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## Cheney nets \$35,000 for Leach in CR

CEDAR RAPIDS — Vice President Dick Cheney breezed through Cedar Rapids on Monday night for a \$100-per-plate fundraiser, using his high political profile to net approximately \$35,000 for Rep. Jim Leach, the Republican running for re-election in Iowa's 2nd District in 2004. Cheney skirted around directly naming any of the nine Democratic candidates challenging President Bush, but he said his campaign will assume nothing in Iowa — which Bush narrowly lost by 4,000 votes in 2000.

"In the 2004 election, we expect to carry Iowa by a substantial margin," Cheney said as Leach stood behind him on the stage.

At the Cedar Rapids Exhibition Center, Cheney praised Bush's record on fighting the war on terror and tax cuts in his short address to the crowd of 350 party faithful. Campaign officials, however, played down notions that the vice president is stumping.

"The vice president and the president campaigned for midterm elections throughout the country," said regional Bush-Cheney campaign spokeswoman

Jennifer Millerwise.

Cheney nonetheless criticized those wishing to repeal some of Bush's tax cuts: "The Bush tax cuts are bringing us out of the recession," he said.

All nine Democratic candidates have called for repeals to some or all of the Bush tax cuts. Missouri Rep. Dick Gephardt wants to repeal all of the tax cuts to pay for his health-care plan.


"The Bush tax cuts are indefensible," said Bill Burton, Gephardt's Iowa press secretary. "Since Bush has come into office we have lost 3 million jobs."

Cheney's visit to Cedar Rapids, his second trip to the state this month, sends a signal that the Bush campaign perceives Iowa as anyone's turf, said Iowa Republican Party officials.

"It's a swing state for either party," said Steven Roberts, a national committeeman for the Republican Party from Iowa. "We'll do very well. But the Democrats are not going to sit on their laurels, either."

Most of the 25 UI College Republicans and five Kirkwood College Republicans who attended the event jumped at the

## Complex poses no danger, EPA says

THE AGENCY CLEARS IOWA-ILLINOIS MANOR OF POLLUTION THREAT

Underground contaminants beneath a local apartment complex pose no significant threat to the building's inhabitants despite residents' concerns about safety, federal officials said Monday.

Diana Engeman, a remedial project manager with the Environmental Protection Agency, answered questions about the details and dangers of the Superfund site located below Iowa-Illinois Manor at a forum sponsored by the Iowa City Area Sierra Club, Sen. Joe Bolzcom, D-Iowa City, and the father of one of the apartment's tenants.

The EPA has not found anyone living in the complex who faces health problems from the chemicals, which include such carcinogens as benzene and xylenes, Engeman said. Xylenes is known to cause birth defects, among other health ailments.

The contamination is most dangerous in the crawl spaces below the apartment, and even those concentrations aren't enough to present a health risk, Engeman said, adding that some traces could only be measured in parts-per-trillion.

The answers didn't sit well with Dan Avenarius, the father who organized a series of meetings after learning that Iowa-Illinois Manor was a Superfund site.

"The EPA answers were not very reassuring," he said. "Anyone who came out of the meeting feeling reassured is confused."


He said it is unethical for apartment owners not to disclose that renters will live above a polluted site.

"Parents shouldn't have to find out about this in a newspaper," he said.

MidAmerican Energy Co.'s cooperation with the EPA in monitoring the level of contaminants at the site has kept the area off the EPA's National Priority List — a compilation of the most-polluted sites in the country, Engeman said.

"This site doesn't need to be NPL," she said, adding,

## Franker rallies the troops with grass-roots casserole

CEDAR RAPIDS — Less than a mile from the Cedar Rapids Exhibition Center, in which Rep. Jim Leach, R-Iowa, held a fund-raiser featuring Vice President Dick Cheney, 2nd Congressional District hopeful Dave Franker hosted a soiree of his own.

While the event garnered only around 25 people overall — a humble number com-

pared with Leach's crowd of 350 at his \$100-per-plate gala — the North Liberty Democrat considered it a success, contending that his event had public accessibility that was most likely lacking in the Leach event.

"We just pulled this event together in the past couple of days," the 50-year-old said. "We expected about 25 to 30 people, so it's a small crowd, but it's just a start."

The event — titled "Jim

Leach, Why-no-call-for-an-independent-investigation-of-the-Bush-Cheney-White-House-CIA-Leak?" — was held at the International Brotherhood of Electric Workers, a Cedar Rapids labor union.

Before the gathering, Franker said he heard a lot of frustration and angst from local people about the Bush

## Lance wows 'em during ride against cancer

When cycling legend Lance Armstrong held a 4-year-old boy undergoing chemotherapy during the Tour of Hope celebration in Washington, D.C., showing him a scar from when he underwent his own battle seven years ago against advanced testicular cancer, he demonstrated to everyone, including Colleen Chapleau, that despite his superstar sta-

tus, he is still a real person who suffered the same struggles as millions nationwide.

"He made a promise that if he got a second chance, he would make a difference," Chapleau, 46, said. "His wish was granted, so he's not going to back down from that promise."

Chapleau, the associate director of the Iowa Marrow Donor Program at the UI Hospitals and Clinics, was one of 62 people selected nationwide to ride on the last leg of the Tour of

Hope, a bike event designed to raise awareness about cancer and cancer research.

On Oct. 18, the streets of Washington were crammed with admiring fans full of adulation for the famous cancer survivor, Chapleau said, adding that Armstrong has attained a "rock-star status."

The most memorable part of the ride was when she nipped at his back wheel for the first five miles of the 42-mile trek, staying two inches behind

while the five-time Tour de France champion sent her encouraging waves and smiles.

The 90-minute ride that, Chapleau said, pushed her to her physical max began at 7 a.m. in chilling temperatures on the outskirts of the nation's capital. After going at a "relaxing" 18 to 20 mph ride, Chapleau said Armstrong pushed the speed to 25 after the mob of

## Accused sniper will defend himself in trial

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. — John Allen Muhammad took control of his own defense Monday, telling jurors directly that he didn't commit the series of slayings that terrified the Washington region last year and quoting Scripture. "Jesus said, 'You shall know

the truth,'" Muhammad told the jury.

He stunned prosecutors and defense attorneys by asking to represent himself minutes before opening statements were to be presented in his capital murder trial. It was a whirlwind day that included

# Weakness seen in skipping Iowa

DES MOINES — Joe Lieberman and Wesley Clark, a lagging candidate and a late entrant, will skip Iowa's leadoff precinct caucuses to focus their time and money on other contests opening the Democratic presidential nominating season.

Party activists said their decisions would have little effect on the outcome of the opening events, and they characterized the actions as signals of weakness for two candidates thought to have a serious argument for the nomination.

"The skipping-Iowa strategy hasn't worked in the past," said state Democratic Chairman Gordon Fischer. "I don't see it working this time."

Iowa's Jan. 19 precinct caucuses launch the nominating process, and a large field of Democrats has been stumping for months.

Lieberman, a Connecticut senator, has campaigned far less often than his rivals. Clark, a

retired Army general, only recently joined the field, although he has demonstrated some strength in national polls.

Focusing his efforts on Delaware, Lieberman on Monday acknowledged that he had little chance of winning in Iowa and said he wanted to direct his resources to other states with early primaries. Delaware will hold its contest Feb. 3.

"I can't compete effectively everywhere in that short period of time," he said.

Lieberman called Iowa backers Sunday night to tell them he was dropping his campaign efforts in the state and would likely leave a storefront operation open with little staff and no campaign time.

"Unlike years past, this time around there are nine early primary states, not just two," Lieber-

man campaign manager Craig Smith said in a statement.

"After much consultation, we decided to focus our resources on where they will prove most effective. Without a doubt, we feel this is the winning strategy for Joe Lieberman to win the nomination."

A Democratic activist, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Lieberman would concentrate on the Feb. 3 primary in New Hampshire.

Clark spokesman Matt Bennett said there was no way the late-entering candidate could compete with other hopefuls who have been stumping in Iowa for months, if not years.

"We have made the decision that we don't have the time or the money to compete there," Bennett said.

Recent polls in Iowa show Missouri Rep. Dick Gephardt and former Vermont Gov. Howard Dean atop the field.

By opting out of the first test of strength, Lieberman and Clark are following a tactic with a mixed record, and some political veterans saw it as evidence of overall weakness.

"I think it means they will have to answer hard questions about the status of their campaign," said activist Phil Roeder.

Democrat Al Gore skipped Iowa's precinct caucuses in his 1988 presidential bid, arguing they were dominated by liberals and opting to make his stand in Southern primaries. His campaign faded quickly.

Among Republicans, Arizona Sen. John McCain skipped Iowa in 2000, defeated George W. Bush in New Hampshire, and caused a stir in early tests. He eventually faded from the race.

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## Court backs Iowa court in 'Satan' case

DES MOINES — The U.S. Supreme Court on Monday declined to review an Iowa Supreme Court ruling allowing a United Methodist Church member to sue over a warning that "the spirit of Satan" was at work in her congregation.

The high court without comment rejected an appeal claiming that the Iowa justices had no authority to interfere in what essentially was a religious matter.

"There's no doubt whether the [Iowa] ruling was unconstitutional," said Hiram Sasser, a staff attorney with the Plano, Texas-based Liberty Legal Institute, which filed the appeal on

behalf of the church. "This case may very well end up back before the Supreme Court in a few years ..."

At issue is a letter written by the Rev. Jerrold Swinton, a former district superintendent of the church, after a dispute among members of the United Methodist Church of Shell Rock drew the attention of church officials.

According to court records, Swinton wrote the letter after speaking with Jane Kliebenstein, a church member.

"Folks, when is enough, enough?" he wrote. "When will you stop the blaming, negative, and unhappy persons among you from tearing down the spirit

of Jesus Christ among you?"

His letter also called on members of the congregation to acknowledge that "the spirit of Satan" was at work in the church, prompting Kliebenstein and her husband, Glen Kliebenstein, to file a defamation suit.

A lower court dismissed the case, but the Iowa Supreme Court ruled earlier this year that a lawsuit could proceed. The justices said the letter went beyond ecclesiastical matters and had been circulated outside the congregation.

Jane Kliebenstein said Monday she was happy to hear of the court's decision.

"Well, I'm very pleased with that. I'm not allowed to say

much, because there will still be a trial ... I'm very happy to hear that," she said.

Sasser said the case is bound for a local courtroom.

"I sympathize with the judge and jury ... they have to delve into internal church procedure and governance in order to arrive at some sort of decision," Sasser said.

Sasser said there's no indication why the Supreme Court declined to hear the case, but the action doesn't reflect on the legal merits of the case. He noted that the court already had agreed to hear two important church autonomy cases "and I guess it didn't have any room on the docket."

### Meskwaki voters hopeful about election

IOWA CITY (AP) — After months of political bickering and the closure of her tribe's casino, Rhonda Pushetonequa is confident that Tuesday's election marks a turnaround in Meskwaki fortunes.

Pushetonequa is one of approximately 500 eligible Meskwaki voters expected to take part in Tuesday's

general and recall election. It's the second in a series of elections many hope will settle once and for all a leadership dispute — now in its seventh month — and clear the way for federal regulators to reopen the tribe's casino in Tama.

"We know this is the big step toward the end," Pushetonequa said Monday.

But on the eve of Tuesday's election, the tribe's feuding leaders failed to agree on important electoral ground rules, such as a single polling place and hours for casting ballots.

The tribal council led by Chairman Alex Walker Jr., which was ousted from power in March, is holding an election at the Meskwaki school. A replacement panel led by Homer Bear Jr. and appointed by the hereditary chief wants voters to cast ballots at the tribal center.

"There are several tribal members

who are confused, not sure where it is they should go to vote," Pushetonequa said. "But we're also confident it will all work out."

The Bureau of Indian Affairs has said it will recognize only the results of the election at the tribal center after reviewing problems with absentee ballots handled by the Walker council.

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# FBI bug boosts Philly's mayor

PHILADELPHIA — Mayor John Street gets polite applause when he talks about policy on the campaign trail these days. The big cheers come when he mentions the bug planted in his office by the FBI.

In the two weeks since news broke that Street was a subject of a federal investigation, Philadelphia's second black mayor has sought to cast himself as a man being persecuted because of his ethnicity, and the message appears to be resonating with black voters.

Stumping around the city this weekend two weeks ahead of the Nov. 4 election, Street received raucous ovations from supporters, who hollered approval when he said the investigation is nothing more than a Republican dirty trick.

"I think people in this city are enormously fair, and they don't like it when they think an injustice is happening," Street said as he campaigned Sunday at supermarkets and churches. "People can't figure this out, so therefore they are left to conclude that something funny is probably happening."

Confounding expectations, a poll suggests that Street's campaign against white Republican businessman Sam Katz has been reinvigorated by the bugging and by a subsequent series of FBI raids on city departments.

A Temple University/CBS3/KYW-AM poll released last week had Street apparently leading Katz, with 48 percent of likely voters to Katz's 41 percent. In the same poll a month ago, Katz had 46 percent to 40 percent.

The survey also exposed the sharp racial divide in the

campaign and how differently black and white voters have reacted to the bugging, which the FBI has yet to explain.

Among blacks, Street's popularity has surged, with 84 percent saying they intended to vote for the mayor, up from 70 percent last month. Among whites, 72 percent said they would vote for Katz, up 1 point from a month ago.

"It is almost as if they are living in two separate cities," said Berwood Yost, the director of the Floyd Institute's Center for Public Opinion Research at Franklin & Marshall College.

"It doesn't appear to me that these accusations have hurt Street; they've only helped. His greatest weakness going into this was a lack of enthusiasm among his base, which is African Americans and Democrats. The scandal has re-energized that base."

If that trend continues, it could be bad news for Katz.

Philadelphia is nearly equally divided between blacks and whites, and voters in city elections traditionally split along ethnic lines. During Street's first matchup against Katz, in 1999, neither candidate was able to cross color lines to muster much support. Street prevailed by fewer than 10,000 votes, even though Democrats outnumber Republicans more than 4-to-1.

The chief federal prosecutor in Philadelphia has strongly denied the FBI probe was politically or racially motivated. And Katz has accused the Democrats of trying to exploit the city's ethnic divisions.

"Philadelphia is in a moment of historic crisis, and unfortunately, the mayor has fueled the fires with a blatant appeal based on race. That's just wrong," Katz said. "They know this investigation isn't about race. It's about corruption."

# Student charged in box-cutter stunt

BALTIMORE — A college student who allegedly hid box cutters and other banned items on four airliners to expose weaknesses in U.S. security was charged with a federal crime Monday, and a prosecutor said he committed a "very serious and foolish action."

The banned items were not discovered on the planes until four weeks after Nathaniel Heatwole, 20, had alerted authorities about his scheme via e-mail. He was charged Monday with taking a dangerous weapon aboard an aircraft, then released without bail for a preliminary hearing Nov. 10.

On Sept. 15, federal authorities received an e-mail from Heatwole saying he had "information regarding six security breaches" at the Raleigh-Durham and Baltimore-

Washington airports between Feb. 7 and Sept. 14, according to an FBI affidavit.

Objects aboard Southwest Airlines planes that landed in New Orleans and Houston were not found until Oct. 16.

The discovery triggered stepped-up inspections of the entire U.S. commercial air fleet — roughly 7,000 planes. But after consulting with the FBI, the Transportation Security Administration rescinded the inspection order and no other suspicious bags were found.

According to authorities, Heatwole told federal agents he went through normal security procedures at airports in Baltimore and Raleigh-Durham. Once aboard, he said, he hid the banned items in compartments in the planes' rear lavatories.

Heatwole told authorities that he left packages on four of

the six planes, according to U.S. Attorney Thomas DiBiagio. Other packages were found on April 13 and April 14 in planes in Raleigh-Durham, N.C., and Tampa, Fla., but it was unclear when they were planted.

The transportation-security agency, which received Heatwole's e-mail, did not send it to the FBI until Oct. 17. FBI agents then located Heatwole

and interviewed him.

Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge, whose department includes the transportation-security agency, said officials "will go back and look at our protocol" for handling such e-mails. He said that the agency gets a high volume of e-mails about possible threats and that officials decided that Heatwole "wasn't an imminent threat."

**Doctors take one twin off ventilator**

DALLAS (AP) — It took a year of preparation, 18 doctors, and a couple's determination to give their infant twins a shot at a normal life.

A week after a 34-hour operation in which neurosurgeons separated the intricate connection of blood vessels running between the brains of conjoined Egyptian twins, doctors say they are pleased with the boys' progress.

Mohamed Ibrahim, 2, was taken off a ventilator and was breathing on his own Sunday afternoon, and doctors hoped to do the same with his brother Ahmed as early as Monday.

James Thomas, the chief of critical-care services at Children's Medical Center Dallas, said in an update released by the hospital that he is cautiously optimistic that doctors will not have to place Mohamed back on a ventilator.

The twins were listed early Monday in critical but stable condition.

"Once each twin is breathing on his own without respiratory distress, his condition may be upgraded from critical to guarded," Thomas said.

The hospital said the twins are showing more motion in their arms and legs, and improved response to verbal cues from the family and medical team.

"The neurosurgical and medical teams are very pleased with the twins' progress so far," Thomas said.

**Standoff ends with man's death**

GREEN LAKE, Wis. (AP) — A standoff between officers and a man who fatally shot a sheriff's deputy responding to a domestic disturbance report ended early Monday when authorities said they found the man dead.

Prosecutor Guy Dutcher said authorities entered the man's apartment around 4 a.m. Monday. He declined to say whether the man killed himself.

The standoff began around 4:15 p.m. Sunday after police received a call about a domestic dispute. Dutcher said the deputy responded to the call and was fatally shot, and the alleged assailant locked himself in the apartment. Dutcher said he did not know if authorities shot at the man.

Michelle Foote, who owns the 12-unit building, said a husband and wife in their 20s and their two young children had lived in the unit since moving from Oshkosh in July.

She said a dispute between the couple erupted Sunday, and the wife left the building with the children to call police.

She said the man had fired numerous shots with a high-powered rifle, causing the building's two main water pipes to burst. Water gushed inside for more than 12 hours, and residents were evacuated.

**Grandmother accused of leaving toddler in burning vehicle**

MOUNT HOLLY, N.J. (AP) — A woman accused of leaving her 22-month-old grandson to die inside a burning vehicle was charged with endangering the welfare of a child.

Police said 41-year-old Pamela Dreadin was driving in a rural area around 3 a.m. Sunday when her Ford Bronco ran off the road and a fire started in the engine compartment.

Dreadin went to a house nearby to call for help but did not mention that her grandson, Michael Malinowski, was in the car until 10 minutes later, when a police officer arrived, authorities said.

By the time rescue crews arrived, the fire had engulfed the vehicle, killing the child.

Dreadin turned herself in on Monday and was released on her own recognizance.

**Judge orders striking teachers back to work**

EVERETT, Wash. (AP) — On strike for a month and a half, Marysville teachers were ordered back to work by a judge Monday, but the head of their union said she expects teachers to defy the ruling.

Union members were to vote Monday evening on whether to honor Snohomish County Superior Court Judge Linda C. Krese's order to return to work by Wednesday.

Krese faulted both sides for the continuing strike, which began Sept. 2 on what was supposed to be the first day of school for 11,000 students in the district about 30 miles north of Seattle.

"It is time for all the adults to grow up and start looking at their obligations to these children," Krese said.

Krese said children have a constitutional right to an education, but minutes after the ruling, the head of the local teachers union said she does not expect classes to resume Wednesday.

"I feel very firmly that we won't go back without a contract. We need a contract," said Elaine Hanson, president of the Marysville Education Association.

**N. Korea test fires ballistic missile**

WASHINGTON — North Korea on Monday fired an anti-ship ballistic missile in the seas between South Korea and Japan, as President Bush and East Asian leaders conferred at a Bangkok, Thailand, conference on how to deal with Pyongyang's nuclear-weapons program.

The test-firing, apparently part of a military exercise, came one day after Bush announced that he would favor giving North Korea a five-nation security guarantee if it abandons its nuclear-arms program. Bush and Asian leaders are meeting at a session of the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation forum in Bangkok, at which North Korea and counterterrorism have dominated the agenda.

North Korea has routinely used provocative military demonstrations to draw attention to its diplomatic demands.

Pyongyang's military fired a similar anti-ship missile on the day that South Korean President Roh Moo-hyun was inaugurated, experts noted. In August 1998, Pyongyang alarmed Asia by firing a longer range Taepodong ballistic missile over Japan into the Pacific. The firing was taken as a sign of progress in the North Korean strategic-missile program.

Experts said they doubted whether the Pyongyang regime

intended the test as a response to Bush's proposal. "I don't think you can tie the two together," said Charles Pritchard, a former U.S. special envoy to negotiations with the North Koreans.

South Korean military officials said it appeared that the test-firing was part of an annual exercise, and they noted that the North Koreans had conducted such exercises two or three times this year.

Japan's Self Defense Agency said the missile was launched from the eastern coast of North Korea at about noon local time. The missile was apparently a version of the Chinese Silkworm anti-ship missile, which has a range of approximately 60 miles.

At the Bangkok forum, the annual summit of Asian-Pacific leaders got under way with pledges to restart global trade talks and place a new focus on terrorism and security.

The 21 member forum said they would pick up where World Trade Organization trade talks left off last month after developing nations walked out of the negotiations.

Early proceedings at the annual meeting were overshadowed by concerns about terrorism, especially because the United States said it would make "economic security" a central topic of discussion.

"[The group] is recognizing now ... that security and economics are inextricably linked,"

U.S. National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice told reporters.

In corridor conversation, however, trade issues initially took a back seat to how leaders would respond in person to Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad, who last week made remarks that many regarded as anti-Semitic.

In comments to a conference of Islamic leaders on Oct. 16, Mahathir argued that Muslims

could learn lessons from the Jewish people about how to succeed in the world by using conciliation instead of violence. But in the course of his argument, he made remarks some consider offensive.

"The Europeans killed 6 million Jews out of 12 million, but today the Jews rule the world by proxy," the 78-year-old leader reportedly said. "They get others to fight and die for them."

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

administration's recent actions, inspiring his speech and partly, the event.  
"From what people have told me, they are sick and tired of the \$87 billion for Iraq, when there is no articulated plan," he said. "Overall, the people just want to know, 'What is the plan for Iraq?' and 'What is the plan for jobs?'"  
Franker originally planned to speak about eliminating tax cuts for the wealthy, but he opted for a more personal approach, mingling with supporters and campaign inquirers.  
Amongst them was Iowa City resident David Van Dusseldorp, a UI Community Credit Union employee who said he was drawn to the event through Franker's work on the Iowa City School Board.  
While not yet a vocal Franker supporter, he said, the low turnout isn't a detracting

factor for the young campaign — attributing the numbers to minimal time and publicity.  
"The grass-roots level approach has been very successful in other campaigns," Van Dusseldorp said. "With time, it will get going and build momentum."  
Franker did not collect money for his campaign, but his campaign team encouraged donations of \$14.27 to commemorate Leach's 14 terms and 27 years in office. All proceeds will be split among Linn County Food Banks, the Cedar Rapids-based African-American Museum and Cultural Center, and Cedar Rapids community schools.  
Those present also got a touch of Franker's homestyle cooking — he proudly declared that he made the macaroni-and-pea casserole himself.  
"I didn't milk the cow myself," he said. "But I did everything else."

fans grew too dense.  
"That ride was the top of my ability," Chapleau said. "I used up every ounce of my physical energy."  
Despite the taxing ride, Chapleau was able to talk with Armstrong. She emphasized the critical need for people to participate in clinical trials and informed him of the ongoing research efforts at the UIHC Holden Comprehensive Cancer Center.  
"We're happy with the visibility, but that's not the point of the ride; it was to raise visibility for the leukemia society," said Ted Yank, the center's associate director of administration. "We could not have asked for a better ambassador for the Holden Comprehensive

Cancer Center [than Colleen]."  
Armstrong, Chapleau, and the other 60 riders finished exhausted in front of the White House. But a grand celebration greeted the wearied athletes — an "emotional and tearful" event that congratulated the riders and commemorated cancer patients, past and present.  
And while Chapleau credits her work in the cancer field with changing her life, she said meeting Armstrong and seeing his influence changed her again.  
"I've been dedicated to helping people, but seeing Lance told me that I can do so much more," she said. "He's such an amazing man, and he realizes that what the medical community needs to hear and see are these success stories. He truly inspires people."  
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# Muhammad to defend himself

Muhammad's cross-examination of witnesses and a brief appearance by his alleged accomplice, Lee Boyd Malvo.  
Peter Greenspun and Jonathan Shapiro, Muhammad's attorneys, declined to comment about Muhammad's decision, but they appeared to be devastated. At a lengthy bench conference with Circuit Court Judge LeRoy Millette Jr. — during which Millette tried to dissuade Muhammad from trying the case — Greenspun shook his head before glancing down and burying his face in his left hand. Shapiro later rested against a courtroom wall, hands in his pockets, clearly dismayed.  
Others in the courtroom were equally surprised, and Muhammad's decision created palpable anticipation about his opening statement.  
Muhammad, 42, is on trial here in the Oct. 9, 2002, shooting death in Prince William County of Dean Meyers, 53, the seventh victim in last October's sniper shootings. But in his opening statement, Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney James A Willett linked him and Malvo to 16 shootings in Virginia, Maryland, the District of Columbia, Alabama, and Louisiana.  
After Willett presented a

methodical recounting of the sniper slayings, telling jurors that there is ample evidence to convict, Muhammad took the lectern.  
He stammered at first, glancing at the clock — it was 12:43 p.m. — and said, "Good evening."  
In a rambling soliloquy that discussed the meaning of "the truth" and used allegory to assert that only eyewitnesses could really know what happened, Muhammad attacked the evidence against him. He said he didn't do what Willett said he did, calling the government's case just a "guess," not based in hard fact. Prosecutors have said they have no witnesses to any of the slayings.  
"It's an assumption. We're looking for facts," Muhammad told jurors. "We are looking for evidence, and the evidence will show that I had nothing to do with these crimes, that I had nothing to do with these crimes directly or indirectly, that I know anything about these crimes ... or anything pertaining to these crimes at all."  
To make his point, Muhammad told jurors a story about his children. He said his daughter appeared to have disobeyed him by stealing cookies from a cookie jar and that he punished her based on his assumption. His son John then corrected him and said he had bought his sister the cookies and that she was placing them in the jar. Muham-

mad said he couldn't know the facts because he wasn't there.  
Muhammad then turned to prosecutors, put out his arm, and said they, too, were operating under dangerous assumptions. But he appeared to contradict his statement that he didn't know about the shootings. "And I say to them: We know something happened," Muhammad told jurors. "They wasn't there. I was. I know what happened, and I know what didn't happen."  
During Muhammad's statement, sheriff's deputies stood all around the courtroom. They did not surround him, however, and allowed him to walk around in a suit and tie and

with no restraints.  
Prince William Commonwealth's Attorney Paul Ebert and his assistants maintained throughout the day that they are not changing their strategy or presentation because a legal novice is sitting across the aisle. They even argued that Shapiro and Greenspun — now standby counsel in case Millette restores them to the case — were taking too large a role in helping Muhammad during Monday's testimony. A few times, the defense lawyers almost objected on his behalf, and they were constantly whispering to him.  
In his opening statement, Willett referred to Muham-

## Dude, where's my fan base?

At first glance, Hollywood celebrity Ashton Kutcher's influence in the Democratic presidential race seems a little out of place and unnecessary. On Sunday, Kutcher announced he would back Sen. John Edwards, D-N.C., and would also join the Iowa campaign trail "soon."

Kutcher, who is best known as Kelso on "That '70s Show," has thus far not shown much political involvement in his fast-paced career, and his outward support of Edwards comes as somewhat of a surprise. His screen life, consisting of such movies as *Dude, Where's My Car?* and *Just Married*, along with his hit MTV celebrity prank show "Punk'd," does not exactly scream "I know a damn thing about health-care reform."

However, Kutcher's involvement may actually do more good than harm if he is able to get his generation to the polls. Large groups of young people will likely come to star-gaze at the hot

young celebrity. What remains to be seen is whether they will stay for the intricate details of the No Child Left Behind Act.

Edwards' Iowa press secretary, Kim Rubey, said, "We think that it will help us draw more people who haven't been interested in politics before" but who are interested in Kutcher.

In fact, many of these fans may be too young to vote. However, youth's absence on Election Day has long been lamented, and nearly any solution that might excite them about the process is welcome. But is drawing on celebrity obsession a fair way to drag kids out to the polls? Rubey said events featuring Kutcher would center on getting young people excited about political issues and urging them to register to vote and attend the January caucuses.

However, Rubey did not immediately have information on Kutcher's

political stances or issues on which he agrees with Edwards. One hopes his entrance into the fray is not just an elaborate episode of "Punk'd."

Still, Kutcher's influence should not be judged as trivial just yet. Not all of his fans are ignorant teenagers. The average viewing age for Fox, the network that runs "That '70s Show," is 33. Furthermore, the show ranks 14 on Nielson's "Top Syndicated Shows," revealing that Kutcher's fan base could possibly encompass older, more experienced voters. Plus, new voters are more than welcome, as Edwards himself will attest.

Edwards' newfound love affair with Kutcher is undoubtedly a smart move for his campaign, and it may be a smart move for politics. Campaign managers should put extra effort into informing and educating those young people, and this may be an effective way to make them listen.

#### The problem is not society

I disagree with this assumption and would like to offer an alternative. The biggest problems we face are not fundamentally social in nature but derive from our own broken human nature. This thesis involves a different understanding of "morality,"

The correct analogy is not that everyone is broken and Christians are "fixed," we are just in the beginning stages of "being repaired."

This may sound alien to many and all too familiar to others. I leave much of it unelaborated, and I have assumed many

points. Whether you agree or disagree, however, I hope you treat this like any other substantial truth claim. Ponder it, question it, and weigh it. That is all I can ask.

The United Nations, France, and Germany aren't going to do what's necessary in Iraq unless the United Nations is running the show and calling the shots.


Let our troops do what they're trained to do and do best — fight. Get them out of nation-building and off the street corners and roads. Keep them in their compound until

## Dialing up a catastrophe when nobody's at home

Singing about being bundled in sweaters and taking walks in the rain seemed to be a formula that worked for twee-poppers Belle & Sebastian. Now, with a new long-player — *Dear Catastrophe Waitress* (Rough Trade) — the Glasgow septet has swept out almost everything that made its pastiche-heavy music so precious.

The charming infusion of '60s folk-pop with indie affability has been phased out this time around and replaced with a frustrating batch of songs embracing the most schlocky, chauvinistic, and forgettable elements of late-60s West Coast pop and mid-70s pub-rock.

And if there is one thing that Belle & Sebastian could be counted on for, it was to be not chauvinistic. Led by Stuart Murdoch through a variety of lineup permutations, the band's first four proper albums saw a songwriting perspective often dealing in the same fatalism that made a band such as the Smiths so great. Combined with an androgynous Nicoesque voice and a band mystique centered on drinking tea, reading books, and talking Tolkien with pals in the park, Belle & Sebastian was the perfect picture of an innocent, nonthreatening pop-band.

A lesson in complete negation, *Catastrophe* is a radical departure that the band can hardly recover from. Slathered with cheesy horn arrangements, bad wah-wah guitars, and a new side of Murdoch as a songwriter, the album is constructed entirely from the worst elements of classic-rock radio.

A trudge through the album becomes almost impossible once Murdoch — previously content being a foppy bookworm in his songwriting — begins to wheel out thinly veiled sexual innuendoes in the album opener, "Step Into My Office, Baby."

An otherwise unassuming song, the Led Zeppelin-isms are abundant as Murdoch fantasizes about being a suit-bound office overseer in a position to pressure newly employed women into sex. Hardly the sensitivity found on *Tigermilk* or *If You're Feeling Sinister*. The rest of the album may not be all downhill, but after a tacky song that simultaneously cribs AC/DC lyrics while rockin' some Lovin' Spoonful riffs, it's only the first in a series of monumental mistakes.

While the title track could easily fit onto any of the band's previous albums, it is still marred by the same hammy arrangements that also ruin such tracks as "If She Wants Me," "If You Find Yourself



Caught In Love," and "I'm a Cuckoo." While "Roy Walker" sounds like it could easily be a cast-off from CCR or Buffalo Springfield, "Stay Loose" is a spot-on Squeeze song — which is not exactly terrible, but definitely not something that was new or bold even in 1982.

And even at the best of moments, Belle & Sebastian sounds like a band covering itself. "Wrapped Up In Books" is pretty much the same song as the title track of *Boy With The Arab Strap*, and "Asleep on a Sunbeam," although coy and boring, is only on par with some of the low-points of the band's best albums.

But to the band's credit, at least *Catastrophe* is a distinguished accomplishment. After all, who could have predicted a band as previously interesting and enjoyable as Belle & Sebastian could find so many imaginative ways to be extraordinarily terrible?

## Costello goes south in North

A sucker punch in the collective gut to an entire set of recaptured fans, Elvis Costello's latest album — *North* (Deutsche Grammophon) — is an album of new material by the weathered rocker and one of the growing Costello oeuvre tailored for yuppie-bars, bank lobbies, and dinner parties.

These are the same places where a seething spin through a beat-up copy of early '80s classics such as *This Year's Model*, *Armed Forces*, or even last year's back-to-the-roots *When I Was Cruel* would cause scowls, uproar, and complaints. These albums are a Costello hurling anthems like rock 'n' roll Molotov cocktails at the cubicle-office culture that he himself escaped in the late '70s.

One of the most enduring New Wave acts with a killer backing band (the Attractions), he was a source of inspiration for everyone striving to escape the creeping traffic, the memos, the bills, and the second mortgages of real

life that he captured so well in his music.

But after the Attractions split, Costello grew more as a songwriter while the songs he penned just seemed to grow older. Albums crossed into dad-rock, but he at least could be counted on to be the cleverest lyricist ever to write pop songs about the National Front, emotional fascism, and the entanglements of infidelity. But even to the somber backdrop of the Brodsky Quartet or Burt Bacharach piano, these were still some of the best-written pop songs around.

This being said, *North* is a low point. While other Costello albums compensate for the drowsy arrangements with ironic, smart wordplay, *North* is as tepid and sickly sweet as a cheap plastic glass of flat champagne. The cautious jazz accompaniment is as safe as Costello's vocal and lyrical performance. Even the liner notes have the bitter tang of cheap printing.

A one-trick crooner dully intoning his way through the 11

songs on *North*, Costello never wavers from monotonous sentimentality, and his voice and words are as riveting as the by-the-numbers incidental music.

Costello, the same geek-hero who welcomed us to the working week, is at a lyrical nadir this time around. The songs not only fail to leave any impression, but the words Costello parades around are the same tired rhyme schemes bleated to death by every no-talent hack in the used bins. In "You Left Me in the Dark," Costello writes, "Eyes are blue/Skies are grey/Nothing I can do can make you stay/I'm glad it will rain today" — a glaring underachievement for the man who wrote some of the best pop songs of the '80s.

And with the level of passion in his voice, the only mood Costello seems to be in throughout *North* is the mood to sit in a La-Z-Boy and scope out the latest *Reader's Digest*.

Maybe next year, Elvis.

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

# Israel strikes Gaza; 10 dead

**NUSSEIRAT REFUGEE CAMP, Gaza Strip** — In the bloodiest day in the Gaza Strip in months, Israeli warplanes and helicopters pounded militant targets Monday, killing 10 Palestinians, including seven in a refugee camp where a car was destroyed, and wounding approximately 100.

The militant Islamic movements Hamas and Islamic Jihad threatened revenge, Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon pledged more raids, and the State Department advised U.S. citizens to defer travel to Israel, the West Bank, and Gaza.

With prospects for Mideast peace efforts further clouded, U.S. officials confirmed that John Wolf, the head of the team monitoring implementation of the troubled U.S.-backed "road map" peace plan, was not planning to return to the region anytime soon. Wolf left for the United States last month, saying at the time he'd be back in 10 days.

The bombing raids Monday came a day after Palestinian militants fired eight homemade rockets from Gaza into southern Israel and Palestinian gunmen ambushed an Israeli patrol in the West Bank, killing three soldiers and seriously wounding a fourth.

Israeli aircraft struck in five separate locations, hitting a suspected Hamas weapons cache twice, another storehouse, and a car carrying suspected militants.

The nighttime strike in the Nusseirat camp in central Gaza, in which 75 people were wounded in addition to the seven killed, was the bloodiest since

an April missile raid on a Hamas leader in Gaza City killed nine people.

Residents said Israeli helicopters fired three missiles at the main street, destroying a car. An Israeli army statement said the vehicle was carrying members of a Palestinian terrorist squad fleeing after a failed attempt to breach the border fence with Israel a few miles to the northeast.

But Israel's Channel 10 TV said that none of the dead were militants, characterizing the refugee camp strike as a "mistake."

Residents said one of the dead was a doctor who was treating victims when a second missile struck. The identity of the other victims was not immediately known.

Hundreds of camp residents carried charred pieces of the vehicle aloft and chanted, "Revenge, revenge."

In Gaza City, Israeli helicopters fired missiles at a building in the Shajaiyeh neighborhood, the same structure that was hit in an earlier air strike Monday, residents said. Eleven people were wounded, they said. Israeli military sources said the attack was meant to finish the work of the first one.

The first of three air strikes Monday destroyed two weapons labs and warehouses of Hamas, the military said. Four children and a 70-year-old woman were among 25 wounded. Two missiles exploded on a street crowded with schoolchildren.

During three years of violence, Israeli air strikes in Gaza have caused dozens of civilian casualties. In April, an air attack killed Hamas leader Said Arabeed and eight other people. In July 2002, 15 people were killed, including nine children,

in an air strike that targeted another Hamas leader, Salah Shehadeh.

Negotiations over implementing the "road map" plan, which was formally presented in June, have sputtered amid violence and political turmoil. The plan calls for an end to the three-year conflict and leads to a Palestinian state in 2005.

A Palestinian bombing attack on a U.S. convoy in Gaza last week, killing three American guards, had led to expectations that the United States would scale back its involvement.

Except for a six-week Palestinian stand-down in the summer, clashes and bombings have continued unabated. Also, the Palestinians have been unable to field a stable government, and with Israel and the United States boycotting Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, no recent contacts have been held between Israeli and Palestinian officials.

In a speech to parliament Monday, Sharon called Arafat "the greatest obstacle to peace." Therefore, he added, "Israel is determined to bring about his removal from the political arena," referring to a Cabinet decision last month. In a newspaper interview last week, Sharon had indicated that he had no plan to expel Arafat — an apparent softening of Israel's position.

Sharon's criticism of Arafat was greeted with catcalls and prompted several Arab legislators to walk out of the chamber. The speech also received a harsh response from Shimon Peres, leader of the opposition Labor Party, who accused Sharon of being insincere in his peacemaking efforts.

## Soyuz craft docks with space station

MOSCOW (AP) — A Russian space-craft filled in for the second time since U.S. shuttle program was grounded this year after the Columbia disaster, delivering a three-man crew Monday to the International Space Station.

A top Russian space official warned, however, that funding problems could jeopardize future missions.

American Michael Foale, Russia's Alexander Kaleri, and Spain's Pedro Duque entered the space station after the autopilot docking of their spacecraft, two days after the Soyuz blasted off from Kazakhstan.

Applause broke out at Russia's Mission Control Center just outside Moscow after the docking.

"I congratulate all our partners on this spectacular success today," said William Readdy, NASA's head of human space flight, at a news conference.

## Iraqi insurgents renew attacks

FALLUJAH, Iraq (AP) — Assaults ambushed an American foot patrol just outside Fallujah at midday Monday in the second day of attacks in this anti-U.S. hotbed west of Baghdad. The Americans then raided a nearby mosque in apparent search for the attackers and detained three Iraqis.

No U.S. casualties were reported immediately, but two civilian trucks were damaged, one left dangling over a bridge at the scene, apparently from what witnesses said was a rocket-propelled grenade strike. It could not be learned immediately whether any Iraqis were injured. No damage to U.S. vehicles could be seen.

The attack occurred approximately 20 yards from the main bridge leading into Fallujah from Baghdad, 35 miles

to the east, when about 30 soldiers on foot, accompanied by five Humvees, were on patrol along the highway.

This was the same general area where a U.S. Army ammunition truck, part of a convoy, broke down on the main road Sunday morning and came under attack. That truck and possibly two other vehicles apparently were hit by rocket-propelled grenades. Dozens of Iraqi youths danced and cheered as the vehicles went up in flames.

Iowa No. 15 in poll; Sooners are No. 1

(AP) — Oklahoma is in a familiar place — first in the initial Bowl Championship Series standings. The Sooners' task this year is to stay there.

Oklahoma was No. 1 in the first BCS standings for the third-straight year, matching the spot it has held in the two major polls all season.

"It's a positive indicator that we've played awfully well for seven games," Sooners coach Bob Stoops said Monday. "We've earned that position and have played well through this part of the season. Now, it's our job to continue it, finish it, and keep it."

Miami and Virginia Tech, the other two undefeated teams from major conferences, are second and third. The BCS standings are used to determine which teams play in a national title game. The teams that finish 1-2 in the final BCS standings on Dec. 7 will play for the title at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on Jan. 4.

The formula uses the AP media and coaches' polls, seven computer rankings, strength of schedule, losses, and a bonus-point system for quality wins.

The Sooners (7-0) have a 1.0 for poll average, 1.33 for computer-rank average, 0.44 for strength of schedule, and zero for losses for a 2.77 total. Oklahoma is ranked first in four of computers with Miami the top team in the other three.

The Hurricanes (7-0) have 4.10 points and Virginia Tech (6-0) has 10.23.

"We can't get caught up in anything other than winning our games," Miami coach Larry Coker said. "If we do that, everything will work out as it should."

Strong finish for men's golf team

The Iowa men's golf team wrapped up its fall season by playing its best golf of the year. The Hawkeyes finished second at the annual Big Four tournament in Cedar Rapids, which pitted Iowa against Drake, Northern Iowa, and Iowa State.

Drake won the event, shooting a 36-hole total of 568. Iowa followed with a 575. Iowa State finished third, and Northern Iowa fourth.

"[First-round score] 275 is so far lower than anything we ever shot all fall, so guys, we've done it," Hawk coach Terry Anderson said.

Leading the way for Iowa was freshman Jon Feldick, who shot a 73-69 for a 142. Freshman Todd Larson was two shots off, with a 74-70—144. And sophomore Andy Tiedt bounced back from a first round 80 to fire a 66 in his second round. Tiedt bogeyed the final hole during his second round to miss a 65 and finished at 146.

"Somehow, we've got to carry the momentum all the way through until March 14. You got to hang it on the kids that they didn't fold their chins up; they went out and gave it their all and shot 25 shots better," Anderson said.

## Judge orders rape trial for Bryant

EAGLE, Colo. — Kobe Bryant must stand trial on a charge of sexually assaulting a 19-year-old resort worker, a judge ruled Monday, clearing the way for a celebrity trial the likes of which hasn't been seen since O.J. Simpson.

Eagle County Judge Frederick Gannett said prosecutors presented enough evidence Bryant might have committed the crime June 30. The Los Angeles Lakers guard could face a life sentence if convicted.

His next appearance, in district court, is set for Nov. 10.

Bryant has said the sex was consensual. His attorneys suggested the woman's injuries came during sex with other men

in the days before her encounter with Bryant at a posh resort in nearby Edwards.

The defense can appeal Gannett's ruling, but such appeals are rare, legal experts said.

Bryant practiced with the Los Angeles Lakers at their El Segundo, Calif., facility on Monday, and it wrapped up around two hours before the judge issued his ruling.

Bryant was asked then about the decision that would be coming out of the Colorado courtroom.

"What courtroom?" he said.


At Bryant's first appearance in state district court he will be advised of his rights, of the charge, and of the possible penalties. He could enter a plea

during that hearing.

Unless Bryant waives his right to a speedy trial, the trial would be scheduled within six months of his plea.

Prosecutors in Colorado almost always succeed in persuading a judge to order a trial after a preliminary hearing because the standard of proof required is relatively low. Allegations are usually enough to advance the case to a higher court for trial, where the standard of proof is much higher.

Bryant's hearing was hardly a quick proceeding: It lasted for nearly two days and included graphic testimony about an encounter prosecutors say turned violent after flirting by both Bryant and his accuser.

## Full throttle

Like most UI students, J.J. Roetlin had to deal with midterms the past few weeks, but he didn't have very much time to worry about studying.

He had to concentrate on the road.

Probably a smart idea, considering he was doing nearly 180 mph on his Suzuki 750.

You blink for one moment in an American Motorcycle Association race, and you could be roadkill.

"One time, I got pitched into a hill headfirst," said the pro rider, recalling a 2002 race at Infineon Raceway in Sonoma, Calif. "My arms didn't get out, and I hit with my head. I thought I was pretty much done for."

Why would people subject themselves to this deadly sport? Simple: to satisfy a need for speed.

"From the time I was little, I had to go fast. I made a track for our lawnmower once," said the 24-year-old self-described "super-senior."

"I've always been a high-risk child," he said. From his experiences, "high risk" seems like an understatement.

Much of his childhood antics would fit in nicely on TV shows such as "Cops" — like when he stole his parents' Blazer.

"He was maybe 9 or 10, and he was riding around back or whatever with his buddies," said his father, John Roetlin, a 67-year-old former Marine.

Producers of "Cops" take note: J.J.'s got tape of the incident on file.

"I never found out until last year, when he was showing it at a community club or something like that," John Roetlin said. "It was a long time ago, so I thought it was kind of funny. I'm sure I wouldn't have thought so back then."

The seeds of Roetlin's burgeoning racing career were planted in his hometown of

Kalona, a community that despite being just minutes away from Iowa City is light years away from the university's hustle and bustle.

"Amish people tell my dad, 'I saw your kid kiting around town at 90 mph.' How do they know?" he said, noting that their main transportation is horse and buggy. "I race past their horses. They don't have a phone. What are they going to do?"

You'd think someone just 5-2 (and 4) and 125 pounds would grow up slightly in fear of getting reprimanded by his ex-Marine father. Not J.J. Roetlin. The guy attacks life just as he does straightaways on his Suzuki — full-bore.

His motorcycle-association career started off with a sputter, however. It's hard to gain confidence in motorbike racing if you're not placing well. And it's hard to place well when you

don't have confidence.

Roetlin struggled in both areas at the dawn of his professional career.

An early accident, in which he ran over a racer who was sprawled out on the track, led to much of his uncertainty.

"I thought, 'He's dead,'" said the fourth-year racer. "I said, 'If he's hurt at all, that's it, I'm done racing.'"

## Offensive line hampered by injuries

What a difference a year can make.

In the 2002 season, only three changes were made to the entire Iowa starting offense over a span of 13 games.

Only seven games into the 2003 season, there have already been more changes on the offensive line, in part because of injuries.

"Obviously, it's disruptive to your tempo and rhythm when you have to make changes," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said.

"It's not an optimal situation. You play the cards that you're dealt. And we'll just keep getting better; we'll live through this."

Last year, the Hawkeyes enjoyed the luxury of starting the same core group of linemen throughout the whole season, but this year, seven different offensive linemen have made up four different combinations of starting squads.

After serving a one-game suspension, senior Sam Aiello worked his way into a starting position at right tackle in game three against Iowa State, taking the place of Eric Rothwell in the lineup and shifting Pete McMahon to right guard.

Sophomore David Walker,

who is likely to see action against Penn State this weekend, injured his knee against the Cyclones, and Rothwell resumed his starting role the following week — only this time at the left guard position.

For three-straight games, it seemed the line began developing consistency, but when center Brian Ferentz's already bothersome knee locked up during the

week of practice leading up to the Ohio State matchup, change was called for once again.

True freshman Mike Jones found himself thrown into the mix at left guard, shifting Rothwell — a nomad of the Hawkeye tribe — to center.

Rothwell, who was listed as the first-string center in the preseason, struggled at his new home against the Buckeyes.

The 6-3, 295-pounder had trouble handing a pair of snaps to quarter Nathan Chandler, which led to fumbles, in addition to launching the ball over Chan-

dler's head and out of the end zone during the fourth quarter.

"We obviously had some problems there, and I think coming into the game we anticipated where we might have some difficulties," Kirk Ferentz said.

"It was a tough situation because Eric Rothwell obviously did a good job playing center in our minds in the spring, but when we made the decision that Brian was one of our top five, Eric's work has basically been concentrated at guard, so we didn't have a lot of time to put this thing together."

Chances are Rothwell will have time to redeem himself at the position because Brian Ferentz, who will undergo surgery today, is out for the remainder of the season.

## Boston police press charges after fight

Williams was treated and released from a hospital after the fracas.

## Sorenstam, Price inducted into Hall

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (AP) — Annika Sorenstam won the U.S. Women's Open nine years ago and figured there was nothing left for her to achieve.

From the career Grand Slam to a historic appearance at the Colonial on the PGA Tour, she left an indelible mark on golf in an amazing journey that led to her induction into the World Golf Hall of Fame on Monday night.

"How lucky can I be?" Sorenstam said. "I'm living a great life and following my dreams."

Sorenstam, the first foreign-born player to get into the Hall of Fame through the LPGA Tour, was inducted along with Nick Price, Japanese pioneer Chako Higuchi, and the late Leo Diegel, a two-time PGA champion.

The spotlight was on Sorenstam and Price, who earlier this year were linked by the Colonial — Sorenstam saw it as the ultimate challenge, while Price saw it as a publicity stunt.

They shared the stage at the World Golf Village in a ceremony that increased to 100 the membership in the Hall of Fame.

Price won 41 times around the world, including three

majors, and is equally revered as one of the most congenial players in golf.

"The good guys don't always win, but Pricey sure did," Nick Faldo said in videotaped remarks.

Higuchi became the first Japanese player to win a major at the 1977 LPGA Championship, and she is the first from her country to be enshrined. Along with 82 career victories, she runs the Japan LPGA Tour, which now conducts 30 tournaments.

Diegel was an exquisite shot-maker with a peculiar putting style, his elbows extended on both sides with his forearms parallel to the ground. He won 31 times, including consecutive titles in the PGA Championship (1928-29).

The induction capped an incredible year for Sorenstam. She won two majors, the LPGA Championship in a playoff and the Women's British Open in a back-nine duel with Se Ri Pak, to complete the career Grand Slam. She starred in a European victory at the Solheim Cup, played for the first time in her native Sweden.

What everyone will remember is the Colonial, where she became the first woman in 58

years on the PGA Tour.

Las Vegas bookmakers predicted a first-round score of 76. Under enormous pressure, Sorenstam had a birdie putt on every hole and shot a respectable 71. She followed with a 74 to miss the cut by five shots, but emerged as a one-name star for her courage and poise.

"If you measure a year in the amount of victories, last year I won more tournaments," said Sorenstam, who won 13 events worldwide in 2002. "But the experiences I had this year, and obviously Colonial, that's the greatest thing that will ever happen to me."

She also paid tribute to Ron Sirak of *Golf World* magazine, who wrote after the Colonial that her performance changed her from a female golfer to simply a golfer.

"That's all I ever aspired to be," Sorenstam said.

She recalled her first victory, at the '94 U.S. Women's Open, and asking IMG agent Mark Steinberg, "What do we do now?"

Along with the career Grand Slam, Sorenstam has won 47 times on the LPGA Tour and two years ago became the first woman to shoot 59 in competition.

### Which is the better NFL team: Vikings or Chiefs?

The Chiefs have been the best team in the NFL this season, top to bottom. They really aren't even close to anybody, including the Vikings, the league's other undefeated team.

Looking at the Chiefs, the success obviously starts with their potent offense, and the key to any offense is the running game. Who better to have leading your running game than Pro Bowl Holmes, perhaps the best back in the league? Going into their Monday night game with the Raiders, Holmes was leading the league in rushing with 563 yards on 123 carries, averaging for 4.6 per pop, and he has scored eight rushing touchdowns, a number for someone who was possibly going to miss the season with a hip injury. He has also caught 27 passes for 257 yards, making him a dual-threat back.

Trent Green isn't having so strong a year as he had last year, but he still has been steady. He has thrown for 1356 yards and nine touchdowns. While his pass rating isn't as high as Daunte Culpepper's, Green still sports an 86.7. He was recently named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his 400-yard, three-touchdown effort against Green Bay in a 40-34 come-from-behind win in Week 6.

While the Chiefs' pass attack isn't as potent as the Vikings', the Chiefs still have excellent receivers in Johnnie Morton and Eddie Kennison. They have the ultimate red-zone receiver in tight end Tony Gonzalez.

Defensively, the Chiefs are much improved, like the Vikings. The Chiefs are allowing a respectable 360.3 yards and 19.2 points per game. Those numbers aren't going to set any records, but they are respectable, especially when compared with last year's defense, which was dead last in the league in most categories.

Perhaps the biggest difference between the teams is the play of the Chiefs' special teams. Dante Hall has been simply amazing, returning kicks for touchdowns in four-straight games. He is already being mentioned as a MVP candidate by many news outlets.

The Vikings might be better statistically, but the Chiefs are the more complete team. Can special teams win a championship? It could happen.

I think it's fairly obvious which is the best team in the NFL right now. And no, it's not just because of their offense, as stellar as it is. The Vikings have one of the league's best defenses as well.

The amazing thing about the dramatic turnaround for the Minnesota defense is that it was done with good coaching and not quick-fix, expensive free-agent pickups. George O'Leary took over as coordinator for Minnesota, which had the worst defense in the league last season. He has completely turned the defense around, and the Vikings stand 10th in yards allowed per game after Week 7. They also lead the league in interceptions (16) with safeties Brian Russell and Corey Chavous leading the way with six and five respectively.


Last year, the Vikings had a total of 16 interceptions all year. Through six games this season, the Vikings are allowing only 17 points per game, versus nearly 28 in 2002.

The Minnesota offense has also improved. Daunte Culpepper threw a league-high 23 interceptions last year and only 18 touchdowns—a QB rating of 75.3. He matured a great deal during the off-season, learning that he can't make every play. Instead of forcing the ball downfield, he routinely throws the ball out of bounds when he can't make a play with his arm or his legs.

In only four games this season, Culpepper has seven TDs and no interceptions. His rating is 114.8. But these numbers couldn't be achieved without a receiver such as Randy Moss, who leads the league in receiving yards (666) and is second in receiving touchdowns (six). With the help of Moe Williams, and with rookie Onterio Smith filling in for the injured Michael Bennett, the Vikings lead the league in total offense.

Defense wins championships. It doesn't hurt to have the league's best offense either.

stretch you come into at about 187, 190 mph. Last summer, they had a guy, Jimmy Moore, crash up there, and it tore him up pretty good. He's still out. They took his spleen out, he hurt his shoulder, arm, leg, had broken ribs. It's inherently dangerous. So yeah, you think about it all the time."

## Fish return to water



Besides, the ballpark isn't that drab. Not with the overwhelming display of orange-and-teal seats, pulsating music, and Cuban cuisine.

"This is different," Yankees manager Joe Torre said. "We come in here, see the palm trees. It's weird. It really is weird."

OK, the trees in the Bronx are starting to show fall foliage. Yankee Stadium has Monument Park to honor the likes of Babe Ruth, Joe DiMaggio, and Mickey Mantle, and a

### Giambi latest athlete to testify in drug probe

SAN FRANCISCO — A former bass player once known as "Walkin' Fish," who left the music world to start a nutritional supplements lab, is no longer playing a backup role. He's now in the spotlight as the focus of a drug probe involving some of the nation's top sports stars.

Victor Conte's lab was raided by the Internal Revenue Service and a team of drug agents in early September, and he's now the target of a federal grand jury probe. He's also accused of supplying athletes with a new designer steroid that is rocking the world of track and field.

New York Yankees' first baseman Jason Giambi became the latest athlete to acknowledge he has been subpoenaed to testify before the grand jury. Sprinter Kelli White and shot putter Kevin Tott have also said they received subpoenas.

"I didn't do anything wrong," Giambi said Monday at a World Series workout in Miami. "To be honest with you, I really don't know much about it."

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## Yankees No. 1, Marlins No. 21 when it comes to spending money

MIAMI (AP) — When it comes to spending, the World Series is a mismatch.

The New York Yankees have outspent the Florida Marlins by a 3-to-1 margin, according to the most recent figures compiled by the commissioner's office.

New York had a major-league leading \$164 million payroll on Aug. 31 in the latest tabulation, which was obtained by The Associated Press. Florida was 21st in the major leagues at \$54 million — seventh among the eight playoff teams.

"We're not worried about that," said Josh Beckett, Florida's starter for Game 3 Tuesday night. "We're baseball players, we're going to play baseball, doesn't matter who we're playing against."

Among the other postseason teams: Boston was fourth in the major leagues at \$106 million, Atlanta sixth at \$95 million, San Francisco ninth at \$87 million, the Chicago Cubs 11th at \$83 million, Minnesota 19th at \$57 million, and Oakland 25th at \$50 million.

It marked the second-straight season in which three relatively low-spending teams made the playoffs. In 2002, the World Series champion Anaheim Angels were 16th at \$62 million, among three teams from the bottom half of the payroll list to make the postseason.

"We're playing the Marlins, supposedly a lot of money against very little money," Yankees manager Joe Torre said. "But it wouldn't matter whom we played. Our expectations to live up to ourselves is enormous. It's unbelievable. We know that going in."

Oakland has made the playoffs for four-straight years, although the A's haven't advanced beyond the first round, and Minnesota has won the AL Central two years in a row despite its small payroll.

"If we start looking at the numbers, it gets ugly," Twins manager Ron Gardenhire said.

"You think we wouldn't want to have a team full of Giambis and Jeters? ... We develop our own players, and we develop them for our ballpark and the way we think that we have to play, and that's a little speed, a little this and that."

Figures for payrolls are based on 25-man rosters as of the day before September call ups. They include salaries, prorated shares of signing bonuses, and All-Star bonuses, but they do not include performance or award bonuses. Portions of income deferred without interest are discounted.

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# Mavs get Walker from Celtics

DALLAS — The Dallas Mavericks bulked up an already strong offense Monday, acquiring All-Star forward Antoine Walker from the Boston Celtics in a five-player trade.

The Celtics agreed to take center Raef LaFrentz and the six seasons remaining on a \$69 million, seven-year contract signed before last season.

The Celtics also get Jiri Welsch and Chris Mills, players the Mavericks got in an offseason trade that also brought Antawn Jamison from Golden State, and Dallas' first-round pick in 2004. The Mavericks will get guard Tony Delk from Boston.

"It's not every day that a 27-year-old All-Star becomes available," said Donn Nelson, Dallas' president of basketball

operations. "We feel we've got one of the most versatile coaches in the league. To add a player of Antoine's ability just gives [coach Don Nelson] more options to work with."

Donnie Nelson struck the deal with Danny Ainge, who became Boston's head of basketball operations in May. The two are close friends, with Nelson having been an assistant to Ainge in Phoenix.

Between his jobs with the Suns and Celtics, Ainge was a TV analyst, and he said on the air he did not like Walker's game. Since joining Boston, he's said he had no intention of trading Walker.

Now Walker, a three-time All-Star who averaged 17.3 points and 8.7 rebounds last season, goes from playing alongside one high scorer in Paul Pierce to being joined by four: Dallas' nucleus of Dirk Nowitzki, Steve Nash, and Michael Finley, plus Jamison, who was added in August.

The Mavericks, the NBA's highest-scoring team the last

two years, have now upgraded a roster that won 60 games and reached the Western Conference finals last season. It also counters the changes made by fellow Western Conference opponents San Antonio, Sacramento, and the Lakers.

"Dallas likes to take chances and make things happen. It's on the cusp of winning a championship right now," Ainge said. "I can't sit here and tell you that we're an NBA championship team right now. I just don't see that. But I'm not satisfied winning 44 games."

Walker has size (6-9, 245 pounds) and can run the offense. His dribbling and passing skills make him the prototype "point forward" coveted by the Mavs coach.

Walker led the Celtics in assists the last three seasons, and he and Pierce combined to average nearly half of Boston's points during that span.

"We see Antoine as a triple-double guy," said Donnie Nelson, the coach's son and an assistant coach.

## Kansas City holds on for victory in Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The confident Kansas City Chiefs wanted nothing more than to beat the Oakland Raiders in decisive fashion. They ended up holding on for dear life Monday night when a backup quarterback turned a potential shutout into a shootout.

Oakland's Tim Brown was tackled on the Kansas City 1 as time expired, and the unbeaten Chiefs won their seventh straight game, beating their bitter rivals, 17-10.

Trent Green passed for 206 yards for Kansas City, which tied a franchise record for consecutive wins. But the Chiefs had to survive a gutsy last-minute drive led by Marques Tuiasosopo, who had thrown just six passes all season.

Tuiasosopo took over for injured MVP Rich Gannon in the second half. He led two scoring drives and drove the Raiders (2-5) from their own 6 with 1:47 left to the Kansas City goal line on a drive featuring two catches by Jerry Rice and a huge 35-yard reception by Jerry Porter. Oakland even tried a fake

spike to get in the end zone, but the game ended when Jerome Woods and Greg Wesley tackled Brown on a catch at the 1 while time ran out.

Gannon bruised his right shoulder in the final minute of the second quarter, then spent the second half on the sidelines nursing the injury, which came from two vicious sacks by Shawn Barber and several other hard hits.

Tuiasosopo also struggled before sparking the Raiders to an impressive fourth quarter. The third-year pro had just 69 yards passing in his entire career, but was 16-of-28 for 224 yards in the second half.

Priest Holmes rushed for 123

yards and ran for a 2-yard touchdown with 4:57 left that gave Kansas City a 17-3 lead.

The Chiefs gave Dick Vermeil a win in his first appearance on Monday night as a head coach since his Philadelphia Eagles played in Miami in 1981.

For the Chiefs, this win took some of the sting out of an 24-0 loss in Oakland on Dec. 28, the first time in 88 meetings between the former AFL foes that the Raiders shut them out.

That game, played in a steady downpour, gave Oakland the top seed for the AFC playoffs, as well as a much-needed bye, and eliminated the Chiefs from making the postseason for the fifth-straight year.

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

**Reality sets in for Carmelo Anthony, Jim Boeheim**

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — The last time the two were on this floor, they hoisted a national championship banner to the roof of the Carrier Dome.

Guess which one misses the other more now.

"It was great to see him," Jim Boeheim said. "Absolutely."

"I'm just glad," Carmelo Anthony said with a grin, "that he wasn't out there yelling at me." Then, just to make sure nobody got it wrong, the kid flashed that familiar, million-dollar smile.

The next chapter is about to begin in the stories of the 58-year-old college-basketball lifer whose critics said he would never win the big one and the 19-year-old former freshman sensation who helped him silence them all. They just won't write any more together.

The Syracuse Orangemen opened practice last weekend for the 28th season under Boeheim, arrayed against more than 300 other Division I programs aiming to knock the crown off their heads. The coach settled into a court-side seat across from his familiar spot on the bench as Anthony's Denver Nuggets became the roundball attraction in town for one night, playing an NBA exhibition against the Detroit Pistons.

It's been little more than six months since they tied off a season marred by scandals at Georgia, St. Bonaventure, Fresno State, and elsewhere with a memorable, down-to-the-wire win over Kansas. But that already feels like a lifetime ago.

When Anthony stopped back on campus for a quick visit this summer, he said he couldn't imagine anywhere else that would "feel this much like home." And toward the end of Sunday night's exhibition, when he re-entered the game as chants of "We want Melo!" rocked the building, maybe that was still true.

But by the time Anthony walked into the interview room, he already looked and sounded more like the instant millionaire being the No. 3 pick in the draft had made him. He was in the middle of a grueling road trip, wearing a diamond-encrusted pendant worth close to two years' tuition, and glad to put this game in the rearview mirror.

"Five cities in seven days, and we're playing Portland in Portland tomorrow night," Anthony said, explaining why he didn't mind sitting most of the second half. Besides, an 82-game regular season is looming just two weeks off. "I've got to save my legs," he added.

Last season, Anthony played 35 games in a season bookended by great performances. After the first one — a 27-point, 11-rebound showing against Memphis — Boeheim wondered if the kid would return for another go-round. The last one — 20 points and 10 rebounds in the title game — removed any doubts.

While Anthony's one-season-and-gone college career made him a mercenary in some eyes, and just another sign of the times in others, Boeheim has no regrets.

His own experience was just the opposite: Boeheim is the longest-tenured coach at the same school. He came to Syracuse as a walk-on 41 years ago and never left, but he remains grateful Anthony stopped

by at all. "He was a once-in-a-lifetime kid for any coach — a Magic Johnson, maybe even better. It took Magic two years to win; Melo did it in one. And he did it with a younger, much less-experienced team around him.

"But he was so obviously ready to move on by the end that the discussion about leaving didn't last more than a few seconds," the coach said. "Another season would probably have been anticlimactic." Yet Anthony's leaving has guaranteed Boeheim's next one will be anything but.

He argued for years that great coaches didn't need a national championship as validation, which seemed convenient because Boeheim had lost two of them, in 1987 and 1996. But he toed the same line in April, when Kansas' Kirk Hinrich missed a desperation jumper at the buzzer, that he had 16 years earlier, when a last-second shot by Indiana's Keith Smart sent Syracuse home without the trophy.

At that moment, Boeheim said, "I'm the same coach I was just a few minutes ago. If Hinrich had made that jump shot, I probably would be worse."

For all that, he does not discount the magic of winning the big one.

Not because of the way others regard him now, though that, too, has been undeniably sweet. He speaks at more coaching clinics, marches in more parades and the value of a basketball signed by his teams commands more than five times the \$800 they used to draw at charity auctions.

The thing that surprised Boeheim the most was what it stirred inside his own gut.

"Before it happens, you think it's good, but you don't really know. And then the moment you have a few minutes to yourself, you start thinking, 'Wouldn't you like to do this again?'"

Krakau was a three-year starter at Guthrie Center before playing defensive end at Iowa State from 1970-72. He then played in the NFL with the Buffalo Bills and the Patriots.

Busch starred at Eldridge North Scott and became an All-America tight end at Iowa State. He then played professional baseball in the Los Angeles Dodgers organization.

Craig led Davenport Central to the Class 4A state title in 1973, scoring four touchdowns to set a championship game record that still stands. He scored 46 TDs in his two varsity seasons, then played at Nebraska.


