## Need for kidney leaves embassy cold

A hint of desperation hovers in Colette Issa's compact Coralville apartment.

It's there while the 34-year-old lies on the couch, wrapped in a blanket, looking prematurely worn-out from the kidneys that refuse to cleanse her blood of toxins.

It's in the pleas of her husband, Jacques Abandelwa, for help writing a letter to Secretary of State Colin Powell to grant his wife a "second chance at life" by allowing her brother to come from Africa on a temporary visa

to donate his healthy kidney.

It's in his displaying of letter after letter from the U.S. Embassy that, in so many words, denies just that.

For the last two years, Issa and Abandelwa have waged a long-distance battle — aided by politicians, clergy, and doctors — to persuade the U.S. Embassy in the Democratic Republic of Congo to let her brother, Vesto Mchula, fly to Iowa to donate his organ. The Type-O blood coursing through both siblings' veins renders Mchula a viable donor to spare his sister from the ceaseless fatigue of kidney disease, which she has had since 1995.

But the case has turned out to be one in which prayers and crossed-fingered hopes clash with the rigid bureaucratic reality of visa-application approval that doesn't take such sentiments into account. Mchula's been denied a visa three times, once in Kenya and twice in the West-African nation of the Congo.

The embassy's letters say his fishing livelihood does not count as employment and thus can't fund his trip nor demonstrate enough ties to the civil-strife-stricken nation to convince them he'd return after his surgery in the states.

But Issa and UI student Abandelwa fire back refutations of each point: How can he find a job in a country that suffers from more than 50 percent unemployment, where jobs are routinely awarded to those with the highest bribe? Their church, University Baptist Church, has raised \$2,800 for the plane ticket. Mchula's wife and three children still live in a (copy desk, we are double checking this and will get back to you) refugee camp, so of course he'd want to return,

## UI president's mansion slated for makeover

UI officials are moving forward with sweeping renovations to the historic university president's mansion that will likely cost more than \$1 million.

"Long overdue" improvements to the residence, constructed in 1908, are slated to begin in the fall, officials said. A project timeline calls for completion by the fall of 2004, with the living quarters probably available by the summer of 2004, said project manager Rod Lehnertz.

The state Board of Regents will consider the renovations at a meeting next week.

The residence has been vacant since last summer, when then-UI President Mary Sue Coleman left to become president at the University of Michigan. UI President David Skorton has continued living in his Iowa City home since taking the reins on March 1, allowing the renovations.

Virtually no work has been done on the nearly 100-year-old house's infrastructure, with only minor renovation projects conducted over the past 80 years. The current project is intended to ensure the facility's operation "long into the future," Lehnertz said.

The Facilities Service Group will accept public bids for the project in August, he said.

"It's already in very bad shape," Lehnertz said. "Frankly, the work should have occurred many years ago."

The improvements will bring the mansion in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and allow more effective service, officials say. Also, the facility's plumbing, electrical, heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning systems will be replaced, along with the addition of a new garage/service wing.

## 100s gather to remember fallen officers

Johnson County law-enforcement agencies and more than 150 spectators gathered on Thursday to commemorate fallen officers throughout history in what many hope will become the first annual Police Officer Memorial Service.

Held in S.T. Morrison Park in Coralville, with the Iowa City Police Color Guard carrying the U.S. and Iowa flags, the Scottish Highlanders playing bagpipes, and the Iowa State Patrol Honor Guard firing a 21-gun salute, the hour-long ceremony honored U.S. police officers killed in the line of duty.

"This is an effort where we have gotten together to honor those who served in this profession and have given the ultimate in serving," said Coralville Police Chief Barry Bedford during his welcome address to the police, families of officers, and citizens, who sat on lawn chairs and on blankets to watch the ceremony.

Last year, 148 officers were killed across the country in the line of duty. Several speakers said that although Johnson County has only suffered one loss of an officer in the line of duty, that one officer was one too many.

Iowa City police Officer Edward Leeney, 34, was killed in 1926 when his motorcycle

collided with a cable car. It is suspected that he was chasing a speeding vehicle, said Coralville police Sgt. John Williams.

"We are very lucky that Johnson County has only suffered one, and I hope it will only suffer one," Williams said before introducing Leeney's granddaughter, Cathy Hogan.

She recounted how Leeney's daughter, her mother, talked about her father, always with "a twinkle in her eye and a smile on her face." She thanked the Memorial Service Committee for honoring her grandfather and keeping his memory alive and said many relatives came to the memorial, some from out of state.

Johnson County Attorney J.

Patrick White gave the keynote address, explaining first that the Peace Officer's Memorial Day was approved as an official holiday by President Kennedy in 1962, the week surrounding it was to be named Police Week.

"Memorials like the one we're having tonight ought to stand for more than words," White said, asking spectators to look around and make a visualization of who they're standing next to and what they're seeing. "What we're memorializing is the devotion and selflessness of officers."

"When you wake up tomorrow, remember tonight, and

## Parrish revels in his larger-than-life persona

DES MOINES — Alfredo Parrish parks illegally, jokes with the security guards at the Polk County Courthouse's metal detector, and struts into the courtroom five minutes before the hearing to casual greetings from opposing attorneys.

The 55-year-old UI alumnus rubs his grayish mustache and goatee, responds with a brief hello, and slides into a plush seat between his two co-counselors. He sifts through a stack of legal documents.

He asks the judge for permission for a *Daily Iowan* reporter and photographer to sit in on a

pre-trial conference of a case against John Deere. The lawyers nod. The judge agrees, but with a caveat.

"I think Alfredo gets enough publicity," she said jokingly.

Everyone erupts in laughter. Parrish garnered much attention last fall for representing men's basketball player Pierre Pierce, who had been charged with the third-degree sexual assault of a UI female athlete. With the unusual use of a mediator in the criminal case, Parrish struck a deal reducing the charge to assault causing injury and allowing

## Self-described cheater will graduate on time

A UI senior who told *The Daily Iowan* he cheated his way through college will graduate on Saturday without objections from the department in which he majored, university officials said on Thursday.

The upper levels of the administration will not throw up any roadblocks to keep Mike Gabler, 22, from receiving his degree in economics along with 525 others at Hancher Auditorium.

In an interview Thursday, Gabler apologized to students and the university for his comments but confirmed that he will graduate. He said he met with Fred Antczak, associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, shortly after the story appeared, but would

not say what they discussed. Antczak handles most cases of academic dishonesty.

In a May 1 interview with *The Daily Iowan*, Gabler appeared to boast when he said: "I've cheated my entire way through college. Students who cheat don't have a hard time doing it and it seems like almost everyone does."

Gabler sent a letter to the economics department apologizing for offending the university after the May 6 *Daily Iowan* article, which described several ways in which students cheat on exams, said department Chairman Stephen Williamson. Typically, he said, departments that catch a student cheating will make a recommendation to administrators, but in this case,

# The woman who changed ROTC

For her first Air Force ROTC meeting her freshmen year, Jamie Kovarna wore a T-shirt and skirt.

Walking into the room full of cadets clad in blue uniforms, Kovarna said she sat next to the only other person in plain clothes, and asked him if he knew whether they were expected to get uniforms already.

"I don't know," he told her. "Nobody told me anything."

Kovarna, who will graduate this weekend with a degree in Russian, said her unpreparedness nearly four years ago has disappeared from her ROTC unit. Her class of cadets, she said, reshaped the way ROTC activities are conducted and the way cadets are trained, and it has improved communication among its members to make it clear what is expected of them.

Fellow cadets said Kovarna's dedication to organization, her natural leadership abilities, and her caring nature have played the biggest part of the ROTC's transformation.

Kovarna's initial interest in the military stemmed from curiosity. She said the military's mix of positive and negative stereotypes in the public

way ROTC upper-class members teach younger cadets basic military operations, such as marching, dressing, and standing at attention.

"When I was a cadet, [the leaders] just lined us up and started to march," said Christen, who belonged to the 255th before graduating from the UI in 1992. "Jamie had all the underclassmen taught individually how to march. It saved a lot of time, and it's a much better way to improve cadets."

After her receiving her commission on May 18, Kovarna will report to duty as an officer on June 17 with the 255th Air Force ROTC detachment in Iowa City, then will head to Texas in the fall for training to become an Air Force intelligence officer, hopefully in Russia, she said.

But as she prepares for her commission, she said she thinks of how much more she knows about people and how much more desire she has to learn.

"Even after college, you're not done learning," she said. "It still feels like I'm pretty much at the beginning."

# UI parents needing childcare wait (& wait)

A report by the state Board of Regents shows that more than 300 children of UI faculty and students are on a waiting list for childcare while funding decreases.

All three state universities' childcare facilities are operating at full capacity with extensive waiting lists, the report released Thursday shows. But Iowa State University and the University of Northern Iowa have far fewer children on waiting lists, 140 and 70 respectively.

The waiting lists are "very usual," said Jane Holland, the UI Family Services coordinator. And local childcare providers said they weren't surprised about the numbers, which Holland said the university addresses by referring parents to non-university childcare services.

The situation is compounded by an expected 3 percent drop in proposed funding for university childcare from \$502,659 in fiscal 2003 to \$488, 572 for fiscal 2004. The services are financed through federal grants and private donations. Meanwhile, ISU and UNI are seeing an increase in funding.

"The whole [UI childcare] program is pretty good," Holland said, adding that it benefits families needing financial assistance.

The university's five childcare programs were assessed as

"very good" in a recent evaluation by a source outside of the UI, she said.

The UI Hospitals and Clinics houses a daycare designed primarily to assist children affiliated with the university; it has 150 children on a waiting list, the report shows.

Serving the university for more than 50 years, the University Preschool, 212 Myrtle Ave., takes care of 12 university-affiliated children between the ages of 3 and 5. Fifty-five children are on the waiting list there.

There are also three nonprofit

centers that work out of university-owned homes, which pay market-based rent for the facilities. The report shows the centers have a combined 180 children on waiting lists.

"We recognize there are many needs out there," Holland said.

Those who seek childcare within the university do so based on the lower rates and financial assistance, she said.

# City may increase parking rates

The Iowa City parking department proposed an increase in parking-meter rates, monthly parking-permit rates, and parking fines in hopes of easing a \$1 million cut in state funding.

The proposals, drafted by Joe Fowler, the director of parking and transit, and Chris O'Brien, the parking manager, include a 15-cent raise for parking meters, a \$5 increase in monthly parking permits, and a raise in the \$5 parking ticket to \$10.

"These increases would give the parking division the ability to provide additional funds to the general fund in addition to potentially adding to our cash balance," Fowler wrote in a May 15 memo addressed to City Manager Steve Atkins.

In addition to making proposals to increase revenue, Fowler also recommended that city councilors charge a 25-cent fare for the now-free Downtown shuttle, as suggested by Atkins.

"The increase would discourage ridership," Fowler said. "It also slows the time to get on the bus, which could cause us to drop routes and go back to three." The shuttle has four bus routes.

As a result of the fee, Fowler estimates a 50 percent decrease in ridership on the shuttle, which carries between 1,400 and 1,600 people per day. He thinks that the people who will stop using the shuttle will be those with other modes of transportation, which in turn will increase the demands for parking in the downtown area.

"The purpose of the shuttle was to reduce the demand for parking ... by providing alternative transportation," he wrote.

City Councilor Connie Champion said although the downtown shuttle doesn't currently charge fees, the ridership affects the amount of federal money Iowa City receives.

"We'll have to look closely at that," she said. "If it will affect ridership, it might affect money we get for the transit service."

Increasing parking meter rates from 60 cents to 75 cents per hour and equalizing them with UI hourly rates will lead to possible additional revenue of \$55,000 per year, Fowler said. In addition to creating more revenue, he also hopes the rate increase will serve as an incentive for drivers to use parking ramps.

He also proposed a \$5 increase for parking tickets. This includes such violations as prohibited zones, loading zones, and service vehicle zones, among others.

"The greatest opportunity to increase our revenue lies in our ability to increase the parking fines that are currently in place," Fowler wrote. "We thought the rates should be comparable with the ones the UI is charging," he said. The university currently charges students \$10 for illegal parking and \$5 for expired meters.

Champion, who, along with the other councilors, must approve any proposals before

implementation, said she will look closely at them.

Although she said she thinks the \$2 increase in expired-meter fines is "a little high," she agrees with charging higher fees for illegal parking.

"I don't have a problem with that," she said. "Illegal parking is hazardous, and I think we could even do more."

Fowler also suggested a \$5 increase in monthly permit prices. Permit owners currently have to pay between \$45-\$65 per month, which is roughly a 50 percent discount off the hourly rate. The increase in price would result in an additional \$36,000 revenue.

Fowler said that there is a 1,000-person waiting list and thus doesn't anticipate a decrease in demand. "There is enough demand, so it wouldn't decrease use," he said. "I don't think it will be a problem."

## 'Oldest' new area to strut its stuff

Nestled on a grassy hill overlooking the Iowa River in northern Iowa City sprawls several baby-blue houses fronted by sweeping wood porches — a scene reminiscent of pre-WWII Iowa City.

But the wood beams that shoot skyward and expose dry-wall that stand juxtaposed to spindly saplings lying prostrate on the freshly sodded front lawns indicate that the homes are part of an ambitious "new" neighborhood plan.

After eight years in the making and a tenuous start, the Peninsula Neighborhood will open for viewing May 17 as the "new traditional neighborhood" of Iowa City.

Built in the center of approximately 200 acres of grassy land near the Elk's Club Golf Course, designers of the 35-acre neighborhood are striving to catalyze a renaissance of the old neighborhood style reflected in Iowa City's residential homes near downtown. Developer Terry Stamper of T.L. Stamper Holdings, LLC plans to construct 410 units, consisting of 380 houses and a mix of condominiums and lofts. The remaining land will be left untouched as a park area around the neighborhood.

There are around 450 neighborhoods such as the Peninsula Neighborhood across the country, each reflecting the traditional architecture of their city, Stamper said.

A sample house outfitted with modern appliances that betray the exterior's old-fashioned aesthetic will be available for viewing Saturday; when completed, homes will start at \$120,000. Seven of the nine nearly-finished houses have been purchased, Stamper said.

The loft apartments, which will be built in late July, will feature 24 units, he said. Aside from Stamper, only one home owner now inhabits the peninsula — Patrick Riepe, the online editor of the *Iowa City Press-Citizen*. Riepe refused to comment.

The houses are built with several different styles, including the Elliston style, which contains approximately 1,950 square feet and features a more formal floor plan where rooms are distinctly demarcated.

Some homes feature a 500-square-foot carriage house, an apartment above a garage, that features its own kitchen and bathroom. Rent for such units would be determined by the homeowner, but likely range from \$450 to \$500 per month, Stamper said.

The land for the project was purchased in 1995 with both federal money and city funds as part of the flood plain after the floods of 1993, said Karin Franklin, the Iowa City planner.

The idea for the neighborhood was cooked up by the Iowa City City Council, community members, and Miami-based urban planner, Victor Dover, Franklin said. Stamper was then picked from a group of three developers to head up the project.

"The idea is to be able to live your whole life here," Stamper said. "There's a place for every age group. We want to mix them up and see what happens."

Because the city has certain zoning requirements that prohibit building homes close to property lines, as are the ones in Peninsula, ordinances were modified slightly to accommodate the new neighborhood, Franklin said.

"People have forgotten how to build a real neighborhood," Stamper said. "We're trying to revamp the concept."

## City considers move that could raise rents

On May 19, the Iowa City Council will consider a measure that might result in higher rents for area residents.

The Department of Housing and Inspection Services has released a detailed plan to increase rental permit fees, including two different options — one supporting an additional housing inspector, the other assuming the same staffing level. Both will be discussed by the City Council at a its work session.

Under the first option, a 41.7 percent increase in fees would raise \$90,000 in annual revenue. That number jumps to 66

percent if an additional inspector is to be funded.

The rental permit fee for a two-year multi-family permit for 12 four-bedroom dwelling units currently costs \$348. The fee would jump to \$530 under the proposal.

According to a department analysis sent to councilors on Wednesday, each of the city's five housing inspectors have faced a 71 percent increase in annual workload since 1992. Over the past 11 years, 2,700 new rental units have been added, the report says.

In addition, the department will also face additional responsibilities if the nuisance ordinance is passed, said Doug Boothroy, the director of Housing and Inspection Services.

"It's my impression that [city

councilors] are interested in increasing staff," he said.

With the fee increase, housing inspections would be self-sustained, eliminating general-fund contributions from the city, Boothroy said.

The fee increases were considered Monday by the City Council as one of 30 cost-saving measures proposed by City Manager Steve Atkins to help ease a \$1 million cut in state funds. However, councilors tabled the plan to wait for further information.

Several councilors concede that fee increases will likely be passed on to the renter.

"Whenever you increase inspection fees, rents do reflect the increase," said Mayor Ernie Lehman, adding that a slight

"overstock" in apartments could mitigate potential increases.

Councilor Mike O'Donnell agrees that any fee increases will be passed to area renters, but hiring a new inspector is necessary.

"I think it's clear we need one ... we have a heavily burdened department," he said. Before the council approves action that could increase rents, city officials should study "who is renting in Iowa City," said Councilor Connie Champion.

"Frankly, if it's four-year college students, we really don't care," Champion said. However, if rents become too high, Iowa City could be "unlivable" for longtime residents and families, she said.

## Experts emphasize résumé's importance

A recent graduate has 10 seconds to explain 17 years of academic prowess, a life's worth of awards and accomplishments, and any marketable skills — all in one page.

A strong résumé, though rare, is essential for the UI graduating seniors facing a tight job market, said Mark Karsh, a former recruiting director.

The former VP/Talent Director at Leo Burnett Advertising in Chicago and founder and president of JobBound, a Chicago-based startup that offers résumé and interview training for college students, said he's read more than 10,000 résumés.

"I was truly amazed at how poor the quality of résumés I got," he said, adding that 98 percent of

them needed major revisions. "For better or worse, it's your entire life on one sheet of paper."

Though résumés contain many of the qualities a student has to offer a potential employer, Karsh said most recruiting coordinators will only spend 10-15 seconds reading them.

The cardinal rule for a credible résumé is correct grammar and spelling, he said.

"A résumé is supposedly your best," he said, adding that if a person's best work contains mistakes, it alerts coordinators about potential carelessness.

When listing jobs, students should provide specific details that are relevant to the position. For example, Karsh hides résumés with "Proficiency in Microsoft Word" credentials.

"People put extraneous and superfluous information on the

résumé," he said. "All people know Microsoft Word, and if they don't, they can learn it in a day."

One of the biggest problems with résumés is wording the objective, said Nicole Stiffler, a placement specialist in the UI Career Center. She said students are often not exactly sure what to put on a résumé.

"The name of the game is customization," she said, adding that résumés are just one of the selling tools students need to get hired.

Stiffler said she couldn't estimate how many students come through the Career Center each semester, but that she sees at least one student per day, sometimes up to 12.

To find a job, however, a concise, well-written résumé is just the starting point.

Jane Schildroth, the director of UI Career Education and

Programming, said the hiring process begins with the cover letter, which will entice employers to read the résumé. A strong résumé, she said, lures an interview, which in turn, can lead to a position with a company.

"Students should use nouns that are specific to the industry," she said.

Chris Frost, a graduating senior majoring in communications, said writing résumés is a painful process. Frost, who's interested in working for a sales outfit in the Chicago area, said he went to the Career Center and read the book *Résumés That Will Knock 'Em Dead* to polish his writing skills.

"The hardest part was wording sentences so they sounded professional," he said.

# UI to renovate president's house

Functional improvements will be added to the first-floor kitchen area, which provides service for public events and fund-raising events. The kitchen will be reconfigured and an adjacent dining area added.

The second floor of the house is used as a residence for the presi-

dent, but the first floor frequently hosts university and state-sponsored events. Last year, more than 2,000 visitors passed through the doors of the mansion during over 50 events.

Plans also include the expansion of the north porch to accommodate an outdoor area with stairway access.

The attic will also be tweaked by converting an office into a bedroom. The windows of the

residence will be replaced as well.

Renovation and rehabilitation work on the president's residence, 102 Church St., was given permission to proceed by the regents in December 2002. They approved the project description and budget in January.

The rehabilitation work will be funded by income from the Treasurer's Temporary Investments at the maximum amount

of \$1.16 million. The remaining renovation work will be covered by private funds — mainly gifts from the UI Foundation earmarked for that purpose.

The house doesn't have a set value — it was never appraised or intended to be put on the market.

"It has somewhat of a price-less tag," Lehnertz said.

# Parrish remains passionate about the law

Pierce to redshirt this season.

With his signature black suit, a mustard yellow tie, and shiny leather shoes coupled with courtroom bravado and searing passion, Parrish seems to embody more the classroom show-off than the archetypal defense lawyer who charges \$250 per hour for a guaranteed murder acquittal (an estimated 25 out of 30, he says).

If Des Moines is Parrish's stage, everyone else is merely a player. It's where he's gawked at like a celebrity, like the "Johnny Cochran of Iowa" he's been dubbed by national media. It's where he chooses between his Audi, Lexus, and silver, streamlined BMW for the short commute to his elegant downtown office.

He wasn't always this fortunate. The man known for often playing the race card in courtrooms across Iowa was born to two civil-rights activists near Selma, Ala.

Following the guidance of his parents, who were teachers struggling to support their family, Parrish spent high school initially dreaming of attending medical school when he wasn't busy shooting jumpers on the basket-

ball court. After graduating from a Presbyterian junior college in North Carolina in 1965, the 19-year-old Parrish arrived in Iowa to attend the University of Dubuque for the remainder of his undergraduate education.

He then became one of the first seven black students to attend the UI law school, solidifying his reputation as an outstanding student by accepting the presidency of the UI Student Bar Association.

N. William Hines, the longtime dean of the law school, has known Parrish for 33 years, since he passed through what is now the Boyd Law Building, where a pictorial of the high-profile attorney is mounted among those of the most prominent lawyers to graduate from the university. Parrish communicates frequently with his ex-professor, who says he is not afraid to take on unpopular cases.

"If you're in serious trouble, Al Parrish is the guy to call," Hines said.

After graduating in 1970, Parrish worked for four years at the Des Moines-based student legal aid — an organization known for representing the lower-middle class. He worked for there until 1974, when he created his own

practice with two lawyers he worked with at the organization.

The first case that brought Parrish to center stage — "one of the most important cases of my career" — was in 1977 when an all-white jury acquitted black defendant David Welton of the first-degree murder of Des Moines police officer.

"He's a pit bull," said Margaret Stuart, his wife of eight years. "He loves his job, and he's very passionate about it."

Parrish acknowledges his fiery temper got him in trouble after a district judge unusually changed jury instructions after two days of deliberations. He attempted to withdraw as counsel and stormed out the courtroom, only to return later — but he refused to take his previous seat as counsel. The judge slapped Parrish with a \$500 fine for contempt of court.

Parrish then wanted to expand the firm, but his partners didn't, so he broke off and moved his first building in 1989 and vowed to continue serving the lower-middle class.

Now, his colleagues say more than 30 years of experience has prompted the once-loose cannon to calm down. But just because he's more tolerant, it doesn't mean he has lost his effective-

ness, said longtime co-worker Elizabeth Kruidenier.

"He's not quite as volatile, but he's still the best," she said.

Parrish tends to talk about his won cases like a real-estate acquisition — "My favorite part of a trial is closing arguments: That's when I usually seal the deal" — or even a basketball match — "I don't like to lose at all"... "Competition is the name of the game."

And don't think for a second that he leaves this attitude at the door of the courtroom. On May 9, a judge denied his request to strike a witness from the upcoming trial. It was worth a shot, he said, shrugging it off.

"Bring it on," he then taunted the strait-laced prosecutors, who returned an emotionless look.

After more than 30 years as a high-profile lawyer, Parrish has no intentions of hanging it up anytime soon. While he sometimes works 60 hours a week, Parrish still finds time for his wife, 2-year-old son, and 6-year-old daughter.

"Retirement is a waste," he said.

Parrish claims he's all business; you'll only find him at home with his kids or at work. Well, there and the golf course.

# 'Cheater' to graduate without objections

"there's no action being taken by the Department of Economics."

Students caught cheating can face an assortment of penalties, ranging from a failing grade to more hours to earn a bachelor's degree or expulsion from the university, according to university policy. The school initially gives students a written warning that doesn't stay with their record beyond graduation.

Gabler accused *The Daily Iowan* of blowing his quotes out of proportion.

"I took a lot of flak for that story," said Gabler, of Morton Grove, Ill. "I didn't think this was going to come out so big."

*The Daily Iowan* stands by its

reporting. In the first interview, Gabler described different methods he has used to cheat, detailing in-depth stealing a test from a teaching assistant's office and looking at other students' exams. He later acknowledged making those statements to a reporter but said the events never happened.

He never wavered in saying that he would get copies of previous years' exams, which were often identical to the tests he would take.

Gabler, who will receive an entrepreneurship certificate with his degree, said that using tests from previous years does not conflict with university policy and that many students do it.

On Thursday, inside his Burlington Street apartment,

he struck a different tone as he puffed on a cigarette.

"I've studied a lot during my time here," he said, adding that none of his professors raised the issue with him after the story appeared. "Obviously, how are you going to cheat your entire way through college?"

"I just want this to end," he added.

Antczak declined to comment on what punishment, if any, Gabler could face.

"People make mistakes," he said, saying "many" students receive warning notes on their records. He did not provide specific figures.

What surprised Antczak most wasn't the story itself. The number of reactions from students his office received has been "unprecedented" in the

five years he has served in the position, he said. Antczak said he has received more than 30 e-mails critical of Gabler since the story was published, and the influx doesn't appear to be tapering off.

"The strongest letters are from the students who are struggling but expect that the work they put in will be fairly assessed," he said, adding that he had received eight or nine messages in his e-mail box by 7:30 a.m. the day after the story ran. "It really touched a nerve."

As for future plans, Gabler says he might go to work at a foreign-car repair firm his father owns. He may inherit the business one day.

## Driver charged in smuggling deaths

HOUSTON — The driver of the tractor-trailer that became a sweltering death-trap for 18 people was charged on Thursday with transporting and harboring illegal immigrants, and authorities searched for three more suspects in one of the deadliest smuggling schemes in U.S. history.

The driver, Tyrone Williams of Schenectady, N.Y., at first told authorities he thought his trailer was empty, then admitted he was paid \$2,500 by two men to take 16 immigrants from the Mexican border into South Texas, according to court papers.

He claimed he did not watch as the immigrants were loaded into his trailer Tuesday night, though he could feel the truck rocking back and forth as he sat in the cab.

The trailer was actually packed with 100 men, women, and children from Mexico and Central America.

Seventeen died inside and another at a hospital in Victoria, where the trailer was discovered abandoned early Wednesday. It was the deadliest immigrant-smuggling scheme in the United States in at least 16 years.

Williams, 32, claimed he threw open the doors after discovering the dead and dying immigrants inside, then drove off. Authorities, however, said the doors had to be opened by sheriff's deputies.

Eduardo Ibarrola, Mexico's consul general in Houston who has interviewed some of the survivors, said the immigrants crossed the border in different ways before gathering in Harlingen, at the southern tip of Texas, for a 300-mile ride up U.S. Highway 77 to Houston.

He said they were loaded into the trailer around 10 p.m. Tuesday and were surprised at how crowded it was. He said there was no water, no light, and not nearly enough air.

"They didn't realize the danger of the situation," Ibarrola said. "They realized [too late] that there were so many people, that there was no air, and that they could not get out."

The immigrants were found about four hours later at a truck stop near Victoria.

Authorities said they were still looking for "Joe," "Abel," and "Fatima" in the smuggling scheme. All four suspects could get life in prison, perhaps even the death penalty, federal prosecutor Don DeGabrielle said.

Williams was arrested in the Houston area Wednesday, hours after the grim discovery in his trailer 115 miles away.

He did not enter a plea to the federal charges, and he remains jailed pending a bond hearing. He did not yet have an attorney.

According to court papers filed by investigators, Williams said he felt "shock, fear, and confusion" after he discovered the immigrants gasping for air. He said he unhitched the trailer at the truck stop and then drove to a Houston hospital, where he initially told authorities he had thought the trailer was empty. It is not clear why he went to the hospital.

After authorities talked to a survivor, Williams changed his story.

He allegedly told authorities he had met two men — "Joe" and "Abel" — on Tuesday, and they paid him \$2,500 to take a small group of immigrants from Harlingen to Robstown, 110 miles away.

After he began driving, Williams told authorities, one of the men called him on his cellular phone and told him they would pay an additional \$2,500 if he took the immigrants all the way to Houston, 200 miles farther.

## U.S. raids attempt to restore order in Iraq

BAGHDAD — U.S. forces raided a village near Saddam Hussein's home town of Tikrit before dawn Thursday and rounded up hundreds of men, including an Iraqi general who disguised himself as a shepherd, as U.S. military commanders intensified a security crackdown.

Soldiers in Baghdad carried out 300 patrols overnight and arrested 92 people, U.S. officials said, an effort designed to show that troops will be more visible throughout the troubled Iraqi capital, where carjackings, thievery, and drive-by attacks on government facilities are impeding reconstruction.

And in a village near the northern city of Sinjar, 18 suspects and a large quantity of weapons were seized in a raid against suspected Baath Party militiamen, U.S. military officials reported.

Paul Bremer, the senior U.S.

civilian in Iraq, pledged in his first news conference that Iraqi saboteurs loyal to the former Saddam government will be hunted, tens of thousands of common criminals released by Saddam will be returned to prison, and top officials of the outlawed Baath Party will be prevented from regaining positions of power.

"We are determined that Baathists and Saddamism will not come back to Iraq," said Bremer, who arrived this week to oversee rebuilding and the creation of an Iraqi authority that will gradually assume responsibility for national affairs. "Iraq must remain a free and independent, stable and representative country."

Despite widespread violence and insecurity that has sharply limited economic activity and cast doubt on the ability of U.S. forces to restore order, Bremer painted a promising picture. He said President Bush sent him to Iraq to face a "wonderful challenge."

"This is not," he declared, "a country in anarchy."

Bremer joined Lt. Gen.

David McKiernan, the commander of ground forces in Iraq, in accusing unidentified "elements" of the previous government of working to undermine U.S. authority. Jim

Lanier, who works with Bremer's team, said later that he believes Saddam loyalists have purposely taken action that "just keeps things in a state of confusion."

they say.  
Sens. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, and Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, and Rep. Jim Leach, R-Iowa, have all piped in with letters on the couple's behalf, the evidence of which are photo-copied and placed in Abandelwa's folder, but to no avail.

"[Embassy consul Karen Ogle] is playing games like this," Issa said, tracing a circle on the couch. "Everything she asks about, we say we can do that."

"You can't be depressed all the time for this because I cannot control it. The only thing I'm doing is praying for God to help me with it."

The chances of seeing a fourth application approved is slim, said Phillip Wright, the embassy's public-affairs official, and only lessened by Mchula's applying in two nations, which may look to the consul like he's "shopping around for a place to get in" to the United States.

"If your average person comes in of the street with no money, there's already an assumption that they won't want to go back," he said. "There's not much chance of that being reversed."

Wright also said Mchula must prove he can pay for his kidney surgery, a fee Abandelwa says they were going to rely on Medicaid to pay for.

But while the controversy

blazes on across the Atlantic, Issa undergoes dialysis for three-and-a-half hours, three times a week to clean her blood, a procedure that, while life-saving, wears on the body's blood vessels. A framed picture shows the 5-7 woman at a healthy 175 pounds in 1996, two years after she relocated to Iowa as a refugee. She has since dropped to 125 pounds. Food has lost its taste, she said, yet she still feels hungry. Her doctors forbid her from drinking large amounts of water so as not to overburden her languishing organ. She crunches on ice instead.

While the largest percentage — approximately 45 percent of Americans — have Type-O blood, which they can donate to anyone, they can only accept organs from other O-types, making the kidney waiting list the longest, said Julie Seiwert, a medical technologist at Mercy Medical Center in Des Moines, one of three hospitals in the state that perform kidney transplants. Of the 248 Iowans waiting for kidneys, 130 need Type-O organs.

Abandela has Type-O blood, but he also has a medical condition that prevents him from being a donor. Their youngest daughter, Barbara, is Type-O, too, but she won't be the required age of 18 for another 10 years.

Their 13-year-old daughter, Bukiwa Ansele, said she doesn't mind helping her mother cook, carry heavy loads of clothes to the laundry each weekend, or read *O*

magazine with her during dialysis sessions. But she says she misses seeing her mother at orchestra concerts and volleyball games.

"Our mom loves us, but sometimes she can't do the things that usual parents can do," Bukiwa said.

But she's optimistic. And draft-

ing a letter to Oprah. Perhaps one day the mail won't be so disheartening.

"Maybe in the long run it will be something we can look forward to," Bukiwa said. "Maybe a good letter will come from the embassy."

# UISG fiasco should serve as wake-up call

UI Student Government President Nate Green decided on May 9 to veto the appointments of more than 50 students to various charter committees and judicial seats, a decision that surprised many and lacked initial justification. A short e-mail to these students offered the explanation that there were "inconsistencies" in the interviewing and appointment process; as a result, all appointments will be held until September.

While Green, who expanded upon his earlier e-mail in a subsequent one sent Monday, was well-intentioned in preserving the "integrity" of the process, he should have offered more reasoning up-front, rather than leaving students to wonder about his reasoning and question his following of the bylaws of the UISG constitution. Evidently concerned about personal biases in decision-making, Green blamed the appointments' "illegitimacy ... not on the wording of the questions asked or the manner with which they were conducted but on the failure of many of the committee's members attending the interviews." Unfortunately, the problems plaguing this year's interview process are not unique, but they are remediable.

First, UISG should reschedule the timing of the interviews and appointments for earlier in the semester, which Green plans to propose. This

will allow for more time to coordinate interview times at which all or most of the interviewing committee members can be present, rather than one or two, as there were this spring. Additionally, UISG should publicize the applications more widely; some students this year complained of a short time span for completing the applications.

Finally, UISG should prioritize its committee interviews and appointments. Some of the 18 committees need to plan in the summer for the following fall; others do not even meet for the first time until spring. It is easy enough to ask various committee members, both faculty and students, when they need to meet. This way, the appointment committee can take its time on the less demanding committees and focus on those that meet earlier.

Student involvement on campus should always be encouraged, and the charter committees and judicial branches can be a valuable way for students to interact with faculty members and actually influence the way the university is run. Although Green's veto appeared hasty and initially ill-explained, hopefully future appointments will be dealt with more comprehensively and involve all the interview-committee members. Otherwise, students may be even less likely to participate and contribute to the university community.

#### The facts about Coke

I read with concern Laura Crossett's piece in *The Daily Iowan* (May 15) headlined "A Coca-Cola: The Truth Behind UI's Contract." I am concerned because her allegations against Coca-Cola bottlers in Colombia are incorrect.

Let me iterate what we all know to be a painful truth. Colombia can be a dangerous place for anyone who lives, works, and does business there. The murder rate in Colombia is 13 times higher than in the United States. Sadly, Coca-Cola bottlers and their employees have been victims of these tragic human-rights violations. Over the past 15 years, bottler managers, non-unionized and unionized workers alike have been attacked, murdered, kidnapped, intimidated and robbed by lawless groups that operate in that country. Bottlers have been subjected to acts of bombing and extortion.

Crossett's baseless allegations seem calculated for shock value. She simply reproduced errant charges of groups that are protagonists in the Colombian civil strife. Some of the murdered people, for example Jose Herrera, who Crossett presents as union members were in fact managers with no trade-union affiliation.

Regarding the pending lawsuit in the U.S. District Court of Southern Florida, here are the facts:

- On March 31, the U.S. District Court of Southern Florida dismissed the Coca-Cola Co. from the lawsuit, finding that the plaintiffs failed to show a wrongful conduct in Colombia. We believe this is just the beginning of a process that will lead to the dismissal of the claims against our bottlers as well;
- In 2001, when our company learned of the lawsuit and allegations,

we launched an in-depth investigation headed by a well-regarded U.S.-based international law firm. The investigation, headed by a future U.S. state attorney produced no evidence supporting the allegations;

- A Colombian court — in an action brought by trade union SINALTRAINAL members — and the Colombian attorney general, who conducted a separate investigation, found no evidence that bottler managers were responsible, as SINALTRAINAL claims, for the murder that is the centerpiece of the plaintiff's Miami lawsuit;

- SINALTRAINAL's allegations have not been supported by 11 of the 12 trade unions with whom bottlers have normal, extensive relations;

- In fact, the other major union representing Coca-Cola bottlers' employees, SINALTRAINBEC, has issued a press release stating that "we have not a single indication" that a Coca-Cola bottler has links to illegal armed groups; and

- Even SINALTRAINAL's Carepa branch is on public record dismissing as untruthful the allegations against a bottling-plant manager that Crossett lyrically recycled in her column.

One of the Coca-Cola Co.'s fundamental principles for conducting business in 213 countries is respect for human rights, labor rights, and local laws. Our company vigorously implements its internal Code of Business Conduct. We have similar written guiding principles for our suppliers, vendors, and contractors. The company is now engaged with its bottling partners to assist them in developing similar policies. Many bottlers have developed parallel statements of principle, which they rigorously uphold.

Coca-Cola bottlers have extensive, normal relations with 12 Colombian trade unions, including SINALTRAINAL. Our company and its


Colombian bottling partners comply with applicable local laws and standards, including respect for employees' rights to choose third-party representation and to bargain collectively.

These measures include transportation to and from work, loans for secure housing in an area of the employee's choice, paid leave for employees with security difficulties, job transfers to more secure locations, job changes to safer shifts and locations, and extensive life insurance.

Union officials, including the SINALTRAINAL president, receive additional protection. Young black men in America know Darryl Strawberry, Michael Jordan, Whitney Houston, and Michael Jackson but don't know successful black businessmen and -women, renowned black medical doctors and scientists, or the black men — one each — among the dead astronauts of the Challenger and Columbia.

opened to blacks in the United States but don't consider that the historical background of black people may have limited their ability to exploit these opportunities fully. Unlike any of the other peoples, who came to America on their own accord, black ancestors were dragged to the New World against their will. They were the only people legally owned by others. And no one could deny the role of law enforcement's prejudice and poor legal representation for blacks in trouble. Many blacks see, with some merit, the police and the judges as devoted to keeping blacks down. To blacks, legal aid provides the bare minimum, which is always inadequate, especially in capital-punishment cases. As a result, there exists suspicion and resentment toward law enforcement and the courts by black men in the United States.

On the other hand, some of our black leaders seem to consider racism the only problem for black people in the United States. They have run so long on the platform of racism that they seem not to consider any other reasons that black youths do so poorly compared with just about every other ethnic group. We are behind the newcomers as well as the old. Even the Vietnamese, the latest arrivals, have advanced beyond us. We are economically behind the Asians, politically behind the Semites, socially behind the whites.

Our leaders demand that

Black people have made a lot of progress in America. Before and after Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in baseball, blacks were well represented in areas of intellectual disciplines: Thurgood Marshall, Alain Locke, C.J. Walker, Daniel Williams, Garret Morgan, Charles Drew, George W. Carver, W.E.B. DuBois, Norbert Rillieux, Frederick Douglass, Mary Mahoney, and Mae Jemison. These names of black men and women have become insignificant within today's black society.

Our sports stars and entertainers have done their part and deserve to be celebrated. Many of them have become wealthy because their talents are recognized. But few of them have benefited our society by the proper use of their wealth and fame.

Black society in the United States is selling itself short by not accentuating its intellectual side, allowing others to conclude that all we have to contribute to humanity is our brawn. Black people are more than just one thing. We should define ourselves the way we want others to define us. Celebrating all aspects of our lives — the way others in the United States do — will go a long way to change our image to the kind that will make our children in the future.

### Smoking ban foolish

I'm going on the record as a life-long nonsmoker who is thrilled by the Iowa Supreme Court's decision to strike down local smoking bans in Ames and Iowa City. Such bans are irrational, unnecessary, and in violation of private property rights. When the EPA conducted a meta-analysis on passive smoking in the early '90s, it failed to find any significant level of increased cancer risk with the standard 95 percent confidence interval. Putting politics ahead of scientific standards, it lowered the interval to 90 percent, essentially doubling the possibility of its results occurring because of chance. Even after that statistical sleight-of-hand, the relative risk of passive smoking to nonexposure was only 1.24, far short of the 3.00 traditionally accepted as the threshold of significance. Thus, it's no surprise that pushers of the "Secondhand Smoke Kills You" line can never cite anything to back up their statements. That is, aside from more bogus statistics and hysterical rhetoric.

Even if secondhand smoke doesn't kill, it can still aggravate allergies and asthma symptoms in afflicted individuals. This is where the power of choice comes into play. Instead of demanding the universe revolve around them, these individuals would do well to patronize voluntarily smoke-free establishments or those with well-separated smoking/nonsmoking sections. And don't tell me the latter don't exist; I've been in them.

Contrary to what the writers of Monday's *Daily Iowan* editorial may think, we do not live in a democracy. Democracy is nothing more than political gang rape; the will of the mob trumps any opposing individual rights. We live in a constitutional republic, which protects unpopular individual rights from the tyranny of the majority. Most restaurants are private in the sense that they are not owned by the government. This gives the establishment owner the right to set the smoking policy for her or his establishment. Customers who don't like the policy set by the owner are free to make their objections known or find somewhere else to eat. In a town as allegedly "progressive" as Iowa City, I have a hard time believing there will ever be a shortage of smoke-free establishments, smoking ban or not.



#### Banks moves on, but leaves quite a legacy

Quarterback Brad Banks may not have known much Iowa history, but he managed to throw himself and his team into the record books.


With arguably one of the best seasons in history, the signal caller from Belle Glade, Fla., provided headlines all year long — from performances against Penn State and Michigan to leading the Hawkeyes to an 11-2 season. Banks led Iowa to its first undefeated Big Ten season in 80 years, and he ended the season with 25 touchdown passes to four interceptions and a 60.1 completion percentage — the most efficient in the nation.

After being taken as a free agent by the Washington Redskins, Banks is still being honored in the Hawkeye state for his achievements during the season. The mobile quarterback leads the depth chart in 2003 on *The Daily*

Iowan's male athlete of the year awards, ahead of national champion wrestler Steve Mocco and teammate Dallas Clark.

"I don't know who's played better or done more in their football teams and played well in big games," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said of Banks during the season. "Nobody played better than Brad did against Penn State or Michigan."

On Sept. 28, 2002, Banks led the Hawkeyes to a 42-35 victory over the Nittany Lions, who then ranked No. 12. The win became a cornerstone in Iowa confidence.

#### Ferentz led team's rapid resurgence

After a season that included an undefeated Big Ten season, a trip to the Orange Bowl, a Heisman campaign for quarterback Brad Banks, and being named the AP college football coach of the year, there isn't much more Kirk Ferentz could ask for.

For the second-straight year, Ferentz was unanimously named Iowa's coach of the year by *The Daily Iowan*. The fourth-year coach led the Hawkeyes to an 11-2 season, during which the Hawkeyes

When asked if he had ever been part of a year like that, Ferentz said, "Not at that scale. It was a fantastic year, and the best part about it was the great stories on the team."

Ferentz has been instrumental in Iowa's resurgence. The team won just one game during his first year and was embarrassed in some contests, like a 49-3 drubbing at Michigan State. After the 1999 season ended, departing senior guard Jay Bickford boldly guaranteed Ferentz would lead the Hawkeyes to the Rose Bowl within four years, despite the fact that


Iowa didn't win a single game in the Big Ten that year.

As it turned out, the Hawkeyes improved more rapidly than even Bickford imagined.

Ferentz and the Hawkeyes went 3-9 in 2000, then continued their climb with a 7-5 season in 2001 that saw a victory over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl, Iowa's first bowl appearance since 1997.

Iowa started the 2002 season unranked in both the AP and coaches' polls, but the

What was most apparent throughout this past season about Iowa gymnast Alexis Maday was her growth as a team player.

Coach Mike Lorenzen remembered a specific moment in NCAA regional competition that captured her positive attitude: She fell off the balance beam; therefore, her only chance at making the NCAA championships was with her team.

"I thought she'd be crushed," Lorenzen said. "I went up to talk to her after she came off the event and she said, 'Don't worry about it, Mike; we're going.' That was one of those growth moments where I saw she had moved beyond just being a talented individual to becoming a great team player."

Maday's efforts this season helped lead the Hawkeyes to their best season in school history and also earned her *The Daily Iowan's* Female Athlete of the Year honor.

"It's really flattering because the first years I was here, I was nominated, but I've never won,"

Maday said of her award. "It's nice to know people are realizing the accomplishments that we're making and the efforts we put into it."

Maday's long list of accomplishments this season helped her beat out other nominees including Lisa Birocci (softball) and Jennie Lillis (basketball) for the award.

The native of Upper Marlboro, Md., earned first team All-American honors on the uneven bars, and she was named to the second team in the all-around competition at the national competition in Lincoln, Neb.

Maday was also named co-Big Ten gymnast of the week on two occasions and won the all-around title in five regular-season meets.

"You cannot say enough about what she has accomplished gymnastically," Lorenzen said. "The level of gymnastics

that she shows out on the floor really lends a huge amount of credibility to us as a national-caliber program because she is as good as anybody else in the country."

Despite sitting out on a few events on two occasions because of the wear and tear on her body, Maday performed consistently.

"She's competed in all-around just about every meet of her college career, which is an incredible grind, and she continued to give of herself this year," Lorenzen said. "She had an amazing season."

Although Maday was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 2001, and along with teammate Annie Rue became one of the first gymnasts to compete for Iowa at the NCAA championships in 2002, Maday said the 2003 was her best season as a Hawkeye. Perhaps not coincidentally, it was also the team's best season.

"I definitely exceeded most of my expectations," she said.

And she helped the team do the same.

# Hawkeyes victorious in beginning play

So far, so good for the Iowa softball team.

The Hawkeyes took their first step toward returning to the Women's College Softball World Series on Thursday with a 5-0 victory over Pacific in Lincoln, Neb., at the NCAA Region V Tournament.

Iowa will meet Hofstra today at 3 p.m. The Pride upset host Nebraska, 3-1, to set up the fourth meeting between the two teams.

Designated hitter Jessica Bashor did just that for the Hawkeyes as she went 2-of-3 at the plate with three RBIs. The senior's one-run double in the fifth added to a 2-0 Iowa lead and a sixth-inning single brought home the final two runs of the day.

"Jess just swung a really good bat for us today," said an exuberant Iowa coach Gayle Blevins. "You want your seniors to lead [in the postseason], and that's what she did for us today."

Bashor struggled at times this season, especially early, but her performance against the Tigers was proof she has "come a million miles" since then, Blevins said.

Amanda Hentges provided some unexpected punch for the surging Hawkeyes in the

fourth inning on her way to a 2-of-3 day at the dish. The No. 9 hitter put Iowa on the board when she stroked a two-run base hit off Pacific's Jennifer Dacre. Blevins called Hentges' clutch connection "a big, big, big at-bat."

"That broke [Pacific's] back a little thinking this is just the 9th hitter," Blevins said, pointing out the production she continues to receive from top to bottom in the lineup.

Iowa collected 10 hits on the day with Bashor, Hentges, Katie Boney, Stacy May, and Stephanie Park all collecting two safeties each.

Hitting alone doesn't carry a team to a championship. Ace Lisa Birocci hurled yet another gem on the way to picking up her 27th victory of the year. The Big Ten Pitcher of the Year allowed just four hits and struck out four in a complete game. Her 249 strikeouts leave the Des Moines native just three shy of the Iowa single-season record of 252, established by Karen Jackson in 1993.

"She threw a great game for us," Blevins said. "These are all kind of new experiences for Lisa."

Kristi Hanks handled most of the postseason pitching duties a year ago.

Thursday's triumph was added proof the Hawkeyes are playing well as a team despite

the absence of suspended second baseman Christina Schmaltz. Blevins said the team is currently as close as it has ever been which is adding to the level of play the Hawkeyes are able to bring to the field.

A Hawkeye victory today would send Iowa into third round action on Saturday. A loss would drop Iowa to the elimination bracket where it would play the winner of Thursday night's Florida International-Creighton game.

Against Purdue on Oct. 5 at home, Banks topped the Boiler-makers with a late touchdown drive for a 31-28 win.

"That showed me something," Ferentz said after the Purdue game. "He kept his poise, and even though things were a little hairy, he came up with the play when he needed to."

In one of the most important show-downs of the year, at Ann Arbor, Banks was named Big Ten co-offensive player of the week after throwing for 222 yards and three touchdowns in the Hawkeyes' trouncing of Michigan, 34-9, on Oct. 26, 2002.

In fact, one of the only times during the 2002 season Banks

finished second in any award voting was at the Heisman Trophy presentation in New York. Banks brought home the Player of the Year award from the Associated Press and the Davey O'Brien trophy — awarded to the best quarterback in college football.

However, Carson Palmer of Southern California finished ahead of Banks in Heisman voting, receiving 1,328 votes to Banks' 1,095.

After the announcement, Banks maintained humility and poise.

"It's a great feeling standing here and talking to you guys about the Heisman," he said. "I mean, this is the Heisman Trophy. I'm here — that's amazing."

Palmer proved too much for Banks again at the Orange Bowl — where the No. 3 Tro-

jans sent the No. 5 Hawkeyes home with their second loss of the season, 38-17, in Miami's Pro Player Stadium.

Banks went 15-of-36 for 204 yards with one touchdown pass and one interception, but with a tired defense and deceiving numbers, Palmer's crew took over — accounting for 550 yards of total offense to Iowa's 323.

"We had a little rhythm going at times, but then we tried to do too much," Banks said after the loss.

But after a season of championship football, a bowl appearance, and a Heisman nominee, the Hawkeyes won't soon forget their quarterback.

And neither will history.

Hawkeyes had other ideas. Banks was instrumental in putting together a season unmatched in Iowa history, throwing 25 touchdowns and only four interceptions en route to winning the Davey O'Brien award for top college quarterback of the year.

The team won games in about every way imaginable, via comeback (28-24 over Purdue), holding off a late rally (42-35 at Penn State), and by complete blowout (62-10 against Northwestern). Perhaps Iowa's biggest victory was a 34-9 demolition at Michigan, the worst home defeat in 35 years for the Wolverines.

Iowa placed five players in the NFL draft in April, the most in the first five rounds since 1987. Ferentz praised the players for their hard work, as the draftees had varied careers.

"It was great to have those guys drafted," Ferentz said. "It was even neater that three of the

guys were walk-ons. There were a lot of great stories. Ben Sobieski [drafted in the fifth round by the Buffalo Bills] didn't even start a single game his senior year and fought through a lot of injuries."

For the 2003 season, Iowa loses Banks, tight end Dallas Clark, and most of the starting offensive line. Still, Ferentz remains optimistic that Iowa

can stay near the top of the Big Ten for years to come.

"It would be tough to top what we did last year," Ferentz said. "We have a brand new team. The neat thing is that we started all over in January, and we're going to try to do it again."

## London wants to host Olympics

LONDON — London joined New York and Madrid in the race to host the 2012 Summer Olympics in what is shaping up as a big-city battle for the games.

Leipzig, Germany, and Cuba have also announced plans to bid. Moscow, Paris, and the Brazilian cities of Rio de Janeiro and São Paulo are also possibilities.

Toronto might enter the race if Vancouver is not selected to host the 2010 Winter Olympics.

Countries wanting to bid for the 2012 Summer Games have until July 15 to select a city and apply. The International Olympic Committee will make its final decision in July 2005.

Tessa Jowell, the secretary of state for culture, media, and sport, announced the government's backing Thursday in the

House of Commons. London Mayor Ken Livingstone, Sports Minister Richard Caborn, and officials of the British Olympic Committee are also supporting the bid.

"I am delighted to be able to inform the House ... the government has decided to give its wholehearted backing to host the Olympic Games and the Paralympics in 2012," Jowell said.

### Hawkeyes hope to scratch out the Itch

One of Hayden Fry's favorite sayings during his tenure in Iowa City was "scratch where it itches." Illinois baseball coach Richard Jones lived by that phrase so much so as a youngster that he was tabbed with the moniker "Itch" for life.

"I got my nickname in the third grade when I broke my leg and always stuck a fly swatter down the cast to alleviate the itching," explained the 36-year coaching veteran.

The Hawkeyes will seek to subdue "Itch" and his Illini squad in a four-game series in Champaign, Ill., this weekend.

While the Hawkeyes (16-27, 8-19) enter the series all but eliminated from postseason contention, the Illini (25-24, 10-17) have hopes of landing the sixth and final seed in the Big Ten Tournament. Illinois probably needs a sweep over Iowa this weekend to land a post-season invite.

"Every game's important for us," said Jones of this weekend's festivities. "Last year, Iowa was in a similar situation and beat us the last three games of the year to get in, so that's the best we can hope for this year."

The Hawkeyes struggled throughout most of their 2003

campaign, but they are now arguably playing their best baseball of the year. Iowa won two games against the Big Ten-leading Minnesota Golden Gophers last weekend at home. The pair of wins came in a double-header sweep on May 10, the team's first twinbill sweep of their rivals since 1995.

"It's been a difficult season, really, and we're just really trying to finish strong," said senior Reed Pawelk. "Nobody's giving up, though, everybody's out there competing."

That was particularly evident last weekend when Iowa won the pair of matchups against Minnesota in their last at-bat, 4-3 and 11-10.

The Hawkeyes will look to build off last weekend's heroics at the plate against a solid Illinois pitching staff that enters the game sporting a 4.21 team

ERA. The Illini are led on the mound by reliever Dave Mazurek, who leads the team with six saves and a 2.57 ERA, and starter Joe Ziemba (6-2, 3.93), who has six complete games to his credit on the year.

The Hawkeyes have endured many trials and tribulations on the mound, where they carry a 7.67 ERA in conference play. One bright spot was discovered late in the year in Nathan Johnson, who went 3-2 with a 3.03 ERA in a part-time role as starter in the second-half of the season.

At the plate, Illinois fared better than Iowa, as it has a stellar .306 team batting average, keyed by Eric Eymann. The Illini slugger leads Illinois with a .354 average to go along with five homers and 31 RBIs.

Iowa will be led this weekend at the plate, as the Hawkeyes have throughout 2003, by Kyle

Thousand. The junior lead-off man is batting a scorching .349 and has wreaked havoc on the base paths, where he has swiped 19 bases.

As the Hawkeyes look forward to next year, it is evident much of Iowa's hopes lie in Thousand's hands. According to Pawelk, it is a distinct possibility that the slugger will hear his name called in the June Major League Baseball draft.

"Thousand's a junior, but I think he's definitely going to try [professional baseball]," said Pawelk.

As for others who will play a role in the Hawkeyes' future, Pawelk said a solid crop of current red-shirt freshman should aid Iowa's fortunes in 2004 and beyond.

"There's some good [players] who red-shirted this year," said Pawelk, who went on to mention outfielder Mike Mogard, along with pitchers Scott Brune and Tim Gudex.

As a whole the Hawkeyes' future looks bright in the departing senior's eyes.

"I think coach [Scott Broghamer] will get them headed in the right direction. There's really no where for them to go but up."

### Women's rowing to compete in Tenn.

The Iowa women's rowing team will travel to Oak Ridge, Tenn., this weekend to participate in the Central Sprints. The Hawkeyes will be facing some familiar foes, including a Notre Dame team that won in Iowa City earlier this year.

Iowa's boats are ranked highly, considering that there are 21 teams participating in the meet this year. The first and second Varsity-4's, as well as the second Varsity-8, are seeded second. Iowa's first Varsity-8 was given the fifth spot.

The seedings mean high expectations for the Iowa boats, which bodes well for their post-season aspirations.

Iowa coach Mandi Kowal sees an opportunity for the Hawkeyes to qualify for the NCAA championships as a team for the first time since 2001.

"If all the other boats duplicate their performance at the Big Tens, and the varsity improves from the Big Tens by defeating crews or racing closer, we have a chance," she said.

Considering spots for the May 31 NCAA championships are on the line, the stakes are high for this regatta.

Fortunately, the crew isn't lacking motivation.

"I want to win," junior coxswain Jenny Steilen said. "I want to win the gold."

Part of Steilen and the rest of the Varsity-4's motivation comes from a performance at the Big Ten championships in which the boat led for most of the race, only to finish second after Michigan's boat rallied late. The Varsity-4 will also race next to the Notre Dame boat in the first heat, but the Hawkeyes are focusing on beating the team seeded just higher than them in the deep field.

"We want to dominate Michigan and any boat near them," Steilen said. "Michigan is whom we're gunning for."

For the 13 seniors on Iowa's roster, it's also one last chance to keep the season alive.

"It makes you want it that much more," senior Tiffany Tiberi said. "I don't want this to be my last race. We want to go out with a bang, and savor it [until] the last possible moment."

Kowal knows that qualifying for the national championships would be a satisfying finish to the already successful season.

"It would be nice," she said. "It would be real nice."
