Nurse's legacy lives on in 'gloving up'

The family of a nurse who accidentally contracted HIV recall her dedication

Aug. 23, 1986, was a quiet night at work for Barbara Fassbinder, but the events of that night turned her into a nationally known nurse-safety advocate for the remaining eight years of her life.

Fassbinder, who wasn't scheduled to work, was called in for the night shift at Memorial Hospital in Prairie du Chien, Wis., approx-

imately 15 miles east of her home in Monona, Iowa. Early that morning, while trying to save the life of a sick young man brought into the emergency room, she made a mistake that would change her life forever.

After removing the IV line from the man, she covered the site with a 2-by-2-inch pad of gauze. However, the man's blood leaked onto her gloveless hands, which happened to be chapped from a weekend of

gardening. The man died later that night after doctors tried unsuccessfully to resuscitate him. An autopsy later showed that the man had AIDS.

Today marks the 10-year anniversary of Fassbinder's funeral. She became the first documented case of a nurse acquiring the HIV virus from a patient without being stuck by a needle. The month of September always holds

Identity theft suspected in child-porn website

Iowa City police say the user could be anywhere from Ohio to Japan

The Iowa City web-hosting company that found 104 child-pornography files on a user's website now believes the account was purchased using another person's credit card.

Sam Jadali, the CEO of Livin4.com, said the \$50-a-year account, which was shut down Sept. 17 after it was discovered, appears to have been fraudulently purchased.

"Basically, it's identity theft," he said. "That could be why it is so hard to track them down."

The child-pornography files were discovered during a random servers check by Livin4.com. The files included nude or scantily clad young children on the site's introduction and galleries. After Jadali was notified, he suspended the client's website and turned over hard copies of the evidence to Iowa City police.

Police have no suspects in the investigation, and they believe the user could be from anywhere from Ohio to Japan, said Iowa City police Sgt. Brian Krei.

"After investigation, we see that he might have hacked into a server in Japan to use our services, as an effort to deter authorities from his origin," Jadali said.

Counsel's office happy staying behind the scene

Quiet chatter fills a laid-back Jessup Hall office as lawyers work to keep the UI out of a court room. Anyone walking in would have little indication that the office handles virtually all of the university's legal issues.

Rarely do the UI's attorneys see time in front of a judge; they end most cases before they go to trial. Most times, the lawyers keep to themselves, trying to improve the university and its policies without being noticed.

Life is calm despite the occasional "mini-crisis," but the office dedicated to protecting the UI's legal interests is now undergoing a review.

"There isn't much routine around here," UI General Counsel Mark Schantz said, leaning back in his chair and sipping from his coffee mug. "There are many interesting people, and I wouldn't trade places with a counsel for a group like the Principal Financial Group."

Some UI students are striding into healthier lifestyle

An exercise program involving walking and pedometers is the way to step it up, Student Health says

Taking Strides, a new UI program designed to promote health awareness through increased exercise, has attracted 100 students since its July inception.

The free program, funded by Health Iowa/Student Health Service, encourages students to check out a pedometer and count their daily steps. Each week, participants are asked to increase their daily steps by 20 percent.

"The program is an easy way to get moving, improve overall health, and add more activity down the road," said UI graduate student Angie Reams, a Taking Strides member since mid-August.

Students in the program count their daily steps using a digital pedometer that they can purchase for \$20 at Student Health or borrow from the program. The pedometer clips on the waistband and measures hip fluctuation for every stride. Unlike most pedometers, it measures steps rather than distance.

British hostage pleads for his life

The group holding Kenneth Bigley has beheaded two Americans this week


BAGHDAD — A British hostage appeared on a video posted on an Islamic

website Wednesday, weeping and pleading for his life as Iraq's leader and U.S. officials crushed reports that a high-profile female Iraqi weapons scientist could be released from jail soon — as demanded by the kidnappers.

The captive, Kenneth Bigley, appealed to British Prime Minister Tony Blair to intervene. "I think this is possibly my last chance," he said. "I don't want to die."

Later Wednesday, an Internet statement purportedly by a group that claimed to have kidnapped two Italian aid workers in Iraq said it

had killed the women. The website posting could not be immediately verified. Simona Pari and Simona Torretta worked for Un Ponte Per ... (A Bridge to ...) when they were seized Sept. 7.

Bigley was being held by a militant group led by Jordanian-born terror mastermind Abu Musab al-Zarqawi. The group has already beheaded Americans Eugene Armstrong and Jack Hensley, whom it abducted along with Bigley from the West-erners' Baghdad home last week.

On Wednesday, the group also posted a video of Hensley's killing on the Internet, as it had two days earlier of Armstrong's beheading.

Hensley's decapitated body was found

Author details 'naked economics'

Author Charlie Wheelan, a guest speaker in the 2004 John R. Hughes Lecture Series, drew nearly 100 people to the Pappajohn Business Building on Wednesday evening to hear him speak on what he called today's "three most contentious issues."

During the lecture, titled "It's the Economics, Stupid: What a Basic Understanding of Markets Can Tell Us About Trade, Health Care, Regulation, and Iowa Business Issues," he ranged from his own experiences to health care, trade, and regulation.

"I am a failed entrepreneur," he said, openly admitting that he and his partner's college attempts at businesses such as breakfast in bed and birthday-delivery services were futile.

Wheelan intended that his book *Naked Economics*, which was published in paperback in September 2003, function as an introduction to economics for the average person.

The former Midwest correspondent for *The Economist* argued that the question should

not be whether we should have a big government or small government, but rather what government should and shouldn't do. Businesses need the government in some ways, he said, such as providing property rights, public goods, and patents.

"The United States is not bad at balancing where it should be involved and where it shouldn't," said Wheelan at a networking reception before the lecture.

The Chicago native also covered seven issues driving health costs higher, including an aging

population and expensive technology. He added the United States is unique in that its companies provide health insurance.

"I was interested in what he had to say about health care," said Karen Walking, an Iowa City resident who attended the lecture. "I personally think that health care should be free, but I don't think that the government would do health care well."

Wheelan also examined the pros and cons of free trade. The decline in jobs because of outsourcing and technology is a major loss for workers, but it is only a minor win in terms of profits for companies, he said.

He quickly acknowledged, however, that free trade can benefit consumers.

"The money people save on products from factories overseas they spend on local business," he said.

Representatives from Eastern Iowa Angel Investors, Iowa First Capital Fund, and Wellmark Venture Capital Fund also spoke at the lecture about their companies' investments.

Iowa groups meet to promote education issues

DES MOINES — Small groups of Iowans gathered Wednesday in living rooms, classrooms, and libraries to give greater visibility to education issues in this campaign year.

"We've noticed that the candidates, from the presidential level on down, have been talking about the war and Iraq, economy and jobs, and even Vietnam more than they've been talking about education," said Dan Kaufman, a spokesman for the National Education Association.

The lack of attention led proponents, including the NEA and a handful of other groups, to adopt a campaign tactic that candidates have found successful in this election cycle to bring their supporters together.

The coalition used the Internet to promote 3,800 house parties across the country where teachers, parents, and other supporters of public schools can gather with others in their own neighborhoods.

"It's not just a conversation, but a conversation and a call to action ...," she said. Iowa first lady Christie Vilsack, a former teacher, "We're going to be asking them to register people to vote and educate them on the issues."

She invited approximately 30 people from a wide range of backgrounds to her house party in Mount Pleasant.

"I wanted it to reflect both parties, people in the community,

beginning teachers, experienced teachers ...," she said.

She said she expects they will "go back into the workplace and their social settings and talk about what happened at the house parties."

Kaufman said the purpose is to create a grass-roots movement.

"We think it's a great way to get people to talk about education. Hopefully, when they go into voting booths, they'll think about

education as an important part of their voting decision," he said.

Vilsack said the national political debate has strayed from issues that affect voters' everyday lives.

"I think we need to bring it back to jobs, health care, and education ...," she said. "I think these are the issues that should determine who the next president is."

However, the effort also is aimed at state and local races.

Vilsack said she hopes legislative candidates will be asked not only whether they support education, but also "whether they think there's enough funding now and what their plans are for funding education in the future."

Other coalition members include MoveOn.org, the Campaign for America's Future, ACORN, the NAACP National Voters' Fund, and the U.S. Hispanic Leaders Institute.

Edwards will fill-in for Kerry in Iowa visit

DES MOINES (AP) — Democrats have announced a switch in plans for campaign rallies today, with

running mate John Edwards filling in for Democratic nominee John Kerry.

Kerry had been scheduled to speak at a town meeting in Davenport and later a campaign rally in Cedar Rapids, but he has been experiencing

troubles with his voice, said campaign spokesman Colin Van Ostern.

With the first debate with President Bush scheduled for later this month, Van Ostern said Kerry wanted to make sure his voice was in good shape for that meeting.

"He wants to rest his voice for the debate," Van Ostern said.

Like many candidates for president, Kerry's voice is often strained by the demands of giving multiple speeches every day and he's been sounding scratchy in recent days.

CBS names 2 to probe Bush Guard papers flap

NEW YORK — CBS News appointed a former Republican Cabinet member and a retired news executive Wednesday to investigate its discredited "60 Minutes" report on President Bush's National Guard service.

Dick Thornburgh, attorney general in the Reagan and first Bush administrations and former Pennsylvania governor, will start work immediately with Louis D. Boccardi, who retired last year as president and chief executive officer of the Associated Press.

The network hasn't set a deadline on their work, although CBS News President Andrew Heyward has said he hoped for answers in weeks, rather than months.

Their appointment came two days after CBS News said it could not authenticate documents used in the Sept. 8 story that had questioned the president's military service and apologized for airing it.

"It would be unfair to single out what I think are the biggest problems," Boccardi said. "We are going to look and see what they are. What CBS itself has said adds up to a significant number of problems on the way in."

It's Boccardi's second such job since retirement; he served on the panel appointed by The New York Times to probe how former reporter Jayson Blair fabricated sources and got them into the paper.


The appointment of a prominent Republican is a recognition of how the media scandal has political overtones. GOP critics considered the story an example of anti-Republican bias, and CBS reprimanded the story's producer for fulfilling a source's request and setting up a contact with Democrat John Kerry's presidential campaign.

"Investigations like this can help a news organization know who should be held accountable," said Geneva Overholser, a former Des Moines Register editor who's now at the Missouri School of Journalism.

"Regrettably, CBS took a very long time to be responsive on this," she said. "But once they decided to be responsive, they were very responsive. This is quick, decisive, and substantial."

It may not satisfy critics, who have already called for anchorman Dan Rather and Heyward to step down. Heyward has said he wanted to see the panel's investigation before making any personnel decisions.

"A strong leader like Dan Rather ought to say the buck stops here and take the fall,"

said Michael Paranzino, a Washington government affairs consultant who set up a website, BoycottCBS.com, to protest CBS' planned airing of a miniseries on Ronald Reagan and has kept it running.

CBS has promised the two investigators full access and complete cooperation, and said it will make their final report public.

The CBS report cited documents purported to be from one of Bush's commanders in the Texas Air National Guard. The documents say the commander, Lt. Col. Jerry Killian, ordered Bush to take a medical exam, which he did not, and felt pressured to sugarcoat an evaluation of then-1st Lt. Bush.

CBS's source, retired Texas National Guard member Bill Burkett, told USA Today that he agreed to turn over the documents to CBS if the network would help arrange a conversation with John Kerry's campaign.

Mary Mapes, a veteran CBS News producer who did much of the work on the Bush story, passed Burkett's number to the Kerry campaign and Kerry

adviser Joe Lockhart said he had spoken to Burkett briefly but did not recall speaking about the National Guard.

CBS on Tuesday said it violates news standards to be associated with any political agenda.

Many document experts believe the so-called Killian memos are fake. Republican National Committee Chairman Ed Gillespie said Wednesday he believed a crime was committed by whoever created the documents. Burkett has said he did not fake or forge the documents.

Senate OKs Goss as head of CIA

The GOP-led chamber ignores Democrats' complaints that the congressman has too many Republican ties

WASHINGTON — The Republican-led Senate approved President Bush's choice to head the CIA, Rep. Porter Goss, over protests from some Democrats who said he has too many Republican ties for a job that requires independence.

The nomination of the Florida congressman, who had planned to retire after eight terms, was confirmed Wednesday by a vote of 77-17. A former CIA and Army intelligence officer during the 1960s, Goss would be only the second congressman to take over the helm of the CIA, following former President and House member George H.W. Bush.

Goss, 65, will lead an intelligence community that has faced intense criticism for failures prior to the 9/11 attacks and for its prewar estimates on Iraq. Yet defenders

say the 15 agencies that make up the U.S. intelligence network have become more focused and made changes to address international terrorism and other threats.

During six hours of debate, West Virginia Sen.

Jay Rockefeller, the senior Democrat on the intelligence panel, questioned whether Goss would be politically objective and outlined a series of attacks Goss has made on the Democratic Party and its presidential nominee, Sen. John Kerry.

They included what Rockefeller considered unfair accusations from Goss that Kerry led the way to "deep and devastating" intelligence budget cuts in the 1990s.

Rockefeller said the law requires the director of central intelligence to provide timely and objective intelligence, independent of political considerations.

"Not surprisingly, one thing missing from Rep. Goss's records are any public statements on intelligence critical of members of his own party or the administration," Rockefeller said. While Goss has promised not to be a partisan Republican as CIA director, "I must vote on his record. I cannot vote on his promise."

11-year-old charged with rape

MILWAUKEE (AP) — An 11-year-old boy was charged Wednesday with raping a 76-year-old neighborhood woman in her home as three of his friends stood watch.

Police said that for a week before the attack, the boys had been "terrorizing" the woman in her house, repeatedly breaking in, taking cash and other items.

The woman, who lived alone, told police she was taking a sponge bath in the kitchen Friday when the 11-year-old walked in, demanded money and then ordered her to take off her clothes and go into the bedroom, according to court papers.

The boy's brother, a 13-year-old who was among the three other boys also charged, said he heard the woman say: "I'm just an old, half-crippled lady, I'm not going."

The woman said the 11-year-old put on a condom and tried to rape her, followed by a second boy.

Bush mocks Kerry's Iraq stand

KING OF PRUSSIA, Pa. — President Bush mocked John Kerry's fitness to be commander in chief Wednesday, saying the way to bring U.S. troops home from Iraq "is not to wilt or waver."

Bush, trying to show a leadership contrast with his Democratic opponent, said on a campaign trip to battleground Pennsylvania: "I'm driven by my desire to protect the American people. I'll be steadfast in my resolve to do everything I can to make you secure."

Less than six weeks before the election, Iraq was increasing in prominence as a campaign issue, thrust to center stage by spreading violence, kidnappings, beheadings, and the deaths of more than 1,000 U.S. troops. With Americans divided about the war, Bush is trying to keep voters focused on what he says are Kerry's conflicting statements rather than the daily bombings and bloodshed.

Bush said, "It's hard to help a country go from tyranny to elections to peace when there are a handful of people who are willing to kill in order to stop the process. And that's what you're seeing on the TV screens. You know, these people cannot beat us militarily."

Bush said the insurgents "use the only tool at their disposal,

which is beheadings and death, to try to shake our will. They understand the nature of America. ... We weep when we think about the families affected by those who have been brutalized by these terrorists."

Back in Washington, Vice President Dick Cheney went before TV cameras on Capitol Hill to say Kerry's statements on Iraq and the war on terror showed "someone who lacks the resolve, the determination, and the conviction to prevail in this conflict."

In that same vein, the Bush campaign put out a new television advertisement ridiculing Kerry on Iraq and other issues. It shows Kerry windsurfing left and right and says his positions shift "whichever way the wind blows."

The Democrats struck back with their own ad that says: "In the face of the Iraq quagmire, George Bush's answer is to run a juvenile and tasteless attack ad."

Bush campaigned Wednesday in the suburbs of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. It was his 37th

visit to Pennsylvania, his top target in the presidential sweepstakes with 21 of the 270 electoral votes needed to win. Four years ago Bush lost Pennsylvania to Democrat Al Gore but polls show the race this year is close.

In between speeches, Bush took an aerial tour of Allegheny County, where the remnants of Hurricane Ivan caused flooding that damaged or destroyed thousands of homes and businesses.

On Iraq, Bush will meet at the White House today with Ayad Allawi, the prime minister of Iraq's interim government who has said the terrorists are being defeated. Bush cited Allawi as a witness to the wisdom of U.S. policy.

"These are critical times, and I'm glad the prime minister is here to reinforce the strategy we have in place," Bush said. He said more Iraqis have electricity now than under Saddam Hussein and that more children are going to school and getting immunizations.

Criticizing Kerry, Bush said that "the way to prevail, the way toward successful conclusion that we all want, the way to secure Iraq and bring our troops home as quickly as possible is not to wilt or waver or send mixed signals to the enemy."

"My opponent is sending mixed signals," the president said. "He has had many different positions on Iraq."

Kerry: Bush lives in make-believe

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — President Bush is living in a make-believe world in his understanding of Iraq, misleading the American people and attacking Democrats on phony issues, presidential rival John Kerry said Wednesday in an interview with the Associated Press.

"Even today, he blundered again, saying there are only a handful of terrorists in Iraq," Kerry said in a brief interview. "George Bush retreated from Fallujah and other communities in Iraq that are now overrun with terrorists and threaten our troops."

Kerry said that in criticizing his statements on Iraq, Bush was "living in a make-believe world," unwilling to tell the truth or to understand the situation in Iraq.

The Democrat said he had laid out "steps to win the war, not to change, not to retreat,


steps to win. George Bush is trying to fight a phantom here because he won't tell the American people the truth, so he sets up something that's not a real issue and attacks it."

Bush "missed a huge opportunity" at the United Nations this week to try to persuade other nations' leaders to join the United States in Iraq and the broader anti-terror war, Kerry said.

"I don't think he's providing the leadership we need," Kerry said. "I will do a better job of dealing with Iraq and winning the war and fighting the war on terror, period."

Kerry spoke to the AP shortly after Vice President Dick Cheney delivered a scathing attack on the Democrat. Speaking to reporters after meeting with Republican leaders on Capitol Hill, Cheney argued that Kerry's penchant for wavering makes him a weak alternative to a "steadfast leader, which is exactly what we have in President George W. Bush."

In a day filled with rhetorical

charges and countercharges — at campaign stops and in advertising — all four candidates found fault. Responding to Cheney's criticism of Kerry, Democratic vice presidential

candidate John Edwards said in a statement that Bush and Cheney "are the last two people we need a lecture from about how to keep the American people safe."

Wonder Bread, Twinkies maker files for Chapter 11

Corporation blames financial trouble in part on low-carb diet craze

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Interstate Bakeries Corp., the maker of lunch box staples Wonder Bread and Twinkies, filed for bankruptcy Wednesday after months of financial turmoil brought on in part by the low-carb craze.

The nation's largest wholesale baker filed for Chapter 11 reorganization and installed new management, saying it intended to survive. The company will continue operating its bakeries, outlet stores, and distribution centers, and analysts said that its famous brands are unlikely to disappear from store shelves.

Tony Alvarez, the head of turnaround firm Alvarez & Marsal and the baker's new chief executive, said the company had no immediate plans to lay off additional workers. But, he added, "It's very rare in this country that

anyone goes through Chapter 11 and is layoff-free."

For more than a year, Interstate Bakeries has struggled with declining sales of its bread and sweet-goods products, a drop the company and analysts blame on the popularity of high-protein, low-carb diets such as Atkins and South Beach.

Thomas Morabito, a food analyst at Longbow Research in Cleveland, said the company was hurt by what he called a "lack of innovation" in responding to the low-carb market; it didn't release a low-carb product until February.

He said the diet trend, combined with the company's high debt and large overhead costs, led to the filing.

"I think the low-carb phenomenon was just a final blow to IBC," Morabito said.

The Kansas City-based company listed assets of \$1.6 billion and liabilities of \$1.3 billion in its court filings. In those filings,

it said Chairman and CEO James Elsesser had resigned effective Wednesday.

Interstate Bakeries and its subsidiaries employ 32,000 people at 54 bakeries and 2,200 distribution centers and outlet stores across the country. In the past two years, the company has laid off about 800 employees as it closed several bakeries. The company's other brands include Hostess and Home Pride.

Gary Hindes, who manages Deltec Asset Management in New York, a firm that works with distressed companies, predicted the solution would be far from complex, centered around responding to a market that is less tolerant of sugar and carbohydrates.

"Fixing this company is not rocket science," Hindes said. "Their costs are too high. What they're going to do is sell off bakeries, renegotiate union contracts. I think it will come out a lot leaner and profitable operation."

Confusion over female prisoners raises questions

Wednesday in Baghdad.

The gruesome hostage drama played out as fighting raged in Iraq, killing three U.S. soldiers and wounding four others.

Suicide attackers struck key diplomatic and commercial centers of the capital, and American tanks and troops searching for weapons stormed into the Sadr City slum, a stronghold of Shiite militants, only to come under a barrage of mortar and automatic weapons fire.

The violence across Baghdad left at least 17 Iraqis dead and 100 injured and underscored the inability of U.S. and Iraqi forces to bring security to even the most vital areas of the capital.

U.S. and Iraqi troops battled with insurgents in the central city of Samarra, where U.S. forces had earlier claimed success against militants waging a 17-month insurgency, police said. At least one child was killed and five people wounded in the fighting, police said.

The confusion over the fate of female detainees began when a Justice Ministry official announced that Rihab Rashid Taha, a scientist who became known as "Dr. Germ" for helping Iraq make weapons out of anthrax, would be freed in the coming days because she was no longer a threat to national security.

The U.S. and Iraqi officials found themselves at odds over who had custody over Taha and another female scientist involved in Saddam Hussein's biological weapons programs, with Iraqi National Security Adviser Qassim Daoud saying they were in the hands of Iraqi security forces and that "Iraqi judges decided to release them because they didn't have any evidence."

But a U.S. Embassy spokesman disagreed, saying the pair "are in our legal and physical custody."

Prime Minister Ayad Allawi told

the Associated Press that his government has begun reviewing the status of its detainees, including the two female scientists.

But he said the review process had nothing to do with the current hostage situation and had started weeks ago in Iraq.

"We have not been negotiating, and we will not negotiate with terrorists on the release of hostages," he said in a telephone interview from New York. "No release takes place unless I authorize it."

The conflicting U.S. and Iraqi statements raised questions over who has authority in the country, even after the handover of sovereignty to Allawi's interim government in June. U.S. officials have been saying that they have been giving more decision-making power to Iraqis, including over security matters.

The U.S. military says it has two Iraqi women in custody — Taha and Huda Salih Mahdi Ammash, a biotech researcher known as "Mrs. Anthrax."

Justice Ministry spokesman Noori Abdul-Rahim Ibrahim announced that "Iraqi authorities have agreed with coalition forces to conditionally release Rihab Rashid Taha on bail." He added that "the decision ... has nothing to do with the threat made by the kidnappers."

But soon afterward, a U.S. Embassy spokesman ruled out any immediate release.

The two female scientists from Saddam's regime "are in our legal and physical custody. Legal status of these two and many others is under constant review," the spokesman said.

Representatives of the Iraqi government and U.S. coalition forces have identified a group of about 14 high-value detainees, including Taha, who may be eligible for release because they are no longer needed for questioning and do not pose a security threat, a multinational force official said on condition of anonymity.

Jadali said the webmaster used a domain based in Ohio, and police are looking into that lead.

Krei said the user does not appear to be local, and Jadali is not considered a suspect.

"He turned over the information to us," Krei said. "We will have to somewhat rely on information he is going to provide."

Iowa City police have jurisdiction of the case, but it is being reviewed to see if it will be given to another agency. Most likely, it will be handed over to federal authorities.

Jadali said Livin4.com has never before dealt with an

account user posting child pornography. The random checks usually find users who are uploading programs or software illegally and sharing it or offering hacking utilities to web-surfers.

significance for her three children, who live in Iowa City and are past and present UI students. Sept. 29 would have been their mother's 51st birthday.

A couple weeks after Fassbinder treated the AIDS-infected patient, she came down with several flu-like symptoms that left her feeling weak. She consulted her family doctor, who diagnosed her symptoms as the flu, but she "just couldn't seem to shake it," husband Dave Fassbinder recalled in an interview this week from his home in Monona.

A blood test a couple of months later showed she was HIV-positive.

Barbara Fassbinder, who was married with three young children at the time, did not see how this was possible. But the second test came back positive as well.

Eva Fassbinder, the couple's oldest child, is now in her sec-

ond year of graduate school at the UI, studying public health with an emphasis in health communication and health education. She originally began in journalism and radio, but her interests and inspiration from her mother led her to pursue the health sciences.

"What keeps people healthy is the right information," she said. "If my mom had had the right information, she might still be here today."

Eva Fassbinder, 27, is also getting married this weekend. She said she and her fiancé chose the month of September because she wanted to make it a "happy month," not just the "month that my mom died."

"She will definitely be in our thoughts at the wedding," said brother Joel Fassbinder, 24. "We are also planning on visiting the cemetery as a family."

When Barbara Fassbinder was diagnosed in December 1986, AIDS was far from being accepted in mainstream American society. Fear of negative reaction led her to withhold the

information from the public for four years. She was moved from her nursing position within the hospital to nonpatient care, including a job in the independent-living area, Dave Fassbinder said.

After four years, she couldn't take it anymore.

"She knew of the definite danger for all health-care workers who weren't 'gloving up,'" said Dave Fassbinder. "In order to get people to listen, she knew she would have to go public."

From 1990-94, she became the main advocate for the Centers for Disease Control and American Nurses Association in making public the information on protecting health-care workers from HIV. One of her first news conferences was held at the UI Hospitals and Clinics in 1990. She was also interviewed on "The Today Show," CNN, and "Firing Line" with Pat Buchanan.

David Fassbinder said the reason his wife's case became so widely known was because it was well-documented. The

couple, after extensive interviews by the Wisconsin State Health Department about their faithfulness to one another and lack of experience with drug abuse, became one of few who met the necessary requirements.

He also added that her main message to the public was that "if it can happen to a nurse in a small Midwest town, then it could happen to anyone."

The family agreed that although Barbara Fassbinder would never be entirely happy with the health system, if she was here today, she would be pleased to see that her advocacy has paid off. Health-care facilities throughout the country now require the use of gloves, face masks, and other protective materials.

"She saved a lot of lives with what she did," Dave Fassbinder said. "It's comforting to know that her life had a reason and purpose."

"The main reasons physical activity is important is because it helps manage stress and weight and it prevents illness," said Amy Fletcher, a fitness-education specialist with Health Iowa/Student Health Service. She worked with a

health-promotion intern to create the program, which is based on a handful of national studies.

Students write down the number of steps they take per day and, at the week's end, record their total on the Internet.

"I like the program because it is easy to follow," Reams said. "The website is easy to

use and motivational."

The first week of walking determines a student's baseline. The goal is 10,000 steps each day, which is approximately five miles.

Students receive rewards for achieving their goal for four, eight, and 12 weeks. They do not have to achieve their goals in consecutive

weeks; they can start or stop the program at any time.

Students can register for the program at www.health-service.com/strides.

Students start the program on a Monday no matter what day they sign up, which should provide enough time to purchase or check out a pedometer.

Schantz came to the UI in January 1992, two months after Gang Lu, a disgruntled UI graduate student, killed five people and severely wounded another in a shooting that stunned the campus. Schantz made sure the wounded woman received worker's compensation after being paralyzed in the incident. There were no lawsuits against the university stemming from the shooting.

After the shooting, the UI realized that the university's size required a larger legal staff to handle the caseload. Then-President Hunter Rawlings contacted Schantz and offered him the position of general counsel

after several meetings.

"I was a little bit ready for a change," said Schantz, 63. "The public-service aspect appealed to me."

General counsel was not Schantz' first tour of duty at the university. Schantz completed his undergraduate work at the university and returned several years later to become a professor in the College of Law.

He eventually became associate dean of the law school before moving on to other areas, including private practice. It was odd returning to the university and having the professors who taught him still at the school, he said.

Marc Mills, the UI senior associate general counsel and a former Schantz student, said

his teaching style was much like his personality. Schantz was very open to students' opinions and new ideas and was not like the professors on television who "grill" their students, Mills said.

Working for his former professor is sometimes "weird," Mills said, but when Schantz asks him a question, "it doesn't feel like I am being quizzed by my professor."

One of the nice parts of working in the office, Schantz said, is that very rarely does he have to appear in a courtroom.

One of the few, and most

recent, cases in which he did have to appear in court was during the lawsuit involving the relocation of the university's Herbarium.

Schantz considers the closing of the dental-hygiene department in the College of Dentistry in 1991 one of the toughest cases he had to handle. The case was very emotional on both sides, he said.

Recently, UI President David Skorton announced a review of the Office of General Counsel, headed by law Professor David Baldus.

"They seem to be on the right track. Yet, we will likely come up

with some suggested changes," Baldus said, declining to elaborate on possible changes.

The eight-member committee has been meeting since the summer, and it hopes to have its

report done by the first week of November. It has hired general counsel from the University of Florida to act as a consultant.

U.S. military expands its outposts

The move comes as the armed services begin to pull back from Germany, South Korea

WASHINGTON — The U.S. military is quietly expanding its network of small outposts worldwide to help fight terrorism in

Middle Eastern and African hot spots, even as it prepares to send home tens of thousands of troops from Cold War bases in Germany and South Korea.

Among the places the military already has placed or hopes to establish such new "lily pads" or jumping off points: Bulgaria and Romania in Eastern Europe, a pier in Singapore, Azerbaijan in Central Asia, and a tiny island off the oil-rich coast of West Africa.

"Freedom of action" is a term the Pentagon uses to describe the flexibility it seeks, and

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld is to brief senators on the plan today.

When President Bush announced in August that 70,000 troops and 100,000 of their family members in Europe and Asia would move to bases in the United States, much of the public reaction was focused on the historic scale of withdrawal.

Less has been said about the other side of the equation, the calculation that the U.S. military will be better positioned for the war on terrorism if it has a wider range of options for

basing and using troops.

Thus the Pentagon is trying to move away from big concentrations of troops at permanent overseas bases in favor of rotating troops for short tours at training ranges and other remote outposts.

In short, the size, location, and capabilities of the U.S. military overseas are about to undergo the most profound changes since the end of World War II and the Korean War, Douglas Feith, the undersecretary of Defense for policy, said in an interview Wednesday.

2nd American captive's death confirmed

MARIETTA, Ga. (AP) — The family of hostage Jack Hensley has received confirmation that the headless body handed over to U.S. officials in Iraq is his, a family spokesman said Wednesday.

The family was told the news Wednesday, the day Hensley would have turned 49, Cobb County police spokesman Robert Quigley said outside Hensley's Marietta home.

The body was handed over to American authorities in Baghdad, the U.S. Embassy said.

In an interview earlier in the day on NBC's "Today," Hensley's brother, Ty Hensley, said Hensley's wife, Patti Hensley, was "extraordinarily devastated."

"She is a widow now," Ty Hensley said. "She is a mother of a 13-year-old daughter. She's also a caregiver of two mothers. What has fallen upon her is an extraordinary amount of weight."

The body was discovered a day after a posting on an Islamic website had claimed that a militant group in Iraq had slain a second American, presumably Hensley. The group has also said it beheaded fellow U.S. hostage Eugene Armstrong.

Acid rain pollution rises 4 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Emissions of sulfur dioxide, which causes acid rain, rose 4 percent in 2003, but it probably will not compromise long-term air quality goals, the government reported Wednesday.

Coal-fired power plants were the main source of the 10.6 million tons of sulfur dioxide. That total compared with 10.2 million tons in 2002 and reverted to the level from 2001.

Nonetheless, pollution from sulfur dioxide has dropped significantly over the past two decades, from 17.3 million tons in 1980 to 11.2 million tons in 2000, the year before President Bush took office. The total is within striking distance of lawmakers' goal of cutting such emissions to 8.95 million tons by 2010 — about half of the amount in 1980.

The Environmental Protection Agency released the information as part of an annual report required by Congress.

Agency chief Mike Leavitt and other EPA officials attributed the pollution increase last year to market trading, which is one aspect of the program to reduce acid rain. A power plant that has polluted more than it was allowed can buy credits from a plant that is under the limits of its allowable emissions.

Deaths at work rise slightly in 2003

WASHINGTON (AP) — Workplace fatalities in the United States rose slightly to 5,559 last year, with the most deaths occurring in the construction and transportation industries. Latino workers continued to have the highest on-the-job death rate, the Labor Department said Wednesday.

Fatalities in 2003 inched up from 2002, when 5,534 people died on the job — the lowest on record since the survey began in 1992. For both years, the numbers translate to four deaths a year per 100,000 workers.

"American workers remain safer than they were just a few years ago," said John Henshaw, assistant labor secretary for Occupational Safety and Health.

The construction industry had the most deaths — 1,126. The transportation and warehousing sector followed, with 805 deaths last year.

When the number of workers in each industry was considered, the largest death rate was in mining, with approximately 27 per 100,000 workers. Construction had a death rate of 11.7, and transportation and warehousing's rate was 17.5.

The most frequent work-related deaths occurred on highways, with 1,350 last year, a decrease from 1,373 in 2002. Most of the incidents were vehicle and mobile equipment collisions.

Long past time to fix Electoral College

We've said it before, and we'll say it again — the American Electoral College system sucks.

All told, the Bush and Kerry campaigns have spent well over \$200 million by now, sending tens of thousands of advertising spots to Iowa television stations. We merit this attention because, simply put, we are special, or at least our state is. Al Gore and George W. Bush finished within half a percentage point of each other in Iowa in the 2000 popular vote, and that makes it a "swing state," one of 17 around the country in which the 2004 electoral vote winner is not a foregone conclusion. This makes us worthy of the kind of time investment you don't normally see unless somebody is building a rain forest next door.

Across the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers, it's another story. Because Illinois is a "blue state," where Kerry is going to win under any circumstance short of a Reagan-style blowout, there is not much reason to spend money or campaign there. Likewise, west of here a straight line of "red states" stretches from North Dakota to Texas. In these states, President Bush is certain to win no matter how much time or money he or Kerry spends there, so they feel it best not to spend any at all.

The sad thing is, they're right. Because all a candidate has to do to win all 21 of Illinois' electoral votes is perform slightly better than anyone else, Kerry is home free. Of the five most populous American states — California, Texas, New York, Florida, and Illinois — only Florida has been given any real attention in this race, because only Florida remains competitive between both candidates.

The more we consider this system, the worse it gets. Even though 4.5 million Californians voted for George W. Bush in 2000, Al Gore got all 54 electoral votes. And more than 51 percent of Floridians voted for someone other than Bush. But because Bush ended up with 537 more votes than Gore, he

became president. Because states allocate their electoral votes on a winner-takes-all basis that doesn't even require the winner to take a majority, the votes of millions of Americans are routinely ignored.

It doesn't have to be this way. The Electoral College can't be abolished without a constitutional amendment, and while that wouldn't be a bad idea, there is an easier way. Nothing in the Constitution says that the winner in a state needs to get every electoral vote from that state. This year, voters in Colorado will have the option to award theirs proportionally to the popular vote — that is, if Bush wins in a close election, he would receive five of the state's nine electoral votes and Kerry would get the other four.

Unfortunately, while this is an excellent idea in general, it would be terrible for Colorado. Because it is the only state considering such a reform, the new system would basically guarantee the losing party four electoral votes, and the winner's prize would simply be one more. This would severely reduce Colorado's importance in presidential elections relative to other states, which maintain the winner-takes-all strategy.

For this reason, the reform ought to take place nationwide. While proportional apportionment of states' electoral votes is not without its drawbacks, it is far and away a better system than the one we have today. It would render meaningless the idea of red states and blue states, give people a more equal voice in who their president will be, and cut back drastically on the number of campaign ads that swing states such as Iowa are subjected to.

The winner-takes-all system of apportionment dates to the late 1700s, when the elections themselves were optional; more often electors were appointed by the state legislatures, regardless of how the public might feel. But times have changed, and the Electoral College has not changed enough. This November, everyone in America will be voting for the same office, and they deserve the right to have their votes counted in the same way.

A week for divulging

As we continue to deal with non-issues this election season, Dan Rather apologized this week for the false documents that were released questioning G-Dub's National Guard service record.

If we're really going to get so technical about this crap (which at this point is crap compared to the discussions we should be having about the environment and foreign relations), shouldn't we take a look at Bush's record? This isn't the first time it's been called into question, and we certainly have no problem arguing about John Kerry's. Rather may have made a mistake in coming forward too soon, but that doesn't mean he was wrong to examine evidence. And in my opinion, his worst fault is spending time on stuff that doesn't matter.

Rather was wrong. I'm not going to say he wasn't. That would negate everything I dislike about other public figures who won't be honest with me. Rather needs to take full responsibility for himself. But so does Dubya. Full disclosure should be a major part of elections and democracy.

In his apology, Rather explained that the report was initially made in an effort to report news "without fear of favoritism." Whichever side you're on, you'll immediately label him as either doing the right thing by calling Bush on his pathetic record or you'll accuse Rather of partisan reporting. Both arguments are probably right. Dubya does have a lame service record. And Rather might not like Dubya for that. But if you think Dan Rather is a bully for having an opinion, you also can't blame me if I rail against Fox News. Who doesn't have an agenda? Can a reporter really remain nonpartisan? Besides, Rather couldn't have blindly charged forward without approval from CBS. You're yelling at the server because the kitchen screwed up your order. There's a higher authority to blame that's out of sight.

It also isn't fair to yank on Dan because he made one mistake. How much of your political knowledge do you owe to him or at least people similar to him? Consider how much accurate information they give you. Sometimes I get angry with my partner because he makes some small error. Then I realize how wonderful he is the other 99 percent of the time. Will you forever discredit Dan Rather because he brought home the wrong information one night?

So is Rather part of a larger conspiracy? If he is, I can't claim which side could have originated the hoax. Some theorists believe Karl Rove is behind this one, making supposed left-leader Rather look ridiculous and lose credibility right before the election. And if you think this is an attempt from Kerry's side, I think you'd have a hard time finding other fabricated stories from the left that compare with those from the right (Swift Boats, anyone?). And, perhaps to prove the point that this is bigger than CBS, Rather said in an interview, "I've never thought this was about me." In many ways, it is not.

Stanford University communications and political-science Professor Jon Krosnick thought CBS might actually benefit from the debacle. "The fact that a source would choose CBS, even if the source is trying to be manipulative, reinforces the idea that CBS and Rather are major players," he said. It reinforces their roles as major media sources, like it or not.

And yet, while major players are important, one option is to just stop worrying about what the mainstream media are telling you. While CBS can certainly be helpful and has a long history of providing the country with daily news updates, other (even more biased) sources should be examined. In an election, it's crucial to get every side of every issue to make a quality choice. If you read each side's propaganda for what it is, you end up learning a lot.

Debating about military records doesn't address what should be the concerns of this campaign anyway. How will each candidate change your future if he is elected in November?

This week, as a challenge to the pop-culture media's account of what make up elections (dog's names, wives' personalities), I'm going to instead make sure I know the true definitions of "counterinsurgency," "paramilitary," "deregulation," and "reform." Do your homework and don't let Dan Rather or bloggers do it for you. ■

Near the beginning, she quotes, "What is he talking about? It tastes like beer." This is in response to a brewer telling her the recipe is not up to scratch on that particular batch. Her unintelligent reaction perfectly sums up her immensely ignorant and negative attitude to experiencing the differing tastes of quality microbrews.

Craft beer needs as much positive exposure as it can get to reach the masses who think the only products available are mass-produced, chemical- and adjunct-laden beers such as Budweiser, Miller, and Coors. This article is damaging as the taste descriptions are absolute childish nonsense, especially because it is reaching a wide audience of people who could benefit with proper knowledge of the true craft-beer scene, rather than be misled by this inaccurate drivel.

I therefore request that you withdraw Sims' article from your website as soon as possible and in the future request that her material does not ignorantly and unfairly insult skilled craftspeople such as the artisanal brewers who lovingly brewed the products that had the misfortune to end up in her glass.

Sims needs to show some respect to the diverse range of quality ales and lagers that represent centuries of brewing heritage on this planet. With an open mind, she may even find one she likes better than Jack's Old No. 7 whiskey.

Afghan attack kills U.S. soldier

The fatality is the third for American forces in Afghanistan this week

KABUL, Afghanistan — An attack on a patrol killed an American soldier, the third U.S. fatality this week in Afghanistan, the military said Wednesday, amid a flurry of attacks that wounded over a dozen Americans in the run-up to the Oct. 9 presidential election.

Meanwhile, a group of 11 prisoners, including a former Taliban commander, arrived home from the U.S. jail at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba. Another 10 detainees were transferred from Afghanistan to the U.S. naval base, the Pentagon said.

The soldier died in an attack on a security patrol on Monday in Khost province, said Maj. Scott Nelson, a military spokesman, but he provided no further details.

The military had already announced the death of two U.S. troops Monday in another incident — an attack in neighboring Paktika province.

The two were killed by mortar fire when a "large force of anti-coalition militants" attacked a security patrol in Paktika. Six Afghan soldiers were wounded.

The U.S.-led force called in A-10 ground-attack aircraft and a B-1 bomber, which dropped two 500-pound bombs on the attackers. At least nine militants were killed, Nelson said.

U.S.-led troops clashed with militants in eight separate

locations Monday, he said. A total of 14 Americans were injured and one Afghan soldier was listed as missing, he said.

Two Americans wounded by a roadside bomb were being taken to Germany for treatment for "non-life-threatening" injuries, Nelson said. He didn't give details of the other injuries.

More than 900 people have died in political violence across Afghanistan this year, underlining the country's continued instability more than three years after the 9/11 attacks triggered a U.S. campaign to oust the Taliban and their Qaeda allies.

Since then, Taliban holdouts and anti-government factions have sustained an insurgency across the south and east, despite the presence of up to 20,000 U.S.-led troops and an offer of amnesty by President Hamid Karzai to all but a few dozen leaders.

Karzai has released hundreds of Taliban prisoners from Afghan jails ahead of the election, and on Wednesday officials presented 11 Afghans freed from the U.S. prison in Guantánamo Bay, Cuba.

"The prisoners have shown their strong support for the peace-building and reconstruction process of the country and have intended to take active part in it," Karzai's office said.

A U.S. military spokesman said the prisoners were released at the Afghan government's request.

In a statement confirming the releases, the Pentagon said "the decision to transfer or release a detainee is based on many factors, including whether the detainee is of further intelligence value to the United States and whether the detainee is believed to pose a threat to the United States if released."

The released prisoners included Naim Kuchi, a leader

of Afghanistan's nomadic Kuchi tribe, who was detained near Kabul by U.S. forces in January 2003.

Kuchi served as a commander in Logar province during Taliban rule and retained his status as tribal leader after the fall of the hard-line regime.

At the time, the military provided no explanation for his arrest, although human-rights groups said he was detained on suspicion of weapons smuggling.

Paraded briefly at Karzai's downtown palace, Kuchi declined to answer reporters' questions.

Another former prisoner, Bader Zaman Bader, said he was interrogated "150 times" by his American jailers but never abused. However, another from the group, who declined to give his name, insisted he was beaten "incredibly."


U.S. and allied Afghan forces captured thousands of suspected Taliban and Qaeda members during and since the bombing campaign which ousted the Taliban.

Hundreds were classified as "enemy combatants" and transferred to Guantánamo Bay. There are now approximately 549 detainees being held at the U.S. naval base following the latest transfers, the Pentagon said Wednesday.

The Taliban drew much of its support from Pashtuns, Afghanistan's traditional rulers and largest ethnic group, many of whom resent the influence of minorities in the current government.

One of Karzai's main election challengers on Wednesday criticized his reconciliation efforts as "dangerous."

"Don't forget the crimes of the Taliban against the people of Afghanistan," said Mohammed Mohaqeq, a former commander in the anti-Taliban Northern Alliance.

Haitian toll passes 800

U.N. forces fire into the air to keep hungry crowds at bay as workers hand out food

GONAÏVES, Haiti — U.N. peacekeepers fired into the air to keep a hungry crowd at bay Wednesday as aid workers handed out the first food in days for some in this city devastated by floods from Tropical Storm Jeanne. Meteorologists said the storm could strike the United States by this weekend.

It was too soon to tell where or if Jeanne would hit, but the National Hurricane Center in Miami warned people in the northwest and central Bahamas and along the southeast U.S. coast to beware of dangerous surf and rip currents kicked up by Jeanne in the coming days.

At 5 p.m., Jeanne was centered approximately 500 miles east of the Bahamian island of Great Abaco. It was moving west-southwest and was expected to strengthen and turn toward the west in the next 24 hours. Hurricane-force winds extended 45 miles and tropical-storm force winds another 140 miles.

In Haiti, mass burials for the more than 800 victims, with bodies piled outside morgues

raising fears about health, were expected to start after delays forced by public opposition. Many Haitians believe that unless a body is respectfully buried, the spirit may wander, commit evil, and harm family members.

In Gonaïves, the country's hardest-hit and third-largest city, some 1,000 people have been declared missing and authorities say they expect the death toll to rise.

Rescuers pulled bodies from mud and rubble — some still under water five days after Jeanne lashed the area with torrential rains for some 30 hours — then added them to the pile in bodybags that lay in mud and grime in front of three morgues.

Red Cross, government officials and aid workers met Wednesday to discuss how to dispose of the flyblown and decomposing corpses.

On Wednesday, government adviser Carl Murat Cantave revealed they had come up against opposition when Red Cross workers took a truckload of bodies to the Bois Marchand cemetery on Monday and were stoned by residents.

He said police had negotiated

with residents about the health hazards of leaving the corpses unburied and persuaded them to agree. Aid workers said the cemetery is the only one in the city not submerged by floodwaters.

Graveyard manager Bony Jeudy said 78 people have been buried at Bois Marchand, some in mass graves, since Monday.

"They come from all over, mostly on wooden carts. Adults, children and babies. They were brought in by friends, families, and strangers," he said of the bodies.

Dieufort Desloges, spokesman for Haiti's civil protection agency, said about 100 more bodies were found in Gonaïves on Wednesday, raising the nation's death toll to 792.

"That's the exact number but for certain it is more than 800 deaths, with more than 700 in Gonaïves alone, and it will go up," he told the Associated Press.

He said there still were dozens of unrecovered bodies. "There are bodies in the water, in the mud, in collapsed houses and floating in houses that were absolutely covered by the floods."

Suicide bomber kills 2 in Israel

A Palestinian teenage girl set off the explosion, which injured 16

JERUSALEM — A Palestinian teenager blew herself up at a busy Jerusalem bus station Wednesday, killing two Israeli policemen who stopped her for

a security check and wounding 16 bystanders in an attack that evaded Israel's clampdown on the West Bank for the Jewish holidays.

Prime Minister Ariel Sharon, meanwhile, dropped a plan to evacuate 21 Jewish settlements in the Gaza Strip simultaneously at the beginning of next year, reverting to an earlier formula — a staged pullout in the summer of 2005.

That prompted Secretary of State Colin Powell to say Palestinian Prime Minister Ahmed Qureia — and not Palestinian

leader Yasser Arafat — should be empowered to take control of Gaza. Arafat "is not able to act in this manner," Powell said Wednesday. Israel and the United States are boycotting Arafat, the head of the Palestinian Authority.

Sharon also hinted that Israel might one day assassinate Arafat, as it did with two leaders of the Islamic militant group Hamas responsible for scores of suicide bombings.

Al Aqsa Martyrs' Brigades, a violent group with ties to Arafat's Fatah movement, claimed responsibility for

Wednesday's bombing, but it was unclear what would trigger an Israeli move to assassinate Arafat. Israel has not carried out earlier threats despite attacks with dozens of casualties.

The blast at a busy intersection in the French Hill neighborhood of northern Jerusalem destroyed a nearby police post, leaving shards of glass in the road as the smell of burning rubber wafted in the air.

Al Aqsa identified the bomber as Zainab Abu Salem, 19, from the Askar refugee camp near the West Bank city of Nablus.

Report: Qaeda-linked militants trained in Philippines

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A secret government report says Muslim guerrillas in the southern Philippines have hosted terror training camps for militant groups from Indonesia and Malaysia for at least seven years.

The training lasted at least until 19 new members of Jemaah Islamiyah — the Al Qaeda-linked Southeast Asian terror group — finished in January, according to a copy of the government security assessment report obtained Wednesday by the Associated Press.

The report provides insight into the depth and duration of the training of foreigners from Jemaah Islamiyah and other extremist groups at the camps, regarded as a lifeline for Osama bin Laden's Al Qaeda following the destruction of its key training camps in Afghanistan.

U.S. and Australian officials have expressed deep concerns over persistent reports of such camps here, saying Jemaah Islamiyah could pass deadly skills to a new generation of militants capable of striking anywhere. A number of suspected Jemaah Islamiyah militants arrested in Southeast Asia have said they trained in the southern Philippines.

Spotlight stays on Iraq as U.N. General Assembly opens

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — After two years, the United States and the United Nations had hoped to take the spotlight off the bitterly divisive war in Iraq. It didn't happen. At the opening of the U.N. General Assembly, President Bush and U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan sparred over the war that can't escape the headlines.

Annan made news last week when, for the first time, he said the U.S.-led war that toppled Saddam Hussein was "illegal." Bush defended his Iraq policy Tuesday before world leaders and ministers from 191 countries, saying a ruthless dictator had been toppled and Iraq is now "on the path to democracy and freedom."

The secretary-general also took aim at the United States in his General Assembly speech, warning world leaders that basic laws to protect civilians are being "shamelessly disregarded" around the world from Iraq and Sudan to Russia and Uganda.

In his list of violations of the rule of law, he cited "Iraqi prisoners flagrantly abused," clearly a criticism of the U.S. treatment of detainees at Abu Ghraib prison near Baghdad. He also noted, without naming names, that at times "the necessary fight against terrorism is allowed to encroach unnecessarily on civil liberties."

Russian drug unit criticized for tactics

MOSCOW (AP) — When an urgent telephone summons came in to the Bon-Pet clinic last October, Alexander Duka responded as always: He loaded his medical bag and set off in his car, prepared to operate on an injured dog.

But when he arrived at the address and prepared a syringe with the anesthetic ketamine, Duka found himself under arrest in a sting operation conducted by undercover agents of Russia's powerful new drug-fighting agency.

Formed a year ago to bring the full force of the country's law enforcement to bear against a growing drug crisis, the agency — headed by a close friend of President Vladimir Putin from the KGB — has an army of 40,000, four times larger than the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration.

But at a time when Russia is reeling from terror attacks that have killed 1,000 people in the past two years, critics point to the new agency as a study in misplaced priorities and questionable tactics.

Bears secondary suffers another blow

LAKE FOREST, Ill. (AP) — Chicago Bears cornerback Charles Tillman will miss seven to 10 weeks with an injured right knee, a blow to a secondary already stretched thin by injuries to Mike Brown and Jerry Azumah.

Tillman said on Wednesday he has a tibia plateau fracture, a hairline crack in the soft tissue between his right knee and upper leg. Surgery isn't necessary, but he must stay off the leg as much as possible.

"It's very, very small. Nothing extreme. Nothing serious," he said.

But it's a loss Chicago can ill afford, with Brown done for the season with a torn Achilles' tendon and Azumah out indefinitely after having neck surgery. That means the Bears will use a backup secondary Sept. 26 when they take on Daunte Culpepper, Randy Moss, and the Minnesota Vikings.

New hockey league plans to schedule games

TORONTO (AP) — A hockey league formed for locked-out NHL players denies that it suspended play, saying a statement released with league letterhead was not legitimate.

A news release from the Sarnia Sports & Entertainment Centre on Wednesday, with a letterhead from the Original Stars Hockey League, carried the headline: "OSHL Suspends Pre-Season Play." The release said it "plans to take the necessary time to sign additional players, finalize scheduling and sponsorship deals" before continuing play.

It also had a quote from league President Randy Gumbley, saying: "We would like to have had a year to plan this caliber of entertainment. Instead, we've had three weeks."

But Gumbley called an all-sports radio station in Toronto denying that the league was suspending play. The league also told the *Canadian Press* that the news release was not accurate and did not come from the league, and all games would go on as planned, including Wednesday night's game in Kitchener, Ontario.

CBS

'Wardrobe malfunction' cost: \$550,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators on Wednesday fined CBS a record \$550,000 for Janet Jackson's "wardrobe malfunction," which exposed the singer's breast during the Super Bowl half-time show.

The Federal Communications Commission voted unanimously to slap each of the 20 CBS-owned television stations with the maximum indecency penalty of \$27,500. The total penalty of \$550,000 is the largest fine levied against a television broadcaster. Most of the FCC's bigger fines have been against radio stations.

The agency's five commissioners decided not to fine CBS' more than 200 affiliate stations, which also aired the show but are not owned by the network's parent company, Viacom.

The UI refuses to play San Diego State in any sporting event. Hoping to see Iowa face Central Michigan in baseball? Not going to happen. And don't even think about seeing a regular-season Iowa-Florida State football matchup.

Why you ask? Iowa sports teams could easily schedule games with the aforementioned schools, but they are forbidden to do so by the athletics department.

The topic of American Indian mascots was a hot one on many university campuses in the mid-90s, including Iowa's.

Some schools dropped their "offensive" mascots and replacing them with politically correct ones. For example, Marquette dropped "Warriors" in 1994 and became the "Golden Eagles."

In April 1994, the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics passed a policy prohibiting all Iowa sports teams from scheduling nonconference games against any college or university that has an American Indian mascot. The Athletics Board might not have gotten involved in the controversy if it weren't for some Iowa students and faculty members.

"A few American Indian faculty and students brought this topic to the board's attention," said Athletics Director Bob

Golf in running for Olympic inclusion

Olympic committee looks at golf and other sports that may be included in the 2012 Olympics

LONDON — Golf, rugby, squash, karate, and roller sports are in the running for possible inclusion at the 2012 Olympics.

The International Olympic Committee said on Wednesday that it notified those five sports' governing bodies that they will be "studied further" as part of a review of the Summer Games' competition schedule.

The IOC is assessing the 28 sports on the program of last month's Athens Olympics to determine whether changes should be made.

The list of sports will remain the same for the 2008 Beijing Games, with any modifications taking effect in 2012. The IOC will decide on the sports program — and select the 2012 host city — at its session in Singapore in July 2005.

IOC President Jacques Rogge repeatedly has said that sports only will be added if others are dropped. The maximum will stay at 28 sports, with around 10,500 athletes.

In Athens, the IOC formally accepted the criteria for judging which sports should be on the program.

Among the key points are global participation, spectator attendance, media interest, the sport's anti-doping policies, and whether the sport features the world's best athletes in the Olympics.

Removal of a sport requires a vote of the full IOC membership. The last sport dropped from the Summer Olympics was polo in 1936.

In 2002, Rogge proposed that baseball, softball, and modern pentathlon be dropped from the games, and golf and rugby added. But IOC members resisted and put off any vote until after Athens.

The IOC this week sent out a 33-point questionnaire to all 28 Olympic sports federations. The form also went to golf, rugby, squash, karate, and roller sports, which are among the 28 "recognized" federations not on the Olympic program.

The move rules out Olympic status for hopefuls such as bowling, water skiing, billiards, ballroom dancing, chess, bridge, and surfing.

Golf and rugby have been top contenders for Olympic inclusion for a number of years. Karate is seeking to become the latest martial art in the games, which already has judo and tae kwon do.

Marlins fading in playoff chase

MIAMI — Much to the Florida Marlins' regret, Josh Beckett was right. Back in February, even before spring training, Beckett talked about how winning back-to-back championships might be tougher in baseball than in any other sport. Now the reign of Beckett and the Marlins as World Series champs might be about to end.

Florida went into Wednesday's game against Philadelphia 5 1/2 games behind NL wild-card leader San Francisco with 12 to play — the last 10 on the road. Unless there's a dramatic change, the Marlins' season will end Oct. 3, and the 1975-76 Cincinnati Reds will remain the most recent NL team to win consecutive World Series titles.

"You fight all year to try to control your own destiny," center fielder Juan Pierre said. "But we're not in that position because of the way we played earlier in the year."

Jack McKeon's team can blame its failure to return to the postseason on a long slump beginning Memorial Day. The Marlins were 30-20 on May 31 and leading the NL East by two games; over the next 2 1/2 months, they went 26-38 to fall nine games behind Atlanta.

"We didn't get it done the middle third of the season," first baseman Jeff Conine said. "The first third of the season we played great. The last third of the season we're playing great. The middle third we lost all our ground and played terrible."

The dismal stretch included 11-consecutive losses to teams then in last place — Pittsburgh, Montreal, and Arizona.

"That just can't happen for a team that expects to make it to the playoffs," Conine said.

Two deals just before the July 31 trade deadline sparked a resurgence. The Marlins acquired catcher Paul Lo Duca to bolster the offense, and the addition of relievers Guillermo Mota and Rudy Seanez turned a shaky bullpen into a strength.

Beginning in late August, the Marlins ran off seven-consecutive wins to get back into the wild-card race. The timing was reminiscent of the late-season charge in 2003 that propelled Florida to the World Series title.

Then came Hurricane Frances.

On Sept. 3, with the Marlins trailing NL wild-card leader Chicago by 2 1/2 games, the teams were scheduled to open a three-game showdown series in Miami. The storm washed out all three games.

"The biggest setback we had was losing the games with the Cubs because of Hurricane Frances when we were rolling," McKeon said. "We were playing great baseball and then got wiped out for three days. That might have made a big difference in the whole picture."

Not only did the Marlins lose their momentum, but the postponements left Florida with three double-headers and no off days over the final four weeks of the season. And because of Frances and the subsequent Hurricane Ivan, two home games were instead played on the road.

Sweet Olympic story turns sour

Another sweet sports story turned sour with the news that Olympic cycling champion Tyler Hamilton tested positive for blood doping.

Because it almost doesn't matter what happens from here on out.

Cycling insiders will tell you the 33-year-old American was the nicest guy in racing, one of the most deserving, and the last one they thought would get busted. Cynics, meanwhile, simply wink at the notion that anybody that good in such a dirty racket could be clean.

In the past, Hamilton stood up for the rest of his sport. Those words used to carry a lot of weight. This time he was speaking for himself. The sad part is that nobody gets the benefit of the doubt anymore.

"I am 100 percent innocent," he said on Tuesday while awaiting the results of backup tests. "I worked hard for that gold medal, and it isn't going anywhere."

The results of new and improved doping tests in the Athens Olympics last month and at the Spanish Vuelta less than two weeks ago say something else. Both found evidence of blood from another person, a signal that Hamilton received a transfusion, an old-school cycling ruse to boost performance by increasing the amount of oxygen-transporting red blood cells in his system.

Hamilton called that "completely impossible."

"No. 1, that's risking my life," he said, citing the fear of contracting AIDS. "No. 2, that's risking my wife's life. And for someone to accuse me of doing that ... I'm very angry about that."

And he's not the only one. Summing up the mood in the riding community in the States, Editor Steve Madden of *Bicycling* magazine said, "It's a bad day for American cycling if it's true. It's a bad day, in fact, even if it isn't true."

The reason is that stories about Hamilton's

courage, his long-suffering display of loyalty and his sense of fairness as a competitor. The thinking goes that if guys such as Hamilton are dirty, then maybe the cynics have it right — maybe everybody else is, too.

In the 2003 Tour de France, just two years after giving up his job as Lance Armstrong's chief lieutenant on the U.S. Postal squad to lead his own team, Hamilton broke his collarbone in the first stage and rode through the pain to a fourth-place finish.

In stage 15, after Armstrong bumped a spectator's bag early in the climb and crashed, Hamilton raced to the front of the pack, waving his arms and yelling, forcing the other riders to slow and observe the code of honor that says nobody takes advantage of a fallen leader.

Armstrong caught up to the main pack, then raced away with breathtaking swiftness, winning that day's race and setting the stage for the fifth of his six straight Tour titles. When Hamilton won the next day's race with a show of grit that defied everyone's expectations, Armstrong called it "the biggest day of the Tour."

Now those heroics, as well as the Olympic win that Hamilton called the "highlight of my career, by far," are tainted. Where once we marveled at human achievement, we now immediately suspect better living through chemistry.

So it should come as no surprise that rumors about Hamilton were already making the rounds. According to one, an analysis of his time-trial win in Athens revealed Hamilton's "wattage" numbers — basically, a measurement of how much energy a rider produces and translates to the pedals — were significantly higher than normal.

His sponsor, a Swiss company named Phonak, said Tuesday it was standing behind Hamilton but qualified that support a day later.

Phonak Chairman Andy Rihs had said that even another round of positives in Hamilton's backup tests would not

necessarily convince him the rider was guilty of doping.

"I don't fire innocent people," Rihs said Tuesday. "For me, Tyler is innocent as long as no one proves the contrary."

But on Wednesday, the team released a statement under the heading "We believe Tyler," in which it said, "we have to concentrate on the facts. These seem to speak against Tyler. But so long as we're not 100 percent certain that he's guilty of manipulation," Rihs continued, "we will believe him."

Immediately below the statement, however, Phonak said,

Hamilton's suspension would hold "pending further notice" until tests and proceedings are completed.

"If Hamilton is not able to prove his innocence, then the contract will be canceled effective immediately," the statement said.

A few others will withhold judgment, but not many. Three gold medalists in Athens have already been stripped, and Hamilton would become the first American caught by drug testers. The concept of innocent until proven guilty still holds sway in a court of law here, but not in the court of public opinion.

The problem with the policy is that some teams have been inconsistent following it. The bigger market sports such as football, basketball, and even wrestling have done a good job avoiding teams with American Indian mascots, but some smaller sports have accidentally scheduled these forbidden matchups.

The policy garnered very little discussion until the baseball team canceled a game against the Braves of Bradley University last spring. However, Iowa faced the Braves in 2002 and 2003,

proving the policy is not strictly enforced and followed. Although Bradley dropped its Indian logo, the "Braves" name still portrays American Indians.

Iowa head baseball coach Jack Dahm explained why the confusion occurred.

"When I was hired as head coach, the 2004 schedule was already made by the old coach [Scott Broghamer]," Dahm said. "When we found out that Bradley was the Braves, we immediately dropped the game."

In 2003, the Iowa field-hockey team took on the Chippewas of Central Michigan. The team was supposed to play Central Michigan on Sept. 12 this year

but was forced to drop the game because of the policy.

There are only 13 schools in all NCAA divisions that still have American Indian mascots, and the policy has been in place for 10 years. So why do scheduling mishaps continue to occur?

"With new coaches coming into the Iowa program, they are not fully aware of the policy when they make their schedules," Bowlsby said. "But it shouldn't be that hard to avoid 13 teams."

required during the next few months before a permanent coach is named.

"It's a very stressful experience," she said. "I've never done this before, and it's really hard to be on your own."

To go along with Neykova's challenge of developing the young Iowa talent, she also has to balance her academic schedule. The 25-year-old received her economics degree from Iowa in 2002 and recently began graduate course work in athletics administration. This does nothing but increase the list of priorities on her daily agenda.

"I have to juggle everything. School, work, going to practice, planning trips, and recruiting," she said.

Neykova is trying to keep the on-court atmosphere as

close as possible to mentor Wardlaw's. He often simulated ways to perform under pressure.

"I've kind of adopted everything and tried to convey it to the women who are here right now," she said. "I know it's going to help them because it helped me."

Sophomore All-Big Ten No. 2 singles player Hillary Mintz agreed that the techniques are effective, and she has a lot of faith in Neykova heading the team.

"We wouldn't want to have anyone else but Toni right now," she said. "She has learned college tennis from Paul [Wardlaw], and this has worked pretty well."

Learning the college tennis game in the United States is something that Neykova had to adjust to when she first came to play for the Hawkeyes. The adjustment of playing a team style of tennis

as opposed to the individual style in Bulgaria was one that came with some difficulties during her freshman year playing doubles in the Big Ten.

"I was sort of against my teammates in the beginning because we were fighting for spots, but at the same time, I wasn't realizing that I'm also trying to help them," she said. "That was the hardest adjustment."

Now she has to adjust to the United States style of play as a head coach. Mintz is confident that Neykova will be more than capable of taking care of business when the fall season kicks off this weekend at the Furman Invitational.

"She knows all of our games," Mintz said. "We're making the best of the situation, and it's going pretty well so far."

Prostate drug added to banned list

LONDON (AP) — A drug used for prostate problems and hair loss was added to the World Anti-Doping Agency's list of banned substances.

Finasteride, which also goes by the brand name Proscar, can work as a masking agent to conceal performance-enhancing drugs.

The change was among the decisions approved Tuesday at a meeting of agency's executive committee in Montreal. In addition, intravenous injections will be explicitly banned except for legitimate medical purposes, and certain substances prescribed for asthma will be prohibited

outside competition. Previously, they had been banned only during competition.

The new banned list will take effect Jan. 1.

"The changes we have made this year reflect our expanding scientific knowledge and our ability to better identify performance enhancing substances and methods," agency President Dick Pound said.

76ers center

MacCulloch retires

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia 76ers center Todd MacCulloch retired Wednesday, ending an attempted comeback

from foot problems that sidelined him the last 1 1/2 seasons.

MacCulloch, 28, hasn't played since February 2003 because of Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease, a genetic disorder that disrupts his balance.

MacCulloch had surgery in January on his left foot to free up a crushed nerve, leaving him hopeful of a recovery and perhaps a similar procedure on his right foot. Instead, there was no progress.

The 7-foot MacCulloch was Philadelphia's second-round pick in 1999. After two seasons with the Sixers, he signed with New Jersey, then was traded back to Philadelphia in 2002 along with Keith Van Horn in the deal that sent Dikembe Mutombo to the Nets.

After a worst-to-first championship season in 2003, the **DETROIT SHOCK** limp into this year's playoffs without their top scorer, Swin Cash. They won their last three games of the season, and had to win their final game for another shot at the title.

Shock ready to defend WNBA championship

NEW YORK — The Detroit Shock's bid for a second-straight WNBA championship is looking anything but easy. They're without leading scorer Swin Cash, and they needed a win on the last day of the regular season to grab the final playoff berth.

Under coach Bill Laimbeer, the Shock engineered a worst-to-first turnaround a year ago, going from the fewest wins to a league-best 25-9 record en route to their first title. They went back to struggling this season, only winding up 17-17 by closing with three-straight victories.

Detroit will host the New York Liberty in Game 1 as the postseason starts Friday night. Los Angeles is at Sacramento in that night's other game, while the other series begin Saturday: Connecticut at Washington and Seattle at Minnesota.

The Shock's Cash is sidelined for all of the playoffs with a torn ligament in her left knee. Sixth in the league in scoring average at 16.4 points, she averaged 6.5 rebounds and 4.2 assists in 32 games before hurting her knee at Phoenix on Sept. 11.

"We have a significant injury. However, we have other great players," Laimbeer said. "You look at the Eastern Conference, and our interior post play, we think, is the best, with Cheryl Ford, Ruth Riley, and Barbara Farris. That's going to be our strength."

Indeed, the Shock still have three double-digit scorers in Riley — Cash's U.S. Olympic teammate and last year's Finals MVP — and All-Stars Ford and Deanna Nolan.

"They are a great team, even with Cash out," New York coach Pat Coyle said. "They are defending champions, and we have great respect for them."

The Liberty (18-16) also finished the season with three wins to be seeded No. 2 in the Eastern Conference, one year after missing the playoffs for just the second time. Coyle replaced the fired Richie Adubato in July after New York lost eight of nine games to drop to 7-9.

With a figure-skating show scheduled at the Palace of Auburn Hills, the opener of the best-of-three series will be at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit. Second-seeded New York will then host Game 2 and, if necessary, Game 3. The teams split their four games this

season, with each team winning twice at home.

In the West, the Los Angeles Sparks (25-9) overcame an injury to one of their key players and a midseason coaching change to finish with the league's best record.

They're aiming for a fourth-straight trip to the WNBA Finals: The Sparks won consecutive titles in 2001-02, then lost to Detroit in the championship series last year.

Michael Cooper left midway through his fifth season as coach of the Sparks, joining the Denver Nuggets as an assistant. He was replaced by his assistants Ryan Weisenberg and Karleen Thompson, who became the Sparks' co-coaches. Los Angeles, 14-6 with Cooper, was even more dominant after his departure, winning 11 of 14 games.

Sparks star Lisa Leslie finished third in the league in scoring (17.6 points) and first in rebounding (9.9). Mwadi Mabika averaged 14.4 points, and guards Nikki Teasley and Tamecka Dixon barely missed averaging double-digits in scoring, too.

Forward DeLisha Milton-Jones, averaging 9.4 points and 4.7 rebounds, injured her knee just before Cooper left and skipped playing in the Olympics.


The Sparks and Monarchs (18-16) split their four-game season series, with each team winning once on the opponent's court. Sacramento won its last three games to take the fourth seeding in the conference.

The other West series pits the Seattle Storm (20-14), led by the league's leading scorer and defending MVP Lauren Jackson, against the Minnesota Lynx (18-16). The 6-5 Jackson averaged 20.5 points and hit 45 percent of her 3-pointers, second in the league among players attempting at least 100.

In the East, the top-seeded Connecticut Sun (18-16) will face the Mystics (17-17), who earned a playoff berth despite playing without three-time All-Star Chamique Holdsclaw in 12 of their last 13 games. Holdsclaw is out for the rest of the year with a medical problem, but neither she nor the team has said exactly what it is.

Katie Douglas, Connecticut's 3-point shooting leader, took an elbow to the face during practice Wednesday. Sun coach Mike Thibault was unsure if the injury would keep her out of the series.

The Houston Comets, winners of the league's first four titles from 1997-2000, missed the playoffs for the first time.

Defiant Bledsoe answers his critics

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. — A defiant Drew Bledsoe provided a stern response to those questioning whether he's still capable of leading the Buffalo Bills.

"I'm the quarterback here. And I'm going to be the quarterback here," he said after practice Wednesday. "The players on the team know that. The coaches know that. And that's just simply the way it is."

Bledsoe's comments came during the Bills' bye week and as the team attempts to regroup after opening the season with consecutive 13-10 losses to Oakland and Jacksonville. They were in response to a growing number of critics who have begun to question his age and ability to lead the offense, which has yet to shake last season's troubles.


"That's the nature of this position," said Bledsoe, 32, referring to the criticism. "When we win, I'm going to get more credit than I deserve. And when we lose, I'm going to take a lot of it. ... I understand that."

"If I couldn't handle that, I wouldn't be here 12 years into a career still fighting to win football games."

Bledsoe's fight has been a losing battle of late.

Including both games this season, he has lost 12 of his last 16 starts and five straight. More disturbing is he's coming off the worst season of his career, and he has not had 200 or more yards passing in his last six outings.

That's a significant drop for a

player who set 10 franchise records in 2002, his first season in Buffalo after being traded by New England. And it's a troubling stretch for a four-time Pro Bowl selection who has won only 14

times in 34 starts with the Bills.

Long forgotten is the day Bledsoe arrived in Buffalo to be greeted by a couple of thousand fans and a marching band.

Bledsoe and the offense were

blamed for much of last year's disappointing 6-10 record, a season in which he was sacked an NFL-high 49 times and failed to generate a touchdown in seven games.

Eagles' Owens silent about Mariucci

PHILADELPHIA — Finally, there's a topic the loquacious Terrell Owens won't discuss: Steve Mariucci.

Owens, who often feuded with Mariucci during his six seasons in San Francisco, will see his former coach when the Philadelphia Eagles visit the Detroit Lions on Sept. 26 in a matchup of 2-0 teams.

"I don't want to talk about Mooch," Owens said Wednesday. "I'm not playing against Mooch. I'm playing against the Detroit Lions."

Owens' relationship with Mariucci became strained when the star receiver had a pair of infamous touchdown celebrations at the center of Texas Stadium in a game against Dallas in 2000. After both of his touchdown catches, Owens ran to midfield to dance on the Cowboys' famed star logo, sparking a melee. Owens was fined by the NFL and was suspended by Mariucci for one game.

"We had different views on that issue," Mariucci said in a conference call.

The suspension catalyzed months of bad feelings between the two, and they never mended their relationship. Mariucci, however, stood by Owens after another one of his innovative touchdown celebrations two years later.

After scoring during a Monday-night victory in Seattle,

Owens pulled a pen out of his sock, autographed the ball, and presented it to his financial adviser in the front row.

"He was cordial enough to give someone a ball," Mariucci said then. "There weren't any obscene gestures, there was no taunting toward the bench or the crowd."

Owens' issues with Mariucci went deeper than his dramatic celebrations. Owens criticized teammates, particularly quarterback Jeff Garcia, questioned the play-calling when he didn't get enough passes, and was known for his sideline tirades.

He once stirred up controversy when he said the team didn't have a "killer instinct" because Mariucci opted to run out the clock in a 10-point victory against Washington.

Fittingly, in Mariucci's last game with the 49ers, a 31-6 loss to Tampa Bay in the second round of the 2002 playoffs, Owens screamed at the sideline and slapped his helmet in disbelief as the coach elected to run out the final 50 seconds of the first half instead of attempting to cut their 28-6 deficit.

Mariucci insists his memories of Owens are fond ones.

"What you know about T.O. is that when he comes to practice and when he comes to play, he gives you his all," Mariucci said. "That's what we asked and that's what we hope for from all of our players is that he gives you a full day's work, and he certainly does that."

Dolphins think win can turn things around

DAVIE, Fla. — There's a wide range of moods surrounding the winless Miami Dolphins these days, including frustration, disappointment, and plenty of anger. There's also the belief that just one win would turn the season around.

"People are frustrated, but at the same time, we can't take that frustration and put it upon ourselves," left tackle Damon McIntosh said. "We need to channel it and put it on the next team that we're going to play, hope to come up with our first win, and start a chain reaction."

McIntosh will make his first start Sept. 26 when the Dolphins host Pittsburgh (1-1), a move Miami coach Dave Wannstedt made in hope of creating the spark that leads to some sort of working offensive combination. Wade Smith, who started all 16 games for Miami last year and both losses this season, will head to the bench.

Smith gave up two sacks in Miami's Week 2 loss to Cincinnati, a 16-13 defeat that sent the Dolphins to 0-2 for the first time since 1988. No Miami team has ever started with two losses

and wound up over .500 or in the playoffs.

"Going into camp this year, they said they'd put the five best out there" on the offensive line, Smith said. "I personally haven't been performing up to the level that I can perform, so they had to make a change."

They need to make many, and fast.

Miami's defense — which still counts itself among the NFL's elite, and rightly so — has allowed only one touchdown in two games, and that was set up by an interception thrown by Jay Fiedler in the opener against Tennessee.

Fiedler was replaced by A.J. Feeley, who has thrown two interceptions that were returned for scores. The running game, missing the suddenly retired Ricky Williams, has been the worst in the league through two


weeks, gaining only 90 yards — and not even a single first down in the loss to Cincinnati. Matt Turk was called upon to punt 10 times, one shy of the team record.

Cornerback Sam Madison and tight end Randy McMichael both threw fits on the sideline during that game, with Madison's tirade seemingly directed solely in Feeley's direction. Nerves are clearly fraying, the byproduct of a tumultuous off-season spiraling downward into a terrible start of the regular season.

"As a group, we've got to somehow find a way to get it done," said Feeley, who's completed 42 of 70 passes for 386 yards. "We haven't done that yet. I wouldn't single out the O-line guys. They're fine. They're doing their thing."

Stats would disagree. Lamar Gordon is the team's leading rusher with 54 yards on 31 carries this season. Miami already has been flagged for 21 penalties for 140 yards; the Dolphins' opponents have committed 10 penalties for 74 yards. And the team is already minus-4 in turnover ratio.

"We just have to stick together," Gordon said. "You know it can't

A David Lynchian vision for the world

The acclaimed filmmaker will speak on world peace at a conference in Fairfield, Iowa

Iowa's about to get a strange visitor. David Lynch is best known for his dark and perplexing films in which everything is revealed and nothing is explained, but on Sept. 26, he will speak in Fairfield, Iowa, on a lighter subject — creating peace. "Conflicts grow out of negativity, the darkness — and darkness is not anything, it is the absence of something, and negativity can't live in the light of peace," Lynch

told *The Daily Iowan* in a phone interview. Lynch will talk as a guest speaker at the Creating Peace Conference at the Maharishi University of Management. In 1973, when anger took hold of his life, transcendental meditation took him on a journey to an "ocean of oneness, with pure bliss, harmony, and universal love." The ancient Vedic tradition of enlightenment and knowledge in India was passed down as a visionary solution for peace from 92-year-old Indian guru Maharishi Mahesh Yogi.

Here they don't come, Miss America

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Skimpily swimsuits, a shortened telecast, and a last-woman-standing talent competition couldn't help Miss America's TV ratings.

A record-low 9.8 million people watched the Sept. 18 pageant, around 500,000 fewer than last year, continuing a trend that threatens the event's future on network television.

Broadcast by ABC, Miss America was television's most-watched program for the night, according to

Nielsen Media Research, drawing a 6.4 rating and a 12 share.

The show, which culminated in the crowning of Miss Alabama Deirdre Downs as Miss America 2005, had some new wrinkles. Chief among them: shaving an hour off the three-hour telecast and speeding up its pace.

'TOON-ing IN

Costumed freaks and cartoon geeks descend upon Des Moines for the 2004 Anime Iowa Convention

DES MOINES — Shrieks pierced the air as Zach Nagatz tore open his red trench coat to reveal his white boxers printed with red hearts during the masquerade in the 2004 Anime Iowa Convention on Sept. 18.

He was dressed as Vash the Stampede, a character from the Japanese animated series "Trigun Maximum," although many call him "Hot Vash." The striptease was not the Cedar Rapids resident's first, however. This was his third Anime Iowa convention, and he has gone to several others.

"It's kind of my thing," Nagatz, 19, said. "Hopefully, I'll have a new thing next year."

He was not the only crowd favorite. Another returning performer was William English IV, who was dressed as Sakura, the 10-year-old female lead of "Card Captor Sakura."

He started attending conventions in 2001, when a friend dragged him to Anime Central in Chicago.

His first thought was, "You guys are all weirdoes." However, he did learn something: "I just found out one day that I like wearing puffy stuff. This is the best place to do it."

Both Nagatz and English are fans of Japanese comics — manga — and animated shows — anime. Both performed at the Hotel Fort Des Moines on Sept. 18 in the central event of Anime Iowa, the costume play, or cosplay.

Anime Iowa is one of the largest fan-run conventions and the longest-running anime convention in the Midwest. It was first held in 1997 in Iowa City's Highlander Inn. Approximately 150 people attended. In 1999, the event moved to Cedar Rapids as its size grew. In 2003, 1,605 people showed up. This year was the first year for Anime Iowa in Des Moines, and it drew an estimated 1,600 attendees.

In cosplay, people may perform individually or in teams for 30

seconds onstage, and the best performers are awarded trophies. The contest has categories for amateurs, experienced costume-makers, and children.

While the cosplay was a big part of the convention, there were other activities as well. The dealers' room was the place to find anime, manga, Japanese snack food, weapons, and stuffed toys, among other things. Companies specializing in Japanese products

did steady business throughout the convention.

Other events included panel discussions and workshops on various topics, such as Japanese culture, painting animation cels, drawing and sculpting, and making props. Video rooms played episodes from various animes, and an art auction sold fan-made artwork.

For UI graduate student **ERICA CHINN**, dance is a religious experience. Her thesis concert will bring spiritual forms to life, along with pieces about the forces of love and fairy tales of perception.

Dancing with a fragmented spirit

For some, dance is an artistic experience. For graduate student Erica Chinn, it is more of a religious experience, and two out of three dances that will feature her in her thesis concert have distinctly spiritual undertones.

"Ark," choreographed by dance Associate Professor Charlotte Adams, will highlight Chinn in a modern piece about the wife of the biblical character Noah. The piece is based on a poem by Christopher Merrill, the director of the International Writing Program. Merrill wrote the poem "Ark" specifically for Adams' piece. The work also features music by UI graduate student Michael Cash.

Chinn will also be featured in "I Owe You ... From My Heart to Yours," a lyrical piece that she choreographed with Gordette Brent, Kendra Cornett, and Lynna Hollis. The dance voices Chinn's "appreciation of God" and stands as personal expression of religion and its influence in her life. Set to "Praise Offering" by Kierra "KiKi" Sheard, Chinn said much of the choreography was influenced by the lyrics, which also aided her in expressing gratitude through movement.

"11 Moments" is a piece that developed out of a discussion between Chinn and UI dance graduate student Daniel Stark about Chinn's experiences at the university. The dance, which will be performed without musical accompaniment, consists of vignettes representing a series of memories cut apart by "fragmented" perception.

"[It] tries to capture a part of the essence we experience when looking into the past, being in the present, and mov-

ing into the future," Chinn said.

Although most of her works in this show involve spiritual themes, the concert will also showcase a smattering of pieces by UI graduate students Gretchen Alterowitz and Tom Truss, and Diego Carrasco, that have little to do with religion.

Truss' piece, "Tsunami," set to music by Prokofiev, is about the forces of love. Carrasco's piece, "Migration," originally based on a fairy tale about brothers transforming into birds, has since evolved into an experimental piece evaluating the effects of lighting on the audience's perception.

Chinn will perform at 8 p.m. today, Friday and Saturday in North Hall's Space/Place. Tickets are available in advance at the University Box Office or at the door for \$12 general seating, \$6 for UI students.

A new kind of musical bridge

Three bands in Iowa City transcend the differences of age-related genres for the simple cause of making music

Music can bridge generational divides and transcend the boundaries between genres. The notion is evident here in Iowa City, where many age groups and cultures participate in the Iowa City Jazz Festival or the local music scene.

Today, as pundits try to dissect the differences among baby boomers, baby busters, the '60s generation, Generation X, and the millennial generation, one thing that connects these groups is music in its simplest form.

One Iowa City favorite is the "Post Rock" music of Marah-Mar. "Post Rock [New Wave] is basically what this group represents," said guitarist and computer techno

artist Mike Samos. "It's a chance to show our audiences that instrumental music can exist in the rock world, especially when you rethink the structures of jazz and infuse it with classical music."

This four-member band, which liberally underscores melodic moods of instrumentation, also consists of the spirited guitarist Mike Kvidera, jazz-trained drummer and keyboardist Daniel Murphy, and cellist Jessica Fischhoff. This Generation X, 20-something group just recently celebrated its one-year anniversary.

"Electronics and the blend of jazz and classical have been big with bands in England for a while now. Therefore, it's no coincidence to finally see it take off here," Samos said.

Marah-Mar took its name from the modernist poet Hilda Doolittle. Marah is the Hebrew word for bitter and Mar is the Spanish word for sea.

"When used appropriately, it's the recombination of mythology and culture," Samos said. "We like to evoke the image that our music represents a 'swelling sea,' and all its instrumental liaisons add necessary fundamental qualities by not being confined to any one single musical idiom."

He added that a band never knows what to expect when performing in Iowa City.

"Most audiences come to see the music, and others focus on it as a social event," he said. "However, it's easy to get by here, which allows time to spend on one's art."

Marah-Mar will play a short set today at "Spatial Relations II," a blend of sonic and visual electronic experience at 8 p.m. at the Museum of Art.

Also representing the Iowa City music scene is the Funkdaddies. Slated as one of the Midwest's "hippest" bands, this group demonstrates that old school soul/funk still exists today. Having just completed its summer tour and local performances at area clubs, the band will play at Flannigan's in Coralville on Oct. 30 for its Halloween party.

Percussionist/drummer Ken Duncan and bass player Larry Weldon set out to put together this 1970s funk-show band a little over a year ago.

They added keyboard player

"The Motown phenomenon pushed us, and we want everyone to know that great music never dies," Duncan said. Even though such artists as Earth, Wind, and Fire, Average White Band, Stevie Wonder, and the Commodores influenced the group's style, it was the early 1970s band Tower of Power that laid the ground work for the Funkdaddies.

Hip-hop and R&B group 456 is also out to find its voice and make a splash on Iowa City's music scene. Having recently performed at Public Space One and the Iowa State Fair, this millennial generation of determined teenagers — three of whom attend Iowa City high schools —

are in tune with what listeners want to hear. Lashard Davis, Lashaun Davis, D. J. Darnes, and senior member Darrell Morris capitalize on freestyling and writing lyrics that represent a concept.

"We do good music for everybody to love. Rap and R&B gives our listeners something to vibrate to," said Trent Donohue, the manager of 456. "This type of music has been incorporated into every club across America"

Donohue says 456 wants to broaden people's imagination. "You get out of it what you put into it. If you just want to make a song, then make a song. If you want to make a difference, then make a statement."

Exuberance from the islands

Reggae music is often called the music of the islands. It's infused with punctuated beats and spiraling rhythmic patterns that invite a freedom to explore a most continuous dance party.

Iowa City's own reggae-inspired band, Public Property — will perform Saturday at 9 p.m. at the Yacht Club, 13 S. Linn St. — perpetuates that exuberance.

"As we have grown as a group, our crowds have grown also," said David Bess, the lead vocalist and guitarist. "Our music inspires people to dance, groove, and have fun."

"Maharishi's gift is a technique, a key that opens up the door within — it's unbounded and eternal," Lynch said. "The experience of transcendental meditation enlivens as it grows within the individual, making life better."

A more advanced form of transcendental meditation is yogic flying, in which the body lifts up and moves forward in short hops, during which the Maharishi and his followers believe the brain produces maximum coherence and wave activity that can be felt worldwide in an effort of creating a universal consciousness of peace.

"The keyword is unity, and in this field called the unified field, of which our modern scientists discovered, but Vedic science is eternal and has always known about it. It's unmanifest; it creates all things," Lynch said. "All it needs to be is enlivened through unity, a place where we do not meet our enemies, but we meet friends — so we need to build a group of 8,000 and let it grow."

The reference to the number 8,000 sounds like the perfect plot for one of his movies — it is the square root of 1 percent of the world's population. For many Maharishi peace advocates, it will take 8,000 people actively participating in transcendental meditation and yogic flying to produce perpetual world peace.

While these politically charged times of international violence may make peace seem impossible, a 1993 study reportedly paved the way for documented results of transcendental meditation's power. The study was conducted in Washington, D.C.,


where a group practiced meditation for one month and then stopped, said Ken Chawkin of media relations at the Maharishi University.

There was a drop in violent crime by 25 percent.

"There's plenty of misunderstandings, no one listens to each other, and there's wild confusion, but there is nothing done beyond the surface of life — we need to enliven unity. And as Maharishi says, don't fight the darkness, just turn on the light," Lynch said.

Other speakers at the Sept. 26 conference include Dr. Robert Muller, a former assistant secretary-general of the United Nations, Dr. John Hagelin, the director of the Institute of World Peace at the Maharishi University of Management and president of the U.S. Peace Government, and Dr. Maureen McCue of the UI College of Public Health and a member of Physicians for Social Responsibility. They will be joined by artists and musicians to dedicate the day to national peace-creating strategies. Registration is available online at creatingpeace.mum.edu.

Wimbledon tells a simple enough tale without blowing stuff up. Peter Colt (Paul Bettany, *Master and Commander*) is an aging tennis pro once ranked 11th in the world but now placed around 157th. He's playing in Wimbledon as a wild card, and regardless if he wins or not (and he's confident that some zit-faced kid will vanquish him early on), he's retiring. No one seems to care.

Enter Lizzie Bradbury (Kirsten Dunst), a tennis star with the looks of Anna Kournikova, the skills of Serena

Williams, the chutzpah of John McEnroe, and the sexual cravings of your average frat boy. Colt's attitude changes.

What follows next is cookie-cutter predictability that still manages to be cute. Girl meets boy. Boy starts winning. Girl and boy have casual sex. Boy wins more. Girl and boy fall in love. Boy qualifies for the final round; girl does not. Relationship problems ensue. Do girl and boy get back together? Are you reading English at this very moment?

Wimbledon demonstrates that good acting and directing can triumph over tired writing. Bettany has been doing fantastic supporting work for years.

And soon you will all be lighting candles at his worship altar, because Bettany earns his leading-man license with *Wimbledon*. He displays impeccable comic timing and brings enough dandy Englishman charm for the whole family to enjoy, yet gives Colt a vulnerable insecurity that creates a fully realized character that, gosh darn it, makes you really like him. Simply, Bettany rules this film.

Director Richard Loncraine also helps by infusing the tennis matches with more energy than the sport deserves. Utilizing *Matrix*-like effects (but restraining from making them obnoxiously flashy), Loncraine

often attaches the camera to the ball in order to show us the moment of impact that determines a match's outcome. It's much cooler looking than anything in *Resident Evil: Apocalypse*.

So men, avoid *Resident Evil*, save the money, and take a date to *Wimbledon*. Your significant other may thank you for it. And hey, you might like it, too. If so, be a man, and confess it out loud.






