## Bush, in Iowa, touts tax cuts

### Bush says Kerry to raise taxes

CLIVE, Iowa — George Bush rehashed week-old debate themes Monday, launching criticism aimed at John Kerry's "global test" and deficient tax proposals to cover increased spending.

A crowd of approximately 2,000 supporters gathered in this Central Iowa town for the president's 16th visit to the hotly contested battleground state he narrowly lost in 2000. Democratic presidential candidate Kerry is in Tipton today for a town-hall meeting.

Bush juggled Kerry's recent debate remarks in turn, touting his own foreign policy before railing against his rival's litmus test for entering pre-emptive military endeavors abroad.

"Can you imagine taking an international poll of nations to determine whether or not we need to protect you?" Bush said. He later juxtaposed Kerry's vote against the use of force in the first Gulf War to the senator's stance in Iraq today. Bush said his father garnered a large coalition that "under any scrutiny" would pass the global test.

"The policies of my opponent are dangerous for world peace," Bush said.

The president also assailed Kerry's remark that the war in Iraq is a "grand diversion" from the war on terror.

## Bush signs tax bill with Grassley

DES MOINES — President Bush visited the swing state of Iowa on Monday to sign the Working Families Tax Relief Act of 2004, which he said would mean lower tax bills for 94 million Americans.

"It comes at just the right time for America. Some of the provisions were set to expire at the end of 2004 ..." he said. "That would have been a setback for hard-working families of America and a setback for our economy."

Bush introduced Mike and Sharla Hintz, a couple from Clive, whom he said benefited from his tax plan. Last year, because of the enhanced child tax credit, they received an extra \$1,600 refund, Bush said. With other tax cuts in the bill, they saved \$2,800 on their income taxes.

They used the money to buy a wood-burning stove to more efficiently heat their home, made some home improvements, and went on a vacation to Minnesota, the president said.

### BUSH'S TAX RELIEF

Amid soaring budget deficits, Bush signed the \$145.9 billion "tax-relief" bill that will:

- Keep the per-child tax credit at \$1,000 for five years.
- Continue to allow more of taxpayers' income to be taxed at 10 percent, the lowest rate, for six years.
- Retain for four years a provision giving married couples relief from the so-called marriage penalty.

## Bar owners given 2 weeks to create a plan or face 21-only

A group of bar owners have two weeks to develop a self-governance plan for the Iowa City City Council, which the proprietors hope will be an alternative to raising the bar-entry age to 21, councilors decided Monday.

The council agreed to delay official discussion of the alcohol ordinance two weeks at the owners' request. The group, led by Bo-James owner Leah Cohen, will present its plan to reduce underage and excessive drinking downtown at the next council meeting.

Some bar owners fear losing business if the entry age after 10 p.m. is raised from 19 to 21. Iowa City police recommended the move in a review of a 19-ordinance, which the council passed in August 2003.

The council appears to be split 3-3 on the alcohol ordinance, with a seventh councilor, Connie Champion, still undecided.

She said the presentation could sway her opinion one way or another

because she has heard perspectives of every major group involved except the bar owners.

"It's up to them to come up with the solution, or I'll come up with the solution for them — which will be 21," she said.

The bar owners' plan calls for a board consisting mostly of owners of 21-only bars to monitor establishments that allow underage patrons to enter. To prevent underage and excessive drinking, the group would notify the city and police of bars not in compliance with rules set by the board, said Cohen, whose bar admits customers ages 21 and up.

She added that regulations might include banning certain drink specials and requiring bars to use slogans such as "19 to socialize, 21 to drink" in advertising.

"This idea of a drastic change is a concern," she said. "It could change the entire ambience of our city by going 21. We don't know what would happen to downtown."

## Car bombs blast Iraq; 24 dead, 100s injured

Some say situation worsening by the hour

BAGHDAD — Of the four car bombs that exploded in Iraq on Monday, it was the concussive detonation on Baghdad's crowded Saadoun Street that left Muhammed Ahmed suddenly all by himself in his third-grade classroom.

"All the students ran away," said Muhammed, 8, who though frightened, found himself making his way with his book bag to the scene of explosion "to see what happened."

A pickup truck loaded with explosives had barreled into a convoy of SUVs, which have become the most conspicuous targets in Baghdad because they invariably carry foreigners. The truck's charred chassis littered the street, along with gnarled hunks of metal and rubber, the shining gravel of burst window glass, a human head, and other body parts.

"I always fear when I see the explosion scenes on TV, but now I see it live," Muhammed said. "I didn't know it would be this scary."

## Vote pairing alive and well in presidential election

*The system uses swapping to support independent candidates but not swing the election to Bush*

Recollections of the 2000 presidential election debacle have loomed in UI Campus Greens member Ethan Grundberg's head as he struggles to decide whether to vote for a third-party candidate or to vote for Democrat John Kerry and sacrifice some of his political ideals.

This year, he has yet another option to consider as he contemplates how to cast his ballot. Vote pairing, a system that allows voters to show support for third-party candidates without "spoiling" the outcome of the presidential race, overcame legal challenges from its debut four years ago to return for another appearance this election season.

Under the strategic vote-casting method, a person in Iowa, which is teetering between President Bush and Kerry, would agree to vote for Kerry in exchange for a vote for independent candidate Ralph Nader in a more secure Democratic state, such as California. This would put a candidate such as Nader closer to the 5 percent of the national

# Judge refuses to drop vehicular-homicide charge

Thomas Eldridge, who is accused of striking and killing a UI junior with a vehicle last fall while high on marijuana, has one remaining chance to have a vehicular-homicide charge dropped after a district judge on Monday shot down his attempt to have one of the felonies dismissed.

Sixth District Judge L. Vern Robinson disagreed with the 21-year-old's argument that his constitutional rights were violated because there is no "rational" relationship between prohibiting a person with marijuana in his system from driving if no evidence shows that the person was impaired.

But one request to dismiss another charge is still pending, and a judge will make the final

call after an Oct. 20 hearing. In that motion, Eldridge's attorney Jonathan Hammond argues that court records detailing his client's charges do not show Eldridge drove his Ford Explorer recklessly during the accident that killed UI junior Amanda Skolnick.

Court records allege that Eldridge was "in an accident" and "failed to hit the brakes when he struck the pedestrian."

"Neither allegation is sufficient to require [Eldridge] to stand trial for an offense defined by law to include only those actions which are 'willful or of wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property,'" Hammond wrote.

If Eldridge's trial does commence, his attorney also wants to block from testimony results from a urine test conducted after the fatal accident.

Court records show that Iowa City police officers took urine samples from Eldridge, believing that they could do so without asking Eldridge — a belief that they later recognized was improper.

The samples later showed enough marijuana for Eldridge to be considered to have been under the influence.

Assistant Johnson County Attorney Iris Frost, who is prosecuting the case, responded in court records that even if authorities did not have implied consent to collect the urine, Eldridge voluntarily did so anyway. If a judge does not drop his charges, Eldridge is set to go to trial next month. He can face up to 35 years in prison if convicted by a jury on both counts of vehicular homicide.

## UI professor to testify on election readiness

Doug Jones, a UI associate professor of computer science and an international expert on election technology, is among four officials set to testify before a Congressional Black Caucus hearing on election readiness.

The hearing, set for Oct. 7 in Washington, D.C., will assess the reliability of voting systems nationwide for the Nov. 2 election and consider the changes made as a result of the Help America Vote Act.

"Many changes have been made technologically, but we have not necessarily moved forward," Jones said. "The No. 1 priority is for Congress to fund activity standards and make sure they are enforced."

Jones emphasized election monitoring as a key component of a successful 2004 election, because no procedural changes could be made in time.

"We will get a good election if people know they are being watched," he said. "That is one piece of insurance we have."

Other experts expected to testify are Mary Frances Berry, the chairwoman of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, Gracia Hillman, a commissioner of the Election Assistance Commission, and Jorge Mursuli, the Florida state director of People for the American Way.

Jones, who is known for uncovering flaws within many widely used voting systems, has served on the Iowa Board of Examiners for Voting Machines and Electronic Voting Systems for 10 years. He is overseeing elections in Dade County, Fla., this year.

# Steam erupts from Mt. St. Helens

Scientists anticipating the volcano's explosion at any time do not expect a repeat of the 1980 eruption


MOUNT ST. HELENS NATIONAL MONUMENT, Wash. — Mount St. Helens blew off more steam Monday, shooting a billowing white plume several hundred feet above the volcano and thrilling hundreds of visitors who had gathered below the rumbling mountain.

"Wow. It was amazing," said 9-year-old Alex Turchiano, who watched from a nearby visitors center. "I was hoping to see lava so I could see the trees fall down and the lava flow into the water. I wanted to see what it was going to do — whether it would stop or keep going."

Scientists, who continued to warn that the volcano could blow at any moment, stopped short of calling the steam burst an actual eruption, saying no volcanic material apparently was emitted. The steam quickly dissipated and did not threaten any structures near Mount St. Helens.

Even if a larger eruption comes, officials say there was little or no chance of a repeat of the mountain's lethal 1980 explosion or Hawaiian-style lava flows. The eruption 24 years ago blew 1,300 feet off the top of the peak, killed 57 people and coated much of the Pacific Northwest with ash.

Since Sept. 23, thousands of tiny earthquakes have shaken the mountain, and several steam eruptions have occurred, the most seismic activity at the peak since the months following the 1980 blast. A burst of ash and steam on Oct. 1 was followed Oct. 2 by a smaller plume of steam and a volcanic tremor. A smaller extended volcanic vibration was detected Sunday. The latest burst came after

scientists detected swelling in the 1,000-foot lava dome within the crater of the southwest Washington mountain. Steam rose to 10,000 feet, nearly 2,000 feet above the rim.

"Hopefully, after this clears away, our crews will get a view of the crater, and the crater will probably be enlarged a bit," said U.S. Geological Survey geologist Willie Scott, who described it as a "very passive event."

Scientists speculated the steam was due to hot rock coming into contact with ice and snow contained in the glacier.

"Now, most of us are convinced there's fresh magma

down there," hydrologist Carolyn Driedger said.

Jeff Wynn, chief scientist for volcano hazards in nearby Vancouver, Wash., said the lava dome within the crater had risen another 100 feet in the dome's southern area.

"Something is driving — like a piston — something is driving up. We believe it's magma. We believe new magma is involved. And new magma is potentially more gas rich and therefore more explosive," Wynn said.

The action at Mount St. Helens has drawn thousands of visitors to the monument, including Patricia Cusic of Live

Oak, Fla., who arrived Saturday with her daughter, and her three grandchildren who live in Arlington.

"Now we can go home and say, 'Hey, we saw a volcano erupting!' This was a good time to come," Cusic said excitedly at the Coldwater Ridge Visitors Center, about 8½ miles from the rim.

During the weekend, officials shut down areas closer to the mountain as a precaution. The Johnston Ridge Observatory, about five miles from the crater, was evacuated, and most air traffic was prohibited within a 5-mile radius of the volcano.


### High court may change sentencing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court appeared poised Monday to alter the system used for sentencing 64,000 federal criminal defendants a year, but justices clashed over whether changes would create greater inequity. Judges, not juries, consider

factors that can add years to defendants' prison sentences under the government's 17-year-old system, which has been challenged as unconstitutional.

Justice Antonin Scalia said that lucky accused criminals go before merciful judges. The unlucky, he said, can face a "hanging judge."

"The whole reason for jury trials is we don't trust judges," he said.

# Car bombs kill at least 24 in Iraq

Across Iraq on Monday, car bombs killed at least 24 people and injured more than 100. The car bomb on Saadoun Street outside the Baghdad Hotel killed six and injured 15; it was the second bombing there in the past year. So was the bomb that killed 15 and wounded 81 at a National Guard recruiting station on the stretch of road just outside Baghdad's Green Zone where the head of Iraq's former Governing Council was killed in May and close to the U.S. Embassy and key government installations.

Monday's third blast, in the northern city of Mosul, killed a bystander and the two bombers, who apparently blew themselves up by accident while waiting behind an elementary school for a U.S. military patrol to pass by. Yet another suicide bomber struck a U.S. patrol elsewhere in Mosul, injuring one American soldier.

"Hour by hour, the situation

is getting worse," said Saad Muwaffaq, 25, who was guarding a building approximately 50 yards from the Saadoun Street blast. "We cannot walk for 100 meters without fearing a car bomb now."

Two American soldiers were killed Sunday by small-arms fire at a Baghdad checkpoint, the U.S. military. A senior official at Iraq's Ministry of Science and Technology was assassinated in Baghdad, Col. Adnan Abdul-Rahman, an Interior Ministry spokesman, told the Associated Press. Another Science Ministry employee was also killed.

One U.S. soldier was killed and two others were injured late Monday when a roadside bomb exploded beside their convoy near Baghdad, the military said.

Al-Jazeera satellite television network reported the release of a video showing two hostages — one an Iraqi businessman based in Italy, the other a Turkish national — being shot in the head by guerrillas.

Car bombings in Iraq have become commonplace in recent

weeks; U.S. officials counted more than 70 during September.

The people killed, more than ever, are Iraqis. The aftermath of the Saadoun Street bombing brought home the horrors that may have become routine to a world watching from a safe distance but that in Iraq still pierce individual lives as deeply as ever.

"Why are they doing these attacks? Is it forbidden for Iraqis to live normally?" Khairiya Abdul Hussein, 51, cried as she searched for her daughter, who worked as a maid for a company on Saadoun Street. "I always asked her to quit. We know this street is a target, but she didn't listen."

Jafar Zyara, 17, who sells tea on the street, said he saw the convoy of SUVs emerge from an alley beside the Baghdad Hotel, which is known as a residence for foreign private security firms and intelligence personnel. Iraqi guards halted traffic to make way for the convoy, which carried members of DynCorp, a defense contractor. News services said the bomb was hidden under a load of dates in the pickup.

# Bars face 21-only decision in 2 weeks

Several local officials in favor of a 21-ordinance met the proposal with a cold reaction Monday.

"The bar owners were given a year to do what this letter proposes, and they haven't done it," said Johnson County Public Health Director Ralph Wilmoth.

Councilor Dee Vanderhoef echoed Wilmoth's complaint, saying the bar owners have known about the meeting for two weeks already.

"All they have proposed to do and not followed through on leaves me very skeptical," she said.

Cohen said that bars have achieved a number of the goals owners set for themselves when the city raised the entry

age from 18 to 19. She touted the widespread use of wristbands to identify underage patrons as the largest accomplishment.

"We feel we need to work in steps to correct a problem that has existed as long as Iowa City," she said.

# Vote swapping resurfaces for 2004 election

vote needed to secure federal funding in the next election.

"I don't know how valuable it is in the current electoral system," Grundberg said. "It still requires a sacrifice of true interest and true preference."

He added that he is still uncertain as to how he will cast his vote, but many others have decided to swap votes.

Approximately 36,000 people signed up to exchange their votes in 2000, said officials from VotePair.org, a website that connects voters in different states.

Developers of VotePair.org said they commit themselves to ensuring that voters can express their true beliefs at the polls on election day by allowing them to secure a vote for a third-

party candidate while helping to keep the voter's least favorite candidate out of office. The idea developed to counter the notion that "A vote for Nader is a vote for Bush," representatives from VotePair.org said.

Marc Randazza, a legal adviser for VotePair.org who studied the legal and ethical implications of the practice, found that views on vote trading are as broad as the political spectrum.

After the 2000 election, the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that vote swapping did not violate a California law banning brokering the exchange of votes. This ruling set the stage for vote trading's return when another close election surfaced.

"I didn't think vote pairing would come back so quickly," Randazza said. "Who would imagine that two elections in a

row would be so close?"

Although vote swapping primarily benefits Kerry and Nader in this election, as in the 2000 election, neither campaign endorsed the practice.

"If voters want to do it, they can do what they want to do," Nader spokesman Kevin Zeese said.

A campaign spokesman for Kerry echoed Zeese's thoughts on the program.

"We're going to try to get every vote we can the good, old-fashioned way," Kerry spokesman Colin Van Ostern said. "What people do with their own votes is their own business."

"You cannot be commander in chief of this country and tell those fine troops in Iraq that they're participating in a grand diversion from the war on terror. You can't ... lead those troops and at the same time say wrong war, wrong place, wrong time."

Earlier Monday in Des Moines, Bush signed a tax-relief act that he said would decrease tax expenses for 94 million Americans. Bush used the legislation to leverage his stance against Kerry, who voted for the act.

He explained that while Kerry's voting has often been inconsistent, the senator has consistently voted in favor tax increases. Bush then blasted his opponent's plan to raise

taxes on the wealthiest Americans to subsidize increased spending, a move the president said would be insufficient. Bush said that the middle-class would end up bearing the cost of the resulting gap.

In a question-and-answer session following Bush's remarks, Bobbi Ramirez and others in attendance were brought forward to tout the president's tax policy in prepared remarks.

Ramirez said \$1,700 in recent tax cuts allowed her to purchase clothes, school supplies, and enroll her daughters in extracurricular activities. The president followed her, saying tax cuts result in a trickle-down effect.

"When somebody shows up to buy school supplies, it means somebody has got to make those school supplies," he said. "Somebody makes them, somebody is going to work. But equally

important, these people were able to begin to realize dreams for their children."

Bush credited his administration for agricultural success in Iowa, saying he fulfilled a promise and would open doors for products to be sold on the international market.

"We're selling a lot of soybeans in China, and that's the job of the president," he said. He later added, "We can compete with anybody, anytime, anywhere so long as the rules are fair."

Other domestic issues the president touched upon include the importance of defending freedom and his support of the controversial ban on a certain type of late-term abortion signed into law earlier this year. Two federal judges have ruled the ban to be unconstitutional.

# Bush signs tax-relief bill in Iowa

"Next year, maybe they'll want to come to Texas," Bush said.

Mike Hintz, a First Assembly of God youth pastor, said he's happy with the job Bush has done on the economy.

"Putting money back in the hands of taxpayers really helps out," he said.

The Kerry campaign has proposed \$419 billion in new tax cuts that would target middle-class families, rather than "special-interest friends," spokesman Phil Singer said in a statement.

Also with Bush was Brian and Tiffany Patterson, of Des Moines. The couple has a 2-year-old son and a 6-week-old daughter.

Brian Patterson, co-owner of a graphic design business, said the tax cuts gave him additional money to use for health care.

"It's really enabled us to put the tax relief back in our pockets to pay for the health care premiums we need to pay for as a small family," he said.

Patterson said he supports Bush's values.

"I think we need a man that is going to be in the White House like President Bush, that's going to stand by what he believes," Patterson said.

Surrounded by Republican members of Iowa's congressional delegation, Bush signed the bill and handed the pen to Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, giving him credit for getting the bill passed.

White House spokesman Jim Morrell said last week that the bill-signing ceremony was a way "for the president to show his appreciation for Sen. Grassley's leadership on this issue."

Grassley, the chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, also took some gentle ribbing from the president for a current campaign commercial

that shows him mowing his lawn. In the ad, Grassley is on a riding lawnmower, towing two push-mowers on ropes behind him to broaden his path.

"The south lawn of the White House has a lot of grass. I'm looking for somebody to mow it," Bush told Grassley. "Mr. Chairman, you should now be known as grass-mower."

# Aristide backers threaten violence

## Demonstrators in the Haitian capital wield machetes, saying they will behead the prime minister unless Jean-Bertrand Aristide is allowed to return

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — Supporters of ousted President Jean-Bertrand Aristide wielded machetes and threatened to cut off the heads of Haitian police and the interim prime minister during demonstrations on Monday, part of a recent campaign that has been dubbed "Operation Baghdad."

No violence was reported in Monday's demonstrations in the capital Port-au-Prince. But at least 14 people were killed in clashes on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1, including three police officers who were shot to death and then beheaded.

Tensions erupted into violence in the capital last week as the country was still reeling from the chaotic aftermath of Tropical Storm Jeanne. The death toll from the storm's devastating floods and mudslides rose Monday to 1,870 with another 884 reported missing, and most presumed dead.

Approximately 150 Aristide supporters demonstrated on Monday, and some directed their anger at Haitian police, who fired in the air to try to disperse a gathering. Using torched cars, protesters blocked roads leading into the downtown slum of Bel Air.

"We'll be in the streets until death or Aristide comes back,"

said Milo Fenelon, a 24-year-old demonstrator. "We won't stop. If they come in here, we're going to cut off their heads. It's going to be just like Baghdad."

Though many demonstrators on Monday were unarmed, some wore masks and carried machetes and rocks. At least two had guns — a rifle and a homemade shotgun. Some burned a tire, sending acrid smoke into the air.

"We will fight until the return

of Aristide," said Georges Jean, a 33-year-old mechanic. "We can also cut off Latortue's head," he said about interim Prime Minister Gerard Latortue.

Tensions were also high with U.N. peacekeepers guarding the nearby National Palace, but no violence was reported.

Latortue, who is leading a U.S.-backed transitional government installed after Aristide's ouster in February, said the police killings last week

were part of an offensive by pro-Aristide gangs dubbed "Operation Baghdad."

He told reporters on Sunday night that Haiti is seeing "a climate of terror" resembling "the four months preceding Jean-Bertrand Aristide's departure."

Now in exile in South Africa, Aristide has accused U.S. agents of kidnapping him and forcing him out of the Caribbean country on Feb. 29 amid a bloody rebellion — a charge the U.S. government denies.

Aristide, who became Haiti's first freely elected president in 1990, was restored to power by U.S. troops in 1994, then stepped down because of U.S. pressure and a term limit. He was re-elected in 2000.

Aristide's Lavalas Family party on Sept. 30 began commemorating the 1991 coup. They demanded an end to "the occupation" and "the invasion" by foreign troops — referring to the U.S. Marines who arrived the day Aristide fled and the U.N. peacekeepers who have taken over since June.

On Oct. 2, police arrested Haiti's Senate president and two other pro-Aristide politicians following a six-hour standoff in a radio station. Latortue said the three were arrested on suspicion of orchestrating violence during last week's demonstrations.

# 2 Americans win Nobel for their work on smell

Two Americans won the Nobel Prize in medicine Monday for discovering how people can recognize an estimated 10,000 odors, from spoiled meat to a lover's perfume.

Richard Axel, 58, of Columbia University and Linda B. Buck, 57, of the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle revealed odor-sensing proteins in the nose and traced how they send their information to the brain.

The Nobel Assembly at the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm said it chose the pair for the \$1.3 million prize not because of any practical payoff from the work but simply because they enhanced understanding of "the most enigmatic of our senses."

For two scientists to single-handedly map one of the major human senses is unique in the history of science, Nobel assembly Chairman Goeran Hansson said.

"It's pretty amazing to be able to sit here in the 21st century and reward discoveries that explain one of the human senses," he said.

Buck said she had not even known she was under consideration. "People have said things like, 'You should win the Nobel Prize,'" she said. "I feel very honored, of course."

Axel said sharing the prize with Buck was "a joy and a deep honor. ... I'm very surprised and very happy." He also said that the work might ultimately help scientists develop better insect repellants to keep away mosquitoes that transmit malaria, for example.

In 1991, Axel and Buck jointly reported discovering a large family of genes devoted to producing different odor-sensing proteins, called receptors, in the nose. Before that, scientists could only guess at how many different receptors were needed to distinguish smells in the environment.

Scientists now know that people have some 350 to 400 types of odor receptors, each of which

can detect only a limited number of odors.

When a person sniffs perfume or fine wine, for example, a mix of different types of molecules flows over the receptors in the back of the nose. That activates an array of the receptors, but only those primed to respond to those particular molecules. The brain notes which receptors are activated, and interprets this pattern as the smell.


Because any given receptor can participate in more than one pattern, "you might have a rose and a skunk being recognized by some of the same receptors," Buck said.

Axel and Buck, who worked independently following their 1991 paper, went on to show that only one kind of receptor appears on each of the 5 million or so odor-sensing nerve cells in the nose, which was a surprise. They also showed how these nerve cells are wired into the brain.

The Nobel assembly said that it is still unclear what the medical and scientific implications of the discoveries will be, but that the work could affect areas as diverse as psychology — to explain why scents often remind us of childhood — and cooking, since scent and taste are intertwined.

"It's possible, I guess, that someone down the road could use this knowledge to cook up something really delicious," Hansson said. "But I think that's pretty far in the future."

Last year's medicine prize winners were Briton Sir Peter Mansfield and American Paul Lauterbur for discoveries that led to the development of MRI, now widely used by doctors to get a detailed, 3-D look into their patients' bodies.

## Which candidate is favored by the American media?

DI editorial writers present opposing views

### George W. Bush

For years, Republicans have been kicking and screaming about alleged liberal media bias. The GOP has effectively exploited the media to its advantage throughout this campaign. Republicans have relentlessly labeled John Kerry as a flip-flopper. Most of their incoherent logic, based upon the twisting and turning of Kerry's congressional record of 20 years, has gained traction with the electorate. The media, however, have ignored the more recent flip-flops in President Bush's political career.

Amazingly, the president's most blatant flip-flops have come on matters of national security, his top campaign issue. Bush initially opposed the 9/11 commission, then supported it. He was against the Department of Homeland Security, then for it. He said the war on terror could and could not be won. Bush also labeled himself a war president before saying that he wanted to be a peace president.

And the monster flip-flop of them all, which illustrates the liberal-media myth, is Bush's statements on Osama bin Laden. The president's position on the man responsible for 3,000 American deaths changed from saying he was "wanted dead or alive" to being "not that concerned about him." Instead of calling the president on this, the media took the bait and followed the administration's hollow rhetoric right into an unnecessary war. The media's failure in this area is best highlighted by both *Washington Post* and *New York Times* (supposedly liberal publications) apologies for their coverage of the Iraq war.

In the case of Dan Rather and the CBS memo scandal, Rather made a serious journalistic error by airing a story based on shoddy sources. However, the outrage over his mistake was unjustified. On the day that CBS announced its blunder, the story appeared 167 times on wire reports and 57 times on cable-news programs. Conservatives used the story to once again allege the media's ties to the Communist Party. Calls were made for Rather's resignation, and an investigation was launched. The fury toward Rather and CBS was colossal in comparison with another individual who made a decision based on faulty intelligence — except his decision came at the expense of the lives of 1,055 American soldiers, thousands of Iraqi civilians, \$200 billion, and U.S. credibility around the world. Where is the outrage in the media? Isn't it unfair to hold Rather to a higher standard than the president of the United States?

The same media double standard applies to the factually inaccurate Swift Boat Veterans for Truth advertisements. For weeks, the media debated the logistics of John Kerry's service in Vietnam. Pundits obsessed over the nature of his wounds, whether he was injured by a bullet or shrapnel, and whether he actually spilled blood. All this is a moot point compared with Bush's military record. The media trumpet nit-picky details of Kerry's record, but the fact remains that Bush never even saw Vietnam.

It's hard to know where to begin when cataloguing the history of media bias against George W. Bush, much less to do so in the space allotted.

A nice starting point might be the illuminating May survey performed by the Pew Research Group, an independent media organization, which found that five times more national journalists identify themselves as liberal (34 percent) than conservative (7 percent). The same survey also found that 55 percent of these national journalists believed the media were not critical enough of Bush, compared with only 8 percent who said the media were too critical.

Then we have Evan Thomas, the editor of *Newsweek* (hardly a conservative journal), who publicly let the cat out of the bag. On the July 10 "Inside Washington" program, Thomas pointed out the boost the press corps will provide to the Kerry-Edwards campaign: "The media, I think, want Kerry to win ... they're going to portray Kerry and Edwards as being young and dynamic ... and that's going to be worth maybe 15 points." Of course, in the July 19 issue of his own magazine, Thomas wrote an editorial posing as a news article in which he concluded that "Dick Cheney projects the bleakness of a Wyoming winter, while John Edwards always appears to be strolling in the Carolina sunshine." How's that for objectivity?

No discussion of liberal bias would be complete without mentioning Dan Rather and his shameless producer Mary Mapes. These two worked on the now-infamous Bush National Guard story for more than five years before embarrassing themselves and their network by attempting to pass off blatantly forged documents in a hit piece on Bush's military service. Mapes also felt compelled to call the Kerry campaign and tip it off to the existence of these documents, a collusion between media and the Democratic Party that should shame Rather, gargantuan ego notwithstanding, right off the air.

But then this is the same Rather who, when asked questions about the authenticity of the fraudulent papers, dismissed inquiries about his inaccurate reporting by, unbelievably, attacking Bush: "Today, on the Internet and elsewhere, some people ... concentrated not on the key questions of the overall story but on the documents that were part of the support of the story" (*CBS News*, Sept. 10). Such is the narrow mindset of Rather, not to mention his network buddies Tom Brokaw and Peter Jennings, who at a *New Yorker* panel discussion this weekend were effusive in their support but not criticism of Gunga Dan. So poorly attuned to the sensibilities of America are these men that they see nothing wrong with cutting ethical corners if it serves some greater (read: liberal) good.

From the libelous hit pieces put out by CBS to the flowery editorializing that masquerades as objective reporting, make no mistake: The media are on board for John Kerry.

We'll hear it again and again and again. It's rather like the Joseph Goebbels theory of politics — just keep repeating a big lie often enough, and people will come to believe it.

You'd like to think it won't work. But then, you'd like to have a president who didn't whine about how hard he was working. One who didn't mix up Saddam and Osama.

One who had some there, there. ■

## Found in translation

Corey Creekmur, a UI associate professor of cinema and comparative literature, is trying to add just a little bit of diversity to cinema in Iowa City.

He is the coordinator of the Thursday night Proseminar series, which shows different cultures' films each semester. He is also the director of the Institute for Cinema and Culture, an office on campus that facilitates film and cultural events for the university.

This semester, the films are from Korea, which has seen a lot of growth in its cinema in recent years, he said.

"We teach a lot of classes on American and European cinema," Creekmur said. "So these seminars are usually an attempt to do something rarer."

Last semester, the seminar selected Icelandic films. "Had I ever seen a film from Iceland? No? That's good," he said. "We're trying to fill in those gaps."

The screenings, which are free and open to the public, are held every Thursday at 7 p.m. in 101 Becker Communication Studies Building.

The Proseminar isn't the only opportunity to view foreign films on campus.

On Monday nights this semester, Hindi films are screened in conjunction with the class Popular Hindi Cinema. The films are also free and open to the public, and they are screened in the same auditorium as the Proseminar.

Creekmur balks at calling them screenings of "Bollywood" films, a term used to refer to the increasingly popular films produced in Mumbai, India, (formerly Bombay).

Bollywood films often have elaborate song-and-dance sequences and can be up to three hours long.

Creekmur offered the title "Masala" as an alternative to Bollywood. Masala means a spicy mix, and the films, he said, are often just that: an eclectic mix of cinematic elements including tragedy, comedy, and the seemingly imperative musical numbers.

"In American cinema, we're used to going to see a comedy or a tragedy — they don't often mix,"

he said. The incorporation of the variety of elements accounts for the length of the films, he said.

Next semester's Thursday night series will feature Arabic films, with a focus on Egyptian cinema.

"We try to match up with people on campus who can lead the course and put it together," Creekmur said.

Graduate student Linda Mokdad brought many of the films back after spending time in Lebanon last summer.

"It creates an understanding and a tolerance to see films from a different culture, a different context," Creekmur said. "It just seems so limiting to only see films from one culture."

Another opportunity for students to view foreign films is through the Bijou. This year, the theater has films scheduled from a variety of countries.

Senior Bret Szymoniak, the Bijou programming and booking director, said, "I definitely think foreign films are an important part of what we do here at the Bijou."

The films, which are chosen by a 15-member board, are usually winners at international festivals such as Cannes, but they are unlikely to be widely shown in the United States.

"I don't think there are a lot of places in Iowa that show foreign films very regularly," Szymoniak said. "It's something we try to bring to the university."

"I think it's important for cultural reasons that students get a glimpse of other cultures. That's very evident when you watch a foreign film — it's a window into another world."

All foreign-language films shown at the Bijou and the Proseminar are subtitled in English.

For those who don't want to go to a cinema to see foreign films, Creekmur recommended checking out of the Iowa City Public Library, 123 S. Linn St., and the UI Main Library.

"Sometimes, I've gone looking for one film and left with five others," he said. "It's great, but a lot of people don't realize those resources are available."

## Famed actor Janet Leigh dies at 77

LOS ANGELES — Janet Leigh's most famous scene was so terrifying it put her off showers for the rest of her life.

Leigh, who died Sunday, insisted she always took baths after seeing the finished cut of Alfred Hitchcock's *Psycho*, in which her character was slashed to death in a motel shower in what may be the silver screen's most memorable murder.

"I know she used to get very scared about that scene," said the director's daughter, Pat Hitchcock, who had a small part in *Psycho* as a co-worker of Leigh's.

Leigh died at her Beverly Hills home, with husband Robert Brandt and her daughters, actors Jamie Lee Curtis and Kelly Curtis, at her side. She was 77.

"She died peacefully," Heidi Schaeffer, a spokeswoman for Jamie Lee Curtis, said on Monday.

Leigh had suffered from vasculitis, an inflammation of the blood vessels, for the past year.

The blond beauty had 60-odd film and TV roles in a career whose highlights included playing Frank Sinatra's romantic interest in *The Manchurian Candidate* and Charlton Heston's abducted bride in Orson Welles' *Touch of Evil*.

Yet the shower scene in *Psycho* became Leigh's defining moment, the role earning her an Academy Award nomination for supporting actress.

"*Psycho* scared the hell out of me when I saw it finished. Making it and seeing it are two different things," Leigh told the Associated Press in 2001, when *Psycho* was picked No. 1 on the American Film Institute's top 100 list of most thrilling U.S. movies. "That staccato music

and the knife flashing. You'd swear it's going into the body. I still don't take showers, and that's the truth."

Dubbed Janet Leigh (her birth name was Jeanette Helen Morrison), she starred at 19 in her first movie, *The Romance of Rosy Ridge*. In 1951, she married Tony Curtis when their stardoms were at a peak. The "ideal couple" divorced in 1963.

"Tony and I had a wonderful

time together; it was an exciting, glamorous period in Hollywood," she said in an interview. "A lot of great things happened, most of all, two beautiful children [Kelly Curtis and Jamie Lee Curtis]."

Leigh appeared in Jamie Lee Curtis' 1980 thriller *The Fog* and co-starred again with her daughter in one of her last roles in 1998's slasher sequel *Halloween H2O: 20 Years Later*.





ISU looks to improve pass protection

DES MOINES (AP) — Iowa State is getting ready for the heat in its next game, and it has nothing to do with the weather. After watching his team give up eight sacks in its last game, Iowa State coach Dan McCarney knows exactly what to expect when Texas A&M visits on Saturday night. "They sure are getting after quarterbacks," McCarney said. "I'm sure they're going to heat up my guys, too." Iowa State's pass protection broke down frequently in the Cyclones' 36-7 loss at Oklahoma State last Saturday. The sacks resulted in 49 yards in losses and, even worse, Bret Meyer fumbled the ball away on three of those sacks.

Missouri, Kansas drop 'Border War'

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Out of respect for U.S. troops fighting overseas, Missouri and Kansas are changing the name of their sports rivalry from "Border War" to "Border Showdown." "We feel that in the aftermath of Sept. 11, 2001, and the ensuing events around the world, it is inappropriate to use the term 'war' to describe inter-collegiate athletics events," Kansas Athletics Director Lew Perkins said on Monday. "We need to be more sensitive to the men and women who defend our country for real." The schools have competed in sports for more than a century. "Our rivalry with Kansas is a very important thing to many people, but it certainly pales in comparison with what is taking place overseas, and this is the right thing to do," Missouri Athletics Director Mike Alden said. Unlike other college rivalries referred to as wars, the Missouri-Kansas competition actually traces its roots to armed conflict. In the 1860s, tensions between Missouri, a slave state, and Kansas, a free state, led to bloody clashes along the border.

Melvin fired after two seasons

SEATTLE (AP) — Bob Melvin was fired as manager of the Seattle Mariners on Monday, a day after the team ended the season with its 99th loss. Melvin, who lasted two seasons, was told of the decision during a morning meeting at Safeco Field, and general manager Bill Bavasi called a news conference for later in the day. In May, the Mariners exercised the option on Melvin's contract for 2005 despite a 9-16 start. He led the team to a 93-69 record in 2003 after Lou Piniella left for Tampa Bay. In a news release, Bavasi said it was a difficult decision to fire Melvin. He credited the manager, his coaches, and the team for playing hard and trying to win through the end of the season.

## Chiefs finally win one

BALTIMORE — Winless no more, the Kansas City Chiefs rendered the Baltimore Ravens defenseless with an almost unimaginable display of ball control and patience. Priest Holmes ran for 133 yards and two touchdowns, and the Chiefs wore down the highly touted Baltimore defense in a 27-24 victory Monday night.

Trent Green went 21-for-31 for 223 yards to help Kansas City (1-3) to its first win since Dec. 28. After going 13-3 a year ago, the Chiefs were off to their worst start since 1980. Through three quarters, Kansas City had 22 first downs compared with four for the Ravens and a 361-126 advantage in yardage. A 1-yard touchdown run by Holmes on the first play of the fourth quarter put the Chiefs up 27-17, and that proved to be enough to



"The oldest, David and Natalie, set the trend for the younger kids by being active and playing sports," said Dave Dawson. "The kids have always been athletic and with us having a big family,

sports kept everyone busy." Dawson's oldest sister, Natalie Dawson, definitely set an example for her sisters by being the first to play field hockey. Their dad still doesn't really know how they got into the sport in the first place. Dave Dawson was in his backyard talking to his neighbor one day. ## ALL-IOWAN

Team is made up of natives of the state

Iowa men's golf team is a grab-bag of home-grown talent and recognizable faces around the Iowa junior golf circuit. No member of the team hails from farther west than Des Moines, and all 12 members grew up and went to high school in Iowa.

Coach Terry Anderson enjoys giving kids from Iowa the opportunity to play at the collegiate level. He thinks there's enough good talent to support a competitive team, and he's so busy that it's a challenge to recruit elsewhere.

Throughout the year he deals with his responsibilities as head coach, PGA director of golf at Finkbine, and the estimated 10 tournaments he competes in each year. He's also happily married and the proud father of two.

As a result, he takes advantage of networks and local talent to acquire the best golfers he can. "There's not much time to go off and leave," Anderson said about recruiting trips.

"But there are several Iowa PGA section and club pros who are former Iowa Hawkeye golfers. They'll call me up, or I see them at tournament and say, 'Hey Terry, I got this kid — keep an eye on him.' So I get a lot of leads from my PGA peers. It's kind of my network — the old Hawkeyes let me know of a player in their home town or course that's good," he explained.

Anderson also takes advantage of competitive golf in Des Moines, Cedar Rapids, Dubuque, and other areas — road trips around Eastern Iowa that rack up around 10,000 miles on his car each summer.

"I'll go to high-school meets if there's somebody I need to see, I'll go to the state high-school tournament, and that's the basic thing that I'm doing right now."

When he finds a player he's interested in, he does a little winning (non-alcoholic, of course) and dining (he enjoys taking them to the Iowa River Power Restaurant). Then he proposes any financial aid that may be available.

The men's golf team has 4½ scholarships to work with. Those can be dispersed any way Anderson sees fit, whether it be four on full-ride and one on half or a broader sharing of the wealth. Currently, there are eight players on the team with partial scholarships.

Anderson said that in golf — which is still considered a white-collar "country club" sport — the families his players come from are generally well-off and may need less help financially than others.

"You're not going to give somebody the world unless they're worth it, but more importantly, unless they need it," he said.

And to Anderson, when he sticks with the best corn-fed Iowa talent he can get, everybody wins.

ABOUT THE SERIES

High-school football players are graded, ranked, critiqued, and discussed by the media and recruiting services nearly as much the athletes already enrolled at the university.

In the last decade, the attention brought to recruiting in high-profile college sports has jumped so enormously that even the casual sports fan has some knowledge about recruiting.

But what about golf, tennis, and others?

Recruiting in nonrevenue sports is essentially ignored by mainstream media, but the storylines are still there. Unlike football, which has 85 scholarships, smaller sports have as few as a handful to work with — making the scouting process and the decision of offering a scholarship that much more critical.

One coach at Iowa chooses only to recruit athletes raised in the Hawkeye State. Another sport looks to junior-college recruits to boost a young squad. And another team transforms newbies to its sport when they walk on campus to varsity athletes.

Expos will remember Blue Monday, 1994

MONTRÉAL — The Montréal Expos will always remember Blue Monday. One win away from the World Series, the Expos were tied with the Los Angeles Dodgers in the ninth inning. Ace pitcher Steve Rogers was on the mound. Olympic Stadium was buzzing. And then, Rick Monday ruined it all.

Monday hit a two-out homer to center field, Fernando Valenzuela and Bob Welch set down Montréal in the bottom of the ninth, and the Dodgers took the pennant with a 2-1 victory in Game 5 of the NL Championship Series.

Monday, Oct. 19, 1981. It was cold, it was damp — and it was the end of the Expos' most successful season.

In Montréal, everybody just calls it Blue Monday.

The ill-fated franchise never got close to a championship again.


The Expos had the best record in baseball in 1994 when players walked out (the '81 season also was shortened by a strike). Only this time, the rest of the season and the World Series were canceled with Montréal (74-40) leading the NL East by six games after a 20-3 run.

That team, led by Larry Walker, Moises Alou, and Pedro Martinez, was soon torn apart in an effort to cut payroll, and Montréal's best opportunity to soften the harsh memory of Monday's home run was lost.

Ten years later, Major League Baseball's experiment with its first franchise outside the United States ended in failure. On Sept. 29, after years of dwindling attendance, the Expos were finally relocated to Washington, D.C.

Hall of Famer Frank Robinson, the team's manager the last three seasons, said he would be interested in following the club to the nation's capital, regardless of whether the team is operated by baseball.

"If they would like to have me back, I would certainly like to be back," Robinson said.

A new owner would be welcomed by the players after years of shoestring payroll budgets.

"That is one of the situations we're looking forward to," said Brad Wilkerson, who hit his 32nd homer on Oct. 2 — the

final one in Expos history. "We're going into a bigger market with more resources, and we're going to have a chance, hopefully, to win year in and year out. That's going to be a little bit different, but we're look-

ing forward to that challenge."

Whatever name the franchise takes in Washington, baseball-starved fans there will find they have a young team with a strong nucleus.

# Out-of-staters found to fill team

Of the 11 members on the Iowa women's golf team, native Iowans could form a foursome — that's it. It's a much more eclectic team compared with the men's, which is all Iowan from top to bottom.

On the women's team you've got Liz Bennett from England, Melanie Boyles from Arizona, and Shannon

Fleming from California, among others.

"I recruit on a national level," coach Bobbe Carney said.

"I think the reality is that I'd like to be able to pick up the best players in the state, but I probably still need to go outside of the state to build a team that can be competitive in the Big Ten."

The main problem is that girls' high-school golf in the state of Iowa isn't at the talent

level that boys' golf is. A major difference is the length of the courses. Carney estimated that a high-school golf tournament for girls is approximately 5,300 or 5,400 yards, a couple par 4's short of Finkbine, which is just over 6,000 yards for the women.

"For me to see best how a player is going to go from junior golf to college golf is to see them playing on golf courses and tournaments that are more like college tournaments," she said.

In order to see stiffer competition on college-length courses, she concentrates on junior golf tournaments, but she still makes it to high-school tournaments around the area.

"Generally speaking, I'll go down to the U.S. Junior in Dallas, the Western Junior in Indianapolis, and I do go to the state high-school meets in Iowa and Minnesota," she said. For Carney, it's easier to make it to the meets in Iowa and Minnesota because their golf season is in the spring, after the Iowa season ends.

She's also worked on recruiting and taking advantage of golfers from abroad. At present, she is in the process of recruiting someone from England who would come in as a graduate student and play competitively on the golf team; she has a lot of

experience playing on a national level in England. Essentially, if the recruit gets into the UI grad school, she'll be a Hawkeye for second semester.

"The advantage of the European players is that their handicaps are probably a closer reflection of how they play, and the reason for that is because they compete at a distance that's close to what we play in college," Carney said.

"And their handicap system is all based on competitive scores. In the United States things aren't regulated as carefully."

The sole European player on the current roster, senior Liz Bennett, who is arguably the best golfer on the team, proves Carney's theory correct.

But Carney insists she's not going to rely on golfers from overseas to support the Iowa team, just as she doesn't rely on Iowa players to support it, either.

"The best way for me to characterize what I'm doing is trying to get a hold of the best players that I possibly can," she said. "Certainly, I do want to give every opportunity I can in the state of Iowa, but the reality is that we probably have to look elsewhere as well."


Ravens put 'Prime Time' on inactive list

# Team chemistry leads Sun to WNBA finals

UNCASVILLE, Conn. — Two years after the Orlando Miracle left Florida for a Connecticut casino, the gamble appears to be paying off.

The Connecticut Sun are in the WNBA finals for the first time in franchise history following a two-game sweep of the New York Liberty.

"I love this team so much for how hard the women play," coach Mike Thibault said. "There's something about them that finds a way, and they have believed in their hearts for a long time they were going to do this."

Thibault, a longtime NBA assistant, took over when the Mohegan American Indian tribe bought the Miracle last year, moved them to Connecticut, and renamed them the Sun.

The Sun have been in the playoffs both seasons and, behind a blend of veteran leadership and rookie star power, have rolled through the post-season this year. They open the best-of-three final series Friday against either Seattle or Sacramento.

Before the season, Thibault bolstered a roster that included original Miracle members Taj McWilliams-

Franklin and former UConn star Nykesha Sales with first-round pick Lindsay Whalen, who led the Minnesota Golden Gophers to their first NCAA Final Four.

The Sun traded All-Star guard Shannon Johnson to move up in the draft for Whalen, and it's proved to have been a good move.

"I think it's all come together because Lindsay has stepped up early," Sales said. "All of us were a little nervous to see what level she'd play at coming in as a rookie, but she really stepped up for us and allowed us to do some great things."

Guard Katie Douglas was Orlando's first round pick in the 2001 and forward Wendy Palmer-Daniel joined the team in a trade in 2002. Debbie Black, who has played professionally for 15 years, was picked up last year when the Miami Sol disbanded. Asjha Jones, a member of two national-title teams at UConn, was acquired in an off-season trade with Washington.

Rookies Jessica Brungo, drafted out of Penn State in the second round, and LeCoe Willingham of Auburn, have played valuable minutes in the playoffs.

"I believe all good teams

should be a family," Thibault said. "We really, really hard in this organization to create that atmosphere."

In the Sun family, McWilliams-Franklin has emerged as the unofficial den mother.

"They voted her team captain because she is that kind of leader on or off the court," Thibault said. "She studies the game; she watches film. I think the young players really respect that from her. As the season's gone on, I think they've looked to her leadership more."

And McWilliams-Franklin has provided it. She's taken Whalen and the other rookies under her wing, cooking them meals, taking them bowling, to movies, and imparting everything she's gleaned from the game over the past decade.

"Taj has always been there, and stayed with me, and helped me through different situations," Whalen said.


A stalwart in the past and off the court, her 18 points and nine boards on Sunday helped the Sun clinch their first Eastern Conference title with a 60-57 win over New York.

# Bobcats begin 1st training camp

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Charlotte Bobcats owner Bob Johnson stepped to the free-throw line Monday and took a succession of shots.

By the time he gave up, the head Bobcat was a miserable 5-for-36.

The NBA's newest expansion team better hope it never needs basketball pointers from its owner, whose shooting performance could be an ominous sign for the ragtag group of players bringing the NBA back to Charlotte after a 2-year absence.

The Bobcats are replacing the Hornets, who left for New Orleans after 14 seasons. They fled Charlotte at the top of their game, losing in the Eastern Conference semifinals in their final season.


Charlotte's new team is years from matching that success, and management is already lecturing them on how to handle the rough road ahead.

"If you think you are going to lose because you are an expansion team, if you think you are going to lose because we don't have all the other players in the NBA, you go out there and play like you are going to lose — that's a self-fulfilling prophecy," Johnson said.

"I told my guys, 'Forget that.' We are going out to play every minute like we are going to win every game. And if we play 82 games like we are going to win, we're going to win a lot of games."

The Bobcats open their inaugural training camp today, but this team of unfamiliar faces and unrecognizable names might be hard-pressed to win even a handful of games.

The general public will recognize Emeka Okafor, who won a national championship at Connecticut last spring and was the No. 2 pick in the NBA draft. And most will be familiar with 13-year veteran Steve Smith. After that, they'll need name

cards to navigate their way through this roster.

Smith is by far the senior member of the team, in charge of providing locker-room leadership and on-court mentoring.

"If you think during my rookie year that I thought one day I'd be on a team of 17-, 18-, and 19-year olds, you'd be crazy," said Smith, who signed as a free agent last month.

The Bobcats don't actually have any teenagers on the roster. Jamal Sampson is the youngest player at 21.

Brevin Knight is second in seniority with seven years in the NBA, followed by Jahidi White at six seasons.

The rest of the team is composed of second- and third-year players management is still getting a feel for.

"We don't have much experience," coach and general manager Bernie Bickerstaff said. "We have nice talent, but we don't have a reputation. We don't have a personality as of yet."

Players did wear large name

cards Monday for identification, but they said they don't need them to recognize each other.

"Most of us were the 13th man on a roster last year — we didn't get much playing time," forward Jason Kapono said. "These name tags aren't for us, they're for the media. You guys don't know who we are."

If the Bobcats really are familiar with each other, it's from the week or so that the bulk of the players spent practicing together. Bickerstaff said he and his staff were shocked last week to see around 12 players holding full scrimmages each day on their own at the team's practice facility.

"There is a tremendous opportunity here for playing time," second-round draft pick Bernard Robinson said. "We all know that; we all want to get minutes, and it's worth it for us to put in the extra work now to go after that later."

Bickerstaff has no starting lineup in mind. His goal this training camp is to experiment with as many different floor combinations as possible, looking for the right fit.

# Healthy Iverson vows changes this season

PHILADELPHIA — Allen Iverson declared Monday that he is 100 percent and promised to be a better leader and teammate.

Calling last year "the worst season of my career, by far," he came to training camp Monday with a positive attitude and said he would have no problems getting along with new Philadelphia 76ers coach Jim O'Brien.

Sound familiar? Probably because Iverson has made similar proclamations in the past only to watch his reputation disintegrate with coaching clashes and questionable off-court conduct.

This year he really means it. Honest.

"Saying it and doing it are something totally different," he said. "I didn't do a good job of anything last year. It was a season I don't want to remember."

He was more of a distraction than a contributor on last year's team, which went 33-49 and missed the playoffs for the first time since the 1997-98 season.

He played only 48 games because of a knee injury, matching a low set during the 1998-99 strike season. He clashed with interim coach Chris Ford and watched some games from a luxury box or the locker room, if he stayed at all, instead of on the bench with his teammates.

"I didn't know how to react or respond to it," he said of his injury.

Now, the knee doesn't bother him, and he expects to look more like the Iverson of old.

With Eric Snow traded to Cleveland, Iverson will slide over to point guard with Willie Green inheriting the shooting-guard spot. Iverson hasn't played the point since his first couple of seasons in the NBA, but he expects a smooth transition because he understands the game more.

"I want the ball in my hands on the break a lot," he said. "I want to put a lot of pressure on the defense."

His willingness to play the

point may be a key. He didn't want to play there when former coach Larry Brown wanted him to, necessitating the deal for Snow. Iverson isn't really a true point guard who can distribute the ball, and he was seen as being interested in isolation plays than dumping the ball inside.

"I can honestly follow orders better than I did back then," he said.

He meant taking direction on the court, but his effort in

games and ability have rarely been questioned. It's his attitude and his behavior toward practicing, his coaches, and his leadership responsibilities that have gotten him in trouble.

O'Brien insists that won't be a problem this year. The two spoke at length over the summer about Iverson's role. O'Brien even traveled to Turkey for a visit. They never talked about previous indiscretions.

O'Brien said practices will be short, and Iverson will play plenty of minutes.

"He'll be very comfortable with the plan for this basketball team," O'Brien said.

Iverson credits being part of the U.S. Olympic team for his promise of change. While other All-Stars dropped out or showed no interest, Iverson said he's interested in going back for the 2008 games even though the Athens squad only managed a bronze medal.

He'll just have to see how consecutive summers of international basketball will affect his health.

## Vince Carter arrives for Raptors camp

TORONTO (AP) — Vince Carter plans to play hard for the Raptors, even though he still wants out of Toronto.

"It's stupid for me to come up here and just because I want a trade I'm going to mope and pout. That's dumb," Carter said Monday, a day before training camp opens.

"I'm coming here to play. I'm going to do whatever needs to be done until further notice."

Carter asked during the summer to be traded but the Raptors are hoping the All-Star guard changes his mind. Toronto hasn't made the playoffs the past two seasons, and Sam Mitchell will be Carter's third coach in three years.

"That's where the frustration comes from," Carter said. "It's nothing against Coach Mitchell or anybody else. It's like getting a new boss every year. You have to start

over, and it's tough. You say in one sense that you want to win, but yet we have to start over."

Carter has four years remaining on his contract, and he remains one of the NBA's most popular players because of his highlight-reel dunks. But knee injuries have caused him to lose some of his explosiveness.

Now, he can expect to be booed by the home fans.

"It's a tough situation, but you live and move on," he said. "My goal, hopefully, is that they'll understand."

Carter, who will earn \$12 million this season, never had any intention of skipping training camp.


"I have a job to do. I'm coming here to play and win for whatever it says on my jersey," he said. "It says Toronto Raptors, well then I'm going to perform for the Toronto Raptors. I'm going to bust my butt for the Toronto Raptors until that jersey says something else. Until then, well that's where I am."

Mitchell expected Carter to show, but he sounded as if he had some doubts.

"There is a sense of relief that he's here and that he has a smile on his face," Mitchell said.

New general manager Rob Babcock expects Carter to honor his contract, but teammate Jalen Rose thinks the situation will be a distraction.

"Vince has been the only franchise player that this city and team has known, so there's going to be a lot of talk about it, and a lot of fans are going to be drawn to it in a negative way," Rose said. "But as players we still have to play."

## Payton reports to Celtics' training camp


