## Ex-med dean's emotional state under scrutiny

*Defense tries to paint Dr. Nelson as unstable, suicidal*

CEDAR RAPIDS — Concerned about the deteriorating emotional health of Richard Nelson, his wife and mistress spoke on the phone several times before the former executive dean of the UI medical school was allegedly murdered.

Mary Jo Young, the administrative assistant who became embroiled in an affair with her boss, Richard Nelson, testified Tuesday that he was conflicted and receiving counseling for a long time before his death on Dec. 12, 2001.

"I knew he was having problems emotionally that he was trying to work through," she said during the trial's second day.


Phyllis Nelson, a 55-year-old former substitute teacher, is charged with first-degree murder for allegedly stabbing Richard Nelson once in the heart with a black-handled paring knife. Defense attorney William Kutmus contends that

his client's actions were a "tragic accident" committed in self-defense; police allege that she stabbed Richard Nelson during an assault, which could send her to prison for life.

Young and Richard Nelson began their affair in September 1998, a romance Phyllis Nelson discovered three years later when she overheard a conversation between the two while standing behind a tree.

That revelation prompted Phyllis Nelson to make several phone calls to Young over the next five months, expressing concern about her husband's emotional state, Young said while on the witness stand. "I think she did say that she was worried about [suicide]," Young said of the first phone conversation between the two in May 2001. Young said she told Phyllis Nelson during their "calm" exchange that she also was worried that Richard Nelson might commit suicide.

A phone conversation in late June or early August, when Phyllis Nelson left a message on Young's home answering machine saying, once again, that she was worried about Richard Nelson and wanted to talk to her about his condition, said Young, who did not call

back. She testified she received another call from Phyllis Nelson later that night telling her that he was fine and not to worry.

The civil communication between the two would soon change with a third call placed in September 2001, the last time the two would speak.

"She called and told me she didn't want him, I could have

measures did not save Richard Nelson's life, which ended at 9:41 a.m. on Dec. 12 after the early morning stabbing at his Cedar Rapids apartment. All of St. Luke's departments were put on high alert, Miner said, a measure implemented only in the most severe of trauma cases.

Young was the last of nearly 20 witnesses and 42 pieces of evidence in the state's case against Phyllis Nelson.

## Through the looking glass

The past 10 days have been a whirlwind of change for Linsey Gram as the UI sophomore prepares to represent the state in the 2003 Miss USA Pageant.

While the recently crowned Miss Iowa USA fulfills the responsibilities associated with that title, she's hired a personal trainer, will meet with dress designers, and is looking for sponsors to help cover pageant costs, which can range from \$500 to \$20,000.

On stage, Grams focused on her family's reaction as the contestants were whittled down to five finalists. As the tension mounted, her family and friends held out hope that every name called for the runners-up

## Banks says an ex-teammate stole his identify, bought car

A former star Iowa Hawkeye football player has accused a one-time teammate, roommate, and business partner of stealing his identity to purchase a car in Muscatine.

Former Hawkeye running back Tavian Banks told police that Richard Willock had used Banks' name to buy a 1999 Chrysler LHS in October 2000 without his consent.

Banks, who played in the NFL for two years after graduating from Iowa in 1998, reported the alleged identity theft to police Nov. 18. In a signed statement, he said he learned the

vehicle was purchased under his name after he received a notice of late payments from Amcore Bank seven months before.

Banks told police: "Through some research of my own, I found out that it was my college roommate from four years ago. His name is Richard

Willock. I called him to ask about this, and he admitted to doing this because with his credit, he was unable to do so."

The car was purchased for Jeff Cooks, a 24-year-old former salesman at the urban-clothing store GoodFellaz, Banks said. Police have named both Cooks and Willock as suspects, and a criminal investigation is ongoing.

Willock, 28, is a former wide receiver for the Hawks who played for the team with Banks from 1993 to 1997. He is also part owner of the Press Box, but he was not at the bar Tuesday.

## President-candidate visits to begin

Six finalists for the UI presidency are scheduled to visit the campus over the next 10 days, the university's presidential search committee announced Tuesday.

A previously announced visit for today was canceled because of a scheduling problem, said search committee Chairman Jonathan Carlson. The first presidential candidate will be on campus Thursday, with the rest following Dec. 16-20.

The name of the first candidate will be made public at 11 a.m. today on the UI Web site. The other finalists will be identified the day before their visits. Carlson declined to specify the

sex of the finalists, and he would not say what geographic areas they would be visiting from.

"They are a mix of people currently working in higher academic administration," he said.

The candidates' identities have been kept confidential up to this point to avoid potentially compromising their current positions.

Bringing the finalists to campus serves two purposes, Carlson said.

"The candidates get a sense of what the UI is like, and it gives us a chance to hopefully impress them," he said.

Carlson also said the visits give students and university employees a chance to see and react to the finalists, then provide feedback to the search committee. The 24-member committee is

composed of student, faculty and staff members, and top administrators on campus, he said.

Each candidate will participate in a public symposium titled "The Future of Public Higher Education" at 4 p.m. at the IMU on the afternoon of her or his visit. After an introduction by a faculty moderator, the candidate will deliver a brief opening statement and then answer questions from a faculty panel and the audience.

After the visits, the committee will forward its recommendations to the state Board of Regents. The regents are expected to name the new president sometime next month.



# Board pushes ahead with bond measure

Petition with 1,700 signatures secures its spot on ballot

The Iowa City School Board is one more step closer to turning blueprints into buildings after a steering committee handed over a petition with 1,700 signatures Tuesday night.

The board's acceptance of the petition for a \$39 million bond referendum, which contained more than double the necessary 841 signatures, will allow district officials to register the Feb. 11 voting date with the county auditor's office.

"Getting the signatures was no problem because people really care about the plan, and there seems to be a huge amount of support out there," committee member Karen Parker said.

The bond vote, which could

raise property taxes \$61.56 per \$100,000 of appraised land value, would construct a 465-seat elementary school and 600-seat junior high in North Liberty, a 250-seat alternative

"The referendum will affect all four communities, and we fully expect that they will vote affirmatively," said Charlie Funk, the Yes For Kids committee co-chairman.

\$4,500 and \$8,000.

Board members also considered staffing 40 polling booths, the number used in general elections, but were leery of dishing out between \$17,800 and \$32,000 to fund the extra sites.

"I think we need to be responsible with keeping costs modest, but we should try to make voting easy," board member Dave Franker said.

In other action, a report on suspension data said the number of high-school students suspended for physical altercations doubled from last year, jumping from 19 students in 2001-02 to 42 students in 2002-03.

"If a conflict has reached the point of altercation, we need to intervene before that point," board member Matt Goodlaxson said.

Associate Superintendent Jim Behle, who prepared the report, said possible sources of the increase could be peer pressure and increases in the numbers of new students and behavioral disorder students in the district.

# Study ponders west-campus traffic effect

A study conducted last spring to predict the effect that potential parking ramp additions could have on traffic flow near the west campus has raised questions about other major traffic changes in the area.

The study, conducted in April by Dickinson Engineering of Oskaloosa, looks at the effects an additional 400 spaces in hospital parking ramp 3 on Stadium Drive would have on the network of traffic along the Hawkins Drive/Melrose Avenue area.

The intersection of Melrose and Hawkins is critical, said James Dickinson, a traffic engineer who made the presentation to the Campus Planning Committee on Tuesday. During the peak morning hour, 434 vehicles traveling westbound on Melrose were counted turning right onto Hawkins, while 370 vehicles traveling eastbound on Melrose were counted turning left onto Hawkins.

"As a rule of thumb, if an intersection has more than 300

turns per hour, you need a double turn lane," Dickinson said.


His study counted 103 vehicles going into ramp 3. The study showed significant traffic buildup around the Kinnick Stadium area, particularly on Melrose as vehicles attempted to turn right onto Hawkins. People were backed up on South Grand Avenue, Dickinson said.

Drew Ives, the interim director of the Facilities Services Group, asked whether adding a second turn lane on Melrose would significantly change the congestion level.

Dickinson said he talked to the city about placing a right-turn arrow that would allow traffic to travel at the same time as the southbound Hawkins movement. This would give those turning right more time to maneuver and would alleviate part of the problem, he said.

"It is not a complete answer to it, but it is a cheap way to improve it," Dickinson said.

Though the traffic study was done to examine the problem of access to parking ramps, the presentation raised other ques-

tions about potential future traffic changes in the west-campus area.

"The constraints of the Melrose and Hawkins intersection are backing up traffic at other intersections," Dickinson said.

Campus planner Larry Wilson said the information obtained from the study will be useful for the arterial-traffic study the university is conducting in conjunction with Iowa City. The study, which Wilson said he expects to begin soon, will examine how the arterial road near the west campus functions.

Possible long-term plans for the area include making a section of Grand Avenue accessible only to buses to create a more pedestrian-friendly area for students living in nearby residence halls.

Problems with access to Melrose could be solved by widening Byington Road to four lanes and making it a two-way. The university's 1998 Campus Master Plan determined that this would be a reasonable solution, Wilson said.

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# U.S. action embitters Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The Iraqi government accused Washington on Tuesday of taking control of a U.N. master copy of Baghdad's arms declaration in order to tamper with it and create a pretext for war.

The White House dismissed Iraq's accusation that it altered the documents. Specialists at the CIA and other U.S. agencies began poring over the 12,000-page declaration, in which Baghdad is supposed to "tell all" about its chemical, biological, and nuclear-weapons programs. American officials said much of the material appeared to be recycled versions of earlier documents.

U.N. inspectors have said Iraq's earlier declarations were incomplete. The United Nations was beginning its own analysis of the mammoth declaration, a process officials say could take weeks.

Inspectors stepped up their search Tuesday, fanning across Iraq on surprise missions to 13 sites — the largest number of inspections since the U.N. operation resumed two weeks ago. One team moved in on a uranium mining site 250 miles west of Baghdad.

President Saddam Hussein, meanwhile, spoke of war and sacrifice in a meeting with top lieutenants, men U.S. strategists hope will abandon the Iraqi strongman in the event of war. "Your heads will remain

high with honor, God willing, and your enemy will be defeated," he was shown on state television telling Defense officials, including Defense Minister Lt. Gen. Sultan Hashim Ahmed.

U.S.-Iraqi tensions flared again in the southern "no-fly zone" Tuesday, when the U.S. command said its warplanes bombed an Iraqi anti-aircraft missile site 165 miles southeast of Baghdad. Just across Iraq's southeastern border in Kuwait, U.S. Army units were conducting desert exercises.

Iraq insists it no longer has weapons of mass destruction or programs to make them. The

Bush administration says it's sure Baghdad does and has threatened war if, in the U.S. view, Saddam's government doesn't comply with U.N. disarmament demands.

Secretary of State Colin Powell denounced Saddam's claims, saying, "He's a liar."

"We'll see now whether he decides that the cost of lying is too great. The cost of lying now might result in his regime being destroyed by the armed forces of the international community," he said during a Dec. 5 interview with the French television station France 2. The State Department released the transcript Tuesday.

# City, county reach SEATS deal

Councilors also opt to accept deal with Mediacom

The Iowa City City Council resolved two long-standing issues Tuesday night, approving an agreement between the city and Johnson County for paratransit service and reaching a settlement with Mediacom cable TV regarding its business practices.

Councilors unanimously decided to adopt an agreement that set the cost of paratransit service for Iowa City at \$687,803 in fiscal 2004. The agreement also calls for a service rate increase of 4 percent each year through 2008.

The city had been concerned it would lose some of the services provided by Johnson County SEATS because the county had considered scrapping it to alleviate budget cuts. In a Sept. 23 letter to the city Department of Parking and Transit, county officials said the lowest price the city could be charged was \$812,000 for the service, which offers the disabled and elderly an alternative to regular bus and taxi services.

The original county estimate

was between \$612,000 and \$702,000. The city's fiscal 2003 contract with SEATS is \$563,000.

"The county and the city have done a remarkably good job with negotiating this contract," said Mayor Ernie Lehman. "This is very important for the community."

Councilors agreed that the previous offers were not acceptable and that this agreement was reached in a congenial manner.

"Last time, it was such a turmoil," said Councilor Connie Champion. "They've done so much better this time."

The city's dispute with Mediacom was resolved in a settlement penalizing the company for its business practices earlier this year.

The council voted unanimously to accept an agreement with Mediacom that would drop a \$73,500 fine the city first proposed the company pay because of a three-month period when city offices were flooded with complaints about the company's poor communication. Customers said they were confused about the cable-package options available to them.

The agreement requires Mediacom to offer such premium channels as HBO and Cinemax to all customers, not just those with digital cable, at reduced prices.

Councilors decided to accept the settlement despite concerns expressed by Councilor Steven Kanner during Monday's work session. He said the agreement, which offers customers a \$5 to \$10 coupon to upgrade their service, would only boost Mediacom's profits because customers would be motivated by the coupon to upgrade their cable packages.

"This doesn't really hold [Mediacom] accountable for what it did," Kanner said. "It seems that it benefits it."

Assistant City Manager Dale Helling assured concerned councilors that although customers may end up paying more, they will benefit from the coupon.

"Our interest is that the city be happy with their cable service," Lehman said Tuesday night. "This is a good settlement."

### Whitmore no longer FSU candidate

UI Provost Jon Whitmore was eliminated from the race for Florida State University president on Tuesday, when a search committee narrowed its list of finalists to three. Whitmore, 57, was selected last week as one of five finalists who would succeed Talbot D'Alemberte. This is the third time in recent months that Whitmore, who could not be reached for comment Tuesday night, has been denied the top position at a major university after having been named a finalist.

"I know he remains a very desirable candidate for president," said Joe Coulter, the UI associate provost for diversity. "There are a number of institutions in the process of searching for a president, and he's on their lists." Whitmore announced his decision to step down as provost shortly after former UI President Mary Sue Coleman announced she would take the reins as University of Michigan

president. He will remain in his current position until summer 2003 to allow the new UI president the option of choosing her or his own provost. A new president is expected to be named in January.

"He's well thought of and has done a very good job at the UI," Coulter said. "I think he would be quite happy to become a faculty member in the department of theater and would be pretty happy devoting his attention there, but I'm afraid he's going to be a president."

Whitmore came to the UI in 1996 after serving as dean of the College of Fine Arts at the University of Texas-Austin and holding other

administrative posts at the State University of New York-Buffalo and West Virginia University.

### Coralville backs School District

The Coralville City Council unanimously voted Tuesday to endorse an upcoming bond referendum for the Iowa City School District.

Councilors cited the positive effect that a strong district has on the local standard of living.

"I think the bond referendum is good not only for families with children but for the economic develop-

ment of the area," said Councilor Dave Jacoby.

Voters will decide on Feb. 11, 2003, whether to pass a \$38.7 million referendum to build new elementary, junior, and alternative high schools and renovate existing facilities. The effort is an attempt to reduce overcrowding in the district.

"I certainly feel we should be supportive of the district," said Councilor John Weihe.

On Monday, the Iowa City City Council lent its support to the measure in an informal meeting, agreeing to draft a letter in support.

until she could barely breathe. "I was a basket case," she said. "I couldn't believe that she had won out of that group of girls. We are all so excited now. Our feet are hardly touching the ground."

Grams' run began by chance in 2000 when directors from the state pageant circuit approached her in a West Des Moines shopping mall and told

her she should enter pageants. Unlike many of her counterparts, Grams had never been involved in pageants before Miss Iowa USA, and she was skeptical because of the negative stereotypes associated with pageants and her past experience in the modeling industry. "I told myself you won't ever know unless you try, so I decided to find out more about [pageants]," she said.

While winning the title of Miss USA comes with a luxury

apartment in New York City and a new 2003 Ford Mustang, Grams said she took a shot at the state title for scholarship opportunities — she took home a few thousand dollars for her accomplishment — and to advance her interest in homeless women and children.

For the past few years, Grams has worked with various agencies in Des Moines, including Meals on Wheels, that cater to the homeless, and she will serve specialty dinners on Saturday.

"The positive opportunities began to outweigh the negative," she said.

To ready herself for the national pageant, Grams will eventually cut back on her semester hours.

"I can't wait to see how much I can do with my cause," she said. "I want to find out if I can really make a difference with the year, or if this is just a one-time opportunity."

# Banks' identity stolen, ex-Hawk says



Cooks' brother, former football player Kerry Cooks, Banks, and Willock were co-owners of GoodFellaz, which had locations in Old Capitol Town Center and Coral Ridge Mall. Phones at both locations have been disconnected, the urban-clothing stores apparently recently having gone out of business.

One week after Banks' statement, authorities executing a search warrant seized the vehicle from the driveway at 1155 Weeber St., where Cooks and Willock live. Police also retrieved a letter from Amcore Bank and an insurance receipt from Willock's bedroom, two bank letters, and more paperwork from Cooks' room.

Muscatine police Detective Matthew Schwarz received permission for the search after obtaining paperwork dating from Oct. 23, 2000, showing a signature reading Tavian Banks on a warranty, registration, and

other documents for the car. It was purchased from now-defunct Doug Bemis Auto Mall in Muscatine for about \$21,000, with documents listing Banks as a co-buyer along with GoodFellaz.

Banks insisted "that the signature that was on all of the documents was not his, and that he did not sign anything, and this was done without his permission, consent, or knowledge," Schwarz wrote in his application for the warrant.

Glenn Seemeyer, who handled the sale, told police "that a sub-

ject named 'Rich,' possibly Richard Willock," had come to the store to carry out the transaction. Seemeyer said he gave the man paperwork to get Banks' signature.

The salesman said he was uncomfortable with the deal because it took a long time to complete and Banks had never signed the paperwork in person. He told police he raised objections, but was forced to complete the deal by Don Wolf, the sales manager.

Charges could include identity theft, a class D felony if the property taken as a result is more than \$1,000, and forgery, also a class D felony.

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# Allies board missile-laden ship

WASHINGTON — A North Korean-crewed ship carrying 12 disassembled Scud missiles bound for Yemen has been boarded and seized by Spanish and U.S. military forces in the Arabian Sea, Pentagon and administration officials said Tuesday.

U.S. intelligence satellites and Navy ships had been tracking the ship, named the So San, since it left North Korea during the middle of last month, the officials said. It was boarded early Monday approximately 600 miles southeast of Yemen — far out to sea and so unquestionably in international waters, a U.S. official said.

The decision to take over the ship was approved "at the highest levels of the administration," the official said.

Evidence of a North Korean effort to ship ballistic missiles to the Middle East during a tense standoff between Iraq and the United States over weapons and missiles can only deepen the strain on the already tense relationship between Washington and Pyongyang. It has been barely two months since the North Korean government admitted — under sharp American questioning — that it maintains a secret nuclear-weapons program in defiance of international agreements.

The incident may also chill U.S. relations with Yemen, which backed Iraq during the 1991 Persian Gulf War and then was the site of an October 2000 attack on a U.S. Navy destroyer, the USS Cole, that killed 17 American sailors.

Since Sept. 11, 2001, Yemen has been an eager partner in the U.S.-led global war on terrorism. U.S. Special Forces trainers began operating there this year to improve Yemeni anti-terrorist capabilities. And just last month, when the United States conducted an air strike against suspected terrorists in Yemen using an unmanned Predator drone aircraft firing Hellfire missiles, the Yemeni government quickly made it known that it had agreed to the action.

"The Yemeni government will be hugely embarrassed by this," an intelligence official said.

Yemen apparently bought the missiles to upgrade the hand-

of aging Scuds that it already possesses, the U.S. intelligence official said. The Yemeni government repeatedly has promised not to purchase missiles or parts in recent months, another official said, but "we keep catching them with their hand in the cookie jar."

The fact that news of the action leaked in Washington may also create friction between the United States and Spain, whose forces led the seizure. "This is an extremely hot potato," a Defense Department official said. "I think the Spanish would have preferred that it come out of Spain."

The incident began around dawn, local time, on Monday morning, when two Spanish navy ships, the Navarra and the Patino, signaled the freighter to stop. When the ship, sailing under a Cambodian flag but believed to be owned by North Korea, tried to evade capture, the Spanish ships fired warning shots across its bow. When it continued to try to escape, Spanish

Special Forces conducted a hostile boarding by helicopter.

The crew of approximately 20 was then put under guard, and the ship was searched. It quickly became apparent that there were problems with the legal status of the ship, officials said, noting that its original name had been painted over to conceal its North Korean origin, and its registry papers weren't in order. Also, a quick search uncovered major discrepancies between the ship's manifest, which listed a cargo of cement, and the actual load aboard the ship. The Spanish soldiers opened large containers partially hidden by the cement and found missile parts. They then called in U.S. military experts in handling explosives.

The USS Nassau, which usually carries Marines, helicopters, and Harrier jump-jets, is standing by the freighter, which remains approximately 600 miles off the Yemeni coast, an official said. Additional searches still are under way, he added.

# Carter warns of pre-emptive war

OSLO, Norway — Former President Jimmy Carter, warning that "the world is now, in many ways, a more dangerous place," Tuesday accepted the Nobel Peace Prize for his work as president and international peacemaker.

In an address that touched upon many of the themes of his post-White House career, Carter urged respect for the United Nations and other international institutions, and he declared that the United States, as the world's sole

superpower, has "not assumed that super strength guarantees super wisdom."

He bemoaned the "terrible absence of understanding or concern" in the industrialized world for those in the Third World "who are enduring lives of despair and hopelessness," and he said the growing gap between rich and poor remained "the most serious and universal problem."

The peace-prize committee said it gave Carter the award for his "vital contribution" in brokering the 1978 Camp David peace accords between Israel and Egypt, for his emphasis on human rights in international politics, and for the work of the Carter Center, the Atlanta-based think tank and advocacy center that he founded after leaving public office in 1981 following his election loss to Ronald Reagan.

"Jimmy Carter will probably

not go down in American history as the most effective president," said Gunnar Berge, the chairman of the five-member Norwegian awards committee, in introducing the winner at Tuesday afternoon's solemn ceremony in Oslo's ornate City Hall. "But he is certainly the best ex-president the country ever had."

Berge noted that Carter, who is 78, had been denied the prize in 1978 on a technicality — he was nominated after the deadline and declared ineligible to share the award with Israel's Menachem Begin and Egypt's Anwar Sadat.

"It became increasingly obvious that the bypassing of Carter had been one of the real sins of omission in peace prize history," he said. "This year, we can finally put all that behind us."

In announcing the award to Carter two months ago, Berge had said the committee was criticizing the Bush administration, reflecting widespread fears in Europe that Washington was taking an aggressively unilateralist position on Iraq and other issues. "It's a kick in the leg to all that follow the same line as the United States," he said then.

Carter, who has been withering about many of the administration's policies, avoided direct criticism. But the former Democratic president took an indirect swipe at the administration's declared policy of pre-emptive action against threats to the United States, warning, "For powerful countries to adopt a

principle of preventative war may well set an example that can have catastrophic consequences."

While declaring again his deep Christian faith, he denounced those who used religion as a cloak of justification for suicide bombings and other acts of terror. "In order for us human beings to commit ourselves personally to the inhumanity of war, we find it necessary first to dehumanize our opponents, which is in itself a violation of the beliefs of all religions," he said. "Once we characterize our adversaries as beyond the scope of God's mercy and grace, their lives lose all value."

#### Court upholds federal death penalty

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal appeals court upheld the federal death penalty Tuesday, firmly rejecting a lower court's conclusion that it was unconstitutional and declaring that only the Supreme Court can change "well-settled" law.

The three-judge panel of the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals reached deep into history to show that Judge Jed Rakoff found no new legal territory when he ruled the death penalty amounted to the "state-sponsored murder of innocent human beings" because so many death-row inmates are later exonerated.

Rakoff's July ruling was issued in a case involving two men charged in a drug-murder conspiracy.

The appeals court noted that European nations from which the United States derived its laws recognized in the 1700s that capital punishment carries the risk that innocent people will be executed, which abolitionists have argued since the 1800s was a reason to shelve the death penalty.

Since then, the appeals court said, the Supreme Court has recognized that risk but repeatedly left the death penalty intact "because our judicial system — indeed, any judicial system — is fallible."

In its 35-page ruling, the appeals panel in New York said there was "no fundamental right to a continued opportunity for exoneration throughout the course of one's natural life."

Defense lawyer Kevin McNally promised to appeal.

"All the court said is that this is an old debate, and while there is new evidence, the only court that can look at the new evidence is the Supreme Court, which is fine," he said. "If we were going to lose, then this is what you'd want them to say."

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

## 'Chavistas' stage massive protests

CARACAS, Venezuela — Supporters of Hugo Chavez surged into the streets Tuesday for a second-straight night of raucous protests — trying to drown out opposition demands that the leftist president give up power.

Hundreds of "Chavistas," as the president's followers are known, ringed the headquarters of the private Globovision television network and rallied at the headquarters of the state oil monopoly.

The new protests came amid the tumult of a nine-day-old national opposition strike that has created shortages of food and drinking water and disrupted the country's oil industry. Earlier Tuesday, thousands of opposition demonstrators marched in the capital, Caracas, to protest Chavista demonstrations at media outlets and an assault by Chavez supporters on a regional branch of Globovision.

Tensions were further raised when nearly half the judges on the Supreme Court decided Tuesday to suspend work to protest what they said was political harassment by the Chavez government.

Eight of 20 magistrates plan to work only on urgent cases of national interest, said Magistrate Alberto Martini. The protest — which would disrupt most court work — came after the pro-Chavez Congress fired court Vice President Franklin Arriechi, saying he wasn't qualified.

Martini accused secret police of investigating justices as part

of a campaign of "threats and harassment."

There was no immediate government reaction to the judges' announcement.

Chavez had long controlled the Supreme Court, but that changed in August when justices defied Chavez by absolving four high-ranking military officers of charges that they led an April coup.

Labor, business, and opposition political groups called the strike on Dec. 2 to demand an early referendum on Chavez's presidency, which is scheduled to end in 2007. They upped their demand to Chavez's ouster after three people were killed and 28 wounded at an opposition rally on Dec. 6. No one has been charged in the shootings.

The strike has paralyzed the oil industry, which provides 70 percent of Venezuela's export revenue and is a key supplier to the United States. The government has dispatched troops to take over gasoline deliveries and guard against unrest in Caracas.

One of the world's largest oil refineries, on the Caribbean island of Curaçao, halted processing heavy crude, and it may have to do the same with medium and light crude by the end of the month because the strike has cut its supplies, officials said.

Venezuelans waited for hours again Tuesday for gasoline, formed long lines at banks, and stocked up on food and water as the strike created shortages at supermarkets, pharmacies, and service stations.

#### Colorado Rep. wins last undecided race

DENVER (AP) — Republican Bob Beauprez won Colorado's new House seat by 121 votes Tuesday, defeating Democrat Mike Feeley after a recount wrapped up the nation's last undecided congressional race.

Beauprez had 81,789 votes, and Feeley ended up with 81,668 votes. Secretary of State Donetta Davidson announced the results after clerks in three suburban Denver counties completed a recount triggered automatically by the slim margin in the race. The announcement ended five

weeks of uncertainty for the two candidates. Both went through freshman orientation for House members in Washington.

At the end of Election Day on Nov. 5, Beauprez led by 386 votes, but the three counties were ordered by a judge to count every qualified provisional ballot.

When those returns were released, Beauprez led Feeley by 122 votes. The recount cost him a single vote.

The election was Colorado's first with provisional ballots, which are cast by voters whose names are not on official registration rolls. It is up to election officials to determine whether the ballot is valid.

#### N.H. diocese reaches plea agreement

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The Roman Catholic Diocese of Manchester reached an unusual settlement with prosecutors Tuesday, avoiding criminal charges and admitting it probably would have been convicted of failing to protect children from sexually abusive priests.

"The church in New Hampshire fully acknowledges and accepts responsibility for failures in our system that contributed to the endangerment of children," Bishop John McCormack said at a news conference. "We commit ourselves in a public and binding way to address every weakness in our

structure."

The church also agreed to the rare step of giving state prosecutors oversight of its policies, including an annual audit.

State Attorney General Philip McLaughlin said he was confident in winning a conviction had the case gone to trial. But he said the settlement does more to achieve his goals of changing the church and making it accountable by releasing thousands of pages of personnel records and other documents after alleged victims' names are blacked out.

"It speaks for itself when you view it," McLaughlin said of the documents, already in his possession by court order. "It doesn't get viewed at all if you're in a criminal trial."

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# Bush taps banker for SEC

WASHINGTON — President George Bush announced on Tuesday that he has chosen William Donaldson — a retired investment banker who was head of the New York Stock Exchange and is a longtime Bush family friend — to be chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Donaldson, who must be confirmed by the Senate, would replace SEC Chairman Harvey Pitt, who resigned last month under pressure over repeated criticism that he was too close to the industry he was supposed to oversee.

Bush said Donaldson will "vigorously enforce our nation's laws against corporate corruption."

The announcement has been eagerly awaited by Wall Street, which has been rocked by a series of accounting and company scandals that have eroded investor confidence and eaten into the brokerage industry's profits. It comes a day after Bush announced he has chosen John Snow to be his Treasury secretary, replacing Paul O'Neill. The White House hopes both men will bring credibility to the president's economic policies,

which have been criticized by Democrats.

"I am firmly committed to doing everything I can to restore investor confidence ..." said Donaldson after being introduced by the president during a press conference. "Corporate managers, boards of directors, the operators and regulators of our financial markets, as well as those who advise, including bankers and lawyers and accountants, must be constantly mindful of the trust that shareholders have placed in them. Each of us must take that trust very seriously."

Both Donaldson and Bush refused to take questions. Donaldson said that in deference to the nomination process, he won't do interviews or detail his views on how he will run the agency, which regulates publicly traded companies and the nation's securities markets.

However, he has made previous public statements that might run him into trouble during the Senate confirmation

process. He is on record a year ago criticizing a rule that was a cornerstone of the Clinton administration's SEC policy, Regulation Full-Disclosure. The regulation requires companies to disclose significant developments or other information to all investors, not just a select few, as has been traditional on Wall Street.

"It's a terrible rule," Donaldson said in an interview in the Oct. 2001 issue of *Institutional Investor Magazine* because it will lead to companies giving out less information. Pitt, the man he is replacing, has made it clear to Wall Street that companies may not use the regulation as an excuse to withhold information.

But executives and several lawmakers, including Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., were pleased with the choice.

### Loan to Snow raises question of credibility

WASHINGTON (Newsday) — Critics are questioning a multimillion-dollar loan to CSX Chairman John Snow that was given — and later forgiven — by his company, saying it will undermine the Treasury secretary nominee's ability to serve as a credible messenger for corporate reform.

The critics said the forgiven loan resembled one of the abuses that led to enactment earlier this year of a corporate-responsibility law that, among other things, outlaws most company loans to top officials.

"In the sense that symbols matter and appearances matter, it certainly undermines his credibility as a committed corporate reformer," said Barbara Roper, the director of investor protection for the Consumer Federation of America. "Someone

who has benefited from the questionable practices of the past is less credible than someone who hasn't."

At least one senior congressional Democrat also voiced criticism. Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., the ranking Democrat on the House Government Reform Committee, said the loan "reflects a double standard — one for top executives and a very different one

for average workers. This administration has already shown it cares more about CEOs than average workers, so I think Mr. Snow will fit in really well."

According to company filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission, CSX loaned Snow \$24.5 million in 1996 to finance the purchase of \$32.2 million in company stock.

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
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



from the scene of the alleged crime. Miner testified that a chest tube would not have saved Nelson, who rallied briefly after being given medication and three liters of blood before succumbing to a rapid heart rate and fatally low blood pressure about three and a half hours after arriving at the hospital.

Cedar Rapids police Officer Ron Dewite, who held an oxygen mask to Richard Nelson's face as he was taken by ambulance to the emergency room, said the renowned children's doctor was conscious but not speaking in the hours before his death.

"He was in a lot of pain, and they were in a hurry to get him out of there," Dewite said.

But the highlight of the day was the testimony from Young, who admitted to having an intimate relationship with Richard Nelson while she worked as his secretary, a job she held from December 1996 to May 2001.

"It was some of the comments he would make to me, or the way he would look at me," she said of the 1998 developments leading to their personal relationship. "I knew things were changing."

The affair progressed after Richard Nelson left a letter addressed to Young, who also was married at the time, in a pile of work papers on his desk expressing his long-standing feelings for her.

"He told me he had some difficult feelings, and I only told him I had some difficult feelings too," said Young.

Over the next few months, the relationship between Richard Nelson and Young progressed as he moved in and out of his Iowa City house, 1010 Highwood St., to a Cedar Rapids apartment.

"He said it was time to move out, to put distance between him and Phyllis, and for her to realize that things weren't as good as they should be," Young said.

Holly Lutt, an assistant manager of the Windsor on the River

and telephone calls on Nov. 26 and again on Dec. 11 — the day before his death — from Richard Nelson, requesting that she open the lines of communication between them.

On Dec. 11, he telephoned her, asking her to spend the night with him, saying his wife had filed for a divorce.

"I was relieved," Young said, not knowing at the time that Phyllis Nelson had not filed for divorce or that the Nelsons had just had dinner together that same night. Meanwhile, according to Kutmus, Richard Nelson was asking his wife not to leave him.

Young said she had no knowledge of this when she arrived at Richard Nelson's apartment around 10:30 p.m. on Dec. 11.

Denton played a series of five voice mails left by Phyllis Nelson for her husband between mid-

message recorded at 12:45 a.m.

"I'm thinking very, very hard and long and wondering if we love each other, which I believe we do, why can't we make a new life together, a new covenant," Phyllis Nelson told her husband in the same message.

Phyllis Nelson volleyed between accusations and sympathy for her husband in a message recorded at 2:02 a.m., complaining that he neglected his family and later blaming Young in a 2:31 a.m. message for manipulating him.

"I believe that she is pretty accomplished at getting what she wants," Phyllis said of Young in her fourth message. "I am not very accomplished at all. I am just sort of all out there."

In her final message recorded at 4:12 a.m., Phyllis Nelson expressed pity for her husband and encouraged him to see his counselor.

"I think you have entered into another round of lying and that there is such self-hatred and self-loathing going on, and that's why you left this house..."

"I would certainly appreciate your talking to me; I do love you," Phyllis Nelson said.

At 5 a.m. on the morning of his death, Young said she and Richard Nelson were awoken by the alarm clock, followed 10 minutes later by the sound of something hitting the window. It was Phyllis.

Fearing for Young's well-being, Richard Nelson told Young to hide in the first-floor laundry room of the apartment complex until he got Phyllis Nelson into his apartment. Young complied, heard the Nelsons walk up the stairs to his apartment, and then left the building to find Phyllis Nelson's 2002 Volkswagen Passat parked next to her car. She then returned home to Coralville.

Two hours before Richard Nelson died, he received one last message at 7:45 a.m. The e-mail read:

"Dick, are you all right? Mary Jo."

E-MAIL DI REPORTERS AT:  
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Apartment complex, where Richard Nelson lived after July 15, 2001, testified that the deceased listed Young as an emergency contact on his lease. Lutt added that Richard Nelson twice contacted her about terminating his lease, once on Nov. 14 and again on Dec. 1.

Young said that during their three-and-a-half year relationship, she and Richard Nelson stopped seeing each other a few times when Young would tell

him she could not manage the relationship anymore.

"It was time for me to move on with my life," she said. "It was necessary for me to have something stable there."

Young admitted to telling Richard Nelson at one point, "Get a divorce, or we can't see each other anymore." She said that she was also dating other men for more than six months while seeing Nelson on and off.

"He told me he loved his wife, he just wasn't in love with his wife," Young said. "He was conflicted with his relationship with me on a lot of levels."

"He was afraid of losing me," she repeated on numerous occasions.

After cutting off the relationship in October 2001, Young received a number of e-mails

and 4 a.m. just hours before the Dec. 12 stabbing.

Phyllis Nelson turned her head from the gallery and conferred with Kutmus as the pleas, prayers, and professions of love that her husband likely never received filled the courtroom.

"And have you been with Mary Jo a lot?" Phyllis Nelson said in her first message at 12:16 a.m. "I mean, what's so unbelievably, ah... that you just can't forgive yourself for, I mean, you have been with her a lot physically, you know, or since August and you've continued to lie to me."

Phyllis Nelson turned to prayer in the early hours of Dec. 12 in her second message.

"Come, Lord, with healing of the past, come and calm our memories," Phyllis Nelson prayed in the

# Bush's noninvolvement in Middle East is disturbing

President Bush issued a document on Monday blaming the Palestine Liberation Organization for the last two years of violent conflict with Israel. However, Bush did not impose sanctions on Palestine, nor did he engage in any kind of dialogue to resolve the violence — in his two years in office, he has met with Ariel Sharon several times, yet he has not even shaken Yasser Arafat's hand. Bush's policy appears to be one of disengagement: Fund Israel, blame Palestine, and let the situation sort itself out.

Prior to Sept. 11, Bush's foreign policy was essentially nonexistent, and since Sept. 11, his war on terror has sought targets for retaliation instead of opportunities for peace. First it was "Osama bin Laden, dead or alive," then the "axis of evil," and now he has shifted his focus to Iraq. In the current climate of war, it has largely been ignored that Bush has entirely neglected any attempt at continuing former President Clinton's tradition of trying to negotiate peace in the Israel-Palestine conflict.

Clinton held frequent summits at Camp David between the Israelis and Palestinians to draft cease-fire agreements. Admittedly, these rarely lasted for a significant amount of time, but the relatively low level of violence that Clinton was able to broker was the result of constant involvement and unceasing effort.

On Tuesday, former President Carter received the Nobel Peace Prize because he recognized that the best way to ensure peace domestically is to

diffuse conflict globally. He persuaded former North Korean Dictator Kim Il Sung to open discussions with South Korea, helped achieve a cease-fire in Bosnia, and brokered the Camp David Accords in 1978 between Israel and Egypt.

Bush has not just failed at brokering peace in areas of conflict, such as the Middle East — he has not even tried. He continues to refrain from making any legitimate effort for peace. While it is convenient for Bush to blame the Palestinians, it is an insufficient foreign policy. If Bush really thinks that the PLO is to blame for the continued violence in the Middle East, he should meet with the leaders there and try to negotiate a solution rather than simply release reports about the matter and do nothing. In sharp contrast to Carter and Clinton, Bush has not held one summit between Israeli and Palestinian leaders.

If Bush continues this modus operandi, the results could be disastrous. His foreign policy has taken two forms: non-involvement and preemptive attack. As the issues of the Israel-Palestine conflict and the war on terror begin to overlap, with incidents such as the recent hotel bombing in Kenya, it will be impossible for Bush to ignore the situation. He must work toward reaching peace between Israel and Palestine; otherwise, the current conflict may evolve into a global war with the cyclical frequency of the Israel-Palestine conflict and the potential military severity of the war on Iraq.

# Rush Limbaugh is a big fat sexist

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# Furor continues over Lott's segregation comment



WASHINGTON — Rejecting his apology as insufficient, black congressional Democrats and others sharply rebuked Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., Tuesday for remarks he made last week praising Sen. Strom Thurmond's run for president in 1948.

Thurmond's candidacy as a Dixiecrat explicitly endorsed racial segregation — a position he later passionately defended as a U.S. senator from South Carolina, most memorably when he filibustered for more than 24 hours against a civil-rights bill.

Thurmond eventually relented his opposition to integration and now is known for his record as the Senate's oldest and longest-serving member.

At Thurmond's 100th birthday party on Dec. 5 Lott, who will become the Senate majority leader when Congress convenes next month, noted that

the Dixiecrat ticket carried Mississippi in the '48 election. In words that have sparked a continuing furor, Lott added: "We're proud of it. And if the rest of the country had followed our lead, we wouldn't have had all these problems over all these years, either."

Lott's comments began eliciting

criticism during the weekend, and on Monday he issued an apology. "A poor choice of words conveyed to some the impression that I embraced the discarded policies of the past," he said. "Nothing could be further from the truth, and I apologize for my statement to anyone who was offended by it."

He had no further comment Tuesday and, according to his press secretary, flew home to Mississippi.

Even so, he continued to take heavy fire from both sides of the political spectrum. *The Wall*

*Street Journal's* conservative editorial page slammed him. So did congressional Democrats, who on Tuesday issued fresh statements of outrage. Leaders of the Congressional Black Caucus — an all-Democratic group — made clear they did not consider the matter closed.

"It is extremely upsetting," said Rep. Elijah Cummings of Maryland, the group's incoming chairman. "Those are the kinds of words that tear this nation apart. And so we're going to do everything in our power to address it."

The NAACP called on Lott to resign his leadership position.

President Bush and other leading Republicans stood by Lott.

"From the president's point of view, Sen. Lott has addressed this issue," said White House spokesman Ari Fleischer. "The president has confidence in him unquestionably."

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., who frequently clashes with Lott on policy, said his colleague had been misunderstood.

"I've known Trent Lott for over 20 years, and I know he

doesn't hold any segregationist views, and he clearly did not mean words like that in that fashion," McCain told CNN Monday night.

Rep. J.C. Watts Jr. of Oklahoma, who for several years has been the lone black Republican in Congress, also appeared on television news shows to defend Lott.

While it seemed likely that Lott would ride out this controversy, the continued reaction to his remarks gave GOP leaders renewed cause for concern about their perennially weak standing among black voters.

## Americans march to protest war

From Indiana Mennonites collecting care packages for Iraq's poor to a "die-in" on an Ivy League campus, Americans took to the streets Tuesday in mostly small, low-key events to protest a possible war with Iraq. More than 100 people were arrested.

World War II veteran Ray Kaepflinger was picketing outside a Chicago federal office building as 20 people were being arrested in the lobby for criminal trespass.

Kaepflinger, 84, said he had "been through the plume of hell in New Guinea" and didn't want to see another war erupt. "As far as I'm concerned, President George II is as bad as Saddam Hussein," he said.

Approximately half of the 200 protesters outside the U.S. mission to the United Nations in New York were arrested for disorderly conduct, including clergy members. Across the country in Sacramento, Calif., nine were taken into custody for blocking the entrance to a federal courthouse.

"It's my first time ever," said Maria Cornejo, 41, a mother of four from Dixon, Calif. "That's how important this is."

In Hollywood, more than 100 entertainers signed a letter to President Bush saying a war with Iraq will "increase the likelihood of terrorist attacks, damage the economy, and undermine our moral standing in the world."

"This notion of pre-emptive war is setting a precedent ... and we must ask ourselves, where does this end?" said Tony Shalhoub, star of the ABC detective show "Monk."

The group United for Peace counted more than 120 planned vigils, acts of civil disobedience, and marches in 37 states from Alaska to Florida. Protests were being organized by fax and over the Internet by anarchists and Communists, evangelicals, and Quakers.

In the Mennonite community of Goshen, Ind., people gathered soap, bandages, towels, and other items to send to Iraq. Among the group was Sharon Baker, 64.

"I'm opposed to any war, any time, anywhere, any place because war doesn't solve anything," she said.

In the nation's capital, approximately 300 protesters staged a march to a park near the White House. Flanked by police, John Steinbach of Manassas, Va., an organizer of the Gray Panthers, was pushing the wheelchair of his 97-year-old wife, Louise Franklin-Ramirez, who, he said, had been protesting since 1917.

"The movement was looked on as being mainly youngsters," said Irving Irskin, 84, of Bethesda, Md. "But we want to show it's our war, too."

Earlier in Washington, around 30 protesters converged on two military recruiting stations chanting, "Hell no, we won't go," and plastering windows with red tape. Police said six people were arrested.







## Rose, Selig discuss Charlie Hustle's return

NEW YORK — Pete Rose may finally be getting his second chance.

Baseball's career hits leader could know by the end of the year if baseball will agree to end his lifetime ban — which would make him eligible for the Hall of Fame.

Rose and commissioner Bud Selig met secretly in Milwaukee on Nov. 25 and their lawyers have been exchanging draft proposals that could end the ban, a baseball executive said Tuesday on the condition he not be identified.

A 17-time All-Star and former

National League MVP, Rose agreed to the lifetime ban in August 1989 following an investigation of his gambling but has maintained he never bet on baseball. None of the 14 men previously banned for life by the commissioner's office was ever reinstated.

"It's a first hopeful sign," said Cincinnati Mayor Charlie Luken, who wrote twice to Selig last month urging reinstatement. Luken said he spoke to Bob DuPuy, Selig's top aide, on Nov. 27 and DuPuy said he would get back to him in about 30 days.

Baseball wants Rose to admit misdeeds as part of any agreement ending the ban, the executive said. Rose cannot appear on the ballot for the Hall of Fame as long as he is on the permanently ineligible list. Baseball officials already have held meet-

ings to discuss the implications of a possible reinstatement, the executive said.

Selig did not return a telephone call seeking comment and DuPuy, baseball's chief operating officer, issued a statement that did not confirm or deny the meeting.

Rose's lawyers, S. Gary Spicer and Roger Makley, did not immediately comment.

Rose took a Delta flight to Milwaukee from Cincinnati on Nov. 24 and chatted with members of Marquette's women's basketball team, which was returning home from a game in Dayton, Ohio, according to the school.

ESPN.com and WXIX-TV in Cincinnati reported Monday night that Selig and Rose had met two weeks ago.

Joe Morgan, a Hall of Fame second baseman who was Rose's teammate on the Big Red Machine teams of the 1970s, has pushed for Selig and Rose to compromise, the executive said.

Morgan spoke about the situation at the World Series, after Rose was given the longest ovation among the stars who appeared in a promotion before Game 4. Morgan said he detected

## Suffocating

A stifling defense and late offensive surge by Iowa in the second half prevented Northern Iowa from making history inside Carver-Hawkeye Arena on Tuesday night.

The Hawkeyes held the Panthers to just one field goal in the game's final eight minutes — and just four points — as they held off UNI, 63-54, to improve to 6-1.

"We definitely didn't want them to get this win here," said Iowa's Brody Boyd, who hit several key shots in the victory.


A win by Northern Iowa would have marked the first time the Panthers had ever won in Iowa City in 20 attempts. It also would have been the only time in the series that UNI had won back-to-back games against the Hawkeyes.

But history took a back seat to revenge Tuesday, as Iowa atoned for a 78-76 loss to the Panthers in Cedar Falls last season by hitting 38 percent of its shots and clamping down on defense. The Hawkeyes recorded nine blocked shots and 10 steals in the effort.

Glen Worley led all scorers with 17 points and fell just short of a double-double, adding nine rebounds. The junior from Iowa City also had five assists to one turnover to go along with a pair of steals and blocked shots. Iowa coach Steve Alford credited the production to Worley's staying out of foul trouble, which allowed him to play a career-high 37 minutes.

"Glen really stood up and had a huge game for us," Alford said. "Glen hits big shots, and now they get a little anxious, hurried with what they want to do."

Worley helped to seal the Panthers' fate with a pass and pair of baskets in the game's final minutes. With 3:55

## Hall inductee Franck led Gophers to title

NEW YORK — George "Sonny" Franck never thought he'd live to see this day.

The former All-America tailback at Minnesota from 1938-40 didn't know whether he would ever make the College Football Hall of Fame — despite his accomplishments with the Golden Gophers.

"I thought maybe I'd die first," Franck said.

He was wrong.

The 84-year-old Franck was one of 15 former greats to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Tuesday night. The other

players were Auburn split end Terry Beasley, Princeton running back Cosmo Iacavazzi, Arizona State receiver John Jefferson, Southern California safety Ronnie Lott, Pittsburgh quarterback Dan Marino, Navy tailback Napoleon McCallum, Michigan offensive guard Reggie McKenzie, Georgia Tech defensive back Randy Rhino, Texas offensive tackle Jerry Sisemore, Kansas State linebacker Gary Spani, Tennessee defensive tackle Reggie White, and Missouri tight end Kellen Winslow.

The coaches to be inducted are Carmen Cozza, who spent 32 seasons at Yale, and Earle

Bruce, who coached at Tampa, Iowa State, Ohio State, Northern Iowa, and Colorado State.

Franck, the oldest of this year's inductees, also played quarterback, safety and was a punt and kickoff returner. In 1940, he finished third in voting for the Heisman Trophy, was an All-American, and helped the Golden Gophers win the national championship with an 8-0 record.

He played alongside Bruce Smith, another College Hall of Fame member, and the two combined for more than 60 percent of Minnesota's touchdowns.

Franck said he never worried about making the Hall of Fame.

"I thought, if they miss me, they miss me," he said. "Maybe I'm too old to worry about those types of things ... Sometimes, when you're in your 80s, people forget about you."

One of the games he remembers most vividly was in the season finale against Wisconsin in 1940. He returned an interception for a touchdown in Minnesota's 22-13 win, which sealed the national championship.

After college, Franck signed up with the Navy and served time as a World War II captain USMCR/Fighter Pilot. He won nine battle stars and survived his plane being shot down in the South Pacific in 1945.

## Unlucky game 13 bad for football

Think back to Aug. 22. It was probably sunny, it was probably hot, and you were no doubt parked in front of the television, watching ... college football. Right?

Of course not. Who watches football in August? Baseball in August, college football in November! Or December, as was the case this year, when the season didn't end until Dec. 7. The college football season, which used to be a relatively short affair (nine, 10 weeks at the most), has turned into an epic ordeal. This year it took 16 weeks to play the regular season; empires have risen and fallen in less time.

The main culprit is the NCAA, which this year for the first time allowed teams to schedule 13 regular-season games instead of 12. A number of teams, including Ohio State, Iowa State, and Oklahoma, took advantage of the opportunity and played the extra game. And why not? An added nonconference game — for big-name programs, most likely a home game — means added revenue and television exposure. Yes, it's also another potential for a loss, but when you bring in San Jose State in on what would be a bye week, as Ohio State did, you're not going to lose a whole lot of sleep.

Unfortunately, those 13 games didn't take place on consecutive weeks. The Sooners played their first game on Aug. 30 and their last on Pearl Harbor Day. Miami's season covered the same length of time, and the 'Canes only played 12 times. The NFL's Oakland Raiders (average player age: 63) manage to get through 16 games in 17 weeks; why can't their younger counterparts keep such a timetable?

The longer season does nothing but complicate an already confusing bowl situation. Iowa finished its season on Nov. 16, then got to wait three weeks to see where it would be playing in January. The Buckeyes got their TOSTITOS Fiesta Bowl bid a full two weeks before the rest of the BCS schools found out where they were headed. Other teams, such as the Hawkeyes' Orange Bowl opponent, USC, got an opportunity to play on

# Hackett ends Bruins' streak


BOSTON (AP) — Goalie Jeff Hackett stopped the NHL's top team as the Montreal Canadiens beat Boston 4-2 Tuesday night and ended the Bruins' three-game winning streak.

The Canadiens took a 4-0 lead on goals by Jan Bulis in the first period and Yanic Perreault, Oleg Petrov, and Randy McKay in the second. Boston cut it to 4-2 when Joe Thornton scored his 15th goal at 10:53 of the second and Mike Knuble got his fifth at 19:16.

Hackett, 3-1 in his last four games, stopped 31 shots, including all 14 he faced in the third period.

Montreal also knocked off a strong Boston team in last season's playoffs. The Bruins had the best record in the Eastern Conference but lost in the first round to the eighth-seeded Canadiens.

Tuesday's win was the Canadiens' second straight after a four-game losing streak. They beat Phoenix 4-2 on Dec. 7. Despite the loss, the Bruins are 8-2 in their last 10 games and have the league's best record.

## Crazy caddy or lax rules on the course?

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — With \$200,000 on the line, Tiger Woods dug his feet in the bunker, waggled his sand wedge over the ball, and was at the top of his swing when the silence was pierced by a nerve-racking noise he has come to despise.

Click! Even more outrageous was the sound that followed. Splash!

Not long after someone took a premature picture of Woods at the Skins Game, caddie Steve Williams took the law — or the lens, in this case — into his own hands and deposited the camera in the pond surrounding the 18th green at Landmark Golf Club.

The question is: Who crossed the line?

Does a caddie have the right to destroy someone's property? "Just because he's Tiger Woods' caddie doesn't give him the right to do that," Vijay Singh said. "It may have been spur of the moment, but I cannot say it was good what he did. If my cad-

die did that, I'd make him fish it out of the lake."

Did the fan get what he deserved?

No one knew who the guy was, only that he was not authorized to have a camera or be stationed inside the ropes. Policies make it abundantly clear that cameras are not allowed once the tournament starts, although that has never stopped anyone before.

"Did Stevie throw the camera away? I've been wanting to do that for a long time," Davis Love III said. "I've taken them away from people, but I haven't smashed one or thrown one yet. I think it's fair."

In the case of the camera, Woods had reason to stand by his man.

He had to back off twice because of cameras on the opening hole at the British Open, where Woods was going for the third leg of the Grand Slam. An early click on the final hole in Ireland cost him a chance at his first bogey-free tournament. There were so many cameras in Germany that Woods felt as if he was modeling on a runway.

And those are just a few examples from this year.

"He backs off a lot more than you realize," Mark O'Meara said.

The national photojournalists are guilty by association. The early clicks almost always come from those who don't cover golf, such as the Japanese photographer who got Woods on the first fairway at Muirfield and was puzzled when he was asked to leave.

The real problem stems from fans who come to the course with cameras, from marshals who spend more time watching golf than policing the crowds, and from tour officials who fail to enforce their policies.

## Lurking security guard overhears conversation

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A former hotel security guard says he overheard a police detective make a toast to Allen Iverson's "next felony" last summer, days before the NBA star was charged with threatening two men with a gun.

Wesley Gregg told Iverson's lawyers he was working a late-evening shift at a Philadelphia hotel July 8 when he spotted the lead detective in the investigation dining with other officers at the hotel's bar and heard him boast, "He is going down," when a news story about the 76ers player appeared on TV.

When the detectives got up to leave, Lt. Michael Chitwood made a toast: "This is for Iverson's next felony," Gregg said in a signed statement he gave Iverson's attorneys on July 24.

The lawyers never used the statement in court. Prosecutors dropped all charges against Iverson after the two men he was accused of threatening said they were unwilling to testify.

But the tale was passed along

to Iverson, and his attorneys said Tuesday it formed the basis for comments the star made about Philadelphia police last month.

"I've heard about police officers toasting to Allen Iverson's next felony conviction," Iverson said during an interview with the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Daily News. "I'm hearing about them saying I'm involved with one thing or another, and it scares me. I know that if there's a crooked cop out there, they could do anything to me. He could do anything. Allen Iverson could wind up dead tomorrow if a crooked cop wants him dead."

After the interview, police commanders said such behavior by officers would not be tolerated. Some officers said they were offended by Iverson's remarks and considered them baseless.

Morriss steps in at Baylor

DALLAS — Kentucky coach Guy Morriss is set to become the second Southeastern Conference football coach in a week to jump to the Big 12.

Morriss will be introduced as the replacement for fired Baylor coach Kevin Steele during a news conference today in Waco, a source close to the Bears program confirmed Monday night.

The source, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Morriss was on the Baylor campus Monday before returning to Lexington, Ky., where he announced his resignation as the Wildcats' coach.

Kentucky Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart confirmed the resignation Monday night, saying only that Morriss, a Texas native, resigned to take another coaching job.

"Baylor comes along and puts together a package that's outstanding," Barnhart said at a news conference Tuesday. "If you're in Guy's shoes, you've got to look at those kinds of things for your family. He's been in the game for an awfully long time. Those opportunities don't come along very often, and for him to have the opportunity to do that for his family, my hat's off to him."

A team meeting for Kentucky players was scheduled Tuesday. Barnhart said he wants a replacement for Morriss hired by Christmas and said he has a list of possible replacements, though he did not identify any candidates.

"I want somebody who's not afraid to come in and win a championship," he said. "I want somebody who can talk about competing annually in the top half of this conference. I want someone who can talk about taking our kids to bowl games and letting them experience what it feels like to be in postseason play."

Dennis Franchione left Alabama — which, like Kentucky, is on NCAA probation — last week after a 10-3 season to become the new coach at Texas A&M, where he replaced fired 14-year coach R.C. Slocum.

Like Morriss, Franchione returned to Texas, having previously coached TCU for three seasons.

Steele was fired Nov. 3 but coached Baylor's last three games, all losses to cap a 3-9 season. Steele was 9-36 over four years and 1-31 in the Big 12.

The Bears lost their first 25 conference games under Steele before

a 35-32 win over Kansas on Oct. 5. The 51-year-old Morriss was 9-14 in two seasons as Kentucky's coach. He replaced Hal Mumme when the former coach resigned in February 2001 amid internal and NCAA investigations.

Kentucky was 7-5 this season but wasn't eligible for a bowl because of NCAA sanctions. It was the Wildcats' first seven-win season since 1998, the final season for quarterback Tim Couch.

After the Wildcats won their first four games this season — their best start in 18 years — Barnhart rewarded Morriss by adding two more seasons to his contract, through the 2007 season.

Morriss made \$400,000 a year at Kentucky, including a base salary of \$170,000 plus compensation for his radio and TV shows and the school's endorsement deal with Nike.

While details of his Baylor contract weren't known, Morriss could make about \$1 million annually at the Big 12's only private school.


Morriss was on the losing end of one of the most bizarre finishes when LSU won, 33-30, at Kentucky on a deflected 75-yard touchdown pass Nov. 9. As the final play was still unfolding, Morriss was sopping wet — already doused with Gatorade — while fireworks were exploding from the scoreboard and Wildcats fans were attacking a goal post.

Pippen, crew hustle easy win over Jordan

WASHINGTON (AP) — In his first game against Michael Jordan, Scottie Pippen had one of his best games of the season.

Pippen had 14 points, seven rebounds, and five assists as the Portland Trail Blazers took a quick lead and led easily from start to finish to beat the Washington Wizards 98-79, Tuesday.

Pippen made six of seven shots and tied for Derek Anderson for the team-high in scoring. All five Portland starters were in double figures before the end of the third quarter.

The Trail Blazers outthrustled and outworked the Wizards, outscoring them 50-28 in the paint and 20-8 on fastbreaks. They were ahead by 11 at the end of the first quarter, and the Wizards never got within single digits again.

Portland has won three straight overall and eight straight against the Wizards.

Larry Hughes had 17 points and 11 rebounds for the Wizards. Jordan scored 14 points.

Pippen and Jordan were a commanding twosome for 10 years, winning six titles during the Chicago Bulls dynasty of the 1990s. Their first meeting as opponents could have come last season after Jordan ended his retirement, but Jordan was hurt both times.

remaining in the second half and the game tied at 50, Worley fed a cutting Boyd with an entry pass which resulted in a lay-up. Following a basket by UNI's David Gruber and a foul on Chris Foster, Worley hit a short basket that allowed Iowa to regain a 54-52 advantage. Following a hurried 3-point attempt by Matt Schneiderman on the other end of the court, Worley nailed a 3 with 2:01 remaining in the game that put the pressure squarely on UNI's shoulders.

"Glen Worley really hit a backbreaker I thought," said Northern Iowa coach Greg McDermott, whose Panthers fall to 2-3.

Worley played down his role in the victory following the game.

"We just did a nice job down the stretch of executing," he said.

After a slow start that saw both squads struggle from the floor — they shot 36 percent — the tightening of play in the second half came as a welcome arrival for Alford, who has stressed this team can win games if it remains close at the half.

"Our style is going to be grinding out wins down the stretch," he said.

Iowa led the contest, 32-24, before Northern Iowa opened the second half with a 10-3 run that cut the Hawkeyes lead to 35-34. A pair of baskets by Greg Brunner and Sean Sonderleiter ended UNI's run.

Boyd finished the game with 12 points, while Chauncey Leslie, Iowa's leading scorer at 19.2 points per game, was held to just eight. McDermott said the Panthers made a conscious effort to take Leslie out of the game.

"That was our game plan coming in — to make somebody beat us other than Chauncey," he said.

Gruber, who punished the Hawkeyes during last season's meeting by amassing 22 points and 12 boards, finished Tuesday's game with 15 points and 12 rebounds. Chris Foster had 10 points for the Panthers.

Iowa will play the fourth game of its current five-game home stand Friday night, when it will host Iowa State in the final intrastate rivalry game of the season.

# Fans, teams hurt by new extended season schedule

national television late in the season, heavily influencing both the human polls and individual-awards voting. In addition, Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz and his staff essentially lost a week of preparation time. Rather than using the time off to develop a game plan, Ferentz could only watch and wonder what team he'd be going up against.

And it's not as if this past weekend was chock-full of enticing matchups. There were three games (four, if you count Army-Navy, which gave us plenty of "Protecting the quarterback, protecting the nation" comparisons) on Dec. 7. The entire college football world came to a grinding halt for three games. Could the season have been compressed a week? Yes. That's one less week of tedious bowl speculation: "If Miami wins, and Texas loses, and Jupiter rises in the third quadrant ... Gator Bowl!" One less week of Brent Musburger. Most importantly, one more week for everyone to prepare — and not just those on the field.

No longer is winning the sole determinant of one's bowl destination. Now, a team's fans have to "travel well." Note to bowl

committees: People travel better when they know where they're going. Thousands of Hawkeye fans fell victim to the ol' bait-and-switch when they bought Rose Bowl tour packages, only to find out Iowa was headed in the opposite direction. To the BCS brain trust, the three non-championship bowls may be interchangeable. But it's unfair to judge a team's fans on how they travel when they aren't even told the destination until three weeks before the game. Even Iowa Athletics Director Bob Bowsby admitted that "even a few days" makes a big difference when it comes to flying tens of thousands of people across the country.

The illusion that college football is anything more than a business is rapidly eroding. That the Big Ten/Pac-10 matchup takes place in Florida, not Pasadena, is evidence that the almighty dollar rules the sport. But at some point even the NCAA bigwigs and television network wonks have to realize that enough is enough, and bring the season back to its previous, more reasonable length.

After all, one week of unadulterated Heisman speculation just isn't enough.

# Rose must 'come clean' to return

increasing support for allowing Rose into the Hall of Fame. The Hall adopted a rule in February 1991 that excludes membership to those on the permanently banned list.

"But it all starts with Pete," Morgan had said. "He's got to come clean. I'm sure he liked hearing the fans cheering for him. But that ovation isn't going to get him into the Hall of Fame. He's got to make it right. It's up to him."

The executive said Selig wanted a resolution "sooner rather than later." Rose recently approached a person involved in baseball's investigation and said, "Give me a second chance," another baseball executive said, also on the

condition of anonymity.

Rose applied for reinstatement in September 1997 but Selig hasn't ruled on it, saying he hasn't seen a reason to alter the ban. Still, he has twice allowed Rose to participate in pregame on-field promotions at World Series games. Other than that, Rose may not be in areas not accessible to fans.

When the Reds asked for permission this year to allow him to appear in the final game at Cinergy Field, Selig turned them down.

"I knew there's been conversations going on," John Allen, the team's chief operating office, said Tuesday. "It was a difficult situation for the Reds to be put in when we requested permission for the final game at Cinergy. We were denied, then two weeks later at the World Series — that was a very difficult situation."

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


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1 tsp. soda  
7 1/2 qt. popped corn

Cook brown sugar, butter, syrup, and salt for 5 minutes. Add soda. When foaming stops, pour over corn (add peanuts, if you wish). Put on cookie sheets or large cake pans. Bake 1 hour in 200° oven; stir every 15 minutes.

**DESSERTS**

**Cherry Almond Coffee Squares**

1 c. dairy sour cream  
1/4 c. water  
3 eggs

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
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
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
