# UI care for kids lacking

In her third month of pregnancy, UI student Megan Tomjack signed up for university childcare and wound up on a waiting list.

It wasn't until six months after her son, Alexander, was born that a spot in coveted on-campus childcare opened up. By then, Tomjack and Alexander had already found a private daycare that was subsidized by the university.

"I did find a daycare that I'm very happy with," the second-year law student said on Sunday. "But [private daycare] has caused me some issues. It's a lot farther away, and it's not as convenient."

To help prevent scenarios similar to Tomjack's, a UI task force has outlined four recommendations to improve current childcare options that the university provides for faculty, staff, and students.

The recommendations include increasing the number of children cared for through the UI from 102 to 200, considering subsidies for lower-income childcare, providing backup childcare and illness services, and developing educational and awareness programs for the community.

"We really just want to be supportive of our faculty and staff and our students," said Joan Troester, a UI human-resource specialist.

The 12-member task force is now awaiting feedback from the university, Troester said. Interim UI President Gary Fethke and other administrators will determine how to respond to the recommendations, which were released on Oct. 27, after an almost year-long study of campus childcare options.

Following more than 10 years of researching and pushing for such a facility, the UI's much-anticipated Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Resource Center opened its red door to the public on Sunday.

The center will be a place for students to study and relax, as well as a venue in which to hold meetings and bring together gay, lesbian, bisexual,

and transgender students with Iowa City residents, organizers said.

"One of our many goals is building bridges between students and the community," said Carlos Serrato, an assistant director of the Office of Student Life. "And it's not just a safe space but a place to celebrate our music, art, and literature."

UI junior Mark Anthony Dingbaum, a member of the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Allied Union, agreed that the resource center will make it easier for students and community members to promote equality and tolerance.

"The resource center will allow us to put all of our time and energy into one place," he said. "A problem we've had in the past is we haven't had the opportunity to get together [with the community]."

And many are eager to help.

UI graduate student Brenton Thompson said he's ready to make a difference.

"I hope this facility will help me find ways to be of service to the community and a mentor to undergraduates," he said.

The new resource center at 125 Grand Ave. Court didn't happen overnight. Susan Buckley, the UI associate vice president for Human Resources, said people first investigated the possibility of such a center in 1995.

But it wasn't until spring 2005 that the Union members decided to expedite establishing the center after learning that a gay couple had been harassed while leaving a football game.

# Man denies hate crime

A UI student arrested early on Oct. 27 in connection with the assault of a gay man outside Studio 13 claimed injustice Sunday, accusing police of being uncooperative and refusing to listen to his side of the story.

Police said Michael Murphy, 19, made "multiple, unprovoked, derogatory comments" about the accuser's sexual orientation and punched him in the face about 1:47 a.m.

"He came up to the group and said, 'Fuck you fatty fag,'" the reported victim told *The Daily Iowan*. Murphy's accuser said he has performed at the bar as a drag queen.

Upon the arrival of the police, the accuser said he had a bruise on his forehead and identified Murphy as his attacker, according to police reports.

The man went to Mercy Hospital for treatment for the bump on his forehead and redness around his right ear, Iowa City police Sgt. Doug Hart said on Oct. 27.

Murphy, a UI engineering major, now faces charges of assault in violation of individual rights — an aggravated misdemeanor commonly referred to as a "hate crime" — and public intoxication, a simple misdemeanor. An Iowa Courts online search revealed no previous charges against Murphy.

# Lack of financial support hurting UI

As part of The Daily Iowan's 2006 midterm-election coverage, this week, DI reporters will explore key issues on voters' minds. Today's story breaks down various aspects of higher education.

Tuition. Financial aid. Faculty salaries. Research grants. Facility maintenance.

A host of university functions depends on state and federal funding, as UI administrators show.

When UI Student Financial Aid Director Mark Warner contemplates the challenges confronting higher education, he dwells on one

major problem — a lack of adequate financial support.

"In my opinion, there is nothing more critical than for Congress to increase the amount of money to the Pell Grant program," he said.

With state and federal lawmaking bodies up for grabs, the overall quality of Iowa's state Board of Regent universities may depend on the lawmakers triumphing in the Nov. 7 elections.

The looming Nov. 7 elections have politicized certain facets of higher education, one of which are

federally awarded Pell Grants.

The grants help economically disadvantaged students obtain access to higher education, said Beth Oakes, the associate director of federal direct loans and federal Pell Grants in the UI Office of Student Financial Aid.

Officials tout the program as an effective means to ensure affordable education because — unlike loans — Pell Grants do not have to be repaid.

"From an administration standpoint, we would always like

to see the dollar amount of the Pell Grant increase, Oakes said.

A recent study by *U.S. News & World Report* ranked the UI a lowly 137th out of 207 schools in the percentage of students receiving Pell Grants, with just 18 percent of the UI population garnering the federal aid.

The University of La Verne in California ranked first at 97 percent.

Oakes attributed the numbers, in part, to some schools serving more students who are economi-

cally disadvantaged. She also noted that the UI plays no role in selecting students for the grants.

One student who said she has felt the pinch of increased rates on her student loans is UI junior Alicia Cikowski.

While her parents pay for some of her education, she said, she has seen increases in both her tuition and interest rates, and she recommended lawmakers provide more aid for out-of-state students.

### DI nabs Pacemaker award

The *Daily Iowan* is one of the best campus newspapers in the nation. On Oct. 28, the Associated Collegiate Press awarded the Pacemaker — the top award the organization gives to college papers — to the *DI*, along with five other daily newspapers.

The award marks both the first nomination and victory since the *DI* attained the honor in 2001. The award began in 1927.

"We're good every year, but it's nice to have other people think so as well," *DI* Publisher Bill Casey said.

The Pacemaker was handed out at a National College Media Convention in St. Louis over the weekend; it reflects content appearing in the *DI* during the 2005-06 publishing year, when Jennifer Sturm served as editor. Though the award represents the overall quality of the winning papers, the *DI*'s package on the April 13 tornadoes and an in-depth report on house parties were among those stories reviewed by judges.

*DI* Editor Meghan Sims described the award as a reflection of the overall quality of the *DI*'s staff.

"This is just a great win for the paper," she said. "It's a good barometer of how hard everyone works around here."

In addition, the article, "House parties: Tales from the unregulated wasteland," written by former *DI* reporters Drew Kerr and Nick Petersen, was named third-best feature story of the year by the organization.

The *Iowa State Daily* was also a Pacemaker finalist in the daily division but did not receive the award.

### 9 hit in alcohol sting

Nine local businesses failed an alcohol compliance check during a sting operation that ran from Oct. 27 into the early morning of Oct. 28.

Offending employees at each business were cited and released; the offense carries a hefty fine of \$710 plus court costs.

Businesses that failed included Fitzpatrick's, Gasby's, Hilltop, the First Ave. Hy-Vee, Martinis, North Dodge Express, Piano Lounge, and the Vine on Prentiss Street.

Charges are still pending at Et

Cetera and Martinis.

At Fitzpatrick's, Cole Bultman, 23, was charged; at Gasby's, Donald Schrader, 60, was charged; at Hilltop, Amy Abdagic, 25, was charged. Alanah Atley, 56, was charged at Hy-Vee; James Weiler, 20, was charged at North Dodge Express; Adam Hachmeister, 22, was charged at Piano Lounge, and Erica Wayne, 21, was charged at the Vine.

Each now faces charges of serving alcohol to a minor.

Twenty-five businesses refused to sell alcohol to minors.

"The efforts of these responsible business people are commended," police Sgt. Troy Kelsay wrote in a press release.

### Man charged with theft

An Iowa City man was charged with second-degree theft after police said he allegedly took nearly \$2,000 of money from the register at a Coral Ridge Ave. business between August and October.

Bryan VanVang, 23, was charged with the felony on Oct. 26, reports show. Police said VanVang, who was a cashier at the 1451 Coral Ridge Ave. No. 222 business, allegedly grabbed cash from the register while working.

Reports showed VanVang later allegedly admitted to taking the money to pay his bills.

He now faces charges of second-degree theft, a felony.

In a similar incident, police charged a Hills man in September for theft after he was accused of voiding more than \$11,000 in food charges from the register at Coralville's Pancho's Mexican Grill. In that incident, police alleged that Brian Shaull, 27, pocketed \$11,287.29 from the business between April 2 and July 28.

### Sheriff's Office recovers boat

Recovery operations for a boat that sank near Sandy Beach at the Coralville Reservoir ended on Sunday, and officials reported that it may have been abandoned or purposely sunk.

No injuries were reported in the incident, said Johnson County Sheriff's Sgt. Dan Quiles.

"The boat has been recovered," he said. "It doesn't appear there was ever anybody with the boat."

Quiles described the situation as unusual, saying such sinkings happen periodically but not very often.

He couldn't remember the last time a boat sank in the Reservoir, Quiles said.

If it is discovered someone sank the boat on purpose, perhaps as a means to dispose of it, the perpetrator could be charged Quiles said, adding he wasn't sure exactly what the charge would be.

"I've never charged someone for that," he said.

The incident is still under investigation by the Department of Natural Resources and the Sheriff's Office, authorities said.

For sinking incidents, the Sheriff's Office keeps specially equipped boats that have depth finders and sonar.

### UI earns presidential honor

The UI earned high marks in its efforts to foster community service, and it was named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for 2006, the first year the school has received such a distinction.

A contributing factor to how well the university placed on the honor roll was its handling of aid efforts in response to Hurricane Katrina.

More than \$170,000 was donated through fundraising and university sources, said Mary Mathew Wilson, the coordinator of the civic-engagement program, to help support the 12 undergraduates and 14 graduate students who lost their place due to the hurricane.

The distinction happened just a year after the UI developed the civic-engagement program, an effort to connect students' with the university's larger goal of serving the community.

The 2005-06 year was also the Year of Public Engagement, declared by former UI President David Skorton as a year to focus on the university's engagement with the public at large and take a broad interactive role on public issues.

### UI scientist wins NSF grant

A UI researcher recently received a nearly \$2 million grant from the National Science Foundation to study the evolution of photosynthesis in plants.

Debashish Bhattacharya of the Roy J. Carver Center for Comparative Genomics will conduct research for two years, mapping the genome of a single-celled algae.

Researchers believe the algae will offer insights into the evolution of modern plant cells and the beginning of ecosystems on the Earth, approximately 1.5 billion years ago. The algae, cyanophora, has been previously unmapped and lacks a complete genome sequence.

The research will better allow future biologists to annotate plant genomes and one-celled organisms, as well as allowing current scientists an opportunity to look at the origin of plant-specific characteristics.

Bhattacharya will work with Jeffrey Boore of Symbio Corp. in California. UI courses will have research methods featured in the experiment, and the NSF will fund a summer workshop for undergraduates on the project.

The Iowa City City Council is seeking members for a new city committee.

The Animal Care Task Force will review ordinances relating to animal care, evaluate Animal Services licensing & Adoption Center guidelines and develop programs to educate citizens on reducing animal overpopulation. The group will also review current licensing programs and write a report of the task force's annual activities.

The five-person organization will be composed of two Iowa City, one Coralville, and one Johnson County resident. The remaining member will be selected by the Friends of the Animal Care Foundation.

The new task force will meet at least four times annually.

Applications for the task force are due Nov. 9 in the office of the Iowa City city clerk, 410 E. Washington St. The members will serve until June 30, 2009.

Rep. Dave Jacoby, D-Coralville, also voiced support for Pell Grants and suggested a more anticipatory approach may be needed to ensure adequate appropriations for public universities.

"What we need to do is budget out a minimum of three years and, optimally, five years," he said.

While he said he will propose such a measure next legislative session — a proposal he believes would receive bipartisan support — Jacoby said some may oppose it because the political control of the state House may change.

"The problem with politics is, it gets too political," he said.

Meanwhile, among the most contentious aspects of higher education have been state-level budget cuts. And neither state lawmakers nor the regents, who govern public universities, has been eager to take responsibility for funding shortfalls.

During the last legislative session — which concluded May 3 — Iowa's regent universities received just \$11 million of the requested \$40 million in supplemental general-operating funds from the state. Lawmakers defended their actions by pointing to specialized funds that they appropriated, including \$10 million in infrastructure-specific monies.

But regardless of where the blame lies, the budget cuts have had tangible effects on college students' pocketbooks.

UI tuition has nearly doubled in six years. The projected tuition and fees for the 2006-07 academic year are \$5,935 for Iowa residents and \$18,195 for nonresidents, compared with \$3,204 and \$10,966, respectively, for the 2000-01 school year.

And federal legislative initiatives have compounded funding woes for students at public schools.

To assuage federal deficits wrought by tax cuts and military interventions, Congress in 2005 significantly raised Stafford Loan interest rates and sliced \$11.9 billion from federal loan programs — the largest cut in the programs' history. Vice President Dick Cheney cast the tie-breaking vote in the Senate, paving the way for the adoption of the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005.

But tuition rates and loans aren't the only factors affected by fluctuations in state and federal funding.

From research labs and classrooms and to libraries and recreation centers, the 16 million square feet of floor space in UI buildings — some of which are more than 100 years old — require constant maintenance and upkeep.

"We have a lot of buildings we take real pride in," said Doug True, the UI senior vice president for Finance. "But as every day goes by, they are deteriorating, and we have to constantly restore them. We do the best we can."

True said the university strives to dedicate 1.5 percent of the replacement value of campus buildings to maintenance, which is roughly \$20 million per year.

But officials often struggle finding money to fulfill that commitment, he said.

"We are making progress to get there," True said. "But we are not at the price-level we need to

be at on a regular basis."

Money for infrastructure management comes from various sources separate from state appropriations, he said. Alumni donations partially foot the bill for special projects, such as the art-campus renovations.

Research grants also depend in part on state appropriations, said Twila Reighley, a UI assistant vice president for Research. Many federal agencies require universities to match funding. For example, a \$200,000 equipment purchase may only be possible if the UI can match the funding agency's grant of \$100,000 with \$100,000 of its own.

The quality of research may be affected by state funding in other, less direct ways, Reighley said.

"A project is unlikely to be funded without a researcher's great idea," she said. "Competitive salaries are required to attract and retain quality faculty and researchers."

# Man accuses police

"I feel so different now," the reported victim said Sunday. "I just kind of feel shut down. I come to [Studio 13] to be happy."

Murphy was released from the Johnson County Jail on the morning of Oct. 27. He updated his Facebook status at 10:56 a.m. on that day to read, "Mike is thinking of a plan to bomb Studio 13."

"A joke," Murphy said with a laugh on Sunday, insisting that he didn't dislike gay men.

"That's kind of crazy," Studio 13 manager Matthew Dolter said. "[The incident] wasn't really related to the bar."

According to Murphy, the night revolved around police who were not accommodating and

made him — not the gay man — the victim of discrimination.

"I felt just because I was in the minority in the group I was pointed out," he said.

Murphy said he was walking alone by Studio 13, 13 S. Linn St., when a group of men made "unusual comments" to him, which he declined to elaborate.

Numerous people also punched Murphy before they reported the incident to police, Murphy asserted.

The reported victim said he did tell Murphy to leave the alley but denied starting the altercation.

Murphy was outside the bar "saying he was sick and tired of living next to gays," the reported victim said, adding he told Murphy to "just walk away."

At first, Murphy appeared to

follow his advice, but he soon returned to the area and punched the man in the face once and in the back of the head "10 or 15 times," Murphy's accuser said.

Murphy said that when police arrived, they didn't ask for his side of the story and didn't give him the option to press charges against the other men.

Officers who are investigating the incident could not be reached for comment on Sunday.

Dolter said he thought the incident was handled well by police.

"I hope it never happens again," he said.

Police typically see less than one hate crime per year in Iowa City, Hart said on Oct. 27.

After presenting the revised reports to former UI President David Skorton and Phillip Jones, the UI vice president for Student Services, and university officials approved the center's launch this spring.

"Students initiated it," Jones said at the center's opening ceremony. "Students made it happen, and students deserve the credit."

UI alumnus Ryan Roerman, the director of the Iowa Pride Network who was key in the center's opening, said another reason the center is so important is it is a place in which students can go to feel safe.

[gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender] students who aren't accepted at home, so they come to the university looking for that," he said, adding that he hopes to publicize the Union and its services through the center.

The facility itself has a

resource room, several lounge areas, an office, and a kitchen — and is staffed by a graduate student who is assisted by three work-study undergraduate students. The concept of the center is similar to that of the ethnic centers that serve the UI student population.

Though the resource center is a step in the right direction, Buckley said, much still needed to be done to eradicate anti-gay sentiment on campus.

# Panel wants kid facilities

One primary concern of the task force is infant care. Of the university's 102 childcare spots, 18 are reserved for infants. The committee recommended adding 50-60 childcare spots, which would fulfill 65 percent of waiting-list needs, according to the report.

Additionally, the task force recommends renovating one to two of the existing childcare sites and collaborating efforts with community childcare centers in the area.

The report cited obsolete UI childcare facilities, awareness of childcare needs, and results of the Faculty Gender Equity Task Force among the problems that warrant a childcare update.

Troester declined to comment on the cost and other possible problems UI administrators may have with the committee's recommendations.

"We hope we can increase our capacity of campus and childcare slots," she said. "The committee feels very positive about these recommendations."

Tomjack said she won't switch daycares now. Alexander is used to his current daycare provider, but services through the UI would have been preferred, Tomjack said.

"I can't even tell you how beneficial that would be," she said about a potential increase of available on-campus childcare. "That would be wonderful."

# Harkin fires up Dem crowd

When Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, entered 348 IMU, he pumped his fist to the cheers and encouraging whistles of roughly 50 supporters.

In town on Oct. 27 to stump for fellow Democrat and congressional hopeful Dave Loebsack, Harkin seemed at ease in front of the liberal-friendly crowd, which included Sen. Joe Bolkcom, D-Iowa City, Sen. Bob Dvorsky, D-Coralville, and uncontested Johnson County Attorney candidate Janet Lyness.

"I've had a lot of fun in politics during my life," Harkin said. "And I think politics ought to be fun. My good friend Sen. Paul Wellstone used to say, 'The future of politics belongs to those with passion.'"

Loebsack possesses such passion, said Harkin, who predicted that a victory for Iowa's 2nd District challenger over incumbent Rep. James Leach, R-Iowa, would help restore "hope and opportunity" to Americans.

Upon taking the microphone, Loebsack expressed gratification to Harkin for his appearance.

"He's one of my heroes," he said in opening his 15-minute address. "I've followed him throughout his career."

Shortly after, Loebsack took some key jabs at Leach, a 30-year veteran of Congress.

"Jim Leach is a good man, but he is absolutely ineffective," he said, referring to what he deemed Leach's inability to curtail the Bush administration's political agenda.

Loebsack called into question Leach's professed independence from unpopular Republican policies. Late in his speech, he remarked, "So long as [Leach] has an 'R' behind his name, he's part of the problem and not part of the solution."

He also articulated what he called "the need to reward alternative energy sources," which has become a staple of his campaign.

"I'd love to work with Sen. Harkin on introducing tax credits for wind turbines," he said. "In doing so, we can provide jobs in Iowa's 2nd District as well."

Harkin kept his focus on

higher education — specifically, the federal government's responsibility to make it affordable. He noted that interest rates on student loans were 1 percent during his college days and that no interest had accumulated during his time in law school and in military service.

Similar support should be in place for today's college students, the senator said.

"We need to look at education not as spending but as an investment," he said and cited Nobel Prize winners and accomplishments in space exploration as past dividends of investment in education.

In closing, Harkin encouraged the crowd to remain politically active and vote on Nov. 7. "Let's get it done," he said, and the small room erupted in a standing ovation.

# Attempted sex assault reported



Another attempted sexual assault was reported in the early morning hours of Oct. 28, making it the fourth-straight home football game weekend marred by such an attack.

Around 1:10 a.m., between the 400 and 700 blocks of East Jefferson Street, an assailant reportedly pursued a woman who was walking alone and pushed her to the ground, according to Iowa City police.

The woman briefly lost consciousness after striking her head, authorities said. She reportedly awoke to the sound of two nearby voices, both males. A passerby yelled at the two men, who then fled the scene.

The woman declined medical attention after filing the report,

and no descriptions of the suspects were available as of Sunday.

The most recent case comes on the heels of other reported sexual assaults that have plagued Iowa City in recent months, particularly during

weekends with home football games. Three separate attacks were reported on Oct. 7, and a similar incident was reported Sept. 30 behind the Airliner, 22 S. Clinton St.

"At this point, we're relying on the public to come forward with any information," Iowa City police Sgt. Bill Campbell said.

Two alleged attacks on the weekend of Sept. 15 yielded similar suspect descriptions, and police released a composite sketch and description of the perpetrator — dark hair and eyes, 5' 9", and roughly 165 pounds. But authorities have no evidence that suspect is involved in the Oct. 28 assault.

Campbell said game-day congestion may unfortunately be conducive to such crimes.

"There are obviously more people in the downtown area, and, therefore, suspicious

behavior is less likely to stand out," he said. "Another possibility is that the suspects come to town for football games. But it's all speculative, at this point."

Authorities said the case is still under investigation; they encourage witnesses — particularly the passerby — to come forward with information. Anyone with knowledge on this latest attempted sexual assault or any other cases can reach Lt. Jim Steffen at 356-5275.

# Seeing water as metaphor, water as life

Blinking out at the cadre of world-class novelists, environmental engineers, and policymakers before him, Mark Twain biographer Ron Powers expressed a shaky faith in his ability to contribute to a two-day symposium about solving the world's water problem.

"It's not often we writers are released from solitary confinement," he said. He was in awe, he said, as he prepared to tackle the global issue alongside those who "are actually doing something useful."

But Christopher Merrill, the director of the UI International Writing Program, had no such doubts when he first envisioned the interdisciplinary assembly, which commenced Oct. 28 with Powers' keynote lecture in the Art Building West.

Merrill's goal? "To see if we could bridge their perspectives, even different languages, in an effort to come up with new ways of thinking about water," said Merrill, who first hatched the idea to hold the Mississippi River Symposium with Meredith Hay, the UI vice president for Research, over a few glasses of wine.

"You see what wine can do?" Merrill said, prompting laughter from the two dozen participants.

The UI has a long tradition of integrating several disciplines, yet writer-scientist collaborations seldom reach this extent, said Jay Semel, the director of the Obermann Center for Advanced Studies.

"I think we've never done this on such a grand scale," he

said. A mix of UI academics and experts from around the world, the water-minded group was scheduled to meet in Dubuque for closed sessions to discuss participant-driven topics on Sunday and today.

Before the event, each participant wrote a position paper and formulated discussion questions — the variety of which reflected her or his diversity. "How do we influ-

ence human occupation of the floodplain?" one wondered. Another: "What if a river is only a river?"

The latter inquiry reflected the writer's belief that while the Mississippi and Nile are ingrained in popular imagination, scientific understanding is somewhat less widespread.

"We think we know about rivers," Semel said, summarizing the argument. "But in fact, we don't know enough about science and how

[rivers] affect human life, and water quality, and what have you."

The symposium draws on the United Nation's declaration that 2005-15 is the International Decade of Action titled "Water for Life." With rising sea levels induced by global climate change and increasingly polluted waterways, the emphasis is valid,

Merrill said. Hurricane Katrina proved all the mighty wrath of the Mississippi, he added.

Powers stressed the pragmatism required to tackle concerns that seem impenetrable.

"The truth-telling impulse encourages all to temper their temperings. The window of hope is a narrow one," said

the Pulitzer-Prize-winning writer, who grew up in Hannibal, Mo.; he has written several books on the waterway fictionally traversed by Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn.

"Time is running out," he said.

The IWP organized a similar meeting this summer in Greece that united 15 writers from around the world to discuss "what we hold in common," Merrill said. A full-length documentary about the event will soon circulate at film festivals worldwide, and a collection of essays will also be released. After the Mississippi River Symposium, a similar published work will come to fruition, he said.

Ultimately, participants embarked on a "remarkable journey," Hay said — "talking about water as a metaphor and as the substance of life."

# UISG's internal focus shifts attention from students

The recent budget ordeal and ongoing debate over how to split UI Student Government creates the perception that internal disagreements and issues are taking precedent over issues more relevant to students.

While UISG has its accomplishments, such as cosponsoring the UI Energy Expo and backing the proposal to help disabled students get textbooks on time, it needs to pass more bills and to demonstrate more visible activity that apply directly to students at large.

UISG is understandably experiencing internal difficulties as it attempts to restructure itself, but the divide over how to split the Graduate and Professional Student Senate is being dragged out, costing time and effort. The committee tasked with looking into the separation has until Dec. 31, a deadline that could conceivably be moved up to speed the process. A slightly more disconcerting internal issue was the budget-drafting problems resulting from failure of senates to agree on funding.

Though officials contend that more time is necessary in order for the effects of legislation to be seen, and people should expect that more initiatives will come to fruition next year, UISG needs to show progress to demonstrate to students that it is working on its behalf.

Other projects in the works include implementing a more effective recycling program in the dorms and the Know Your Rights Campaign —

meant to educate students about their legal rights. There are no problems with these projects or working on splitting UISG, which was approved by a student vote. The problem is a feeling that not enough is getting done outside of UISG's chambers.

One of the seven current executive branch initiatives listed on the UISG website is to keep the UISG website updated. However, a look at the site shows that many sections are still sparse. The frequently asked questions section has yet to be written, and a number of other links request that you "check back soon." Worse still are the more important sections meant to keep students informed, such as the "executive reports" section, which is to be written on a three-week cycle but from the site's appearance, the reports have never been posted. Then there is the legislation section for approved bills, which contains only a snippet informing students that the page is for passed legislation. Granted, the website does have minutes posted, but the unappealing process of reading through a budget discussion is inferior to a summation of passed legislation.

There is a need for greater transparency and progress on issues more relevant to students as a whole. The internal issues are important and need to be resolved — but not at the expense of other needs that also must be met.

### McCain coverage needs work

Dean Treftz's account of Sen. John McCain's appearance in Ames fell far short of the serious news coverage it deserved ("McCain discusses gay rights, Korea," Oct. 19). Why should it be surprising? and requiring that they be discharged if they are somehow discovered, no matter how responsibly they serve their country. Placing quotation marks around the word suggests that the discrimination in this context is somehow trivial, made up, or merely perceived by some. "Don't ask, don't tell," (which Treftz failed to explain in his article) is, by definition, a discriminatory policy. The article makes no hint as to how McCain responded to the question.

Treftz's reporting was fuzzy, disjointed, and wholly unsatisfactory. Do better.

# Finding an America beyond the clichés

Iowa City is known as a home for writers year round, but every fall, a particularly international tribe of scribes hits town with the UI International Writing Program residency. This week, the Arts & Culture section is profiling a selection of the novelists, poets, essayists, screenwriters, and journalists who have spent the past three months calling Iowa City home.

Today, in the first installment of our six-part series, the DI talks to Kyrgyz writer Jamby Djusubaliev about her childhood in Kyrgyzstan, classical literature, and how Iowa City breaks the American stereotype.

journalism, the writer only turned in four translated works, rather than the full 10 required. Djusubaliev then forgot about the IWP, Iowa, and writing, because her mother's health worsened. Toward the end of June, Djusubaliev found out she had been accepted by the program. Then, "my family decided 'yeah, I should go,'" she said.

"I came, and I don't regret it at all," she said. "Iowa City goes completely against all those clichés about America."

Although the decision to go was one of the hardest decisions she had to make, she has enjoyed her time in Iowa exceedingly. "[Iowa City] is the place where everything flourishes," she said, adding that although great literature is present in the States, the average voracious reader must search diligently to find it within a television-dominated society.

As a frequent contributor to the Kyrgyz and European press, along with her position as editor-in-chief of the journal *Meerim*, Djusubaliev has used the Soviet education system of her youth to further her writing success.

The 39-year-old said her schooling, from primary to collegiate, focused heavily on classical literature. Her parents emphasized the importance of education, which cultivated her desire to learn and share her knowledge with others.

"At 7 years old, I would write three or four stories, and my parents kept them," she said. "They were very proud." Her relationship with her parents molded her mind artistically. Falling asleep to the sounds of her father reading *Macbeth* more often than fairy tales, she said she was always interested in major literary works.

As a teenager, she submitted articles to local media outlets so others could read her material.

"I didn't think I would be a professional writer," she said. "I never had this aim."

Living in a Soviet republic during the Cold War, Djusubaliev and her family occupied lives dominated by Russian control. Her filmmaker father was blacklisted and labeled a dissenter before turning to screenplay editing; her mother was an actress-turned-filmmaker who also directed documentaries.

"They were not members of the Communist Party," she said. "And if you're artists and not members, you have a really hard life."

Parental influence continued to affect Djusubaliev — she chose to study cinema at Moscow State University, from which she graduated in 1990.

The writer said not all of the outcomes of the communist government were negative. During her last academic year at Moscow State University — when the Berlin Wall fell, creating the domino effect that resulted in, first, the breakup of the Soviet Bloc and, eventually, the dissolution of the Soviet Union — through intensive negotiations, she was able to come to the United States

for the first time.

Smiling, she said, "I'm a victim — I mean, product — of Soviet education."

Scheduled to leave Iowa City Nov. 22, the international writer will return to Bishkek a week later.

"It was enriching for me as a journalist [to come]," she said, sipping her espresso macchiato. "I don't want to sound pathetic, but I'm happy I found my America here beyond the clichés and policy of government."

Returning to her life of media journalism and public relations, Djusubaliev also brings back another goal. Although she feels at home in Iowa, she is set on completing her mother's unfinished 1992 film — an effort that's part

fable, part social commentary.

"I really would like to finish it [for her]," she said. "This is my dream."

She called the film a philosophical fable, because the protagonist is a chicken commenting on the contemporary state of the world. She said there's need for the film today, specifically for "people aspiring merely for the good thing — peaceful decisions, humanitarian development," she said. "Maybe I feel [the need] very much here in Iowa."

She expressed relief at the general attitude of Iowa City residents, because they oppose the "common condescending attitude toward the creating person."

As we finished our beverages, she offered me a brownie, demonstrating the generosity of the Kyrgyz. She gave me a kiss on the cheek and her information in case I ever make it to the opposite side of the world, where art and art appreciation still manage to flourish.

After sitting in the Prairie Lights Java House for a few minutes by myself, the Kyrgyz writer made eye contact with me and introduced herself as Jamby. "So sorry I'm late," she said. A long-distance phone call had kept her occupied as she completed plans to leave the States, stopping for a week to visit friends in Connecticut before going back to her Central Asian home.

Jamby Djusubaliev, has been living in Iowa City for the past three months as part of the UI International Writing Program. Like the program, she has been around since 1967.

Her blonde hair and green eyes seem incongruous with her origins; most Kyrgyz reflect the country's Mongolian influence: brown hair, brown eyes, tan skin.

"I'm often seen as a Russian," she said. Djusubaliev said that only around 3 to 5 percent of the population have the Eastern European features of Kyrgyzstan's original people. "We're a multiethnic country." Invaded by the Mongols and the Russians, the Kyrgyz have adapted and learned the benefits of mingling different cultures, religions, and traditions. Djusubaliev herself speaks six languages.

Djusubaliev, a translator and journalist, lives in the country's capital, Bishkek. Djusubaliev declined her first invitation to participate in the IWP, deciding to continue her studies in France.

She received her second invitation just as her mother's health was declining. After weeks of indecision, she hastily filled out the application, per her father's request.

"It was quick," she said. "I didn't have time to translate [all of] my work."

Having no published books and mainly working in




**Women runners snag 6th**

The Iowa women's cross-country team placed sixth in the tough Big Ten championships, beaten only by teams ranked in the top 15 nationally. Sunday's finish — an improvement over seventh last year — is Iowa's highest since placing fifth in 1993.

For the fifth-straight year, Michigan ran away with the team title.

The Hawkeyes were led by juniors Meghan Armstrong and Racheal Marchand, who earned All-Big Ten honors with eighth and 12th-place finishes.

Diane Nukuri again struggled toward the end but still contributed a 16th-place finish.

The Hawkeyes knew they would need an entire team effort to do well. Although they couldn't beat any higher ranked schools, they kept the race close. Iowa finished only five points from fifth place and 21 from second.

"That's how much we missed out on it by," coach Layne Anderson said. "[Illinois and Michigan State] gave us chances to beat them, but we didn't."

Iowa quarterback Jake Christensen didn't panic, although he was pushed. Even in the tightest spots during his first career start, the redshirt freshman had an air of confidence and poise.

With Iowa leading by just three points midway through the fourth quarter, the 20-year-old Christensen engineered an 80-yard scoring drive to secure a 24-14 victory over Northern

*Illinois at Kinnick Stadium and help the Hawkeyes become bowl eligible for the sixth-straight season.*

*Christensen, a prep All-American who started for the injured Drew Tate, completed 19-of-30 passes for 256 yards and a pair of touchdowns, and Iowa escaped a late comeback effort by the Huskies to snap a two-game skid.*

*"This is something I've been dreaming about my whole life," Christensen said. "I think that's something a lot of little*

kids dream about and not a lot of guys get the opportunity to do."

Two touchdowns in the first seven minutes of the fourth quarter put Northern Illinois back in the contest, but Iowa answered with a long drive, despite a holding penalty and a sack. Still, the Hawkeyes faced a fourth down on the 10-yard line.

The usually conservative Hawkeye coach Kirk Ferentz pushed all his chips onto the table, albeit two missed field

goals earlier in the game made the decision easier. The bet paid off.

Christensen, who made big throws for 35 and 24 yards on the possession, connected with tight end Scott Chandler on a quick pass for a 10-yard score with 3:56 remaining for a 24-14 lead.

"At that point in the game, we had to respond. We needed to respond," Ferentz said. "That was critical, and I

Passes flew out of hands instead of into them. Two drives were killed by missed field goals. A punt return was fumbled, recovered, and returned for negative yardage. Northern Illinois drives were extended not by big plays but by tiny penalty flags tossed at numerous Hawkeye defenders.

Iowa's 24-14 win was just a few more miscues away from becoming Indiana Part II.

Rather than panic after the Huskies rallied for 14 unanswered points in the fourth quarter, cutting the deficit to three, quarterback Jake Christensen found 6-7 target Scott Chandler late in the fourth quarter for a touchdown, quelling the comeback.

"I thought that was probably the biggest positive of the day for us," coach Kirk Ferentz said about the play, which ensured a sixth victory and bowl eligibility for his team. "The way that offense responded that entire drive. Momentum had swung dramatically, and we knew going on the field that it'd probably be a good idea if we did something with it."

Iowa's first chance at becoming eligible for the postseason came two weeks ago in the nightmare in Bloomington, Ind. The squad's opportunity to sneak a win in that game ended when a Drew Tate pass was intercepted off a deflection from wide

## Haluska leads Blowout

"The growth of the bigs is coming along," he said. "Seth is learning to drive better, and Cyrus has come a long way in the last two weeks ... A lot will be asked from Tyler."

# Hawkeye D earns an 'A'

Phil Horvath's white jersey might have sprouted grass.

The Northern Illinois quarterback was battered, beaten, and bruised, thanks to a suddenly stingy Hawkeye defense. His once-clean uniform reflected an afternoon of peeling himself off the Kinnick Stadium turf like roadkill.

Although the Hawkeyes didn't officially notch a sack, it was evident an improved pass rush harassed Horvath — forcing him into three turnovers. The defense snared two interceptions and recovered a fumble.

"We came out and had a lot of intensity, like last week," Hawkeye safety Marcus Paschal said. "We didn't come up with the win [last week], but we tried to continue with that this week."

Back in the starting lineup for the second-consecutive game and appearing healthy for the first time since suffering a shoulder injury against Ohio State, Paschal was all over the field, notching six tackles. His second-quarter interception in Huskie territory proved to be pivotal — it set up an Iowa touchdown six plays later to make the score 17-0 at half-time.

"[The interception] felt lovely," Paschal said. "Last week, I thought I had my hands on one. Unfortunately, I didn't get it. It was about time; it was my first pick in like two years."

The Iowa defense backpedaled a bit in the fourth quarter, giving up two quick touchdowns to make it

17-14, but after a Hawkeye touchdown, A.J. Edds forced a Horvath fumble to seal the Hawkeye victory.

Maybe the most impressive feat of the stellar defensive performance was holding the nation's leading rusher, Garrett Wolfe, to 66 yards on 22 carries. The senior came into the game averaging more than 175 yards per game but found little room to work his cat-quick legs. He averaged three yards per rush, and his long run went for just 11 yards.

"It was a great job by everybody," defensive tackle Mitch King said. "We pursued. The safeties filled gaps. We didn't let him get started. He is a back that at any point you can shut him down 10-12 times, and the 13th time he busts one 60 to 70 yards. Our game plan was to just swarm to the ball and pursue to the ball backside."

Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz praised how his team prepared for the diminutive Wolfe.

"The good thing is that with a guy like this, if you are not at your best, you are going to pay for it," Ferentz said. "The last two weeks we have done a good job in practice, and our scout teams have done a good job of getting after our defense a little bit."

The Hawkeye defense is coming together at the right time. Last week, it held an explosive Michigan offense to 20 points, and this week, Northern Illinois could only muster 196 yards of total offense.

Looming in front of Iowa are three remaining Big Ten games. If Paschal and the rest of the swarming Iowa defense continues their run of impressive play, the Hawkeyes might find themselves in Florida for the fifth year in a row.

# Soccer falls in season finale

It wasn't how the Iowa soccer team envisioned its season's end.

Despite spending a majority of the game defending their third of the field, the Hawkeyes kept Illinois off the board for nearly three-quarters of the match. But the Fighting Illini struck in the 68th minute of play to win the contest, 1-0, thus putting a damper on Iowa's senior night, on which the Hawkeyes honored their lone senior, goalkeeper Ali Becker.

For Illinois, the victory secured the second overall seed in this week's Big Ten Tournament, taking place in State College, Pa. Meanwhile, Iowa's loss ended the 2006 season, with the Hawkeyes finishing tied for last place with Minnesota at 1-8-1 in conference play. Iowa finished with an overall record of 6-11-2, a slight improvement from its 3-12-4 record in 2005.

Iowa head coach Ron Rainey had nothing but praise for the Fighting Illini after the game.

"Illinois is a very good team and very classy," he said. "[The Illini] keep the ball very well and are technical all over the field. I thought we did some nice things defensively against them, but they probably wore us down a little bit, because the ball was in their end for quite a bit of the 90 minutes."

Rainey said Illinois' ability to maintain possession of the ball prevented his squad from countering more often.

"I felt through the first 20 minutes, we had a couple of

opportunities to maybe slot some balls in behind the defense, but we were unable to connect," Rainey said. "Those were maybe the times we could've been dangerous against them."

"You don't want to end the season on a 1-0 loss, but they deserved to get a goal on us for all the pressure they put us under."

Amid the disappointment of losing their fifth 1-0 contest in Big Ten play this season, the players were pleased to see a

closer match with Illinois than the 4-1 decision the Hawkeyes lost at the conclusion of 2005.

"We've lost a lot of games this year 1-0, and I think that's going to give us a lot more motivation to come in harder next year," Iowa sophomore Kelly Warner said. "It's a learning process."

One of the many possible tell-tale signs of a future turnaround came just after the Illini scored the game-winner. Junior Kelsie Full said the final 22 minutes of the match

were the most composed Iowa has been after giving up a goal this entire year.

"In the beginning of the season, when we'd get scored on, we kind of freaked out and lost our composure," she said. "Throughout the season, we've gotten a lot better with that, and we've created a lot more opportunities after we've gotten a goal scored on us."

Although the Hawks lost, she believes emotion helped carry them through the final match.

"Every game, we step out on the field with a ton of emotion, because we have something to prove," Full said. "We're going to continue to do that until we're able to prove what we have to say."

# Hawks don't lose cool

receiver Andy Brodell. The loss against Indiana and the win against Northern Illinois were eerily similar, but this time, when it counted the most, the Hawkeyes stayed cool while heat slapped at their backs.

"There's some parallels, no doubt about that," Ferentz said. "I think we dug in. We responded a lot more favorably. There was a little bit of déjà vu in there.

"I think we played better fundamental defense. That's a starting point. That always gives you a chance. And then there was our response offensively. When we had to have it, we had it."

He wasn't the only one who was spooked with the two-week old upset loss memories.

"I know Indiana was in the back of my mind just a little bit when they were coming

back like that," said tackle Marshal Yanda. "We knew we couldn't let that happen again. No matter what they did, if they scored seven or three or even if they punted, we knew we had to bring the ball down and three or four first downs.

"It was all about responding, and we did."

The answer to Northern Illinois' near upset call was an onslaught of rush offense and defense. Albert Young became the first Iowa running back to gain 100 yards in a game this season. He took some of the pressure off his young signal caller early — 77 of his 124 yards came in the first quarter.

Garrett Wolfe, the nation's leading rusher, was held to more than 100 yards below his average.

"We're a work in progress, right now," Ferentz said. "All teams are, but I think we can still make dramatic improvement."

Next week, another chance

for Indiana Part II awaits in Northwestern. The Wildcats were the prequel to the Indiana loss — they were the Hawkeye slayers last year, upsetting Iowa 28-27 late in the season. The challenge should be familiar — don't get caught looking ahead at a big-time matchup with Wisconsin on Nov. 11.

"None of us will ever know if we were looking ahead at Indiana," Ferentz said. "For whatever reason, we didn't bring our best there. One's not acceptable. Two are really not acceptable. I just hope we're more mature than to think we can not bring our best any week.

"We saw firsthand the kind of heart and attitude Northwestern plays with. It's fewer than 12 months ago that they beat our butts. If we had any [looking past the Wildcats], I'd be really surprised. We better not."

# Hawks stymie comeback try

thought [Christensen] did a great job of orchestrating that drive and dealt with some adversity in the process. It was not easy, but he did the job."

Christensen wasn't alone for personal accolades. Running back Albert Young gained 124 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries — the junior's first 100-yard game this season; he eclipsed triple digits eight times in 2005.

"It took long enough," Young said. "A good run game is able to help the play-action. Those guys were looking in the backfield, biting, and Jake was able to go on top. Everything complements each other."

Northern Illinois running back Garrett Wolfe, the nation's leading rusher, mustered just 66 yards on 22 carries against the Hawkeye defense. But Wolfe scored on a 1-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter to spark a late rally. After forcing an Iowa punt, the Huskies scored again on a 25-yard pass from Phil Horvath to Britt Davis with 8:40 remaining for the 17-14 score.

But Christensen, whose first attempt was intercepted after the ball deflected off Chandler's hands in the first quarter, engineered the game-securing drive. He was the first redshirt freshman

quarterback to start for Iowa since 2000.

The left-hander was just as impressive at the end of the first half, orchestrating a no-huddle drive that ended with a six-yard touchdown to Dominique Douglas, who stretched the ball across the goal line with 18 seconds left before the break. Christensen competed 4-of-5 passes on the drive for 29 yards.

Teammates were quick to offer praise for the young gunslinger but admitted they didn't expect anything less.

"He really did a good job of taking the adversity on and showing what he can do," Chandler said.

He got up for several enormous dunks during warmups and the scrimmage over the weekend, including one on a fast break that left the crowd oohing and ahing. The freshman also impressed Haluska.

Haluska added the team is slowly adjusting to its makeup, and the group's identity starts with defense.

In addition to their effort, the Hawkeyes appear to have stepped up their athleticism. Haluska, Smith, Tate, and Seton Hall transfer David Palmer all look to be excellent finishers near the basket, while guards

Freeman, Justin Johnson, and Henderson are capable of slashing defenses with their ball-handling and driving abilities.

Most important for the Hawkeyes will be protecting the homecourt. The team hasn't lost at Carver-Hawkeye Arena since the 2004-05 season.

"Tony Freeman hasn't lost in this building," Alford said.

With the Black team winning, 83-72, that streak remained alive.

While the statistical production of last year's seniors, including the Hawkeyes' leading rebounder, assist man, and two of the top three scorers, will be sorely missed, Alford says the loss of their locker-room leadership may hurt the most.

"Those are five hard guys to replace, and now you're doing it with just two seniors," he said. "Obviously, everybody respects them, because they've been through it."

"It's a tall order, but we're trying to empower some young guys, as well, whether it's a Tony Freeman, some of these younger guys, give them some leadership, as well."

Projected by many to finish in the bottom half of the conference, the Hawkeyes' tough early season and conference road schedules will not make growing pains any easier on such players as 6-7 freshman Tyler Smith. The top-heavy Big Ten features three teams — Ohio State, Wisconsin, and Indiana — ranked in the top 10 nationally in preseason polls, all of which Iowa faces on the road in a 10-day stretch in January.

Although the gruesome mid-season span would appear the ultimate test for Alford's bunch, Haluska believes a nonconfer-

ence start away from home will be the crucial part of the Iowa season.

"I think the biggest part of our season is going to be the first couple games we play," he said. "We play five or six games on the road in November, and for a young team, some of the guys have never been on the road before, let alone out at Arizona State, down at Saint Thomas, or at Virginia Tech."

Before the team can get off to any start at all, Alford and the rest of the Iowa coaching staff must decide on a starting lineup, something yet to be determined from the opening two weeks of practice. The eighth-year Iowa head coach says the evaluation of fairly equal inexperience and overall athleticism has made picking the tip-off corps very difficult.

"I think if you start asking all the coaches to name their starting lineup, it's hard to figure out," he said. "I don't know what my lineup is going to be yet. It's unusual, but that's what makes this league so much more exciting."

With so many position questions left unanswered, the only sure thing in the Nov. 13 lineup against The Citadel appears to be Haluska, who Sunday joined Penn State's Geary Claxton, Ohio State's Greg Oden, Indiana's D.J. White, and Wisconsin's Alando Tucker as the fifth

member of the preseason All-Big Ten roster. An outstanding honor for Iowa's top-returning scorer, Alford is hopeful the veteran can step into an ever bigger role as a leader his final year.

"We want Adam to have fun and do what he does, and that's score points some more," he said. "He's as good of shooter as there is in the country. He's very athletic and understands how to guard."

"He's not a really vocal individual, but he leads by example, and it's a great example for the rest of the guys to follow."





The weekend moved the Hawkeyes' record to 2-10 in the Big Ten, 13-11 overall. Indiana is 1-11 and 10-14. The Boilermakers are 9-3 and 19-4.

"It feels really good to win again," said Iowa coach Cindy Fredrick, whose team won just once in its last 11 matches before last weekend. "It was really good to see the team play as well as they did."

Senior blocker Melanie Meister hit a team-high .444 against the Hoosiers, while sophomore hitter Catherine Smale led Iowa with 14 kills. Sophomore setter Kiley Fister dished up 44 assists.

The win gave the Hawkeyes a series sweep of the Hoosiers for the second-consecutive season.






