, followed by Texas Tech, Penn State, North Carolina, Minnesota, Arkansas, Cincinnati, Boston College, and Mississippi State.

George Washington, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Colorado State, and Cal Santa Barbara held the final five places.

The season will begin in earnest this weekend. The big games will be Nov. 24 at the Jimmy V Classic in Raleigh, N.C., where Duke plays Tennessee, and Connecticut meets North Carolina State.

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

Arizona, Kansas on top of AP poll

Alabama hasn't been regarded this highly in 25 years. The Crimson Tide rose four places to No. 4 in the Associated Press men's college basketball poll Monday, their best ranking, since they were in the same spot on Feb. 15, 1977.

Like Alabama, Texas improved on its preseason ranking thanks to a victory in the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic at Madison Square Garden. The Longhorns moved up one place to No. 3 in the first poll of the regular season.

Arizona and Kansas held on to the Nos. 1 and 2 spots they occupied in the preseason poll.

The Wildcats received 58 first-place votes and 1,736 points in the voting by a national media panel, while Kansas was rated No. 1 on 10 ballots and had a total of 1,679 points.

Texas, which beat then-No. 16

Georgia, 77-71, in New York, moved up one spot from its highest ranking ever.

Alabama jumped from eighth on the strength of its 68-62 victory over then-No. 3 Oklahoma. The Crimson Tide now can aim to match their highest ranking ever — they were third in the Feb. 1, 1977, poll.

Pittsburgh, which had one first-place vote, and Duke remained fifth and sixth, while Oklahoma fell four spots to No. 7.

Florida, Michigan State, and Oregon rounded out the Top 10.

Xavier dropped one spot from the preseason poll to sit 11th, while defending national champion Maryland and Mississippi State — which drew the only other first-place vote — tied for 12th.

Connecticut was 14th, followed by UCLA, Marquette, Kentucky, Georgia, Western Kentucky, and Missouri.

The last five ranked teams were Gonzaga, Indiana, Cincinnati, Minnesota, and Tulsa.

likely remain one of the top two BCS teams, ensuring the Buckeyes play in the national championship game rather than the Rose Bowl.

A loss by Ohio State would make Iowa the outright Big Ten winner and give the Hawkeyes the bowl berth guaranteed to go to the league's winner under the terms of the Big Ten's agreement with the BCS.

But there are still numerous other scenarios with varying probabilities that will leave the Hawkeyes tuned to televisions, as well as holding off on travel reservations to Pasadena just yet.

Ferentz calls himself a "traditionalist" when discussing the BCS system and bowl berths, so he would likely be as disappointed as anyone if his team was somehow prevented from playing in the Rose Bowl, the New Year's Day destination for champions of the Big Ten and Pac-10 for decades. But playing elsewhere would not take away from a remarkable season that saw Iowa set a new standard for victories with 11 and run the gamut in the Big Ten for the first time since Warren Harding occupied the White House.

"At worst, we're co-champs," Ferentz said. "If it goes the other way [and Ohio State loses] it'd be nice to be full champs, but again you can't diminish an 8-0 record."

As for the team's plans when it comes to taking time off, Ferentz said the team wouldn't do anything "too taxing" this week

and would be given all of next week of to enjoy the Thanksgiving holiday with family as well as enjoy the moment before getting back to work the first week of December.

No better timing

With a bye week in Big Ten play this weekend, Iowa's Fred Russell, Scott Boleyn, and D.J. Johnson have extra time to heal from injuries.

Russell, who rushed for 194 yards against Minnesota last weekend, left that game with a shoulder injury. Ferentz did not want to go into specifics on the injury, but Russell's left arm was in a sling on Monday, and the coach said the team's starting running back will benefit the most from the time off.

Boleyn sprained his knee during second half action against the Gophers and will likely be ready to return to practice after the break, as will Johnson, who missed Iowa's final two games of the season with a hamstring injury.

Iowa braintrust

Ferentz extended his congratulations to kicker Nate Kaeding, offensive lineman Andy Lightfoot, and defensive lineman Jared Clauss for making the Verizon Academic All-American team at the district level.

Kaeding and Lightfoot were named to the first team, while Clauss landed on the second. This marks Lightfoot's third season as an academic all-district All-American.

Ferentz expressed his hopes that at least one of the two first team all-district members can

land a spot on the national academic All-American list, as defensive end Aaron Kampman did last season.

Kampman, now with the NFL's Green Bay Packers, was the only player from a Big Ten team to make the national first team in 2001.

Staying put ... for now

The question was posed to Ferentz about possibly being linked to NFL coaching jobs again this season after leading the Hawkeyes to an 11-1 season. "Never say never," he replied.

Last season, Ferentz had his name linked to a few NFL openings, most notably the Indianapolis Colts. He said common sense would dictate he would once again be brought up in speculation surrounding job openings, but he was content to stay put for now.

"It's like I said a couple weeks ago, why would I want to leave here?" he replied. "I'm extremely happy here, I've got a great job, I've got a fantastic job."

Ferentz said there may be "sexier" jobs available on the surface, but bigger may not always be better. He used an interesting analogy to explain why.

"I drive a Chevrolet, and I love my Chevrolet," he said. "My car dealer is the best guy in the world, and that's a big part of it."

Speaking of job openings

Ferentz smiled when a reporter asked for his thoughts on the rumor that former Iowa coach Hayden Fry was rumored to be on a list of possibilities to fill the vacancy at Baylor.

The 73-year old Fry played

quarterback at Baylor from 1947-1950 and was an assistant coach there in 1960.

A return to the sidelines by Fry seems unlikely in Ferentz's eyes. "He's way too smart to go back [to coaching]," he said.

Second thoughts

On Monday Ferentz again reflected on the only time he ever doubted whether he could have success at Iowa.

It came following Iowa's 38-10 loss to Ohio State in 2000 when offensive lineman Sam Aiello was injured during practice the following week.

"That was one moment where I kind of went in the tank," he said. "It was a tough night; I just started wondering a little bit."

Ferentz said he felt the team "really dug in" following that and, after losing to Wisconsin the following week, the Hawkeyes went on to win two of their final three games to finish the season 3-9.

On the recruiting trail

Having the next few weeks off will also help Iowa in its recruiting efforts, Ferentz said. The break allows the coaching staff time to focus on the team's current targets and figure out where to rank the prospects.

Iowa's success will not change Ferentz's recruiting philosophy, though.

"It's good players, but more importantly, it's players we feel good about [as people and as athletes]," he said. "It's not like we've got a bunch of big recruits out there right now."

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Ali visits overseas for U.N. peacekeeping

KABUL, Afghanistan — Schoolgirls showered Muhammad Ali with flower petals Monday during the former heavyweight champ's visit to a U.N.-sponsored school in Afghanistan's capital.

Ali, who made the trip to Kabul as a "U.N. Messenger of Peace," signed autographs and handed out volleyballs and jumping ropes.

Ronald DiNicola, who served as the boxing legend's personal attorney for 15 years, said Ali came because he wanted to help focus world attention on Afghanistan's massive humanitarian needs.

"He wants to keep the spotlight of international attention on what's going on here," DiNicola told the Associated Press. "Especially in light of other world events."

The 60-year-old former heavyweight champion, who suffers from Parkinson's disease, walked slowly and hardly spoke as he toured a girls' school in western Kabul.

His sense of humor was intact. As he positioned himself in a chair surrounded by dozens

of Afghan girls under a tent, Ali smiled — and pretended to snore — when a group of waiting photographers were slow to take his picture.

Girls were banned from going to school under the former Taliban government, which was ousted in a U.S.-led war last year.

Ali also made a trip to a mud-walled boxing club, which had two framed photos of a younger Ali hanging on the wall. He handed out gifts of gloves and jump ropes.

After slowly shaking the hands of 20 young boxers, Ali seemed to regain his strength, taking a minute to pound a red and blue punching bag as a small crowd cheered him on.

He watched several young men spar in a makeshift boxing ring before donning a pair of red gloves and briefly boxing with two Afghans.

Ali, a devout Muslim, arrived in Kabul on Sunday and met President Hamid Karzai at the presidential palace. On Monday, he also visited to a women's bakery sponsored by the U.N. World Food Program. He will leave today.

"He loves to travel to this region. He feels very much at home here," DiNicola said.

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Steelers' Maddox making strides in recovery

PITTSBURGH — Quarterback Tommy Maddox has no structural damage in his injured spine, and he was walking in his hospital room in Tennessee on Monday, but the Steelers weren't ready to say when he can play again.


"We're quite happy with his progress," team doctor Anthony Yates said at a news conference Monday morning.

Maddox was hurt on the final play of the third quarter of the Steelers' loss at the Tennessee Titans; he spent Sunday night in the hospital with a concussion.

He was expected to return to Pittsburgh on Monday night and be hospitalized in the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center for further tests. All indications were that his injury is not career-threatening.

Maddox underwent X-rays, a CT scan, and MRI exams Monday morning, and doctors detected no structural damage, Yates said. Maddox was initially diagnosed with a spinal-cord contusion — a bruising and swelling that includes hemorrhaging — but instead he has an interruption in the normal electrical activity in the spine.

For at least the next several weeks and perhaps longer, former starter Kordell Stewart, whom Maddox replaced during

the third game of the season, will be the quarterback. The Steelers (5-4-1) are at home Sunday against Cincinnati (1-9).

At least 15 minutes passed Sunday at the Coliseum while

Maddox was turned onto his back and strapped to a backboard after trainers cut off his face mask. Players for both teams knelt and prayed.

Maddox was unconscious for

about five minutes but never stopped breathing.

Maddox was hurt while flipping the ball to Antwaan Randle El for a 2-yard gain.
